Hitler and Disarmament

THE declaration of the American representative at the Disarmament Conference is clearly and unmistakably an expression of the sentiments of the American people on war and peace. America has learned from its experience in the World War that it can only lose from any entangling alliances with European powers whose policies are determined not only by greed for material gains but also by age-old rivalries and antagonisms.

The American stand regarding disarmament would save the conference and avert the war that is being feverishly prepared in Europe today, if the European nations were sincerely desirous of maintaining peace.

The stand of the Soviet Government, as outlined by Litvinoff, has undergone a change since his first plea for general disarmament several years ago. Now Soviet Russia advocates security first, and disarmament afterwards. This is, in a measure, along the lines of the French insistence on security as the paramount guarantee of the peace of Europe.

At the Disarmament Conference in Geneva, Maxim Litvinoff, the Soviet Commissary for Foreign Affairs, said: "The Disarmament Conference was called at a time when, to many, war seemed to be only a theoretical or historical possibility. Can the conference, now, see the conference close down completely and disappear without a trace?"

"Just now, at all times, when there is a most bloody war or, rather, a series of such wars overhangs every continent and the whole of humanity, there are few states which can consider themselves removed from such peril. It may affect some earlier, other later, but it is not to be escaped. . . . In the face of such danger no single state, if alive in the interest of self-preservation, has the right to wash its hands of responsibility and to refuse to participate in the settlement of the world by averting this terrible peril."

Before Maxim Litvinoff's dramatic proposal for security before disarmament, the chairman of the United States delegation at the Disarmament Conference, Norman H. Davis, presented in a striking address the American program for saving the disarmament conference this most crucial juncture. Among other things, Mr. Davis said: "The American Government earnestly and sincerely believes that only by following the path of disarmament can the peace and progress of the world and the national security of each country be truly promoted."

"Unfortunately, there is at present a distinct tendency in Europe toward the old policy of political alignments accompanied by military alliances."

Four Jews Suicides in 'Gay' Vienna

Poverty Causes Once Wealthy Austrians to Choose Death

VIENNA, May 30.—(Sulicides among the Jews of Vienna are increasing at a terrific rate as a result of the economic misery of the Jewish population.

Four Jews, all formerly well-to-do, were listed among the suicides of the last few days, a check-up revealed today.

A Jewish merchant and his wife, residents of what is considered the richest district of Vienna, committed suicide by inhaling gas.

Another Jewish merchant, a resident of the same district, also committed suicide, as did a sixty-eight-year-old Jewish doctor.

In every case, extreme poverty, now rampant in once-prosperous Jewish Vienna, was given as a reason for suicide.

Self-destruction is contrary to Jewish religious law, so that the mounting toll of suicides among the Jews here is regarded as an indication of the depth of desperation to which the Jews have been reduced.

Jewish Deputies Weigh Nara Peril

New Assaults Provoke Polish Parliament Club to Call Special Session

WARSAW, May 30.—The Jewish Deputies' Club in the Polish Parliament will hold a special session to consider the problem of Nara attacks on Jews, which are increasing.

The meeting, which will be held on June 5, will take place in the Krakau home of Deputy Rabbi Joshua Thon, who is ill and unable to travel to Warsaw for the meeting.

Nara assaults on individual Jews are increasing steadily in number. Newspapers all over Poland are filled with the names of injured Jews.

With impressive military ceremonies the graves of fourteen Jewish Revolutionary War patriots were honored yesterday afternoon at the cemetery of Congregation Shearith Israel, the oldest Jewish cemetery in the city, by members of the New York Lodge of the Jewish War Veterans, dressed in the regalia of the army, navy and marine forces, and the

troops of Fenimore Cooper Boy Scouts formed the honor guard. As Dr. Harold Korn, vice-president of the lodge, called out the name of a dead hero a youthful member of the boy scout troop stepped forward, placed a wreath at the foot of the grave, draped the flag, and then, as he accepted as a program of activity for the league.

Congressman Urges Christians to Take Immediate Action

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Representative Andrew L. Somers of New York in an interview today came out with a strong indictment against Nazi activities in the United States, advocating a counter-offensive against the forces of Hitler in this country.

"A threat to the foundations of American society," are the words in which Somers described the operations of Nazis here.

He expressed keen interest in organizing Christians for the purpose of shedding true light on Nazi propaganda activities in the United States and charged all Americans with responsibility of warding off the Nazi invasion of this country.

