On Memorial Day the graves of fourteen Jewish Revolutionary War patriots were decorated at the cemetery of the Congregation of Shearith Iscongregation of Shearth 18-rael, the oldest Jewish ceme-tery in New York City, at Chatham square near Oliver street. Dr. David de Sola Pool, Rabbi of the Spanish Portuguese Synagogue, conducted the services, and members of the Jewish War Veterans participated in the ceremony. Judge Myron Sulzberger, president of the New York Lodge of the B'nai B'rith, presided.

The Jews of America contributed their share of the upbuild-ing of America from the very beginning. Jews were identified with the discovery of America by Columbus. Jews fought for American Independence. They American Independence. They participated in the Civil War, in the Spanish American participated in the Civi War, in the Spanish American War and in the World War. They have played, and are now play-ing, a conspicuous part as Amer-icans devoted to the ideals of America, in time of peace.

The Nazi ingratitude to German The Nazi ingratitude to German Jewry, expressed in savage terms, is a severe blow to the pride and self-respect of the German patriots who worked and fought and died for their country, but it is also a severe blow to Germany itself. For by tts cruel ingratitude, Germany has humiliated itself and has eliminated itself from the famly of civilized nations.

The Jewish position is secure wherever democracy prevails. Under autocracy, or under dic-tatorship, the Jewish position depends upon the whims of the autocrats or dictators. Beneficient despots, for political and other motives, sometimes adopt a friendly attitude toward the Jews. In most instances, however, autocrats or dictators have made the Jews the scapegoats for their own governmental blunders and crimes. In Ger-many the Nazi dictatorship rose to power and is maintaining itself on an anti-Jewish program.

Austria Jews

In New Peril: Press Hostile

Anti-Semitic Campaign Breaks Out Anew: Fear Widespread

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, May 31.—A new antiSemitic campaign has broken out in Austria

Newspapers feature attacks on Jews and anti-Semitic meetings, which have been forbidden for some time, and are now in full swing again in Austrian cities and villages.

Neuigkeits Weltblatt, which is Neuigkeits Weltblatt, which is generally regarded as an organ of the Dollfuss regime, prominently featured an account of a large anti-Semitic meeting in Vienna, declaring that stormy applause greeted the remarks of one of the speakers, who demanded govern-ment cooperation in achieving "a celebration of liberation from the Jews, similar to the 1933 celebra-tion of liberation from the Turks. The speaker also was cheered when he demanded a strict numerus clausus for Jews in all walks of life and an inquiry into the citizenship rights of all East Eu-

cutzensarp rights of all East Eu-ropean naturalized Jews.

Vienna Jewry is particularly alarmed by the attacks because they are being countenanced by groups close to the Dolifuss regroups close to the Dollfuss re-gime. The fact that the anti-Sem-ites obtained permission to hold their meetings is regarded as par-ticularly significant in view of the fact that some time ago attempts of the anti-Semites to hold meet-ings were prohibited by the Dollfuss regime.

Drapery Trades Heads Judge May Points Out Disproportion Between Help and Population

Although Brooklyn has a larger Jewish population than Manhattan and the Bronx combined, only ten per cent. of money contributed by the Jews of Greater New York comes to Brooklyn, Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May declared last night in an appeal for aid for needy Brooklyn Jews. Judge May is pres-ident of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities.

His statement was issued in connection with the twenty-fifth an-niversary drive for \$500,000, now being conducted by the Federation. County Judge Algeron I. Nova is chairman of the campaign.

"The campaign has been marked by a considerable number of gen-erous contributions by Manhattan philanthropists," said Justice May philanthropists," said Justice May, "and we are very grateful for this aid. The logic of the situation should result in support of our philanthropic work without regard to county or borough lines."

