Nazis Use Ford's Name In Propaganda Drives

The First Day

The first day of the open hearings before the Congressional Committee investigating Nazi activities in this country brought forth testimony which linked the German ambassador, Dr. Hans Luther, and the former German consul general in New York, Dr. Otto Kiep, with German anti-Semitic propaganda in the United States.

The German ambassador was described by the Rev. Francis Gross, a priest of Perth Amboy, N. J., as the financial backer and sponsor of the anti-Semitic and sponsor or the anti-semite pamphlet published by Gross under the title, "Justice to Hun-gary, Germany and Austria." The Rev. Dr. Gross received pay-ment in bills from the German ment in bills from the German consul general, who informed him that the funds for the pamphlets were furnished by a friend of the New Germany. In d of the New Germany, In a letter to his printer, Gross wrote:

"Concerning documents—cor-respondence in my possession by which the proof is estab-lished that in publishing my books Ambassador Luther was the sponsor, financial backer and promoter of my books-permit me to state if these documents would be used in a further discussion, repercussions and sensation in the American and world press might even cause the recall of Dr. Luther—and the friendly relationship between our country and Germany might become clouded for a long while.

Overmore I myself will be in a storm center in which I might not be strong enough to overcome antagonism from opposing

Apparently the Reverend Dr. Gross failed to get as much as he had expected from the German embassy and consulate for the writing and publication of his booklet, for in his letter to the printer he complains:

"I feel that I was not only used but more abused by the German embassy at Washington, by which I have been used to fight Germany's battle and have been thrown overboard by the German embassy when the fight scame heated . . ."

Nara Riots Harry Jews

Poland Ignores Pledge; Disguised Attack on Government Seen

WARSAW, June 6.—Despite the creasing seriousness of the antiincreasing seriousness or the anti-Semitic rioting engaged in by the Naras (National Radicals) and the pledge of the government to take steps to prevent attacks on the Jews, action of the authorities to maintain order today took the direction of raids on headquarters of Jewish organizations by the police to search for hidden arms and to prevent formation of Jew-ish self-defense units.

A new outrage was reported today when Naras, shortly after mid-night, broke into Jewish residences on Bravorga street, Warsaw, and attacked the sleeping families. Neighbors hearing the victims' cry for help, summoned the police, who caught two of the hooligans. Several wounded Jews required hospital treatment. Six Youths Arrested

Samuel Untermyer, 76, Makes New Plans to Aid Reich Victims

YONKERS, N. Y., June 6.—Celebrating his seventy-sixth birthday this evening at a family dinner at his estate, Greystone, Samuel Untermyer told the Jewish Daily Bulletin reporter that his one great ambition in life is "to see justice done to my people in Germany.'

The man who once received a fee The man who once received a fee of \$775,000 for his part in a \$100,000,000 copper merger twenty years ago, is now devoting himself almost exclusively to the furthering of the anti-Nazi boycott of Germany. Fee of power trusts, veteran of the Pujo investigation, veteran or the Pujo investigation, he is principally interested in men and events likely to break down the Hitler maltreatment of Jews. His only message to the Jews of America, he said, was to "have courser".

"Feeling fine" and "going strong," he declined to comment further on Jewish problems. "My office in the city," he declared, "is issuing my statement on Ambassador Hans Luther's propaganda activities in America as revealed in the opening day's sessions of the Congressional investigation.

Cables Assure Reich Bar of Anti-Nazi On Castoria

Peace Reigns There, Answer to Query Sent by Body

The Greek Jewish community here was reassured yesterday by cables from Castoria, Greece, that peace reigned there once more and Jews are unmolested

Alarmed by reports of anti-Jew ish excesses, in which Isaac Iliaou, isin excesses, in which issae inator, son of the president of Castoria's Jewish community, was said to have been severely injured by members of the EEE, Greek Nazi organization, New York's Greek organization, New York's Greek Jews not only cabled, through the Hessed Ne Emeth of Castorialis. but also induced a large and im-portant local society of non-Jew-the mayor of that town.