Burden on Jews
"To date the entire burden of countering Nazi propaganda has been met by the representative bodies of the Jews, who are the immediate victims of Hitlerism," Somers recently declared in an address.

Social Service Groups Ask for A New Deal

Committee Urges Improvements in Status of Its Workers

(Special to the J.T.B.)

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 30.—Following many hours of animated discussion, the joint committee of three Jewish social services and education organizations this afternoon went on record as advocating that boards of directors of social agencies recognize delegated representatives of the social work staffs in matters affecting the welfare of the employee group.

The groups meeting at the Hotel St. Charles are the National Conference of Jewish Social Service, the National Association of Jewish Center Executives and the National Council for Jewish Education.

Dr. Maurice Taylor, of Boston, chairman of the committee reported to the conference on the status of the Jewish social worker, also endorsed in principle the formation of membership associations of employees of social agencies, without endorsing the theory, tactics or methods which such organizations may develop.

Cast Doubt On Widow's Testimony

Oculist Discredits Mrs. Arlosoroff's Power of Identification

JERUSALEM, May 30.—Mrs. Arlosoroff declared Arabs had murdered her husband, while she was questioned immediately after the crime had been committed, defense witnesses testified today at the trial of Abraham Slavsky and Zvi Rosenblatt, revisionist Zionists accused of the slaying. Another witness offered testimony which indicated that the police trackers who identified the footprints at the scene of the murder were convinced they were not those of the accused.

The defense witnesses also assailed a declaration by Mrs. Arlosoroff that she had recognized the man who flashed a light on her husband just before he was shot. Expert evidence was introduced to prove that it would have been impossible for her to recognize the man who held the flashlight.

Agency Continues Loan Negotiations

\$500,000 Debt Fund in Course of Completion, Says Kaplan

JERUSALEM, May 30.—Negotiations for a loan undertaken by the Jewish Agency for Palestine have not been completed yet, Eliezer Kaplan, member of the executive committee of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

Reports current here yesterday said that a loan of \$500,000 had been negotiated with British and Palestinian bankers. The loan is to be used for the consolidation of Zionist debts.

"The Jewish Agency has been conducting negotiations for some time to obtain a loan for the purpose of consolidating debts," Kaplan declared. "The matter was decided upon at the last meeting of the Actions Committee in Jerusalem. During the past few weeks the negotiations have continued energetically. However, the loan has not been obtained as yet."

Paris to Honor Priest Who Spoke for Jews

10,000 in Plea; Colleges Here Aid in Boycott

Petition Against Purchase of Books, Supplies Made in Reich

With 10,000 students' signatures affixed to it, a petition urging educational institutions to refrain from buying books and supplies made in Germany will be presented today to the presidents and deans of New York colleges and universities, according to an announcement yesterday by Dr. Joseph Tenenbaum, chairman of the Boycott Committee of the American Jewish Congress.

Students of all faiths from nine local educational institutions have signed the petition, which was framed by the college division of the American Jewish Congress. Colleges represented by signers are St. John's University, Columbia, Barnard, Teachers' College, New York University, City College, Hunter College, Brooklyn College and Long Island University.

Students groups sponsoring the petition include the Inter-Faith Councils, Menorah Association and the Avukah.

The Boycott Committee of the American Jewish Congress will present a series of Saturday midday broadcasts on the boycott movement over Station WJLB. Dr. Tenenbaum also announced. The first broadcast will be given Saturday evening at 10:30 P. M., and speakers will be Jacob Chabin and Rabbi Nachman B. Ebin. A musical program will also be presented.

Sees Reich Ruled By 'Jungle' Sway

Dr. Dubovsky, Speaking Over Air, Urges Boycott as Tool to End Nazism

Nazi Germany is the most recent nation to subscribe to the fallacy that might makes right, Dr. Benjamin Dubovsky, member of the executive committee of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, declared last night over Station WJLB. Dr. Dubovsky urged support of the boycott of Nazi goods. "The atrocious and ruthless rulers of a once great and proud nation think they have discovered something new," the speaker said. "It is hard to recognize that in reality it is the law of the jungle."

"As long as the Nazis will be able to finance their army of atom-bombers, planes and propaganda," he continued, "they will be in a position to keep their stranglehold on the German nation, prepare for war and maintain the peace of the world. Stop the flow of foreign money to the Nazi coffers by means of the boycott and you paralyze the grip with which Hitlerian clutches the free life out of Germany."

