

EDITORIAL NOTES By HERMAN BERNSTEIN

Governor Lehman's Appeal
GOVERNOR HERBERT H. LEHMAN delivered an impressive address at the dinner arranged by the United Jewish Appeal in Brooklyn.

Governor Lehman spoke, in part, as follows:
"In a large sense this United Jewish Appeal is our answer to those iniquitous forces which invoke discrimination and hatred and denial of opportunity. The two organizations which make up the United Jewish Appeal have been working desperately to rebuild the broken lives of thousands upon thousands of the Jews of Germany who have suddenly found themselves without a home in the very land in which for countless generations they and their forefathers have lived and worked."

Then, after describing the contribution that German Jewry had made to the upbuilding of Germany, every field of human endeavor, the Governor said:

"There has been no secrecy, no equivocation on the part of the German government. Hundreds of thousands of men and women in all walks of life have been ruthlessly and without pity deprived of their means of livelihood and of the primary rights of citizenship. Loyalty, patriotism, service counted for naught. Doctors, lawyers, civil servants, university professors, musicians, industrial workers have been driven from their positions and have been denied the right to work at their vocations. Even the right to education is now being denied many of the Jewish children and youths, regardless of their intellectual qualifications."

"These men and women in great numbers are now undergoing indescribable suffering and suffering. They must be helped lest they go hungry; they must be aided lest they yield to their despair."

These statements, in one form or another, have been made before. They are based on the facts of the Jewish tragedy. But they assume special significance and impressiveness when uttered by Governor Lehman, who first distinguished himself as a humanitarian and one of the greatest states in the Union. He has served the people with unequalled modesty and earnestness, with courage and dignity and a boundless sympathy.

Governor Lehman's appeal for aid for the Jewish people in their tragic plight cannot fail to make a profound impression and to call forth a most generous response.

Nazis Plan DAWA Unit For Boston

New York Organizer Addresses 300 in Counter-Boycott

(Special to the J.D.B.)
BOSTON, June 22.—Although the mask of secrecy was to be worn by a gathering of Hitler sympathizers held in the Turn Verdin Hall, Jamaica Plain, last night, the Jewish Daily Bulletin has learned that initial steps are being taken to organize a Boston branch of the DAWA, business organization of German Americans who are openly hostile to the Jews and who aim to destroy the boycott of German-made products. One of the chief functions of the organization is to establish a boycott of Jewish business houses.

Louis Zahne of New York City told the meeting, which was attended by a large group of German extraction, that they "must organize for their good." Those present, numbering about 300, expressed approval of the Friends of New Germany, a completely Naziized organization.

Zahne told his hearers that the economic security of countless German Americans is imperiled. He said that discrimination against German Americans is forcing a great many out of their jobs because of a belief current that they are in sympathy with the Nazi movement.

Police Guard Hall
He said: "American citizens cannot be Nazi, neither can Germans who have become citizens of America join in the movement. On the other hand members of the Nazi party in Germany cannot belong to the American society of Friends of New Germany."

A police cordon stood guard outside the meeting hall. The speaker pointed out that the founding of the society is being based on the attitude of the "persistent discrimination."

"It is not our purpose to preach hatred," he continued. "The Jewish people have every right to representation in the affairs of the United States government. There are millions of them but, because of the discrimination against us, we are not getting the representation."

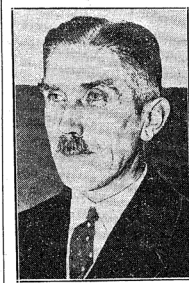
Five Nazis Quizzed by Dickstein On National Guard Membership

Polish Jews Target of New Radical Attack

Nara-Endek Combine Insinuates They Had Pieracki Killed

LONDON, June 22.—A new and subtle campaign against the Jews of Poland has been undertaken by the National Radicals (Naras) and the National Democrats (Endeks), following suppression by the government authorities of most of the overt anti-Semitic demonstrations by the two factions, it was revealed today.

