### Hitler's Moral Default

DR. HJALMAR SCHACHT, president of the Deutsche Reichsbank, in his statement announcing the German moratorium and suspended cash payments on all her foreign debts for six months, concludes thus:

"A spirit of compromise, pa-tience and goodwill are essential if the world is to escape a new economic relapse. Let Germany's goodwill be met by equal goodwill in foreign coun-

The London Times, commenting on Dr. Schacht's explanation, charges Germany with "a direct breach of good faith" and re-fers to Dr. Schacht's defense of Germany's stand as "reminiscent of the murderer who having slain both his parents pleaded for mercy on the ground that he was an orphan."

"It is really impossible to avoid the conclusion," writes the London Times, "that the reversal of Germany's trade balance since the beginning of the year has been the direct result of her inflationary domestic policy and of the retaliatory measures prowoked by her treatment of the borders -both factors for which she must be held responsible— even if no account is taken of the more sinister implications of her increasing imports.

"In pursuing this course the German Government have been willfully neglectful of their good name. By allowing a forced default upon their international fault upon their international obligations they have shattered the remains of their credit."

Dr. Schacht's plea for a spirit of goodwill, "if the world is to sescape a new economic relapse."
sounds like a brazen mockery in
the light of events since Germany fell under the sway of
Hitler. His concluding sentence, "Let Germany's goodwill be met by equal goodwill in foreign countries," is typical of Hitlerite arrogance.

Nazi Germany has now de-faulted on her international ob-ligations to her creditors. But ever since Hitler came into pow-er, Germany has defaulted on er, Germany has defaulted on her human obligations as a civilized nation. Her moral default has led to her financial default. The end of Hitlerism is approaching rapidly.

### Defender of Jews Felled By Assassin

### Killing of Pieracki is Climax to Series of Outrages

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, June 15. — Col. Bronislaw Pieracki, Polish Minister of the Interior and deter-mined opponent of political anti-Semitism, fell here this afternoon on the steps of his home, the victim of an assas sin's bullets. The murder of Marshal Pil-

sudski's intimate friend and associate climaxed a series of outrages and acts of terrorism in all parts of the country which received striking impetus in connection with the visit here of Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi propaganda chief. Assassin Escapes

Col. Pieracki was shot as he was returning to his home this afternoon by an unidentified assallant who succeeded in making his escape. He died shortly afterward after an emergency operation.

Although the assassin was not discovered, the general conviction held by the authorities was that the murder was an act of vengeance by the National Radicals (Naras) for government action undertaken to suppress the ter-roristic attacks of the Naras on the Jews.

The government yesterday took action against the Naras in several districts where the Nara attacks verged on a pogrom, closing headverget on a popular comment near quarters of local Nara groups and suppressing a Nara newspaper. Col. Pieracki, as Minister of the Interior, was reported as charged with directing action against the anti-Semitic, anti-government

### Arctic Survivor, Now Refugee, In Straights

### Three Jews Now Hold Four World Boxing Championships Will Address

Baer's Victory Sets New Record-Rosenbloom. Ross Hold Titles

As a result of Maxie Baer's decisive victory over Primo Carnera Thursday at the Madison Square Garden Bowl, three Jewish boxers world champions

Max Baer is king of the heavy weights and supreme ruler of fis-tiana today. "Slapsie" Maxie Ro-senbloom is the light heavyweight titleholder and young Barney Ross, the clever fighter from Chicago, is champion of both lightweight and champion or both lightweight and welterweight classes. Never before in the history of boxing, that is, since the adoption of the Marquis of Queensbury rules, has one race dominated a sport the way Jewish fighters have at the present mo-

Not only is Maxie Baer the first Jew in modern times to hold the heavyweight title, but he is also the first Jewish fighter to get as far as challenging for the crown

In the Days of Old

Daniel Mendoza, one of the
greatest fighters of the old regime and probably the most widely cele-brated boxer of the pre-Sullivan era, was a thoroughbred champion He fought in the late eighteent! and early nineteenth centuries and kept in trim until he was fifty-five years old. He won his last fight at that ripe old age and then

hing up his gloves.

