A Victim of Politics

The Jews of Palestine as well as the Jews of other lands have been shocked by the unex-pected verdict in the Arlosoroff murder case and the death sentence imposed upon Abraham Stavsky. The appeals issued by the Laborites and the Revision-ists and by Chief Rabbi Kook, calling upon the Jews in Pal-estine to control their passions at this moment and to maintain order, indicate the sense of responsibility of Jewish lead-

ership in Palestine. Nothing would please the ene-mies of Jewish Palestine more mies of Jewish Palestine more than intensified strife and con-flict among the various politi-cal factions of Palestinian Jew-ry just now. Conviction of Stavsky for premeditated mur-der, on the basis of the flimsiest circumstantial evidence, natur-ally has aroused the Jewish population, by whom both the trial and the conviction are construed as a mysterious political man-euver to discredit the Jews by discrediting the element regarded as most objectionable to the Palestine administration.

It is difficult to believe that the Court of Justice in Pales-tine would lend itself to politi-cal pressure or influence. But cal pressure or influence. But unfortunately the course of the investigation and the trial has been marked by most puzzling incidents that have created doubt and supplied. doubt and suspicion.

The shocking verdict has been appealed. A new trial is almost certain to result in the acquittal of Stavsky. The vast majority of the Jews of Palestine are convinced of his innocence. Every legal effort should be made to save the life of this innocent youth. An adequate fund should be raised quickly for the legal defense of this victim of political atmosphere and intrigue.

The murderer of Chaim Arl-

osoroff has not yet been found. The Palestine police should con-centrate their efforts on finding the real murderer. And the mur derer, whoever he may be, Arab or Jew, should receive the full penalty for his dastardly crime, provided his guilt is substanti-ated beyond any doubt.

PARIS, June 10.—The conviction of Abraham Stavsky for complicity in the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff "was a deliberate mis-Arlosoroff "was a denoerate inis-carriage of justice" aimed at di-verting the attention of the Jews "from the anti-Zionist policy of the Palestine government, standing in flagrant contradiction to the mandafe!

It promises that the executive will not spare any efforts in "bringing the situation which is approved by both the Palestine court and govern-ment to the notice of world public and also to honest British opinion.

I'm an opponent of capital punishment as a matter of principle and hope that this sentence will be changed on appeal"

Revisionist Appeals Against Violence Here

An appeal against acts of pro-ocation was issued here yesterday by the Central Committees of the Zionist Revisionist Organiza-tion and the Brith Trumpeldor. dividuals, who to our sorrow head non-partisan Jewish organizations, have already released provocative statements. Such statements made at the time when Stavsky's attorney, Horace Samuel, has appealed to a higher court seeking to save the Jewish martyr, Stavsky, from the gallows, may have a detrimental effect on the further develorments of the case and perhaps lead to tragic results in Palestine

German Courts Argue Right Of Jew to Act as Guardian

problem over which two German courts have disagreed.

According to the Juedische Zei-

tung of Breslau, a Jewish lawyer of that city was appointed guardian of a minor. Shortly after his appointment he was notified he must not exercise his guardian-ship and the law court formally dismissed his appointment. There then followed a series of actions which have aroused widespread interest and comment in both Jewish and judicial circles.

Retrial Ordered

The lawyer appealed the deci-sion of the lower court, but the decision was upheld by the district court. Thereupon the attorney took the case to the appeal court, which annulled the district court's decision and ordered it to retry the case. The latter again dis-missed the application, it went again to the higher tribunal and a second time the district court's ruling was annulled.

In its decision, the district court

took the stand that while the ward was "non-Aryan," like the guard-ian, "that does not justify the ap-pointment of a 'non-Aryan' guard-

After considerable legal mumbojumbo undertaken to prove through a specious comparison with the a specious comparison with the status and minority rights claims of Jews in Upper Silesia, that the German Jews "consciously place themselves outside Germanism," the court reached the interesting conclusion that the guardian would not be capable of adequately protecting the ward.

Lower Court's Opinion This fundamental position of

the Jewish racial minority demon-strates that the Jews," the court holds, "contrary to their previous declarations, declarations, consciously place themselves outside Germanism.

