Witness Describes Dramatic Scene at Jaffa Jail

Solidarity
H. G. WELLS, arriving in the United States for a two weeks' rest, gave his opinions on war and peace, British Fascism and anti-Semitism in Europe. The great novelist remarked that Anti-Semitism in Europe is childish stuff and nonsense, and that there is no more reason to suspect Jewish than Scottish solidarity.

"Do you want me to tell you of the conspiracy of the Scotch?" he added. "Well, they are the engineers on all the principal ships in the world, and they have been since the age of steam. Through a conspiracy of efficiency they will be for years to come."

Mr. Wells had in mind the legend of Jewish solidarity of world domination that is being circulated by the Nazi propaganda. It is the old story of the "Protocols." And now the Hitlerites are trying to prove by a post card caricature of Hitler that the Jews had organized a plot to assassinate Hitler.

The enemies of the Jews have done and are doing their utmost to create solidarity among the Jewish people by their vicious onslaughts. Unfortunately, the Jews are not sufficiently united even in their defense against Hitlerism. Thus far no coordinated program has been elaborated by American Jewish leadership.

Exaggerations

We have received a letter from Joseph D. Kaufman, chairman of the publicity committee of the B'nai B'rith membership campaign in Washington, together with specimens of the "literature" used in the campaign.

"On April 1 the membership of this lodge was about 225," he writes. "Today it stands about 750, or more than tripled in less than a month. . . . It is impossible to continue until we get at least a thousand members, which should be done in less than a week, and thereby set the record for at least a million Jews to become members of the B'nai B'rith with its obvious advantages of campaigning. The inspiration behind all this, local campaigns and national to be, is Mr. Edmund L. Kaufman of this city."

The letter analyzes the "literature," or exhibits, sent out by the publicity department, and exposes the screaming broadsides.

The exhibits are indeed very striking and effective. But they are too hysterical and they magnify the danger of anti-Semitism in the United States. It is an act of dangerous irresponsibility to exaggerate the menace of anti-Semitic racketeering in this country.

Palestine May Limit Lawyers, Curb Licenses

Considers But 5 Permits Per Year; Bar Group Opposes Plan

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, May 4.—A strict limitation on the number of lawyers to be admitted to practice in Palestine is being considered by the government, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned today. The government is now contemplating restriction of licenses to practice to but five new attorneys a year. It was learned. The new restrictions are expected to go into effect in September.

The Jewish Agency for Palestine has taken up the question with other organizations concerned with a view to submitting representations to the government. The Jewish Bar Association, it was learned, is definitely opposed to the plan.

Enactment of this regulation would prevent many Jewish settlers from Germany from engaging in Palestine in the profession for which they had trained and which they had practiced in their native land.

Open Gates to Refugees Lord Cecil Asks Nations

British Statesman Says Even Reich Should Aid Homeless

Makes Stirring Appeal Before Council—Permanent Solution 'Essential for Credit of Civilization,' He Declares—McDonald Urges Non-Jews Help

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, May 4.—A stirring appeal to the nations of the world to open their gates to the homeless refugees from Germany and to the German government to facilitate the task of finding homes for these thousands was made here today by Lord Robert Cecil, chairman of the governing body created by the League of Nations to cope with the refugee problem.

Addressing the session of the council of this autonomous governing body today, the noted British statesman pleaded for the permanent solution of the refugee question "essential for the credit of civilization." He urged Germany to aid in the work.

Reich Jewish Athletic Clubs Settle Disputes

Basis for Future Action Agreed Upon After Intervention

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, May 4.—The disagreement between the sports clubs associated with the Jewish War Veterans Association and the German Maccabim was settled today following arbitration by the Reichsvertretung der Deutschen Juden, the All German Jewish Representative Body. The two organizations agreed to a basis governing their future course in relation with each other.

"Following increasing tension in recent months, both bodies have accepted the following guiding lines of the Reichsvertretung for their mutual relations," according to the statement of the Reichsvertretung.

"Both, while maintaining their respective ideology and without prejudicing their right to recruit members, undertake to employ methods eliminating the defamation of the other side.

"They agree, in negotiations (Continued on Page Twelve)

"We feel we have a strong claim on the German government to make certain that part of our work concerned with passports enabling refugees to travel and find permanent homes and not to stay where they originally fled, where there is no solution," he declared.

Germany Must Help
"This trouble, for which we are not responsible, is caused by measures the German government has seen fit to take. The German government must do something to relieve us of the burden imposed by nothing that we have done.

"We can only do what we are enabled to by the governments we represent, with public support. Merely providing a solution for the day is no solution. We must provide subsistence to prevent starving, but we must seek a permanent solution."

"Some," Lord Cecil continued, "have found a home in Palestine. But such is possible only for a fraction. A small number have established themselves in other countries without upsetting economic conditions. But small numbers. Some have found homes overseas. It may be possible in the course of time to settle more (Continued on Page Twelve)

Don Seitz, Journalist, Presides at Nazi Talk

Don Seitz, well known journalist, presided at a lecture given Friday night by Doug Brinkley at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. Before the lecture Seitz was asked to identify the sponsors of the affair. This he professed himself unable to do.

"Is it possible that Brinkley, who is recognized as a Nazi propagandist, is speaking under the auspices of a Brooklyn Nazi group?" he was asked.

To which Seitz replied, "The Jews are easily scared. I presided three weeks ago at a Brinkley lecture at Town Hall. He gives a fair clear, decent, honest and good picture of Germany."

Palestine Can Absorb 80,000 Yearly - Lipsky

Jews 'Will Spill Over' to Nearby Countries, He Declares.

That Palestine is growing so rapidly that it will be able to absorb 80,000 new Jewish settlers each year was estimated by Louis Lipsky, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, in his first public address since his return from Palestine at a meeting at the home of William Lowenstein, 115 Central Park West, where the Food Trades Division of the United Jewish Appeal was organized.

The need for a place of Jewish settlement, so that the agricultural and industrial possibilities in Palestine and surrounding countries are so large that the Jews "will spill over physically and economically into Transjordan, Iraq, and the Hedjaz, as well as into Syria," Lipsky predicted.

Reports 300,000 Jews There

He reported that there are 300,000 Jews in Palestine today. Of this number more than 100,000 are in Tel Aviv, he said. Speaking of the difference of opinion that exists among Jews with regard to Palestine, Lipsky declared:

"Practical sense dictates that all Jews, regardless of former prejudices and dogmas that have died, should unite in support of the national center in Palestine, whose development can be greatly accelerated through a union of all Jewish forces. He is a co-chairman of the \$3,000,000 United Jewish Appeal.

Expenditures Rise

25 Societies Will Spend More Than In 1933, Justice May Says

Expenditures of the twenty-five affiliated societies of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities during the current year will exceed operating costs in 1933, according to a statement by Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May, president of the Federation, who based his conclusion on the increased costs of commodities and greater social needs in Brooklyn. Justice May declared that despite the fact that the utmost economy is practiced by the constituent agencies, and even if the \$800,000 the Federation is seeking in the current twenty-day anniversary campaign is raised, some of the affiliates will have a deficit this year due to the constantly-increasing appeal for relief being made to all the institutions.

