The Indictment of Pellev THE indictment of William D. Pelley, chief of the Sil-

ver Shirts, an anti-Semitic organization, on charges of fraudulent stock sales, marks the beginning of the end of the Silver Shirt racket. The Galahad Press, publishers of the vicious anti-Jewish journal Liberation, the Silver Shirt organ, has been declared bankrupt by Judge Webb, of Asheville, N. C. Pelley's two aides, Robert C. Summerville and Don D. Kellog, have also been indicted with their chief. It has been revealed that a num-ber of prominent "socialites" in various parts of the country had been induced to buy stock in the publishing company of Liberation, which according to an admission by Summerville "has no property and does not even own a sheet of paper."

As we pointed out on a previous occasion, these destructive organizations, like the Ku Klux Klan, are conducted only as racketeering schemes, playing racketeering schemes, playing upon the prejudices and fears of the ill-informed, inciting one element of the population against another by fabricating falsehoods and spreading hate.

The end comes to these or-ganizations either when their dupes cease supporting them or when they succeed in gathering together large sums and the leaders commence to quarrel among themselves as to the division of the spoils.

An Unwise Plan

This week's issue of Liberty contains an article on "What the Arthur Garfield Hays, general counsel of the American Civil Liberties Union. Mr. Hays is a brilliant attorney and a fearless champion of civil liberties. He was in Germany as an observer at the Reichstag fire trial and studied the situation of the Jews under the Hitler regime.

Mr. Hays' article in Liberty, while illuminating and interesting, contains a dangerous and unwise suggestion. Mr. Hays himself realizes that his proposal will be criticized by Jews, for he writes, at the end of his article: "There will be criticism from Jews that my views are legalis-tic, that I have suggested a method by which Hitter might affect world opinion without making a substantial change in policy.

In his opening paragraphs, Mr. Hays states the case clerly: "Equal rights under the law, without discrimination or favor, without privilege, penalty or im-munity, without preferences of any kind depending upon race, creed or religion.

Seriously by Endek Mobs

Others Slightly Injured; Semites Aggressors, Biased Press Savs

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, May 24.—Two Jews
were seriously wounded, several
others slightly injured and one
Christian student badly hurt in anti-Semitic disturbances which broke out in the town of Cieszyn, Poland, close to the Czechoslova-kian frontier.

As usual the Gazeta Warsaw-ska, Endek anti-Semitic newspa-per, reported the affair as an at-tack by Jews upon Christians. Inquiries by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency revealed, however, that the trouble started late Tuesday, when Endek anti-Semites attacked students at a Brith Trumpeldor school. A street fight followed in which the Endeks were beaten. The next day they resumed the attack, smashing windows in Jewish shops and terrorizing the Jew-ish population.

Windows in the two local syna-Windows in the two local syna-gogues were also smashed by the Endek hooligans. When the En-deks attempted to destroy the premises of the Hanoar Hazloni, they were met with flerce resis-tance, and the Jewish casualties occurred in the clash that followed

Police squadrons were sent to the town from Kattowice. Order was restored by the police, who arrested sixteen of the Endeks and one member of the Brith Trum-peldor, Breitkoff, An inquiry has been opened by the public prose-

Mc-Donald, League of Nations refugee head, declared yesterday on his arrival from Europe on the Italian liner Rex. The High Commissioner stated that the position of the refugees has improved to some ex-tent in the last three months. He attributed the improvement to the "devoted efforts of Jewish and non-Jewish private organizations."

Set \$500 Bail In Brooklyn Kashruth Case

Tel Aviv Provision Firm Manager Pleads Not Guilty to Charge

Jack Rosenberg of 402 Sackman street, Brooklyn, manager of the Tel Aviv Provision Company of 551 Morgan avenue, Brooklyn, was released on '500 bail yesterday by Magistrate Gasper J. Liota of the Fifth District Magistrate's Court in Brooklyn on charges of violating the state kosher law. The case was put over to the Court of Special Sessions.

