## American Jewish Patriots

On Memorial Day the graves of fourteen Jewish Revolutionary War patriots were decorated at the cemetery of the Congregation of Shearith Israel, the oldest Jewish cemetery in New York City, at Chatham square near Oliver street. Dr. David de Sola Pool, Rabbi of the Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue, conducted the services, and members of the Jewish War Veterans participated in the ceremony. Judge Myron Sulzberger, president of the New York Times, and the Hon. E. B. Rish, president of the

The Jews of America contributed their share of the upbuilding of America from the very beginning. Jews were identified with the discovery of America by Columbus. Jews fought for American Independence. They participated in the Civil War, in the Spanish American War and in the World War. They have played, and are now playing, a conspicuous part as Americans devoted to the ideals of America, in time of peace.

Wherever the Jews have settled, they have adapted themselves to the environment of their new homes, have served their adopted lands loyally and have helped to build up those lands materially and culturally. In Germany, they aided in building up German commerce and industry, and made lasting contributions to the intellectual achievements of America. Many of our "out-Germans" are German themselves in their devotion to their "Fatherland." The Nazi ingratitudes to German Jews, expressed in savage terms, is a severe blow to the pride and self-respect of the German patriots who worked and fought and died for their country, but it is also a severe blow to Germany itself. For by its cruel ingratitude, Germany has humiliated itself and has eliminated itself from the family of civilized nations.

The Jewish position is secure wherever democracy prevails. Under autocracy, or under dictatorship, the Jewish position depends upon the whims of the autocrats or dictators. Beneficent despots, for political and other motives, sometimes adopt a friendly attitude toward the Jews. In most instances, however, autocrats or dictators have made the Jews the scapegoats for their own government's blunders and crimes. In Germany the Nazi dictatorship rose to power and is maintaining itself on the Jewish position.

The Jewish position is bound up with the demagogues of the world. Wherever there is liberty, wherever there is justice, the Jews have the same rights and obligations as the rest of the population.

## Gobs and Gobs and Gobs, But Not Many Jews Among Them

Either Jews are susceptible to sea-sickness or they have no desire to see the world. When the United States fleet steamed up the Hudson River yesterday, there were only 250 none of a total of 35,000 tars aboard.

Jews apparently prefer the army. In that branch of service the Jewish average is one and one half per cent, according to Isadore Abelson, director of Army and Navy Activities for the Jewish Welfare Board. He could only shake his head when he was asked to explain these figures.

A Jewish Welfare Board representative was on hand to welcome the Jewish gobs. Simon Barchak, New York representative, had spent two days contacting the Y. M. H. A. and the Jewish Com-

munity Center. As a result, the sailors were received with this pomp of admirals and told these were theirs for the duration of the fleet's stay in New York.

Services for the officers and men of the fleet will be held this afternoon and tomorrow at Temple Emanuel-EI, 1 East 51st-street.

Practically all the Jewish sailors hail from this city. "Yes, sir," the consensus of opinion was, "it's all right to see the world, but they can't serve home-made 'latkes' on board."

There are no Jewish chaplains in the fleet, because under a navy regulation chaplains are chosen according to the representation of the various denominations in the navy. But while aboard ship, Gentile chaplains conduct Jewish services on all important Jewish holidays.

## Experts Plan Close Scrutiny Of Biro-Bidjan

Americans Will Leave for Summer Study Tour and Report

A delegation of American technicians and scientists will leave for Biro-Bidjan, the Soviet Russian this summer to make a survey of Biro-Bidjan, the Russian Jewish autonomous state, it was announced yesterday by Edward Aronow, member of the American Committee for Settling German Jewish Refugees in the U.S.S.R., at a press luncheon at the Hotel Claridge. If their report is favorable, the committee will launch a drive for funds to settle Jewish refugees on the land there, Mr. Aronow announced.