Medical care is the largest single item in the institutional budgets. Material relief and service is next in line in the amount appropriated.

A new objective and a new method have been undertaken this year in the annual campaign. The goal of \$500,000 has been set as the immediate aim of the drive, but beyond that the Federation seeks to enlist a wider and more democratic support for its activities.

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Angola Again Being Discussed As Possible Haven for Jewish Exiles

Tangled European Situation Revives Interest in Country

Angola, a Portuguese West Africa prove the dark horse among the corners of the earth which are put forth as likely for large scale Jewish colonization?

Persistent rumors to that effect have cropped up again. To be sure, League of Nations' High Commissioner, James B. McDonald, who is in charge of settling Jewish refugees, when approached, promptly disclaimed any knowledge of the existence of such a proposal. When a London daily further intimates that an American relief organization was prepared to contribute some \$100,000 for such a project and the Joint Distribution Committee was asked about it, it replied with an equally emphatic denial.

A report came from Paris referring to the departure of the Portuguese ambassador there with Lisbon his destination. He was to confer with his government on the proposition. It was said that sponsors of the plan are aiming at the ultimate establishment of a Jewish autonomous state in Angola under League protection and since Portugal objects to the League's overlordship negotiations are afoot for removing such objection.

On a number of previous occasions Angola was prominently mentioned for the purposes of Jewish settlement. The most significant moves in this connection was made in 1912 when the ITO, Jewish Territorial Organization, then headed by Israel Zangwill, sent a commission on an expedition to Angola to examine the territory in question. ITO's avowed aim was "to procure a territory upon an autonomous basis for those Jews who cannot or will not remain in the lands in which they at present live."

A "Hopeful" Country

Headed by J. W. Gregory, professor of geology at the University of Glasgow, holder of numerous scientific degrees and distinguished for his scholarship the expedition returned in 1913 with a report on the country and conditions. As a supplement to the report, Dr. Gregory made a statement which in part said as follows:

"I have considered the suitability of Angola rather for refugees who wish to escape poverty and ill-treatment in their own countries and wish to remain in a Jewish community. I assume that such refugees would be willing to work with greater patience than ordinary commercial settlers, for they are not so much to be regarded as happy immigrants than as a new class. I see no reason why such settlers should not in time build up a colony for themselves."

Regarding actual figures, Dr. Gregory said:


"I estimate that 5,000 square miles of moderately good land are available in the southern part. How much more of the lands surrounding that area is suitable I cannot tell. . . I think it probable that the 5,000 square miles could be greatly increased."

"Each settler should have about 160 acres, or say, four families to the square mile. With an average of six per family that gives a maximum of 120,000. In most agricultural countries, the human population equals the agricultural. So that 5,000 square miles should support, say, fifty thousand people."

Land Superior

Elsewhere the head of the commission had stated "I should think the land in Angola is decidedly su-

perior to the average in Palestine." He also suggested that "in generations to come, as people have saved money and begun to live on unearned incomes, the country would carry many more" than fifty per square mile, and that "5,000 square miles is a small tract for a country and will not support a big population unless it has mining and manufacturing industries."

Israel Zangwill first became interested in the possibilities of Angola when in June, 1911, he received a letter from a Jew occupying a responsible post in Rhodesia, who described Angola in glowing terms and said that "during the last couple of years many co-religionists have gone up to the Congo territory which is enormously rich."

While more Jewish leaders were becoming interested but still hesitated, the Portuguese government made the first move. The Chamber of Deputies passed the Jewish Colonization Bill. But it dealt only with individual settlers. Zangwill himself was not so overenthusiastic about the proposal as not to acknowledge that Angola "was not the paradise which it has been represented in some quarters." He admitted that "a good deal of the soil was poor."

Climate Good

Authorities are agreed however that the high plateaus in the southern part are adapted to the white man and are sufficiently fertile to support him. Angola is the fertile portion of Portuguese colony in West Africa, and is wholly tropical. It covers an area of about 500,000 square miles with a total population of some 4,000,000, including probably less than 50,000 Europeans or persons of European descent. The plateau temperatures are moderate; frosts occur in winter. The nature of the climate may be judged by the crops grown—Oranges, bananas, Indian corn. Coffee plants have been observed flourishing, as well as European vegetables, including potatoes of high quality.

The most serious climatic disadvantage is the extreme contrast between the dry and wet seasons, the latter being prolonged and succulent, the parched conditions of the dry period.

When Dr. Gregory summed up his conclusions, he declared that the Benguela Plateau was "remarkably salubrious, going on to say that its climate was pleasant and healthy; scenery beautiful, and it was free of insect pests, dan-

gerous animals and vermin. He was most attracted by that region and felt that life there could be easily made comfortable.

He went so far as to assert that, considering the cost of clearing the clime and the political conditions, he could not think of another area as suitable for the ITO aspirations.

"All Those Against"

But there were other authorities who took a diametrically opposite stand. Sir Harry H. Johnston, writing on "Angola as a Land of Jewish Settlement," insisted that "Frankly, from what I know of Angola—and it is, probably, as much as, if not more than what is known by any other non-Portuguese person at the present time—I do not think it offers any single continuous area of sufficient size suited for the establishment of a Jewish colony."

Another expert, H. W. Neville, declared: "The project of the Portuguese government to settle Jews in Angola is one that requires cautious consideration." He held that the Portuguese authorities enjoyed but little power and that voluntary labor was extremely difficult to obtain there.

Among other objections to Angola there has come to the fore from time to time the suspicion of the black population which, some say, is rather warlike. There are still native kings holding sway, medicine men, voodoo in their mysterious incantations and ritual queer musical instruments issue forth weird music and some portions of the region readily convey the Occidental conception of the glamor of tropical Africa.

New Jewish Magazine

The first issue will contain an article by George Britt, New York City newspaperman, on "Jews in America," reprinted from the Modern Monthly, an American magazine.

Polish Jewry Urged to Help Hebrew Univ.

Meeting in Warsaw Decides Participation in Budget

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, May 4.—The first Polish conference of the Friends of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, meeting here yesterday adopted a series of resolutions urging support of the efforts to build up the institution as a spiritual and cultural influence.

The resolutions express recognition of Chancellor Judah L. Magnes and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, chairman of the board of trustees of the university, for "their devoted work to establish and develop a Jewish university."

Another resolution urged the adoption of all possible measures to maintain the existing faculties of the university and also urged the creation of new faculties in pedagogics, agronomy and chemistry, which the conference declared was essential in order to strengthen the spiritual and cul-

tural influence of the Hebrew University in the Diaspora.

The conference also adopted a resolution urging the board of governors of the university to find ways and means for carrying out the resolution adopted and asked the board to include in its membership representatives of the largest and most active groups working for the interests of the university in Palestine, the United States and Poland.

The conference asked Chancellor Magnes to appoint an appropriate representative of Poland and undertake to donate not less than £2,000 for the university by November 1.

Mrs. Richard Bernhard is a slim, dark-haired young woman with a very gracious and friendly manner and a perfectly delightful sense of humor. She seems to accomplish so very much in her amazingly quiet and unflustered way that one is tempted to believe that the cynics are wrong and that there really are more than twenty-four hours in a day.