Another great heavyweight slugger, but of more recent times. was Joe Choynski. He was one of the greatest of the Jewish fighters who had their heyday in the '90s and early 1900s.

Choynski Was Good, Too

Since Choynski's time no Jewish heavyweight fighter came into prominence until Max Baer clown-ed, sang and danced his way into the boxing stadiums of the coun-try. However, Max had what Choynski lacked when the latter fought Corbett, Jeffries and Fit-zimmons and even Johnson. Max has the killer punch. Max is a tiger who fights with the ferocity of a wounded animal at bay. He is a savage in the ring. At the same time he possesses a technique and finesse that has carried him to the greatest boxing pinnacle of all time — the world's heavyweight

championship.

There are other Jewish heavy-weights in the game today who are coming along. King Levinsky, the Windy City Assatsin, may prove to be more than a threat prove to be more than a threat and finally wind up with a chance at the big money. Art Lasky of the Pacific Coast is still another. Maxie Rosenbloom, though he

holds the light heavyweight title now, will not keep his crown for now, will not keep his crown for any length of time. He is aging quickly, but we have seen another Jewish fighter in action recently who will probably fill Rosen-bloom's shoes.

### Pertinent and Impertinent

There are today certain groups or organizations working to unify the Jewish race. Such organizations and such groups, no matter how sincere their convictions and no matter how noble their motives, must

be brought to a realization that by their work they are actually making more powerful the enemy they set out to destroy. Unity has little value when it breeds prejudice to combat every constructive feacan undertake.

One such organization, for instance, has been formed ostensibly to further the political ambitions of the neglected Jew. Actually it is putting the Jewish politician in a separate class. The good such an organization can accomplish is negligible, but the harm it can do is very great indeed. The hatred engendered by work of this sort is a consideration that no one who has the good of his race at heart

should overlook

Women, fortunately, have had little to do with projects of this type. Probably their wisest course is to disregard them. The publicity involved in attacking them makes them entirely too conspicuous. Such movements, if they do not savor definitely of a snobbish attitude at least seem to put us on the defensive.

Prejudice Directed Against Race
It is a known fact that there is much less prejudice against the Jew as an individual than against the race as a whole. A good many Jewish women have become prominent and are well liked in the world at large. In communities where the numbers are small the prejudice is often much less. It is when they become linked together in large groups that Jews meet the greatest prejudice, and instead of trying to remedy conditions by persuading the world that they are not a strange group of aliens, they set up organizations to bring their best ambassadors back into their own tight little bands. We are not only Jews, but citizens of the country we live in, and

as such we owe a double loyalty. Our problem is therefore not one of forgetting that we are Jews but of remembering that we are Americans. What we must look for is neither segregation nor emergence understanding.

Nome of us can truly wish for segregation in place of brotherhood and good-will. Yet in a variety of ways, and with the most consumate skill, that is just what we are accomplishing. Our greatest mistake is that we see only strength in unity, and we completely overlook the fact that when that unity serves only to unity more powerful opposing forces, it becomes not strength, but the greatest of our weekpresses.

June seventeenth is Father's Day throughout the country, and "Women Wise-And Otherwise" unite on this day with all those who pay tribute to the fathers. Of course, we are especially concerned with Jewish fathers, and we feel it a duty as well as a privilege to speak here of the splendid qualities of the typically Jewish father and to testify to the deep and lasting influence he has on the lives and the careers of his children and through them on the development and the destiny of the entire nation.

When he prayed that justice should reign all over the earth, he did more than utter a cere-monial formula. He gave vent to a passionate desire of his heart." a passionate desire of his heart." Yes, justice is always a passionate desire of the heart of the Jewish father, for he knows only too well that where injustice wields the sceptre he and his nation, his peoand his children, will be the first to suffer.

# Rabbi Declares

#### Antipathy Directed Not to Fellow Americans. But to Nazis

A letter of good will has been addressed by Rabbi Solomon A. Fineberg, of Mount Vernon, chaplain of the Jewish War Veterans, to several hundred Nazi sympathizers and advertisers in Deutsche Zeitung.