Although no non-Russian Jews are at present permitted to settle in Biro-Bidjan, it is expected that the Soviet government will permit Jews from other lands to enter (Continued on Page Eight)

## Jews in Budapest Move for Reform

New Intellectual Group Asks Bare-Headed Services, Less Hebrew

BUDAPEST, May 31.—Reformers of Jewish religious services were demanded today by a newly formed group of Jewish intellectuals calling themselves "Jesajas." The group submitted a memorandum to the Jewish community of Budapest, which is an officially recognized government institution, asking sanction of reforms. They demand curtailment of the use of Hebrew in services common to men and women and hatless worship.

## Jew Appointed To Roosevelt's Under - Cabinet

A. J. Altmeyer Awaits Senate Confirmation of Labor Post

MADISON, Wis., May 31.—Positive news of the appointment of A. J. Altmeyer as Assistant Secretary of Labor in President Roosevelt's under-cabinet was received here today, confirming early reports and rumors. Altmeyer, who still holds his official position as secretary of the Wisconsin State Industrial Commission, will resign his post here if his cabinet appointment is confirmed by the United States Senate, he declared today.

Altmeyer's appointment to the Labor Department post culminates a swift sweep upward from the ranks of New Deal administrators. A short time ago the new Assistant Secretary of Labor had occupied a post of very minor importance in NRA officialdom. Altmeyer is usually considered as belonging to the LaFollette Progressive faction in state politics here.

## Report Notes Palestine Boom But Fears Future Speculation

A survey of Palestine's economic development, contained in the seventh annual report of the Palestine Economic Corporation as made public yesterday by Bernard Bessner, chairman of the board of the corporation, indicates rapid economic progress in most of the statistics for the past year. The report points out, however, that economic expansion has "brought in its wake certain undesirable speculative elements." Property values in certain sections have shot up, and credit expansion has to some extent been encouraged. The agricultural colonies have been affected seriously by

## Widow Picked In Line-Up, Arab Testifies

Arlosoroff Trial Judge Questions Policeman, Witness Yesterday

JERUSALEM, May 31.—Police Officer Scharmeier, who yesterday testified that the widow of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff told him her husband had been shot by Arabs, was closely questioned today by presiding Judge Corrie as to his reasons for not having immediately reported the conversation to his superiors. Judge Corrie seemed particularly eager to ascertain why Scharmeier, the first policeman to see Mrs. Arlosoroff after the murder, failed to record the conversation in his police diary.

Scharmeier replied he was in multi and carried no diary. Suleman Movakent, an Arab testified Mrs. Arlosoroff picked him out as a suspect during an identification parade at police headquarters.

Efraim Eliezer stated he too was picked out by Mrs. Arlosoroff as a possible suspect. Corporal Mordecai Meiri testified Police Tracker Abu Ruz told him it was impossible that Abraham Stavsky and Zvi Rosenblatt, 27, 282 of whom were Jews, could have killed Dr. Arlosoroff.

## Austria Jews In New Peril; Press Hostile

Anti-Semitic Campaign Breaks Out Anew; Fear Widespread

VIENNA, May 31.—A new anti-Semitic campaign has broken out in Austria.

Newspapers feature attacks on Jews and anti-Semitic slogans, which have been forbidden for some time, and are now in full swing again in Austrian cities and villages.

Neuigkeiten Weltblatt, which is generally regarded as an organ of the Dollfuss regime, prominently featured an account of a large anti-Semitic meeting in Vienna, declaring that stormy applause greeted the remarks of one of the speakers, who demanded government cooperation in achieving "a celebration of liberation from the Jews, similar to the 1933 celebration of liberation from the Turks." The speaker also was cheered when he demanded a strict number clause for Jews in all walks of life and an inquiry into the citizenship rights of all East European naturalized Jews.

Vienna Jewry is particularly alarmed by the attacks because they are being countenanced by groups close to the Dollfuss regime. The fact that the anti-Semites obtained permission to hold their meetings is regarded as particularly significant in view of the fact that some time ago attempts of the anti-Semites to hold meetings were prohibited by the Dollfuss regime.

