#### Solidarity

H G. WELLS, arriving in the United States for a two weeks' rest, gave his opinions on war and peace, Brit-ish Fascism and anti-Semitism in Europe. The great novelist remarked that Anti-Semitism in Europe is childish stuff and nonsense, and that there is no more reason to suspect Jewish than Scottish solidarity.

"Do you want me to tell you of the conspiracy of the Scotch?" he added. "Well, they are the engineers on all the principal ships in the world, and they have been since the age of steam. Through a cou-spiracy of efficiency they will

be for years to come."

Mr. Wells had in mind the legend of Jewish solidarity for world domination that is being circulated by the Nazi propagan-dists. It is the old story of the counterfeit "Protocols." And how the Hitlerites are trying to

prove by a post card caricature of Hitler that the Jews had organized a plot to assussinate Hitler. The enemies of the Jows have

done and are doing their utmost to create solidarity among the Jewish people by their vicious onslaughts. Unfortunately, the Jews are not sufficiently united even in their defense against Hitlerism. Thus far no coordi-nated program has been elabor-ated by American Jewish leader-

#### Exaggerations

We have received a letter from Joseph D. Kaufman, chairman of Joseph D. Kaufman, chairman of the publicity committee of the B'nai B'rith membership cam-paign in Washington, together with specimens of the "litera-ture" used in the campaign.

"On April 1 the membership of this lodge was about 225," he writes. "Today it stands about 750, or more than tripled in less than a month . . . It is ir pur-pose to continue until we get at least'a thousand members, which should be done in less ann a week, and thereby set at least a million Jews to become members of the B'nai B'rith with its obvious advan-tages of campaigning. Tenenbaum, who has been on the witness stand since yesterday. Tenenbaum told how Mrs. Ar-losoroff, brought face to face with losoroff, prought face to face with Rosenblatt in the office of Chief Investigator Rice, shouted "this man killed my husband," As Mrs. Arlosoroff had spoken in English, Tenenbaum translated the phrase into German for Rosenblatt's benefit. He was then ordered to leave

When Rice recalled him half an hour later, Tenenbaum testified, he heard Mrs. Arlosoroff saying to Resemblatt in German, "I am sure you killed my husband. I know that you didn't do it voluntarily, but because you were ordered to. Why shouldn't you tell me who sent you? You are young, you had sent your You are young, you had better say now who sent you. It you will tell, I shall do my best for you. She said nothing more, Tenchaum declared.

Inspector Shows Plan Tenenbaum produced in court a plan drawn by him the day after the murder at the seashore show-ing the position of Dr. and Mrs. Arlosoroff and the two murderers at the moment the shots were fired. On the basis of the plan he concluded for a time that the murderer was left-handed, a supposition which led to the arrest of the Revisionist, Schneiderman, who was left-handed, Schneiderman was later released by the police. Tenenbaum discussed the matter with Chief Investigator Rice and with Prosecutor Behor Shitreet. Mrs. Arlosoroff declared, however, that she could not remember whether the murderer was left-handed or not.

The committee had come to pro-The committee had come to pro-test against the projected Friends of New Germany rally at Madison Square Garden May 17, on the grounds that it would incite to riot, hatred and intolerance, and to ask the Mayor to forbid the meeting. Nazi literature was pro-duced by the committee in sup-

port of its contentions.

Dunham promised to consult with the Mayor on the matter the following morning and inform the committee of his decision.

JERUSALEM, May 4.—A strict limitation on the number of lawyers to be admitted to practice in Palestine is being considered by the government, the Jewish Tele-

graphic Agency learned today. The government is now contem-plating restriction of licenses to plating restriction of incenses to practice to but five new attorneys a year, it was learned. The new restrictions are expected to go in-to effect in September.

The Jewish Agency for Palestine has taken up the question with other organizations concerned with a view to submitting repre-sentations to the government. The Jewish Bar Association, it was learned, is definitely opposed to the plan.

Enactment of this regulation would prevent many new Jewish settlers from Germany from en-gaging in Palestine in the profes-sion for which they had trained and which they had practiced in their native land.