Goldstein Finds Them Too Lax in Performing Marriages

"Indifference and delinquency" on the part of rabtis and civil authorities performing marriage ceremonies were blamed for breakdowns in Jewish family life by Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, associate rabbi of the Free Synagogue, speaking over station WNEW yes-terday afternoon. Dr. Goldstein spoke on a program sponsored by the School of the Jewish Woman. "These men forget that the mar-

riage license is no more than an riage license is no more than an authorization on the part of the state to perform the service," Rabbi Goldstein declared, "and that upon the rabbi even more than on the civil service there rests an ethical obligation. It is his duty to determine before per-forming a marriage service whether conditions are present which will make marriage and family life imnossible and lead to dissension and eventually to divorce."

In the case of suffering patients rom rural communities, they would be sent to this center in San Francisco, their cases diag-nosed, and the findings of the "jury" hurried back to their attending physicians in their own places of residence.

Identical With Nazis

The stormtroopers in this country call themselves O. D. or Ordnung Dienst, which they interpret to mean "ushers." They are dressed in uniforms almost identical with those of the stormtroopear with those of the soundtoopers of Germany. Their drills are precisely the same. It is understood that they are led for the most part by non-Americans. Schuster is not a citizen of this

country.

Kosher Foods Are In Great Demand

But Buyers Must Beware and Support Only Bona-Fide Dealers

There is a theory among some of our people that the word kosher of our people that the word Rossier means clean only, and therefore they may eat anything which is packed in sanitary packages and in accordance with the Pure Food and Drugs Acts. Nevertheless, everything which is clean is not Kosher, but truly that which is kosher should be clean and pure. Because the word kosher is on a shop window does not signify that the articles for sale in the shop are kosher.

Unquestionably a number of our co-religionists feel that any pure food products they purchase are satisfactory from their viewpoint, and undoubtedly they may be.

However, it would appear to be only fair to support manufacturers who produce foods in accordance with the Jewish Dietary laws. It helps to employ many of our co-religionists. As long as there are a large number of Jews who do care for kosher products, all should assist in this vital part of industry of Jewish life.

Kosher foods - those produced under rabbinical supervision --- are in continuous demand by Jews who in continuous demand by Jews who adhere to the observance of the traditional laws. Many Jewish families, while not observant in every respect, purchase kosher foods, as they maintain a kosher home. A great number of our Jewish people are not familiar with the requirements of kashruth, and are under the impression that any article displaying Hebrew lettering or the word "Kosher" is bona fide

In every age, the problems of Kosher food and supply have been serious matters to the Jewish public. The leading reasons for these hardships have been manifold, but speaking of the present time only, one could outline them as follows:

Turning from the general con-sideration of manufacturing, re-tailing and purchasing Kosher food to the practical end of Kashruth observance, i. e., observance of the Jewish dietary laws, one is confronted with what appears on the surface to be a chaotic condi-tion. The lack of confidence in tion. The lack of confidence in some of the established forms of Kashruth endeavor and method of supervision should be accounted to one reason. The frequent overcharging the price of products, and the hesitancy by some of the storekeepers to carry Kosher products because of a slight increase is another reason. Furthermore, there is the absence of a harmonious and cooperative spirit among the rabbis and their organizations.

The common cause of Kashruth, considered by many one of the most important pillars of Judaism and its survival, demands that truth in statement when Kashruth is involved should be absolutely correct. A generally accepted basis for judgment on the questions in-volved is lacking. Then there is a volved is lacking. Then there is a conflicting variety of organiza-tions striving to achieve proper observance, conveying to the lay-man an impression of unethical and otherwise unsound activity.

german Jews **Given Courses** In Re-Training

Most of the 6,069 Are Former Merchants and Shopkeepers

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, May 21.—At present
there are 6,069 Jews in Germany undergoing occupational struction, says a report by the Central Committee of German Jews for Aid and Construction. There are 1,282 in collective train-ing centres and 1,418 in individual training centres. The Hechalutz is providing for the occupational re-training of an additional 2,369 young Jews.

