EDITORIAL NOTES HERMAN BERNSTEIN

Vindicated

THE liberation of Aba Achimeier, Zionist Revisionist leader, on the ground that the evidence against him was insufficient, is hailed by Jews in Palestine and other On the basis of the flimsiest circumstantial evidence, Achimeier was kept in jail for about eleven months, charged with having inspired the assassination of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, For eleven months, during the preliminary investigations, which were conducted in the strangest manner, it was attempted to turn the murder of the eminent and popular labor leader, Arlosoroff, into a political assassination, into an act of terrorism sanctioned by the Revisionists for political purposes.

Writing of the Arlosoroff trial on April 26, I said in part as "Whether the accused Revi-

sionists are guilty of the das-tardly crime or not, there is no doubt that leaders of the Revisionist organization have had no sand in it, and could not have sanctioned it. The character of the leaders is well known to the Jewish world. Among these leaders are men who have devoted themselves as sincerely and unselfishly in behalf of the restoration and rehabilitation of Eretz Israel as any other of the outstanding Zionist leaders. They differ in their ideology of the restoration of Palestine, but terrorism cannot be part of any Jewish program in Palestine or elsewhere. Terrorism is the one thing that would defeat Jewish aspirations in Palestine."

Now, after all the evidence against Achimeler has been pre-sented, his handcuffs were removed and he was permitted to leave the court room, a free man. The court denied the mo-tion of the counsel for defense, Horace Samuel, to free also the other two defendants, Abraham Stavsky and Zwi Rosenblatt, before the opening of the case for the defense. Stavsky and Ros-enblatt are accused of premedi-tated murder, while Achimeier was charged with "having counselled and procured the murder of Arlosoroff,"

Judging from the course of the trial, despite the more than eculiar methods employed durng the prominary investiga-tion, the case against Stavsky and Rosenblatt will also collapse. At any rate, the political issue that was created in connection with the crime has already been discredited by the freeing of hchimeler.

The mysterious murder of Dr. aim Arlosoroff remains thus as enigmatic as before. But is now clear beyond a shadow doubt that the Revisionist lers have had no hand in the (Continued on Page Five)

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) ANTWERP, May 17.—Belgian authorities have arrested a number of German Jewish refugees who have accepted employment or have engaged in trading, the Bel-gian committee for the refugees reported today. Arrests of the refugees, most of whom are Polish subjects or Staatenlose, with-out citizenship rights anywhere are increasing daily, the commit-tee stated, adding that the refugees are being deported at once.

JERUSALEM, May 17.—Aba
Achimeler, Zionist Revisionist, who
was yesterday acquitted of complicity in the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, and freed by the order of the court, was promptly re-arrested again, it was learned to-

Achimeier is detained without bail on the charge that he is a leader of the Brith Habiryonim, secret revolutionary terrorist Reorganization. visionist. Attorney Horace Samuel, who is defending him, argued that Achimeier should be released on bail, since others held on the same charge had been released on bail of \$125. It is thought that his argument may not prove successful as the police are determined to detain him

The Brith Habiryonim members were arrested as the result of a wide roundup in Palestine on July 26, 1933. Some thirty were ar-rested and later released on bail.

'Friends' Aim To Boycott U.S. Jewry

700 Police at Garden Guard Against Disturbances

The DAWA (German American Protective Alliance) meeting in Madison Square Garden for the purpose of declaring a boycott against American Jewry, last night unleashed one of the strongest anti-Jewish attacks ever tolerated in this country.

The meeting, marked with a

definite Hitlerite stamp which could not be disguised behind a maze of American flags and bunting, was attended by 23,000 persons who crowded all available, space in the auditorium. Thousands more could not gain admision to the packed hall.

Police guards were enhanced by what spokesmen for the Friends of New Germany estimated to be 600 "ushers." The "ushers," drawn from the legion of uniformed "ord-nungsdienst" or storm troop department of the League of Friends of New Germany, are patterned in an almost identical manner with an almost identical manner with the Schutzstaffel or higher grade storm troops of Germany. They too served as "ushers" during Hitler's kampf for power. The uni-forms of the American storm troops, with a few non-essential changes, are the same as those of the German storm troopers.