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American Economic Committee Co-ordinates New Investments

Steady Stream of Inquiries, Chiefly From German Newcomers, Is Handled in Offices of Smoothly Functioning Organization in Tel Aviv

TEL AVIV, May 31.—When Jewish immigrants from Russia and Eastern Europe started streaming into America in the eighties, they came under conditions somewhat similar to those that now prevail in Eretz-Israel. There was an incipient "boom" in America fifty years ago, and almost anything to which industry and enterprise turned their hands seemed to offer rosy prospects. Jews got in on the ground floor, so to speak, when the edifices of American business were being reared.

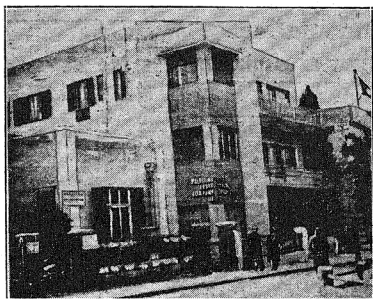
But there was this difference. In those days in America a "greenie" had more or less to depend upon his own acumen and organizing abilities in order to succeed. Nowadays the German Jew or Polish Jew or other newcomer finds investment opportunities, business openings and fields of endeavor more or less charted by rule of thumb, and can obtain free of charge the services of expert investment advisors to help him build up his new existence in Palestine.

The American Economic Committee for Palestine is the contemporary pioneer in this field of investment servicing. Directed locally by Rehabiah Lewin-Epstein, New

was to obviate duplication in the same spheres of industrial and other endeavor and we give the following passage from one of the committee's publications as an instance of what might happen without guidance:

"In its work of guiding 'capitalist-immigrants' the committee places great stress upon the necessity of the 'capitalist' to have a practical experience which can be used in Palestine. Capital flowing into Palestine without control by those who can put it to productive use on the basis of Diaspora experience can be a danger to the orderly economic development of Palestine. Such capital may cause inflation and speculation, and may create mythical values which can bring misfortune to the country and to many individuals. The committee is less interested in piling up records of totals of 'capitalist-immigrants' and of their aggregate possessions than it is in searching the record of the experience of the prospective settler for a practical basis for his settlement. The committee believes that in this process private misfortune can be prevented and the orderly and sound upbuilding of the country may be facilitated. . . .

must be on a sound footing to earn its way.

There is a general card-index of industries to apply to the bureau. Sixty-two per cent of all such applicants are German Jews and Jews from Mittel- and Ost-Europa. For example, of the 151 total applicants for the first quarter of 1933, seventy were from Germany out of seventy-one who called at the office. During the first quarter of 1934, there were 644 total inquiries, 461 persons calling in at the office, and 250 of these being from Germany. Again: during January to March, 1933, the aggregate capital reported by applicants on personal calls was \$206,908. In the same quarter of 1934, the capital represented by such personal applicants was \$1,023,300—almost a five-fold increase. Two hundred and forty-eight of the 1934 "capitalists" had funds of up to \$3,000 and sixty had from \$3,000 to \$5,000 each; whereas the previous year, forty-six had up to \$3,000 and sixteen from \$3,000 to \$5,000.

The totals for 1933 are impressive reading. Of the total number of 1,362 capitalist enquirers who called in at the office (an average of roughly five persons each working day—almost a steady state: 888 were from Germany, 125 from Poland, eighty-four from America, and eighty from Austria. They reported possessions of capital funds amounting to \$3,298,903, or roughly \$16,500,000, as available for investment. Of them, 1,022 declared they were interested in industry. Eight hundred and twenty-five had capital up to \$3,000 each and one hundred and eighty-eight from \$3,000 to \$5,000 each. The actual total inquiries amounted to 2,878, for in addition to the 1,362 potential investors, there were 124 seeking employment and 893 general inquiries by mail.

These figures are a most eloquent testimony, if such testimony were needed, of the real benefits that are being derived from the bureau. The spinner of the candlestick maker can be sure that all that carefully compiled information is devised with one aim—that of effort, and that he has his orientation in a new land so that he may obtain the maximum good.

Gone are the days of irresponsible, indiscriminate "greenhorn" ventures. The industrial or business newcomer is practically helped almost from the very day of his arrival. And that is how American business efficiency is putting orderly economic development in its proper sphere.