George Ringler, newly appointed supervisor in the State Depart-ment of Agriculture and Markets in charge of the state kosher law, is the complainant. Rosenberg was arrested Wednesday.

Ringler charges seventy-three pieces of pickled pastrami, weigh-ing 329 pounds, were transported from the Majestic Provision Company, 209-211 Lewis street, a non-kosher firm, to the Tel Aviv Provision Company for sale as a kosh-er meat product. Rosenberg pleaded not guilty vesterday and waived examination.

Veterans Label Examiner's' Tactics 'Fraud'

Chaplain Scores Use of Organization's Name for Soliciting

Characterizing as a "rank fraud" the obtaining of subscriptions for the Brooklyn Jewish Examiner through use of the name of the Jewish War Veterans, and urging all who have subscribed to the publication because of such use to cancel their subscriptions, Dr. Solomon A. Fineberg of Mount Vernon, national chaplain-in-chief of the Jewish War Veterans, yes-terday issued a statemest attack-ing the weekly and its editor, Rabbi Louis Gross.

Dr. Fineberg's statement was in accordance with action taken by the National Council of the vetergroup at its last meeting.

"Contemptible Scheme"

Dr. Fineberg said:
"The National Council of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States has learned with re-gret that the name of the Jewish War Veterans has been used in a War veterans has been used in a contemptible mercenary scheme in-volving the Brooklyn Jewish Ex-aminer, edited by Dr. Louis Gross, and the Minute Men. "The obtaining of subscriptions

or donations by either of these in the name of the Jewish War Veterans, or the soliciting of funds by anyone who claims to speak for the Examiner or the Minute Men on behalf of the Jewish War Veterans, in early fraid Our Veterans, is rank fraud. Our or-ganization has never authorized any such solicitation; we have nevany such solicitation; we have never received any money thus collected. We have no connection
whatever with the Jewish Examiner, and anyone who say that
this periodical represents us in
any way is, either innocently or
purposely guilty of falsehood.

'Minute Men Separate'
"The Minute Men are likewise totally and completely separate and apart from the Jewish War Vet-erans. The formation of this or-ganization has never been authorgamization has never been author-ized by the Jewish War Veterans. Although the organizer of this group happens to be a committeechairman of the Jewish War Vet-erans, the Minute Men have not even the most remote connection

even the most remote connection with the Jewish War Veterans, and have never had any kind of recognition from our organization.

"The Judge Advocate General of the Jewish War Veterans has been instructed to proceed legally against those who have been raising funds fraudulently in the name of our organization. His department will cause the immediate arment will cause the immediate ar-rest of anyone who proceeds after this warning has been issued to use the good name of the Jewish War Veterans and to capitalize the Nazi situation for personal

profit profit.

Professor Albert Einstein's counsel urging America's Jews to show the world "that love is stronger than hate and persecution," was the theme of an address delivered at Temple Emanu-El, 1 East Sixtyfifth street, at last night's "symbolic commencement exercises." Degrees and diplomas denied German Jewish students on racial grounds were conferred "in absentia."

"The Nazis say that the real difficulty arose out of the immi-gration into Germany of Polish and Galician Jews in large numand Galician Jews in large num-bers; that these people were for-eigners who took the jobs of good Germans. The fact is over-looked that these Easterners were invited into Germany during the war when labor was scarce; that all of them were not Jews; that a distinction might be made between foreigners and those in Germany whose roots were deep in the soil and had been for centuries."

And in conclusion Mr. Hays makes the following suggestion:

"It would seem that, from the point of view of a Hitler, a proclamation of equal rights for all races and religions ould be possible and would be advantageous. So long as all Germans had equal rights under the law, he could justify himself in reversing his anti-Semitic policy. By laying down insensate qualifications he would rid the German state of a great many more Jews, who would leave voluntarily."

