EDITORIAL NOTES HERMAN BERNSTEIN

Relief—Not Advice

R. IRA M. YOUNKER,

President of the Jewish Social Service Association and

co-chairman of the Greater New York Drive of the United Tewish Appeal, tried to dramatize the tragic plight of German Jewry by saying in sub-stance that the Jews of Ger-many are under a moral obli-gation not to have children while Hitler is in power. Mr.

Younker, in explaining his remarks as published in a metropolitan newspaper, declared in a statement to the Jewish Daily Bulletin:

Jany Billetin:
"I certainly do not advocate
Jewish race suicide. My own
feeling is, however, that if I
lived in Germany I would certainly not wish to bring into this world children who would have to face as terrible a future as confronts them in Nazi Germany today. . . . Only by thus sharply dramatizing the state of these children can we in America be made to realize the full extent of the horror for Jews under Hit-

Mr. Younker has rendered a Mr. Younker has rendered a distinct disservice to the United Jawish Campaign by injecting a highly controversial issue into the relief drive. This is an unwise and rather harmful dramatization of the sorrows of the Jews of Germany. The majority of American Jewry will disagree with Mr. Younker's suggestion of Jewish race suicide in Ger-many, however well-intentioned dramatized suggestion may

As for the German Jews, they are in the desperate position of not even being able to complain not even being able to complain of their sufferings and their hu-miliation. We do not know ex-actly whether they approve of the methods employed by the various factions of American Jewry in combatting Hitlerism and denouncing the Nazi outrages perpetrated upon the German Jews. The German Jews dare not speak. Some of them have even been compelled to minimize the anti-Jewish atrocides in Germany and to ask that

no vigorous protests be made by the Jews of other lands. But as the Jewish tragedy in Germany is not merely a German Jewish tragedy, for the Hitlerist anti-Jewish menace is reaching far beyond the borders of Germany, the Jews of other lands and particularly the Jews of America realize that Hitler-ism must be combatted vigoriam must be combatted vigor-ously, regardless of whether or not the German Jews approve such a defensive measure. When the Jews of Russia were po-grommed, the Jews of America did not ask the Russian Jews whether they should raise their voice in a mighty protest. The Russian Jews, oppressed by the Tsar, also had to maintain sience. They, too, had to fear

Mejid Says **Duo Offered** Him Money

Claims Brother Was in Cell With Him, Overhearing Talks

(Jawish Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, May 10.—Abdul
Mejid, Arab convict who has occupied the witness stand at the trial of the three Revisionist Zion-ists accused of the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff for three days of gruelling cross-examination by defense counsel Horace Samuel, to-day went on the stand for the

fourth day.

Although Samuel had concluded his cross-examination of the wit-nesses, he was recalled by the prosecution. Mejid had said during Samuel's examination that he was approached by Abraham Stavsky and Zvi Rosenblatt, two of the ac-cused, and offered £1,000 to as-

sume the blame for the murder. For three days the Arab testified in detail as to the alleged bribe and the story of how he was coached in the details of the murder by the accused and by another Arab, Sufchi.
At the close of his cross-exam-

ination Samuel created a sensation when he declared that, irrespective of the result of the present trial, he was prepared to prove that Mejid and his companion Issa Dar-

Mejid and his companion Issa Dar-wish had killed Dr. Arlosoroff. Musa al Alami, Arab govern-ment prosecutor, began by asking Mejid whether the convict's brother, Hamid, who was in the same cell with him, had overheard his conversation with Stavsky and Rosenblatt.

Mejid answered that his brother had overheard one of the talks and asked him what they had wanted. "I told him they are talking about the Arlosoroff case, offering me money and teaching me the details of the case," Mejid replied.

Government Will Take Measures Reports reaching the capital to-day from Lodz, Bialystok and Czenstochowa, where the attacks against Jews this week reached serious proportions, have strength-ened the determination of the government, it was learned, to take vigorous measures to maintain order. These measures would include the prohibition of the wearing of the gray uniforms, affected by the Naras.

Hooligans at Lodz, according to reports here today, stoned Jewish motorcyclists who put up a strong battle in self-defense. Speier Compares Pre-War Anti-Semitism With Today's

The difference between the anti-Semitism in Germany before the war and the present type is that economic difficulties were never so severe as at present, Professor Tans Speier, of the University in Exile, said in an address before the History society of City College yesterday. Professor Speier's topic was the "Social Aspects of National Socialism in Germany."

