HERMAN BERNSTEIN The Snub to Dr. Luther

THE German Ambassador to the United States, Dr. Haus Luther, was irritated in St. Louis by the protests made to Mayor Bernard Dickmann in connection with the Ambassador's visit to that city, and by the Mayor's statement that he had sufficient confidence in the people of St. Louis to feel certain that Dr. Luther's visit would not result in conver-sions to Hitlerism.

Mayor Dickman also said: "I did not invite Dr. Luther.
I only agreed to receive him and
extend City Hall courtesies. But my statement that Dr. Luther will find here such a spirit of tolerance that through him we may appeal to the German gov-ernment to correct the injus-tices which today disturb all right-thinking people was attri-buted as offensive to Dr. Lu-

The Mayor of St. Louis, of German descent, is a thorough American, though still retaining a sympathetic interest for the land of his forefathers. And because of this sympathetic interest in Germany, he feels pained as an American by the injustices committed under the Nazi

The German Ambassador, inrne German Ambassador, invited to participate in the Saen-gerfest, which had been founded in St. Louis by the Mayor's father, came to St. Louis but found no time to attend the reception at the City Hall. Dr. Luther said the Mayor's statement was "very political" and

"I am here to do homage to those who love the spirit of Germany and the songs of Ger-many. If people wish to pro-test, I cannot help it.

The republican representative of the Nazi regime has committed the unpardonable mistake of placing himself in a position of being snubbed and of snub-bing the head of the municipal administration of a great Amer-

ican city.
If Dr. Luther had fulfilled his obligations as Ambassador more cautiously and wisely, he would not have found himself in t most embarrassing position. found himself in this

The Dollfuss Assurances

A Dollfuss organ, the Weit-blatt, of Vienna, contained a viclous anti-Semitic attack in its report of a large anti-Jewish meeting held in Vienna. One of the speakers at that meeting is quoted as appealing to government cooperation in achieving "a celebration of liberation from the Jews, similar to the celebra-tion of liberation from the Turks." ## Nara Brawls On Increase In Poland

Suburbs Report Renewed Rioting by Anti-Semitic Organization

WARSAW, June 1.—Attacks by
National Radical anti-Semites
against Jews are increasing in

number and virulence.

Isaak Litwak, youthful Jewish athlete and member of the Stern athletic association, was severely injured when members of the Mak-kabi and Stern clubs were returning from a soccer game. Nara hooligans ambushed them and a

bloody clash took place.
In the Warsaw suburb, Praga, vendors of the anti-Semitic paper Sztafeta, viciously attacked Jewish pedestrians for "amusement" ish pedestrians for "amusement" as they later explained. The Jews were vigorously defended by Polish Socialists whose club rooms were nearby. Arrests were made by the police after the bitter

fighting was over.

Jewish porters in the same suburbs repulsed a Nara attack, but
police arriving on the scene after the clash arrested a number of the Jews.
The Nara campaign is featured

in the anti-Semitic Sztafeta under a slogan, "Jews Cannot Be Polish

## Anti-NaziBody, A.F. of L. Merge Boycott Work

Point Out Need of Coordinating Efforts

Consolidation of the anti-Nazi boycott activities of the American Federation of Labor and the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League was announced Friday by Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, vice president of the League, who represented the League in the merger negotiations with William Green, president of the A. F. of L.

Mr. Green named a committee of three to effect the consolidation On the committee are Joseph P. Ryan, president of the Central Trades and Labor Council of New York, John Fitzpatrick, president of the Chicago Federation of La-bor and Miss Selma Borchardt, vice president of the American Federation of Teachers.

The merger will combine the activities of the A. F. of L., the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League and the Chicago Committee for the Defense of Human Rights, which is the Middle West affiliate mittee is headed by Salmon O. Levinson, co-author of the Kellogg Peace Pact.

House of Commons Measure to Float £2,000,000 Fund to Aid Arabs Passes Final Reading

LONDON, June 1.—The House of Commons today passed a

LONDON, June 1.—Ine House of Commons uousy passed a measure authorizing the Palestine government to float a loan of £2,000,000, which will be guaranteed by the British Treasury. At the third and final reading today Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, independent member of Parliament, offered several amendments to the bill which were defeated by the House.

The entire debate during the third reading was virtually a dia-

logue between Colonel Wedgwood, staunch supporter of the Jewish cause, and Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, British Secretary of State for Colonies.

## Calamity Faces Austrian Jews; Dr. Silver, Wm. Green Clamp Tightens

Barred From Free Employment, They Face Economic Disaster

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, June 1.—Unemployment is increasing rapidly among the Jews of Austria owing to their quiet and systematic exclusion from representative positions in that country.

