The Atlantic Monthly and Alexander Stavisky

ON MARCH 8 I wrote to the editor of The Atlantic Monthly and enclosed my editorial in which The Atlantic Monthly was criticized for referring to Alexander Stavisky as a Jew. In response to that communication, the following letter, dated March 13, came from the editor of The Atlantic Monthly:

"We do not understand that your article proves your case. If the Atlantic has been mistaken in stating that Stavisky was a Jew, we shall certainly make public apology. We have long since written to find out all the facts.

"We are not prejudiced against the Jews, as you can readily see, if you take the trouble to follow The Atlantic. Two recent articles, 'How the Jew Did It' and 'How the Jew Does It,' by Rabbi Milton Steinberg, seem to have met with much genuine commendation from amongst your people."

On March 20 I sent the following letter to Ellery Sedgwick, publisher of The Atlantic Monthly:

"I have your letter of March 13, in which you say that you do not understand that my article proves my case, and that if the Atlantic Monthly has been mistaken in stating that Stavisky was a Jew, you will make public denial."

"I regret that my editorial was not sufficiently clear to convince you. Perhaps I may be able to make this point clearer in my letter."

"The Atlantic Monthly article referred to Stavisky as a 'Polish Jew,' and gave his birthplace as Sobodka, near Kiev. Kiev is one of the oldest cities in Russia, thus Stavisky could not truthfully be described as a 'Polish Jew.'"

"It has been reported after an investigation by the New York weekly, Le Surs Partout, that Alexander Stavisky's mother had been converted from the Greek Orthodox faith to Catholicism, which some of the French newspapers reported for her conversion from Judaism. It was also revealed that Alexander Stavisky's father and grandfather were buried in Paris, in a Protestant cemetery. If Stavisky's grandparents and parents left the Jewish fold and became converted to Christianity, nothing more for their children were considered Jews, according to Jewish standards. Only according to Hitler's standard could father were classified as Jews, because he had a Jewish grandfurther. I suppose that since Stavisky's grandparents and father were embraced Christianity, Alexander Stavisky could truthfully be described as a Christian."

Turko-Jews Act to Gag Nazi Dogma

Hitler Journal, on Sale in Istanbul, Gives Rise to Protest

ISTANBUL, May 25.—The Jewish population of Turkey, alarmed at the increase in this country of anti-Jewish Nazi propaganda, has sent a delegation from the Jewish community board to Angora to protest against such propaganda and to urge that all possible measures be taken to end it.

The immediate cause for the action by the community was the appearance here of a Hitlerite journal entitled Milli Halklar. The pages of the publication are full of racial hatred and incitement against the Jewish people.

German Firm Advertiser
All the advertisements in Milli Halklar are of German firms in this city, and the effect of the whole has created disturbance. The general Turkish press, however, repudiates Nazi propaganda and asserts that the policies of the Turkish government are national and not racial in nature.

A recent case in point is an article in the newspaper Akcham, in which the writer declares, after enumerating the various countries.

Jail Polish Editor In Libel on Jews Nazi Who Faked Talmud Passages Also Loses Citizenship

KATOWICE, May 25.—Because he invented "quotations" from the Talmud to prove that the Jews were preparing for the annihilation of the Christian world, Edward Chownanski, editor of the Polish West Journal, Chownanski, today was sentenced to serve nine months prison term and to pay the costs of the trial and 200 zlotys in damages to the Jewish community board.

Chownanski's citizenship rights were also suspended, for a three-year period.

The verdict came after a two-day trial.

Predicts Industrialists of Reich Will Withdraw Aid of Nazis

"The world boycott of German-made goods is highly effective in England, and, according to reports received, very effective in other countries as well, Sir Robert Mond, Jewish industrialist and honorary president of the World Jewish Economic Federation, parent boycott organization, declared today upon his arrival from Europe on the liner Majestic.

Sir Robert, who is on his way to Toronto, Canada, where he is to receive an LL. D. degree from the University of Toronto, asserted that the boycott of Germany is causing the Nazi leaders an enormous amount of worry and predicted that within a short time the German industrialists who financed the Nazis in the hopes of smashing the German labor movement will withdraw their support.

Witness Strengthens Alibi of Accused in Arlosoroff Death

Forty-seven defense witnesses still remain to be called, he informed the court. Today marks the end of the fifth week of the trial.

Samuel's announcement was hailed with satisfaction by all those interested in the trial, since the extension of hot weather makes it difficult to carry on.

House Inquiry Seeks Evidence In Asheville

Sheriff Moves to Bring About Arrest of William D. Pelley

(Special to the J.D.B.)
ASHEVILLE, N. C., May 25.—A group of Congressional investigators are expected here tomorrow to investigate the activities of the Silver shirt organization. Immediate steps to arrest William Dudley Pelley, chief of the Silver Shirts, and extradite him to North Carolina, if he can be located, will be taken by the sheriff's office here, according to instructions issued by the Nineteenth Judicial District.

Pelley was indicted Wednesday on charges of violation and conspiracy to violate North Carolina "blue sky" laws.

As a result of the order signed yesterday by Judge Michael J. Schenck of Buncombe County Superior Court, records and correspondence of the Foundation for Christian Economics, Silver Shirts of America, Calahad Press and various affiliated and allied organizations were impounded in one room at the headquarters of the Silver Shirts and a guard placed over them.

The impounding order stated that the records were "necessary as evidence for the State, and that there is danger that such evidence will be removed from this jurisdiction or district."

It was understood that Federal agents would arrive here shortly to inspect the records.