Commenting on the part of one of the largest unions in Germany in reviving anti-Semitism, Profes-sor Speier said, "the National As-sociation of German clerks, the founders of which were politicians, not clerks, acted as the intermedi-ary between the old anti-Semitic organizations and the present Hit-ler ideology."

"Anti-Semitism and everything that is fashionable in Germany today can be found in the doctrines of this union. The union was very well organized, which means militaristically organized," the lecturer declared.

When asked about the public reaction to Hitler, Professor Speier laughed and replied: "There is no public opinion in Germany any more. Jokes have taken the place of public opinion. You people who read the American press know more about Germany than the people there."

In reply to another student query, the lecturer declared that in his opinion "the educated people will not stand for this treatment in the long run."

Appeal Meets to Start Drive

An appeal to the men and wom-en of New York to make their gifts on "Mother's Day" to the fund for the relief of German Jewish refugees was sounded yester-day by Mrs. Roger W. Straus, Chairman of the Women's Division of the United Jewish Appeal of New York, at a tea at her home, 6 East 93rd Street, to inaugurate the women's activities in the refugee aid campaign.

A quota of \$200,000 for the German-Jewish relief drive opening at the Hotel Commodore on Sunday was accepted by the group of prominent women leaders who attended the tea, at which the officers of the Women's Division were inducted.

Sadness In Reich "Thousands of Jewish women in Germany," said Mrs. Straus, "will be inexpressibly sad on this Sunday which we in America have designated as 'Mother's Day.' We America should observe this 'Mother's Day' by giving generous contributions to the United Jewish Appeal in honor of our own mothers, who will be gratified by this form of tribute. Our gifts to the German Jewish relief campaign will enable many mothers in Germany to provide food, clothing and shelter to their children: and will enable thousands of mothers to send their children to schools where they need not bear the burden of shame that is forced upon them in the few German schools where Jewish chil-dren are still admitted. 

Text of Protest on Immigration Limit

Will Increase Labor Shortage. Jeopardize Growth, Say Agency

5,600 Certificates Instead of 21,000 Asked for Palestine Hopelessly Inadequate, Statement Declares-World Plight of Jewry Adds to Crisis

The following is the full text of the statement issued by the executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine in Jerusalem es plaining its position on the im-migration restrictions imposed by the Palestine government.

JERUSALEM. May 9. "The executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine feels bound to define publicly its attitude on the grant by the government of Palestine of only 5,600 labor immigration certificates for the pebetween April and Septem 1934," the statement declared.

"The executive perceived in this grant the continuation of a policy which restricts immigration, while the steadily expanding absorptive capacity of the country is creating a steadily growing gap between the demand for labor and the supply, causing a loss of the Jewish economic position, and gravely ieopardizing the chances healthy, unhampered progress of the Jewish National Home. The last two years were a period of unprecedented economic progress in Palestine. The collapse of Ger-man Jewry and the world-wide repercusions brought home to the masses of Jews that Palestine alone offers the opportunity for a secured existence

Secured existence.

"The increasing flow of capital to Palestine, the investment in building, sgriculture and industry proceeded apace. The government's revenue has abown an enormous increase and the treasury surplus grew by 1,000,000 pounds in one year. Throughout this period, as the government so often admitted, there prevailed an acute shortage of labor, particu-larly felt in agriculture with the result that it was found impossible to recruit the necessary labor for wide Jewish areas in Palestine,

"Orange plantations, agricul-tural settlements and industry also were severely handicapped and even major enterprises like the n major enterprises Ruttenberg concession, the Pales tine potash concession and the Nesher cement works found great difficulty in obtaining workers. The labor shortage proved that the former labor immigration schedules lagged behind the actual requirements and were grossly dis-proportionate to the country's growing absorptive capacity.

Immigration Increased

"It is true that immigration to Palestine has shown a marked in-crease in the last three years. Im-migrants of all catagories with their dependents numbered 4,000 in their dependents numbered 4,000 in 1931, 10,000 in 1932 and 28,000 in 1933, but the economic develop-ment of Palestine far outstripped the supply of labor which the im-migrants provided, including those entering as travellers and stayed after finding employment. For at least three schedule periods the rate of admission of labor immigrants was stationery and ap-peared to be stabilized at a rate far below the minimum claimed by

the Agency.

