Medical Center Plan Endorsed By U.S. Leaders

Scientists Among Backers of Hadassah and Physicians' Drive

Men and women prominent in education, medicine, social service and philanthropy have endorsed the plan to build a medical center in Palestine which is to be a com-bined hospital, research institute and post-graduate school of medi-cine. The list of endorsers was made public yesterday by Hadassah, the Wor nen's Zionist Organization of America.

The new center, which will be known as the Hadassah-University Hospital, is the joint undertaking of Hadassah and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee. A campaign to raise \$200,000 for the construction of the medical center is now in progress here with Mrs. Edward Jacobs. Mrs. Alexander Edward Jacobs, Mrs. Alexander Lamport. Dr. Nathan Ratnoff and Dr. Emanuel Libman as co-chair-men. Mrs. Felix M. Warburg is honorary chairman.

When the medical completed it is planned to engage German scientists and specialists now in Palestine to head the various hospital departments and to direct the research and teaching. Talmud Held by Silver Shirts as Evidence of a Plot by the Jews?

den Post of the Silver Legion, a reporter for the Jewish Daily Bulletin was permitted to remain throughout the regular meeting of the group at the Turnhalle last Wednesday. Some business was Wednesday, Some business was held over until the next meeting because of the presence of the spy, but sufficient evidence was accumulated to indicate without pos-sibility of refutation the dastardly Silver Shirt plot against the pres-ent order of affairs.

In all, precisely forty-one mem-ers were present, six of them women. By actual count at least fourteen of the men wore DAWA pins, and in all likelihood there were ore of these buttons on the lapels of those who could not be seen from the reporter's seat. Before the meeting the conversation of virtually all was carried out in orman, but the proceedings were in English, and of all who spoke, only four did so without a German accent.

One burly gentleman with a heavy German accept "surprised" the audience with a gift, an old and heavy volume of the Hebraic Talmud. He announced that henceforth it was to be the property of the Silver Legion. He explained that it was given him by a rabbi in Russia, who entertained a deep sense of gratitude for his having taught him English. In presenting the volume, which must have been quite precious in an intrinsic way to the rabbi, the gentleman ex-plained that this gift could be converted into a true expose of the Jewish scheme to overthrow civili-zation. "This book and the proto-cols," added the master of ceremonies, and throughout the audience heads bobbed in agreement Its Mercenary Value

This met with some agreement, but the master of ceremeeting was listed downstairs as that the jig was up. We are an ancient people which
is and through its vouth is away. in and through its youth is ever renewed. By virtue of our history, we are as old as the oldest, and thanks to our children who in the ceremony of Confirmation avow their kinship with that historic past, we are as young as the youngest. The word 'confirm' means to strengthen, to make firm. Therefore, Confirmation is a source of strength to the Jewish people.

"The word 'confirm' also means to verify, to attest. Our boys and girls, by that ceremony, verify and attest the character of the Jewish people which was received at Sinal—namely, that our existence as a seperate people is not merely a biological will to live. We have a right to our existence only inso-far as we remain a people dedi-cated to the highest moral and ethical idealism. If we are merely to be another group, without any to be another group, without any special place or purpose, it would hardly justify our suffering and martyrdom. Why endure persecu-tion, discrimination, humiliation? Jews Under the Hammer and Sickle

Biro-Bidjan Area's Importance To World Jewry Looms Large

Steps Already Have Been Taken Toward Declaring It Member Republic of Soviet Union; Non-Russian Settlers Sought

The following is the last of a series of seven articles on "Un der the Hammer and Sickle," a reappraisal of the Jewish posi-tion in the Soviet Union.

A project launched several years ago and derided by most Jews outside Russia as chimerical has thus been given new impetus and direction and, conditions in world Jewry being what they are today, will no longer be dismissed with a

There is much, however, on the surface of the Biro-Bidjan project that will puzzle the uniniti-ated reader even now. The large reader even now. territory now proclaimed an autonomous "Jewish" province is as yet practically without Jews. Of a total population of 50,000, the Jewish portion is estimated at 12,-000 and more conservatively at only 8,000. If several years of planned colonization on a definite pramise of Jewish autonomy have succeeded in attracting to Biro-Bidjan no more Jews than that, what will attract them now? And if the Soviet government knows of definite reasons why Jews should flock to Biro-Bidjan from now on, why shouldn't it wait with the proclamation of autonomy at least until their numbers there become

Outside Jews Sought

The reply is that under condi-tions facing the Jews in Fascist-ridden countries, such a powerful rouse countries, such a powerful token of good will as a pledge to autonomous rights, and civic and political protection, may itself prove of sufficient incentive to start a mass migration to Biro-Bidjan, even though for the mo-ment there be no other incentive. ment there see no duel measure. For the bid implied in the procla-mation is directed, though not so specifically stated, not so much to the Russian Jews, as to the Jews outside the Soviet Union. Altogether in Germany and Aus-trie and Fungania there are threetria and Rumania there are threequarters of a million Jews whose lives have become untenable in their countries, but who have nowhere to go.