## Palestine Can Will Welcome Magnes Absorb 80.000 Yearly-Lipsky

Jews 'Will Spill Over' to Nearby Countries, He Declares

That Palestine is growing so rapidly that it will be able to absorb 80,000 new Jewish settlers each year was estimated by Louis Lipsky, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, in his first public address since his return from Palestine at a meeting at the home of William Lowenstein, 115 Central Park West, where the Food Trades Division of the United Jewish Appeal was organized. The need for a place of Jewish

settlement is so great and the agricultural and industrial possibilities in Palestine and surrounding countries are so large that the Jews "will spill over physically and economically into Transjordan, economically into Transjordan, Iraq, and the Hedjaz, as well as into Syria," Lipsky predicted.

Reports 300,000 Jews There He reported that there are 300, He reported that there are 300, 000 Jews in Palestine today. Of this number more than 100,000 are in Tel Aviv, he said. Speaking of the difference of opinion that exists among Jews with regard to Palestine, Lipsky declared:

"Practical sense dictates that all

Jews, regardless of former preju-dices and dogmas that have died, should unite in support of the na-tional center in Palestine, whose development can be greatly accelerated through a union of all Jew-ish forces." He is a co-chairman of the \$3,000,000 United Jewish

25 Societies Will Spend More Than in 1933, Justice May Says

Expenditures of the twenty-five affiliated societies of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities during the current year will exceed operating costs in 1933, according to a statement by Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May, president of the Federation who based his conclusion on the increased costs of commodities and greater social needs in Brooklyn. Justice May declared that de-spite the fact that the utmost economy is practiced by the consti-tuent agencies, and even if the \$500,000 the Federation is seeking in the current twenty-fifth anniversary campaign is raised, some of the affiliates will have a deficit

this year due to the constantly-increasing appeals for relief being made at all the institutions. Medical care is the largest single item in the institutional budgets. Material relief and service is next in line in the amount anpropriated.

A new objective and a new nethod have been undertaken this year in the annual campaign. The goal of \$500,000 has been set as the immediate aim of the drive, but beyond that the Federation seeks to enlist a wider and more democratic support for its activi-

#### Gives Palestine Entry Conditions in Plea For Appeal Funds

The Jewish Agency for Pales-tine is required to post a guar-antee with the Palestine govern-ment for the maintenance of antee with the Palestine govern-ment for the maintenance of every Jewish boy or girl who en-ters Palestine from Germany, it was pointed out by Louis Lipsky, co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, in urging wide contri-butions to the \$3,000,000 fund-ratising effort, so that a maximum number of such German Jewish children may be absorbed into

Palestine. The budget includes the travel-ting expenses from Germany to Palestine, maintenance and edu-cation to the age of eighteen, the guarantee required by the govern-ment of Palestine to ensure against any youth becoming a burden on the community, central supervision educationally and so-cially after settlement at various points and in various institutions in Palestine, and the erection of buildings for the housing and the teaching of the young settlers.

## Angola Again Being Discussed As Polish Jewry Possible Haven for Jewish Exiles

#### Tangled European Situation Revives Interest in Country

Will Angola in Portuguese West Africa prove the dark horse among the corners of the earth which are put forth as likely for large scale Jewish colonization? Persistent rumors to that ef-

Fersistent rumors to that ef-fect have cropped up again. To be sure, League of Nations' High Commissioner, James B. McDon-ald, who is in charge of settling wish refugees, when approached, uptly disclaimed any knowl-of the existence of such a Proposal. When a London daily further intimated that an American relief organization was prepared to contribute some \$10,000,-000 for such a project and the Joint Distribution Committee was asked about it, it retorted with an equally emphatic denial.

A report came from Paris re-ferring to the departure of the Portuguese ambassador there with Lisbon his destination. He was to confer with his government on the proposition. It was said that sponsors of the plan are aiming at the ultimate establishment of a Jewish autonomous state in Angola under League protection and since Portugal objects to the League's overlordship negotiations are afoot for removing such objec-

On a number of previous occa-On a number of previous occa-sions Angola was prominently mentioned for the purposes of Jewish settlement. One of the most significant moves in this connection was made in 1912 when the ITO, Jewish Territorial Organion, then headed by Israel gwill, sent a commission and expedition to Angola to ex-Ization, Zangwill, amine the territory in question. ITO's avowed aim was "to procure a territory upon an auton-omous basis for those Jews who cannot or will not remain in the lands in which they at present live."