The Unemployment Insurance Institute was reconstituted today without a single Jew being given a place on the board. This auto-matic process of excluding Jews is going on quietly all over Aus-

Because the exclusions are so arranged that there is no publicity thanks to the strict censorship maintained by the Dollfuss regime, they are attracting little attention outside of Austria, but the eco-

nomic position of Jewry is gravely endangered there. At the same time privatelyowned firms are also discriminating against Jews, making it next to impossible for a Jew to obtain work anywhere in Austria. Jewish leaders term the unemployment situation among the Jews "cata-strophic."

Offers Amendment

Colonel Wedgwood offered an amendment to the bill providing for a reduction from £250,000 to £50,000 of the sum set aside for settling displaced Arabs, stating that owing to the Palestine boom most of the displaced Arabs have been absorbed in industry and are no longer eager to return to the land, where they would have to pay rent. He also cited the fact that the displaced nomads had been compensated by the Jewish National Fund. These facts, he de-National Fund. These facts, he de-clared, "had been forgotten when officials compiled imaginary tales of Arab grievances."

Sir Philip, who answered for the government, declared Great Britain would be guilty of a breach of faith if it accepted the amendment, since the MacDonald labor government has committed the govof displaced Arabs. He said there are only 899 cases of displacement in government files, but declared there is no obligation to assist this group if it refuses help. He assured Colonel Wedgwood that only the necessary sums will be spent on resettlement work.

Attacked Second Reading When the bill was presented for

the second reading, Colonel Wedgwood attacked the measure, declaring there was no necessity for floating such a large loan.

#### Report on Refugees

National headquarters of the United Jewish Appeal, which is seeking \$3,000,000 for the relief and rehabilitation of German Jews and renabilitation of German Jews and for the settlement of Jews in Palestine, yesterday made public a report on the number of German Jews and refugees aided during 1933 and on the manner in which the support was given.

A budget of £250,000 for coloni-Palestine has been adopted for the year ending April 1, 1935, by the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews in the Settlement of German Jews in Palestine, the report stated. Of this sum, £80,000 will be used for purchasing land, from £60,000 to £70,000 for agricultural settlement, £50,000 for urban settlement, and £40,000 for the training of young people in agriculture and the crafts and the present of programs. and for the erection of necessary housing accommodations. The balance will be used for temporary housing and maintenance of im-migration during the first weeks after their arrival.

#### Work for Children

Referring to the work for Ger-man Jewish children in Palestine, the report declared:

"A very large part of the funds to be allocated to the American Palestine Campaign will be applied to the settlement of German Jewish children and youth in Pales-tine, particularly those between fifteen and eighteen years of age. These children are placed in agricultural or occupational training schools or integrated into the eduschools or integrated into the edu-cational system of the country."



Dr. Samuel Schulman, rabbi | emeritus of Temple Emanu-El, New York, was elected chairman of the Synagogue Council of America at a meeting held Friday at the Harmonie Club. Rabbi Schulman succeeds State Senator Albert D. Wald to the leadership of this organization, which represents all factions of Judaism—Reform, Conservative and Orthodox — and is composed of six national organizations. The election marks Dr. Schul-

man's return to an active place in Jewish leadership. He has remained in the background since he and his colleagues, the late Dr. Hyman G. Enelow and Nathan Krass, were succeeded to the rabbinate of Tem-ple Emanu-El February by Rabbi Samuel H. Goldenson.

Dr. Schulman, a past president of the Central Conference of Amer-ican Rabbis, has been a represen-

tative of the Reform rabbinical organization to the Synagogue Council since its inception: Delighted at Honor

Interviewed after his election, Dr. Schulman expressed delight at the honor conferred upon him. He stated that the time has come "when we must recognize that this organization, which is unique insofar as there is nothing like it in any other country, should have what it deserves, a more promi-nent position in the leadership of American Jewry. Representing the whole of the American Synagogue, every shade of thought in it, it has shown the possibility of mutual esteem and cooperation among tual esteem and cooperation among the various elements in the syna-gogue, despite necessary divisions because of different interpretations of the spiritual heritage of Israel."

Judaism a "Religion" Judaism a "Religion".