At present 2,738 are engaged in At present 2,738 are engaged in agricultural training, including 900 who have been placed by the Hechalutz in training centres abroad, with the assistance of the Jewish Central Committee for Aid and Construction.

One of Four from Berlin Of those who are undergoing oc-cupational reconstruction, 1,468, or about a quarter, come from Berlin, 659 men and 809 women.

Berlin, 659 men and our women.

Berlin provides a smaller contingent for agricultural training than the rest of the country, only 257, about seventeen per cent compared with fifty per cent in the rest of the country.

The majority of the men engaged

in occupational retraining were previously merchants and shop-keepers. Only forty-five were students and fifty-three belonged to the academic professions, showing that the problem of the academicians, which is otherwise important, does not play as im-portant a part in occupational reconstruction. The majority of the women, 331, used to be office workers, 119 were shop assistants

Women Work on Large Scale The further work of occupational reconstruction is envisaged on a large scale. In April, about 9,000 people will be brought into the reconstruction scheme. About 3,000 of them will be trained for commercial occupations, for experts are warning against an un-limited flow into the artisan and agricultural professions, and tak-ing account of the existing possibilities and aiming at the normal-ization of the occupational structure of the Jewish population, the commercial professions have been allotted a quota of one-third of

allotted a quota of one-third or the total.

Of the remaining 6,000, 3,500 will be placed in individual train-ing centres, 1,500 in collective centres and 1,000 in private

It is expected that 4,000 of the 9,000 young people who are to take up occupational retraining will themselves be able to pay he costs of their training, and he fellef work will have to find the relief work will have to find the funds for the other 5,000.

The occupational reconstruction work of the Central Committee work of the Central Committee required a sum of 370,000 marks during the last four months of 1983. The monthly need has al-ready risen by more than 100,000 marks, and will be still further increased after the new contin-gent has been brought into the A sum of 900,000 marks is therefore being budgeted for the reconstruction work during the first half year of 1934.

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) LONDON, May 21.—At last Hit-ler's claims of Nazi Germany's close kinship with the "Aryans," which have so far always been dismissed with ridicule by the outside world, have found a distinguished defender in Lewellyn Powys, billiant English writer, who agrees that at least the actions of Hillor's Germany show very close kinship to the crudities of the original "Aryans," those primitive barbarians who invaded India 5,000 years ago

"The way of the Aryans" is the way of the Nazis of today, Powys declared.

Here are a few of the striking parallels which he draws in the English Weekly between the Nazi Germans' "Aryanism" and the or-iginal Aryans as described in India's sacred book of the Veddas: "Barbarous Way"

"From the beginning the proud Aryan way has been a base, bar-barous way, a way definitely opposed to every lofty conception of civilization.

"The Arvans have always been 'wrong-headed.' To be known as unparalleled killers before the terror-stricken populations of the world is the reputation they prize. They have been a race of destroy ers, reaping where they have not sown, estimating their success by the quantity of land they have ap-propriated, a race of rank herds-men smelling of sour milk and

cow dung.
"In the Laws of Manu, which is probably the earliest written script to embody their effrontery, we see embody their enrontery, we see Aryans for what they are, heavy rationalizing of the ahmans is identical with the Brohmone heavy rationalizing of Hitler. Their

istocrats associate their low-born love of action, their predatory prowess, and impulses of cruelty, with that most hoary of all prevarications, the moral order the Universe:

"If a man of one birth assaults one of the twice-born castes with virulent words, he ought to have his tongue cut. If he makes mention in an insulting manner of the name and caste, a red-hot rod ten thumbjoints long should be thrust into his mouth. . If a low-born man endeavors to sit down by the side of a high-born man . . king may cause his backside to be cut off. . .

"'Day and night should women be kept by the male members of the family in a state of depend-

"It was part of the approved morality of the Aryan to treat the original inhabitants of India abominably. 'On killing a cat, or abominatoly. On killing a cat, or a frog, a dog, a lizard, an owl or a crow, he (an Aryan) should practice the observance (ordered for) killing a Cudra (low-caste person).