"Any study of the actual facts," writes Rabbi Fineberg, "will re-veal that Jews in America have no ill will whatever toward the Ger-mans residing here. Vast sums have been spent, and are being spent now, by Jews in stores, restaurants, factories and all sorts of commercial enterprises owned or operated by Germans. Tens of Germans have employed and will continue to be employed in industries or house-holds owned by Jews.

"There is no boycott being con-ducted against German American citizens by any Jewish organiza-tion. Anyone who claims that tion. Anyone who claims that such discrimination exists is using falsehood and fraud to foment trouble which can bring profit to no one, but to the despicable agi-tators who seek to bring about strife between Jews and Germans in this country."

He concludes with a request that "if your commercial interests have been damaged in any way because of your German origin, and if you will communicate this information to our National Commander . . . we shall take prompt steps in your behalf."

The statement was made in connection with the fortieth anniver-sary of the Jewish War Veterans. Rabbi Fineberg also urged "the Jewish shirt organizations to go out of existence. We cannot fight Hitlerism while using its methods.

With Mrs. Houghton he made a seven weeks' tour of Europe, studying youth movements abroad.

University professors and other aders throughout Germany told Dr. Houghton of the persecution of the Jews in the beginning of the Nazi rule and of the discrimination at the present time. In Berlin he learned that 70,000 had been exiled.

"I can't say that I saw much in Germany that I could commend. Conditions are getting worse," Dr. Houghton said. In Austria, Czechoslovakia and other parts of the continent he observed a growth in anti-Jewish feeling, which he attributed to the "Nazi contagion," although, he explained, most countries are developing their own

"I believe in Zionism very ardently," was one of Dr. Houghton's statements. There is a nossibility of Germany being the aggressor in a European war, he said. Some of her neighbors are afraid of her, and in general fear is the outstanding characteristic in Europe to-day; everybody is afraid of his neighbor





the most brutal and ruthless measures." Bouton believes that Nazis are driving Germany into a wan, which he expects within five years. Hitler's "reign of bigotry and

terror" would be promptly termin-ated, Bouton holds, if Germany but knew where to turn after he is shorn of power.

### Rabbi Demands Social Reforms At Conference in Wernersville

(Continued from Page One) gram of social reforms that would grain of social reforms that would include the total elimination of child labor, old age pensions and retirement pensions taking effect at the age of sixty-five, together with a system of unemployment insurance.

The committee further recommended "a comprehensive program of public construction, by municipal, state and federal authorities of buildings, roads, bridges, hospitals and schools and especially of housing projects on a national scale, to wipe out slums and slum

areas."
Dr. Sidney E. Goldstein, chairman of the Social Justice Commission of the conference, in his report of the commission's work dised unemployment, distribution of the national income, socializa-tion of basic enterprises, the NRA and the trends of political organization in this country.

The commission, Dr. Goldstein reported, found that "unemployment continues at the end of five years of social effort to be the most acute problem in our eco-nomic life." There are at least ten million men and women in America jobless, with probably five million families utterly destitute and dependent upon public aid, he said.

#### Urges New Tax System

To distribute the national income wisely and justly, the commission advised a "radically revised sys-tem of taxation that will include a rapid increase of surtaxes upon current incomes; a marked in-crease in inheritance taxes and crease in innertance taxes and gifts; a heavy tax upon corpora-tion surpluses and reserves; the taxation of tax exempt securities; and the removal of competitive taxes upon commodities in cur-

A further suggested remedy, the report stated, was a program of control over the prices of commodities so that the increase in wages may not be constantly outrun by the increase in the cost of living.

In the marter of socializing basic enterprises, the group found that "it is not safe for society to leave the basic social enterprises in the control of private groups that operate these enterprises for private profit instead of for the service to the community."

A three-point program for socializing basic enterprises was suggested for adoption by the government. These were: 1) Reorganization of the banking system, of

The commission went on record as criticizing the NRA for its "many weaknesses and defects which if uncorrected will invalidate the program as a whole and make true recovery impossible." These defects were pointed out as follows: Working hours in the var-ious codes are too long and should be limited to not more than thirty be limited to not more than thirty laours per week. Minimum wages in almost every code are too low. Workers' right to organize and bargain collectively must be protected and enforced.

