THE open letter addressed to patriotic German Americans by Samuel Untermyer, president of the Non-Sectar-ian Anti-Nazi League To Champion Human Rights, is a dignified and impressive apdignified and impressive appeal to their Americanism and a fair warning not to permit themselves to be misled and misrepresented by Nazi agents and propagandists in various disguises.

The letter points out that the anti-German boycott in this country is not directed against German Americans and that the Hitler regime blindly refuses to realize that if there were not far more powerful factors engaged in this boycott than the Jews alone it would hardly have been as effective as it is. en as effective as it is.

The League of Friends of New Germany is the direct descendant of the American branch of the German National Socialist (Nazi) Workers' Party Several years ago Heinz Spanknoebel, Fritz Gissibl and other Germans began the regimentation of Ger-man voters in this country into man voters in this country int. Hiller's Nazi party. A number of the party members in this country work country wore the storm troopers' uniforms. No effort was made by them to conceal their purpose or their allegiance to Germany and the thick came into power they formed an association with Colonel Edwin Emerson's Friends of Germany which lasted but a of Germany, which lasted but a short time. About a year ago Hitler ordered the dishandment of the American branch of his party. Spanknoebel returned to Germany, after having enrolled Germany, after having enrolled the National Socialist members in the League of Friends of New Germany. Upon his return from Germany, Spanknoebel held here a national conclave of the leaders of the Friends of New Ger-many and presented his credentials from Berlin authorizing his leadership of the organization.

. When Spanknoebel was ex-posed and indicted, he fied this country and is now a fugitive from American justice. He was succeeded by Fritz Gissibl, who resigned as the head of the Friends of New Germany about two months ago, announcing that he was returning home to that he was returning nome to help rebuild the Third Reich. Gissibl left Reinhold Walter, a naturalized American citizen, in charge of the Friends of New Germany. Walter is aided by a group of other German leaders who had but recently applied for American citizenship. Gissibl is still in this country, unofficially fostering the develop-ment of the DAWA, the anti-Jewish boycott device sponsored by the Friends of New Germany "captured" group, the

Flood Again Sweeps City; Houses Ruined

Relief Rushed Victims: Six Jews Killed-Many Injured

JERUSALEM, May 15.—A heavy torrential rain again swept down on Tiberias today compli-cating the work of rescue and frightening the refugees who survived the cloudburst of yester-day. Not a single roof is left on the houses of Tiberias, while the flood waters have not receded, but are increasing.

The number of dead is given by the authorities at twenty-nine with the casualties mounting. A number are listed as missing and eighteen are among the injured, including six Jews.

Among Funds Aims The sum of \$1,011,330 was spent by the Joint Distribution Commite in connection with its program tee in connection with its programs of aid to German Jews during the period from April 1, 1933, to April Harry Karp's Memory 1, 1934, it was announced yesterday by I. Edwin Goldwasser, one of the Chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal of New York, which is now trying to raise \$1,200,000 in New York City for the relief and rehabilitation of German Jews and for the settlement of refugees in Palestine. The United Jewish Appeal represents the Joint Dis-tribution Committee and the

American Palestine Campaign.

The funds were used to aid Jews in Germany re-educate themselves for vocational occupations, to train thousands of Jewish vouths to ac quire proficiency in manual trades and agriculture, to advance credits or free loans, to establish, enlarge and support Jewish elementary schools for children, to help main-tain communal relief and welfare institutions, to facilitate the orderly emigration of German Jews to various countries, and to pro-vide relief funds to organizations and individuals caring for refu-gees outside of Germany.

The allocation for aid within Germany itself amounted to \$483,-Allocations for refugee ald in other lands amounted to a total of \$527,898, divided as follows: \$287,427 in France; \$76,429 in Holland; \$16,589 in Belgium; \$6,-089 in Austria; \$20,000 in Poland \$18,088 in Palestine; \$8,895 in Czecho-Slovakia; \$1,000 in Uru guay; \$13,679 for various organizations, institutions and individual emergency cases; and \$15,237 for non-functional and administration non-functional and administration expenses in connection with Ger-man emergency activities. In addition, there was an allot-ment of 400,000 francs (approxi-

mately \$25,000) to cover trans-portation of 300 refugees from France and Belgium to Palestine. The balance of \$57,500 was used for various purposes, including allotments to the Emergency Committee in Aid of Displaced German Scholars, Emergency Com-mittee in Aid of Displaced Foreign Physicians, American Friends Physicians, American F 71e ft 8 Service Committee and adminis-tration expenses of Office of League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

