The Jewish Protest

THE general strike held yesterday in Jewish Palestine in protest against the restrictive immigration policy of the Palestine government repre-sented every group of Pales-tinian Jewry. All political dif-ferences were forgotten in the just demand for a larger number of immigration certificates for Jewish workers waiting to be admitted to Palestine where the shortage of labor is acute at present.

The Zionists in Poland and other lands joined in this pro-test against the illiberal immigration policy of the Palestine government.

Palestine is prosperous today because of the work, the enter-prises, the sacrifices of the Jewish people. The absorptive cap-acity of Palestine now fully justifies a liberal immigration policy for Jewish labor seeking a w home and new opportunities new home and new opportunities in the old home of the Jewish people. The short-sighted Col-onial policy affecting Jewish im-migration to Palestine at this crucial moment is not in keep-ing with the pledges contained in the Balfour Declaration or the

This is the acid test of the mandatory power's sincerity with regard to the Balfour Declaration. Victims of Nazi Ger-many and of other lands indulging in economic discrimination on religious grounds are eagerly seeking refuge in Palestine. To them Palestine is the only hope. To them Palestine would be the only salvation. The actual ful-fillment of the Balfour Declaration would not only save these refugees from their desperate plight, but would also aid in the progressive development and the increased prosperity of Palestine for all the inhabitants of the

Thus far the failure to fulfill the Balfour Declaration as con-ceived by the author of that declaration has served to inten-sify friction between Arabs and Jews, for the deluded or mercen-Arab agitators endeavored fo convince the Arab masses that Great Britain had never intended to make good its promise to the Jewish people. If the mandatory power fails in the fulfillment of its obliga-

tions and persists in restricting immigration at a time when the "absorptive capacity" of Pales-tine justifies a very much larger Jewish immigration to Pales-tine, what becomes of the sanctity of international agreements and covenants?

Running to a phone booth he

After some skillful inquirles a reporter learned that the swastika was not a recent painting, or the result of some Nazi vandal's suppressed art desires coming to the fore. Rather, he discovered that the emblem was a design built into the chimney when the New

York Hospital was erected. Coolidge Abbot, of Boston, Mass., the architect who drew the plans for this building some four or five years ago, adopted this de-sign. It has no architectural significance as a chimney marker.

Needs in Use at Arlosoroff Case

Aba Achimeier, who was ac-quitted of complicity in the murder of Dr. Arlosoroff, was re-arrested by the police and charged with having been the leader of the Brith Habiryonim.

Achimeler immediately began a hunger strike because the police refused to free him on bail. After four days of fasting Achimeler ended his hunger strike, stating he did this out of deference to Rabbi A. I. HaCohen Kook, Chief Rabbi of Palestine, who urged him to break his fast since the Jewish re-ligion forbade suicide and Achi-meler was said to be in bad health.

Three Seriously Wounded Following Protest: General Strike Casts Seven-Hour Pall on Holy Land

TEL AVIV, May 23.—Forty-five Jews were wounded here, three of them seriously, in the course of a two-hour clash between a mixed crowd and police detachments. Barricades were set up in the streets and the enraged demonstrators fought a

bloody battle with the police.

After the crowd left a cinema house in which a protest had been held, they formed a demonstration. The marchers encountered police lines on Bialik street. A merciless attack by the police infuriated the marchers, who replied with a volley of stones. Twenty-five Laboriates and ten Revisionists are among the injured. The others were onlookers.

'Born a Rabbi,' H. P. Mendes Marks 60th Birthday in Pulpit

Not one lifetime but nearly two comes with the knowledge of a re encompassed in the sixty years that separate the initial Shabouth At the age of twenty-two the remon of a twenty-two-year-old young rabbi became the first Chaare encompassed in the sixty years that separate the initial Shabouth rabbi in a small Manchester, Eng-land, congregation and the reception vesterday tendered Dr. Henry Pereira Mendes by the New York Board of Jewish Ministers on the occasion of the anniversary of the celebration of his sixty years in the ministry.

The rabbi emeritus of the Portuguese Synagogue, Shearith Iswael, was the guest of his fellows of the rabbinate in the vestry rooms of Shearith Israel. He was the cynosure of all eyes and the subject of all laudatory addresses delivered at the meeting.

