### Poor Fish

OUR attention has been called to an advertisement in a journal called Mutual Professional News, and distributed among physicians and dentists.

"Come to Troutdale—in Maine," reads the advertisement. "A vacation paradise for lovers of fishing, and so forth. Then follows this bait: 'Exclusively a Gentile clientele!'"

Strange enough, on the very same page appears a quotation from John Galsworthy which reads:

"Sport, which still keeps the flag of idealism flying, is perhaps the most saving grace in the world at the moment, with its spirit of rules kept, and regard for the ideal."

The Professional Mutual News, which is distributed under the Mutual Professional Plan, undoubtedly reaches a number of Jewish readers to whom the above quoted advertisement must be offensive.

This particular "paradise for lovers of fishing" is for a Gentile clientele only. Apparently the owners of the Troutdale Cabins do not believe that the sport of fishing should keep the flag of idealism flying. Or is it possible that the owners of the Troutdale "paradise" have authoritative information that the trout in Troutdale prefer to be caught only by a Gentile clientele?

Poor fish.

### Nazi Contingent

It is always so. A terroristic organization that incites and directs assaults against a portion of the population eventually extends its terroristic acts to other portions of the population. In Rumania, years ago, when the peasants were led to commit anti-Jewish outrages, they soon turned against non-Jewish estate owners and attacked their Gentile neighbors as well. After attacking the Jews, the Nazis in Rumania turned against the Poles because he dared to say that the anti-Jewish violence was at the same time a serious menace to Rumania.

In Poland, too, the Nazis and the National Democrats, the anti-Jewish rowdies and the anti-Jewish economic boycotters, not content with their shocking assaults on the Jews, quarreled

## Exiled Reich Statesman Sees Fall Of Nazis During Coming Winter

Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld Says Hitler Is Losing His Power in Germany

The Hitler regime will suffer a radical change if not outright downfall during the coming autumn or winter, declared Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, internationally known lawyer and former Minister of Justice for Prussia, who arrived yesterday afternoon aboard the French liner Champlain, to appear as star witness for the American Inquiry Commission which is soon to begin investigation of Nazism.

One of the best known legal defenders of political prisoners and anti-Fascist reformers for Ernst Torgler, acquitted defendant in the Reichstag fire trial, Dr. Rosenfeld was a member of the convention which framed the Prussian State Constitution after the war, a member of the first Reichstag in 1920 and succeeding ones. He represented the Social Democratic party.

## Ontario Elects Two Jews to Its Parliament

Windsor Mayor and Toronto Alderman Are Chosen

(Special to the J.D.R.) TORONTO, Ont., June 20.—The provincial legislature of Ontario will number two Jewish members when it convenes for its next session as a result of elections in this city and Windsor.

In the latter city Mayor David A. Croft was yesterday elected to the Parliament by an overwhelming vote. The youthful Jewish mayor of Windsor—he was only thirty when elected to the majority in 1930—will be the Minister of Labor in the cabinet of the liberal Premier-elect Mitchell F. Hepburn, the latter announced when informed of Croft's signal victory.

## Open Palestine Farming School

Tabor Institution Built From Funds Left by Sir Elly Kadoorie

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, June 20.—The Kadoorie Agricultural School for Jewish students, built at Tabor by the Palestine government and funded by the late Sir Elly Kadoorie, Bagdad Jewish millionaire, was officially opened tonight by High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, chief figure in an impressive ceremony.

The £60,000 bequest for the school was half of a fund left by Sir Elly for educational purposes in Palestine. The other half was used to build an Arab school similar to the one opened at Tabor tonight.

On June 18, 1931, when work on the latter school was begun, the Arab school was already functioning.

## Hitler Downfall Predicted if President Dies

Ensuing Revolt Will Engulf Hitlerism, Standard Says

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, June 20.—Prediction that Germany will be plunged into a civil war in which Hitler and Hitlerism will be engulfed, in the event of the death of the Reich's aged President von Hindenburg was made today in an editorial in Lord Beaverbrook's London Evening Standard.