"Schedules granted were 5,500 for October, 1933, and 5,600 for April, 1934. The Agency finds it impossible to reconcile this restriction of immigration with the declared policy of the Mandatory. declared policy of the Mandatory Power that immigration will be regulated in accordance with the economic absorptive capacity of Palestine, a principle which the cess of the absorptive capacity, but should be authorized to the fullest extent.

"Moreover a restrictive policy is gravely prejudicial to the struc-ture of the Jewish National Home and threatens to undermine the economic positions acquired by the Jews with so much effort and sac-"The present scarcity of labor

has already led to a series of ad-verse developments in Palestine, which are bound to be further ag-gravated by the new schedule," the Agency statement pointed out.

Huge Rise in Wages

"Building wages have risen to unprecedented heights upsetting investment calculations and raising capital expenditure beyond the economic level. Labor has shifted from agriculture to better paid oc-cupations, and immigrants destined for the farms have been drawn in-to the towns, while the farms remained understaffed and the orange groves undercultivated. Jewish workers are available to allow the Jews to have their share in government projects, Impor-tant development projects have been held up. Industry has been revented from taking the fullest advantage of the possibilities afforded by new investments and the expanding markets, while a number of enterprises were unable to keep pace with the rise in wages, and the building industry lost a considerable number of its skilled employees.

Labor Situation Tense

"The general labor situation has een one of high tension

"Workers are leaving their jobs in reply to the more insistent demands by employers exasperated by their inability to find workers. Public resentment has been aroused by the sight of enterprises delayed by the impossibility of finding Jew-ish labor for works undertaken for the specific purpose of absorbing Jewish immigrants.

"The government has given no official reasons for the discrepancy between the claims advanced by Agency and the schedules ted. Should this discrepancy be due to the fear of an economic setback, it would appear remarkable that this fear should have continued to influence schedule after schedule, in spite of it being invalidated by subsequent devel-

opments. "The Agency believes itself justified in refusing to take a pessi-mistic view of the future. In the present position of the Jews in the Diaspora, the flow of capital to Palestine is unlikely to abate, Already large accumulations of cap-ital in Palestine are seeking profitable investment in the Jewish orange area, which consists of 130 --000 dunams, two thirds of which are young plantations requiring a steadily growing volume of labor.
Preparations for new planting
promised to increase this area by
one fourth during the current six months. Whatever difficulty should befall the orange industry, the cultivation of the groves must con-tinue with little likelihood of a decrease in the demand for labor.

future The local demand for mannfactured products-steadily growing with the growth of the population—provide yet a wider margin for further industrial progress.

"As to the building industry, with all its signal development, it is still far from satisfying existing needs. Housing accommoda-tion capital being plentiful, it is unlikely to show a serious contrac-tion in the near future. Even if building industry cannot be maintained on the same level for a period of years, the release of labor from the industry need not cause a crisis, as industrial development and agricultural colonization can be relied upon to absorb the sur-

"The settlement of land and the onversion of agricultural laborers into independent farmers, is continuing uninterruptedly and a numher of major settlement schemes are now nearing realization.

"In the face of all these pros pects it can hardly appear justifi-able that a fear of a future crisis should cramp the present development and upset the balance in the labor market. As against the vague fears of a possible future crisis, the Agency must set the obvious fact that the shortage of labor has continued for more than a y Recent experience proved that the development of the Jewish National Home can proceed on a wider basis and at a more rapid pace than was previously regarded as possible.

Jabotinsky Offers Plan For Zionist Peace

'Free Confederacy' of Parties Urged by Revisionist Leader

Threatened Split of Z. O., He Contends, Compels New Set-Up - Outlines Plan That Provides for Equal Party Representatives at World Congress

The following article is a comprehensive, authoritative state-ment of the Zionist-Revisionist viewpoint suggesting a method whereby the various Zionist parties can come to final agreement on the Palestine and other Jew ish questions. It was written by Vladimir Jabotinsky, world leader of the Zionist-Revisionist Para former member of the World Zionist Executive, one of the founders of the Jewish Legion which fought in Palestine under General Allenby, and a noted publicist.