The campaign is in the form of insinuations that Jews were responsible for the murder last week of Col. Bronislaw Pieracki, Minister of the Interior and intimate associate of Marshal Pilsudski. Pieracki's murder followed commencement of a heavy drive under his direction against Nazis and

London Herald Sees Wilhelm Staging Comeback Over Nazism

Fake Assassination of Adolf, With Jew as 'Goat' Feared as Stimulant for Reich Worship of Fuehrer—Von Papen Held in High Esteem

LONDON, June 22.—The ring of steel that Herr Hitler and his Nazi demagogues have thrown about themselves is momentarily expected to turn on the Fuehrer, throw him and his policies into the discard, establish a military dictatorship and before the year is out restore the monarchy with Kaiser Wilhelm on the throne.

That is the picture painted for a London Daily Herald correspondent at Doorn, Holland, by a member of the former Kaiser's official family. According to this correspondent, German army leaders, particularly those identified as "old-line

Prussian" officers whose affection for and loyalty to Wilhelm has never dimmed, have joined hands with the Junker class, whose strongest and most popular representative is the Col. von Papen who early this week started the work with his speech that defied the Hitler policy of massing criticism.

The affiliation of these two influential factors in the Reich, the Herald informant stated, was definitely for the purpose of swaying President von Hindenburg to remove Adolf Hitler from the chancellorship into which he more than a year ago placed him.

The Goal Is Close
That this goal is close to achievement than most people believe was the avowed belief of the ex-Kaiser's associate. He placed Hitler's downfall, "on the basis of information received here," at some time this coming winter.

The Doorn spokesman declared that there has never been any sympathy wasted between the former Kaiser and the Nazi regime and that there now exists a close

CAPITAL COMMENT

WASHINGTON — Suggestions that debtor nations might make payments in kind to the United States have reopened speculation on negotiations for trade agreements. The German government's note to this country was quite matter in its approach in that every encouragement should be given to increased trade between the United States and Germany if this country respects to credit debts from the Reich.

Just before all of the talk about payments in kind, and before the exchange of notes between the United States and debtor nations, George N. Peck, head of the newly created Federal Bank for stimulating exports, made a report to President Roosevelt in which he pointed out that if this nation expects to sell goods abroad it will have to import more goods in return. This report paved the way for President Roosevelt's message concerning payments in kind and took all of the shock out of the suggestion.

Germany is in a critical economic situation and is sorely in need of export outlets. The boycott against the Hitler government, primarily because of its anti-Semitic policies has seriously curtailed Germany's trade with the United States, Great Britain, France and other countries. Further curtailment of Germany's trade is seen in reports that Great Britain, France and other nations are considering stern reprisals in the form of a special customs tax on German goods, or the impounding of German trade balances. These are being considered because of Germany's failure to meet her obligations to creditor nations.

The United States would like to collect her debts from Germany. Also, this country would very much like to have Germany buy more American goods, especially land and other hog products. Germany once was this country's leading market for land. Now it is the poorest market because of trade barriers. The loss of the German market for hog products has been a severe blow to American agriculture. George Peck would like to have the United States regain this market and it could be done, if this country would agree to buy more goods from Germany.

Germany has an extensive interest in the German moratorium. Approximately \$100,000,000 of the Dawes-Young loans are held in this country, while it is estimated that about \$600,000,000 represents the aggregate of other affected issues of German municipalities, governmental subdivisions and industrial corporations — in possession of American investors. Germany claims that the only way Americans can expect to be paid is through the purchase of more goods from her.

Germany is bitter in blaming the outside world for her present critical economic position. The country has been hard hit by the boycott on German wares and the Reich argues that as long as Germany is debarrated from selling abroad on a normal scale and building up commercial balances by that means she cannot meet her obligations. Germany admits that the boycott is causing economic paralysis and she is determined to resort to any course to enforce its removal.