The editorial reminds readers that it was Colonel von Papen, Vice-Chancellor in the Hitler cabinet, and who was presumably placed there by von Hindenburg as a check on the Fuehrer, who procured Hitler's appointment as Chancellor. Von Papen was then and still is today, the Standard declares, behind Hindenburg.

The Junkers, the once dominant group in Germany who are represented by von Papen, are becoming alarmed at the leftist move (Continued on Page Eight)

## U. S. May Intervene in Strike Threatened by Kosher Shops

Sam Pollack, associate general manager of the Federation, had accused the Department of failing to take interest in the butchers' plight and of ignoring its promise to call a conference to better conditions in the meat industry.

## Polish Jews Seen In Grave Danger

Harbor Asked For Tel Aviv; Action Remote

Development of the City Brings Up Question in Commons

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, June 20.—The speedy development of the city of Tel Aviv in Palestine has raised the question in the House of Commons of establishing a harbor for the city.

In reply to a question by Major H. A. Proctor, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, Colonial Secretary, said that plans had been taken to improve the harbors at Haifa and Jaffa. He added that these improvements will be sufficient for Palestine's needs for a good many years in spite of the growth of Tel Aviv.

A harbor for Tel Aviv has been tentatively suggested, Sir Philip said. The Secretary said that such proposal from High Commissioner of Palestine, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, this indicated, he said, that the government was not contemplating a harbor for the city.

Barnet Janner and Colonel Wedgwood posed questions to the Colonial Secretary regarding the results of plans to set up an aerodrome at Ludd, which would be of distinct benefit to Tel Aviv in conjunction with the railway depot to be built there. Sir Philip said that he and the High Commissioner are giving the "most careful consideration" to the recommendations of the local committee.

### Golden Named Judge

## Terror Plan In Warsaw Is Revealed

Christian Neighbors Tell of Massacre Threat; Protection Asked

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, June 20.—Although government action against the Naras and the Eadeks since the assassination last week of Minister of the Interior Pieracki has necessitated considerable abatement of overt acts of the anti-Semitic anti-government factions, nevertheless plans for the further terrorization of Jews are still being formulated by their acting leaders.

### Terror Plan Revealed

A plan to drive the Jews from the suburbs of Warsaw by a veritable reign of terror with all the elements of massacre has been uncovered, it was reported here today from unimpeachable sources. Jews in the suburb of Nowohrad were to be the object of a joint attack by armed gangs of Naras and Eadeks who, since government action against both organizations, have taken to working in unison on many occasions.

Christian neighbors of several Jews in the suburb informed them of the proposed attack on all Jewish residents failing to leave the community.

The situation was disclosed to Jewish members of the Sejm, who requested adequate police protection for the district from the chief of the department of security.

Despite assurances of the authorities that sufficient force would be assigned to maintain order, many Jews sent their wives and children to stay with relatives and friends in districts which had not been threatened.

Similar plan inst the Jews in the suburbs of Szwecja and Powsnaski was also reported. Powsnaski has already been the scene of violent excesses.

## Nazis Send 2 Army Men to U. S. To Develop Stormtroop Cells

Reports that three Hitlerite emissaries are on their way to New York to assume control of the American Nazi organization could not be verified yesterday. However, it was learned, that the League of Friends of New Germany will hold a national convention in Chicago soon to elect officers. It is believed unlikely that the election will take place without first having those to be "elected" nominated by German Nazi authorities.

According to a dispatch from John Steele, London correspondent for the Chicago Daily Tribune, on June 18, two former army officers under instruction from the Munich Brown House and a Herr von Holtzhausen, who has been in charge of the foreign section of the German Ministry of Propaganda, will arrive here without visas but with assurances from Nazi agents in this country of gaining success.