Arms Makers Scored Armament manufacturers were scored and compulsory military training in colleges and universitraining in colleges and universities was condemned in the report to the conference by the Commit-tee on International Peace, which was presented by Rabbi Max C. Currick, chairman, of Erie, Pa. The report upheld, also, the right of the conscientious objector to war and to such training as an expression of the war spirit, to be excused from such training."

The committee recommended that the conference give, if requested, all possible assistance to the Congressional committee investigating Nazi intrigue in this coun-

try.
"Nazi organization and propa-ganda for the subversion of the present form of Government of the United States impedes the present friendly relations between our rriently relations between our government and that of the German Reich, and is, therefore, an impediment to the world peace movement," the report stated.

In his presidential message to

In ms presidential message to the conference, Dr. Samuel H. Goldenson, of Temple Emanu-El, New York City, urged upon rabbis and other Jewish leaders the ne-cessity of analyzing and under-standing the play of forces that make possible such a phenomenon as Hitlerism in the present-day

"We should not spend all our time in denouncing Hitlerism," he declared, "but reserve some of our strength and energy for the greatstrength and energy for the great-er and more useful task of under-standing the causes of its power, and seek to eradicate them." Chauvinism, or perverted na-tionalism; the doctrine of narrow,

racial culture in opposition to cul-ture as broad and universal; and the demand for self-contained sol-idarity as against a genuine unity based on loyalty to a commonly-held, all-inclusive ideal were listed by Dr. Goldenson as some of the

contributing causes to Hitlerism. To combat its menace, the New York rabbi declared it was the duty of "all of us to remove as far as we can the forces that threaten the stability of the social

In discussing the spread of in-tolerance all over the world, Dr. Goldenson cautioned that since "we Jews are always the first victims it behooves us to be especially watchful of our own conduct and not commit the folly of believing that similar illiberalisms may not develop among ourselves. develop among ourselves. If we should take proper counsel from the nature of the attacks upon us the nature of the attacks upon us in Germany and if we study their origin and the way they are jus-tified by our enemies, we would be especially on guard against the development in Jewish circles of development in Jewish Circles of narrow and trivial conceptions of culture, of chauvinistic national-ism and the advocacy of rigid and regimented solidarity."

Dr. Goldenson, ridiculing the type of solidarity that Hitler claims to have behind him, urged upon Jews a solidarity of a dia-metrically opposed kind. He sug-gested a unity derived from "love for our heritage and the respect that each shall have for the oth-er's way of making our heritage count in life."

The conference leader warned against the tendency to emphasize Jewish nationalism separately and apart from its unique religious and spiritual quality, and declared that spiritual quality, and declared that this tendency in modern Jewish life, due chiefly to ignorance of the distinctive quality of Jewish history, will ultimately lead to the disintegration of the Jewish peo-ple. The only justification, he said, for the separate existence of the Jew as a minority people lies in his conscious fulfillment of his self-imposed task of playing a spe-cial role in human life.

But this five thousand dollar day-dream of mine is perfectly logical, because I am almost a veteran of the payments in kind way of life. Not that I've ever been paid any salary in steaks, cereals, cr and coffee, but time and again when I've wanted something out of the line of steaks, cereals, cream and coffee-such things as pictures and books, for example-I have taken to the payments in kind system like a duck to water.

### A Flutter in Barter

Let me tell you about my latest coup, in the barter system. I call it a coup because I believe that the advantage was mine, although the party of the second part is just as certain that the advantage was his. And I shall not disabuse him. After all, you can't have a barter system without both barterers getsystem without both barterers get-ting what they think they want. For all of these years I have been getting along without any-

thing like an honest-to-goodness dictionary. When in doubt about a word, which is not often, I consult a Thesaurus, of which I have a number, including a Roget's. THE importance of "The Berlin Diarks," just published, lies not in the volume's so-called revelations of Germany's future war plans, as the advance newspaper reports represented, but in the provision of authentic documentary material supporting the the provision of authentic documentary material supporting the charge that Hindenburg surrendered Germany to Hitler to protect from slander his own name and the names of his friends and to shield from inevitable Parliamentary inquiry the manner in which he had acquired the East Prussian estate of Neudeck.