The Zionist organization is threatened with a split; there are threatened with a spit; there are some who think the split is already there. It would be idle to discuss whose fault it is; the only thing that matters—to those who set any value by the preservation of a Congress and an Executive representing the joint will of all the Zionist parties, as I do-is to try to establish those conditions upon which a united body of that character could be reborn, and reborn for permanence,

Such an attempt, of course, had better be made by somebody quite objective and impartial, which I do not claim to be. Still, the intelligent reader will himself judge in how far the remarks that follow can be accepted as cool sense or, on the contrary, as partisan or, on th outbursts.

It is a fashion with most Zionist writers and orators to endow the Zionist movement with all the dignity of a non-territorial "State." And they conclude, accordingly, that every "citizen" of this Statelike community should obey the decisions of its "Parliament" and "Government" the same as a citizen of, say, Sweden or Holland obeys. I am afraid this is a con-Holland struction not only premature but totally erroneous.

Zionism Not a State

I wish to goodness we Jews could possess a real State, and the sooner the better; but the Zithe sconer the better; but the zi-onist movement is only a move-ment, not a State. The difference lies, above all, in the realm of ethics A State can comnel: therefore, a citizen who obeys its orders even against his own convictions and conscience, commits no moral transgression: he must, he is forced, he acts under duress, and if his acts are morally wrong in his own judgment, the responsi-bility is not his. But a "move-ment" is a community based on ment" is a community based on the free will and consent of each of its components. One is not only not "compelled"—one is not even supposed to remain a memif the actions demanded of become irreconcilable with his conscience. For the moral re-sponsibility, in the eye of his inermost tribunal, rests upon him. and him only. He has no excuse of outward compulsion, he was free to obey or disobey, and if he acted against his own ethical judgment, it was his own fault and sin.

A very common example can illustrate this difference. Thousands and thousands may abhor the very idea of killing their neighbors from across the frontier in the name of patriotism; or, even if not entirely pacifists, they

pelled. It would be quite another story if they took part, say, in some kind of Jameson raid, at the same time thinking it unjust. In that case, their action would be

Two Viewpoints Clash

Today the Zionist movement comprises widely and deeply con-flicting elements. There are those in its ranks who feel that it would be unworthy of our national traditions to seek domination even in Palestine: and there are those who Palestine; and there are those who believe that every nation is en-titled to "dominate" in its own national home. The former, ac-cordingly, cannot agree that the claim for a "Jewish majority on both sides of the Jordan" should be stated in the name of a body of which they, too, are a part. And the latter, equally, cannot agree that Zionism should be officially interpreted, in the name of a body which they, too, are a part, as undertaking quite content with prospects of a national minority.

The same can be said as to tactics. Some Zionists are entirely

convinced that hammering radical demands upon the mandatory powers is harmful; and some, again, are entirely convinced that "hammering," etc., is the only way to obtain the object. If the latter became the master of the Zionist became the master of the Zionist Organization's machinery, it would be quite natural for the former to say, not only to their fellow-Zionists, but also to the world at large: "Our conscience forbids us to support methods of action like-ly to destroy the Jewish hope; we want the world to know that there is also another kind of Zionists serving the same ideal but reject-ing such tactics; so that when the day of wrath will come, it should not strike all the Zionists but a portion of them should be left to carry on." And vice-versa.

So far it has been "vice-versa." For many years, Zionism has been officially presented to the mandaofficially presented to the manda-tory power as a project which does not imply the claim for a Jewish majority in Palestine. But Jewish majority in Patestine. But a section of Zionists were pro-foundly convinced that the "ma-jority" claim is the only argu-ment which can compel the mandatory power to change its immi-gration policy, and the only inter-pretation able to make Zionism adequate to the needs of the Jew-ish tragedy. Let it not matter, for the moment, whether that sec-tion's view was right or wrong: but it was their profound con-viction, the voice of their conscience, and they felt that, should they keep silent (for silence, to all the world, means acquiescence) they would harm the Zionist fu-

Always Two Opinions

It would be idle for anybody here to intervene with the well known objection: "Is it not still more harmful to confront the world with two interpretations of word with two interpretations of Zionism, thus promoting stran-gers to the role of judges in a Jewish dispute on things essen-tially Jewish?" The objection sounds plausible, but nobody really believes in it. There has al-ways been, before the non-Jewish world, two Jewish opinions. went to the War Office to insist on the suppression of the Jewish Regiment. Another hurried to the rescue of the Legion. (And both included prominent Zionists.) This play of dualism goes on: some Jews are in favor of the anti-German boycott, some are against it. Yet, above all those divisions. there is evidently the voice of the objective truth, of life's reality itself; and somehow, therefore, it is always the good cause that triumphs in the end. The Balfour Declaration became a fact; so did the Jewish Legion; and Germany's exports dwindle. It is, of course, very regrettable that Jews cannot talk in unison; but let us not overestimate the danger.