In other words, the suggestion is made that the "Easterners," the so-called Ost Juden, be sacrificed. Many of the Easterners came to Germany during the war when Germany and Austria

occupied Russian territory. Many of them came there shortly after the war, after the bolshevist revolution, because they did not fit into the new order established in Soviet Russia. If driven out of Germany, they could not re-turn to their former homes. Such a solution of the Jewish prob lem in Germany might appeal to the Naumann group of German superpatriots who, notwithstanding all the humiliations heaped upon them, still profess to love the Nazis, but the Jews of the world could not regard this plan as a solution of the problem at n. It is a dangerous suggestion

It is also an unwise suggestion. For Hitler could not officially admit "that a distinction might admit "that a distinction migu-be made between foreigners and those in Germany whose roots were deep in the soil and had been for centuries." Such a distinction would eliminate Hitler himself, for he was not a Ger-man until recently. He himself was just such a foreigner in Ger-many as the Ost Juden.

At the same time Salonica has At the same time salonica has assumed the place occupied former-ly by Constantinople as the chief center of Sephardic Jewish culture in Southeastern Europe ture in Southeastern Europe At the same time there is noted here a closer contact with the Jews of Northern Europe from whom the Greek Jews have kept apart for centuries because of language dif-ferences, which are now being overcome by the large influx of German and other Ashkenazi Jews, speaking German, Yiddish and English; the spread of Zionism, and more extensive use of Hebrew in conversation

The great majority of the Jews of Salonica and of the rest of Greece still speak a language foreign to the Northern Jew, according to the latest statistical data. Sixty per cent. of the Salonica Jews and all those of Southern Greece and of the Greek Islands speak an Italian dialect with an admixture of Hebrew words, while the Jewish inhabitants of the Northern Greek provinces, that is, the part which formerly belonged to Turkey, speak Ladino—old Spanish interspersed with Hebrew words. It is the linguistic difference that has kept the Greek Jew isolated from the rest of Jewry.

The urgent need of organized | tain laws than others. When the kashruth in greater New York is unquestionably of great importance. The execution of such an endeavor has the aspects of a herculean task Aside from the traditional religious question, kashruth must be considered also from a civic standpoint. The latter is of great importance, due to the attention it creates among non-Jewish fellow citizens.

The city authorities of New York, in conjunction with rabbinyork, in conjunction with rabbin-ical organizations, are trying to bring order out of chaos existing here. When an organizing body under the auspices of the city authorities held a meeting recently, dissension started immediately, one organization refusing to join the heard if one of the other organizations were included. Kashruth supervision based upon tra-ditional precepts does not lie alone in the hands of an individual rabbi because he has received a degree from a greater rabbinical authority than another rabbi, who is nevertheless a rabbi and who has received a degree from a reputable authority.

A Great Procedure Necessary Kashruth supervision should also not be permitted to be under the sole jurisdiction of any one organization in a community where there is no governing, offi-cial ecclesiastical body. Some rabbinical authorities are undoubtedly more capable of expounding cer- or to an individual.

various organizations met under city auspices, at the outset they should have first set down an agreed upon procedure as to how kashruth, in all its phases, should be observed throughout the city. Judge Malvin Defines 'Kosher' In Decision at Neboh Hearing

What is kosher meat? What is kosher meat?

That was the question posed by
Magistrate David L. Malvin sitting in Brooklyn Tuesday and answered by himself. Here's the an-

swer:
"Meat can only be kosher when it is properly selected, slaughtered and handled under the supervision of rabbinical supervisors, in ac-cordance with the Jewish ritual and sanctioned by the Hebrew or-thodox rabbinical requirements The regulations as established by the orthodox rabbis require strict adherence to the Hebrew laws dur-ing the entire process and a failure comply therewith would make

the product non-kosher. Denies Dismissal Plea This definition was incorporated a decision handed down by Magistrate Malvin in the case of the Neboh Kosher Provision Com-pany and its president, Abraham Kaufman, charged with intent to defraud and with unlawful exposure for sale of non-kosher meat consisting of four barrels of brisket and four barrels of tongue. After several weeks of hearings in the Magistrates' Courts in Brooklyn, the decision denied the mofendant held in \$500 bail and tried in the Court of Special Sessions