Vladimir Jabotinsky Ill Of Influenza Attack

WARSAW, May 25.—Vladimir Jabotinsky, world leader of the Zionist Revisionists, is reported to be confined to his home here by an attack of influenza.

Nazis Make Their Most daring bid for power in German-American social circles in the history of the American Brown Shirts movement in America on Friday night when they arbitrarily "crashed" a meeting of the German-American Conference in an effort to place the important group under the control of the League of Friends of New Germany.

The meeting, called at Luchow's Restaurant at 140 East Fourteenth street, was attended not only by members of the organization but also by delegates from all Nazi organizations in the United States. Friends of New Germany, the DAWA (anti-Jewish boycotting society) and the United German Society.

Victor F. Ridder, German American and publisher of the New Yorker Staats-Zeitung, was expected to make a strong bid to retain power. For many years he has been president of the German American Conference. Dr. L. Oberdorfer, secretary to the Conference and an associate in business with Ridder, also was expected to try to maintain control. Bernard, Victor Ridder's brother, is also active in efforts to preserve the status quo of the conference.

Friday night's meeting is considered the most significant since Hitler's rise to power. Its importance lies in the influence of the German American Conference, which is the parent body of twenty-two other organizations.


20 Arrested; Jewish Shops Are Demolished in Fighting

WARSAW, May 25.—Anti-Semitic excesses which began at Cieszyn Tuesday evening and lasted into late Wednesday night were renewed last night, the Warsaw Courier reports today.

Twenty persons, many of them students and the rest members of other participating groups, have been arrested, the Courier says. A number of Jewish shops in a suburb of Cieszyn were demolished. "Exaggerated reports said that National Democratic sympathizers had attacked a Revisionist Brith Trumpelrod group in meeting, thus bringing about a street riot, following which the Endeks had made it a point to smash as many windows in Jewish houses as possible. Among the buildings thus discriminated against were the offices of the Zionist organization and two synagogues.

An investigation by the Katowice police is understood to be in progress.

OXFORD, England, May 25.—Professor Felix Frankfurter of Harvard University has returned to Oxford following a visit to Palestine.

While in the Holy Land Professor Frankfurter visited various factories and industrial enterprises, including the new seventy-five loom "Mesh" silk mill established by the Messrs. Sacks at Ramat Gan. The mill was transported from Paterson, New Jersey, to the Palestinian town with the aid of the New York and Tel Aviv bureaus of the American Economic Committee for Palestine.

The only comment Professor Frankfurter made on his return to Oxford was:

"I have not a thing to say, Sorry."

Professor Frankfurter is occupying the Eastman professorship at Oxford. He spent three weeks in Palestine.

"The point I wish to make in my editorial is that it is wrong for such a responsible magazine as The Atlantic Monthly to refer to the racial or religious origin of a criminal, especially when such reference is not based on facts. I have never seen it mentioned in The Atlantic Monthly or elsewhere that Samuel Insull is an American or British Christian, or that Ivar Kreuger was a Swedish Christian. It is therefore decidedly wrong on the part of The Atlantic Monthly to label Alexander Stavisky as a Polish Jew or a Jew, for he was not. His grandparents and parents had eliminated themselves and him from the Jewish fold long ago."

The June issue of The Atlantic Monthly, just out, contains the following editorial, "Note On Stavisky."
"At our request the author of

"The Stavisky Scandal" in the March issue has made every effort to establish the truth of Stavisky's racial origin. From France he reports:

"The statement that Stavisky was a Jew was made in an account which came into my hands. I think it was true, and so does everyone I have consulted. It is quite true that there is a cross on the grave of his parents in Paris, and Stavisky himself may well have been "born in the Christian faith," but I am thinking of race, not religion. I can not now definitely affirm that Stavisky was a Jew, or prove it, because I can not get access to conclusive evidence. Naturalization papers, and so forth, are confidential documents, and I have been refused access by the Ministry of Justice. Now that the whole affair is sub judice, the relevant dossier is not accessible."

"In any event I had no intention of reflecting unfavorably on the Jewish community as a whole, and sincerely regret that my article should have given rise to that impression."

"The Atlantic Monthly's "public denial" based upon the anonymous author's explanation is very weak. It is the first principle of good, conscientious journalists to secure the facts before writing and publishing an article, and not afterward. But the chief point is that a responsible publication is not justified in dragging in slanting references to the race or religion of a criminal, whether such criminal is a Jew, a Christian or a Mohammedan."

We do not doubt that the Atlantic Monthly is not prejudiced against the Jews. The integrity of its editor has been recognized for years. But in this instance a distinct wrong was committed in publishing unverified and misleading statements which are offensive to the Jews."

"All the news concerning Jew" is faithfully and promptly reported in the Jewish Daily Bulletin — the only Jewish daily newspaper printed in English.

Pertinent and Impertinent

It is surprising to find how few Jewish women's clubs there are in our city. I am not referring to charitable organizations, of which there are certainly a great number, but to women's social organizations. I am not giving my sanction now to a life of bridge and tea parties, but clubs on the order of the college type would certainly not interfere with any one's life to an alarming extent, and would probably offer an opportunity for pleasant recreation. Men manage to have their meeting places without devoting their lives to them.

Most of our young women are great potential athletes who spend the winter months moaning that they have no place to exercise, and complain over how dull it is walking in Central Park. An athletic club with squash courts, a gymnasium and a swimming pool would be just as useful to women as the city athletic club is to men. It would allow women to get their exercise in town instead of having to rush frantically to the country on the first mildly tepid day in spring. The amount of motor fuel thus saved would almost finance the swimming pool.