Among those who spoke were Rabbi David de Sola Pool, Rabbi Mendes' successor at Shearith Is-rael; Dr. Bernard Drachman of rael; Dr. Bernard Drachman of Dichron Ephraim Synagogue; Rab-bi Max Drob, president of the Board of Jewish Ministers, who presided, and Dr. Mendes himself. Dr. Mendes, who consecrated himself to the service of God on the night of his bar mitzvah, comes of a long line of rabbis. His father, Abraham Pereira Mendes, was minister of the Sephardic Congregation in Birmingham, England, when his third child, Henry, was born. He had previously been Chazan in Sephardic communities in Jamaica, British West Indies, and later he became dayan and and later he became dayan and preacher in the ancient Sephardic community of London. Years later in 1882 after his son had taken the leadership in the restoration of the ancient Jeshuath Israel Syn-agogue in Newport, R. I., he came to this country as minister of that synagogue, oldest American congregation. Dr. Mendes' maternal grand-

father, David Aaron de Sola, was the cantor preacher of the Spanish Portuguese Synagogue of London, Portuguese Synagogue of London, the translator of the Sephardic prayer book and the author of many volumes in English. An uncle, Abraham de Sola, profes-sor at McGill University, was minister of the Sephardic community in Montreal while another uncle, Samuel de Sola, became Chazan of the Spanish and Portuguese Syna-gogue in London.

His Forebears

As a matter of fact the long and distinguished line of de Sola rabbis, scholars, physicians, martyrs and statesmen carries Dr. Mendes directly back to the ninth century. His mother's mother, Rica Mel was daughter of Raphael Meldola, the chief rabbi of the Sephardics of England, and sister of David Meldola, chief rabbi in succession to his father. For thirteen generations, Meldolas were chief rabbis in Mantua, Florence,

Piza or Leghorn.

Thus Dr. Mendes was, in the manner of speaking, born to the rabbinate. And now at the age of eighty-two he can look back at his long career with the fondness that

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zan and minister of the newly organized Sephardic congregation in Manchester. Three years of service and an invitation came from vice and an invitation came from America to accept the position of preacher at Shearith Israel, New York's oldest congregation, the only one in the metropolis that antedates the Revolutionary War. For forty-eight years, until 1925, Dr. Mendes had actively served Shearith Israel; since then he has been rabbi emeritus.

His Communal Work

Dr. Mendes' Jewish communal activities have been as wide as they have been varied. Locally he they have been varied. Locally he organized the Monteflore Hospital, the Crippled Children's East Side Free School and the Institution for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes. A founder of the American Hebrew magazine he has long campaigned for laws protecting Sabbath day observers and against the introduction of secagainst the introduction of sec-tarian exercises into public schools. As a member of the American Jewish Committee and the Alli-ance Israelite Universelle, he took part in campaigns to protect and secure the rights of Jews throughout the world. One of the pioneer Zionists, Dr.

Mendes took a leading part in the introduction of the movement to this country. In his memoirs he has written: "Soon after Dr. Herzl began his

great movement, Dr. Gaster, chief rabbi of the Spanish and Portuguese community of England, call-ed upon me in London where I ed upon me in London where I was visiting, saying that Dr. Herzl wished to meet me. They both called the next day and Dr. Herzl asked me if I would undertake to introduce the Zionist movement in the United States. I readily and eagerly consented. On my return to the States I formed the first Zionist association, becoming its president and I served for one year on the Actions Committee. My interest in Zionism has never been diminished but I had to withdraw from active participation.'

The scheduled answer was not

made at the hearing yesterday.
The reason, it was explained by
Eli Meltzer, vice-president, was
that Nathan L. Perlman, counsel that Nathan L. Fernman, counsel to Local 440, had not had time. Asked, however, whether the Local wished another hearing, Meltzer said, "As far as we are concerned, this is final.

Fist Fight Breaks Out

A fist fight almost broke out in the trial room of the Health Department, 139 Centre street, where the hearing was held, when, at the close, one of the poultry slaught-erers insulted another. An alter-cation was prevented by the intercession of a policeman. A heated argument continued on the street for some time after the policeman had evicted the slaughterers from

Buitenkant declared that the charges of racketeering and coer-cion are still unanswered, and asserted that Local 440 "is controlled by racketeers."

Damaging accusations had been presented by Simon to the union presented by Simon to the union executives in a conference last week. None of these were touched upon by Local 440 executives in the hearing yesterday.

The memory of Meyer London, first Socialist Congressman in the first Socialist Congressman in the United States and defender of the immigrant, will be perpetuated in the Meyer London Memorial Library of the Rand School of Social Science, which was dedicated last night at an open air meeting in East Fifteenth street, opposite the Rand School, where the library will be permanently housed.