## Report on Conditions In Palestine Submitted To League Commission

GENEVA, May 31.—John Hattin Hall, Chief Secretary of the government of Palestine, gave a detailed account of the present situation in Palestine when recapitulating the annual report of the Mandatory Power, delivered to the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations. After listening to his account members of the Mandates Commission questioned him closely on the makeup of the Arab Executive previous to the October riots.

## Liberal Stand on Jews Brings Expulsion for Heidelberg Students

HEIDELBERG, May 31.—Vandalla, Heidelberg student corps, was today expelled from the Federation of Heidelberg student societies and from two general universities in Germany. Student groups on the ground that the Vandalla group has "consistently refused to oust Jewish students, and those of Jewish descent." At the same time university authorities announced that in the future no student of Heidelberg would be allowed to join the Vandalla society.

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# Manhattan Aid For Brooklyn's Drive Is Urged

## Judge May Points Out Disproportion Between Help and Population

Although Brooklyn has a larger Jewish population than Manhattan and the Bronx combined, the ten per cent of money contributed by the Jews of Greater New York comes to Brooklyn, Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May declared last night in an appeal for aid for the Brooklyn Jews. Judge May is president of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities.

His statement was issued in connection with the twenty-fifth anniversary drive for \$300,000, now being conducted by the Federation. County Judge Algoner I. Nova is chairman of the campaign.

"The campaign has been marked by a considerable number of generous contributions by Manhattan philanthropists," said Justice Mitchell May, and we are very grateful to them. "The appeal for aid for the situation should result in support of our philanthropic work without regard to county or borough lines."

# Blames Rabbis In Breakdown Of Home Life

## Goldstein Finds Them Too Lax In Performing Marriages

"Indifference and delinquency" on the part of rabbis and civil authorities performing marriage ceremonies were blamed for breakdowns in Jewish family life by Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, associate rabbi of the Free Synagogue, speaking over station WJLB, Tuesday afternoon. Dr. Goldstein spoke on a program sponsored by the School of the Jewish Woman. These men forget that the marriage license is no more than an authorization on the part of the state to perform the service," Rabbi Goldstein declared, "and that upon the rabbi's shoulders rests the civil service there rests an ethical obligation. It is his duty to determine before performing a marriage service whether conditions are present which will make marriage and family life impossible and lead to dissension and eventually to divorce."

The opening prayer was made by Rabbi Henry Fisher. Cantor Morris Nathanson chanted the memorial prayer.

# Nazi Steam Roller Chugs On Toward Cleveland Convention

Speculation is rife in New York with regard to the anticipated attempt to Hitlerize the German American Convention, which meets will Cleveland on June 14. It is understood that Nazis, who are now in control of a number of large German American centers throughout the country, will strive to bring into the fold of the swastika all the German American groups of the nation represented at the affair.

It was learned here yesterday that American and anti-Nazi forces have already taken steps to thwart Nazi tactics at the convention. It was stated in authoritative circles that measures have been taken to bar the display of the swastika at the convention.

Luther Insists on Swastika It is asserted that should be barred, it will be impossible for the German ambassador to speak at the convention because it is generally known that Dr. Hans Luther refuses to address affairs at which both the swastika and national emblems are not flown. Luther's presence has generated many meetings of the Friends of New Germany and other Nazi groups which might otherwise be considered un-American and hence, disapproved by well-meaning German Americans.

Furthermore, some doubt prevails as to whether the Nazis will consent to recognize any affair at which the swastika is not flown. It is preposterous at this time to consider the sensitivities of the Nazis so delicate as to prevent their attendance at the significant convention. They would be unwilling to let all possibilities of making one of the most masterly coups in the history of Nazism. The Nazis have not been overly sensitive in seizing control of the hundreds of German American societies over which they are now masters, and it is highly unlikely they will permit any initiative to disturb their steam roller process turning various societies into Hitler-baiting groups designed to carry out the policies of the Nazi government in this country.

