HERMAN BERNSTEIN Is Goga Coming Back?

THE reports that Octavian Goga, the notorious reactionary and anti-Semite, is to be invited by King Carol to dicate an ominous situation in the affairs of Rumania, Goga, a former member of the government, is one of Rumania's foremost poets and Jew-bait-ers. Now he is also identified with the Nazi movement in Rumania, During his period of office as a member of the Ruman-ian government he published a book full of the most venomous and vicious attacks on the Jewish neonle.

In 1927, when I had a lengthy interview with Queen Marie, of Rumania, and referred to Goga's anti-Semitic outbursts in his new book just published at the time, Queen Marie remarked:

. "Goga is a great poet, but a poor diplomat."

To which I replied:
"He is a member of your government not as a poet but as a diplomat." It so happened that several

weeks later Octavian Goga was dropped as a member of the Cabinet. If it is true that Goes is now

coming back to the Cabinet at the request of King Carol, it means that the Iron Guards and Nazified Rumanians are to determine and direct the major policies of the Rumanian govpolicies of the Rumanian gov-erument. Such a change at this time would lead to intensified anti-Semitism. It would also discredit and weaken the King Carol regime. In recent years the wiser counsel of Foreign Minister Titulescu has helped to avert serious internal trouble in Rumania and to fashion a peaceful policy among her neighbors as a member of the Little Entente and of the Federation of

LONDON, May 3.—Under the heading, "Infamous Accusation," The Manchester Guardian, noted English liberal newspaper, today denounced Julius Streicher, notorioue Nesi enti-Semite Nesi over lord of Franconia and publisher the bitter anti-Semitic sheet. Der Stuermer of Nuremberg.

"Julius Streicher," The Guardian declared, "publishes weekly an anti-Semitic paper exceeding all bounds of decency so constantly that the Reich government pro-hibits its dispatch abroad. He is too stupid and too violent to be capable of more serious employment and too well established as a preacher of his odious gospel to be jettisoned with ease or safety."

An Overwhelming Offense

After describing the contents the special May Day ritual murder number of Der Stuermer, which was widely advertised all over Southern Germany, the Guardian declared that an overwhelming offense is that the virtual governo of a large and cultivated city and province in Germany revives a charge against the Jews which has been so utterly disproved.

Yeast Company Using Campbell Promises a

Thorough Search Into

Nazi Propaganda A promise of a really thorough investigation into the charges hurled by B. C. Vladeck, chairman of the Jewish Labor Committee, that students at Stuyvesant High School were required to read Nazi pamphlets printed in Germany was made yesterday by the Board of

Education following a meeting be-tween Vladeck and Dr. Jacob Greenberg, of the board. The investigation, which will be headed by Dr. Harold G. Camp-bell, superintendent of schools, will endeavor to answer two questions propounded by Vladeck:

1. How did the booklet get into the library at the high school? 2. Why did the children ask for the pamphiet, which was entitled "German Youth in a Changing World?"

Dr. Greenberg told the Jewish Daily Bulletin that definite an-swers to these questions will be made by the middle of next week. An investigation made by the board last week resulted in a virtual whitewash of the officials at the high school. It was explained that some unknown person had mailed the pamphlet to the school, and it was sent down to the library and stamped "Property of Stuyve-sant High School" without any having read it.

Scrutiny of Constitution Shows No Guarantees for Equality to All

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, May 3. — Austrian
Jewry was alarmed and surprised when a close scrutiny of the actual text of the new constitution for Austria, which became available today, disclosed that the document does not contain guarantees for the equality of all citizens regardless of religion. One of the most important

clauses of the old republican con-stitution of 1920, for the Jews of Austria, was the phrase "privi-leges of creeds are debarred." The omission of these words

from the new "authoritarian" constitution imposed by the Dollfuss government has caused great alarm in Jewish circles, particularly in view of a sentence in the new constitution which reads: new constitution which reads: "Austrian citizens may be treated "Austrian citizens may be treated unequally only in so far as posi-tive grounds justify." The language of this clause is vague and in-definite and it is obvious that it can be stretched to mean almost anything.

Earlier reports on the new constitution had stated that Jewish fears of discrimination had been completely allayed.

