With the passing of Israel Unterberg, American Jewry loses a quiet, lovable, modest and devoted personality whose sincerity and generosity made themselves felt in American Jewish life. One of the finest types of the Russian Jewish immigrant, he achieved genuine distinction by aiding and in-spiring the work of Jewish education in this country. With Professor Mordecai M. Kaplan, he was one of the founders and main supporters of the Society for the Adtributed most generously and unostentatiously to various Jewish philanthropies and re-lief work. But his whole-hearted devotion to the cause of Jewish education was his growning achievement.

He realized that the settlement of Jews in Palestine settlement of Jews in Palestine brough the instrumentality and with the aid of a Jewish Na-tional Fund, would prove the wisest and most practicable pollcy of Jewish rehabilitation in Palestine. There were many Zionists who at first doubted the importance of his project. Ussishkin fought all opposition with his characteristic vigor Events have now confirmed his views, and his contributions to the upbuilding of Eretz Israel are of great, last value to the Tewish people.

The electoral college has long been a source of friction between Venizelists and Salonica Jews, with the latter hotly opposed to its existence. The Venizelists its existence. strongly attacked abolition of separate voting for the Jews, the majority of whom in the last elecmajority of whom in the last elec-tion supported the present govern-ment of Premier Tsaldaros. Ventzelos promised the Jewish leaders that he would bend every effort to the work of establishing

### Local Jewry Hails Tribute To Ussishkin

Dinner in His Honor Tonight at Astor to Further Kfar Plan

Enthusiastic response on the part of local Jewry to the Ussishkin Tribute Dinner tonight in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Astor has led Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Jewish National Fund of America, to issue a statement ex-pressing the firm belief that the Zionist movement will overcome the present discord within its ranks and that the upbuilding of Pales-tine will proceed without further

Dr. Goldstein stated that the allegiance of all Zionist parties to the Jewish National Fund is an encouraging sign of unity. Unity can be achieved, he asserted, when the fundamental objectives of the Zionist ideal are taken into consideration.

The president of the Jewish Na-tional Fund bases these optimistic views on the response to his or-ganization's appeal on behalf of the Kfar Ussishkin project.

The Kfar Ussishkin project was started at the Eighteenth Zionist Congress in Prague last summer, when a resolution was adopted stating that in observance of the seventieth birthday of the veteran Zionist leader, "the whole of Jewry should take part in the establish ment of Kfar Ussishkin." The pro The proment of Krar Ussishkin." The pro-ject calls for the acquisition of an area upon which there will be es-tablished a new colony bearing Ussishkin's name. On this new soil will be settled Jewish pioneers as well as exiles from oppression.

#### Tribute Is Worldwide

The Jewish communities in many The Jewish communities in many countries have already responded cheerfully to the Kfar Ussishkin fund. In Great Britain, Belgium, France, Rumania, Czecho-Slovakia, Bulgaria, Greece and Palestine Ussishkin Jubilee celebrations have already been held and money has been contributed liberally to the fund. Even the stricken Jews of Germany have raised more than \$20,000.



The road which leads from Safed to Meron suddenly assumes a dif-ferent aspect. Noise, excitement, waggons crammed full of people No end to the donkeys which get in everyone's way. People on horseback, afoot, in conveyances, all impelled by one desire, go in one di-rection—towards Meron! The dust of the road rises higher

and higher, getting into everyone's throat and settling on one's lungs -but whom could that keep from the joy which awaits him or from the blazing fire which will spread about the grave of Rabbi Simeon ben Yohai? The spirit takes hold of everyone, young and old alike. Here comes an old Jew from Safed on a donkey. The Jew has long side locks and is wearing a -edged cap. There on a tall horse is a swarthy, sunburned chalutz. There are Jews from all parts of the world here, each wearng the costume peculiar to his habitat. There are Sephardim, wearing red fazzas or turbans. are emaciated Yemenites with blazing black eyes, Bukharian Jews with protruding stom-Women and girls add to the confusion, which grows greater and louder. Donkeys bray at the top of their voices, horses neigh, automobiles break their way through shrilly. The animals and machines mingle with the sea of humans streaming endlessly to-

#### The Sea of Human Heads

And when, before sunset, one gets to Meron, one feels as though one is a part of a gigantic sea of human heads. One's eyes search in vain for an unoccupied spot. All day long preparations have been in progress for the ceremonial fire. The dances have not ceased for a moment. There has been scraping of fiddles and beating of The flutes and the trumdrums. The fittes and the trum-pets have done their best to out-do the rest. And how many were fortunate enough to get inside the yard surrounding the grave of Rabbi Simeon ben Yohai?