A Government official, who better than any other American knows what is going on in Germany, last winter said that the Hitler government was about to face a serious crisis. At the time he expressed an opinion that he doubted if the Hitler power could remain in the saddle much longer without the threat of Hitler's fighting lieutenants breaking away from

their leader's policies.

This Government official's words rang true the other day when Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen issued a vigorous blast against Nazi doctrines. Another break was the recent resignation of Count Rudolf Nadschi as German ambassador to Russia. In East Prussia opposition is developing against the Hitler regime's policies, especially as they seem agricultural.

Of great significance to world Jewry is the visit to this country of Baron Maurice de Rothschild, a scion of the famous house of Rothschild and one of the leading members of the French Senate. Baron de Rothschild is one of the powerful men of France. He is deeply interested in international affairs and in particular has been a close observer of what is going on in Germany. In the French Senate he is considered one of the

best informed members on international affairs.

His visit to the United States was in connection with a world tour. Baron de Rothschild came to the United States from Japan where he had the privilege rarely granted to foreigners, of being received by Emperor Hirohito.

The plight of Jews in Germany is very close to his heart. While in the United States he had occasion to discuss the situation with several leading Government officials.

Germany's policy of spending millions for Nazi propaganda in other countries and spending additional millions for building up a military machine is not being looked upon with favor by most nations, especially those to which Germany owes money.

With Congress out of the way, the McCormack committee investigating subversive propaganda activities in the United States is making preparations for holding a series of hearings in various sections of the country. These are expected to begin in the next two

or three weeks. Representative John W. McCormack, committee chairman, has indicated that addi-

tional surprises are in store for the American public when the committee resumes its public hearings.

only Jewish college in the United States, President Bernard Revel delivered a masterful address in which he analyzed and appraised the situation of the world today from a truly Jewish viewpoint and declared that education is the only salvation for civilization in the present moral crisis.

He pointed out that the world is not safe for peace and democracy today, that it can know no rest while the forces of darkness sanctify the bloody creed of racial supremacy and of ill will toward men in defense of humanity's urgent cry for understanding among men and nations.

Referring to Nazism, Dr. Revel said:

"Medieval darkness has settled upon a great country that was once a home of culture and idealism. We stand aghast, bewildered and humiliated witnesses of the moral degradation of a once great nation. Germany is celebrating a bloody renaissance of cold bigotry and savage arrogance."

It was most fitting that this eloquent estimate of Hitlerism and of the Jewish tragedy as part of the world tragedy was presented on this occasion at the Jewish institution of learning. Educational institutions should be the first to arouse the world conscience.

Jews and Olympic Games

William May Garald, promoter of the California Olympic games and member of the International Committee, on his return from Europe, gave the assurance that Jewish teams from Palestine and Jewish athletes from other countries will take part in the Olympic Games to be held in Berlin, in 1936.

The American Jewish Congress has expressed disapproval of Mr. Garald's statement and pointed to the fact that none of Germany's promises during the past year with regard to fair play were kept.

I believe that Jewish teams from Palestine and Jewish athletes from other lands will participate in the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936. But before 1936 Hitlerism will have been relegated to the scrapheap of history.

The Palestine teams and other Jewish athletes, in accepting invitations to participate in the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936, should stipulate that their acceptance is conditioned upon the provision that there shall be no religious or racial discrimination of any kind at that time and that if they shall not be confined to sports only.

Pertinent and Impertinent

The Bible, which has been treasured in the past and is treasured today, has all everything to do with it, is not interestingly known to the modern Jewess. For some reason the Jewish woman of today, who has sought in every way to become a cultured person, who keeps faithfully up with the times by reading all the modern novels, essays, biographies and poetry, has disregarded the most treasured of all literary works, the oldest and the newest, and the one great cultural contribution her race has made to the world.

