Stopping the Fraud GOVERNOR LEHMAN'S approval of the Wald bill which makes it a misdemeanor

to alter or conceal the mark on imported merchandise giving the country of its manufacture is sure to make the boycott of German products even more effective than it has been thus

As Samuel Untermyer recently pointed out, German manufacturers and importers and certain of our own retailers have been successfully resorting to frauds, eva-sions and devices by which they have deceived the American con-sumers. The German goods have sumers. The German goods have been knowingly and misleading-ly marked with the names of cities, provinces and states in Germany, instead of with the name of the country as specifi-cally required by the law. Mr. Untermyer sharply criticized the Treasury Department for per-mitting these gross violations.

Senator Albert Wald and Governor Lehman deserve high praise for stopping in New York the evasive methods of the German manufacturers to camou flage the mark of origin of their

Samuel Untermyer, whose in-defatigable efforts to curb these tricky violations of our laws and whose tireless work for the an-ti-German boycott have attracted worldwide and favorable at-tention, also merits the grati-tude of all right-thinking and liberty-loving people.

Gangster Students

The Cuzists, the followers of the anti-Semitic Professor Al-exander Cuza, of Rumania, were defeated in the Radutzi by-election to the Parliament and they avenged themselves by at-tacking Jewish passengers in the trains. They beat the chief Rabbi of Jassy and plucked his beard. They attacked other Jewish travelers and forced them to shout "Long live Cuza!"

It is reported that in Radutzi, where the by-election was held, the Cuzists attacked not only the Jews but also Christians whom they suspected of having voted against the Cuza slate. The anti-Semitic rowdles were dispersed by the gendarmes.
In 1927, while visiting Ruma-

nia, I heard from eyewitnesses and victims exactly the same accounts of Cuzist outrages. The same attacks on Jewish passengers in moving trains were made then. The same humiliations were heaped upon anyone who looked like a Jew to the Cuzist rowdies in students' uniforms The Jews were forced to shout "Long live Cuza!"

Parley on War and Economic Injustice Blames Financial Muddle

Speakers at the Conference on War and Economic Injustice, held during morning and afternoon sessions at the Broadway Tahernacle yesterday, indicated that Fascism is one of the major threats to world peace and that the cause of Fascism is the peculiar economuddle in which the finances of the world are tied up.

At the morning session Reinhold Niebuhr, principal speaker, de-clared that capitalism is seeking to save itself by enlisting the lower middle classes in Fascism. He defined Fascism as "a lower middle class psychosis—the poor man's movement," and stated that Germany had a choice of Fascism or Socialism. He indicated that the former course was adopted un-der the manipulation of the capitalist class

Villard Recalls Wilson

Oswald Garrison Villard, former editor of The Nation, recalled the late President Wilson's assertion that America must face a re volution, more than likely a blood less revolution. He declared that the World War interrupted the country's trend toward revolu-tion, and to this he laid most of the country's recent economic dis-

Rabbi Louis I. Newmann held that ministers and rabbis are the champions of their congregations favoring the under-dog rather than the better off element. He said that with respect to this, the clergy "are not carbon copies of the people in pews," but they are, perforce, more radical. B'klyn Group Merges With Guardians, Judge May Announces

The problem of the prevention and correction of delinquency Brooklyn is now being dealt w. on a city-wide basis in coordina-tion with similar work in other boroughs, according to an an-nouncement made public last night by Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May, president of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities Ac. companying the announcement was an appeal to the contributing public of Manhattan and other parts of the city to recognize the obligation to support the Federation's \$500,000 campaign without regard to borough divisions.

Justice May declared that the Brooklyn Jewish Social Service Bureau has been merged with the Jewish Board of Guardians of New York and that it will function here after as the Brooklyn District of the Jewish Board of Guardians with headquarters at 285 Schermerhorn street.

"The success of this experiment,' declared Justice May, "may blaze the trial to other functional coordi nation of the Jewish social services on both sides of the East River The Brooklyn Federation and the New York Foundation are jointly financing this venture in social engineering. It is a matter of mutua congratulation that the govern-ment boards of the three participating agencies were able to n gotiate the merger with genuin disinterestedness in behalf of bet ter service to the community."