"The Brahmans may be taken as prototypes of Hitler's favored crew; the Kshatriya as prototypes of the sabre-rattlers of the fu-ture; the Valcya as prototypes of the merchants and yeomen of the Fatherland; the Cudra the prototypes of the deluded German working class, oppressed and exploited.

BERLIN, May 20.—Directors of
the Economic Aid Department of the Berlin Jewish Community, Dr. Bruno Woyda and Herr S. Adler-Rudel, reported on the work of the Department during the past year, at a meeting held here of representatives of the Community institutions, the Rabbinate and of workers in the Economic Aid Department.

The president of the Berlin Jew-ish Community, Heinrich Stahl, who presided, explained that the purpose of the meeting was to review the work accomplished till now in the field of economic aid and to announce future plans. "They had found it necessary,"

he said, "to make a sharp line of demarcation between the activity of the Economic Aid Department and that of the Welfare Office of the Community, which had previ-ously carried out some of the work. In the economic aid, in contradic-tion to the usual welfare work, they were dealing only with new tasks which had arisen out of the conditions of the present time. It was not intended to carry on w fare work, but to protect in-secure livelihoods and keep them from breaking down. This is a vital task of the Community, for the

immigration.

There is a fear among govern-ment officials that if Denmark shows itself more favorable in the matter of opening its doors to the refugees, the possibility exists that a great wave of exiles might swarm into the country. This is a situation which Denmark will of course not relish. It is hoped that an international agreement among the refugees will eventually be

In a Fool's Paradise

The Nazi Minister of Justice. Hang Frank, at a luncheon of the American Chamber of Commerce in Berlin, declared that no boycott will force Germany to her knees and that the world might as well make up its mind that it is no longer dealing with the Germany of Versailles. And then he said to the Berlin American Chamber of Commerce:

"I am glad to say that the boycott in the United States is the work of the American people and it is my duty to help American authorities to break this boycott insanity." Hamilton Fish Armstrong,

Hamilton Fish Armstrong, editor of the Foreign Affairs, one of the foremost American publicists and students of European affairs, who has recently returned from a visit to the capitals of Europe, including Berlin, writes in his latest series of articles appearing in the Herald Tribune:

"The financial and economic situation (of Germany) is catastrophic, and for a simple reason. Germany must buy abroad a great part of the raw materials which she converts into exportable manufactured goods. But the racial policy of the Nazis, and their treatment of socialists, republicans and lib-erals of every variety, has been repugnant to people all over the world. Wherever Nazi policy has been understood in its essential aspects — wherever, namely, there is freedom of thought, speech and judgment, the real fruits of liberty—men have spontaneously given ex-pression to their feelings by re-fusing to buy German goods and German services whenever others are available. This antipathy for everything German is far from being the result solely of organized boycotts by Jewish organizations, though obviously. these have been effective. It has arisen because the violation of Jewish rights and of civilized standards of equity and fair play has outraged not merely Jews but all Christians also."

Sir Robert Mond, chairman of the British boycott committee, now on a visit in this country, at a conference with Samuel Untermyer, president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, declared:

With less than one per cent of Jews in the world popula-tion, less than three per cent of them in the population of the United States, and less than one-quarter of one per cent in Great Britain, no such inroads been possible, even if every Jew in the world were an active boycotter. It is a stupendous up-rising of outraged humanity the world over, irrespective of race or creed."

The sooner the Germans commence to realize that the moral material boycott against German goods and services is not merely the work of the Jews, but that it is supported also by world public opinion, the better it will be for Germany. The ruinous consequences of the moral and material anti-German boycott cannot be explained away by such speeches as the Nazi Minister of Justice made before the American Chamber of Commerce. The Nazi rulers live in a fool's paradise, if they imagine they can hoodwink the entire world as they are hood-winking the German people. Their misdeeds continue to shock civilized people everywhere. And the German people are paying the heavy penalty for having enthroned Hitlerism and all the evils it embodies.