wrote "The Berlin Diaries" cannot he so easily impeached or controverted, for he was a member of the German Ministry of War, high in the confidence of General Kurt von Schleicher (last of the pre-Hitler Chancellors), and an inter-ested spectator in the series of fevered negotiations conducted by the Nazis, through von Papen and Goering, for the right to govern Germany in return for nothing less than the quashing of the Parliamentary indictment of the Junkers of East Prussia, who led by Oldenburg, lavished the funds of Ger-many on the estates of themselves and their allies

There is a brief passing note in this book telling how the Nazis, to win the neutrality if not the friendliness of General von Blomherg, commander of the East Prus-sian Reichswehr, presented him with an estate. The real identity of the author, called "General X." is concealed, in the words of the editor, Dr. Helmut Klotz, "by con-centrating the actual experiences and observations of several (and equally reliable) persons into the one person and, in the second place, by temporal or spatial displacement of accessory circum-stances." The American edition appears with a foreword by Edgar appears with a foreword by Edgar Ansel Mowrer, formerly Berlin cor-respondent of the Chicago Daily News. It is published by William Morrow & Co.

#### Brief, Hectic Months

The range of the diary is only eight months, from May 30, 1932, to January 30, 1933, from about the fall of the Bruening Cabinet, the fall of the Bruening Cabinet, through the brief and tumultuous life of the indecisive von Schlei-cher's Cabinet, to the summoning of Hitler, on his pledge not to dis-turb the East Relief Fund, and to smash the Reichstag inquiry. Be-sides supporting the worst of the Communist aspersions on Hinden-burg, "The Berlin Diaries" makes plain the reason Hindenburg gave Hitler the accolade of power al-most at the moment that the first great decline of Nazi electoral influence became apparent. The Field Marshal and his son, Oskar, in whose name Neudeck was deeded to save inheritance taxes, hated and feared the Nazis and despised and feared the Nazis and despised Hitler and his entourage and se-cretly hoped they would blow themselves up by some rash and unconsidered motion, but both hated and feared the Parliamentary inquiry more. This book makes it plain that Schleicher could have avoided the worst had he either played politics with Hindenburg, or shown that firmness in his office to which "General X" was always steeling him,

"General X" renders a curious service to Hindenburg. —Hitler is named Chancellor. We know of course what has happened since to the Reichstag and all its commissions and members.



Representative John W. McCorck of Massachusetts, chairman of the investigating committee, is astounded at the far-reaching mass of evidence uncovered by his comsince the investigation

mittee started. "When I was appointed chair-an of the committee, I never thought that the evidence which has been disclosed ever existed in the United States." he said. "I

er thought that there would be anything discovered outside of individual activity, and that the acless confined to individuals in this country. I never thought that we would make a contact with a for eign government, or a political party in control of a foreign government, sending instructions into the United States to persons in the United States, a few citizens and most of them aliens, to engage in activities within our bor-ders for the purpose of arraying Americans against Americans be-cause of their race. I consider the attempt to array Americans against Americans because of racial or religious differences sub-versive to our government and our people.

From the volume of evidence in hand, the Congressional committee is quite certain that Nazi propaganda activities are financed f Germany. This preliminary conclusion was reached as a result of secret investigations and from testimony and evidence gained at the recent public hearings in Washington. But, the committee does not intend to rely entirely on its own investigations. Before its final report will be made, the committee will take into consideration the results of investigations now under way by the Department of Justice, the State Department and the De-

In the meantime. Nazi activities alone will not hold the committee's attention. The next step will be to look into Communistic propaganda activities. Then, the committee intends to investigate propaganda of

All this talk about Russia hav an this talk about Russia hav-ing a paid propagandist in this country, amounts to nothing. At least, that is how it looks for the

George Sylvester Viereck, it will be remembered, charged that Ivy Lee was a propagandist in this country for the Russians. Viereck was summoned to appear before a sub-committee at a secret hearing in New York, to testify before Representative Dickstein on what

he knew of Russian propaganda activities in this country. While Representative Dickstein would not reveal the results of Viereck's appearance, it has been learned from reliable sources that Viereck's charges were groundless.