"The Ignominy of the Twentieth Century" depicts Professor Al-bert Einstein, in an attitude of despair, facing Hitler, whose fist is clenched. On Hitler's side is a brown-shirted storm trooper. Be-hind them is visible an arm supporting a sword from which blood is dripping. Califano is afflicted with deaf-

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Fascists in America Are United Against Jews

America's Inertia Encouraging ToAnti-Democratic Groups Here

Reactionists, the Disgruntled, Envious Poor, 'Rugged Individualists' and Prophetic Intellectuals Flock to Fold of Pro-Nazis and Their Ilk

The following is the last of a series of eighteen articles dealing with the anti-Semitic move-ment in the United States. The first was published on Wednes-day, April 18. The articles were based on an exhaustive investi-gation of Nazi propagunda activities in this country and in Germany for a period of over a

This development, considering the rapidity with which it embedded itself in American political affairs, is the most remarkable in the history of

the country.

which may now be answered as accurately by the most ignorant dullard as by the shrewdest poli-tician. The Fascist movement is generally scorned. It was so received by other European countries, which eventually bowed before the overwhelming forces of unity, aggression, violence and pereution which characterize the Fascist movement. As yet no nation, aside from those led by non-Fascist dictators has a means of stunting the growth of Fascism within its boundaries. It will be surprising if the United States government, traditionally tolerant of alien political beliefs and activities, succeeds in discouraging the Fascist and Nazi move-

A Potpourri

Fascism provides a link for the reactionists, the disgruntled, the envious poor, the rugged individualists, the prophetic intellectuals, the proud "Aryans," the religious and nationalistic fanatics, the demagogues, the political racketeers and lunatics of all descriptions.

Fascism has played into the hands of such ardent patriots as Ralph Easley, professional anti-Communist. Easley, in line with his business, has scattered anti-Communist and somewhat anti-Semitic pamphlets throughout the nation. These are printed in Germany and distributed free of charge here. The booklets he distributes justify Hitlerism and the Hitlerite type of government. Easley trades on a number of respect-able American names subscribed to these booklets.
Dr. William A. Wirt, the Gary

Shirt movement, "explained" the Wirt charges in confidential letters widely circulated from Washington. Pelley pointed out that Jews were at the bottom of the conspiracy mentioned by the Hoosier teacher. George Christians, com-mander-in-chief of the Crusader White Shirts, took occasion to identify himself as the author of the "Kerensky" phrase, and there-by won for himself nation-wide publicity. A Common Enemy

While in many cases there is no tangible alliance between the various Fascist organizations operat-ing in the United States, nevertheless they strive for the same goal, batter their common enemy which is Democracy, and generally aid each other's cause. They all seek to render "America to Americans," although the Khaki Shirts speak English with a heavy Italian accent; although the Silver Shirts in New York (75 per cent of their following drawn from the League of Friends of New Germany) normally converse in their native German; although the American Nationalists speak with an Irish brogue; although the Croix de Feu are entirely at home in French and not at all in English; although the entire Fascist movement, particularly in the East, is expressed in a babel of tongues in which Eng-

lish is scarcely recognized.

On one thing can the divergent Fascist groups see eye-to-eye. That is the Jewish question. Virtually all Fascist organizations are anti-Semitic, and they experience in this respect a kindred feeling despite their entirely different eco-How far it will go is a question nomic and social philosophies. It is remarkable that the Jews, unable to achieve unity in their own ranks, should so effectively inspire

unity among their enemies.

What assurances have Jewish citizens, or Catholic citizens, or any other citizens who might be considered a minority group that one or two years hence some powerful leader will not emerge, knit together all minor political parties into a Fascist machine, and then proceed to invoke the terrorism of the Middle Ages? As far as this reporter's investigation goes, there is no authority to protect these

Three authorities which might be commonly expected to defend the American democratic form of government are the Department of Justice, the Post Office Depart-

ment and Congress.

U. S. Off Her Guard My inquiries at the investigation bureau and the press office of the department of Justice revealed an apparent ignorance of Nazi condiwhen I asked for specific information concerning action being taken against such groups as the Silver Shirts, the Crusader White Shirts, the Khaki Shirts, and other Fascist organizations, the Depart-ment of Justice spokesmen indi-cated that they had little data and less chance of taking action against these groups.

In the Post Office Department the same situation prevails. Mem-bers of the inspection force presented what they said was the complete file of anti-Semitic literaChampioned by Fascists in U. S.

Copies of a number of scurrilously anti-Jewish newspapers were on display in the Post Office files, but they continue to circulate, and for all the action the Post Office Department may take, will continue to do so. Here and in other de-partments I discovered an awful respect for the freedom of the press and sanctity of the mails. It appeared that none is willing to take the responsibility of prose-cuting the case against American Fascism because of the howl that might emanate from the entire press of the country.