Friedlaender, Authority On Music, Dies at 82

He was eighty-two years old and had been honorary professor of the history of music at the Uniwersity of Berlin. His best-known work was the monumental "The German Song in the Eighteenth Century," published in 1902.

Nazi Atrocities Hit by Labor of Rhode Island

A. F. of L. Branch to Aid Boycott, It Resolves at Convention

(Special to the J.D.B.)
PROVIDENCE, May 3.—Hitlerite atrocities against Jews and the Nazi program of outlawing labor organizations today stood con-demned in the judgment of Rhode Island as a result of action taker at the annual convention here of the Rhode Island branch, American Federation of Labor.

The delegates unanimously passed a resolution assailing the persecutions committed against "persecutions committed against trade unions and the Jewish peo-ple in Germany" and pledging the organization to "all possible co-operation in the movement to boycott German-made products until such time as the Hitler Govern-

ment restores to their rightful po-sition those people who have been persecuted."

The resolution was introduced under the auspices of the Rhode Island Textile Council after Rabbi Israel M. Goldman of Temple Israel M. Goldman of Temple Emanu-El, outstanding Jewish lea-der and sponsor of the Case of Civilization Against Hitlerism here, had outlined the situation in Germany. Rabbi Goldman de-scribed the outrages against Jews and the future harm done by the Nazi policy, relating also the exile of organized labor in the Reich which he called another barbaric and backward step on the part of a supposedly intelligent and civilized people.

Even the children's societies are being hurt by the influ-ence of the Nazis, who have begun the process of regimenting Ger-man American youth through the medium of their branch of of Hitler-Jugend, called in this country Deutsche Jungenschaft. 

Membership in the DHV is com-posed almost exclusively of German merchants and professional man merchants and professional men, and their employees, who are kept in close touch with Germany through great DHV international offices maintained in Hamburg and Berlin. From these offices come pamphilets on the New Germany, and these are circulated either through the mails directly from Germany or from the offices of members of the DHV in this country. Since the ascension of Hitler to power his policies, both warmly defended in these commu-nications. The DHV offices in Germany also issue propaganda at-tacking the Versailles Treaty and

France.

The DHV is a part of the German Labor Front, and all its members are German citizens and members of this National Socialist institution. Unless Germans in America are registered in the La-bor Front it is impossible for them to secure work on their return to the Fatherland. Hence the Germans here register through their membership in the DHV.

The organ of the DHV is "Der Deutsche Kaufmann Im Ausland." Deutsche Kaufmann im Ausand," in translation, "The German Mer-chant Abroad." It keeps German businessmen abroad informed on the wishes of the Nazi party at home. A Little Lucre, Please Through the good offices of the

DHV the League of Friends of New Germany were able to survive and prosper. Members of the DHV, mainly business men, have been persuaded or coerced into be-coming members of the League of Friends of New Gormany, and expensive advertisements have been secured for the Deutsche Zeitung from members of the DHV. From excellent authority it is learned that the North German Is learned that the North German Lloyd alone contribute \$500 week-ly in advertising toward the League of Friends of New Ger-many. The cost of advertising in the Deutsche Zeitung is by far the highest of any newspaper in New York, when the size and cir-culation of the paper are taken into consideration. Its minimum rate of fifty-five cents a line may be considered extremely high when contrasted with that of the New York Times, which in most categories charges much less than twice that rate, although the cir-culation of the latter is thirty times as large and its prestige inestim-ably greater.

The close contact maintained by the League of Friends of New Germany with the Berlin govern-ment makes it expedient for merchants here to support the American organization just as they must support the National Socialist Party in Germany to maintain idly relations with the father-

The DHV likewise contributes many members to the League of ids of New Germany who pay priends of New Germany who pay one dollar a month dues and con-siderably more to the various funds that are forever being raised by the latter. Rubin, Palestine's Painter, Declares New and Hopeful Jewish Refugee Professor Art Is Being Created; Fame of Artist Spreading Through World

Urges Wider Recognition by World of Recent Achievements

JERUSALEM, April 15.—Very few people who come to Palestine fail to see Rubin. Everyone certainly hears of him. No one knows his first name; he himself may have forgotten it. He is just Rubin to intimates and strangers slike. His fame has spread beyond the confines of the country in which he has made his home, following upon many years spent in France Italy and America, acquiring and as assiduously discarding different trends of art that have finally which, at a glance, is wholly "Rubin." given way before that new fashion

By saying, "That is a Rubin canvas," you stamp its origin and locale just as effectively as though you were to call it an El Greco, a Goya, a Gauguin or a Franz Hals, in the case of other coun-tries. For Rubin's work expresses and depicts the great Hebrew traditions which are distinct from the ritual-Judaistic manner of Pilichowsky or Boris Schatz. It was Bialik, poet laureate of the Jew-ish people who declared, "Rubin's concepts are rooted in Hebrew tradition."