Thousands of people were crowded into the space. From everywhere, from every house top and every staircase, people strain, eves fixed upon the tombstones of the great holy man at rest there for hundreds of years.

Here is a group of young peo-ple dancing in a ring. They are pious pupils from the yeshivas wearing long curly sidelocks. And there is a sunburned chalutz, head wound about with a cloth, among them. They circle about, singing. They clap their hands, and the light of ecstasy in their eyes increases. They are preparing for the real sacrificial fire which will scon begin.

The honorable settlers of Safed have just arrived, and the Buvaner Rebbe accompanied by his pupils. They bring the scroll in with songs and exclamations of joy. Force and enthusiasm help to make way for the bearers, who enter the yard about the Rabbi Simeon ben

Yohal's grave in great exaltation.

Night begins to fall quickly.

However, the darkness disappears very suddenly, and on all sides flames rise up and illuminate the dark faces. The holiday spirit takes firmer hold of all hearts pre-

Here and there in the crowd there is singing. Some say the Zohar enthusiastically. Hundreds and hundreds of candles flare up. People crowd upon each other in their eagerness to see over to where the sacrificial flame will soon appear. Mixed with the joy-ous exultation there are the weepous exuitation there are the weep-ing and wailing of prayers to God in Heaven. The smell of the oil lamps chokes up the air. Thou-sands and thousands of heads are lit up by the flaring lights and a holy glow.

#### They Came With Gifts

Near the grave of the holy man great basins have been placed. Jewish men, women and children come up and throw into them various clothes and cloths. Here is a woman coming up to hand a white silk dress to the sexton. There is a beatific expression upon her face. In one hand she bears a bottle filled with olive oil. Her children each touch the bottle, and drops of oil drip upon the white silk dress

A second woman comes up with her household. Each member of the family bears a white kerchief. One by one she hands each ker-chief over to be soaked in oil, that it may rise with the flame of the holy man.

Here is a Jew with a wide yel-ow beard. He throws silver coins upon the altar. A holy light comes into his eyes.

The sexton throws the clothes cloths and other things handed to n into the basins. Bottles of are thrust upon him by dozens him into the basins of hands:

Suddenly the singing ceases. Everybody holds his breath. A holy fear runs through the great crowd standing in the dim glow. The holy moment for which Jews from all parts of the land and from many lands have gathered here is at hand. The eyes of all are turned towards the grave, and with bated breath all await the flame which will rise from it.

Nazi Germany has launched its first great offensive against American Jewry. Flying the colors of the DAWA (Deutsch-Amerikan-ischer Wirtschafts-Ausschuss; the German American Protective Alli-ance) Hitler's former American Nazi Party has declared a boycott on American Jews.

Elsewhere is reproduced the cover of the Business Guide of the DAWA, which has recently come off the press and is being widely distributed to anti-Semites throughout New York. The booklet, the first of a series to follow, contains almost one thousand names of firms, each of which have paid \$5 for the privilege of being listed among those which do not boycott German goods. It exhorts its subscribers, which according to this reporter's information, have risen during the few weeks of the organization's existence, to over 15,000 in New York City and en-virons, to patronize DAWA stores and wear the DAWA button.

American Nazis have now appealed to their former countrymen with the declaration that the Jews intend boycotting them regardless of the wares they handle.

The United German Societies has publicly announced, with re-gard to the ultimate expansion of the DAWA, that "There is not a shadow of doubt that American citizens of German descent will

The purpose of the DAWA as set forth in pamphlets put out by the United German Societies follows: In securing the collapse of the anti-Nazi boycott--

1. To combine all German-Americans in the city of New York in one defensive front; 2. To organize a community

of interests of all those, be they importers or merchants, artists or artisans, who are the victims of the boycott;

3. To influence and induce all American citizens of German origin and millions of other rightthinking Americans to patronize only such firms which are known to reject the boycott and which have joined the organization mentioned in two.

Lecturers are being sent to all German American societies in the metropolitan district in the cru-sade to convert the entire German-American population to DA WA principles. Thus far few if any organizations outside those controlled by the Nazified United German American Societies have subscribed to the plan, but ob-servers report that large blocs from the major societies have expressed their willingness to join. A 'German' Store

We have in the above plan the scheme for the creation of a Ger-man-American commercial empire. The plan provides for its expansion to become an American "Aryan" business association. The DAWA has announced that it will shortly bring into existence its first venture, a German store selling German goods. It is hoped by its sponsors that the success of this concern will warrant the establishment of other stores selling German goods almost exclusing German goods almost exclusions. ing German goods almost exclu-

sively.