How she can give as much time as she does to her two children, her wide circle of friends and her interest in the various Federation organizations with which she is associated would puzzle anyone who had not had the opportunity of seeing her. The answer can of course be found in her efficiency, her flair for organizing and her real executive genius.

Executive Work Hard
There are very few people who are willing and able to undertake executive work in social service. In Federation it is perhaps the least amusing but certainly the most important work. Mrs. Bernhard is for instance on the board of the Home for Hebrew Infants. She herself holds no brief for the placing of children in institutions, preferring to some extent the system of boarding out. However, for some 30 years she has been at the ages of four weeks and three years her work has helped supply a home and a happy healthy start in life.

The institution life may have its disadvantages, but when one seeses some of these three-year olds playing in the sandboxes and on the merry-go-round, or getting their sunbaths out of doors—seven and a half acres of out of doors at that!—one is rather inclined to overlook the disadvantages.

Aids Crippled Children

Mrs. Bernhard is also on the board of the Crippled Children's East Side Free School at 157½ Henry street. This school, one of the first in the city, was started by her grandfather, Mayer Schuman, and is now run by the Board of Education. The children get special physical care and are sent by Federation to a summer home in Oakhurst, New Jersey. They remain there from June to September, and most of them make such remarkable progress in health.

Mrs. Bernhard worked there one summer some twelve years ago as a play counselor.

She represented the Board of Jewish Social Service on the Family Welfare Drive this winter. She is on the board of the Y. W. H. A. and for the last three years has been chairman of their camp committee. Besides all this she is fre-

quently called upon by Federation to help in campaigns and in organizing meetings. She says of money collecting that "People can do anything if they really want to, and if they go into things with the impersonal feeling of nothing to be gained and everything to gain with

And that attitude may explain why she has been so successful not only in raising funds but in all her contacts with people.

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FATHER COUGHLIN

By ABBA HILLEL SILVER

VOLTAIRE was an outspoken champion of tolerance but when he was exposed to ridicule through an unfortunate financial transaction at Potsdam in which a Jewish banker was also involved, he became little more than a hostile towards all Jews. Personal revenge and vindictive have all stock speculation motivated the animus of the Jew-baiter.

Rabbi Silver would wonder whether Father Coughlin is not on the way to become a first rate anti-Semitic goon by a similar private re-employment. Father Coughlin has been a strong advocate of the monetization of silver. He believes that at the root of all our economic misfortunes is the Gold Standard. Many share his belief. However, he was not content merely to preach his silver gospel. He was so sure that President Roosevelt was about to monetize silver, (Father Coughlin's "The New Deal in Money," p. 38) that he had his radio grid buy five hundred thousand ounces of silver on a ten per cent margin. In other words he speculated in silver. Father Coughlin is, of course, opposed to stock speculation—generally speaking. So are we all. But, says he, he relied on President Roosevelt's word to increase commodity prices—and so there was no element of speculation in what he did. . . . The Father had evidently forgotten his own words of admonition. "If the American people prefer to be hypocrites by gambling on the stock market, that is not necessarily the fault of the President." (Father Coughlin's "Radio Discourses" 1931-32, p. 124.)

Father Coughlin speculated in silver and unfortunately the Treasury Department found it expedient to make public the names of the large owners of silver stocks—and the name of his radio league was among them. The Father has accordingly been exposed to sharp and painful criticism. Men are saying many unkind things about him. It is suggested that his ardent championing of silver was not all together an act of disinterested humanitarianism. Now, who is to blame for this public disclosure of the good Father? The Secretary of the Treasury, of course. And who is he? Why it is Mr. Henry Morgenthau Jr.—a Jew!

This is a fortunate break for Father Coughlin—the fact that Mr. Morgenthau is a Jew. One can now easily distract the attention of people from the real issue by dragging the red herring of anti-Semitism across its path. Father Coughlin lost no time in exclaiming in the shining silver armor of Christian righteousness in moral combat against the satanic gold hoards of International Jewry.

"Mr. Henry Morgenthau Jr., secretary of the treasury, has completed his clumsy effort to protect the gold advocates, the Federal Reserve bankers and the international bankers of ill-repute. . . .

"It was expected of Mr. Morgenthau and will still be expected of him to prevent any silver legislation for the ultimate benefit of 1,000,000,000 Orientals who from time immemorial have identified their trade and commerce with silver and especially with the gold for the benefit of the American people who today are in bondage to the gold controllers."

"He was astute he would have investigated the prodders in the gold transactions. Through our process of revaluation we simply multiplied by billions of dollars the gold in the hands of the interna-

tionists—the European Warburgs, the Rothschilds and the rest of that group—who are the financial Dillingers of world control and financial slavery."

"The financial capitalists of today who follow the prescription of the elder Rothschild when he said 'Give me the gold and I will control the world,' cared little for anyone but the poverty-stricken Jew or the unsuspecting Gentile, save themselves."

Please note that silver has now been baptized by Father Coughlin and has become a "Gentile" metal. Gold, presumably, remains a circumcised Jewish metal. . . . One recalls the distinction made by the Nazi Gottfried Feder between "loan" capital and "industrial" capital, in an effort to explain why the capital of "Aryans" was "kasher" while the capital of Jews was "trefah."

Please note too that among the manufacturers who are opposed to the monetization of silver—the financial Dillingers—all the names of Jews are mentioned, whereas up to the time of the expose, Father Coughlin used to mention in his radio addresses quite a number of Gentiles, chief among whom was J. P. Morgan. It was J. P. Morgan who was the chief conspirator—up to two weeks ago, was the Federal Reserve Bank that was opposed to "our forecasting the Gold Standard," that was "adverse to the revaluation of gold" . . . that "thrives upon war bonds, foreclosed mortgages and misery" . . . And this Federal Reserve Bank was "inspired by the House of Morgan, the hired and able servant of the British Empire" ("The New Deal in Money," p. 30). But now it is only the "European Warburgs, the Rothschilds and the rest of that group" who are mentioned and who are charged with seeking world control and with exploiting the "unsuspecting Gentile."

There is much more than a trace in all this of classic anti-Semitic propaganda and of the evil odor of the "Protocols of the Elders of Zion"; and we wonder how long it will be before Father Coughlin will be broadcasting to his radio audience stories of gigantic secret plots of world Jewry to destroy Christendom and to dominate the world. Father Coughlin must surely know that the "Jewish plan for world domination through the domination of all countries by International High Finance" is the king-pin argument in Nazi Jew-baiting. Is that the reason why, to our best knowledge, he has not raised his voice even once during the whole of last year in protest of the horrors and cruelties of the Hitler regime? . . .

One is amazed that a Catholic priest, who knows to what infamous slander and libel his own church is frequently submitted in this country and elsewhere, would abuse his office, his gifts and his powers by giving utterance to such false and dangerously provocative expressions. Is he not aware that the Catholic Church and the Pope are as often the targets of the same sort of innuendos and conspiracy-charges as the Jews?

When the Protestant Bishop James Cannon Jr., Dry dresser, was indicted for misappropriation of campaign funds, he quickly drew the red herring across his trail by proclaiming to the world that he was the victim of a Roman Catholic conspiracy. And Father Coughlin has now done the same thing, putting this infamous charge: "Decent citizens are just about surfeited by such lying implications," he said, ("Radio Discourses," p. 28.)