## Liberals Will Be Absent

The German American Convention, the most important function of the year, will meet without much of the liberal strength originally ascribed to it. There will be many more delegates from Friends of New Germany present than were originally expected.

The Nazi capture of the German American Conference here last week is expected to have a significant bearing on the outcome of the German American Convention. The thoroughly Americanized Friends of New Germany Conference, which controls virtually all New York societies, have been ousted to make room for deep-seated Nazis. The New York delegation would add strength to the convention's fight to remain American, but with the gleeful chattering of the New Germany remains no doubt but that the support of this largest unit of German American societies will fight bitterly for the Nazis.

## Los Angeles is Also Conceded to be Highly Nazi insofar as the Nature of convention delegates is concerned.

# San Francisco Plans Hospital For Diagnosis

To Be Adjunct to Mt. Zion Hospital, on Mt. Sinai Model

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—A diagnostic center, patterned after the department of Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York City, is to be created at Mt. Zion Hospital here, according to plans which are being rushed forward by its directors.

Mt. Zion Hospital is an agency of the San Francisco Federation of Jewish Charities.

The diagnostic center, as planned, would serve not only men, women and children in San Francisco but would render similar assistance to afflicted persons in rural communities.

Its personnel would include specialists in every field of medicine, men who are expert in every branch of materia medica. They would sit in each case as a jury, each specialist diagnosing the case from his own field.

In the case of suffering patients from rural communities, they would be sent to this center in San Francisco, their cases diagnosed, and the findings "hurried back" to their attending physicians in their own places of residence.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 31.—Local Nazi sympathizers are bemoaning the fact that their literary ambitions have been squelched by orders from New York.

Happiness reigned at first among the members of the Milwaukee chapter, Friends of the New Germany, when after prolonged striving they succeeded in putting out a propaganda organ of their own.

It was a meager four-page sheet, known as the Wisconsin Beobachter and Observer, half in German, half in English, but it was their own, and they beamed with pride. The happiness, how-

ever, was short-lived. Orders came through from national headquarters that no local Nazi papers were to be permitted, but that all efforts and money must be concentrated on the Deutsche Zeitung, the national organ published in New York.

Sadly the Milwaukee "Friends" submitted. They were granted, however, an occasional page in the Deutsche Zeitung in order to present their news or literary outpourings. But there have been mummings or protest, it is reported, and ground that a local organ would have strengthened the movement here. The protests have gone unheeded.

## Eager for 'Further Struggles,' Local Nazis Seek N. J. Camp

The local Nazi stormtroopers wish to establish a quiet camp in New Jersey, where during the summer they may "harden themselves for further struggles." This announcement appears in the current issue of the Deutsche Zeitung, organ of the Nazis, with an appeal for funds and furnishings with which to provide the stormtroopers a summer home.

It is signed by "Stormtrooper Gau Fuehrer" (which in the original Nazi organization means "Divisional Commander") Joseph Schuster of Brooklyn.

### Idealized With Nazis

The stormtroopers in this country call themselves O. D. or Ordnung Dienst, which they interpret to mean "users." They are dressed in uniforms almost identical with those of the stormtroopers of Germany. Their drills are precisely the same. It is understood that they are led for the most part by non-Americans. Schuster is not a citizen of this country.

The appeal is translated as follows:

"Notice!  
We have long sought an opportunity to provide for our stormtrooper comrades a summer place. It so happens that in New Jersey is a finely situated place for rent, in which the men of the stormtroops may rest and harden themselves for further struggles (or fights).

"We have sent a request today to all members of the Friends of New Germany and their friends to help us make this Stormtrooper home as comfortable as possible. We will be thankful for mess kits, blankets, labbers, pads, bed covers, tent covers, in fact, everything which can be applied to the home. We ask every one who can help in any way to report at the

Divisional Office at 533 Knickerbocker avenue, Brooklyn.