Community Child Program

A series of rapid and significant events involving important aspects of the general social and economic problems have been altering social work programs and have been forcing a reexamination of theories, programs and results. All of us are conscious of the changing atmosphere and the pressures to redirect our thinking which this involves. Basically two important developments are affecting our work, our purposes and our plans. In the first place, overwhelming social problems have been created which are distinctive of the present decade. These are not temporary problems that will disappear in time like a minor skin eruption. Vigorous social action of a progressive character is needed for their solution. In the second place, the sources of community action have been depended for solutions of former problems, primarily, the strength of voluntary philanthropy, cannot be indited to deal with these new problems. New sources of community strength must therefore be created. With a vague recognition of this fact we have been turning hopefully to governmental action programs, certain that we may find in it the requisite force for adequate action. The best that may be said is that government has taken on new responsibilities and is making some experimental beginnings. The outlines of a complete program are not yet apparent.

Intensified Factors
The social and economic factors which affect child welfare are not of recent origin. They have rather become intensified and extended to larger areas of the population. Long standards of living, diminished social resources and present and future uncertainties have involved an increasing number of children. The lack of economic resources for family growth, conditions which a large part of the population experiences, the inadequate programs for housing, recreation and the organization of health and medical services, the lacks in our educational program and the inadequate facilities for dealing with special handicaps, physical, psychological and intellectual, are common problems we practically all groups of the population.

It is misleading to consider the present situation as a "new" social reality for except in the sense that we apply the term program to varied organized and spontaneous activities which affect the welfare of children. If we are realistic we must admit that comprehensive planning for the welfare of all children is not implicit in our present form of social organization, neither for Jewish children nor for the welfare of the children in general. It is also obvious that if the needs in the general population are to be satisfactorily met by comprehensive programs extended to all children, the welfare of Jewish children in many important respects would be secured. Similarly the extent or degree of failure in general programs would detract from the welfare of any particular group.

Voluntary Effort Inadequate
The inadequacy of voluntary effort to deal with basic economic problems has been recognized. Voluntary philanthropy, long considered as the particular genius of American social welfare, has under the pressure of unmet needs

yielded to the public welfare principle. Where intelligent leadership prevails voluntarism is accepting the logic of circumstances and its failure, and promoting the development of governmental responsibility for meeting basic needs. There is in fact a general tendency to accept this change as socially desirable and to find for private philanthropy a position of continuing usefulness as part of the general attempt to secure social welfare, whatever may be the differences of opinion concerning the most satisfactory basis of alignment. There is hope but no real assurance that the insistent social and economic problems of our time will be solved. We must admit, however, that there is considerable validity in the fear that existing political and economic controls cannot be relied upon to inaugurate and carry through a satisfactory program of public welfare. But whether we anticipate success or failure of governmental action for social welfare, there exists little illusion that an alternative solution for our basic problems is possible within the capacity or interests of a form of social effort which depends on the voluntary contributions from individuals possessing surplus incomes. With some minor exceptions such a belief would be no less farfetched when applied to voluntary Jewish social action.

Before we can consider the most satisfactory type of alignment between voluntary Jewish effort and the existing or potential programs of community action, we must analyze the specific problems which are of importance to the Jewish group and which are not common to the total population or which may be inadequately provided for or remain uninvolved in measures which successfully deal with difficulties of other populations. There has been little illusion that there are specific Jewish problems. The more important of these may be stated as:

1. Specific economic difficulties and the lack of occupational adjustment which differ radically or at least present considerable variations from the economic problems of other groups.
2. The aspect of Jewish culture in relation to group survival and adjustment, and
3. The problems of religious and racial prejudices.

Jewish Education Costs

If school for the Jewish child, they must be lowered. To do so it may be necessary to devise a new school schedule and a functional curriculum which will provide for the Jewish child, the needs of the community and which will produce more adequate results, commensurate with prices paid. To broaden and strengthen Jewish education is essential, not only for the lay organization, primarily interested in fostering Jewish education, but created on a national basis.

There will have to be a clarification of the confused and disputed questions relating to the financing of Jewish education. If we are to provide for a planned program of activity for the Jewish community, the Federation, the synagogue and other interested groups must cooperate in a careful inventory of the needs of the Jewish schools. There is upon a division of responsibility for the various phases of the problem. The scope and content of the community program of Jewish education must be studied, evaluated and re-formulated. The amounts expended for Jewish education have, since 1930, decreased by more than one-third, and in some communities by more than one-half. Jewish education

has suffered, in some communities, a more drastic retrenchment than have other phases of Jewish community endeavor. The saving feature, however, is the recognition which is growing that, with the transfer of the major share of the burden of relief to public agencies, the Jewish communities will begin to devote more thought to the normal needs and interests of the growing generation.

payment and rentals that cannot provide adequate housing. This practice as related in thousands of evictions, unwholesome overcrowding, and occupancy of condemned houses.