Dr. Schulman made a plea for a greater place for the synagogue in American-Jewish life. "In this country," he said, "it can be safely asserted that the average American thinks of Judaism and Jewish life as such, as a religion. He classifies it in his mind. sifies it in his mind, as so many conferences and activities on all sides show, with Catholicism and Protestantism. The Synagogue Council, which represents the whole of Judaism in this country, must be given a place in the lead-ership of American Jewry on occasions and on matters which concasions and on matters which con-cern the whole of American Jewry and world Jewry. In other words, by the refusal to recognize spirit-ual leadership in Israel and give

Virtually the entire fish trade here, wholesale and retail, was asking that question Friday after a number of fish consignments from the Middle West had arrived here, thoroughly Hitlerized.

The fish, staring straight ahead with that expression of patriotic fervor so frequently found in Yorkville these days, and branded with the swastika in the manner of a great proportion of the city's German American element, were promptly returned to consignees in Michigan. The crates in which they came and their wrappings had been decorated with the hakenkreuz emblem.

The concensus among fish dealers in the city appeared to be, "We have enough bi-ped Hitlerites, imported direct from Germany, without dragging the lakes of the Middle West for new variation."

This firm has been buying from Carl Treppop & Com-pany and from Charles Stemnitz of Cheboygan. ## English Judge Holds Aloof in Suit on Reich

Seizure of Property Is Not Within Jurisdiction of Court

(J.D.B Special Correspondence)
LONDON, May 26.—Justice
Roche gave an interesting judg-ment in the King's Bench Division today in action brought against a Lloyd's underwriter by Dr. Som-

Lloyd's underwriter by Dr. Sommer, a German Jew, in connection with the setzure of his property by the Nazis.

"This case," observed the judge, "involves domestic order and domestic concern in Germany, and it is undesirable for a British court to travel outside an examination of the rights of the parties into questions which are matters of controversy in Germany itself.

"In February, 1933, Dr. Sommer went to the United States on business and did not return to Europe until April. There is no doubt that he intended to return to Ger-many. In fact, Dr. Sommer did not return to Germany, because of something that he had learned while staying in Italy. His house in the Reichenhachstrasse in Dresden was entered in May of last year by the police. A search of his papers was made and intima-tion was given that Dr. Sommer was suspected of various things, ranging from communism to corruption in business. His secretary was arrested. It was contended that these things amounted to a confiscation of Dr. Sommer's houses and property.

"Considering all the facts I am satisfied there never was a loss of the Reichenbachstrasse house at all. What began was an occupation for purposes of investigation, but undoubtedly developed into some-thing more. There was occupa-tion by the Corruption Bureau for nonths, and as might haps have been expected, there haps have been expected, there were some excesses and impropriety. But, in regard to confiscation, I hold there was not the slightest intention to interfere with Dr. Sommer's property in the house. In fact, negotiations took place with the Revenue authorities in the property in the pro thorities in July on the basis that the house still belonged to Dr. Sommer."

## CAPITAL & COMMENT

WASHINGTON Representative Andrew L. Somers of New York is quite perturbed over Nazi propaganda activities in the United States. The Congressman from the Empire State is particularly concerned over those propaganda activities in this country which are supported by for-

eign funds.

He points out that so far as Germany is concerned, the prop-aganda activities are for the purpose of fostering hatred against the Jew. In order to foster this hatred, Representative Somers says, the German ministry of propaganda during the last year has been authorized to appropriate in connection with its activities in foreign countries "an amount vary-ing from thirty million to forty million reichsmarks, equivalent to about \$16,000,000."

The Hitler government's expen diture for foreign propaganda activities, coupled with that government's increase in the military budget last year, makes a total ex-penditure of \$156,000,000, according to Representative Somers' fig-ures. This, he says, "is more than fifteen times the annual interest requirements of the German gov-ernment's direct obligation to the American people, most of which, it so happens, is owed to Ameri-cans of German blood."

Another interesting comparison made by the New York Congressman is that the \$156,000,000 "repmore than twelve per ce of all German obligations held by American investors, who, in time of Germany's need, were friendly enough to lend.
"Thus," the New Yorker said,

"are the American people placed in the position of paying for the very propaganda that is aimed at the overthrow of American institutions. It Germany were to put the money she is using to persecute the Jew into paying her debts citizens, she would have a better claim to our confidence.'

Recently when the House had under consideration the bill pro-viding for loans to small industries, Representative Adolph J. Sabath of Illinois delivered a few remarks in favor of the bill. In the midst of the discourse. Representative Herman P. Kopplemann of Connecticut asked Representative Sabath if he would yield the floor

Sabath said he could not yield to the gentleman from Connecticut. He did, however, take time to say kind words about Repre-

sentative Kopplemann as follows: "I regret that I cannot yield to the gentlemen from Connecticut at this time: but I want to say that am fully cognizant and appreciate that he has worked on this bill, and, in fact, as early as in February, he submitted a draft of a bill which, I felt, was legislation in the right direction, and its principles and some of its provisions are now embodied in the bill before us."