The money which they donate to the telephone company in search of the "fourth" would more amply pay for the telephone tables at the club. And think of the wear and tear on nervous glands by the happy knowledge that one has only to walk into the clubroom to find a bridge game waiting for one.

It should be fairly easy, in spite of the promised boom in real estate, to get a building suit such a purpose and yet not too expensive. If enough women became interested, the equipment might be managed little by little. Although it may seem ridiculous to be thinking of next winter when we are just entering upon a series of hot spells, still those of us who have come limping back from the club with muscles stiff and creaking from disuse may not find it too inopportune a moment to discuss keeping these muscles working after we've gotten them in tolerable shape over the summer.

The Stuermer Shows Nazism In Its True Colors, Says Editor

Dr. Georg Bernhard Urges Wide Distribution of the Ritual Murder Issue of Julius Streicher's Newspaper

Dr. Georg Bernhard, an outstanding journalist of the German Reich and former editor-in-chief of the *Vossische Zeitung*, is now an exile from Germany living in Paris, where he has written the following article:

May 1, holiday of German labor in the German Cultural Reich, found a special celebration in the "ritual murder" issue of the *Stuermer*, a weekly which Julius Streicher publishes in Nuremberg.

Streicher was originally a Jewish democrat. A democratic public school teacher in Nuremberg, he became a public agitator. In-coming against Jews with all the ways his speciality, and he always invented repugnant ways of doing it. His weekly, the *Stuermer*, served him simultaneously as an instrument of propaganda and exhortation. He was a constant guest in the courts of law, which gave him long-term sentences. Gradually he became inclined to assume, by way of excuse, that Streicher was the victim of those agonizing mental diseases which develop, on the part of Jewish mentality, as a mixture of paranoia, inclination towards pornographic activity and unbridled urge towards expression.

His weekly, *Men Covered* by Bavarian Franconia. As formerly, he is still publishing the weekly, the *Stuermer*, which yields him a monthly income of many thousands of marks. For every business man who does not wish to be mobbed, to be accused of Jewish origin or to be exposed to the Lynch laws must sell himself to the sadist National Socialist leader of Nuremberg. The "ritual murder" issue of this Streicher weekly is, essentially, no worse than the other issues of the paper. All the lies which have ever been told in the course of years by Streicher himself, and also by others, to the effect that the drinking of Christian blood is part of the Jewish religion or to be based here and illustrated by falsifying composite photographs. This defamation has no connection with the anti-Semitic theory of the Third Reich. It is a frontal attack against the Jewish religion and thus completes the filth which Streicher, Rosenberg and the Nazi hierarchy and their leaders have already hurled against Catholicism and Christendom generally.

Entirely to Complain to Hitler
The All-German Representative Body of German Jewry has brought charges against Julius Streicher, the editor of the Third Reich Adolph Hitler. To complain to the painter of Braunau against the Stretcher of Nuremberg is to complain against the devil to his grandmother. Adolph Hitler knows his friend Julius Streicher very well. He will only approve of him as long as he also sanctions everything which Julius Streicher

utters. For he has so often himself repeated these assertions in his own speeches.

The very fact that this paper continues its incitement to pogroms unmodified in Hitler Germany is proof enough of this. Attempts are made however, to conceal this abroad. Therefore it is forbidden to take it across the border of the Third Reich. And recently it was even forbidden to sell the *Stuermer* in Berlin, because too many foreigners could see it.

World Should See It
The "ritual murder" issue of the *Stuermer* should be distributed, millions of copies of it, in all the countries of the world. For this newspaper, and this special edition in particular, shows the true visage of German National Socialism and reveals the real soul of the German leader better than do his speeches advocating peace.

The proceeds of this will go towards the settlement of German Jewish refugee children in Palestine. The program will include the unaccompanied children, several playlets and a tribute in tableaux to Herzl. Mrs. B. F. Seidelman, leader of the Flatbush section of the Buds, is in charge of arrangements.

A victory banquet and ball will be held this evening by the Young Israel of Flatbush at its building on Avenue I and Coney Island avenue. Bloch's Sacred Service Music Hailed in Milan

Composer's Setting of Sabbath Ritual Gets European Premiere

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
MILAN, May 25.—A spirited outbreak greeted the production of Ernest Bloch's "Avodah Hakodesh" at the premiere of the symphonic season of the Scala di Milano.

Bloch himself conducted the "Sacred Service" which is a setting of the reformed Sabbath morning liturgy for baritone, chorus and orchestra. The performance marks the beginning of the new concert and opera season in European capitals.

The service was presented at Carnegie Hall, New York, on April 21, and was greeted by the American audience enthusiastically.

The purpose for composing this music was expressed by Bloch several weeks ago when he declared: "I wanted to express the wish that man may liberate himself from hate, prejudice, dark instincts, regression, all that lowers him from going forward, from rising above himself."

Bloch began work on the music in 1930, having been inspired by Gerald F. Warburg, son of Felix Warburg. The family of Jacob and Rosa Stern set aside a fund of \$100,000 to provide an income for the composer.

Bloch studied Hebrew and started the work in a little village in Switzerland. The work, completed in 1932, won immediate acclaim at its preliminary Rome performance.

Over \$200,000 Already Raised By Federation

Benefit Performance Today; Proceeds To Be Added to Fund

The Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities has received more than \$200,000 thus far in its \$500,000 twenty-fifth anniversary campaign. County Judge Algeron I. Nova, chairman of the drive, announced.