Now Jack is out of work and
Hyman is a dishwasher in a restaurant. His parents own an
orange grove in Patestine. Formerly they were grocers in Chicago but the crash in 1929 swept away their business. With the little money they had left the Shapiros money they had left the Shapiros migrated to the Holy Land and invested in this new project. The grove is still in an embryo stage—non-paying, Hyman explained. The idea occurred to both him and his pal, Jack, that fishing in their vessel off the shores of Tel-a-Viv might supplement the family's in-

Although both boys have had but little experience on the sea, Hyman's being confined only to his contact with herrings in his facontact with herrings in his ta-ther's store and Jack's to a three-year term as sailor on the Goodrich Lines, they have un-bounded confidence in their ven-ture. Hyman cited the experience of Marin Marie, the young Frenchman who a year ago succeeded in sailing his tiny sloop, "The Win-nebelle," all the way from France to America, without aid. "If he could do it, so can we," asserted

Their good ship, the Aviva (Spring), which flies both the American and Jewish flags, is a'rarin' to go, declares her youthful skipper. Her single cabin, six by seven feet long, containing two by seven feet long, containing two berths, a table, benches, a chest and book-racks, is spotless and sung. So is the tiny galley, all of two by three, with its shining oil stove and shelves. All that is needed now, says Hyman wistfully, is a new Diesel motor, some hydrographic and pilot charts, a sextant, a protractor, signal flags, rockets

Deutsch Defends **Iews' Patriotism**

Denies Charge They Have No Concept of Nationalism at Peace Session

Bernard S. Deutsch was the presiding officer and principal speak-er yesterday afternoon at the tenth of a series of fourteen world peace meetings being conducted by the World Fellowship of Faiths at the Hotel New Yorker. The topic for the day was "National-ism and Internationalism."

"Since this conference is under the auspices of the World Fellowship of Faiths, it might be well to mention the charge frequently directed at Jews that they have no conception of the meaning of nationalism. The charge is unfounded, and again requires an un-

derstanding of the background of a people," Mr. Deutsch declared. Rabbi Morton M. Berman of the Free Synagogue pointed out that the recent eruptions of hatred and violence within certain states should convince us we can not hope for international understanding and cooperation until those states have made it possible for their own diverse minorities to

live at peace with each other.

Weigh Passport Problem

Delegates from twelve countries he said, gathered to receive the report of High Commissioner James McDonald on his observations in the various countries harboring refugees as well as in Germany

The committee also discussed problems relating to passports for refugees and to the status of state-less exiles, Mr. Fosdick explained. "I came away from the meeting feeling a number of problems have been ironed out," he added, Discussion took place in some detail on the question of colonies

for the refugees, the delegate said. "Our meeting spent much time on Palestine," said Mr. Fosdick, "but so many factors are involved

GoebbelsPaper Renews Attack On Reich Jews

Calls Man 'Scoundrel' but Ignores Fact Nazis Slew His Son

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
PRAGUE, May 17,—Der Angriff, leading Nazi paper edited by
Minister of Propaganda and Pub-lic Enlightenment Paul Joseph Goebbels, is continuing its attacks on the Jews. Under a heading, "What Jews Permit Themselves," Der Angriff printed an article relating the wounding of an S.S. man, member of the black uniformed picked Hitler guards, during the anti-Jewish boycott day, April 1, 1933.

According to Der Angriff, the wounded man, Wilhelm Asthalter, demanded damages from the Jewish furniture dealer, Herr Schumm. Asthalter was on duty in front of Schumm's store and in rone or Schumm's store and
"was suddeny shot in the back by
Schumm's son, hovering for
months between life and death."
Asthalter, Der Angriff declared,
never recovered fully and Schumm
refused for new resemble dem. refused to pay reasonable damages.

During the regotiations Schumm, according to the Nazi paper, "haggled instead of pay-ing and atoning for the scoundrel-ism of his son" ism of his son.

Der Angriff neglected to mention, however, that Schumm was an officer in the German army during the World War and that his son was killed by the Nazis on anti-Jewish boycott day while de-fending his father's shop.

'Ritual Murder' Paper

Is Reissued

Jews Under the Hammer and Sickle

Jews Remain Jews in Russia Despite Inroads of Sovietism

Synagogues Have Lost Ground as Houses of Worship, but Show Signs of Renascence as Meeting Places

The following is the sixth of a series of seven articles on "Un der the Hammer and Sickle," a reappraisal of the Jewish posi-tion in the Soviet Union. The series is running daily in the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

The fear that Russian Jewry even if it should physically surwive the attritions of the dictator-





"Picture a peasant in 'svitka' husbanding the soil, or a worker in overalls manipulating his tools No phylactery ever touched his forehead and no prayer ever passed his lips. He reveres no literature as sacred and respects none of the national holidays of his people. Supposing that such a man does retain distinctiveness of type; but what will identify him as Jew? Aren't the Karaites a living illustration and a warning of what may be in store for a body of Jews who cut themselves away from the main stream of Jewish history?"