**Reveals Sailings**  
Major Hans von Dombek, one of the officers, was reported by the Tribune correspondent to have sailed early last week from Cherbourg, Co. East, for New York. The other, was reported to have sailed on June 12 from Boulogne on a Hamburg-American ship. Von Holtzhausen was said to be waiting for the first White Star liner to leave for New York. The dispatch mentions William Kern and Albert Roemer, reputed to be German-American members of the New York National Guard, as supporters of von

**Lt. Col. Joseph Mundy, adjutant in charge of the New York National Guard, is expected to be in New York tomorrow.** Mundy, in response to queries as to the identity of Roemer and Kern, yesterday replied that neither of the men were known to him. He further stated that the New York National Guard does not engage in matters of a controversial nature.

Dombek, who, with headquarters in New York, will be entrusted with the organization of Nazi stormtroopers in America.

It is also reported that the Ministry of Propaganda has obtained \$95,800 through secret sources for the formation of stormtroop bodies in the United States, which it was said, will be paid through three officials in the New York and Chicago German consulates.

**"It is reliably reported," the article goes on to say, "that \$750,000 has been set aside since May 9 by Dr. Goebbels for Nazi propaganda in the United States and for the formation of Nazi organizations in America."**

From October, 1933, to May, 1934, \$1,719,000 has been spent on National Socialist propaganda here. The article also states that 18 Nazi Officers sail here "In April and May eighteen Nazi officials sailed for the United States."

"We believe we can best fortify Jewish morale and furnish the most effective answer to misrepresentation and prejudice by means of a vital and constructive religious life.

"We therefore urge every Jew to enroll in the synagogue of his choice, and generously to support its program of Jewish religious idealism."

## U. S. Jews' Aid To Exiles Hailed By McDonald

### Gives Farewell Message as He Sails for Europe

Before he sailed for Europe yesterday aboard the steamship Albatross, James G. McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, issued a farewell message congratulating the Jews of America for their efforts in behalf of Jewish refugees from Germany.

Mr. McDonald's statement, adopted by the League of Nations, national chairman of the German Jewish relief effort, expressed confidence that the United Jewish Appeal, which already has reached the halfway mark in its drive for \$3,000,000, will raise its full quota.

### His Parting Message

The High Commissioner's message to Mr. Waxing and to the Jews of America follows in part: "A few months ago, when I learned of the decision of the American Joint Distribution Committee and of the American Palestine Campaign of the Jewish Agency for Palestine to join hands in an effort to raise an adequate fund for the relief of their German brethren, I said:

"Once more, as so frequently throughout their long, heroic and tragic history, the Jews are showing their willingness to make great sacrifices on behalf of their fellow Jews."

Close contact with the United Jewish Appeal during the few weeks I have been at home has shown me the extent to which the Jews of America have accepted their responsibility.

After remarking that achievement of the United Jewish Appeal's goal would prove to the Jews of Germany throughout the world that they may rely on their brothers in this country, Mr. McDonald concludes with the wish that "my fellow Christians would move to raise money to set the Jews of America, for the principles involved in the tragedy of the German refugees are universal."

I.

Mrs. Adela Goldstein, presiding, urged that the activities of the Mizrachi school for Jewish women in Palestine be increased so that a greater number of exiled Jewish women might be admitted. The organization adopted a resolution endorsing her request.

About 200 persons attended.

## Liberals Flay Nazi Acts in Consul Protest

### Demand Cessation of Barbarity, Release of Prisoners

(Special to the J.D.B.)  
PHILADELPHIA, June 20. — Representatives of liberal organizations have joined in a protest against persecution of political prisoners, Communists, Socialists and Jews by the Nazis in Germany.

A delegation of ten, headed by Mrs. Katharine L. Harris, secretary of the Philadelphia League Against War and Fascism, marched upon the office of Arno P. Mowitz, German consul general here, at 1420 Walnut street, and presented a petition which was received by a clerk in Mowcland in part:

"We demand the unconditional release of Ernst Thaelmann and of all political prisoners in Germany. We demand a stop to the persecution of Jews by the Hitler government and the cessation of all brutality committed against the German working class."

The group insisted that Mowitz "immediately communicate these statements to the proper authorities for effective instant action, before new lives may be lost or new tortures committed." The delegates left immediately after delivering the petition. There was no disorder, although six mounted and three foot policemen were on hand.