And now Father Coughlin himself is guilty of the self-same crime of bearing false witness against his neighbor, of appealing to latent

racial and religious prejudices and of trying to obfuscate a situation in which he is unfortunately involved—by means of laying down a poison-gas barrage of anti-Semitic insinuations.

"Greed must go and charity must remain," proclaimed Father Coughlin in one of his sermons. We agree. May we suggest, however, that charity should begin at home even as greed frequently does. . . .

Following a receipt of the letter, a special committee to discuss the temple's action was appointed by the First British Past Presidents' Club, sponsors of the plan. Members are Sol Easdale, Sam Taskop and Morris Robbins, all First British past presidents. At a conference with temple representatives Nathan Easdale, Alfred Shemanski and Melville Monheimer, it was revealed that the temple's refusal was based on the opinion of its board of trustees. The Seattle First British is a sufficiently all-inclusive group and is qualified to represent the local Jewish community.



When Maurice A. Spisler entered his shop yesterday morning he found a note which had been thrust under his door. He opened it and read in a scrawled German script: "Keep your mouth shut, you accursed Jew!"

Spisler, the owner and operator of the Brighton Press, a printshop at 3157 Coney Island avenue, is a member of the Jewish War Veterans and outspoken in his convictions against the Hitler government. He was outspoken when he addressed a meeting of the Brighton Beach chapter of the Anti-Nazi Minute Men on Thursday evening. During a fifteen minute talk, he

told the group:

"Life is sweet. It is sweet only when we are permitted to live in peace and as good American citizens. But we find the prejudices of the old world pursuing us, persecuting us in the new world.

"Life is sweet, but under persecution by aliens it is sweeter to die. What could be sweeter than to die for this nation which recognizes the equality of all and will not tolerate persecutions."

He appealed to the Minute Men to defend American principles with their lives. He asked them to help enforce the boycott, to investigate stores handling German goods and ask their owners to pile them on boycott bonfires.

No Peace for the Wicked

WITH the play, "Men In White," a jumping place in the spotlight ago to the effect that a doctor's life is not a happy one; at least if he has a life. The play is supposed to be his own, and if it is his own, it can't be very happy at that since that means that he is a waking not sleeping hours are intruded upon by exigent callers, or by frantic telephone calls concerning abnormal conditions of various intimate parts of the human body. I had an unexpected illustration of the other evening concerning the lack of private life of doctors. A physician friend who has what seems to me an abnormal interest in abnormal mental and psychic states persuaded me to attend a lecture on schizo-phrenia at the New York Academy of Medicine by a very learned gentleman named Dr. Campbell, of the Harvard Medical School, I believe, or of some other institution no less grave and learned.

It was a very good lecture, but it's not about the lecture I'm going to tell you. On each of the yards, or concrete, walls flanking the stage, or rostrum, or dais, from which the speaker was reading his scholarly paper I observed a long slit which had been cut out of the concrete, or granite, and covered with what looked like glass. And every now and then a light would be flashed in each of them and a name would appear. It was not until I had observed a member of the audience rise and leave the room that I realized the function of those lighted oblongs in the masonry. Even when a physician wants to improve his mind with a lecture on schizo-phrenia, his office or his home may intrude and call him back to stern, unyielding duty. In every room in the Academy I learned, there is a similar device for calling physicians to their patients in time of need or stress.

Incidentally that lecture hall would have been a first-rate place to become ill in. Or do you suppose it is likely the patient would have suffered from too much attention? The young wife of the young physician informs me that some years ago, in a convention in Chicago, such a situation occurred. There was a gathering of physicians, in the middle of which a visitor fainted, and her companion in a great fright, shouted: "Is there a doctor in the house?" There were, according to conservative count, five hundred of them.

Faith of His Fathers

I MET the other day a man I had not seen in years, one who had won a reputation as a violent radical in his youth and was maintaining it during his middle years. You would have no trouble recalling him were I to give you his name, which I prefer not to do. He was never known to be a nifty dresser, so that I didn't consider it odd that he seemed to have a several days' growth of beard. But he had always been clean-shaven and I hesitated to say anything about what seemed to be his determination to grow a beard. Then he told me that his mother had just died and I expressed my condolences, and we parted, I to walk South, he, North.

I hadn't gone more than ten paces when the explanation suddenly struck me. That several days' growth of beard was a concession to the faith of his fathers, a faith which in other times he had taken so trouble to observe. It wasn't sitting in his socked feet among the mourners, as age-old custom prescribed, but this concession he did make. Even he, this noisy radical, had to acknowledge, at least once in his life and by inference, that he, too, was a Jew.

I lifted my eyes in mild surprise and said: "You don't mean you're afraid to go to 86th street." "Yes," she replied, "there are times when it's almost dangerous to go to that part of town." What a lovely little branch of the New York Public Library please assure this young lady, and others, that it's still on good terms with the rest of the city?

Goldman Believes Jews Should Unite

Emma Also Praises Settling of Refugees in Palestine; Is in Montreal

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MONTREAL, May 4.—Emma Goldman, veteran anarchist, believes that the Jews should unite in defense against the anti-Jewish persecution prevailing in many countries, including the United States.

Miss Goldman, on her arrival here last night after a ninety-day tour of the United States, made an interesting declaration of her attitude on Jewish problems which she had previously refused to consider as specifically Jewish in nature.

There is a definite anti-Jewish tendency, Miss Goldman now believes, distinct from feelings of class. In an interview here today she urged the Jews to unite to defend their rights.

In a statement unusual from one of her pronounced beliefs she declared it the duty of every Jew to help the settlement of refugees in Palestine and expressed her gratification that many German Jews had found refuge there.

Many German Jews now exiles from their native land will return to the Reich after the collapse of Hitlerism, she asserted, "because German culture is too strong in their bones."



WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4. A quick and thorough investigation of subversive propaganda activities in the United States has been launched by the Congressional committee headed by Representative John McCormack of Massachusetts. The committee has sent scouts into propaganda hotbed centers in leading sections of the country. The purpose of these investigators is to get the lowdown on the activities of the leaders of the propaganda mongers. All this started with the appointment of Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia lead counsel to the McCormack committee.

Attorney Hardwick knows the tricks in the game being played by those interested in promoting bitterness among racial, religious and political groups. He is an arch enemy of the Ku Klux Klan. A former member of the House of Representatives, Attorney Hardwick undertakes his new task with a background of broad experience. He is opposed to intolerance and believes that there is a great public service to be done through the investigation.

The Society for Constitutional Security is opposed to Congress granting Dr. Albert Einstein citizenship. This organization, through its president, Mrs. William B. Epton of Leonia, N. J., has sent a memorial to the Senate remonstrating against the passage of House Joint Resolution 309, introduced by Representative Edward A. Kennedy of New Jersey, to admit Dr. Einstein to citizenship. This is the first formal expression of opposition to such action made to Congress.

Representative Kennedy intends to press for the passage of the resolution. He holds that a man such as Dr. Einstein "merits the high regard of any nation." Representative Kennedy points out that several European countries have welcomed Dr. Einstein and offered him their citizenship. "Certainly the United States, which he has helped to protect, to defend, to free, to liberate, to save, should extend to Dr. Einstein all the privileges and prerogatives of her citizenship," the Jersey representative declared.