The reply is that the fate of the Karaites is no criterion for the Russian Jew, because their cases are totally different. The Karaites who were only a handful of peo-ple, relatively speaking, introduced ple, relatively speaking, introduced doctrinal schism into Jewish life and deliberately withdrew from the main body, thereby a priori sealing their doom. They couldn't survive, for if they intermarted with the main body from which they severed themselves, they died of seeinfulcion and if they did not of assimilation, and if they did not intermarry, they died from inbreeding.

Russian Jews Self-Sustaining

Russian Jews, on the other hand, even if they had deliberately withdrawn from world Jewry, are three million strong, somewhat of a "main body" themselves, and are biologically self-sustaining. But they did not at all "withdraw" from world Jewry, nor did they from world Jewry, nor did they separate from it on religious or doctrinal grounds. They were caught, instead, in a maelstrom of social-political change, the full effects of which upon the rest of humanity are still hidden in the

bosom of time.

The fact should not be over-looked that the Jewries outside the Soviet Union are themselves without guarantee of immunity against the very social-economic changes upon which extinction of the Russian Jews is predicted.

Three million Polish Jews are being proletarianized before our very eyes, and even more violently dislodged are the half million German Jews and the quarter milhan Jews and the quarter min-lion Austrian Hungarian Jews. And there is the ominous hand-writing on the wall for the Jews of Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Ru-mania and other countries of the

letarianize, they have no proletarian state in which they could in-tegrate. If, then, we should pry into the mental and ideological process of these millions of Jews who are kicked down the hill into a veritable precipice, what are we expected to find there?

The likelihood is that the mental and ideological processes of the millions of Jews who are read out of existence in the Fascist coun-tries will be more certain to run into the channels of their Russian prototypes than away from them. Those who take the short view of Jewish history imagine that sheer discarding of phylacteries and the dietary laws and similar observ-ances and rituals is enough to drive a nermanent wedge between Jews and Jews. Those, however, who take the long view of Jew-ish history could discern greater historical forces in operation which keep Jews together despite dif-ferences of observance and ritual. Predictions Wrong

So, then, as did the prediction that the Russian Jews would precipitously abandon their Pale, break up in small units and dis-solve, so did the prediction that would hasten to shed their historical skin simply prove a wrong guess. Far from running away from themselves, Russian Jews have taken very definite steps to insure their historical identity.

Thus, for example, Jewish set-tlers on land moved in solid homogeneous groups to kolkhozi of their own, and even formed special autonomous districts (Rayoni). Moreover, they sought and ob-tained recognition for Yiddish as tained recognition for Yiddish as their national tongue, so that where Jews form the majority, Yiddish is the official language of the school and the court. Also, the school and the court. Also, there is a Yiddish State Art Theatre and a Yiddish press; and earnest efforts are on foot to develop a proletarian Yiddish literature. Regardless of how one thinks of the intrinsic mining and the court of the court of the state of th the intrinsic values behind the autonomous districts and the national tongue and the proletar Jewish literature, it is impossible to undervalue their motive. Their motive is: the will of the group

to survive as such. But there are other tokens, besides Yiddish with its great liter-ature and the several hundred years of Jewish culture it epito-mizes, whereby we could judge that the Russian Jews aren't so eager to break away from their past as it is imagined in some quarters. Jewish families in Russia aren't torn asunder, and around the table there sit in peace the parents who were brought up by the synagogue and the children by the synagogue and the enildren who were brought up in the communist cadres. Who knows the subtle art of passing the word better than the Jew? For thousands of years he lived by a Torah that was not even written down, but was transmitted from worth the youth When passets. mouth to mouth. Aba Achimeier, Zion's Fearless Fighter

Man Freed of Murder Charge Pictured as Beyond Reproach

Dr. Von Weisl Describes His Selfless Devotion for Jewish State-Youth Looks to Him as Leader

(Reprinted from vesterday's late edition: (The writer of the following article is an important figure in article is an important figure in European and Palestinian jour-nalism, having represented some of the important German-lan-guage newspapers in Palestine. Aba Achimeier, doctor of philo-sophy, married, father of a little girl who is being brought up by a reletive in the far-away Kuntzo Dagania, is the type of the Jewish "hero," an entirely new cast of Jew, of which the world today does not yet know, of whom it has little conception, yet who is everywhere among us-no longer by the dozen, but by the hundreds. These are the people which we meet in all the party camps; many, all too many, among the Jewish Commu-nists—many among the left Zionists—but many in the very circle which Achimeier heads: the "Revisionist extremists