And between Poland and Rumania there are at least four million Jews who are being rapidly proletarianized without having a proletarian State to prote ing a protection state to protect them. Motives for Project

The whole seemingly fantastic project of Biro-Bidjan, its rise and fall and rise again, will be better understood if viewed in the light of the motives which started it several years ugo. There were then a minor and a major motive. The minor motive was political and universal—to counteract the influence of the Zionist movement which communists characterize as "bourgeois." Not that it was ever which communists characterize as "bourgeois." Not that it was ever believed that the unknown Far Eastern territory of Biro-Bidjan could ever replace Palestine in the could ever replace Palestine in the consciousness of the nationalist Jew. The sponsors of the project never believed that for a moment. But in those days Russia still be-lieved that a world Communist revolution was imminent, and that the Jews the world over, being preponderantly bourgeois, would be everywhere as thoroughly up-rooted as they had been by the Russian Revolution and would be flocking, consequently, to a Jew-ish republic under the aegis of the Soviets, if it were only offered them. But as the world Commun-ist revolution has been slow in coming, the political motive in the meantime vanished of itself. The second motive for Biro-Bid-

The Soviet government, it will be remembered, had at the outset made clear its intention to deal with the declassed Jewish bourgeoisle with some consideration for the fact that the old respire hear practically havend them. gime had practically barred them from farm and factory. They re-alized the Jews were really forced into their bourgeois occupations, instead of taking to them of choice. Accordingly, the Soviets offered to facilitate the integration of these declassed Jews on the farm and in the factory.


Many Fail to Fall in Line However, among the several hundred thousands of declassed Jews there were several tens of thousands who proved so recalcitrant that, in the opinion of the trant that, in the opinion of the party leaders, they were not en-titled to the leniency generally accorded to the rest of their liquidated class. To put it in the po-lite language of the Communist lite language of the Communist dialectician, the class ideology of these people was too set and unbending ever to hope it could change in their old setting and environment.

For these neonle had shown on several previous occasions that they could transport themselves bodily to the kolholz (collective farm), but remain spiritually and mentally in the city. For in the wake of the activities of the Five Year Plan, hundreds of thous-ands of crstwhile distranchised Jews were absorbed by the in-dustries, and in the wake of their absorption that were integrated. absorption they were integrated and reinstated. The "Declassed Class," in other words, had found a measure of peace and hope at home, and as a natural conse-quence Biro-Bidjan was left without a hinterland upon which to

"When I rearned," one of those who returned told me, "that many of my chums who had been in the same boat with me all their lives, were holding regular jobs, and that their children were attending school like the rest, I grew vio-lently homesick, and I knew wasn't going to stick it out there.

with the Dniepr, or Bidian with the Volga? And the Mongol faces of my neighbors, the natives, could not take the place of the mouzhik faces I had been accustomed to all my life. Well, I am here now, and am mighty glad that I am not there.

Not Complete Failure

No other reason need be given for the failure of Biro-Bidjan so far to attract itself more Russian Jews than it did until now. The project, however, was not a "fail-ure" in the sense that the work wasn't properly organized or done for it was simply that the need of it had gone out of existence Integrated in his home environment and not discriminated against either politically or economically or socially, the Russian Jew could see no reason at all why he should leave the birthplace he should leave the birthplace he loves for a country he knows not even in his dreams. Nor has he any reason to do so now. It is my opinion that if Biro-Bidjan were to depend altogether upon the Russian Jew for settlement, the project as a whole would stand no chance of fulfillment whatso-

Whenever someone comes along nd starts giving us the line about Well, after all, Hitler has succeed-"Well, after all, Hitler has succeed-ed in uniting the German people," we get riled. And the more they talk about the new courage and hope among the German underdogs, the more riled we get.