Practically all the 2,000 Greek Jews who came here from Casto-ria were aroused by reports of the atrocities and eagerly awaited the reply. Cables came from Jacob Iliaou, president of Castoria's Jewish community, and from Morris Hazan, father of Victor Hazan who is secretary of the Hessed Ne Emeth in New York,

The committee of New York's Castoria Jews who investigated in-Castoria Jews who investigated in-cluded Mathew Russo, Samuel Elias, Bocko Mayo, Victor Hazan and Max Cohen. Russo returned from a visit to Castoria only three months ago, at which time, he said, its 1,000 Jews, mostly merchants, were living unmolested.

Aldermen Summon Fama On Bigotry Charge

Economic Paper Means

After receiving cabled notice Tuesday that its Economic Bulletin was harred from Germany the Anti-Nazi Non-Sectarian League, of which Samuel Untermyer is president, issued a statement that its Bulletin is almost exclusively circulated in the United States to "importers, merchants and professional men, designed to keep dealers informed about adequate substitutions for Nazi goods and to further the aims of the anti-Nazi boycott."

Published monthly with a cir-culation of about 50,000, the pub-lication, according to the records of the organization, has no sub-scribers in Germany. It has a few in Austria and Czechoslovakia and these, it is believed, may have seeped into Germany.

Federal Aid Withdrawal Faces Hightstown Farm Project

The Jewish farm project at Hightstown, N. J., which was to have received aid from the subsishomestead division of the Department of the Interior, will have that aid withdrawn unless have that aid withdrawn unless work of colonization is placed un-der the management of that Divi-sion, the Association for Jewish Farm Settlements reports, follow-ing receipt of an order from Washington.

The government had previously agreed that the Hightstown colony was to be purely a Jewish coopera-tive venture, as submitted in the plans of the Association.

In direct contradiction to the previous understanding, the Wash-ington order states that all colonies started or financed by the gov-ernment must be under direct Federal control. Term Change Unjust

A special meeting of the associa tion's executive committee resolved that this change on the government's part was not just, since, the association claims, the government had broken a promise, on the basis of which statements had been made to the press and to thousands who had applied for information regarding the proposed colony.

A second resolution stated that the selection of colonists will be the selection of colonists will be made entirely without control by any organized Jewish body and may have an adverse influence upon the future existence of the col ony and endanger the ideal. The change on the part of the

administration of the division may administration of the division may be part of the general policy in regard to all subsistence projects, the executive stated, but it does not think the Hightstown colony should have been included in the same category with other because of its specific nature.

Polish Jews Under Iron Hand Of Anti-Semitism, Unger Says

Hebrew Scholar Relates Story of Their Plight: Here for Study

News of the plight of 3,000,000 Jews in Poland were brought by Menashe Unger, young Yiddish writer who arrived in New York on the S.S. Kosciusko.

Unger, who is the son of the Zhabner rebbe of Galicia, a mem-ber of the Rapshitz dynasty, told of work he has in preparation on the history of the Chassidic movement, its leading figures and its

holy rabbis.

The political situation of the Polish Jews is growing worse from day to day, Unger said. The new anti-Semitic party, NARA, is active, and has come out in full strength against the Jews. Just where they obtain funds for their

activities is a mystery, he said.

The economic situation is v tually unbearable, especially in the border regions and the small towns, Unger said. The various income sources are being closed to Jews and artisans are being barred from their trades. The young people are despondent. Eager for productive activity, they have no opportunity to engage in it. There are now in Poland 50,000 Chalutzim ready to leave for Palestine at a moment's notice, Unger said.

Cultural Workers Persistent But despite the terrible eco nomic plight the efforts to spread

culture among the Jewish popula-tion are going ahead persistently, the visitor reported.

The schools conducted by the
Zisho (Central Yiddish School Or-

ganization) are in great difficulty. Both students and teachers frequently go hungry and make great sacrifices to the cause of Jewish education. The same is true of the Tarbuth Hebrew schools.

There are no publishing houses for Yiddish books because the depression has put a stop to book sales and such books as appear are published at the expense of the author himself. The theatre is author himself. The theatre is Raving a hard time, but the Yid-dish actors continue at their per-formances and stagecraft, getting only minimum compensation. The press plays an important role in press plays an important role in cultural work, and there are now twelve daily Yiddish newspapers in Warsaw and 500 various other publications throughout the coun-try.