The ruling majority then may amuse itself by "expelling" the mutineers from the Zionist Orton the Zionist Or ganization: but everybody by now realizes that that will bring neither help nor solace. It is, on the contrary, the "mutineers" who always get the biggest headlines in the press, and the "expulsions" of the minority will only result in or the minority will only result in a confession that the Zionist Or-ganization, once identified with "Zionism" as a whole, no longer even pretends to represent the to-tality of Zionist Jewry. If I spoke as a partisan, I should say; quod erat demonstrandum! But I speak in the name of cool common sense.

Common sense points to one solution only: the Zionist Organiza-tion can no longer exist on the hasis of its present statutes; with parties fighting each other at Congress elections in order to conquer the majority (and, here in Eur-ope at least, victory depends, to a very large extent, on the respec-tive financial power of each-for Shekalim can be distributed free of charge); with the conquering majority trying to dictate and threatening the minority with majority trying to dictate and threatening the minority with dreadful executions. The very character of those dreadful execu-tions is a tell-tale admission that gives away all the fallacy of that famous comparison of Zionism gives away all the fallacy of that famous comparison of Zionism with a "State": the ultimate, the final threat in expulsion." A State does not expel offenders against discipline: a State puts them in jail. . . I apologize for too fam-illar and slangy a term I am about to use, but I can find no other: all this is "bunkum."

The Zionist Organization can-not be preserved by such methods. It was all very well as long as the Z. O. was young, and there was accordingly but little differ-entiation between its component elements. Today it consists of deeply differentiated parties, each one actually sovereign, independent, and unamenable to any compulsion. This fact has to be admitted; and more—this fact should

become the base on which the new waining, in the one, free to act world Zionist Organization should as they like.

Since comparisons are the fashsince comparisons are the fash-ion, I offer a better one: Zionism is not a "State," but a "family." As long as the children were small, and "Daddy" alive, it kept small, and "Daddy" alive, it kept together without difficulty. Now there is no longer any trace of a person or a party likely to be recognized as the equivalent of "Daddy"; and the "children" are recognized as the equivalent of "Daddy"; and the "children" are grown, long married, each one with his own line of business. Such a family can only be kept from disbanding by free mutual consent, none of the brothers ever attempting to dominate.

Translated into the language statute paragraphs this won mean:

The World Zionist Organization is a free confederacy of indepen-dent and sovereign Zionist par-

At the World Zionist Congress At the World Zionist Congress each party is represented by an equal number of delegates, and resolutions require the free con-sent of all the delegations.

All these parties shall use their best efforts to work out, in so far as possible, joint objects methods of action with regard to such matters as raising the neces sary funds, spreading the Hebrew sary tunds, spreading the field ew language, training chalutzim, financing Palestinian institutions or enterprises, facilitating and regulating immigration. For thes purposes they may fix by mutual consent, from time to time, fair quotas of the benefits and advan tages to be derived by each party from the joint activity of all

They elect, at the Congress, a joint executive—the Jewish Agency—whose powers shall be strictly confined to the lines of action agreed upon mutually-including also the function of performing in the name of Zionists as a whole. such political steps as would be agreed upon by all.

The parties, moreover, under-take to consult each other on any separate action, political or otherwise, which they might stand in-dividually to initiate, always endeavoring to achieve, at least some degree of coordination-while re-

I think I can visualize an rangement of this kind, and I feel sure that it would be quite a usesure that it would be quite a userful arrangement. But even pessimists should realize that that would be the only practicable form of comparative unity, simply because there can be no other.

The Deutscher Bund under the fine hand of Hans Wuerz, former secretary American Branch of the National Socialist Party, and Friedrich Heiss, the grand old man of anti-Semitism, has issued its first appeal for a following-cash customers, if you please.

Heiss and Wuerz are convinced that Gissibl and his successor, Reinhold Walter, are not Nazi enough (Heaven and Heiss only know how they could be more so). So they are starting their own outfit, into which they hope to drag Germans, German Americans, and all others who are willing to cross the Nazi palms with silver.