The library is based on the Rand

School collection, which was started about ten years ago with funds provided by the Meyer London Memorial Foundation. Interest from the fund will now be used augment the library and make it the most important collec-tion on the social sciences any-where in New York. The Forward Association, Workmen's Circle and various labor organizations contributed generously to the fund when it was begun after Meyer London's tragic death in an East Side automobile accident. The volumes will be housed on the second floor of the Rand School, which occupies the old People's House. Among Jewish Socialists Meyer

London was for a number of years an outstanding figure. He was born in Suwalki, Poland, in 1871 and studied at the gymnasium in Poltawa. Later he came to the United States, where his father had for several years been a Hebrew teacher. In this country Meyer London studied and practiced law. At the

same time, as one who in his early youth had become a member of the Social Democratic Party in Russia, he threw himself into the Socialist cause here with such energy that many consider him one of the most important figures in the development of the movement.

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Germans Spring From Many Racial Strains. Says Prof. Boas

Writing on "Aryans and Non-Aryans," Professor Franz Boas, perhaps the foremost living an-thronologist. sets forth, in the thropologist, sets forth, in the current issue of The American Mercury, the reasons why there is no pure German "Aryan" race, nor, indeed, any pure race that has not adopted many of its racial characteristics from geographical environment. Follow-ing is an extract from the Mercury article:

By FRANZ BOAS

The present policies of the German government are based on the assumption that an "Aryan" has certain biologically determined qualities which are entirely foreign to every "non-Aryan."

There are said to be 6,000,000 non-Aryans in Germany, but sin according to the prescribed defini-tion a fourth part of non-Aryan blood is enough to stamp the individual as non-Aryan, the actual number may well be close to 1,000,000 or even more. Accord-ing to the policy adopted by Germany these are practically exclud-ed from all participation in German economic, social, and intellec-

What is an Aryan? Aryan is a linguistic term and nothing else. It means that there was once one language, nowadays called the language, which gradually Aryan language, which gradually spread over a large part of Europe and Asia, and developed into all the different "Aryan" languages spoken today. In this sense Aryan is anyone who speaks an Arvan language. Swede as well

as American Negro or Hindu A judgment of the German policy A judgment of the German poncy requires the answer to two ques-tions: one, what, racially, are the so-called "Aryans" and "non-Ary-ans?"; the other, to what exten-does the behavior of a single human being and of a people depend

upon hereditary traits?
Roughly speaking, we may divide the population of Europe into three groups, which are situated in strata extending from west to east: in the north the tall blond blue-eyed Northwest Europeans; in the middle, in the region of the Alps and east and west of them the darker Alpine type; and in the south the small, very dark Medisouth the small, very dark Medi-terannean type of Spain, Italy and Southern Fra ince. Of course, there are other local types which do not conform well with such a hard and fast classification. . . .

It is a fiction to speak of a Ger-man race. We should rather ask what types of physical build are represented among the Germans. Here we encounter a complete lack of unity. Blonds with long heads in the North, darker people with short heads in the South; broad faces here, narrow ones there; noses turned up and aquiline, the general build tall and short, broad and slight. There is no "German race"; there are only local types which are very different one from another, each of which comprises individuals of different characteristics, so that representatives all these types may be found in any part of Germany and of the neighboring countries. The East German is closer to his Polish neighbor than to the Frisian; the Tyrolese shows more similarity to the East Alpine Slav than to the North German, the Rhinelander more to the neighboring Frenchman than to the German in more distant parts.
Since the Jews are considered as

a thoroughly different element, we must define their racial position. There is no more a Semitic than there is an Aryan race, since both terms define linguistic groups, not human beings. We can only speak of Near Eastern types. There are Jerusalem.

at least two or three very differ ent Near Eastern types: dark Ar-menians, lighter Kurds, and the long-headed Southern type. long as we have known Jews at all, all three-and perhaps ever other European strains—have been represented among them. The Jews are not a uniform race. The Armenoid type is very closely re-lated to that of the Dinaric peoples, the inhabitants of the region of the Adriatic Sea, so much so that in some cases the Tyrolese and the Armenoid can hardly be distinguished with certainty. Similarly, a relationship exists be-between the Syrian and Mediterranean types. The contrast be-tween the blond Northwest Eurobean and the dark Southeast German is just as great as the difference between the latter and the Armenoid Jew.