The Influencing Tradition It is the tradition of the simple

nanoscape — commatingiy influenced by the great Hebrew revival that goes on unceasingly.


Rubin has been brought up in this traditionalism—he says he was a Yeshiva-bochur (Talmudic student) once—but he has traveled a long way to adjust it to his own version. His is a mystic enthusiasm for the simple as well as for the macabre—a joyousness that is shown in his trio of sombre Safed musicians, throwing out the whole aura of Chassidism, in his inimitable landscapes of Galilee or Judea able lanoscapes or Games or Judea,
in his still paintings of flowers,
massed hues, and birds, in his
study of grotesqueries at a merry
festival-making.

His art is not static; it changes

with the mutations of his ideas, the fluctuation of his conceptions. But he manages to hold on to something essential, inimitable, in all his canvasses, and that is "Rubin." One of the best known ration. One or the best known critics in England has written that Rubin paints landscapes of Palestine as no one else does, that his canvasses have a rhythmic, ordered turbulence. There is in his work a characteristic sincerity and vigor, an unforgettable originality that has singled him out to be the leading exponent of the new Pal-estinian art, to which an earnest band of young Jewish artists are devoting themselves.

Library of Books Burned by Reich To Open May 10

Paris Institutions to Include Volumes by World-Famous Writers-Many Contribute

The Deutsche Freiheits-Bibliothek (German Library of Burned Books) will be officially opened May 10 at 65 Boulevard Arago, Paris, its sponsors, Heinrich Mann, Lion Feuchtwanger, H. G. Wells, Romain Roland and Andre Gide announced in a joint communication received yesterday by the American Commission Investigating Fascist Activities.

The library will contain all books which have been either officially banned or burned by the Nazi Reich. In addition to such banned authors as Lessing, Heine, Karl Marx, Einstein, Voltaire, Sigmund Freud and others, a commund Freud and others, a com-plete collection of Fasciana, as contained in the writings of Al-fred Rosenberg, Hitler, Wilhelm II and H. Stewart Chamberlain, will

The collection has been further augmented by material, writings and books contributed by the American Commission Investigating Fascist Activities, headed by Ed ward Dahlberg, novelist, and 20,000 volumes donated by Ger-man refugees who were able to salvage their personal libraries.

Charity Dinner Plans to Raise Two Millions

Speakers Will Show Need for New Contributions to Fund

Plans for a \$2,000,000 drive next fall to offset a threatened deficit in its budget were discussed by 200 business and professional lead-ers at a dinner meeting at the Hotel Plaza last night of the Fed-eration for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

The deficit the Federation is facing, it was pointed out by Wal-demar Kops, chairman of the Busiess Men's Council Executive Committee, comes at a time when the ninety-one affiliated philanthropic agencies are coping with the greatest problems in their history.

Stressing the huge increase, which had come in the need for free service in the Federation institutions, Kops presented charts which showed graphically how this need had risen from 1928 to 1933. In the seven affiliated hospitals, the charts revealed the number of patients treated yearly has grown from 11,138 in 1928 to 22,236 in 1932, an increase of 100 per cent. In the same period the number of days of care given to free patients has increased 54.3 per cent. During these years of increas-ing need for free service, Kopa stated, funds have decreased in an

alarming manner. He presented another chart showing the annual contributions of members which in 1928 amounted to \$3,727,367, by 1934 had fallen to \$1,600,624, a drop of 43 per cent. In the same drop of 43 per cent. In the same period the number of annual con-tributors has decreased 51.4 per cent, declining from 24,065 in 1929 to 12,359 in the present year.

Twelve pages were devoted to discussion of "Jewish ritual murder," climaxed with the assertion that the Jews are planning the biggest and most gruening the biggest and most grue-some ritual murder against Hitler and his followers ever witnessed by the world.