A "Hopeful" Country

Headed by J. W. Gregory, pro-fessor of geology at the Univer-sity of Glasgow, holder of num-erous scientific degrees and dis-tinguished for his scholarship the expedition returned in 1913 with a report on the country and conditions. As a supplement to the report, Dr. Gregory made a state-ment which in part said as fol-


I have considered the suitability of Angola rather for refugees who wish to escape poverty and ill-treatment in their own countries and wish to remain in a Jewish community. I assume that such refugees would be willing to work with greater patience than ordin-ary commercial settlers. I thought the country more hopeful for refugee immigrants than for any other class. I see no reason why such settlers should not in time build up a colony for themselves." Regarding actual figures, Dr.

Gregory said:
"I estimate that 5,000 square miles of moderately good land could be obtained in the one tract. How much more of the lands sur-How much more or the lands sur-rounding that area is suitable I cannot tell. . I think it probable that the 5,000 square miles could be greatly extended.

"Each settler should have about 160 acres, or say, four families to the square mile. With an aver-age of six per family that gives you a population of 120,000. In most agricultural countries, the urban population equals the agricultural. So that 5,000 square miles should support, say, fifty people to the square mile, or a quarter of a million."

Israel Zangwill first became interested in the possibilities of An-gola when in June, 1911, he re-ceived a letter from a Jew occupying a responsible post in Rho-desia, who described Angola in glowing terms and said that "during the last couple of years many mg the last couple of years many co-religionists have gone up to the Congo territory which is enor-mously rich."

While more Jewish leaders were while more Jewish leaders were becoming interested but still hesi-tated, the Portuguese government made the first move. The Cham-ber of Deputies passed the Jewish Colonization Bill. But it dealt only with individual settlers. Zangwill himself was not so overen with minister was not so overen-thustastic about the proposal as not to acknowledge that Angola "was not the paradise which it has been represented in some quarters." He admitted that "a good deal of the soil was poor."

Climate Good

Another expert, H. W. Nevinson, declared: "The project of the Por-tuguese government to settle Jews tiguese government to settle Jews in Angola is one that requires cau-tious consideration." He held that the Portuguese authorities enjoyed but little power and that volunbut little power and that volun-tary labor was extremely difficult

to obtain there.

Among other objections to Angola there has come to the fore from time to time the suspicion of the black population which, some say, is rather warlike. Mrs. Richard Bernhard is a slim. dark-haired young woman with a very gracious and friendly manner and a perfectly delightful sense of humor. She seems to accomplish so very much in her amazingly quiet and unflustered way that one is tempted to believe that the cynics are wrong and that there really are more than twenty-four

hours in a day.

How she can give as much time as she does to her two children. her wide circle of friends and her interest in the various Federation your face is made up right. Until organizations with which she is associated would puzzle anyone who had not had the opportunity of seeing her. The answer can of course be found in her efficiency, her flair for organizing and her real executive genius.

Executive Work Hard

There are very few people who are willing and able to undertake executive work in social service. In Federation it is perhaps the least amusing but certainly the most important work. She herself holds no brief for the placing of children in institutions, preferring to some extent the system of boarding out. Aids Crippled Children

Mrs. Bernhard is also on the board of the Crippled Children's East Side Free School at 157 Henry street. This school, one of the first in the city, was started by her grandfather, Mayer Schu-man, and is now run by the Board of Education. The children get special physical care and are sent by Federation to a summer home in Oakhurst, New Jersey. They remain there from June to September, and most of them make such remarkable progress in health that the projects can be considered worthwhile quite apart from the pleasure it gives. one summer some twelve years ago as a play counselor.

whether Father Coughlin is not on the way to become a first rate anti-Semite goaded by a similar private re-sentment. Father Coughlin has been a strong advocate of the remonetization of silver. He be-lieves that at the root of all our economic misfortunes is the Gold Standard. Many share his belief. However, he was not content morely to preach his silver gospel. He was so sure that President Roosevelt was about to remonetize sil-ver, (Father Coughlin's "The New Deal in Money," p. 38) that he had his radio guild buy five hundred thousand ounces of silver on a ten per cent margin. In other words he speculated in silver. Father Coughlin is, of course, opposed to stock speculation-generally speaking. So are we all. But, says he, he relied on President Roosevelt's word to increase commodity prices —and so there was no element of speculation in what he did . . . The Father had evidently forgotten his own words of admonition. "If the American people prefer to be hypocrites by gambling on the stock market, that is not neces-sarily the fault of the President." (Father Coughlin's "Radio Dis-courses" 1931-32, p. 124.)