Benes Calms Fears of Jews On Nationalism

Promises Czechs Will Not Impose on Carpatho-Russians

PRAGUE, May 15.—Dr. Eduard
Benes, Czechoslovakian Foreign
Minister, today assured a Jewish
delegation from the Carpatho-Russian city of Uzhorod that his gov-ernment would not attempt to force Czechoslovakian nationalism on the Jews of that section.

"You are right in refusing become an instrument for Czechoslovakian nationalism," Dr. Bencs told the delegation. "That has been my policy and the policy of President Masaryk and has not been changed since 1920."

"I understand your aspirations and will assist you. Using you as an instrument for our nationalism would not be good for you or for us. We don't want it. I shall dy with interest the question of the Hebrew schools contained in your memorandum," Dr. Benes declared adding, "I can assure you of my assistance."

Jews, Wise Says At Springfield

Persecution Has Caused 10 Million to Return to Judaism

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence) SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 14. "I don't wonder Hitlerism attacks us, because it believes in war, intolerance, hatred and unwar, informatic, latter and the brotherliness," Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York told an audience of 500 Springfield residents. "Hitlerism is shrewd enough to understand that we Jews hate war, love tolerance, hate hate, and be-lieve in the virtue of love and brotherliness; therefore it singles us out as its natural enemies."

In the process of singling out the Jews as their natural enemies, the Nazis have solidified Jews throughthe world, the rabbi added "Hitler may have taken from us 600,000 German Jews, but he has given us 10,000,000 back. The Jews as a people have never learned to All Hitlerism makes us feel is that we are going on, on, on."

Dr. Wise praised the Catholic and Protestant church leaders for their position against the govern-ment, and damned the Nazis not only for their political attitudes. but for cowardice. "Let me make it a matter of record that I offer my homage to the stand taken by the Cardinal of Munich against Hitlerism."

Friend Encouraged

Liquidating a bourgeois is in itself an unheroic task, since the seir an unnervoic tass, since the bourgeois is a very weak person and is already ipso facto liqui-dated when he loses his property. We have seen in the past five years how millions of bourgeois years how millions of bourgeois, were liquidated without a revolution and how they went back, of their own accord, to proletarian rank. Certainly, the bourgeois is not like the feudal lord who is nobility-conscious even though without land, or like the clergyman who is mission-conscibutional without church or congrelating the control of the control

"Ideology" Dangerous

But it is different with the ideology of the bourgeois, or his moral ology of the bourgous, or his mora and, in the eyes of the Commun-ints, immoral outlook upon law and order and proprieties, which is fed upon the consciousness of his whole class. Here he is strong and potentially dangerous.

Therefore, not the bourgeois as an individual must be liquidated but the bourgeoisie "as a class." An inferiority complex must be ininduced through degradation of status, until, far from deriving comfort and strength from one's own class, one will shrink from it as a source of misfortune. And this degradation of status must extend to children as well, for thus only could parents be made to suffer more acutely and their pride and morale quickly broken.

But by the same token, as the leasure inimical to the Revomeasure lution class was deemed liquidated, the shackles from the individual of that class were lifted, beginning with the removal of disabilities with the removal of disabilities against the children. At first a child of a "lishenets" was not to pass beyond the fourth primary grade, but by that time the liqui-dated bourgeois was deemed to have lost so much of his class con-sciousness that his children were permitted to proceed as far as the seventh grade. Here the children were offered an oportunity to re-deem themselves by dint of their own allegiance to Communist doctrine, by joining the Pioneer and the Young Communist (Komsomol) groups. Another three years of suffering and discrimination, and the parents themselves were deemd sufficiently at peace with the new order to be given a new lease of life under it.