Loan Funds Great Aid

The various relief activities car-ried on by the Joint Distribution Committee, the ORT and various committee, the ORT and various other organizations engaged in healing the ailing Jewish commu-nity have brought much help, Unger said. Loan funds, known as the C.K.B., were established with the help of the Joint and received a government subsidy of 100,000 zloty. The C.K.B. is under the management of Isaac Gitterman and Isaac Borenstein, statistician

The organization has about 20.-700,000 zloty at its disposal. It has established some 600 funds throughout the country. It has also prevailed upon the government to permit entry duty-free to packages sent Polish Jews by their relatives in other countries. means much to the impoverished Polish Jewish population

Worked in Palestine

About Palestine, where he spent several years, Menashe Unger had a number of interesting things to relate. While there he was a member of the Yiddish writers' league and of the Achduth-Hapoalim, an corganization formed to create

ewish-Arab solidarity.

When the talk turned to the when the task turnes to the uestion of Yiddish in Palestine, nger said that in his opinion Iddish was not in rivairy with Hebrew there. Jews recognized Hebrew as the national language, Visiting U. S. A.

he said, but they also like Yiddish. Unger believes that in Palestine Yiddish should have at least the same rights and be tolerated in the same fashion as are the other minority languages, such as Ger-man. He believes that a Zionist newspaper should be printed with a Yiddish supplement for the Jews who have just come from Eastern Europe, in the same way as the recent German arrivals have been in the same way as the recent German arrivals have been permitted to publish a newspaper in German. Unger believes that such a newspaper in Yiddish would help the East European Jews acclimate themselves to the

In Palestine Unger attended the Hebrew University and studied cabala under Professor Shalom. While there he began the extensive encyclopedia on Chassidism and the holy rabbis which he hopes to publish in Hebrew and in Yid-dish. He has already collected more than 300 volumes on the subject. The encyclopedia will contain the biographical and bibliographical material on the various rabbis who figured in the history of Chassidism, from its beginnings until the year 1914. The contribu-tion of each to Chassidic philosophy will be but a part of the valuable data to be included in the compendium.

He plans to remain here two months, in which time he will also study the life of the Jewish labor masses and report on it to Unser Express, the Hajnt and Literarische Bletter in Poland. "If Hitler or his aides should "If Fittler or his aides should take any overt steps against the German Jewish community, it is almost certain that the government at Washington would find itself under the necessity of making the long-delayed 'intercession' which liberals and humanitarians everywhere have so long antici-pated," Rabbi Newman said.

"The silence of the Roosevel ninistration regarding the treatment of the German-Jewish min-ority has been a source of grievous disappointment, and contrasts sharply with the attitude and ac-tions of previous U. S. governments.

"But if the Nazis strike at the Jews by new legislation or new outbreaks, the long pent-up indig-nation of Washington would be certain to direct itself against the Hitler regime."

No mention of the riots has been allowed in the German press, Ho ever, the German propaganda ministry, on inquiry of the London Daily Telegraph, is reported to have stated that the demonstrations may be regarded as a pro-test against the American boycott of German goods, "inspired by Jews." The Telegraph adds that responsibility for the action of the crowds has been disowned by the Nazi authorities in the cities

Supplementing the press cam-paign handbills have been circu-lated throughout Germany since the middle of May, containing vio-lent onslaughts against the Woolworth organization on the ground that it was owned by Jews. The Telegraph comments as follows on the situation:

"These attacks until today had little apparent effect on the German people, whose interest in the Ger-man people, whose interest in the anti-Semitic campaign is now very slight, except when artificially stimulated."

Reinhardt Home Bombed by Nazis

Damage to His Salzburg Residence Not Known; Three Arrested

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, June 6.—The summer
residence of Max Reinhardt, German-Jewish theatrical producer, was the target for bombs thrown supposedly by Nazis. The extent of the damage done the dwelling, situated in Salzburg, was not re-ported. Police have arrested three

suspects.