The complainant against the corporation was Sidney Rosenwasser from the office of Arthur Simon Department of Health confidential investigator. Evidence, according to Magistrate Malvin, has brought out that "the secrecy with which the aforesaid delivery was veiled creates a guilty inference of wrongdoing."

significant acknowledgment of the ramifications of the kosher products business is made in the decision; "Commerce and business in the preparation and sale of kosher products has reached such tremendous proportions and is of such great concern to a large mass of people that the propriety of such regulations and laws can no longer be questioned.

Section 435-A of the Penal Law,

which was alleged to have been violated in the Neboh kosher case, reads as follows:

"Sale of kosher meat and meat preparations:

"A person who, with intent to defraud sells or exposes for sale any meat or meat preparation and falsely represents the same to be kosher, whether such meat or meat preparation be raw or prepared for nan consumption, or as having been prepared under and of a product or products sanctioned by the orthodox Hebrew religious requirements; or falsely represents any food product or the contents or any package or container to be so constituted and prepared by having or permitting to be in-scribed thereon the word kosher in any language; or sells or ex-poses for sale in the same place of business both kosher and nonkosher meat or meat preparations, either raw or prepared for human consumption, who fails to indicate on his window signs and all dis-play advertising, in block letters at least four inches in height, kosher and non-kosher meat sold here; or who exposes for sale in any show window or place of business both kosher and non-kosher meat or meat preparations, either raw or prepared for human consumption, who fails to display over each kind of meat or meat prepa-rations so exposed a sign in block letters at least four inches in height reading kosher meat, or non-kosher meat, as the case may be, is guilty of a misdemeanor."

JERUSALEM, May 9.-The Jewish Agency today published figures giving the number of Arabs employed in the Jewish orange groves in Palestine.

The data, compiled at the end of February, shows that in 1,044 Jewish groves there were 6,800 Jewish and 4,548 Arab laborers.

To Bill Schorr the fact that he has officiated at the birth of one of the least serious efforts of the theatrical year is in no wise surprising. No more surprising, in-deed, than the fact that one of the earliest efforts of his professional career was the direction of "Six Characters in Search of an Au-Characters in Search of an Author." From Pirandello to prize fight comedy seems a long distance, but it is no more than a full fledged director should be able to take in his stride, says Mr. Schorr. Drama yesterday, farce today, and tragedy or whatever the theatrical future may hold for him, tomorrow-it is all in order, according to the young man who is the permanent director for those other two ambitious young men of the theatre, the Messrs.

Harmon and Ullman. Born in Russia

William Schorr was born in deep Russia, in a small town not far from Moscow. His father, a choolmaster, was one of very few Jews who were allowed to pursue such a profession under the old regime. The elder Schorr met his Waterloo, however, in the revolu-tion of 1905. Although he was only mildly radical, even for those days, he was thrown into prison, and only the heroic efforts of his wife made possible his escape. He fled, then, to the New World, and his family, including ten-year-old William, followed later.