This, in broad outline, is the gru-eling process which the "lishentsi" have had to go through between the years 1921 and 1933, my friend being only one of them, and in no sense an exception. (To be continued tomorrow)

Teachers Great Sufferers in **Nazi Despotism**

Israelit Worried Over Situation; Many Reported Starving

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, May 3.—Among the worst sufferers in the present cataclysm in Germany are the Jewish communal and private teachers. Since the advent of Hitler they are being more and more displaced from their positions not so much by any instigations against them by the Nazis but by the ac-tions of the German . ews them-selves. This situation is deplored by the Israelit, of Frankfurt, be-cause at this moment the function of the teacher of Jewish religious tradition and Hebrew, should be more important than ever for the keeping up of the Jewish spirit.

Thousands of Jewish teachers in Germany today find themselves without means of subsistence, and many are in desperate circum-stances. The reasons given for their plight is a tendency on the part of many Jewish families in smaller German communities to dispense with the usual religious instruction for their children.

Because of their consciousness of being unwelcome in the coun-try on account of the Nazi anti-Jewish attitude, these families are sacrificing their Judaism in an effort to attract as little attention as possible by their Jewishness among "Aryan" neighbors. This is particularly true of those Jews who even before the advent of Na-zism gravitated toward assimila-tion. In other cases, the reasons are chiefly financial.

Tealthy Country Attractive, Writer Avers in The Standard

South-West Africa, former German colony, and now under the mandate of the Union of South Africa, was advocated as a haven for "the millions of declassee Christians in Germany, for those who have inherited a minimum share of Jewish blood in their yeins and are being therefore humiliated ichael S. Sawmellee in the May sue of The Standard, in an article entitled "'Poetic Justice' for German Refugees."

The Standard is issued by the American Ethical Union "to promote ethical thinking and to en-courage better ways of living." The author of the article is a former trustee of the Boston Ethical Society and members of the Vocational Board of Boston University. During his forty years in this country he has been Swedish Commissioner for a number of in-Commissioner for a manufacture ternational expositions. The magazine introduces the article valuable idea towards meeting the needs of the partly-Jewish refu-gees from Germany."

"Among these millions of perse-cuted Germans," Sawmelle writes "there are over 800,000 young men and women between the ages of 20 and 35 years who have no fu-ture in their native country. Where can they go? The depression and unemployment at home prevent other nations from absorbing them. Are the fever infested jun-gles of South America or Africa or the narrow confines of Palestine their only opportunities? "South-West Africa is a country

with only 200,000 inhabitants yet fearly as large as Germany and France together. It was always considered the healthlest of the German colonies and the one best adapted for white settlers. After the World War it was placed under a British Union of South Africa andate, and it is unlikely ever to be returned to Germany; it is too close to Union soil. And the Eng-lish might well feel that there was "poetic justice" in colonising it with expatriates of the Fatherland. South-West Africa would make staunch citizens of these exiles. And the British and United States governments could well afford to extend to them credit similar to that given to the Chinese government by the United States not long ago. Also there are in the world at least 70 million persons of partly Jewish ancestry or close repartly Jewish ancestry or close re-lationship through intermarriage.

If these were appealed to by an appropriate organization, would not many of them come to the financial aid of their unfortunate brethren in Germany?

The world's shipping has been hard hit by the depression; innumerable idle ships could be used advantageously for the transportation of large but carefully selected groups of refugees who are suit-able to become pioneers. Our own economic situation would certainly be helped by the sending of a surplus of our products where it can-not interfere with regular trade opportunities. It would help stimulate general business recovery.
"The refugees belong to every

sort of vocation—they would con stitute a genuine community and they have been accustomed to a high standard of living. They mgin statuard of living. They would need machinery, tools, food products, material for housing, clothing, etc., and they would by degrees call for many other things besides the bare necessities. It does not matter whether the individual is friendly to Ger-many or whether he has any understanding of Germany's interest. The said Yankelevitch of Buenos Aires, for example, is an East European Jew who is only interested in bettering his use of his business. In order to prove to such people that it is to their business advantage, German merchants abroad must be induced to use such radio stations for their ad-vertising."