All Reinhardt theatres were quidated early in March in accordnce with an order issued by Naz Minister of Propaganda Goebbels who decreed that Jews were to be ousted from the German theatre Reinhardt's brother-in-law, Her mann Rosenberg, was dismissed from an administrative post in the Deutsche Theatre. When Chairman McCormack asked Mr. Dickey: "He paid you \$4,000 to obtain publicity in this country on statements fav-oring anti-Semitism?" Dickey replied: "Yes." Afterwards the witness qualified his answer, saying that the statements covmany subjects other than anti-Semitism.

Dickey also testified that Carl Byoir, his associate, received a monthly fee of \$6,000 for publicity for the German tourist in-formation office, the German railways and steamships, the German Board of Trade and the Leinzig fair. Of this sum George Sylvester Viereck received a monthly salary of \$1,000 and a commission of \$750 a month for having obtained the contract for Carl Byoir and Associates.

of the Carl Byoir The copy contract with the German tourist information office, inserted in the record, contains the specification that the American pub-licity firm "will refrain from disseminating any information of news matter which might be considered political, National Socialist or racial propaganda." Such specification is merely camouflage. Hitlerite Germany is so identified with racial bate is so identified with racial hate that any praise of Nazi Germany is necessarily also praise of its system of religious and racial bigotry and cruelty.

Who are the givers and the akers of funds for disseminating Nazi propaganda in this country?

The first according to the testimony of the Rev. Dr. Gross, is Dr. Hans Luther, German ambassador to the United States. It is inconceivable that the ambassador himself was so indis-creet as to have committed himself in writing to the fact that he was backing and financing the scurrilous Gross pamphlet. However, the ambassador is responsible for the acts of the consul general, and witnesses have testified under oath that the German consul general made nents for this pamphlet and

for other Nazi publicity.

Dr. Hans Luther was chancellor under the republic. He was also president of the Deut-sche Reichsbank. His republicanism was rapidly converted into Nazism. The "republican" chancellor, Dr. Hans Luther, be-came an ardent and loyal Hitlerite.

second giver, Dr. Otto Kiep, Kiep, until recently German consul general in New York, was under the republic the head of the press department, connected with the German foreign office on Wilhelmstrasse. Then he was appointed counsellor to the Ger-man Embassy in Washington. Finally he was transferred to New York as consul general. Dr. Kiep is a very capable man, intimately familiar with the press and with publicity. In his eagerness to serve his Nazi mas-ters in Berlin he so forgot himself that he personally negoti-ated with propagandists and publicity agents and made payments for their services while he was the German consul gen-

Among the takers thus far mentioned are: the retired Hungarian priest, Francis Gross, Byoir, Carl Dickey and Sylvester Viereck.

The priest wrote and published a pamphlet which contained vicious anti-Semitic material for

hatever revenue he got out of the German consulate in New York. He got less than he had expected, and he expressed his his printer. This priest, who adopted the Nazi attitude toward the Jews, tried to justify himself by writing to his printer "we all shall honestly work to keep the fire of passions already flaming under ashes and try to bring once more harmony into disturbed relationship tween our Jewish element and the present Germany."

Carl Byoir, who is said to be a Jew, entered into a contract with the German curist information office to spread its propaganda, which is the propagan da of the Nazi regime, for a fat fee. His Jewish origin did not deter him from undertaking this job. Nor did it deter the Nazi firm using a "non-Aryan" for their purposes of disseminating eulogies on Hitlerite Ger-many, which is endeavoring to exterminate the Jews. Carl Dickey, an associate of

Carl Byoir, admitted having accepted money from the German consul general for disseminat-ing anti-Semitic publicity. Af-terwards he issued a statement in which he said:

"The intentions of this firm have always been to allay anti-Semitism and racia hatred and their effects in the United States."

The Nazis in Germany will read this statement with considerable amazement and amuse

Carl Dickey was recently ap-pointed a member of the advispointed a member of the advis-ory council of the Columbia School of Journalism. What an inspiring example this type of publicity work will be for the young journalists who are boing trained in that splendid school! But we doubt that in the light of his testimony before the Con-

gressional Committee Mr. Dickey will be permitted to continue as a member of the advisory com-mittee of the Columbia School of Journalism.