This statement does not mean that there are no finer distinctions in physical build between most Jews and most non-Jewish Europeans; the differences, however, are not fundamental. It is well known that dark Syroid Jews are often taken for Spaniards or Itali-ans, Armenoids for South Slavs or other Alpines, and blond, blue-eyed

Jews for Northwest Europeans.

An attempt is being made by those who are in power in Ger many to justify on scientific grounds their attitude toward the Jews; but the science upon which they are building their policies is a pseudo-science. No one has ever proved that a human being, through his descent from a certhrough his descent from a cer-tain group of people, must of ne-cessity have certain mental char-acteristics. A nation is not to be defined by its descent but by its language and customs. Otherwise Germans, Frenchmen, and Italians would not be nationalities. Language and customs are determined far more by the environment in which the child grows up than by its descent, because the physical attributes, so far as they have any influence at all, occur with extra ordinary variety within every group.

Just as the Germanized Slavs and French have become Germa in their culture, as the Frenchified Germans have become French, the Russianized ones Russian; so have the German Jews become Ger

"It is inconceivable that the new Germany as a whole thinks and feels like Streicher. How long, then, will she allow him to continue?"

The Referee said:

"Streicher knows quite well that every account which he published was a criminal lie. He knew quite well that Jews are not and never have been guilty of ritual murders. He knows further, that this foul libel on a whole race has in other countries, notably Tsarist Russia, inspired pogroms in which thou-sands of innocent men, women and children have been massa-ered. That is the reason, we suspect, why he published his lies; he wants to foment pogroms. Unfortunately, he is the worst man in Europe. But Hitler recently promoted him represen-tative of the Munich government in Bayarian Franconia.

The Frankfurter Zeitung dis-played extraordinary courage in telling the truth in Germany telling the truth in Germany about the effect of the Streicher incitement to pogroms. 'Frankfurter Zeitung wrote:

"The ritual murder number of Der Stuermer has created in and

outside Germany the stir that was to be expected from its aim and contents; a stir and anger naturally not confined to Jewish circles. It exceeds in its text and pictures anything we have hitherto seen in this way."

The Russkoye Znamya, the organ of the Black Hundred pogromists under the Tsar, never gromists inner the Tsar, never stooped to such depths in agi-tating against the Jews as Der Stuermer does now under the Hitler regime. The Nazis stop the sale of this issue of Der Stuermer in Berlin and at the same time promote the publisher to a high and responsible post. The Nazis understand the meaning of such promotion, discounting any explanations that may be made by the Hitler govern-

ment for foreign consumption.
The London Times writes that "almost every issue of Herr Streicher's journal Der Stuermer contains at least one per-sonal attack on a named Jew which no impartial reader could construe as anything but an in-citement to violence."

In addition to the ritual mur-der myths, Der Stuermer is devoting its pages to reproducing extracts from a new version of the "Protocols of the Wise Men of Zion," called "Life and Ac-tivities of the Jewish Kabal," just published by the Deutsche Kulturwacht Verlag of Berlin. These are blossoms of the new Kultur in Naziland.

Decorah Scandinavian Pay Tribute to Jewish Pioneer

pecial Correst DECORAH, Iowa, May 21.— This little town, peopled mainly by the sons and the grandsons of Scandinavian pioneers, turned out en masse to make a public holiday of the eightieth birthday of Ben Bear, "the Bear of Decorah," the German Jewish immigrant who came to this place in 1876 when it was hardly more than a name on a map, made it his home, reared his children in it and built up a clothing business which has kept ace with the development of the

munity.

Everyone Attends

To this celebration came not only the members of the family but every neighbor-friend the Big but every neighbor-friend the Big Bear has made in Decorah, from the butcher and the baker to the banker, the clergyman and the college president—for Decorah is the site of Luther College, founded many years ago for the sons and grandsons of the pioneers from

Sweden and Norway.

Ben Bear was born in a village in the province of Wuertemberg Germany, and at the age of thirteen came to America to make his fortune. In those days, accord-ing to Mr. Baer's recollection, it took the North German Llove boats thirty days to cross the Atlantic. The Monday after his Atlantic. The Monday after his landing he was at work in the New York dry goods house of Rosenthal and Sulzberger. He worked for this firm for about ten years and then left for the West to strike out on his own.