Signers of the petition were: Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Emily Cope Gordon, co-president, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom; Miss Mary Martin Gleason, of the Pioneer Youth League; Mrs. L. L. Reschauer, former secretary, Women's International League; Vincent Mullin, American Civil Liberties Union; Gordon Cope, Swarthmore College; Miss Emma G. Gruher, of the Bureau of Municipal Research; Miss Sara Glantz, Miss Sara Rosenthal, Mrs. Philip Kind, Rabbi Feibelman and Herbert Syme.

## Gratz College Graduates Five; Morris Plaque Is Presented

(Special to the J.D.B.)  
PHILADELPHIA, June 20. — Five students were graduated this evening from Gratz College, the oldest Jewish teachers' institute in this country.

A feature of the graduation was the presentation of a plaque in memory of William Morris, for many years president of the College and leader of Mikhiv Israel Congregation, oldest congregation in this city and one of the oldest in the country. Prior to his death in 1924, Mr. Morris expressed the wish that a memorial devoted to Jewish education or philanthropy be established by his widow, Hannah Morris.

With this in view, a trusteeship was created, consisting of Mrs. Morris, Dr. Cyrus Adler, Judge Horace Stein, Leon J. Obermayer, and D. Hays Solis-Cohen. Mrs. Morris reserved the income from the property during her life and gave to the trustees wide latitude with regard to the eventual disposition of the fund. She died in October, 1921.

After consideration, the trustees elected to make a gift of \$5,000 of the principal of the trust to the Hebrew Sunday School Society. The balance of the fund,

consisting of real estate and mortgages from which it is hoped ultimately to realize \$85,000, was conveyed to the Northern Trust Company in trust, to distribute the income to the Board of Overseers of Gratz College so long as the Board of Trustees of Gratz College and the Hebrew Education Society act together for the support of Gratz College.

It was further provided that it at any time the existing arrangement between the Hebrew Education Society and the trustees of Gratz College should terminate the property should then be divided equally between the Hebrew Education Society as part of its permanent fund and the Board of Trustees of Gratz College as part of its endowment.

The Board of Overseers of Gratz College-Hebrew Education Society resolved to erect in Gratz College a tablet suitably inscribed in acknowledgment of this gift and in honor of the donors.

The presentation of the tablet was made by Leon J. Obermayer and accepted by Rabbi Abraham A. Neuman. Brief addresses were delivered by Rabbi Philip Lips and Abraham P. Pivovsky, president of the Gratz College Alumni Association.

## B'nai Brith Parley To Be Held July 1

## Church Federation Frowns on Boycott

Philadelphia Christians Decline to Support Anti-Nazi Meeting

PHILADELPHIA, June 20. — The Philadelphia Federation of Churches at its regular meeting, yesterday approved action taken by its secretary, the Rev. Dr. E. A. E. Palmquist, in refusing to join in the sponsorship of a meeting arranged by the Non-sectarian anti-Nazi League in the interest of the boycott.

The meeting is scheduled to take place in the Metropolitan Opera House Wednesday evening, with Samuel Untermyer, president of the League, as principal speaker.

The State Federation of Labor, the Central Labor Union of Philadelphia, the American Legion and the Jewish War Veterans, joined in sponsoring the meeting. The purpose of the meeting is to express disapproval of the Hitler regime in Germany.

The Church Federation in an official statement said: "We do not feel that it is the place of a church organization to support the boycott of German goods."

## Brown Tears Mask off Nazism In Series of Illinois Lectures

(Special to the J.D.B.)

CHICAGO, June 20. — Harrison Brown, European representative of the Chicago Committee for the Defense of Human Rights Against Nazism, will address the Boycott Conference affiliated with the Chicago Committee, at the Labor Lyceum next Tuesday evening. Other speakers will include Dr. Charles Copeland Smith, Dr. Z. Lorber and Jacob Siegal, chairman.

State Senator Roy C. Woods has been elected chairman of the finance committee of the lawyers' division. Mr. Woods appealed to the lawyers of Chicago to aid in the boycotting of Nazi-made goods and to support the activities of the Chicago Committee.