Has not the social worker also unquestioningly carried out the policies in relation to CWA and work relief programs? Every client is expected to accept any work offered, regardless of his previous skill, or his attitudes. In the routine of administration, it has been impossible to individualize the giving of work. In some cases the aged, and the infirm, have been referred for work beyond their physical capacity and the white collar man has been practically forced to perform uncustomary manual labor.

In our bewilderment, we have turned to the government for a solution.

It is evident that no fundamental remedies have been proposed for the present time. We feel, therefore, that a system of insurance against insecurity is necessary, as an immediate aim pending more fundamental action. The United States little progress has been made in establishing insurance against unemployment. At the present time there are a number of bills pending in Congress. The two outstanding are the Wagner-Lewis and the Workers' Unemployment Compensation Act. Before evaluating these bills, let us consider the essentials of adequate social insurance.

1. The bill should be national in scope. As Mr. Lewis said at the Washington Conference of the A. A. S. W., "The economic basis for security can only be obtained on a national scope and local conditions are dependent upon and interrelated with a nation-wide economy."
2. The bill should provide for all workers. The professional, the laborer, the farmer and the domestic worker have all suffered from insecurity.
3. The bill should be non-contributory. The responsibility should fall on those who benefit from the profits of work. Security should be a legitimate charge against industry and the government.

Beneficiaries of unemployment insurance should not be required to contribute.

4. The bill should cover the full range of unemployment.
5. Compensation should be equal to the local wage levels. A full substitute for unemployment will maintain purchasing power.

The bill should be administered by the chosen representatives of the beneficiaries. According to Mary Van Kleeck of the Russell Sage Foundation, "It is almost inevitable that any political consideration or employer interests where these would be in conflict with the best interests of the unemployed."

Because we feel that the Workers' Unemployment and Social Insurance Bill would meet the immediate need for security under our individualistic order, we propose that social workers give it support.

Sigman's Widow Gives Him Gavel

CHICAGO, May 20.—Stirring scenes were enacted yesterday as the twenty-second annual convention of the International Ladies Garment Workers' Union opened in the Medinah Club.

David Dubinsky, president and general secretary-treasurer of the union, sought with emotion as he was handed an ivory gavel by the widow of Morris Sigman, late union leader. The gavel was given Sigman many years ago by Local 1 of the Pressers' Union.

Dubinsky briefly pledged himself to uphold the principles of the first owner of the gavel.

Austrian Refugee Hailed

Max Winter, refugee from Austria, Palestine and a former Socialist leader in Vienna, inspired rounds of applause in describing the fight made by workers and Socialists in the Austrian capital. He appealed for aid for the destitute Austrian children made orphans by recent Vienna warfare. His appeal ended in a high pitch of emotion as the kissed Dubinsky and brought the entire audience to its feet, singing the Internationale.

Italians sang their workers' song and in their native language described the persecution of Jews.

Martin Pletti, exiled Socialist leader from Berlin, introduced Norman Thomas, traditional Socialist candidate for the presidency and principal speaker at the affair.

Questions NRA

Thomas advised the workers not to depend on the NRA. He told them they must organize to obtain benefits under their own power.

Sol A. Rosenblatt, divisional administrator of the NRA, told the audience that NRA would advance the cause of Jews as well as was organized as the national manufacturers.

Dubinsky was given an oil portrait of himself by Isador Ingaler of New York as an expression of the esteem of the workers.

Dubinsky presented the financial report, which showed that in the past two years the organization had wiped out a debt of almost \$500,000 and had banked \$531,000 in cash.

Hotel and heard Mrs. Arlosoroff tell Police Officer Scharmeister that she suspected Arabs of the murder of her husband.

Scharmeister, who testified after Kupperstein, declared he was the first man to question Mrs. Arlosoroff after the murder. To his question, "Who were the murderers?" Mrs. Arlosoroff replied, "I think they were Arabs."