"If such a state of tension exists between the minority and the State people in general, the interests of those who are appointed as guardians demand that they should be able to relieve this tension. The it is not relieved it would endanger the interests of the ward, and particularly so in this case where the administration of property is involved.

The complainant in this case appears, however, to be unqualified to smooth out this tension which exists between the ward as a member of a racial minority and the German people and its members. He has been thrown by the National Socialist Revolution out of his status and actually out of his profession.

High Tribunal Disagrees
The higher tribunal countered with following:

"The entire attitude of the Dis-trict Court is not in consonance with the attitude of the National Socialist State on the 'Aryan' question. The fact that the law for restoring officialdom does not apply to guardians, that the National Socialist State has not made the circumstance of a person being of Jewish origin a general and fundamental obstacle to his hold-ing any official position, or the position of a lavyer, shows clear! that the Jewish origin of the complainant is not in itself a ground for his dismissal from his appointment as the guardian of a Jewish

"Jewish intrigue is apparent
everywhere," declared General R. everywhere," declared General R. B. G. Blakeny, British anti-Semite who passed through Montreal on his way back to England on the last leg of a world tour.

Blakeny, who led and helped organize the original British Fas-cist party in 1926, stated in part;

"There can be no world peace until the Jews are put under control. All governments and Eng-lish subsidiary states are Jew-ridden. The Jews are behind the trouble in India. The Jews seek world domination. War is the Jewish harvest."

He also hinted that the English government dare not exploit "the great oil fields in the Jordan Val-ley in Palestine because it is afraid of Jewish intrigue."

He concluded with a prophecy that soon there will be serious trouble in the United States be-cause the "Jews are running the country."

Christian Official Hits Nazi Torture

Can Scarcely Be Appreciated by Outside World, Says Hoffman After Trip

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, June 10.—The "spiritual and mental torture" to which the Jews and "non-Aryan" Christians of Germany are being subjected can scarcely be appreciated by the outside world, Conrad Hoffmann, formerly of the Foreign Department of the Young Men's Christian Association, said in an interview on his return from a tour of Egypt, Palestine, the Balkans and Germany.

Hoffmann, member of the Committee on a Christian Approach toward the Jews, said that in Nazi Germany physical violence against "non-Aryans" is not affecting vic-tims so much as the "moral subjection under which they are suf-

World Intrigue Seen by Hits British Rule as 'Regime of Colonial Bureaucracy'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) GENEVA, June 10.—The Jewish population of Palestine and the Jews of the rest of the world are convinced that the whole work of rebuilding Jewish Palestine under present political conditions is fu-tile, Vladimir Jabotinsky, Zionist Revisionist leader said, in an ad-dress to newspapermen attending

the disarmament conference here. Jahotinsky charged that the Palestine administration is using Jewish enthusiasm for building up a non-Jewish Palestine, where the Jewish minority is in a ghetto, as it is elsewhere. "This is not a rejection of the

"This is not a rejection or the mandate system or a protest against Great Britain as the mandatory power," Jabotinsky said. "But it is a condemnation of the regime of colonial bureaucracy in Palestine.

"Guided by a stubborn belief in the intrinsic fairness of the British nation with regard to the Fribish nation with regard to the re-establishment of Palestine as the national home of the Jewish people, we have addressed a peti-tion to the League of Nations, to the various governments, to the British government and to the people of Britain, urging that masses of the Jewish people are in distress, distress for which there is no real solution but that of large-scale emigration to Pal-estine," the speaker continued.

Transjordania Essential He declared that the opening of Transjordania to Jewish settle-ment is an essential condition no longer opposed by the Transjor-danian Arabs but by the manda-

tory administration. Transjordania which would have the same population density as Palestine has room for one and a half million immigrants, while a Palestine on both sides of the Jordan would harbor five or six millions," Jabotinsky asserted. "A mote settlement instead of hin-dering it would in a few decades solve the tragic problem of the Jews without harming their non-Jewish neighbors."