Raymond Brown, concert director of the Milwaukee Philharmonic Orchestra, also has protested. The executive committee of the

League Against War and Fascism in a communication to Dr. Baker expressed its alarm at learning that the college, "a government supported institution, contemplates sending a fifty-two piece band on an extended trip through Germany. This tour, sponsored by the Ham-burg-German Lloyd Lines, direct agents of Hitler's Fascist government, is clearly designed to pro-pagandize for a favorable impres-sion of the Nazi regime."

"We hold this to involve direct fraternization with Fascism and urge immediate measures to can-cel the contemplated tour," the league added.

Dr. Baker refused to heed ap-peals, denying the tour was subsidized, though the students will pay but \$100, it was reported, for a tour normally costing \$563. Dr. Baker declared the remaining cost is to be made up by concerts the students are to give in Germany. The trip is to be made this summer. More agitation against it is expected in the next few weeks.

No Room for Profiteers

Mrs. Samuel W. Halprin, president of the Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, in the course of an address on her recent impressions of Palestine, pointed out the dan-ger of the tendency toward speculation among some of the newcomers in Palestine.

"In previous years came with the sole idea of building a new Jewish life in a Jewcame welded together by a single aim of bringing the Jewish people back to the soil, to create a normal, healthy, productive people. Too many of those now entering Palestine have the individualist viewpoint. . . . Every Jew must come as a builder for . Every his people, to rebuild the whole the national life for Jewry.
One of the chief evils of individualism is speculation, and concentration of the population in the cities fosters this ten-dency."

Eight years ago, after my first visit to Palestine, I saw the be-ginning of such unfortunate tendencies, and I called attention to the fact that the Jews cannot afford to have profiteers in the land of their Prophets.

Crippled by the abnormalities of life in other lands, where Jew-hatred has developed into a cruel sport, or into a policy of vengeance which makes the Jews the scapegoats or the lightning-rods; robbed of their consciousness and self-respect as Jews, a few of the newcomers have brought along to Palestine the unsound ways and methods which the Galuth had forced upon them. Fortunately, their number is comparatively small. But small as it is, it is too large for Palestine.

Palestine is small, but it is full of great opportunities for honest toil and for honorable enterprise.

Palestine, where the Jews of old lived the Bible, where they established for mankind the foundations of justice, of morality, of humanitarian has served as the reservoir that gave the Jewish people strength, vitality, endurance and hope to withstand persecutions and martyrdom throughout the ages.

And most of the Jews who are now returning to the ancient are now returning to the ancient homeland are bringing with them new energy, new idealism, new experiences which they have ac-quired throughout the world, where they have learned from sufferings and persecution how to love and value freedom, independence and peace, where they mastered the art of adapting themselves, of surmounting difficulties, of making themselves useful. There is room for large Jewish immigration b there is no room for speculators and profiteers in Palestine. If this menace is growing there, drastic measures should be adopted by the Jewish leader-ship in Palestine to check it without delay.

Handcuffs on his wrists were removed at once and Achimeter stepped from

the prisoners' dock a free man. The court, however, denied similar motion by Samuel as to the other two defendants and ordered

While Stavsky and Rosenblatt were accused of premeditated mur-der, Achimeier was accused of "having counselled and procured the murder of Dr. Arlosoroff,"

History of the Case Arlosoroff, brilliant young Zionist leader, was shot and killed on the Tel Aviv seashore on June 16, 1933. Within a few days after the murder the three Revisionists were in the custody of police, accused of the murder. After a long-drawn-out preliminary hearing before Magistrate Ralph Bodilly, the three men were committed to stand trial for murder. The charges against Achimeier seemed to rest primarily upon speeches he deliv-ered in Haifa and Jerusalem, an article in Hazit Haam Revisionist newspaper, and entries in his diary, in all of which he was alleged to have called for terror against political opponents.

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

Bigotry Grows Rabbi Declares

Traces Definite Correlation Between Economics and Race Hate

The relation between economic maladjustment and race hatred was described by Rabbi Israel Goldstein of Congregation B'nal Goldstein of Congregation B'nal Jeshurun yesterday afternoon at the ninth of a series of fourteen world peace meetings being conducted by the World Fellowship of Faiths at the Hotel New Yorker.