Only a few hours before Repre-sentative Sabath made this state-ment, Representative Kopplemann, a member of the Banking and Currency Committee, had been instru mental in getting the committee to agree to an amendment to the on loans to small industries. This amendment, which later was adopted by the House, was spon-sored by the Congressman from Illinois. It will make possible loans to public schools in places where teachers have been forced to go without pay and schools have been closed for lack of funds.

## 'Grand Rabbi' A Myth, Reich Jews Declare

Fraenkel, Now in Exile, Held No Communal Position, Says Report

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, June 1.—There is no grand rabbinate in Berlin, the All-German Jewish Representative Body declared vesterday in connection with foreign press reports on a certain Rabbi Fraenkel, called in newspaper reports the Grand Rabbi of Berlin. Rabbi Fraenkel lived in Berlin as a private individual holding no communal position, the statement declared.

Rabbi Fraenkel was severely beaten and tortured by Nazi storn troopers in the early days of the Hitler regime. When the story appeared in foreign newspapers Hermann Wilhelm Goering, Nazi chief, denied the existence of Rabbi Fraenkel, only to be confronted with photographs of the rabbi swathed in handages and bearing marks of a brutal beating. Rabbi Fraenkel has since left Germany.

The Generation of the Tired

TESS SLESINGER'S first novel, "The Unpossessed," gives the effect of being peopled by the dead who have been temporarily animated. In any event, it is the obituary, in brilliant fiction, of the generation of tired radicals who couldn't start anything, not even, as in the case which I choose to take symbolically, a magazine, which has its human parallel in the baby Miles and Margaret feared to bring into the world.

Miles, for example, is the harsh and thin New Englander who wears his radicalism as a crown of thorns and as a compensation for his own sense of joylessness and ineffectuality. His wife spends her years in the effort to thaw him out, almost succeeding, and to give him a sense of being important. The women in this novel are somewhat more aware of their true functions and limitations and they see activities in a fairly sane perspective, and that is perhaps bewoman who is merciful and just. believe that sanity and understanding can be imputed even to Elizabeth, who moves from man to man on the sex express, while Norah Blake, childless as the rest, is most the mother, chiefly to her Jeffrey who roves, without deep desire, from woman to woman in sterile flirtation. I have met al-most all of these people, or specimens of the types they represent, so that there are times when the book strikes me as a personal rem-

I have even known someone very much like Professor Bruno Leon-ard, the solitary Hamletian Jew of "The Unpossessed," whose most casual conversation flashes and coruscates and glows like a powerful incandescent lamp that shines without heat. With his brilliant quips he conceals hunger for love and a broken heart and hope and ambition. He is always so frightfully amusing, don't you know, and he is the god of a group of young radicals who look to him for guid-ance and direction and then, finally, free themselves from the tangle of the circus party which is to launch their magazine, but only buries it in gusts of mockery and laughter. Perhaps the case of Bruno is the saddest because his gifts were the greatest. One is more readily inclined to speak of this Jewish intellectual in the past tense, because the book celebrates his ignominy more deeply than that of any other individual. But like the good spiritual physician mercy.



Referring indirectly to the band controversy, Dr. Baker in an edi-torial in the Echo, undergraduate weekly, pleaded against intoler-ance toward Germany.

"The German people have with-out doubt gone mad, suffering from spiritual illness caused by a decade and a half of international injustice," he said. "The world will some day learn national insanity cannot be cured by punishment Retaliation, repression and isolation will drive Germany straight into war, the results of which on the world in general and on the persecuted minorities in Germany, are too terrible to contemplate."

To record one's impressions of a seven-day conference represent-ing the deliberations of some dozen different groups in the limited space available is indeed a gargantuan task. The assignment is undertaken with due humility. It is hoped that both the reader and those who participated in the Atlantic City conference will be char-itable with any omissions or possible misinterpretations.

sible misinterpretations.

The subject matter submitted to and discussed by the conference may be divided into four divisions: (1) Concerning social work tech-niques, social work processes, and the evaluations of these in terms of improved services for those we try to help.

(2) Concerning the relations be tween these various methods and the various problems of Jewish

(3) Concerning certain basic and fundamental changes which must be made in the existing economic order for the purpose of assuring the achievement of the necessary objectives for the fullest self-real-ization not alone of Jews but of all peoples.

(4) Concerning the international Jewish problems and the relation of American Jewish community efforts in easing the adjustments

of Jews in other countries.