Letters which the Friends of New Germany sent to members of Congress inviting them to attend a meeting in New York at Madison Garden, New York, on May 17, did not get so well with the lawmakers on Capitol Hill. The meeting is to be held to protest the boycott against imported German goods.

Representative George Foulkes of Michigan characterized the intended meeting as "but a part of the sinister, subtle, and scheming propaganda to entice Jewry throughout the United States by Nazi agents. Both in military groups actually engaged in drills with arms and in groups using camouflage names and tactics for altruistic purposes, the Nazis are seeking to build up a terrorist army in this country that can some day be used to establish a new American Hitlerism."

The reported statement of James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for Refugees in London before the council of the High Commissioner for Refugees, that Palestine offers the only immediate area for shelter to refugees from Germany, may stir the United States to be more liberal in extending asylum to these people.

High Commissioner McDonald's statement concerning the top reports submitted to Secretary of Labor Perkins by two committees recommending more liberal application of the principle of asylum

to refugees from persecution, appears quite well timed.

During the last few months there has been much talk about extending shelter to those forced to leave Germany. But as yet there has been no action. Secretary Perkins and other members of President Roosevelt's cabinet are favorable to the idea. In spite of this favorable sentiment there is a hitch somewhere. It is understood that the Labor Department has been drafting a set of regulations liberalizing immigration restriction insofar as refugees would be concerned. These regulations were to have been submitted to the State Department for final approval. With all the reports, recommendations, and suggestions, something should happen soon.

The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce has reported favorably to the House, on a resolution introduced by Representative Herman P. Koppelman of Connecticut, calling for a nation-wide investigation of practices of milk distributors. The investigation would be made by the Federal Trade Commission. Representative Koppelman believes that there is too wide a spread between what the farmer gets for milk and what the consumer has to pay. He, along with a number of other Congressmen, would like to know why. Passage of the resolution is practically assured in the House.

British Film Company To Screen 'Nell Gwynn'

Jeanne de Casalis, one of the most prominent actresses of the London stage, has been added to the cast of "Nell Gwynn," ambitious film production which Herbert Wilcox has started making at Shepperton Studios near London for the British & Dominion Film Corporation.

It is to be presented by United Artists. Cedric Hardwicke, England's famous character actor, takes the part of Charles II opposite Anna Neagle. Samuel Pepys, the famous diarist of Restoration times, will figure in the background.

'Whirlpool' Premiere At Casino Theatre

Columbia Pictures' production, "The Whirlpool," had its local premiere at the Casino Theatre, Fifth Avenue and Seventh avenue, last Friday.

"The Whirlpool" is an action drama in which Jack Holt is arrested, Lee Lee is leading lady. The same team of principals which appeared together in Columbia's "Flight" and "War Correspondent." The supporting cast includes Jean Arthur, Donald Cook, Allen Jenkins, John Miljan, Ward Bond, Rita LaRoy, Willard Robertson, Oscar Apfel, and Charles MacMurphy. R. William Neill directed.

Ray Goetz, Lew Aronson, Howard Dowling and others. Proser handled the successful "House of Rothschild" publicity campaign for United Artists. Offices have been established at the Hotel Edison.

It Pours on Kingsley

Award of the Pulitzer Prize to Sidney Kingsley for his "Men in White" ended a perfect up-the-ladder story. Here was a young fellow (he is in his thirties) who before October of 1933 was completely unknown on Broadway. He had been graduated from Cornell University some years ago and had spent his post-graduate days knocking around from one job to another, trying to find some place for himself. He had experienced a few shows, worked for moving picture companies both in New York and Hollywood and held a steady eye on the drama. Five years back he conceived the idea for "Men in White." His father a practicing dentist in Bronx, Kingsley was not entirely unfamiliar with professional life, but he knew little about medicine. He went out and dug up his information by the simple expediency of asking questions and then set it down on paper. No fewer than four producers and the opportunity of producing "Men in White." Each saw possibilities but not one of them was sufficiently enthusiastic to take chance and put it into production. Finally the Group Theatre got hold of the script and last summer with many of the players spending the season at "Green Mansions," an adult camp, the play was rehearsed. It opened in October the author's first play. The rest is history. An instantaneous success. From its opening night it has been playing to filled houses ever since. Stock companies took it out on the road. Amateurs produced it in local houses. A moving picture com-

pany came along and paid \$46,000 for the film rights. Foreign producers in England, Hungary and other countries bought rights. In book form it is in its fourth edition. And to cap the climax the Pulitzer Prize committee stamped its approval, which means that the play will run through the summer.

Idolism Pays

"Men in White" is the first play in years to say a few kind words for the medical profession. It is an idealistic presentation of a social problem. Shall a physician be bound to his profession or to himself? The answer favors his profession. Boldly speaking it is an inspirational play, a piece that should inspire young medical stu-

dents, and it does create a feeling of good will towards doctors, pointing out to patients what sacrifices a career in medicine entails. The author fashioned his play realistically and by playing down sentimentality and presenting his hero as a man with faults rather than a boy scout was able to be convincing.

Kingsley's idealism, and I believe that it is sincere, has certainly paid. Before the last royalty statement is received I imagine that the young man will be some \$100,000 richer. And by the way "Men in White" was the first Pulitzer choice in years that met with the approval of dramatic critics. Most of them picked it themselves months ago.

No Beauty Prize

If the committee had been awarding prizes for the best looking playwright Kingsley would not have gotten a mention. He is short, slouches a trifle, wears his shirt a size too large, talks with a non-Texas drawl, dislikes to be rushed and always carries a cane. He is unassuming and despite his good fortune, wears the same size hat that he did a year ago. He is, of course, Jewish.

Garbo to Be Cast in 'The Painted Veil'

Uncertainty as to Greta Garbo's next story was over with definite announcement from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer that she will next appear in "The Painted Veil." Richard Widmark will direct this adaptation of W. Somerset Maugham's novel. Salta Vitell, who collaborated on "Queen Christina," has been assigned to work on the script with John Meehan. Hunt Stromberg will produce the picture.

Jewish Life, Thought and Action in Books of the Day

Stefan Zweig's Baker's Dozen Of Short Tales and Novelettes

THERE are few things, of equal length published these days, more satisfying than a story, or a novelette, by Stefan Zweig. The Viking Press has just published thirteen of them, in translation, under the title of "Kaleidoscope." I strongly recommend this book, for no high-falutin' reason involving appeal to the higher criticism, but for sheer enjoyment. You may not like all of the stories equally; no matter. These thirteen stories are a baker's dozen, a generous overweight of reason for the price.

I particularly recommend for your pleasure the stories entitled "The Burning Secret," "Transfiguration," "Fear," "Leporella" and "The Invisible Collection," although "Buchmende," "The Runaway" and "The Governors" are nothing to be sneezed at, despite the testable objection to "Buchmende" as a memoir rather than as a story. Besides, "Kaleidoscope" is as good a place as any in which to get a taste, in English, of the European fiction form known as novellen. In each one of the Zweigian examples of this form we have matter out of which your average novelist would make a full-bodied book. Zweig's versions are no less full-bodied, for being limited in length between long short story and a thin book.