"Those who ascribe racial conflicts to the limitations of human nature," declared Dr. Goldstein, "and do not seek the fundamental causes are either blinding them-selves or blinding the public. "In America the Negro prob-

lem of the yellow races and the problem of anti-Semitism are aggravated and rendered more acute by an economic system which is competitive and exploitative. "The resurgence of anti-Semi

tism in this country coincides with the low curve of the economic cycle, In 1921 the Ku Klux Klan was at its zenith. Now the Silver Shirts are gaining prominence. The competition which the Jew offers in busines and in the profesions is in no small measure responsible for anti-Jewish sentiment. If our economic status should get much worse, anti-Semitism may take formidable proportions."

Four Hebrew Teachers End B'klyn Strike

Yeshivah Instructors Arbitrate Differences With Directors

The strike of the four teachers t the Torah M'Zion Yeshivah, 623 Stone avenue, Brooklyn, which was called May 5, has been settled amicably and the teachers have been in the classrooms since Sunday, it was announced vesterday by the teachers.

Following several abortive at-tempts to arbitrate the difference tempts to arbitrate the difference between the Hebrew teachers and the board of directors and parents of pupils at the Yeshivah, a final settlement has been made, the teachers announced. The chief obstacle, arising from a demand on the part of the teachers that they be represented by the Central be represented by the Central Committee of the Hebrow Teach-ers' Union, was burdled when the Union agreed that its representa-tives be left out of the deliberas tions.

The four Hebrew teachers returned to their duties after all their other demands had been agreed upon. The Yeshivah is now run on a cooperative basis, it is announced, with the teachers and the principal in charge of financial matters. Tuition fees and box collection will go to the teachers, accommittee appointed by Abraham Solowitz, president of the Yeshi-vah, will look over the accounts of the school and pay up all back salary due the teachers.

In the event of a misunderstand-ing regarding educational matters in the school, the question will be arbitrated by an equal representation of teachers and directors, the agreement stipulates. Objection to this clause was one of the orig-inal reasons for the strike.

Added Subsidy Author's Lecture Packs

Approximately \$19,000 Is Placed in Jewish Aid Fund for Year

Polish government has The Polish government has granted a subsidy of 100,000 zlotys (approximately \$19,000) for the current year to the Jewish free loan societies in that country subventioned by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the United Jewish Appeal announced yesterday.

This subsidy is an increase of 25,000 zlotys over the Polish gov-ernment's 1932 grant to the 660 societies.

Jewish free loan work in Po-land was begun by the Joint Distribution Committee in 1926. Since its inception the committee has supplied the societies with \$1,100,-000. Contributions from Jews in Poland have added \$900,000. Loans issued by the societies amount to about \$2,000,000 a year to from 100,000 to 150,000 people. Over a period of eight years loans have been given to 1,200,000 persons, totalling about \$13,500,000 in re-volving credits.

Of the money furnished by the Joint Distribution Committee, \$325,000 has been repaid by the societies, and reapplied by the American organization toward their further development

NoApostacyAmongUSSR Jews: Intermarriage Rare, Writer Says

Incentives Found Forcing Many German Jews to Intermarry Are Missing in Soviet; Holds Race 'Obliteration' False

The following is the fifth of a series of soven articles on "Un-der the Hammer and Sickle," a reappraisal of the Jewish posi-tion in the Soviet Union. The series is running daily in the Jewish Daily Bulletin

The fear that, without religious and social injunctions to condemn it, Jews would practice intermar-

David Goldberz logical urge to mate with one outside his group. If that were generally true, then such neighbors, for example, as the French and the Spanish and the Italian peoples had been throughout their histories should have by now been merged into one people. They are all Gentiles, of the same religion, and even of kindred racial origin. Often en-ough, too, they had been under one political rule. However, we know them to the present day to be peoples distinct and apart from

The fact is, not only is there no such natural tendency to marry away from the group, but there is, on the contrary, a natural urge to cleave to one's own. On the low-est rung of the ladder human beings were even practicing incest at the behest of that natural urge, until it became necessary to prountil it became necessary to pro-hibit the practice religiously, that is, it became necessary to legis-late intermarriage between fami-lies of the same tribe. It took the twelve tribes of Israel some three hundred years to form the nation of Israel, so difficult was it for them to overcome the natural tendency to keep within the tribe and shun intermarriage even with their brother tribes.