"We have had contributions in actual cash amounting to a total of \$204,370," said Judge Nova, "and I am gratified at the prospect of our complete success, although we face difficulty in completing the funds we must have to meet the minimum budgetary necessities of the twenty-five affiliated societies."

The Federation Women's Division tomorrow will enter the last half of its ten days' roll call, designed to add 10,000 contributors to the Federation campaign. Approximately 600 women in all sections of the borough are aiding in the endeavor, and Mrs. Nathan L. Goldstein, general chairman, said workers are well on their way to the halfway point. The final report meeting on the roll call will be held next Thursday from 12:30 to 1:30 P. M.

The Women's Division is sponsoring a benefit performance to day of Littman's Little Artists, who are to appear in revue at 2 P. M. at Union Temple Auditorium, 37 Eastern parkway, the proceeds to be added to the sums being raised by Federation Town, the children's "municipality" to aid the Brooklyn Federation campaign. More than one hundred children are taking part in the revue under direction of Miss Joan Hamilton. Services of the young performers have been donated by Morris Littman of Manhattan.

More than 800 children are expected to attend the performance this afternoon, including "citizens" of Federation Town who range in age from two to eighteen years, and the "city's" official

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board, headed by Daniel Karp, the sixteen-year-old mayor. Mrs. Isaac Meyer and Mrs. Meyer Goldstein are co-chairmen of Federation Town.

Jewish Colors And Swastika In One Parade

Procession Celebrates 100th Birthday of Toronto

(Special to the J.D.B.) TORONTO, Ont., May 25.—Hitler's swastika and the Jewish flag were carried in the first official parade celebrating Toronto's one hundredth birthday.

Thirty nations were represented in the parade, which was led by the governor-general of Canada and witnessed by 100,000 Toronto residents and others who had come out of town for the event.

The long line of march, flying the colors of all nations, proceeded to the "old fort," now known as York Fort. At City Hall Lieutenant Governor Bruce, prime minister of Ontario, reviewed the parade.

The Jewish paraders received considerable applause at various points along the route as they marched close behind the German group bearing the colors of Hitler's Reich.

Jews figure prominently in the traditions of Toronto, the Levy and Joseph families having settled here 117 years ago, seventeen years before the town of York became the city of Toronto.

Toronto Jews Mourn Death of Hertz Telson

(Special to the J.D.B.) TORONTO, Ont., May 25.—More than five hundred Jews here were present at the funeral for Hertz Telson, who was secretary of the Hebrew National Association, the Folks Verein. He died suddenly from a heart attack at the age of fifty.

He is survived by his widow and a son. He came to Toronto from Odessa, Russia, fifteen years ago.

Neistadt, Bernstein Elected by Socialists

(Special to the J.D.B.) BALTIMORE, Md., May 25.—At an election of State officers for the Socialist party, Dr. Samuel Neistadt, of Baltimore, was chosen secretary and Charles S. Bernstein, editor of the "Maryland Leader," the Socialist paper.

Joseph Cohen, C. M. L. A., will represent the Province of Quebec. This is the first time in the history of the B'nai B'rith Order that a district convention is being held in Montreal. It will continue for three days.

Special religious services will be held Saturday morning at the Shaar Hashomayim, Shaar Zion and Portage Synagogues.

Sunday morning's session will be followed by a luncheon for delegates. On Sunday evening the convention banquet and hall will take place. Joseph H. Dillon, C. M. L. A., member without portfolio in the Quebec Cabinet, will be a guest of honor. Richard E. Gaudin of Chicago, executive director of the anti-defamation League, will speak.

Toronto Alderman Charges Boycott

Victims, He Says, Are Those Who Sublet Israel Property to Jews

(Special to the J.D.B.) TORONTO, Ont., May 25.—Charging that a person "well known to the members of his committee" has organized a Gentile boycott against those who sublet leases on Toronto Island to Jews, Alderman J. J. Glass moved a meeting of City Council in Committee here that no more subletting be permitted without the committee's approval.

The alderman refused to divulge the name of the man to whom he referred, declaring:

"This individual told me he was without prejudice against members of the Jewish race. I think he even went so far as to make a statement to the press. Now he has gone underground and organized a body on the island to intimidate any person who sublets to a Jew."

The committee will call upon the person Glass spoke of to be present at the next meeting and answer the charges.

New Economic Group Formed in Germany

(I.T.A. Special Correspondence) BERLIN, May 17.—A new newspaper, the F. W. L. Company for the Promotion of Economic Interests (Forderung wirtschaftlicher Interessen), consisting of Jewish residents, or formerly resident in Germany, has started operations here.

The new organization, which is a limited company (G. m. b. H.), announces that it undertakes primarily the administration and valuation of property and other business appertaining to this class, services activities throughout the whole of Germany, with the aid of a network of correspondents and experts.

Jews in Maritime Provinces Of Canada Aid Zionist Cause

(Special to the J.D.B.)

HALIFAX, N. B., May 25.—Jewish communal life in the Maritime Provinces of Canada may be gauged by a review of the strength and position of the Jewish families who constitute part of the population of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Halifax, N. S., is represented with the largest Jewish unit, which numbers 170 families and 789 persons. Charles Zwering, who served as president of the local Jewish community, is also president of the local Zionist body and the branch of the Jewish Immigrant Aid Society. Among the active women's organizations is to be found the Ladies' Aid Society, which recently celebrated the 20th anniversary of its existence. Halifax contributed \$800 towards the recent United Palestine Appeal.

Gloucester, N. S., with a Jewish population of 85 families and 437 people, nearly half that of Halifax, surpassed the latter city with a contribution of \$1,000 toward the Palestine Appeal. Every family is listed among the contributors as well as its six organizations.