When he reached Chicago he

asked the ticket agent to pick him a town further west. The ticket agent selected Cedar Rapids, Iowa, but fearing that his resources were unequal to opening a store in so "populous" a town, the young Bear went further, wandering in and out of the small communities northern Iowa and southern Minnesota, until he struck a place fifty miles west of the Mississippi, where that river separates Iowa from Wisconsin. There, in the Scandinavian settlement of Decorah, he drove his stakes,

Ben Bear has won the affections and esteem of his townsmen not alone by being an hones, and fair-dealing tradesman, but also by taking an active part in many mmunity endeavors. He was the first president of the electric plant; was an active worker in the battle that gave the town its courthouse, its opera house and its metropoli-tan hotel; and he was chairman of the county Red Cross

He was married in 1884 to Miss Antonia Hamburger of New York and in their home in Decorah were born their three children, Mrs. D. S. Benjamin, of Springfield, Ill.; Mrs. A. C. Heller, of Grand Island, Neb.; and Alexander Bear of Grand Forks, N. D., the "three little bears," included in the town's toast to its only Jewish pioneer.

when he learns there are no Jews about: no ghetto Jews no ghetto. Perhaps to the Gen-tile tourist, synagogues and ghettos constitute part of the picturesqueness of the foreign scene, but to many of the tourist Jews such sights are reminders of the social blot on the escutcheon. There are assimilated Jews who are as eager be reminded of their bearded corkscrew-lock wearing rabbi ancestors as a Nazi official is eager to have it known that his grandmother was a Jewess. I recall what a sense of relief the Jews in a certain tourist group felt when, at Algiers, the guide informed them that the old ghetto had been wiped away and the Jews who had once resided there had been absorbed into the general French citizenry. Even if he was wrong, he was comforting.

There is however, another type of Jewish traveller who is always in quest of his youth, so to speak or, rather, of the youth of his race. Wherever he goes he seeks Jews, and the more old-fashioned the better; and Jewish scener, street and synagogues and cemeteries. He may be a journalist, but, more often, he is the artist, seeking to record on paper the historic the picturesque aspects of his farflung people g people. Among these artists Saul Raskin and Lionel Reiss, both of whom have recorded, in lithograph, etching, water color and oil, Jewish places and Jewish types, Palestine being their com-mon terrain. Reiss has done many pictures of the Jew throughou Europe as well as in Palestine. do not mean that these are the only Jewish artists who have sought to tell the story of dispersed Jewry in line and tone, but they are fairly typical.

An Unusual Touriet

Ary Stillman is a contradiction to both these types. He is a tour-ist, albeit not in the conventional sense, who deliberately seeks out the Jewish places, the Jewish type in remote parts of the world, and he is a painter who refrains from recording the Jewish sights and types seen. 

Although no producer's name ap-peared on the program, the Vic-tor Herbert revival of "The Only Girl," which started a limited run at the Forty-fourth Street Theatre the other night, is evidently the work of J. Lewis, who preceded Dr. Magnes, explained that "we are called upon to fight back a catastrophic hurricane whose terrifying clouds have burst over Germany and threatened to engulf our people everywhere. We must approach this United Jewish Appeal in terms of personal relationship to the threat of Nazism. If we fail in the task we have assumed, we shall give strength to the forces whose goal is the ex-termination of Jews not alone in Germany but in every land where they can penetrate."

Was U. S. Court Judge in Western New York; Appointed in 1927

(Special to the J.D.B.) ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 23.-Simon L. Adler, judge of the United States court for the western district of New York, died of a heart attack here today. He was sixty-six years old and unmarried.

Judge Adler was appointed to

Since that time he has been practicing law here. For seven years he practiced in New York City. While in that city, Judge Adler began to take active interest in politics, and in 1910 he was elected to the Assembly. Six years later he was chosen majority leader of the Assembly.

He stated further that Ivy Lee had absolutely no connection with the Friends of New Germany or any of its leaders, that he had not been threatened with the withdrawal of the Rockefeller accounts in the event that he "continued handling Nazi propaganda," and that no word, written or oral had ever passed between the Friends

of New Germany and Ivy Lee.

LONDON, May 23.—Continued persecution of the German Jews will lead to national suicide for Germany, Professor Elliot Smith, noted anthropologist, declared today in an article in the London News Chronicle.

Professor Smith, who is chairman of a scientific committee apman of a scientific committee ap-pointed by the Royal Anthropo-logical Institute to determine the contribution of the various races to the upbuilding of civilization, stated that "aithough I usually object to becoming involved in political controversies; in this case it is our duty to protest the Nazis claims against the Jews.