Of Lasting Power
Indeed, before "Kaleidoscope" appeared, his publishers had made separate books out of them. Take, for example, "Letter From an Unknown Woman," one of the most poignant stories ever written, which I read some years ago in a collection of Zweig's stories now out of print, "Passion and Pain." I read some of the other stories now included in "Kaleidoscope" and I think it is a test of power that I could read these stories again and again, and still find that with which I first read them.

Zweig's specialty, if that isn't too commercial a word, is the soul in individual stories and least three of his stories end with suicides, but when you read the stories wherein suicides close the action, you won't find that form of conclusion forced, or even revolting. Death fits into those stories without taking the emotional, or the spiritual, lift out of them. Zweig renders beautifully the effect upon children of their discoveries of the motives which dominate their elders. "The Immortal" is the tale of a young lad who dimly, and then more surely, becomes aware of a flowering illness between his mother and a young girl. Zweig's touch goes into the boy's affections more warmly than an easier access to his moth-

Jews in Europe's Book World; Works by Brod, Fleg and Others

THE STORY OF JESUS
JESUS RACONTE PAR LE JUIF
ERRANT. By Edmond Fleg.
Librairie Gallimard, Paris, 1934.

THE story of Jesus as narrated by the Wandering Jew, is the English translation of the title of this last work by the author of "Hear, O Israel," "Moses," and "Solomon," which have given him a prominent place in France as an imperial historian of Biblical events. This life of Christ, coming from the pen of a Christian writer, shows a refreshing breadth of view. One of its main aims is to free the Jews of the period from any blame of the crime of "deicide." Jesus is pictured as one of the Jewish rabbis of the period who had his own following of disciples like the other rabbi and who taught the usual teachings of Judaism, but added to them his own interpretation. That he suffered death at the cross was no fault of the Jews, the author proves, but of the secular rulers of Palestine at that time—the Romans, with whose political philosophies Jesus' teachings had come in conflict.

What is rather surprising in this Judeophile work is that the author adopts as the narrator the "Wandering Jew," a fictitious figure in no way complimentary to the Jewish people, as it was invented by medieval bigots as a chastisement of the Jew for the alleged crime of crucifying Christ.

**DE FRAU, DIE NICHT ENTE-
ZUGESCH.** By Max Brod.
Verlag, Albert de Lange, Amsterdam, 1934.

THE name of Brod, a comparative newcomer in the literary world, has already been distinguished in Germany. The distinction came to him when the Nazis, upon assuming power last year, burned the two first novels written by the young German-Jewish author, together with those of the great masters Wassermann, Schuttlzer, Mann, Zweig, and others who have brought prestige to German letters. In "The Woman Who Does Not Deceive," written in his present exile in Holland, he continues his realistic and frank interpreta-

tions of German-Jewish relations which caused his condemnation by the Nazis. The theme of the novel, where love and the attempt to solve political and social problems are closely interwoven, is one which would not tempt many writers because of the lurking dangers in the handling of such a subject and the difficulty of embodying it in concrete terms. But the author has performed his task with marvelous skill.

The story deals with the love affair of a young Jewish writer, Spira, with a German woman, Carola Weber. It begins in 1932 and ends in 1933 prior to the advent of the Hitler regime. Local background: munichian sanatorium, Germany, near the Silesian border. The affair runs a smooth, poetic course, until the day when the first clash occurs. The question of race brings to the foreground the conflict between the Jew and his Aryan sweetheart, which ultimately leads to final separation. The physical attraction and love between the Jew and the Aryan woman is doomed to defeat in the clash of opposed spiritual ideals. This love between the Jew and Aryan, the author calls "Distance-love," as there can never be any "real merging of two beings" with such divergent moral and mental backgrounds.

The Assnated Jew?
JUIF, NON... ISRAELITE? By Edmond Coken, Librairie de France, Paris, 1934.

THE title of this novel, "Jew? No, Israelite," almost tells the story. The author's chief aim is to show the distinction between a real Jew and an assimilated Jew, who is Jewish in name only. The Countess de Mellan was one of those who thought that the Jews formed a caste by themselves, and were guided in everything by selfishness. During the war, as a nurse, she falls in love with a wounded army lieutenant, later learning to her sorrow that his name is Simon Levy. However, love overcomes all her prejudices and the French countess becomes Madame Levy. Everything runs

smoothly until she discovers that Levy is too assimilated. He goes every day to his cafe, attends hunting parties and does everything in exactly the same way as the small-town well-to-do Frenchman.

In Countess de Mellan's eyes he has lost the personality with which she endowed him and with this disillusionment comes the end of love. The idea which the author tries to convey through his work is that there is no more a Jewish race than a Mohammedan, French or German race. The term race which refers to a specific zoological entity, in his opinion, is being confused with social concepts such as language or nationality. The Jews do not represent any particular type of race, but are just as many brachycephalic as dolichocephalic types among them, both of brunettes and blonde complexion. What really characterizes the Jew is the language and habits and customs which he has acquired during centuries of ghetto life.

"The Black Book"
DAS SCHWARZBUCH. By the Committee of Jewish Delegations, Paris, 1934.

This new book of facts and documents in English, "The Black Book,"—written in German, follows up the Brown Book of last year. Its 500 pages are filled with irrefutable evidence of the barbarities practiced in Germany during the latter part of 1933. It completes the picture of "Aryan" Kultur of Nazi Germany.

Alexandria's Chief Rabbi
CINQUE ANNI DI RABBINATO. By David Porat. Alexandria, Egypt, 1934.

THE rather bulky volume is Italian, dealing with the last "Five Years of the Rabbinate" of David Porat, Chief Rabbi of Alexandria, and is an historical study of the origin and growth of the Jewish cult of Alexandria, with special attention to the last few years. It presents an excellent example as to what can be achieved toward Jewish advancement in a community where all work in harmony.

Appeal to German Jews
AUFRUUF ZUM JUDENTUM. By Emil Bernhard Cohn. Verlag, Siegfried Scholten, Berlin, 1934. Reichsmark: 3.

"Judaism" is a touching appeal to the German Jews to face bravely the present critical hour of German Judaism and unite in a common effort to come out successfully from the test of their religious and moral strength which they are now undergoing.

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U. S. Nazis Master Military Tactics

Training Goes On Steadily by Storm Troops

Objectives Indicated by Secret Sessions and Racial Hatred

The following is the fifteenth of a series of articles detailing the rise and growth of the Nazi-inspired anti-Semitic movement in this country in all its ramifications.

Within the next few months New York's German-American society stands to be received into the ranks of the League of Friends of New Germany, look, stock and barrel. The process is to be accomplished through the anti-Jewish boycott organ of the league, the DAWA (German American Protective Alliance).

It is remarkable with which the Nazis have succeeded in coordinating German American society thus far. Members of Catholic societies, liberal societies, and even Socialist societies have subscribed to the DAWA, whereas formerly these organizations remained coldly aloof from Nazi activities. The DAWA holds as its purpose the defense of Germany from American and German trade against the anti-Nazi boycott. But there is every reason to believe that this is a subordinate element to the outright boycotting of Jewish establishments in the United States.