"We all know what a worthwhile instrument to our movement are the stormtroopers, who help us in our struggle against not only with money and time but also by placing at the disposal of their people even their lives. Show the stormtroopers that the friends of the movement are convinced that the stormtrooper comrades build the peace and the strength building facilities of the Summer months so that during the coming Winter they may take active part in affairs and march against the enemies of Germany.

### "Storm hall" and Victory!"

From whence the stormtroopers come is a secret that the Nazis will not disclose. Those living in Yorkville say that they can be found every hour of the day loitering in the cafes and amusement resorts of the section.

Who maintains the stormtroopers during the winter months when they are not "resting" in summer camp is another affair that is deemed to concern Nazis exclusively. Some sources of information insinuate that the Friends of New Germany, among the stormtroopers as bouncers at so much per bounce, constitute their principal source of income. It is known that the numerous "Spandies" have become quite as common in Yorkville as in Berlin go toward the upkeep of the stormtroopers here as in Germany. Spandies are collected by little girls in Hitlerjugend and the purpose of the campaign is set forth as "our fighting fund."

In the New York area there are approximately 1,500 stormtroopers. They reserve order at meetings of the Friends of New Germany, take tickets and march in goosestep.

## Detroit Graduated From Naval Academy

## Kosher Foods Are In Great Demand

### But Buyers Must Beware and Support Only Bona-Fide Dealers

There is a theory among some of our people that the word kosher means clean only, and therefore they may eat anything which is packed in airtight containers, in accordance with the Pure Food and Drugs Acts. Nevertheless, everything which is clean is not kosher, but truly that which is kosher should be clean and pure. Because the word kosher is on a shop window does not signify that the articles for sale in the shop are kosher.

Unquestionably a number of our co-religionists feel that any pure food products they purchase are satisfactory from their viewpoint, and undoubtedly they may be.

However, it would appear to be only fair to support manufacturers who produce foods in accordance with the Jewish Dietary laws. It helps to employ many of our co-religionists, and it does not require a large number of Jews who do care for kosher products, all should assist in this vital part of industry of Jewish life.

Kosher foods—those produced under rabbinical supervision—were in continuous demand by Jews who adhere to the observance of the traditional laws. Jewish families, while not observant in every respect, purchase kosher foods, as they maintain a kosher home. A great number of Jewish people are not familiar with the requirements of kashruth, and are under the impression that any article displaying Hebrew lettering or the word "Kosher" is bona fide.

In every age, the problems of Kosher food and supply have been serious matters to the Jewish public. The leading reasons for these hardships have been manifold, but speaking of the present time only, one could outline them as follows:

Turning from the general consideration of Kosher food, we are faced with the problem of kosher food to the practical end of Kashruth observance, i. e., observance of the Jewish dietary laws, one is confronted with what appears to be a chaotic condition. The lack of confidence in some of the established forms of Kashruth endeavor and method of supervision should be accounted to one reason. The frequent overcharging the price of products, and the hesitancy by some of the storekeepers to carry Kosher products because of a slight increase is another reason. Furthermore, there is the absence of a harmonious and cooperative spirit among the rabbis and their organizations. The common cause of Kashruth, considered by many one of the most important pillars of Judaism and its survival, demands that truth in statement and in action be involved should be absolutely correct. A generally accepted basis for judgment on the questions involved is lacking. Then there is a conflicting variety of organizations striving to achieve proper observance, conveying to the layman an impression of unethical and otherwise unsound activity.

# The Bulletin's Day Book

Despite the fact that all liberal elements were voted out of office in the powerful German American Conference last week, the election returns indicated a lapsing fervor for the Nazis. Those who attended the affair have expressed surprise that the liberal American elements polled as many votes as they did.

It will be remembered that Victor Ridder, who is doing his best to run the New Yorker Staats-Zeitung as an American rather than a Hitlerite paper, refused to run for office. Nevertheless, he was defeated by the Nazi Froelich (an official of the North German Lloyd) by a plurality of only fourteen votes.