Addresses Women

One of the meetings addressed by Mr. Brown on his State tour was that of the Women's Division at the Hotel LaSalle. Nearly 200 women heard the Englishman tear the mask off Nazism and reveal the pitiful condition of women and children in Germany. Miss Harriet, chairman of the Women's Division, presided. Among the guests were Miss Mary MacDowell of the University of Chicago Settlement, Prof. Mary Glavin, Mrs. Catherine Waight MacCallister, Mrs. Ada McKinley, Mrs. Lillian Summers, Mrs. William S. Hefferan, Mrs. Harriet Park Thomas, Mrs. Salmon O. Levinson, Mrs. M. N. English, Miss Jean Duncan Clark, Mrs. George Bass, Mrs. Thoma P. Kaurmann, Mrs. Glenn E. Plumb and Miss Amelia Sears. In Springfield Mr. Brown ad-

ressed a Christian meeting at the Centennial Hall. More than 600 residents of the State capital attended and unanimously passed a resolution condemning the Nazi treatment of minority groups and further pledged themselves to refrain from purchasing all Nazi-made goods "so long as such inhumanities are known to continue."

Woman a Distraction

"The G-rman woman," Mr. Brown related, "according to the Nazi ideal, is but the distraction of the tired warrior. No section of the German community has been so duped by Hitler as the female population."

"The gangster Nazi-regime of Hitler will last long enough to launch the war it is working for when it thinks it is strong enough to win it," Mr. Brown charged, "or the Nazi regime will be brought down by one of the active crises which is bound to occur as the result of such a crazy regime. The only way in which this all-important crisis can be precipitated is by a boycott. The situation in Germany today is becoming more and more difficult. The boycott makes it more difficult and the boycott is going to precipitate the crisis which is the only possible means of our escaping the indescribable horrors of another war."

# The Bulletin's Day Book

An old Greek gentleman, Hippocrates by name and known to all physicians as the "father of medicine" who is supposed to have formulated an oath which to this day forms the sum and substance of the medical code of ethics, may be properly envisioned as having indulged in a bit of "turning over" and other calisthenics peculiar to those dwellers in beneath-the-ground domiciles who have been deeply annoyed at some above-the-ground occurrence.

The above-the-ground occurrence that has undoubtedly given the doctor his "turning over" as much annoyance as he has suffered in many years was the recent sensation created by the large group of Montreal internes.

With emergency operations waiting to be performed, this body of youthful physicians, with the Hippocratic oath prominently still fresh in their memories, laid down their tools, discarded their operating gowns and deserted their new assumed status at the Notre Dame Hospital.

Their desertion they termed a "protest." It was a protest against the presence in their midst of Jewish physicians, Dr. Sam Rabinovich.

Action of the executive head of the department in this emergency, therefore, was immediate and commendable. He dismissed the internes and called for volunteer physicians to fill the void and at the same time invited applications from other recent medical school graduates to fill the vacancies created by the dismissal.

Understandably in this situation, however, this action precipitated a crisis in other French Canadian hospitals throughout the city, where more physicians walked out at the same time in sympathy with the original band of strikers.

While this situation threatened to become so serious that fatalities were being contemplated, Dr. Rabinovich, the innocent cause of the whole nasty business, decided that the time had come

for him to act. Whether his decision was voluntary, or pressure was brought to bear upon him, the fact remains that the Jewish doctor resigned. His resignation was worded in such a way that the prejudice-ridden internes were put in the extremely bad light they selected for themselves.

"... because care of the sick has always been of first importance to the Jewish people," his letter of resignation explained.

Quite palpably, "care of the sick" was of secondary importance to the hot-headed, race-biased young doctors. Giving a Jew the "worship" was of primary importance.

There can be nothing but praise for young Dr. Rabinovich's self-sacrificing action. In the action of the hospital authorities, however, in receiving back to the fold the violators of the Hippocratic oath, there is little honor. True, they had the patients to consider. But surely, sufficient doctors could have been brought to Montreal at very short notice to replace those who had been so careless of their trust. Instead of sticking by their dismissal act, the hospital authorities, after having acted with courage and honor, turned their back on both and received the culprits with forgiveness.