As the DAWA gains headway in New York, congratulatory messages come from other parts of the country wherein Nazi cells have gained strength. The most recent report, of the Nazi cell in Philadelphia indicates that a similar plan for action is contemplated there.

Some Home Talk

In New York the Nazis are actively supported by the Friends of the Legion and the Stahlhelm organizations, both composed of former German war veterans. The Deutsche Legion is thoroughly gleichschaltet with the Friends of New Germany in New York, its commander, H. O. Spier, being an active organizer, but it is understood that in the more remote sections of the metropolitan area recalcitrant members of the legion make impossible complete coordination. In New York however, the Deutsche Legion contributes to the Nazi elements some of its staunchest support. Jewish members here have been suggested.

They were responsible in large measure for the prominence gained by the Deutsche Legion in American affairs. The Stahlhelm, former members of the Kaiser's army, has a number of branches throughout the United States. According to Captain Georg Schmitt, who came to this country last Fall for the purpose of incorporating the American branch of the Stahlhelm with that of Germany, approximately ten thousand members live in the United States. The German Stahlhelm was dragged somewhat unwillingly into Hitler's conception of "totalitarian," the corporate state in every individual and organization is a unit. The American

Stahlhelm, according to Schmitt, has been brought into the fold of the mother group in Germany.

Another military group, the League of German and Austrian War Participants, is the last Nazi of all large German military organizations. A week ago the mother chapter in Newark voted to retain freedom of conscience and action, which precludes its absorption by the League of Friends of New Germany. It does not, however, interfere with cooperation of the Nazi organization and the war veterans in combining forces for local fests. The Hudson County chapter of the organization is understood to have given great support to the DAWA, after Vice Commander H. Burnmeister appealed to the members to unite the German element of New Jersey into a cooperative unit with the anti-Jewish boycott element of the Friends of New Germany. The War Participants have powerful chapters in Essex, Hudson and Union Counties and in Passaic.

The Green-eyed Monster

The importance of these units in any Fascist organization the Nazis might plan is obvious. Each, trained in the use of arms, would constitute a first class stormtroop detachment. There is some objection, however, to the process of being gleichschaltet by the League of Friends of New Germany. I understand that the Stahlhelm considers itself above taking orders from the league leaders, who are considered as upstarts. A parallel situation prevailed in Germany when Hitler essayed to put on an equine footing the national army and the storm troops.

A plan for the coordination of German American singing societies with the National Socialist party in Berlin is now underway. Hitler has created a Reichs-

musikammer (Reichs Chamber of Music) to which all singing societies in Germany must subscribe. The societies in the United States have recently been invited to join, and at this writing it is considered almost a certainty that they will. Representatives of Hitler's organization will shortly tour the United States seeking the adherence of all large singing groups to the Reich order. The United Singers of Baltimore, mother group to practically all German singing societies in that area, have been asked to join. It is believed, however, that pressure will be placed on the Nordostlicher Sängerbund von Amerika, which controls all major societies throughout this part of the country, with the exception of workers' singing clubs which are Communist or Socialist. Other leagues which will be contacted include the Central New York Sängerbund, the Central Ohio Sängerbund, the Sängerbund des Nordwestens, the Nord Amerikanischer Sängerbund, all of which control thousands of German singing societies throughout the country.

Jews Not Tolerated

At present frequent exchange visits of German and German-American singing societies are being contemplated by the United Singers of New York, the United Singers of Brooklyn, the United Singers of Queens and the United Singers of Suffolk County, which includes almost one hundred metropolitan societies have subscribed to some extent to the policies of the League of Friends of New Germany. A few of these smaller vereins still stubbornly refuse to come under the Friends of New Germany, but the vereins leagues as a whole are sympathetic. The DAWA, as in the case

of many other organizations, has succeeded in bringing into line

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many of the singing societies and their members. Jewish members of these singing societies are with drawing as the influence of the DAWA gains, and thereby they pave the way for the Nazi agents. One who had been a prominent member of the singing societies for twenty years recently resigned. He complained that the majority of the members, now grown conscious and proud of their "Aryanism," made life intolerable for Jews.

In the turn, sport-, and football societies, the same complaint is heard. These have been touched least by the Nazi influence, yet the members, many of whom belong to Nazi groups, have come to look with scorn and hatred upon their fellow Jewish members.

Even in the benefit groups, there are frequent reports of discrimination against Jews. One prominent benefit society will no longer employ the services of Jewish doctors.

The Franz Sigel Order with fifteen large lodges in the metropolitan district is rapidly going Nazi. The name of one of the lodges, the Heinrich Heine Lodge, was recently changed to the General von Steuben Lodge. The name of the famous German Jewish poet, it was reasoned, was not in harmony with the Nazi policies of the lodge. The majority of the remaining lodges are decidedly in favor of the Nazi policies, and the remaining groups it is believed that the old Jewish members will not be able to prevail against the influence of the DAWA and its anti-Jewish boycott implications.

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Rafferty Bill Action Delayed Until June 4

Friends of New Germany In Hudson, Essex, Oppose Measure

(Special to the J.D.B.)
TRENTON, N. J., May 4.—Not until at least June 4 will there be any action on the Rafferty Bill which is designed to curb vicious propaganda in the state. The Senate Judiciary Committee now has the bill and since the Legislature has adjourned until June 4, decision necessarily will be in abeyance.

Meanwhile leaders of the Friends of New Germany in Hudson and Essex Counties have been extraordinarily energetic through messages and personal delegations seeking to protest against the measure. These do not even dwell upon their opposition under the guise of questionable constitutionality, although Assemblyman John J. Rafferty, sponsor of the measure, and Assemblyman Samuel Pesin have issued a brief contending it will stand any court test.

Thus John Blaisch of Union City, who headed one delegation, unhesitatingly declared: "Our Hudson County branch of the Friends of New Germany has a membership of 22,000, all against this bill. We gathered 5,500 petitions asking that it be defeated and the petitions were signed by members through the state. We left the petitions with the Senators as an expression of our attitude. We are against the Jews but we are against the Jewish boycott of German goods. We are not allied with any foreign government, being good Americans. Our organization is planning to open a department store in New York to handle only German-made goods. We won't stop our activities until the Jewish boycott is discontinued."

and important by Central American society. They have in the past promoted some of the most delightful affairs in the history of the city. They have begun to side toward the Nazi side. The conversion of these groups was begun almost a year ago. The New York and Brooklyn member groups of the PASSAIC Volkstest Verein aggregate about one hundred thirty organizations. The Brooklyn groups particularly are cooperating with the Nazis, and as far as can be learned support the DAWA to a greater extent than the Manhattan units. About a week ago a meeting of the Platteau-Volkstest Verein of Brooklyn, which was attended by a representative of Consul-General Dr. Borchers, proved to be quite as Hitler in character as the meetings of the League of Friends of New Germany.

One of the pure Nazi organizations, nation-wide in scope, is the German American Theatre Union. Its headquarters are in Berlin, and virtually all members in this country retain their German citizenship. This organization is closely allied to the National Socialist Labor Front of the fatherland.