The DAWA was brought before the public on the evening of April 8, when approximately 12,000 persons sought entrance to the Ridgewood Grove Arena in Brooklyn.
Two hundred uniformed stormtroopers stood guard. The crowd booed at the mention of Jews. Jewsolved at the mention of Jews, Jew-ish leaders, and public officials who had protested against the ter-rorism of the Hitler Government. When the name of Mayor LaGuar-

#### Brooklyn Relief Requests Increase

Improved Economic Trend Not Affecting Poor, Brenner States Improved economic conditions ave not yet been reflected in the

number of poor families requiring relief and service, according to a comparative study of the work of United Jewish Aid Societies of Brooklyn for March and February. Both the number of families as-sisted and the total amount of relief granted were greater during March than in the previous month "Many families which husband-ed their resources during long pe-riods of unemployment," the re-port stated, "have now been compelled to seek material relief.
Others, displaced by technological
advancements, are experiencing advancements, are experiencing in some industry which no longer requires as many workers as be-

According to the study, which was prepared for the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, of which the United Jewish Aid Societies is the family welfare agency, the Societies gave direct service to 1,470 cases in March, as against to 1,400 cases in March, as against a total of 1,363 cases for February. A total of 804 heads of families received grants adding up to \$36,623 during March, while in the receding month 755 heads of families received allotments totaling \$31,866.

Mortimer Brenner, president of the United Jewish Aid Societies, in making public the report, pleaded for support of the Federation's \$500,000 twenty-fifth anniversary campaign now under way to meet the budgetary necessities of the twenty-five affiliated institutions.

With Colonel Edwin Emerson, president of the Friends of Germany, back in New York for two weeks now, the propaganda ma-chine of the local pro-Hitlerites came of the local pro-Hitlerites must be humming smoothly. The spring sowing of "Truth About Germany" and "German Youth in a Changing World" and "Ameri-can Illustrated News" is proceeding apace. Colonel Emerson, it appears, had

left for Berlin January 20 for a quick flying visit and probably to quick flying visit and probably to get orders from the Nazi higher-ups. But, like the plans of Bob-bie Burns' mice, his too went astray. The Colonel says he took astray. The Colonel says he took part in a fencing match while in Germany, and a counter-revolu-tionary fencing foil went through a very tender portion of his ana-tomy. He was therefore forced to stay in Berlin longer than he had alsayed. had planned.

But now he's back in his offices in the Whitehall Building, 17 Battery Place, Room 131.

A strange feature of the Co-lonel's stay in Berlin was the fact that nobody would even admit he was there. With so influential an American at the Nazi capital it was rather queer that American correspondents would always re-ceive the announcement that the foreign office had never heard of ioreign office had never heard of his presence in Germany. He was, nevertheless, staying at an unas-suming pension on Unter den Lin-

The Colonel has had a versatile career, to say the least. He was a rough rider with Teddy Roose-velt, a prisoner of war in Turkey during the World War, a founder and guiding light of the Friends of Germany (not to be confused with the Eriends of New Cormany), and he is at present a correspondent for whatever German newspapers still exist, a dissem-inator of Nazi literature, and what

Emerson was born in Dresden and speaks with a marked German ascent. He earned the title, "Co-lonel," by appointment to that rank in the New York State National Guard. When he was a pri-soner of war in Turkey, the story The Jewish Daily Bulletin brings you goes, he was transferred to Ger-daily complete nows of events concerning Jews in all parts of the world.

for a war prisoner. He wrote for the Continental Times, an English-language pro-German newspa per published in Amsterdam, After the War Colonel Emerson

came back to this country and began writing prolifically. He be-came correspondent for a number of German newspapers. He became an ardent Republi-

can and wrote a biography called "Hoover and His Times" for the presidential campaign of 1932. The chief claim to fame of this volume is in the way it is written. Instead of following the usual chronological order in relating Hoover's life Emerson began with Hoover in the White House and ended up with Hoover's birth in West Branch, Iowa. The book in West Branch, Iowa. The book can still be found in the cut-rate stores selling publishers' surpluses. Its price, we think, is forty-nine cents.

It is paradoxical that Emerson the anti-Semite and pro-Nazi, eulogized Hoover's "humanitarian-ism" in his biography. Going back on their writings seems to be a habit of Nazi propagandists. There is George Sylvester Viereck, who collaborated in the writing of "My First Two Thousand Years," a novel relating the story of the wandering Jew. Although not militantly pro-Jewish, the book at least was sympathetic to the Jews.