True, the forgiveness was tempered with condemnation of the strike, but the internes had won their point in that they in their position had reaffirmed their original refusal to work with the Jewish physician.

## Beer-Guzzling Nazis in Saloon Hatch Plot, 'Cell in Back Room'

The League of Friends of New Germany, now organizing a cell at College Point, met in a roisterous session in the rear room of a saloon at Eighteenth and Fourth avenue until an early hour yesterday morning, completing plans for a well-knit group, scheduled to begin operation in the next month. McLaughlin, described as "Yiddish outrage" against German Americans and called upon the attendance to draw into the Nazi Organization the large German American element of College Point. McLaughlin issued a mighty appeal by declaring himself of only twenty per cent German blood (the rest, apparently, being Irish) and crying:

"God, if I'm willing to work sixteen hours a day without salary, you Germans should be willing at least to join up in the movement."

McLaughlin is the editor of the English language supplement of that highly profitable enterprise, the Deutsche Zeitung, weekly organ of the Friends of New Germany.

## Kaplan Lauds Medical Work In Palestine

Sees 'New Deal' There  
and Atmosphere  
of Content

Dr. Ira I. Kaplan, director of the cancer division of the New York Department of hospitals, who returned recently from a visit to Palestine, said yesterday that the medical accomplishments in the Holy Land are astounding in spite of the continuous influx of immigrants, the prevailing superstitions regarding scientific treatment, and the lack of sanitation in the old sections of the cities. Dr. Kaplan addressed the national board of directors of the Zionist Organization of America, at a tea at the home of Mrs. Herman Shulman, 315 Central Park West.

He referred to the low maternal death rate in the Hadassah hospital in Palestine, declaring that the rate of 3.8 per 1,000 cases in Palestine is an admirable pre-natal control and careful work on the part of midwives and doctors, who, due to lack of hospital space, must conduct the home births.

Describing the Hadassah-Rothschild Hospital building in Jerusalem as "ancient," Dr. Kaplan said its history is accomplishing is amazing.

"New Deal" in Zion  
"The hospital is long outmoded," he said. "It is in need of a new deal," he said. "It lacks most of the modern equipment which in this country is considered as a matter of course. It lacks the newest, most modern hospital equipment which is available in our hospitals here; it has no ambulance. Unquestionably Jerusalem needs a new, large, modern hospital. It needs a new building and the construction of the Hadassah-University Hospital ought to be begun immediately."

Dr. Kaplan said that the two most striking facts in Palestine today are the building activity everywhere and the atmosphere of optimism among the people. He noted that the children are happy and independent. He summed up present conditions of the country with the words: "A new era of employment, industrial and agricultural activity and a populace busy and satisfied."

how he was forced to flee from the Nazis last March, making his getaway just before his arrest. The charge against him was that he defended in court Socialists and Communists and that he represented his party in the Reichstag.

He recalled how nine years ago, as a member of the Reichstag he was elected to the National Council to attend the International Parliamentary Conference. "At that time I was received and greeted most graciously by the German Ambassador and the Consul," the German Jewish jurist reminisced through an interpreter.

"Yes, a grave crisis has existed in the ranks of the National Socialist party for a long time now," he declared in reference to the recent controversy over the Von Papen speech. "There is plenty of internal trouble. This fall will witness a considerable modification in the regime and then its overthrow."

As for the possibility of the monarchist restoration, the visitor said that once achieved it will be a military dictatorship immediately after the Hitler downfall, and declined to discuss the chances of the Communists in Germany.

He revealed how his house in a Berlin suburb and other property were confiscated. His daughter, Mrs. H. Kirschner, herself an attorney, who also fled Germany because she understood to represent a citizen of Poland in a German court, and that action was regarded as treason against the fatherland.

Jews, Dr. Rosenfeld said, have been deprived of all rights of citizenship. They are treated as aliens, and the continuous persecution promises to become much worse.