Sydney, N. S., has 55 Jewish families with about 200 souls and Whitney Pier, in the same province, 22 families with 60 souls. Both communities have contributed \$700 towards the Palestine Campaign.

A larger Jewish community is to be found in St. John, New Brunswick, which counts 150 families with 700 souls. It raised \$1,200 for the United Palestine Appeal. The president of the community is A. J. Garson, who was an alderman candidate in the recent municipal elections but failed to win.



"If the picture looks like something you wouldn't like in your home, then the critics say 'Good!'"

From Warsaw comes the story of a Jewish youth who sought to enlist in the Polish Army, as a way of proving his patriotism. There are Jews who are Polish patriots; if you don't think so, listen to Arthur Szyk, the Polish-Jewish artist, decanting on the subject, either in good Yiddish or bad English. Well, this young Jew, who has nothing to do with art or propaganda, offered his services to the Polish Army, through the regular channels, and was turned down. He appealed to the Ministry of War, and was turned down. He went to an even higher authority with his plea to be allowed to serve and was by the authority turned down beyond hope of appeal.

And the reason? Although he has lived in Poland since boyhood, perhaps blood, and apparently, can't become one. He is a stateless, a man without a country, one who came into Poland on a League of Nations (Nansen) passport, perhaps from Russia, perhaps from some other country. When Edward Everett Hale wrote his little book, "The Man Without a Country," the readers felt that the tragedy of the case was in direct ratio with its rarity. Now that Europe has tens of thousands of such without countries these cases cease to arouse the sense of pity. And the fact that caps the irony of this situation is that these men without countries had their status created as the result of a war fought for a set of purposes one of which was the self-determination of nationalities.

It seems silly to talk a man he can't serve the country which has given him hospitality because he hasn't the right piece of paper.

No Royalties to Germany

I HAVE received additional assurance from publishers who have brought out translations of authors proscribed by the Nazi regime to the effect that no royalties obtained from the sale of American editions are sent to Germany, presumably for the account of the author, but in effect, for the aggrandizement of the Third Reich. They have not hesitated to do this, to despoil Einstein and Feuchtwanger, and they would do likewise with the funds of others in their books.

It was Will Irwin who first threw into my minds the possibility that by buying translations of Feuchtwanger, Mann and others we were making unwitting contributions to the Nazi. According to him, the American publisher made his contract usually with the German publisher, to whom royalties are sent outside of Germany had to be sent. And when these royalties arrived in Berlin, or Munich, or Leipzig, they would go to them in some form or other who had already confiscated the bank deposits, books, homes and real estate of these

same persons, most of them, fortunately, refugees.

It was from The Viking Press I obtained assurance that ever since February, 1933, no sums due to Lion Feuchtwanger had been sent to anyone else but Lion Feuchtwanger. In answer to a subsequent inquiry concerning the American royalties earned by Stefan and Arnold Zweig and Alfred Döblin, I received the "blank statement" to the effect that "the exiled German authors whose books we publish are receiving the royalties that their books earn. In practically every important instance our contracts are directly with the author."

In response to my inquiry concerning the royalties of the American editions of Erich Maria Remarque, the Rhineland Catholic who is disliked by the Nazis because he is a pacifist, I received the following reply, from the Boston house of Little, Brown & Company:

"We secured the American rights of 'All Quiet on the Western Front' from the English publisher, who in turn secured them from the German publisher. Our contract for the next book, 'The Road Back' was made direct with the author."

In reply to an inquiry concerning the works of Emil Ludwig, the same publisher writes: "All our contracts for Ludwig's biographies have been made with the author or his agent."

All of this, taken together with Mr. Knopf's assurance made over the telephone that the royalties earned on the American editions of Thomas Mann go to Thomas Mann, should put to rest all the doubts raised by Mr. Irwin. Now, when you go to buy "Fowls" or "Luddebrooks" or "Lincoln" or a "Buddenopus" or "Marie Antoinette," you may do so with the knowledge that no part of your hard-earned money is going to the despoilers of these authors.

Creators of Literature

IT MUST be a Jewish plot. Every year an American committee selects three novels published in this country for translation into French, under the auspices

of the Femina group. From these three, a committee of Frenchmen, and perhaps women, too, selects one for the Prix Femina American. This selection and award is in addition to the honor conferred, once a year, upon a creative work published in England, often a novel, sometimes a poem.

This year the American committee, which is not at all Jewish, has selected for translation "Long Penetration" by MacKinlay Kantor; "Lamb in His Bosom," by Caroline Miller (the Pulitzer prize winner) and "The Unpossessed" by Tom Stoppard. Of these three novels, and all of their works of the creative imagination, half are Jewish. If you have three, you get one and a half. Now, the gentle reader may well ask, how do you reach that fraction in your estimate? Very simply, as I shall show.

Caroline Miller is not Jewish at all. Tom Stoppard is all-Jewish. And MacKinlay Kantor is half-Jewish, on his father's side. Proving that half of three authors are Jewish. So far as thematic material is concerned, there is nothing Jewish about Kantor's "Long Remember," which is a novel around the Battle of Gettysburg, while Miss Stoppard's novel is only incidentally Jewish in the extent that you cannot write a novel about New York intellectuals without having as one of your characters—and in this case one of the most colorful—Jewish.

From what I know of these books, it seems to me that the task of translating them into French will be fraught with more than ordinary difficulty.