When proof comes, it comes in a rush. First, we saw reports from Germany published in British pa-pers. All is not well in the Reich, they insinuate. Anti-Nazi pamph-lets manage to find their way between the sheets of German newspapers, which in themselves are so uniformly dull that it may be they are bought for the seditious ma-terial that might be found inside. Or else someone looking up a tele-phone number in a directory out-side a 'phone booth in Hamburg will suddenly come across a sheet of paper with vigorous anti-Nazi material printed on it. Or else, while walking in the streets, Storm while waiking in the streets, storm Troopers and their subjects sud-denly find themselves showered with sheets of the same kind. Sometimes, too, as the London Daily Herald reports, "'seditious' inscriptions in paint or tar, desper-sitely hard to report a proper mysately hard to remove, appear mysteriously on walls and pavements."
And then there are the tiny
newspapers containing true accounts of what goes on in Germany, photostated, reduced and many, photostated, reduced and then distributed by the thousands together with little magnifying glasses, to enable news-hungry Nazis to read about themselves. New Yorkers who visited an expo-sition at the New Workers' School several months ago were able to see copies of the little papers. Some of them are about an inch by an inch and a half in size, re-duced from typewritten sheets, the words very small but readable even to the naked eye.

Those were the reports. didn't know how deep-rooted this opposition was, and we wanted to be absolutely sure of our ground before we confounded our "Hitler united the German people" friends.

Then, three days ago, we found that we were looking for. We what we were looking for. We were introduced to a German ref-ugee, out of Berlin only two months. We hurried him to a cor-ner and asked him:

"Is there or is there not abso-

lute unity among the Nazified German people today?"
"There is not," he said.

"Elaborate, please," we demanded, the flush of victory coloring our rosy cheeks. He elaborated. And the sub-

stance of his observations strict-ly first hand, mind you—was this: There can be no doubt that many There can be no doubt that many Germans are in opposition to the Nazi regime. Even though they may not go about attacking Hitler and Hitlerism, six million Communist voters and further mil-lions of Centrist voters do not overnight become more barbaric than any savage in any unexplored hinterland. Beneath the smolte-screen of Nazi propaganda gushing from the chimney-like mouths of Goebbels, Goering, et al., lies an under-current of dissatisfaction. Riproaring anti-Semitism is not en-ough to feed the mouths of the hungry unemployed. The milleni-um for Germany has not yet arrived, despite the fact that Hitler and his cohorts have been in charge of operations for more than a vear.

dissatisfaction is quickly squelched. Arrests and sentences to concentration camps for those who speak out against the regime have by now become too numerous to be

And since it is hidden, it finds itself forced into a position more disadvantageous to the Hitlerites than it would otherwise be. The dissatisfaction arises among the Nazis themselves. The Commun-ists, the Centrists, the Catholics. ists, the Centrists, the Camones, all have been absorbed into the Nazi organization. It is from within that the seed of opposition is sprouting. And because of that, because of the fact that the Nazis have nothing tangible to punish without biting their tails like scorpions surrounded by fire, this op-position is far more serious than

position is far more serious than even Hitler suspects. What it will lead to no one knows. The refugee with whom we spoke believed the Nazi regime will eventually be forced more and more to the left, until all the or-iginal symptoms of the disease, including anti-Semitism, will dis-appear. Whether that will happen or not we won't venture to predict But it's nice to think about.

cell," Rosenblatt said. cell," Rosenblatt said. "I was reading a typewritten article by Vladimir Jabotinsky on Moscow methods. In the article, which had been smuggled in, Jabotinsky said Palestine police were adopting OGPU methods. Cohen asked me what I was reading and I told him it was an article by Jabotin-sky. We spoke no more. I haven't seen him since. I had no reason to kill Arlosoroff."

Cross-examined concerning his relations with Abdul Meiid, Arab relations with Abdul Mejid, Arab convict who said during the pre-liminary hearings that he had killed Arlosoroff and later re-tracted this testimony, Rosenblatt

"Mejid used to greet us an others with the word 'Shalon every time we passed his cell. 'Shalom' never asked Mejid to take the blame. I never told him I killed Arlosoroff. I never showed him any plans. I have never given him any details regarding our alleged crime.

"I was present once when Meiid spoke to Stavsky from his cell. He told Stavsky that the police had discovered a blood stain on Mejid's trousers.'

Shown his shoes, casts of which had been made, Rosenblatt de-clared to the court that he did not wear those shoes in June all. (The murder was committed on June 16.)

(Continued from Page One) lation of the orthodox kosher laws follows many weeks of negotiation and discussion of the problem. For years it has been alleged that butcher shops and other stores selling food guaranteed to be kosher were in reality not obeying all the religious regulations.

When the LaGuardia administration took office last January the Mayor appointed a special subcommittee to deal with the problem of which William Weiss, president of the Union of Orthodox Congregations, was elected chair-man. Since January various rabbinica organizations have been meeting to deliberate on the affair. One of the chief difficulties encountered was unwillingness on the part of orthodox rabbis to consent the inclusion of conservative rab-bis on an equal footing in any kashruth regulating body. The city administration has been insistent on the formation of a united body omposed of all Jewish groups as a requisite for a new deal in kashruth control.