But versed as he was in Holy Writ and in the commentaries thereon and able as he was to adjust himto the most violent circumstances in the life of his time and country, he was no linguist. He knew Hebrew and Yiddish, of of course, and a little German, culled from his stay in the Berlin of prewar days. Having traveled through China and Japan with a pack on his back, and sometimes not even that, but with no Chinese or Japanese to help him on his way, he had made himself somewhat of an adept in the sign language. But not enough to keep himself out of an uncomfortable Chinese or Japanese cell when some petty officer failed to be convinced of his perfectly honorable intentions.

One Silver Dollar

Well, this young Mathmid landed in the n ed in the new world some time after the end of the war with one silver dollar. He knew nothing about the United States, except that in the old country it used to be known as "die guldene Medina," and even less about the state of Washington or the city of Seattle. He couldn't read a sign but he could smell a barber shop when he passed one, and he knew that he wanted a shave. He hadn't had a shave in a week. He was well on the way to growing a beard he didn't want, even if he had been a Mathmid. He needed a haircut just as badly but he knew enough about arithmetic to realize that he couldn't have that too and have enough left over for a bite of food and a bed for the nightfall out of one silver dollar. Recalling what he was able to get out of a mark in the Berlin of 1912, he decided that a shave, with a little tip thrown in, would leave him seventy-five cents for the rest of the

Enelow and Rabbis Krass and

The retirement of Dr. Schulman ne of the leading lights of the Reform rabbinate, is a loss to the metropolis and to Judaism, His mind is still active, his body agile anl his voice quite as overpowering as it was in his younger days. It was a happy thought that re-It was a happy thought that re-sulted in the election of Dr. Schulman to the chairmanship of the Synagogue Council of America.

This organization - comprising the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the United Syna-gogue and the Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations, each with its rabbinical affiliate—had become Jewish scene. One hears about each of its component parts. One is aware of the American Jewish aware of the American Jewish Committee and the American Jew-ish Congress. The B'nai B'rith is always in the background and the Untermyer Non-Sectarian Boycott League and the Jewish War Veterans are newly significant with the rise of Hitlerism. But rarely does one hear of the Synagogue

This condition is not likely to continue. Dr. Schulman intimated so in his post-election pronunci-amento. Calling his organization "unique" in the Jewish field, by ason of its all-inclusive Judai

Confiscated in Winter: Swiss Government Aids Writer

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERNE, June 6.—All property of Emil Ludwig, eminent biographer who is in exile from Germany and a Swiss citizen, has been restored to him by the Nazi gov ernment.

This action followed representations made to Berlin by Ludwig as a citizen of Switzerland. The government of Switzerland acted in his behalf.

On December 2, 1933, funds belonging to Ludwig were confis-cated by political police. The charges lodged against him were in effect that he had been active in spreading anti-Nazi propaganda abroad.

Last fall, while in the United States, Ludwig described himself as "one of the lost sons of Israel who have returned to the family.' He was not brought up as a religi-ous Jew, he said, and believes the plight of the Jew in Germany is 'honeless."

"I can see only one hope," he continued, "and it is becoming slowly apparent that it may be a possibility, and that is that there will be a revolution from the bot-tom—a Bolshevik revolution in Germany."

It had fifty Chicago and twelve Detroit members, the lat-ter of whom were under the lead-ership of Walter Hentchel, who is now in Germany.

Gissibl declared he met Heinz Spanknoebel in 1982 in Detroit and Spanknoebel in 1982 in Detroit and dissolved the Teutonia in order to organize with Spanknoebel an American branch of the German Nazi party. In April, 1983, Ru-dolph Hess, general manager of the Nazi party, dissolved the American branch and at the convention in Chicago in July of for-mer members of the group, Spanknoebel formed the Friends of New Germany with himself at or New Germany with himself at the head. As a second in command, Gissibl said, he succeeded Spank-noebel on the latter's flight to Germany last October.

He asserted that until March 20, 1934, when he resigned, the membership rose a thousand per cent and is still increasing.