Inhibitions Remain

Civilization has polished down a great deal the tribal instinct against intermarriage, but it created other considerations to insure the preservation of the group. The historic consciousness, the heritage, the common language and the community of custom—these the community of custom—these afford powerful inhibitions against intermarriage. Let the physical existence of the group be assured, and there is no doubt that the mating instinct will travel via the shortest and least resisting route towards one's own.

How, then, about those German How, then, about those German Jews who, according to popular indictment, "had bartered their souls for the price of civic eman-cipation" and intermarried Gentiles the score?

The indictment, to begin with, is a terrible exaggeration. Lion Feuchtwanger lists more than 60 percent. of the half million German Jews of today as antedating the Napoleonic era. The rush, therefore, for Gentile brides and theretore, for centule bruses and grounds of the part of the enan-cipated German Jews couldn't have been so great. But it is true that an inordinately large number and the part of the p

of the German-Jewish aristocracy did intermarry, precisely because they were of the aristocracy, that is, men and women who, like the aristocracy everywhere and at all times, have lost contact with the people, with the masses. They were bidding for social equality for which the Napoleonic emancipation had made no provision. They were the exception, and not the rule Aristocracy Absent

But the emancipation of the Russian has provided for social equality as well. There is no fickle Jewish aristocracy in their midst. Nor is there the slightest external conside ation or incentive for intermarriage, excepting the incen tive of love, which is personal and exceptional, hence cannot threaten the existence of the group.

There might have been a spasm of intermarriage at the beginning of the Revolution, but no one will notice the effect of it in the Jewish community at this time. took the geneological record of several groups of Jewish families in Moscow and Leningrad whom I learned to know intimately. They have a long revolutionary pedigree and have never known religious or racial scruple about intermarriage. That is, they were just the kind of people who you would believe to be hopelessly

would believe to be nopclessly mated with Gentiles.

There were just two Gentile brides in the first group of seven families, and one Gentile groom in the second group of four. Needless to say, the Gentiles adjusted the present to the Levich groups. themselves to the Jewish groups, and not the groups to them. No doubt, in the capitals, there are count, in the capitals, there are cases where a solitary Jew marry-ing into a populous Gentile family group identifies himself with them, and not with his own. But on the whole, * doubt whether intermardoubt whether intermarriage in Russia has reached the proportion it has reached in the United States, and I doubt that it will ever reach it. There is no apostacy in Russia, there is no bid for Gentile front, there is not a single incentive for intermar-riage there; but there is the pow-erful group instinct for self-pre-servation against it.

Jews Not Intermarrying So, the picture of Jews being scattered in small groups over a wide land full of Gentiles and ready to obliterate themselves rethrough intermarriage may be dismissed as grotesquely false. The former Pale is now a mother-land to them, and they live there in great bulk, and their livelihood is being provided for by the new industries created on the premindustries created on the premises, in accordance with the avowed economic policy of the Soviets which calls for the decentralization of industry.

There remains the fear that, though surviving as a group, the Jews will in the course of time take on a totally new orientation under the Communist system. Also, that they will be so different from what Jews had been in the past, what they will continue to be in the other countries of the Diasin the other countries of the Dias-pora that, for all historical pur-poses, they will write themselves off the record of the Jew, some-thing which, on different grounds though, has happened with the Karattes. The ground for such fear will be gone over in the next fear will be gone over in the next

Dr. Stutzin was born in Lithuania and was brought to Germany when he was six years of age. He is a graduate of a German medical school. After the War he became the director of the Kaiser-in Augusta Victoria hospital in

Ordered by the government to the hospital within five days, Dr. Stutzin went on a lecture tour speaking at the universities of Madrid, Paris and Cape Town.

Dr. Stutzin is the inventor of the cinemascopy method of observ-ing the internal organs of the human body and of a method of ob-viating sterility. He is a member of a number of scientific academies and of universities in Argentina Brazil, Chile, Czechoslovakia, Spain, the United States, France y and Mexico. He was also at time invited by the League of Nations to demonstrate his in-

For a short time during his youth Dr. Stutzin was imbued with the Zionist ideal and wrote a num-ber of articles for Die Welt, Later ber of articles for Die Weit, Eater, however, he became convinced that assimilation was the only thing to work for, and it was not until recently that he again became ac-tive in Jewish life. He is a mem-ber of the committee of German Jews who are working for the re-lief of German-Jewish refugees, and is active in Zionist circles.