Life for people like Achimeier is not worth living, if they cannot live in freedom. But for freedom they will make any sacrifice themselves, as well as others

I believe Trotzky also is one of "heroes" and — to name a non-Jew—Gandhi is also a hero in sense. And among the Zion ists there are many Socialists who cannot live in the communistic cooperatives of Pelestine and who today hate and curse Achimeler as their deadly enemy and who are "heroes" in this sense—ready for death or for life.

But the new element which Achimeier brought into the Jewish world, following the example of Jabotinsky's legion is this: Achimeier created the Jewish hero who is a patriot-who inexorably, soberly, incorruptibly brings and demands sacrifices for the freedom of the Jewish fatherland, for the Jewish state. Jabotinsky created the "Jewish State-ist": Achimeler, the patriot

Achimeler Is Fired

In the summer of 1930 I was commissioned by Jabotinsky to take over the management of the Revisionist daily Doar Hayom. The revisionist daily Doar Hayom. The paper belonged to a private print-ing firm, was an undertaking planned to yield a profit, and it was my task to reorganize it under a budget suddenly cut by one of owners by thirty-five per cent, just after the Doar Hayom had been forbidden for a few weeks because of an Achimeier article which attacked England. At that time I fired a number of editors among them Achimeier whom I All the discharged editors took this very much amiss, became my enemies and have re-mained such to this very day. Achimeicr shrugged his shoulders: Dr. Von Weisl means well, but he doesn't know me, he told my friends. Three months later we both joined the Central Committee of the Palestine Revisionists.

What, I asked myself, grown weary by bitter experiences—Is that possible? A Jew deprived of

How He Looked

I looked at the man: slim, too slim, with black ringlets which hang dishevelled over his high, hang dishevelled over his high, pale forehead, in which are set a pair of burning, dreaming eyes. Narrow hands which always hold a notebook or loose leaves upon which to record everything he lears and thinks. He walks awkwardly holding one shoulder obliquely, bending his head to one side when he listens: his voice is soft, whispering. He speaks fal-teringly, therefore prefers to write, laughs in a friendly, childlike fashion. At the same time he is reflective, looks like a lad and is as unwordly as an old man about to die.

Newspaper, party, friends—all were merely a means to the end; the

Class He Despised

This was the point in his development regarding which Jabotinsky (and I, too) stood in opposition to Achimeier. And of this mass one could not demand sacrifices; and on the other hand, this mass demanded violent sacrifices. And for this reason the most im-portant task of politics seemed to me to be the organization of the Jewish bourgeoise. From this mass had to and would be chosen the elite, the youth, the most inspired, who would be educated to a new national type. But Achi-meler despised this class; it is not even good enough to be used as material by him. Only the youth interested him, only to it did he return. But politics with its necessary lies, intrigues, money mat-ters, would only spoil the youth.

And this person is supposed to have organized the murder of Arlosoroff — this person, who hates politics because it leads to lies? The thought becomes ridiculous when I utter it. Not that I would say that Achimeier would shrink at force—but, if he ever considers force necessary he will acknowledge it. But to carry out the murder of a Jew whom he may have considered dangerous and then to go out and for this reason to progo out and for this reason to pro-pose a protective alliance and an armistice to the party of the mur-dered man, as Achimeler did twelve hours after the murder, no.

"You must follow the examnle of Dr. Goebbels when a Jew ple of Dr. Goebbels when a sew addresses a question to you," the organ of the Minister of public """ """ says. "First "Enlightenment" says. "First act as if you did not hear him and gaze over his head as if looking for the distant land of Canaan. If he repeats the ques-tion, look at him in the eye and say nothing. If that is not enough, and he asks a third time, look him over slowly from head to foot and back again as if studying his strange anatomy.

. . . We (meaning all Aryans) are witty enough. We want to have our fun out of our treatment of the Jews. We have only to set the tone and the Jew must accommodate himself to it."

The acts and words of Hitler. Goering, Goebbels and Rosenberg indicate clearly that the present rulers of Germany are demented. If these rulers of Nazi Germany were to submit to an examination by outstanding non-Nazi and non-Jewish alienists, the world would become convinced that mad men are in control of the German people today.