For Heiss it will be a day of glorious revenge. Some months ago the Friends of New Germany withdrew their patronage from Heiss' paper, Amerikas Deutsche Post, which had been the Nazi Party organ for many months. The Nazis reckoned that Heiss was making too much dough for the fat, old duffer he is, and a few of the more far-sighted (Griebl and Spanknoebel primarily) agreed that the silver lining should grace their own pockets. So they set up Das Neue Deutschland, which later became the weekly Deutsche Zeitung.

In both these sheets they pub lished announcements that went something like this: "Many per-sons have been under misapprehensions concerning the identity of the organ of the Friends of New Germany. The Deutsche Zeitung is the only official organ of this group, and we urge members and friends to buy no other."

But for Heiss the day of reckoning is at hand. In a cozy little corner of the May issue of Amerikas Deutsche Post, the ancient lowing announcement:

"WARNING AGAINST IM-"WARNING AGAINST IM-POSTERS: Various persons, in-cluding women, representing them-selves as representatives of the

The Nazis are pouting. Begin- Deutscher Bund, seek out German business concerns to solicit pur-chases of the "Deutsche Zeitung" (Organ of the League of Friends of New Germany).

"The Deutscher Bund," (Heiss must have rubbed his hands and given vent to a satisfied, 'Haw!' as he wrote this) "has absolutely nothing to do with this filthy business, and it asks German busine men, recognizing such persons, to turn them over to the police."

Bundesleiter Wuerz's name was signed to the announcement, but it smells like Heiss.

Heiss, as the leader of an Aryo-Christian Union was going to rule the world with that outfit some months ago. Apparently he must and returned again to his first love, race politics with the religious element merely a caudal appendage to wage in the faces of fanatics of the Pelley calibre.

Now, whether or not Heiss is go-ng to reap the golden harvest his anti-Semitic old soul craves, is a matter for time to decide. He has a fair chance of garnering a few dollars from members of the disgruntled Friends who have all but been asphyxiated by a couple of the stench bombs recently uncorked within the fold. Heiss is all ready for a skyrocketing of his revenues He has made arrangements for the sale of bulk quantities of his sheet (100 for \$2.50—otherwise retailed at a dime apiece) to all groups who think, or fail to think, in the Heissian manner.

For a thin dime, folks, you get ome nice pictures of St. Adolf, nice snapshots of the hakenkreu (swastika to the linguisticly lin ots of the hakenkreuz ited), and twelve pages of blood curdling stuff on the big, bad Jews. Step right up, folks. Just a thin

Maybe we shouldn't bring this up: but, doggonit, the way this fellow Heiss goes around exposing the secrets of the Jewish International Money Bund, we really should tattle a bit ourselves.

We'll do it this way. Those in-terested can go through the crim-inal files for about the year 1926 or '27 and look under the H's. You'll find nothing about Friedrich himself, but the stuff his shop at that time was printing. Hot Dog!!!

Off the Milk Wagon "The Milky Way" which the man presented at the Cort Theatre on Tuesday night is nearly as funny as the advance notices of the show promised. For a week this column has been unstinting with space devoted to preliminary comments about the piece by Lynn Root and Harry Clark and now having seen the play I wonder whether I was not a bit overcome

by the ballyhoo.

Hugh O'Connell as skillful a

comedian as Broadway can pro-duce, plays the title role of a milksomewhat of a sap, who through a series of utterly im situations becomes middleweight champion of the world. He is ably sided by Leo Donnelly, the conniving fight manager who foxy that he even out-foxes himself; Gladys George, as the mana-ger's very hard boiled lady friend who has the funniest lines in the play; William Foran, in a character part as a trainer, and Brian Donlevy, as the very good looking prize fighter. There are also six or seven huge Saint Bernard dogs.

Doesn't Stand Analysis If you delve too deeply into the mechanics of "The Milky Way" you must discover that it is pretty shallow stuff. The plot has some of the most impossible situations I've seen in weeks but the direction is intelligent and the dialogue is unusually bright. There are many hearty laughs in the lines and the cast does make the most of them. "The Milky Way" is a farce, a fantastic conglomeration of slap-stick comedy that will please you, if you are in the right frame of mind. It is at best lightweight entertainment.

To Be Irrevelant

The only course that re-mains is a well thought out and organized campaign of settlement relief to bridge the gap.