Little Man, So What?

Not since they made "All Quiet on the Western Front" have the gentlemen who control the destinies of Universal Pictures indulged in so unrestrained a ballyhoo in announcing the arrival of a new picture. The occasion for this ex-uberance was the opening at the Radio City Music Hall last eve-ning, of "Little Man, What Now?"

In the realistic novel by the German, Hans Fallada, from which the picture was adapted, the author drew in bold strokes the story of a typical lower middle-clas young German couple, married and about to have a baby who are brought face to face with the economic problems of post-war Ger With skill and intelligence the author traces the gradual degradation of this couple who fi are crushed by a system which makes no provision for their kind. First, the man loses his job because he will not marry his boss's daughter; then, after his wife appeals to his step-mother, whom he despises, for another position, he finds himself installed as a salesman in a large Berlin cloth-ing store but he cannot make his sales quota and is finally dismis His benefactor, a friend of his stepmother's, has been sent to

prison and there is no one to wh prison shit there is no one that of a neat white collar worker to that of a day laborer has its effect on his outlook on life but he insists upon retaining his bourgeois ideals and he still shuns the radicals. One day, while innocently watching a demonstration of workers he is struck down by the police who are attempting to break up the meeting. He then realizes that ne nas fallen from the white collar class and the thought fills him with dread: only the faith of his wife who goes out to work by the day, saves him from becoming a social saves him from becoming a social outcast. He was a young man who wanted nothing more than the right to work and live modestly, but the march of events finally just what he is trying to be. Mos of the time he is just an actor. breaks him completely and the book ends on this note of hopelessness and leaves the implication that the only hope for men of this type is to become class con-scious and join a workers' movement. Film Dodges the Issue

As Fallada wrote it, "Little Man, What Now?" was a sincere, simple, meaningful story. In it was material for a real film, a film , one that would make ink. Universal dodged people think. the issues in typical movie style. Instead of setting forth a thought provoking film they have turned out a flabby, slow moving, dull,

sentimental picture.

If the idea behind the book frightened the timid executives of Universal City the least they might Universal City the least they might have done was to have an entirely new plot written around the title. Certainly after one reading they knew what they were getting. To make things worse they followed with some slavishness the original plot of the story, and incidentally the most unimportant feature of the book.

Where the West Coast picture makers fell down was in the interpretation of the spirit of the book. Instead of showing that the couple realized their position was a hope-less one and certainly the things

that happen to them would convince 2 low grade moron, a last minute scene is interjected wherein one of our hero's old compan-ions climbs into the attic a few hours after the baby is born and announces that he has a job for our then pretty down-hearted hero. Another closing bit shows the same hero, now without a white collar in dirty workman coat and cap, vowing over his newly born haby that he will fight for the youngster's right to live.

The picture asks a question "Lit-tle Man, What Now?" and then answers it with a "Yes," "Per-haps," "Hope Springs Eternal," "Maybe," "All is for the best," and about everything else indefinite except "Love and Kisses."

Missed Greatness

I feel strongly about "Little Man, What Now?" not because it is a bad picture but because it might easily have been a great film, the first of its kind to point out that not necessarily by hon-esty, industry and hope do men persevere. One of these days some unkind person will break "story conference" at Hollywood and point out that there few people around who although they obeyed all the rules as set down in the books, still never got anywhere.

Some Virtues
"Little Man," as Universal conceived it is not entirely without

virtues. In spots the dialogue is good and some of the shots, especially the scene showing the actor walking into the clothing store and trying on all the clothes just to rehearse a part, are unusually tell-ing. Margaret Sullavan as Mrs Pinenberg has a cute but not coy air about her and although she is surprisingly agilc for a woman about to have a baby, manages to remain convincing. Douglas Montgomery as Pinenberg is much and handsome for too suave role of a timid clerk. He emotes much too readily. He never does seem able to make up his mind