Hitlerite Jews

The Union of National Jews, the pro-Nazi group headed by the pro-Nazi group headed by Dr. Max Naumann, was officially notified by the supreme com-mand of the Storm Troops that the application of the Union of National Jews for permission to hold field exercises was refused on the ground that "field exercises are only for those German Volksgenossen who radically and politically stand for our princi-ples." And the letter concluded with "Hell Hitler."

The Naumann group had asked the chief of the Storm Troopers to receive a delegation of the Union, but the request was rejected.

The New York papers carried full accounts of the issue. The Archbishop of Canterbury wrote a letter to the London Times. And a member of the staff of the German Embassy in London even remarked on it in a speech, for which we're sure he's scheduled for a concentration camp.

It was Dr. Fritz Randolph, an attaché at the Embassy, who made the break. He got up before the members of the Birmingham Rotary Club and began talking about

the various goings-on in the Reich.
"If you had in your administra-tion, in your schools, Jews doing what they did in Germany, you would also have a problem and would have to do something about it," said Dr. Randolph. That was all right. ght. That was good, even. was the same old hash the Nazis have been handing out ever since they opened their butchery shop. That would never get a good Nazi in dutch.

But then poor Dr. Randolph made his break. And a bad break It was for a good Nazi to make. He began talking about what the Nazis were doing against the Jews, trying to make out a case for his people. Then he said:

"You must make some allowance for the actions of some lunaticsactions which have nothing to do with the will or the official sanction of the government.'

Even the Nazis will realize that their propaganda machine broke down that time. Naive Dr. Ran-dolph's profound utterance will give anti-Nazi wits a chance to spread themselves for months to come. There are so many clever thing to say about it. The implications overwhelm us. For in-stance, we can bring that statement down to its logical conclu-

Certainly Herr Streicher's concoctions in his paper are the work of a lunatic. That lets him out of the government, even though he does have his high official position.

And Dr. Goebbels' vivid imagi-nation and rabid ramblings show signs of dementia praecox. So the signs of dementia praecox. So the Ministry of Propaganda and Pub-lic Enlightenment (we like those last two words, by the way) has nothing to do with the will of the government.

Then there's Herr Goering. His yapping about the Jews doesn't seem to have much sanity in it. So, Air Ministry or no Air Minis-try, he hasn't got the official sanction of the government.

What about handsome Adolf himself? Occasionally he too permits himself to wander from the path of normalcy. He sponsors pata or normatcy. He sponsors anti-Jewish boycotts, burnings of books, and other various things that ordinary human beings wouldn't dream of doing. That puts Hitler outside the pale.

. . The question then arises in our puzzled mind: Who, then, is the Nazi government?

Culture League In Germany Plans Future

Jewish Group Outlines Its Work; Singer Praises Artists

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) BERLIN, May 10.—The work done by the Jewish Culture League of Germany and its plans for the future were outlined at a gather-ing of representatives of the Jewish press, and of the Jewish organ-izations arranged by the responsible artistic and organizing lead-ers of the League. The members of the artistic personnel of all the various groups of the League were also present, and reported on the

work of their particular sections.

The president of the Culture
League, Dr. Kurt Singer, described
the development of the Jewish Culture League and its needs and paid tribute to the devoted work of the artists. He appealed to the Jewish Press that it should to a greater extent than hitherto, while reor extent than hitherto, while re-taining full right of criticism, ed-ucate the public to a proper un-derstanding of this institution which is giving German Jewry a chance, which may not recur, for shaping Jewish cultural communal

Those who desire a stronger emphasis of the Jewish aspect in the vork of the Jewish Culture League, he said, may rest assured that leaders of the Jewish Culture League have constantly before their eyes the ideal of a strongly-Jewish German theatre. They must not, however, press a demand which it is imposible to fulfill, for an abrupt cultural break and transformation. They must in this matter place confidence in the course

of development.
The public must be educated to regard the Jewish Culture League not as a seasonal affair, but as something permanent, as an insti-tution which demands the participation of its members at every part of the year. The Jewish Cul-ture League Theatre would continue its performances during the summer, and the League Orches-tra would shortly undertake a tour throughout the whole of Germany, and they hoped that it would be

a great success. The Administrative Director of the Culture League, Dr. Werner Levie, said that since October 1 there had been 123 performances in the Berlin Jewish Culture League Theatre, seventy-one plays and fifty-two operas. In addition the Culture League had arranged eighty-three concerts, forty-two of them orchestral concerts, twenty-four chamber music concerts, eight choral concerts and eight song recitals, twenty-three instrumental soloists, twenty-one vocal soloists soloists, twenty-one vocal soloists and thirteen ccompanists had col-laborated, who do not belong to the artistic personnel of the Jew-ish Culture League. American Saga With Hearts and Flowers