From sources it is learned that Ridder expected a much smaller vote. It is understood that if the vote had been taken two months ago it would have gone almost unanimously to the Nazi elements.

Marcy have wondered about the occupation of Reinhold Walter, present national commander of the League of Friends of New Germany. The tight-lipped brownshirt has been refused to give interviews and his comrades keep his past a deep, deep secret.

We are prepared to satisfy whatever curiosity there may exist on the subject of Walter's profession. Prior to his connection with the Nazis he was employed for no great length of time at the United States Customs Service, and last year, and has made a living doing chores for them ever since. As head of the national organization he receives a monthly salary, which aggregates, as nearly as we can learn, \$2,000 yearly.

### In a Fool's Paradise

The Nazi Minister of Justice, Hans Frank, at a luncheon of the American Chamber of Commerce in Berlin, declared that no boycott will force Germany to her knees and that the world will not really make it its mind that it is no longer dealing with the Germany of Versailles. And then he said to the Berlin American Chamber of Commerce: "I am glad to say that the boycott in the United States is not the work of the American people and it is my duty to help American authorities to break this boycott instantly."

Hamilton Fish Armstrong, editor of the Foreign Affairs, and the foremost American publicists and students of European affairs, who has recently returned from a visit to the capitals of Europe, including Berlin, is in line with the theories of articles appearing in the Herald Tribune:

"The financial and economic crisis in Germany is a catastrophic, and for a simple reason. Germany must buy abroad a great part of the raw materials which she converts into exportable manufactures. But the racial policy of the Nazis, and their treatment of socialists, republicans and liberals of every variety, have repugnant to people over the world. Wherever Nazi policy has been understood in its essential aspects wherever, nevertheless, there is freedom of thought, speech and judgment, the real fruits of liberty—men have spontaneously given expression of their repugnance to the Nazis, and by refusing to buy German goods and German services wherever others are available. This anti-pathy for everything German is far from being the result solely of organized boycotts by Jewish organizations, though obviously

—as long as the outfit lasts.

While we are in the mood for telling stories we may as well tell about Spanknebel, who disappeared when the government is arrested an indictment for his arrest under the war time espionage act.

Spanknebel is now a minor leader of the stormtroops in a small town in Germany. For a while he was placed in charge of a non-important concentration camp, but, entreprising as ever, he discovered a more lucrative profession.

At present the former Number 1 of the Nazis is manning a Hitlerite news service, which serves Nazi news hot off the swastika for all newspapers into which it can be tossed. The boy, it is said, is making good in the fatherland.

Ben Lazare, leader of the Blue Men of America (formerly the Anti-Nazi Blue Shirts) has told us that within the next few days he will be imported to the front page of the Bulletin.

According to the generalissimo his forces will be hooking up with the more important anti-Nazi boycott organizations. He says that through the picketing activities of his outfit, and only by this means, will the boycott become one hundred percent effective.

Lazare, incidentally, claims his Blue Men membership of 9,000. "Paid up," he declared in high dudgeon, "we can't demand our two bits (provisional for a question) from everybody in these hard times!"

## Little Man, So What?

Not since they made "All Quiet on the Western Front" have the gentlemen who control the destinies of Universal Pictures indulged in so unrestrained a ballyhoo in announcing the arrival of a new picture. The occasion for this exuberance was the opening at the Radio City Music Hall last evening, of "Little Man, What Now?"

Last Tuesday night at the Hebrew Institute of University Heights the first chapter of the American Maccabi division was officially installed. The laurel wreath went to Milton Magid for his hard work, self-sacrifices and ambition in organizing and developing a group of over one hundred Maccabi members in the Bronx as the premier unit.

## 'A Dream Through The Years'

The story of Magid's athletic career among different non-Jewish men and his hopes and prayers for the time when he could align himself with a purely Jewish athletic organization, reads like a chapter from a Frank Merriwell story. Magid's club at the Hebrew Institute is the culmination of twelve years of activities on the athletic front of the metropolitan sector.