During the war Dr. Stutzin was instrumental in saving the lives of sixteen Jews whom the Turkish military court had condemned to military death on the false testimony of a



The Bulletin's Day Book

We have just come upon an in-teresting little booklet, "World Judgment on Hate for Jews." It is published in German by Michael Kacha in Prague and contains the views of some of the famous characters of history with regard to the Jewish question. It is principally composed of comment from many current sources of intellectual achievement.

Nanoleon Bonaparte had this to Napoleon Bonaparte had this to say in a letter to the Chief Rabbi of Dusseldorf in 1808: "All men are brothers before God, which has always been their (the Jews') religious belief. I am not happy over this, that Jewish communities exist within my people, since through their ethnical peculiarities they form a foreign body within a united popular group of within a united popular group of the nation. I am not happy that they retain their ethnical pecu-liarities and avoid assimilation. But I cannot subscribe to their persecution because of their race and religion."

Nietzsche, who has written much of the Jews, at various times attacked and defended them. His theory may be summed up best in these quotations: "For what does Europe thank the Jews?—For many things, good and bad, and before all things for one which is at the same time the best and worst: the greatest conception of morality, the fruitfulness and majmoratty, the truttuness and maj-esty of unending progress, infinite significance, the entire romanti-cism and exaltation of question-able moral practices—and because of this, the most attractive, the most insidious, and the most sought out part of any color, play and seduction of life, which today glows in the heavens of our European culture like an afterglowperhaps waning. We artists, as spectators and philosophers, are therefore thankful to the Jews." This Gertrude Steinian soliloguy marks many of Nietzsche's writ-ings on the Jews. He gives them credit and discredit profusely. Nietzsche during his later years was one writer who received substantial payment for every word that came from his pen.

Jewish question is well known. Unlike Hitler and so many other dictators of the past and present, Lenin gained power while betterdictators of the past and present, Lenin gained power while better-ing the lot of persecuted Jews, while others have made anti-Jew-ish progroms one of their principal planks in bidding for national

He once wrote: "Enmity against the Jews is endured only where landowners and capitalists through selfishness hold the workers and farmers in the deepest ignorance.

Only thoroughly oppressed and
entirely ignorant people can believe the lies and propaganda against the Jews."

Heinrich Mann, at present per-sona non grata with the Hitler government, says of anti-Semit-ism: "Hate for the Jews is an ancient, unchecked propaganda ancient, unenecked propaganda forced upon the people. It has absolutely nothing to it. This propaganda was spread through-out the provinces earlier than in Berlin. National Socialism is a revolution by a small proscribed part of the people against those who have been better civilized. No leading National Socialist comes from Berlin."

Theodore Hartwig, former chairman of the International Prole-tarian Freethinkers, cannily re-marks, "We are beginning to see clearly the economic background anti-Semitic movement. The Jews for the past century have been crowding certain economic positions, having been for-bidden by the laws and traditions of the middle ages to enter most of the trades and professions. The casting out of Jewish elements from certain offices extends right up to the present era. The so-called equal rights of citizens is a fact only on paper.

Jean Marestan, a French writer Jean Marestan, a French writer of Marseilles, says that "The source of anti-Semitism lies in the variety of religious conceptions. The Christians cannot forgive the Jews, who have judged and con-demned their Messiah as a fraud. On the other hand, there lies be-tween the psychology of the Jews and 'Aryans' a great difference.'

British films are being brought to this country in increasing quan-tities this season and some of them have made our Hollywood producers a trifle jealous. Such pictures as "The Private Life of Henry VIII" and "Catherine the Great" have not added to the good will between the two nations. These pictures were much too successful for comfort. The latest importation, made by Gaumont-British and called "Friday the 13th" will help smooth things over, however. It is a botchy job.

Big Ben and the Bus

Keaton, who started his stage career as an acrobat in vaudeville, a race that never says more than "alley oup," offers a solution to the problem. He suggests that in making comedies di-rectors should cut the dialogue down to a minimum.