The boy had had the beginning of a good European education in a government school at home. In New York he went to the public his Bachelor of schools, earned Arts degree at New York Univer-sity, and proceeded to attend almost every other form of higher educational institution in the city. He passed his bar examination without ever intending to practice law, went to the Beaux Arts without planning to become a painter or sculptor, and followed a gener-ally unconventional educational course which was nevertheless excellent background for his present

Always Near a Theatre During all this time he was nev-

er far from the theatre. At the age of twenty-five-he is now thirty-one—he had already directed a production of "The Dover Road" for Tom Van Dyke's Drama House Players at the Theatre Albert Premier in Paris. His next effort was to lease the Fifth Avenue Playhouse and stage a production there of "Green Fields," translated from the Yiddish of Perez Hirschbein. The critics, in a rare exploratory mood, journeyed to lower Fifth avenue to see it and pronounced it good, and it ran for forty or more performances. season's newest hit on their hands

Another experience during that period was that of co-directing with Leslie Howard. The play, "Out of the Blue Sky," was unfortunately short-lived. Special Correspondence) PRAGUE, May 13.—The Prager Mittag is publishing a series of articles on "The Spirit in the Medical Faculties," which it introduces with the words: Among the Prague specialists of all creeds there is a definite article of faith, that at forty one is too young to become a professor at a Prague Clinic; and at fifty one is too old; and between forty and fifty one i

"There are seven leaderless clinics of the medical faculty at the Prague German University," the paper proceeds, "and in these leaderless clinics impossible conditions obtain, which ought not to be allowed in the capital of the republic under the eyes of the central authorities, because they con-stitute a menace to the life and the health of the population. "The professors at the medical

faculty of the German University form a closed body, consistently keeping out our younger people.
An assistant can become a lecturer only when his Ordinarius presents him to the Ministry. But the professors will not advance assistants if they are Jews, and they propose German and Austrian young scholars who are adherents of the National Socialist teachings. If the Ministry rejects such a proposal, it is repeated, in the hope that the Ministry reserved in the hope that the Ministry will finally appeared. istry will finally agree. A gyn-aecologist like Professor Halban of Vienna is rejected because he is not 'racially pure.' At the Prague German University the anti-Semitic movement existed for years before the race madness became a Gov-ernment principle in Germany," the paper concludes, "and more atten-tion was paid to race protection than to the proper treatment of the sick and to medical research."

Persian Jews Flocking to Fold Of Bahaism for New Freedom

TEHERAN, Persia, May 1. -Persian Jewry, for centuries considered a "bulwark of staunch Judaism and the home of Jewish learning," is presenting today the strange spectacle of growing disloyalty to the Jewish faith, according to latest advices from all Jewish centers in the Kingdom of Persia, which indicate that Per-sian Jews are yielding in alarm-ing numbers to the lure of Bahaism, the new religion which has recently made its appearance in the Near East

the Near East.

It is estimated that the new religion has already attracted more than half of the Jewish population of Persia and the defec-tions persist. The rapid spread of Bahaism among Persian Jews is ascribed to two causes, the degrading position of Persian Jew to-day and a tendency on the part of many Persian Jews to mistake Bahaism for a new type of Juda-

Bahaism is an outgrowth Mohammedanism. It aims at a reform of the Shiite form of Islamprevalent in Persia, and among other tenets it condemns the Siite attitude toward non-believers, including Jews. It has been welcomed by Jews and other oppressed religious minorities with open arms, because of its progressive and tolerant views, its abolisom of the law of impurity of in County Probate Court. Similar strangers and its advocacy of the sums were left to other charitable principle that all men are leaves organizations

of the same tree. The new religion has come like an edict of toleration for the enslaved and persecuted Jews who could not go out into the streets when it rained for fear that the water might pass their impurity on to a true believer, whose money had to be washed before it went into the pocket of native tradesmen, and whose low economical and social position was due to the law of uncleanliness. Therefore, the Persian Jew flocks to the new religion, because he sees in it redemption.

The second factor, which wins Jewish adherents to Bahaism, is the close connection between the Bahai Movement and Palestine The Bahai prophets, Baha Allah, Abdul Baha, and Said Ali Mohammed, when expelled from Persia made their home in Haifa, Palestine, and the holy places of the Bahai religion are all in Palestine. This connection is merely accidental, for Bahai Allah might well have been exiled to any other part of the world, yet it is being util-ized as an effective argument among Persian Jews