The rest of the paper was devoted to the usual fulminations against the Jews and assurances that the "dastardly Jewish plot would not succeed." He advocated "tireless anti-Semitism" as the best means of guarding against "Jewish plots."

Jewish Body Sends Protest to Hitler Against Libel Spread

He cited the low birth-rate among them. the number who were converted to the Christian church, and the exaggerated patriotism to support this contention. There is evidence enough, he said, in Dr. Lessing's book, The Jewish Self-hate. NOW

interfere with the citizens' duty. Public employment is indepen-dent of religious belief. For employment in educational institu-tions the law will establish exceptions to this." .

The preamble to this latest "Constitution" reads thus: "In the name of God Almighty, from Austrian people have been given this Constitution for a Christian German Federal State on a cor-porative basis."

Under the reservations em-bodied in the new "Constitution." any interpretation may be given any interpretation may be given to the laws, which emanate not from God Almighty, but from the present makeshift rulers of Austria. To suit the political purposes and chauvinistic or religious or racial prejudices of the ngious or raceat pregulates of the small men dominating Austria today, the new constitution could easily fit into any Fascist or Nazi scheme, Citizens could be declared as not equal before the declared as not equal before the law "when practical considera-tions justify it." Citizens are equally eligible for public employment, if they establish their patriotism. This opens a wide field for graft and prejudice. Who is to determine the "patriotism" of a citizen applying

for public employment? Citizens have a right to ex-Citizens have a right to express their opinions by word of mouth, writing, picture or any other manner "within the limits fixed by law." And the laws may decree a preliminary censorship of the press, the theatre, the radio, the cinema, and so feath. forth.

Cautions of Indifference Refusal of Men to Fight Alone Can Avail, He Tells Students

Vigorous denunciations of war Vigorous denunciations of war were delivered by Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, Kirby Page, Rabbi Leo Jung, and Professor Reinhold Nie-buhr at the Jewish Theological Seminary last night where, for the first time in the history of New York City students representing the theological seminaries of six religious beliefs held a rally to protest against war and war preparations. "War cannot be ended by arms

reductions or by degrees," declared Dr. Goldstein, "it must be ended altogether or not at all.

altogether or not at all.

"We must recognize," said
Rabbi Goldstein, "the failure of
the instrumentalities in which we
have trusted during the last generation. The League of Nations
was organized to establish international cooperation, to reduce
armaments, and to end war. But while the League has solved some minor controversies, it has failed in the greatest crises that have arisen on every continent. The arisen on every continent. The peace pacts, including the Briand-Kellogg Treaty, have also falled because of the conditions, com-promises, and reservations attached to the treaties.

"The disarmament conference has likewise failed chiefly because the delegates assumed the valid-ity of the war system, and spent their time discussing reductions in tonnage and guns.

"There is only one way in which we can end the age old evil of war. In spite of all great inven-tions and modern devices of warfare today, war cannot be fought fare today, war cannot be fought without manpover in the field and factory. When we withdraw the manpower from the service of the government in the prosecution of the war program, war will come to an end. Wars will cease only when men refuse to fight."

(Continued from Page One) firm of Grote and Conroy, attor-neys for the Certified Company, last July charged that the three defendants "deliberately and maliclously attempted to prevent the plaintiff's customers and other Jewish bakers from purchasing the plaintiff's products, intending to plantain's products, intending to destroy the good will of the plain-tiff." In addition, the Voice is charged with intimating in edito-rials that the Certified was not a reputable concern. It is alleged that representatives of the defendants made "improper, intimi-dating, and coercive threats against Jewish bakers who used the plaintiff's products."

Boycott Not Mentioned

No mention of the anti-German boycott is made in the complaint. The answer, filed by Bushel and Gottlieb, attorneys for the Voice, denied allegations of intimidation coercion, and unlawful interference.

A novel feature of the co the introduction of James Water-man Wise's book, "Swastika," to demonstrate the righteousness of boycott. Editorials and news articles from newspapers dealing with Hitlerite atrocities are also among papers on file with the court

Among the items are four editorials published by the Jewish Baker's Voice asking the bakery industry, which is predominantly Jewish, to boycott the goods of the Certified Company.