Mr. Aldrich Comments

When such charges were laid beore Chief Inspector A. P. Aldrich, ne wrote in part: "The absence of greater activity by the Post Office Department in connection with Nazi and other anti-Semitic propaganda is not due either to timidity or to an unwillingness to assume responsibility. Action is taken whenever it is shown that matter is being circulated through the mails in violation of the Postal Laws. The department has no au-thority, however to suppose the thority, however, to suppress the dissemination through the mails of literature which does not come within the scope of the Postal Laws even though such literature contains statements objectionable to particular groups or organizations

"With respect to the opening of mail matter, Post Office inspec-tors, as well as all others in the postal service are governed by Section 701 of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1932, which reads as follows:

Section 211

Perhaps the only clause which might be brought into play is one tacked on to the end of Section 211 of the Act of Congress with regard to mails. This act, approved March 4, 1909, and amended two years later, provides for the non-mailability of lewd or indecent material, instruments for abortion or the prevention of conception, and various devices related to both categories, the circulation of which is punishable by not more than five years' imprisonment, a fine of \$5,000, or both. Agents Are Active

It is difficult to prophesy with regard to the success of the Con-gressional Committee created by the Dickstein resolution for the in-vestigation of Nazi and other propvestigation of Nazi and other prop-aganda. German Nazi agents con-tinue to remain in this country, and will do so more than likely, until, like the refugee Spanknoebel, they are summoned to an accounting. Then there will be left only the American citizens who have been appointed by the German agents to head the groups, and these can plead inno-cence of their former chiefs' doings.

Even the War Department appears to be unaware of efforts made by Nazis to corrupt and proselyte its forces. Information regarding these attempts, substantiated by statements from local arm yofficers and court testimony, has been given in earlier articles.

The failure of the War Departand railure of the War Department to keep up with the Nazi situation is reflected from a com-munication recently directed to this reporter from a spokesman for the National Guard Bureau in Weshington He said to Washington. He said in part:

"This bureau has no information and no means for securing information on German Nazi activities mation on German Nazi activities as they affect the National Guard. The Congress has always been strongly opposed to any activity, on the part of the War Depart-ment or any of its agencies that may give it even the appearance gathering information on the activities of citizens of this coun-

"It would appear," he wrote, "that the Department of Justice would be the most likely federal agency to consult."

The preceding articles, as specifically as space permitted, have dealt with the rise of Fascism in the United States. The series is not intended as an indictment against the Nazis and Fascists, but rather as a statement of facts a observed by one who has devoted year to reporting exclusively on Fascist developments both in the United States and abroad. Vol-umes of material are at hand which might further prove such generalizations as limited time and space have made necessary in this series.

As far as this reporter can see there is little hope of an immediate cessation of Fascist organizational activities in the United States. It appears that the best way to cope with the situation is to carefully analyze the movement, isolate it specific complaints, and eliminate as completely as possible the pro-vocations which might cause oth-erwise patriotic Americans to adhere to it. The alien agitators and political racketeers should then be placed out of harm's way.

Rabbi Goldman Asks End of Hysterical Reaction by Jews

(Special to the J.D.B.)

NEWARK, N. J., May 8.—In paying tribute to Mrs. Felix Fuld, recholder Philip Lindeman, Isaac Lowensten and A. J. Diamond at a dinner in Fuld Hall of the Y.M.-Y.W.H.A. last night, more than 450 representative Jewish citizens heard earnest pleas to forego hysterical or panicky reaction to any current manifestations of anti-Semitism, and to concentrate raof Jewish consciousness.

The principal plea was voiced by Rabbi Solomon Goldman, who s the main speaker at the event which marked fifty years of the Y.M.-Y.W.H.A. in this city, and the start of a week's celebration of the opening of the present building at High and Kinney streets a decade ago. "Used to H" Declaring that "anti-Semitism doesn't worry me; I'm used to it,"

Rabbi Goldman maintained that "what we must emphasize in the present crisis is not anti-Semitism. nor Hitlerism, nor the spread of Nazism, but rather what is the manner of reaction to it. For the first time in eighteen centuries, we are showing ourselves actually panicky and hysterical because we're afraid and not prepared. Our ancestors shrugged their shoulders and looked with contempt upon any manifestations of anti-Semitism."

In asserting that the "Jewish center was a recognition of the common aspirations and unity of our people," Harry L. Glucksman, executive director of the National Jewish Welfare Board, declared "the solution of our difficulties is not to be found in pleasing our Christian neighbors or excelling them in politeness, but is essentially a problem of inner emotional adjustments?