Professor Levensohn, formerly of Berlin, an expert oculist, declared that he testified that it was impossible to have seen the person who flashed a light in Dr. Arlosoroff's face. He declared he had experimented on a starved moonless night similar to the night on which the crime was committed and had ascertained that within a few feet red was seen as black. It would therefore have been impossible for Mrs. Arlosoroff to have seen the red signposts in Rosenblatt's coat or the pattern, Professor Levensohn said.

must not enroll members and then not know what to do with them. We must not live by fund-raising campaigns and consider that we have made friends. Mass meetings give inadequate returns for energy expended, campaigns do not always win souls."

Rabbi Wohl proposed the establishment of small intimate groups of enthusiasts in various cities, under the leadership of competent discussion leaders. He urged the training of selected groups of activists who would undertake systematic visits to homes in their localities. He pleaded for additional concentration on winning influential people and not "stuffed shirts and mere moulted men."

Goldie Myerson, of the Palestine Labor Delegation, said she disagreed with Rabbi Wohl and some of the other speakers who discussed his program. She maintained that what is needed was not "discussion circles" but circles from which work should be expected."

2,000 Members a Gain

Miss Myerson discounted the enthusiastic claims of those who predicted a membership of 15,000, 20,000 within a year, and said that the organization should and would be satisfied if it could bring into the fold between 2,000 and 3,000 recruits.

That Dr. Wohl's suggestions were "out of our reach" was asserted by Dr. Herman Seidel of Baltimore, who held that the organization should be organized in an organized and responsible campaign to counter the invasion of Hitler in this country."

"For eight years the Nazi party has made an effort to find a hold in the United States," Somers said. "During the last year, since the rise of Hitler to power, the Nazi movement in this country has enjoyed a degree of success. Since Hitler came into power the Hitler government has made a concerted effort to invade the United States by sending to our cities and towns thousands of secret service agents and by dumping upon our people millions of dollars worth of literature with the insidious object of stirring up racial discord similar to that which exists in Germany and with the ultimate objective of creating sympathy in America and making us forget the obligations that Germany still owes us."

Asks for Literature
Mary Sykrin expressed herself as favoring a program that "should build a body of literature." She stressed the need of a publications committee which would result in a "confederation" of all publications connected with the League for Polish Palestine.

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Among others who participated in a lively discussion of various points of the future program were Joseph W. Brown, Dr. Michael Wattenberg, Rose Stoloff, Dr. Michael Rooschvarg, Dr. Anna Mintz and S. Dongol.

In his summary of the arguments, Dr. Wohl disclaimed most of the sentiments attributed to him by other speakers. He particularly denied that he urged solely "the study group" as the only intellectual pursuit. He said that his idea was to emphasize the advisability "of talking privately" and thus bringing about the best results. "I believe the time has come for the Christian forces of the United States to recognize the danger of the Nazi movement and to unite for the purpose of conducting an organized and responsible campaign to counter the invasion of Hitler in this country."

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Hitler Espionage
In a withering indictment against the Nazi regime, he declared that "the Hitler government is seeking control of our public institutions and that it is conducting a widespread espionage system on the activities of the United States Government and a section of the population of this country."

Congressman Somers estimated the number of centers of the League of Friends of New Germany at "more than twenty" throughout the United States, and he described their "disciplinarians" as "storm troops wearing the uniform of the Nazi storm troops of Germany." He charged them with operating in the same manner as the brown shirts of Germany, and he described their function as "through methods of terrorization it has gained control of German organizations in this country and reorganized them as subsidiaries of Nazidom."

Among the more serious charges lodged by Somers against the Friends of New Germany is that of having sought "to set up units in the National Guard for the ultimate purpose of gaining control of our national defense forces."

Insidious Propaganda

"An attempt is being made to reach the Reserve Officers' Training Corps," he said. "Our lecture platforms, our universities and our schools have been deluged with ex-

Nazi Bid Stirs 2 Journalists To Fight Duel

Baptized Jews Quarrel Over Accepting Press Invitation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, May 20.—As a result of the recent visit of Jewish journalists to Berlin, upon the direct invitation of the Nazi government, two baptized Jews will fight a duel.

The invitation of the Nazi government was boycotted by Jewish newspapers and Jews by a number of baptized Jews who occupy important posts on non-Jewish papers.

Antoni Slonimski, a baptized Jewish journalist, who is descended from a distinguished family of Polish Jewish scholars, scornfully refused the Nazi invitation and sharply attacked another baptized Jewish writer for praising the Nazi regime.

"The Nazi espionage system has extended to private homes, and servant girls are pressed into service of their employers for the purpose of securing reprisals against relatives in Germany for any hostility to Nazidom," he concluded.