The Nazi philosophy has crept even into the German music and theatre venues. Mainly under the sponsorship of the Stahlhelm and Deutsche Legion music chapters and the Richard Wagner Music Venues, the seed of Nazism has been sown in the entire realm of music. This last group is marshaling into the DAWA a strong force of German musicians. It is unlikely that they will succeed in bringing into their ranks practically all music Vereine whose membership is composed of great extent of professional musicians. A Nazi theatre movement has been brought under way under the direction of Mitzl Wirth and will start in first offering tonight (Sunday) in the Tunstall at Lexington avenue and Eighty-sixth street. It hopes to be forerunner to a Nazi Theatre here.

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Four Hebrew Teachers Strike

according to the strikers, they "weren't even sure of getting that." The peak salary attained by the four was twenty-six dollars weekly. This, the picketers say, they received back in the days of "prosperity."

The strike was precipitated when the dispute committee of the Central Committee of Hebrew Teachers' Organizations, which embraces all of the Hebrew teachers unions in Greater New York, was asked by the four teachers to investigate their complaint against the school. An investigation by this body disclosed the fact that the teachers could be sufficiently well paid for their services from the tuition fees alone. There are 300 pupils in the school, ranging in age from six to fifteen, and the regular Hebrew school curriculum and in addition Yeshiva subjects. Hours were from four to eight-thirty at night.

While the strike is in progress the school is shut down. As in support to win the sympathy and support of the pupils' parents will be made by the striking quartet and their union at a meeting Sunday night to which the parents have been invited. The meeting, at which the dispute committee will be present, will be held in the synagogue at Chertok's, 17th Avenue, Brooklyn. Parents will be asked not to send their children to other schools pending settlement of the dispute.

Board Refuses Union Offers
The teachers are demanding a salary of twenty dollars weekly, which is to include the summer months and religious holiday vacations.

On the other side of the argument is the board of directors of the school. According to the president, Abraham Solovitz, the board is willing to settle the dispute. But, Mr. Solovitz adds, the board positively will not deal with the union. "We will settle with the teachers," he informed the Jewish Daily Bulletin on the telephone Friday, "but we will have nothing to do with their union."

Mayor Promises To Protect Jews

Wilno Head Pledges Action Against Endeks, Nazis and Radicals

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WILNO, Poland, May 4.—Strict measures will be taken to end the series of night attacks on the Jews of Wilno by members of the National Democratic and the National Radical parties and by Polish Nazis, the mayor of this city promised a Jewish delegation which called on him today to protect the outrages.

To M. Wygodski, head of the Wilno Jewish community, and Chief Rabbi Rubenstein, the mayor pledged that the police would take severe measures to prevent any recurrence of the disorders and to bring the guilty to justice.

One Endek student was sentenced to a month's imprisonment for his part in assaulting Jews in the streets of the city and several young disciples of the party were expelled from the high schools for participating in the gang activities.

When Tenenbaum was asked by the prosecution to admit the contents of documents confiscated from Aba Achimier's desk, defense counsel Horace Samuel objected strongly, particularly against the reading of a manuscript written by Achimier and entitled, "Megillot Haaskarim," in which he allegedly justified murder if national interests were benefited.

Samuel pointed out that Achimier's views might have been changed since the manuscript was written.

Court Upholds Defense

The court recognized the force of Samuel's contention and upheld his contention, ruling that all testimony regarding the contents of Achimier's private papers be stricken from the record.

Cross-examined by Samuel, Tenenbaum admitted that he had called Stavsky "murderer." "This was due to the fact that I had been without sleep for ninety hours," Tenenbaum explained, "and because Rice told me that Mr. Aronsohn recognized Stavsky as the murderer."

"Was the spirit of the other police similar to yours?" Samuel asked. Tenenbaum declined to answer the question stricken from the record.

Tenenbaum also told how he had secured a photograph of Stavsky from the Polish Consulate in Tel Aviv on the Sunday after the murder.

Other Chasan, Stavsky's landlord in Tel Aviv, testified that Stavsky had rented a room three months before the murder in his residence located in the Caucasian Jewish quarter of the city. Stavsky, he said, worked two or three days a week. On the night of the murder, according to Chasan, he saw Stavsky, Achimier and another man, who he said was about six o'clock. He next saw Stavsky and Achimier about ten o'clock on Saturday evening. They talked in the street and discussed the \$1,000 reward offered by the police for the capture of the murderers. Chasan declared he overheard Stavsky say that the reward was \$1,000 and that \$1,000 to the reward. Several days later Achimier was arrested, but was released and returned home.

Achimier Rebeckas Landford (Stavsky's wife) declared that the police had visited the house and inquired what the landlord told them. When he heard Chasan's story Achimier remarked, "It is you told the story to the police."

A few days after this incident Chasan's wife found a note in Stavsky's room in Achimier's handwriting reading, "you did well."

Vladick Hits City Slums Before Senate Body

WASHINGTON, May 4.—B. C. Vladick, member of the New York City Housing Authority, explained the terrible conditions existing in American cities' slum areas at a hearing of the Senate Committee on Labor and Education today.

Arguing for the LaFollette \$10,000,000 Federal appropriation for a proper national housing program, Vladick in a detailed fashion showed the cost in money, health and bad social effects of slum areas in New York and elsewhere.

Czechs Protest Reich Mail Action

Complain to Postal Union Letters in Transit Are Opened

PRAGUE, May 4.—The Czechoslovak postal authorities, it was learned today, has lodged a complaint with the International Postal Union at Berne against the opening of mail in transit through Austria.

After repeated complaints that mail in transit through the Reich was being opened and its contents read, contrary to international agreements, the Czech postal authorities filed their protest with the postal union, submitting evidence that seventy per cent of the mail in transit through Austria is being opened and read. This situation was not altered despite repeated remonstrances.

Ben - Gurion, Shertok Discuss Entry Limitation With Sir A.C. Wauchope

JERUSALEM, May 4.—David Ben-Gurion and Shertok of the political department of the Jewish Agency for Palestine today discussed with Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, High Commissioner for Palestine, reasons for the curtailment of immigration certificates for Jews to 5,600, one third of the number requested by the Jewish Agency.

Portuguese Minister Denies Government Favors Angola Plan

LISBON, May 4.—Reports that the government of Portugal was favorably disposed towards a scheme to settle five millions Jews in Portuguese West Africa, were denied here today by the Ministry of Colonies.

The government of Portugal will never consider such a suggestion for mass settlement, it was officially stated, although it will allow every facility for individual immigration in Angola and other colonial possessions.

1,600 Delegates Will Attend Conference

in countries not densely settled, but a permanent solution is essential for the future of civilization. James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for Refugees, addressing the body, appealed "as a non-Jew to the non-Jewish world to do its duty" and stressed the need for a solution of the problem on the basis of permanency.

"Little has yet been done," he told the council. "We are not satisfied with our concrete accomplishments. We haven't felt the need for a definite solution of new permanent homes for refugees."

"I appeal as a non-Jew to the non-Jewish world to do its duty. The Jews are the bulk of the refugees and the bulk of the responsibility for which they are not to be blamed. If non-Jews helped, only to a small extent, there would be no financial problem. Non-Jews must help."

He concluded his appeal by pointing out that refugees are not necessarily burdens to the country in which they settle.

"The United States of America was built by refugees," he declared. "I, myself, am the descendant of a refugee. America, North and South, must open the gates."