Richard F. Flourney who wrote "Come What May," which opened the other evening at the Plymouth the other evening at the Plymouth Theatre, has faith in America. The Depression, and by this time it deserves to be capitalized, fright-ened him no doubt, but he had enough faith left to write a play about life in this country among the common people, which it is hoped will prove that the end is not yet in sight and we all have a chance to exist.

In making his point the author struck upon the not unusual device of tracing through a period of thirty odd years, starting in 1896, the happenings in a family of or-dinary Americans. The first scene Chet Harrison, a typesetter and Eve Hayward getting married. They are plain people of the middle-class, possessed of the virtues of their kind, Ambitious and hopeful, they both dream the dreams of every man—peace, security, and power but the play shows how the trouble of raising a family and maintaining faith soon becomes

their consuming problem.

The audience is taken through the audience is taken through the tremulous times of the Span-ish-American War, the crisis of 1907, the World War, and finally ends in 1928 when Chet remarks to his ageing wife that conditions are better and the country has at

last become sensible.
"Come What May" is often sentimental and sometimes shallow but the author in portraying his middle-class family may have purpose-ly kept his play within the intel-lectual limits of his characters. They never realized anything but the obvious causes of their discomforts and were completely un-conscious of the basic sources of economic discontent. In doing this Mr. Floutney has been true to his types and the resu. is a play that, although you may disagree with its findings and conclusions, will

nevertheless impress you and at times move you with the sincerity of its emotional range.

done adeptly. The neighborhood scenes, the inevitable family doctor, the drunk, the boy with the ambition to be an artist and all the other trimmings make "Come What May" an enjoyable experience.

Well Acted

Zionist Paints Jews' Status In Drab Light

PARIS, May 17.—A gloomy picture of the position of European
Jewry, and particularly of the position of the German Jewish refugees in various countries, was preented today by Dr. Nahum Goldmann, Zionist leader, who reported to the Committee of Jewish Dele-gations on the meeting of the eague of Nations governing body t London. The position of the refugees has

become worse in recent months Dr. Goldmann said, and the committees aiding them are weaker, with the exception of the Amerian and British relief committees. He said that a catastrophic sit-

uation exists among the relief committees in Holland and Switzerland, and added that the only positive achievement of the governing body was the settlement of 10,000 German Jewish refugees in All the other plans of the refugee group have so far ended in nothing, Dr. Goldmann declared. The position of the Jews in Ger-

many has not improved and a new wave of anti-Semitic measures is red there, the Jewish said. The Jewish situation in Austria was pictured as "critical" by Dr. Goldmann, who added that the administrative practices of the Austrian government gave ground for fears as to the future. In Pofor fears as to the future. land the economic position of the Jews is daily becoming worse and only the greatest efforts can prevent a catastrophe there, he said. In general, Dr. Goldmann declared, anti-Semitism in Europe has been strengthened in recent months.

Outside the Garden the milling crowds were kept under control by one of the largest police details ever assigned for any meeting. Deputy Chief Inspector David J. McAuliffe was in charge of two captains, forty-five sergeants, 500 patrolmen on foot, forty mounted patrolmen and their captain and

more than 100 plainclothesmen.

Hundrer's of Nazis arrived in the city throughout the day. Those who did not come by train drove in their automobiles, but attempts to park in the vicinity of the Garden proved of no avail, because since 8:30 in the morning a spe-cial detail of police kept all adjoining streets clear, and arrangejoining streets clear, and arrange-ments were made for diverting traffic in the evening. Exception was made in the case of Poly-clinic Hospital in West Fiftleth street, where doctors' and visitors' automobiles were permitted to come to a standstill

Refuse to Ban Rally

From preliminary indications, little trouble was to be expected. Although the meeting in the Garden constituted one of the most formidable threats ever made against American Jewry, all hope of having the meeting banned was abandoned early in the week with announcement by city authorities that they did not intend to interfere with the Nazi's "constitutional rights of free speech and rights of assembly, repugnant as it may be to certain classes." Both Mayor Fiorello LeGuardia and Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutsch refused to countenance the demands of individuals and groups that the meeting be banned.