American Jewish Congress Launches Chicago Drive

(Special to the J.D.B.) CHICAGO, May 25.—An intensive membership drive, aiming to reach all strata of local Jewry, has been launched by the Chicago Division of the American Jewish Congress. The campaign is headed by Leo H. Lovitz and S. E. Steinberg.

Dr. Bernstein to Discuss Immigration to Palestine

Dr. Simon Bernstein will discuss "Palestine Immigration from America" at a meeting Monday evening of the Theology Herald Society, a group of German-speaking Zionists affiliated with the Zionist Organization of America. The meeting will take place at the Central Jewish Institute, 125 East Eighty-fifth street.

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WASHINGTON

One of the reasons why the Federal Government has not yet announced expected changes in immigration policy to permit re-entry from prosecution in Germany and other countries to enter the United States under liberal conditions may be found in the recent nationwide agitation against letting down immigration here.

Some amendments to existing immigration laws are pending in Congress. These are present immigration laws and make them more flexible in their application to individual cases. This would be done without interfering with the intent of existing law.

The whole question of immigration legislation is being discussed by many and editorial expressions in the press of this country indicate that the only changes that would be generally tolerated would be those designed to permit re-entry in individual cases without any general letting down of the bars.

Because of the delicate situation, the Federal Government probably will take no immediate action toward facilitating entry of refugees into this country. One of the fears is that if such a move is made as an important step toward lifting the bars on immigration, this, it is thought, would kill the bill.

Of course such an interpretation would be a misinterpretation. The country's great injury would be done. For this reason, easing requirements to facilitate entry of refugees should not be expected before the present session of Congress adjourns.

Leavitt, secretary to the Connecticut Congressman, protested a recent talk over that station by Representative Louis D. McCadden of Pennsylvania, in which an attack was made on Jews.

Portions of the letter read: "Recently Representative McCadden of Pennsylvania addressed a radio station over your station, criticizing the present administration, and concentrating his attack on the supposed influence of public spirited Jews in this country."

"Disregarding for the moment the questionable basis for Mr. McCadden's criticism, his address, an invective against the Jews, is amazing to me, in that it was permitted to be broadcast over any radio station in this country."

"I, myself can understand how a station as prominent as WOL could disregard the libelous character of Mr. McCadden's address and permit it to be broadcast. I am aware that it is not always possible for station officials to edit programs before they are broadcast, but from my own experience none station official is cognizant of the general import of a program about to be given, and I am therefore surprised that the significance of Mr. McCadden's address upon your refusal to broadcast it."

"You must know that there is considerable agitation to curb the auto-development of radio, even to the extent of the industry under the control of the government, as is the case in many foreign countries."

"Yet, if attacks like Representative McCadden's are to be fostered through the connivance of our radio stations, how can we oppose the plans for strict supervision of radio programs?"

In her letter Miss Leavitt requested a reply from WOL officials. Instead of a reply she has received two telephone calls from subordinates, who offered excuses and explanations. Miss Leavitt insists that she must have a written reply from the station official. This has been promised her. When she receives it, that letter should make interesting reading.

Tired Doctors

Most plays are so short-lived that the cast never really gets warmed up to its work before the lights are sent to storage. It is only in exceptional cases that a production stays open over a long stretch. The producers then find it difficult to select a new play to declaim the same lines daily becomes a trifle maddening. And, by the way, the moving picture made from "Men in White" is scheduled to arrive in New York sometime in June. It has already been shown in various cities throughout the country and has met with gratifying success. Regardless of its appearance in this city the play will continue.

Stevador Pays Off

I love the way that they do things down at the Civic Republic Theatre where "Stevador" is playing. Last week the managers of this cooperative venture announced that they had made sufficient money to pay off the costs of production and that a profit was in the treasury which will be equally divided between the authors and the actors, a striking feature of the Theatre Union is that the organization can produce other plays. From now on the show is in the "black" and after cast salaries and house expenses are deducted the remainder will go to the cast and authors as bonuses. The Theatre Union is incorporated as a non-profit organization.

for support to all those forces in America who are interested in the development of the Jewish spirit."

Dr. Magnes, who has been in this country since April 30, was the guest of honor at the annual dinner of the board of governors and chairman of the council of the American Friends of the Hebrew University, during his stay in New York. Dr. Magnes is the associate chancellor, and S. Glanzberg, registrar, who accompanied Dr. Magnes to this country, will also return to Palestine shortly.

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Denmark's Chief Rabbi Tells Graphic Story of World Jewry

THE HISTORY OF THE JEWS
By Dr. M. Friediger, Chief Rabbi of Denmark. P. Haase & Son, Copenhagen, 1931.

EXACTLY one year ago, Christen X, of Denmark, together with other members of the royal family, attended the special service in the synagogue at Copenhagen in commemoration of the one hundredth anniversary of the establishment of that Jewish place of worship in the Danish capital.

Could anything emphasize more strikingly the good relations that exist between the Jews of Denmark and their gentle fellow-citizens, than this homage paid by the democratic ruler of the Danes to the father of his Jewish subjects? Of course, Danish Jews had long before 1833 occupied positions of trust and responsibility in the land of their adoption. But Nordic ancestry, to the contrary notwithstanding, not one breath of religious animosity has for years been directed in this country north of Germany, Scandinavia, including as it does the neighboring Norway and Sweden, against the Jews, and no religious intolerance and as one reads Dr. Friediger's great work, "The History of the Jews," nothing is so striking as the references in the points of view by the peoples of the Scandinavian north and some of the nations to the southward.