However, that did not leave Ivy Lee out of the picture. The Mc-Cormack committee has indica-tions that while Ivy Lee, as far as is known, is not doing propaganda work for the Russians, he is said to be responsible for some of the Nazi propaganda activities in the United States. The committee is digging further into the

In connection with the probe in general, Representative McCor-mack takes this attitude: "It is immaterial to me who may be in-volved by the facts that might be developed — if it is evidence and not mere opinion of some person it will be brought out into the public for the benefit of the American people, and for the use and benefit of the Congress for its fu-ture action."

Originally, the committee had an appropriation of \$10,000 with which to conduct the investigation With the additional \$20,000 already voted the committee will be in position to conduct its investigation on a more intensive basis.

Plans call for public hearings to be held by sub-committees in many sections of the country. This will include, the West Coast, especially sections California, where Nazi propaganda centers are known to exist. The principal member of the sub-committee which will conduct hearings in the far West will be Representative Charles Kramer of California. Additional hearings will be held in the East, the South, and in the Middle West.

### Polish Minister is Assassinated; Zionist Executive and Council U. S. Major Charges 'Putzy' Naras Are Under Suspicion

thodoxy in Foland to support the Plisudski government and sup-ported the Agudath Israel against the Zionists and other groups in obtaining control of Jawish affairs. He was also instrumental in hav-ing passed the kehilla law regulat-

ing and defining the functions of Jewish community organizations. In national politics, Col. Pieracki was a leader of the Polish legion-

aries, who constitute Marshal Pilsudski's chief support.

#### Began Career in 1930

The assassinated Minister held the rank of colonel. He started his cabinet career as Under-Secreof State for the Interior in the Pilsudski cabinet and held that post from August to December, 1930. From December, 1930, to May, 1931, he was Minister Without Portfolio in the Slawek cabi-net, becoming Minister of the In-terior in the Prystor cabinet in

May, 1931 . Earlier this year he took up the cudgels against Polish anti-Semites who accused the government of permitting Jewish street demonstrations while at the same time it was prohibiting those of Polish national organizations. In answer to a violently anti-Semitic speech in the Polish Sejm last February by the Endek Deputy Bieleski, Pieracki declared from the Sejm tribune:

#### Hite Terrorism

"Acts of terrorism and violence by individuals and collectives, ir-respective of their motives and no matter against whom they are di-rected, will not be tolerated and the perpetrators will not escape punishment.

The Minister further announced: "In order to prevent all misun-derstanding, allow me to state that we will not tolerate race and national conflicts because they are alien to the historical spirit of the Polish people.

"Poland's great power in the past was achieved only thanks to the capacity for living with the alien races inhabiting Poland. It will be perilous if we adopt foreign race theories, which are serv-ing political expansion purposes.

That was when Drs. Rosmarin and Wislicki, Jewish members of the Sejm, called upon him to protest against the continued attacks upon the Jews by the National Radical anti-Semites.

He received a detailed memo-randum from the Jewish deputies. who also provided him with affi-davits and statements of witnesses regarding the Nara -saults. The list included Jews beaten up in the streets. attacks on homes and shops, the robbing of Jewish pri-vate houses, attacks on Jewish women and efforts at incendiarism directed against the Jews.

#### Polish Jews Express Regret of Killing

Regret of Annua A statement issued Friday night by the Federation of Polish Jews in America and the American Jewish Congress expressed "deep regret" at the assassination Col. Pieracki and associated the attack on him with the series of attacks on Jews and with the pres-ence in Poland of Dr. Goebbels. It expressed hope that the govern-ment would act vigorously to halt the attacks.

The National Committee to Aid Victims of German Fascism announced that groups numbering more than 1,500,000 members and affiliates were joining in protest against admission of the Hitler

Among these it listed the Inter-national Workers Order, the Finnish Workers Federation, the In-ternational Labor Defense, the Trade Union Unity League, the Unemployed Councils and the National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners.

#### Parling Gate Note

In every case, the announce-ment stated, telegrams were being sent to Secretary of Labor Fran-ces Perkins and President James B. Conant of Harvard.

It repeated charges that Hanf-staengl, ostensibly coming here for the sole purpose of attending the twenty-fifth anniversary reunion of his Harvard class, is actually bent on promoting the Nazi cause in the United States.