The Maccabi leader says: "This association is the answer to my prayers. I hope that I shall be able to interest every Jewish boy and girl in it. There is no reason in the world why any Jew should represent an organization other than one of his own kind."

It was this hope that spurred Magid on in his search for an ultimate goal. Groping his way from one athletic organization to another in his struggle to realize an athletic ideal, Magid knows the vicissitudes that a Jewish athlete, man or woman, must face when participating for non-Jewish groups.

## An All-Round Athlete

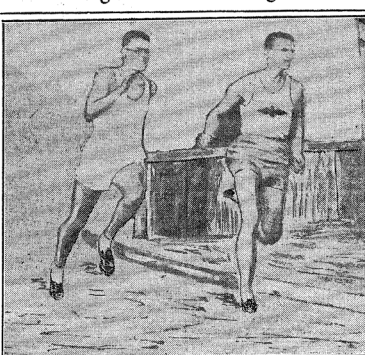
This young man who is now in charge of the first American Maccabi chapter has had a long and diversified career as an athlete on the gridiron, the cinderpath, the swimming pool, the indoor board and the cross country lanes. In fact up until 1922 he participated in all seasonal sports. In the fall of that year he played football on a team that averaged 145 pounds. They were a champ eleven for their class and went undefeated for two years. However, tragedy stalked the last game of their second season. For most of the boys it proved the last game that they would ever play on the football field. One of the ends was injured in the last scrimmage and died two days later. The shock to the boys blasted the spirit of the team.

## Made Track and Cross Country His Specialty

Notwithstanding his excellent ability at water polo or on the tennis courts and despite his form and speed over the hurdles and in the high jump, Magid decided to concentrate on track and cross country running.

He entered into competition for St. Anthony some twelve years ago. His first practice session on the road proved a mere eight mile race. Milton finished twenty-eighth in that race from a field of over 100 entrants. On December 8, the coldest day in 1922 he ran in a nine mile grind around Central park. This race

was held under the auspices of the Finnish American A. C. and Magid surrendered his novice standing in this, his second road race. He finished thirteenth, lapsing in the arms of Willie Ritola and Tima Prim, who were directly behind him.

## With Many Organizations

From that time he participated under the banners of the Glencoe A. C., the Brooklyn Evening High School, the New York Prep School, the Holy Name Athletic Club, and the German-American Athletic club.

It was during the time when he was a student at the New York Prep school that Magid pitched a shut-out game to win from the George Washington High baseball nine. Washington that year had won the inter-city championship in the Chicago-New York series that were held until 1925.

When he joined up with the Holy Name Club he became a roommate of many other famous Jewish athletes who were national champions at the time. Pinky Sober, the great City College athlete who was the national half mile champ in 1926 and Dave Adelman, intercollegiate shot put king while at Georgetown University and a member of the first Maccabiah team in Palestine, were two clubmates of his.

In 1928 he attached himself to the German-American A. C. at the time when that organization was getting many well-known Jewish athletes to participate under its banners. Magid was appointed coach of their track and field and cross country teams and remained with this club until 1933.

## Saw Realization of Hopes in Maccabi

Magid also says: "In all these years it had been my ambition to join and represent some Jewish organization—but it seemed impossible to affiliate myself with the proper club."

The United States Maccabi Association, chapter one, of which I am the leader, enables me to accomplish all that I have planned in my twenty years of athletic competition."

Magid has an enrolled membership of 110 people, forty of whom are women. He has planned an athletic program to include both men and women and has been able to secure quite a number of very capable assistants.

## Convention Elects Louis Hourwich President as Session Ends

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 31.—Louis Hourwich of Boston was elected president of the National Council for Jewish Education at its closing session yesterday. Other officers elected include Dr. Jacob S. ATLANTIC CITY, May 30.—Ben M. Selman, president of Jewish Philanthropies of Boston today was elected president of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service Workers in one of the most important elections in the history of the organization.