Only One Regret
Reading Chief Rabbi Friediger's monumental work there is only one regret to be expressed, namely, that the Danish edition commands a comparatively small audience, and that, therefore, the world at large is excluded from the masterly array of facts here assembled. It is, however, to be hoped that this void will be filled in the near future, so that speaking people will be afforded an opportunity to partake of a literary feast that makes this Jewish history the most important and further exemplification of the never-ending problem of Judaism in its contact with forces, both in the past and in the present, of a religious faith that, no matter what the obstacles in the way, persists in confounding intolerance and scepticism in many instances, and goes without saying that when race hatred and persecutions made conditions intolerable in Germany, they sought refuge in Denmark found that country a true home.

As Dr. Friediger sums up the situation today: "It must be the task of future historians to furnish a calm and just presentation, as well as a correct judgment, of that one thing which is already observable today, and may be put down as a fact,—within Jewry has been strengthened, and the Jewish people has been imbued with a spirit that shows itself when the need is greatest, and that history has allotted to the Jewish people, reveals only one more in the feeling of cohesion.

"All Jewish organizations that have the maintenance of Judaism as their basis have no other or a common purpose. It is to be hoped that the German Jews, who have furnished world-culture with such great wealth, will be able to bear their evil burden with true Jewish heroism until justice once more is victorious, and returns to them that which is rightly theirs, and to them loyal citizens."

The Purpose Indicated
In presenting his data in the customary chronological order where the history of whatever kind usually are concerned, Dr. Friediger nevertheless from the very first chapter, "The Return of the Jews from Babylon," has been endeavoring to show that this hope of deliverance of the Jews from

whatever depression may be their fate today is uppermost in his mind.

"At last came the hour of deliverance," he writes. "After fifty years of exile in hope and longing, and after once again to have been driven to their native soil. Shortly after his accession to the throne, Cyrus, in 536 B.C., issued a decree that permitted the Jews to return to Heaven, has given to me all the kingdoms of the earth, and he left me the task of building Him a house, and I am now here. He who you belong to Jerusalem and there build the house to the God of Israel. God be with you."

It was ever thus in the history of the Jews down the ages. Oppression, persecution, racial hatred, murder, and banishment required the Jews to come back to the country from where they were driven. Dr. Friediger does not pretend to reiterate what has been told in so many times before, except for the added purpose of giving his Scandinavian readers, for whom the book is written, a new and interesting, a connected story of Jewry through the centuries. But there are certain chapters which by their very content let in a new light on the Jewish people at the very top of the bibliography in question. Here he discusses "The Period of Enlightenment" and "The Equal Rights Question of the Jews," the Danish scholar touches pretty close to the issues of the hour, with Moses Mendelssohn leading the way and who, it is noted here, "was the first Jewish-German author who by reason of his ability and his irreproachable character, was recognized by the general public as one who could make himself as one with his environment's intellectual atmosphere, and produce a great effect in the world without being faithful toward his ancestral belief."

Events Tell the Story
Here, again, Dr. Friediger lets past events in Germany tell their own story when placed in juxtaposition with occurrences of the present. Not that German Jewry has been sailing from the time of Mendelssohn until the revolution of 1848 once more gave the Jews the country privileges heretofore denied them. It is here that Gabriel Riesser is here forever associated with the period when Germany had to take a back seat and Germany could not make a nation out of Frankfurt am Main with Riesser himself as vice-president of the gathering.

Here, writes Dr. Friediger, "the constitutional groundwork of the German people was laid, and in which paragraph 16 reads: 'The main law and the constitution of 1848 are in no manner touch any religious confession. This can in no way effect the duties of the citizen.'"

"It was the first time," adds Dr. Friediger, "that such a paragraph was included in the German main law and constitution. Actually this interpretation has been the ruling one in Germany."

The Grave Danger
In this respect to the Jews of continental Europe view with alarm the racial antagonism engendered against them in certain quarters in which the conditions are unfavorable to those rights which are theirs by virtue of constitutional law in the countries of the West. It is for this reason that Dr. Friediger dwells carefully on what has been transpiring in Germany since the coming of the third Reich, with the dire consequences to the Jewish population. In one chapter of his book, which virtually is a book in itself, the reader can follow the course of events in the history of the Jews into Hungary, Italy, England, Holland, Russia, Poland, Turkey, as the various questions concerning Jewish life in these countries are discussed. It is hardly necessary to point out which one of the countries

Among the Literati

A Discouraging Note
With the college term drawing to a close perturbed seniors are indulging in the natural pastime of deciding just what field of endeavor they will conquer. Unfortunately, since the stock and bond business has suffered a relapse and seems to be increasing, we must respect our serious minded young men and women cast hopeful eyes toward the publishing business. To them it seems to hold the simple answer to all their problems.

Nice Atmosphere
They picture a genteel atmosphere in a surrounding of cultured among books and authors. Here, they believe, is a chance to meet all the writers they are certain they can emulate. They also feel that their judgment of the suitability of a manuscript is infallible and that they have impeccable taste. All of which means that the publishers who are waiting for manuscripts will be over-run with youngsters who want to be editors or who will compromise if they are not offered a good deal of sitting quiet reading manuscripts at home for a small fee. I say six week because by then it becomes really warm and the new batch of graduates is likely to go away for the summer, promising themselves that in the Fall, refreshed, they will be in better shape to storm the citadels of literature.

Always Editors
It is obvious why these young people want to be editors but their field of actual duties is not so broad either. They believe that all an editor does is read manuscripts and tell authors how to write them. They argue that the work of an editor is taken up with proof-reading, which requires great presence and skill, correcting manuscripts and rewriting, in addition to being able to attract writers to his firm.