Perhaps more effectively than
in any other year the members of
the National Conference of Jewish Social Service, the National Asso-ciation of Jewish Center Executives and the National Council for Jewish Education were successful in integrating their joint programs so that at various points they all made their contributions to main theme of the sessions: "The Social and Economic Adjustment of the Jewish People in the United

definite responsibility to carry or and to adjust their field of essenand to adjust their field or essen-tial usefulness to those phases of Jewish family welfare work not being met by tax-supported agen-cies. Although the demand for meeting the entire relief need was not exclusively an obligation of the Jewish relief society, it was indicated that there were many needed services which could be carried or developed which would supply much needed wants in the work with Jewish families.

Interest was also manifested in the measurement and evaluation of family social service in order to determine improvements in social service methods. These improve-ments would not alone save time and energy, but far beyond that would bring more immediate, better and more effective services to clients suffering from various maladjustments.

Other sections discussed child care, health, the care of the aged and delinquency. In each of these instances it was evident that re-gardless of the changes which have occurred in the past five years in the increase of public funds for the care of these groups, the needs of the Jewish community have re-mained practically the same. Fi-nancing has become more difficult and wherever possible public funds should be drawn upon to supple-ment existing income of Jewish organizations.

#### Problems of Jewish Life

To the specific questions affect-ing Jewish life in America, its ing Jewish life in America, its preservation, its enrichment and advancement, the Jewish Center and the Jewish Education groups directly and effectively applied themselves. The evident failure of dassimilation as a practical way out for the Jew did not have to be overemphasized. The alternative course of strengthening the forces making for an intelligent, cooperative, effectively self-expressive Jewry was self-evident.

The conference on Jewish rela-tions reported its interest in se-curing facts about Jewish life in America which would serve as a paucity of information which paralyzes much constructive effort at

this time was deplored.

On the whole, there was very little omitted from the rather com-plicated and involved diagnosis of all these experts to explain why American Jewry is so sick today. The X-ray charts, the clinical thermometer readings, and the results of various observations regarding the patient were there in rather large number.

The tragedy of it all is the absence of a clear-cut, unified, con-structive, acceptable and practical program for the reconstruction of Jewish life in America.

#### New Issue Introduced

Perhaps greater progress might have been made this year except for the introduction of a new is sue: Which must come first—the solution of the economic problem or the concentration upon the development of a better program of adjustment to the status quo and the strengthening of Jewish life under those conditions to the best possible extent? The advocates of the former

view argued that without a radi-cal reconstruction of our social and economic order there is no hope for Jewish perpetuation on a self-respecting basis. The latter a self-respecting basis. The latter insisted that regardless of the so-cial order which now functions or will come to function later we must face our daily task of car-rying on and strengthening the efforts making for the preserva-tion of our people on the best pos-sible level

be it through the ordinary chan-nels of social legislation, be it Communism or any other form of political action that should be left to social reformers and political movements and should not be the community center workers or Jewish educators.

This brings the writer to the discussion of the participation of the younger members of the conference, which produced considerable heat and we hope some light.
The Younger Group

It was quite evident this year It was quite evident this year that a significant portion of the younger group in the conference presented an organized opposition based on clearly defined dissatis-faction with the ideology of the older, the more conservative group. These were reflected not alone in the discussion on how to go about reconstructing Jewish life in America but also on the matter of political action on a national and international scale.

At one point, their arguments were charged as being "sugar-coated pills of Communism." This however, was belligerently refuted by many of the members of this group. Associated with this desire for political action was the devel-oping program for self-protection

The basic assumptions lying the organization of protective groups for the rank and file social workers is the lack of con-fidence in the executives of agencies to secure the workers' rights; the feeling that board members keep down the wage level and are ruthless on salary cuts and other personnel practices; the certainty that without effective organization will be no one's cause: and finally that the interests of the rank and file of social workers are identical with the interests of the working class as a whole, in contradistin tion to the capitalist class and its hangers-on.

The conflicts which developed cannot remain quiescent until the next year's conference. Some meth-ods will have to be developed during the year looking toward a basis for the satisfactory cooperation of both the older and these younger members of the conference, so that the constructive possibilities of this organization will not be seriously

#### The Frankfurter Zeitung Lost to Liberalism; Simons Edged Out

BERLIN, June 1.—The Frankfurter Zeitung, last of the great
liberal German newspapers, today
passed out of the hands of Simon-Sonnemann family, publishers of the paper since it was founded by Leopold Sonnemann.

Dr. Heinrich Simon, publisher of the paper for the last twentyeight years, Kurt Simon and Frau Therese Simon Sonnemann, daughter of the founder, withdrew from the ownership and management of the paper.