Against Nazism

Convention Also Passes Resolution Advocating Stronger Boycott

Two resolutions-one favoring militant cooperation in the boycott of German goods as a protest against Nazi anti-Semitic atrocities, and a second expressing sat-isfaction with the activity of the Hungarian government toward suppressing Nazism in that country-were among the highlights of the first annual convention of the 'Association of Hungarian Jews of America at the Hotel Edison, West Forty-seventh street near Times Square, yesterday afternoon.

More than 400 delegates, repre senting twenty-seven member or-ganizations in the metropolitan area, attended the two afternoon sessions and a banquet at the Hotel Edison in the evening.

While the assembly voiced its gratification at the past record of the Hungarian government in the suppression of the Nazi menace, it somewhat tempered its praise of the regime in a subordinate resoluwhich urged the Hungarian administration to take further fu-ture steps to "eliminate numerous clouds" in the form of Nazi out-

Herman Quittman, who presided at the second afternoon session, also delivered the opening address at the first meeting. He warned Hungarian Jews against thinking of themselves as an entity apart from world Jewry and advocated strengthening of the Nazi boycott

Samuel Ohlbaum, chairman of the board of directors, presided at the first session. Rabbi Lazar Schonfeld read the opening prayer, while Morton Greenbaum gave the secretary's report. Speakers in-cluded Rabbi M. Schenk of the American Jewish Congress and At-torneys Charles Brody of Bridgeort, Conn., and Max D. Steuer.

Nandor Schneeweiss presented

the report of the greetings com-mittee. Messages of greeting were read by Secretary Greenbaum from Gov. Lehman; Rabbi Ferencz of Hungary; Rabbi Hevesi, Chief Rabbi of Hungary; Jewish members of the Hungarian parliament; Adolph Frankl, president of orthodox congregations of Hun-gary, and Stern Samu, who holds a similar position in Hungarian a similar position in Hungarian reform Jewry. Frederick L. Heckleburg, as a personal repre-sentative of Mayor LaGuardia, read his chief's message of greet-ing before the convention.

Fricke Voices Warning Otto L. Fricke, chairman of the ession, warned the Congress that it might have cause to regret its action if it endorsed the DAWA.

Rev. John L. Foisel, pastor of t. John's Evangelical Church St. John's Evangelical Church here, said that all organizations were working toward the same goal—German unity and Germangoal—German unity and German-American unity, but that each had its own method of attaining that unity. He expressed regret that the DAWA delegates might go away displeased.

The results, for the DAWA, were catastrophic. The DAWA reso-lutions were tabled with no pos-sibility of ever again this year coming before the congress.

The rising tide of anti-Semitism. which had promised to engulf the entire ranks of German American society, found itself stemmed to some extent here today following amendment of the Steuben So-ciety resolution calling for a virtual boycott of all American business organizations refusing trade with Nazi Germany.

Charges Reich Subsidizes Naras at Polish Jews Parley

ASBURY PARK, N. J., June 10.

-A warning to Poland that un-Naras speedily she may soon find herself a victim of Nazi conquest, was sounded last night by former Congressman Nathan D. Perlman, a vice-president of the American Jewish Congress, who addressed the opening session of the twentysixth annual convention of Federation of Polish Jews America here.

The Federation took under adisement Mr. Perlman's plea that it join in formal protestations to the Polish authorities regarding what was termed a violation of the minorities rights, protection clauses, resulting from continuous attacks of the Naras.

Naras Subsidized

German Nazis are subsidizing the Naras, Mr. Perlman charged. He claimed that the forthcoming visit of Coebbels to Warson this month is definitely intended to ad-vance the cause of the Nazis. He vance the cause of the Nazis. He attributed the failure of the Pol-ish government to curb the Nazas either to the insincerity of its claims of impartial treatment for the Jews or to its being too weak. He expressed the hope that the convention will see fit to join with the American Jewish Congress in united action of all Jewish groups in the United States.

Benjamin Winter, president of the federation, rendered his an-nual report, in which he made a comprehensive review of the year's activities, stressing "our excellent relations with the Polish Consultates." He brought out the great practical value of the organization's medical service.

Disclosure that consulates throughout the country were veritable nests of Nazi propaganda.