There Is Hope
Despite the sad and carping note of the preceding paragraph, there is room for young people in publishing. For girls the magic necessary to crash the gate is stenographic skill, and for boys the ability to handle wrapping paper and errands. They must also be willing to work for \$15.00 with the prospect ahead of earning as much as \$50.00 after three or four years.

mentioned above are living up to their agreement, and which are now being broken.

Like other historians dealing with the subject of Judaism, old and modern, Dr. Friediger makes his effort and Zionism his deep concern, and he has done so with complete sympathy with the great work of which Theodor Herzl was the inspiration. He also pays his respect to Chaim Weizmann, and what this energetic leader of modern Judaism is doing to perpetuate the Zionist structure of which Herzl laid the foundation. As for Scandinavia's contribution to the progress of Judaism in northern Europe, Chief Rabbi Friediger says, "I have taken the Jews into Dr. David Simonsen, his immediate predecessor in that office, whose scholarship won him renown far beyond the immediate borders of Denmark."

Without that intimate relationship that existed between these two devoted sons of Jews into their collaboration where all matters concerning their coreligionists were in question, it is difficult to believe that the Jews as a whole as the "History of the Jews" could ever have become a living fact. The Danish nation itself may well take credit to the fact that it fostered this literary performance which reaches beyond the boundaries of mere religion and becomes a human document applicable to thinking men everywhere.

Jewish Centers and Education Have Identical Aims—Soltes

Goldstein, Chaseman and Glucksman Also Address Convention

(Special to the J.D.B.)
ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 25.—The problems of the smaller city community center executives, the importance of greater cooperation between the community center and Jewish education, how the Jewish community of Harrisburg succeeded in effecting a complete union of all forces, these and allied topics today occupied the minds of the delegates attending the annual sessions of the community center executives' convention.

The convention was opened formally with a dinner last night when Moses H. Chaseman, president, Albany, presented his annual message. Joint sessions of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service for Jewish Education will take place tomorrow evening, with more than 300 delegates in attendance every part of the country in attendance.

Touching on the need for cooperation between Jewish centers and Jewish education, Dr. Mordecai Soltes, director of Jewish Extension, Philadelphia, Jewish Welfare Board, pointed out that the two are close allies in a common cause, though each naturally emphasizes the own aspect of the program designed to accomplish the same end. Both, he said, are directly and intensely interested in aiding in the rearing of a generation of American Jews who will be imbued with Jewish influences and endowed with Jewish personalities, who will be adequately motivated and equipped to participate actively in the Jewish life of their adopted group life, and to contribute toward its preservation and perpetuation.

Centers Assume Responsibility
 "Not only in their origin and guiding philosophy," Dr. Soltes declared, "is there a kinship between the Jewish school and the Jewish center, but in practice as well has there been evident in recent years a convergence of interests. Particularly striking has been the readiness of the center authorities in many communities to assume a share of the responsibility for formal Jewish education."

"Gratifying developments in the center field in the past few years," Dr. Soltes added, "have been the expansion and intensification of the Jewish school system. The program, the offering of courses for seniors and adults in the form of unit series and institutes of Jewish studies; the deepening of the intermediate level of seniors in Jewish problems and issues which has found expression in the conduct of mass youth functions and the organization of discussion groups at both of which the central themes considered were of current and vital Jewish interest."

Dr. Philip R. Goldstein, director, campaign department, of the Welfare Board, explained that where as differences in religious attitude may justify the maintenance of more than one religious institution, there is hardly a good reason for carrying on more than one program whether of cultural, social or physical activities. Besides the multiplicity of such activities, Dr. Goldstein, leads to the same standards; and the scramble for patronage results in budgeting difficulties. The pronounced tendency in the smaller communities toward the merging of cooperator forces is deserving of praise, he said.

Dr. Goldstein was also of the

opinion that the smaller community centers should have extended to them a larger measure of recognition and representation on important committees. By giving the leaders of smaller centers the sense of dignity that goes with the sense of belonging, the work in these communities will be powerfully stabilized and strengthened.

Dr. Kallen Attacks Social Work Structure

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 25.—Social workers comprise a class whose function it is to assist the constantly widening gape in the cracking status quo, said Dr. Horace M. Kallen of New York, who arrived at the Hotel St. Charles here to attend and address the National Conference of Jewish Social Work.

A new deal in social work is not likely, Dr. Kallen declared, so long as the "patron" system prevails and workers are afraid to speak out lest they lose their jobs, made possible by the wealthy. Only symptoms and not causes are treated, he maintained.

The necessary reorientation would take place, he said, "through the complete democratization of the social workers," who in addition to exercising free speech would fashion their attitude toward "clients" as doctors to their patients.

Theatre Man Repels Nazis' Bid in Newark

Franklin, Jew, Closes Down Place After Getting High Offer

NEWARK, N. J., May 25.—Sidney Franklin, Jewish owner of the Little Theatre here specializing in showing German films which were produced before the advent of the Nazi regime, revealed today to the Jewish Daily Bulletin that he has been approached by a representative of a German concern with a proposal to lease the show-house for displaying a pro-Nazi film, "God Bless Hitler."

PRAGUE, May 25.—The Pragerpresse, semi-official Czechoslovakian government newspaper, today expressed indignation that the German Nazi paper Fridtich should be freely circulated at Marienbad, leading resort of Czechoslovakia.

Professor Lessing, German Jewish refuge scholar and staunch opponent of German militarism, was assassinated by Nazi adherents. The assassination was widely hailed in Germany.