More than sixty lines are devoted to Emerson in the Who's Who in America. A number of interesting facts about him can be teresting facts about him can be picked up there: He was born in Dresden in 1869, graduated from Harvard and was foreign correspondent for several American newspapers. In 1905, when he was covering the Russo-Japanese War,

Israel Unterberg, manufacturer, banker, philanthropist and presi-dent of the Jewish Education Association, died yesterday morning at his home, 363 West End avenue. He was seventy-one years old. His family was at his bedside when he succumbed in the early morning. Funeral services for Mr. Unterberg will be held today at 10:30 A. M. at the Unterberg Memorial Building in the Jewish Theological Seminary, with Dr. David de Sola Pool and Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan

officiating. Burial will take place in Washington Cemetery of the Shearith Israel, Cypress Hills. He is survived by a widow, two sons, David and Clarence, and four daughters, Mrs. I. C. Rubin, Mrs. Edgar J. Nathan, Mrs. Milton J. Powell and Mrs. Samuel Dereck-

 Israel Unterberg led a life filled with adventure in finance and busi-ness and at the same time was a quiet leader in the fields of philan-thropy and education. His early business success, which enabled him to gain a modest fortune, allowed him to give vent to his charitable feelings.

#### Born in Lithuania

He was born December 15, 1863, in a small town in Lithuania. He received his early religious educa-tion at the home of his grandfather in Europe and from him inherited his love for Jewish life

Mr. Unterberg came to America at the age of ten. When he was twenty-one, after working with his brother for several years, he went into the shirt business alone, in a small store on Canal street. The New York office of his large shirt business today is located at 40 Worth street, in the Textile Building, of which he was the owner.

(Continued from Page One ist policy, creating inner antagon isms and hatreds all along the line; but insofar as the other parties are concerned a great deal of progress was made at Jerusalem in modifying partisanship through compromise and adjustment.

"In this effort to create an atmosphere of peace and good will the Executive of the Jewish Agency played a leading and determin-ing part. The issue of religious practises raised by the Mizrachi (orthodox Zionists) party was met by the proposal of the Executive with regard to the Sabbath which received the unanimous approval of the entire council. The solution reached with regard to Kashruth did not satisfy the Mizrachi, but the voluntary act of the Histadruth (labor group) in deciding to place all of its public kitchens under ritualistic supervision but at the ritualistic supervision but at the same time standing by the principle of religious freedom of the individual, should go a long way in removing the acrimony exhibited by the Mizrachi on this issue. In the matter of certain problems in the field of organized labor a resolution was a unanimously adouted. lution was unanimously adopted which will have the effect of bringing about a more orderly relationship between employers and laborers without violating the principle of organized labor.

Labor Adjusts Itself

"It is interesting to observe the ndency of Histadruth through its leadership to adjust itself with due regard for the interests of the workmen to the new conditions that arise in Palestinian de-elopment. The attitude of labor leaders is the best answer to the destructive tendency of the Re-visionist party in the labor field.

"As a consequence of the moderating influence of the Executive, it may be said that the Executive is r ow in a better position to pursue its policies and to administer the affairs of the Jewish Agency than it was in the months following the Prague Congress during which time it was pursued by the sabotage of parties and a continuous fusilade of partisan criticism.

#### Regarding Palestine

Speaking of the economic development of Palestine which Mr. Lipsky said is the "only hopeful in the great sea of trouble in which the Jews of the world now find themselves," Mr. Lipsky praised the "unbounded con of the Jews" who are settling in the country.

Palestine there would be no new Palestine: without our past in Palestine, there would be no sense in building the present and the future of the Jewish people in Palestine.

Oscar Leonard has translated several fragments from Ussish-kin's forthcoming book, "Sefer Ussishkin." Two brief extracts from these fragments illustrate effectively his conceptions of the new and the old in Palestine.

Ussishkin describes a conver-sation he had with a young woman who had come to live in Palestine. When he asked her for her impressions of Jerusal-

Several days later he met on the streets of Tel Aviv the daughter of a friend of his from Southern Russia. The girl had been a student of natural science. She had left Russia a year be-fore and came direct to Palestine.

When in the course of conversation, he asked her how she liked Jerusalem, the girl replied:

"I am ashamed to say I do not know Jerusalem as yet," "You too? Ussishkin, Why?" asked

She remained silent for a few moments and then said in a voice trembling with emotion:

"I am not yet worthy of the immeasurable joy of seeing the Capital of our Homeland, Jerusalem, the city which has spread its light and its law over all the peoples-What have I done for my people and my homeland that I should be worthy of such privilege? The Jews of America will undoubtedly participate in this magnificent tribute to Ussishkin in their characteristically generous manner.