Father Coughlin speculated in silver and unfortunately the Treasury Department found it expedient to make public the names of the large owners of silver stocks—and the name of his radio league was among them. The Father has accordingly been exposed to sharp and painful criticism. Men are saying many unkind things about him. It is suggested that his ardent championing of silver was not al-together an act of disinterested humanitarianism. Now, who is to blame for this public discomfiture of the good Father? The Secretary of the Treasury, of course. And who is he? Why it is Mr. Henry Morgenthau Jr.—a Jew!

This is a fortunate break Father Coughlin-the fact that Mr. Morgenthau is a Jew. One can now easily distract the attention of people from the real issue by drag-ging the red herring of anti-Semi-tism across its nath tism across its path. Father Coughlin lost no time in encasing himself in the shining silver armor of Christian righteousness in moral combat against the satanic gold hosts of international Jewry.

# CAPITAL & COMMENT

A quiet but thorough investigation of subversive propaganda activities in the United States has been launched by the Congressional committee headed by Represen-tative John McCormack of Massachusetts. The committee has sent scouts into propaganda hotbed centers in leading sections of the country. The purpose of these investigators is to get the lowdown on the activities of the leaders of the propaganda mongers. All this started with the appointment of Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia head counsel to the McCormack committee.

Attorney Hardwick knows the tricks in the game being played by those interested in promoting bitterness among racial, religious and political groups. He is an arch enemy of the Ku Klux Klan. A former Governor of Georgia, a former member of the House of Representatives, Attorney Hardwick undertakes his new task with a background of broad experience. He is opposed to intolerance and believes that there is a great public service to be done through the lic service investigation.

The Society for Constitutional Security is opposed to Congress granting Dr. Albert Einstein citizenship. This organization through its president, Mrs. William B. Shelton of Leonia, N. J., has sent a memorial to the Senate remonstrating against the passage of House Joint Resolution 309, introduced by Representative Edward A. Kenney of New Jersey, to ad-mit Dr. Einstein to citizenship. This is the first formal expression of opposition to such action made to Congress.

Representative Kenney intends to press for the passage of the resolution. He holds that a man such as Dr. Einstein "merits the high regard of any nation." Representative Kenney points out that several European countries have welcomed Dr. Einstein and offered weicomed Dr. Einstein and offerainly him their citizenship. "Certainly the United States, which he has publicly declared to and does love, beacon of liberty that it is, gladly will extend to Dr. Einstein all the privileges and prerogatives of her citizenship," the Jersey represen-tative declared.

Letters which the Friends of New Germany sent to members of Congress inviting them to attend a mass meeting in Madison Square Garden, New York, on May 17, did not set so well with the lawmakers on Capitol Hill. The meeting is to be held to protest the boycott against imported German goods.

Representative George Foulkes of Michigan characterized the intended meeting as "but a part of the sinister, subtle, and scheming propaganda being conducted throughout the United States by throughout the United States by Nazl agents. Both in military groups actually engaged in drills with arms and in groups using camouflaged names and pretending altruistic purposes, the Nazists are seeking to build up a terroristic army in this country that can some day be used for the establishment of an American Hitlerism."

The reported statement of James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for Refugees, made in London be-fore the council of the High Commissioner for Refugees, that Pal-estine offers the only immediate

estine offers the only immediate area for shelter to refugees from Germany, may stir the United States to be more liberal in extending anylum to these people. High Commissioner MoDonaid's statement, coming on top of reports submitted to Secretary of Labor Perkins by two committees are constructed as the commissioner of the c recommending more liberal appli-cation of the principle of asylum in the Jowish Daily Bulletin.

The Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce has reported favorably to the House on a resolution introduced by Representative Herman P. Kopplemann of Con-necticut, calling for a nation-wide investigation of practices of milk distributors. The investigation would be made by the Federal Trade Commission. Representative Kopplemann believes that there is wide a spread between what the farmer gets for milk and what the consumer has to pay. He, along with a number of other Congressmen, would like to know why. Passage of the resolution is practically assured in the House

THE story of Jesus as Nar-rated by the Wandering Jew, is the English translation of the is the English translation of the title of this last work by the au-thor of "Hear, O Israel," "Moses," and "Solomon," which have given him a prominent place in France him a prominent place in France as an impartial historian of Bibli-cal events. This life of Christ, coming from the pen of a Chris-tian writer, shows a refreshing breadth of view. One of its main aims is to free the Jews of the period from any blame of the crime of "deicide." Jesus is pic-tured as one of the Jewish rabbis tured as one of the Jewish rabbis of the period who had his own following of disciples like the oth-er rabbis and who taught the us-ual teachings of Judaism, but added to them his own interpretations. That he suffered death at the cross was no fault of the Jews, the au-thor proves, but of the secular rulers of Palestine at that time— the Romans, with whose political philosophies Jesus' teachings' had come in conflict.

What is rather surprising in this What is rather surprising in this Judeophile work is that the author adopts as the narrator the "Wandering Jew" a fictitious figure in no way complimentary to the Jewish people, as it was invented by medieval bigots as a chastisement of the Jew for the alleged crime of crucifying Christ.

During the war, as a nurse, she falls in love with a wounded army licutenant, later learning to her sorrow that his name is Simon Levy. However, love overcomes all her prejudices

Levy is too assimilated. He goes every day to his cafe, attends hunting parties and does every-thing in exactly the same way as the small-town well-to-do French-

Friends of New Germany In Hudson, Essex. Oppose Measure

(Special to the J.D.B.)
TRENTON, N. J., May 4.—Not ntil at least June 4 will there be any action on the Rafferty Bill which is designed to curb vicious propaganda in the state. The Senate Judiciary Committee now has the bill and since the Legislature has adjourned until June 4, decision necessarily will be in abey-

Meanwhile leaders of the Friends of New Germany in Hudson and Essex Counties have been extra-Essex Counties have been extra-ordinarily energetic through mes-sages and personal delegations seeking to protest against the measure. These do not even cloak their opposition under the guise of questionable constitutionality, al-though Assemblyman John J. Rafferty, snonsor of the measure and Assemblyman Samuel Pesin have issued a brief contending it will stand any court test.

Thus John Bischoff of Union City, who headed one delegation, unhesitatingly declared: "Our Hudunhesitatingly declared: "Our Hud-son County branch of the Friends of New Germany has a member-ship of 22,000, all against this bill. we gathered 5,380 petitions asking that it be defeated and the peti-tions were signed by members through the state. We left the petitions with the Senators as an ex-pression of our attitude. We deny we are against the Jews but we are against the Jewish boycott of German goods. We are not allied with any foreign government, be-ing good Americans. Our organiation is planning to open a de-partment store in New York to handle only German-made goods. We won't stop our activities until the Jewish boycott is discontinued."

Cross-examined by Samuel, Ten enbaum admitted that he had called Stavsky "murderer." "This was due to the fact that I had been without sleep for ninety hours," Tenenbaum explained, "also because Rice told me that Mrs. Arlosoroff recognized Stavsky as the murderer."

"Was the spirit of the other po-lice similar to yours?" Samuel asked him. The court ordered the question stricken from the record.

Tenenbaum also told how he had secured a photograph of Stavsky from the Polish Consulate in Tel Aviv on the Sunday after the murder.

Osher Chasan, Stavsky's landlord in Tel Aviv, testified that Stavsky had rented a room three months before the murder in his residence located in the Caucasian Jewish quarter of the city. Stav-sky, he said, worked two or three days a week. On the night of the murder, according to Chasan, he saw Stavsky, Achimeler and three others in Stavsky's room about six o'clock. He next saw Stavsky and Achimeler about ten o'clock Saturday evening. They talked in their room, shook hands gaily, and discussed the £1,500 reward offered by the police for the capture of the murderers. The B'nai B'rith should put a stop to such foolish and dangerous publicity, however well-intentioned it may be.