If it is to be familiar with the Bible is the duty of a Jew, it is at least a pleasant duty. There is a great deal in the Bible that is not only beautiful and stirring, but vital and important—as important surely as the latest newspaper murder trial. The sentimentally inclined who ruin countless dozens of handkerchiefs at the movies or over sad books, may find a more worthwhile substitute for such movies or books in the age-old and ever-lovely story of Ruth. Her devotion and its happy reward make up one of the most exciting tales in all literature.

For Tales of Depression

And as for those who have been reading the tales of this depression and the subsequent tribulations of mankind, they may draw very pretty analogies with the story of Job and his great patience. There are tales of courage and endurance, weakness and strength, love and hatred. There is the tragic figure of the leader, Moses, who may only look at the Promised Land from afar, and who must know that the great goal he has worked for will be reached by another. There is the fairy story of the lovely Esther, whose innocence triumphs over the villainy of the cruel Haman. There is the heroism of the Maccabees, and the tale of human weakness so often seen repeated, in the worship of the Golden Calf.

There are wonderfully drawn characters, too. David with his many virtues and his very human failings is a real person. Solomon combines the disillusioned wisdom of the preacher with the joyous tenderness that shows itself in the Song of Songs, the loveliest of all love poetry. There is humor, there is pathos, there is bitterness, and there is joy.

Grandeur of Prophets

There is the grandeur of the prophets. And there is the breathtaking beauty of the Psalms. Most people know the twenty-third Psalm, a few know the first and the hundred and thirty-eighth. There are many as lovely, perhaps lovelier than these. With all these treasures so easily accessible, it is surprising that so many of this generation have forgotten to look for them.

Every Jewess required to read a book should help us either to enjoy the life or to endure it. The Bible does this. It contains the life, and it teaches us wisdom. It may be read for religious reasons, and for intellectual and spiritual satisfaction. It does something more, however, something that can be said of only the greatest literature of the ages—it helps us to understand life. For this last gift alone it deserves to be read.

Alien's Desire to Learn English Inspired Free Classes for Poor

Miss Sarah Elkus Sees Need for Making the Foreign-Born at Home

Eighteen years ago Miss Sarah Elkus, director of day classes for adults in English and citizenship, and an unusual experience. She described the event most vividly herself.

"While attending the graduation exercises of a public school on the lower East Side I noticed a woman sitting near me. She was weeping bitterly. I asked her the reason. She replied in her native language, that 'The schoolmaster is my daughter and I can not understand a word of what she is saying.'"

Miss Elkus then advised this sorrowful mother, who felt that she had lost contact with the life and the interests of her children, to learn English. However, the woman declared this to be impossible. She could not go to an evening school on account of her husband and children, and would not permit her to pay for private education.

Miss Elkus says that she realized this momentous point, and then she began to look for men and women who could not attend an evening school, and she invited the mother to come to the Educational Alliance on the lower East Side and bring with her a few friends who were likewise eager to learn English. Out of this small group grew the classes in English and citizenship. Classes are sponsored by the Board of Education and are a real blessing to the lower East Side.

Foreign-Born Isolated

For it is the foreign-born mother who more than any other member of the immigrant family suffers from an intellectual isolation. Miss Elkus points out that the men in the streets and the shops, the children at school and at play do not touch with the influences, but the mother is left in the home without any stimulating contact. She sees her husband and children growing away from her, she hears them speak a strange language, in the end she feels an outsider in her own family. Yet it is she who creates the home.

the atmosphere of the home, who has the health and the happiness of the entire family in her keeping.

The day classes for adults help these women to step out of their humiliating isolation and to share in the life of the family, the life of the community. Instruction in English embues the mother to understand and watch over the school progress of her children, to confer with teacher or principal, to write understanding notes to school teachers, to attend parents' meetings, and to appreciate the value of prolonging as far as possible the school life of her children.

There are at present 185 such classes in existence with a register of about 9,000 pupils, of whom only 300 are men. The others are chiefly mothers who are eager to keep up with the educational progress of their children. The average attendance is thirty-five in each class.

The wise and encouraging leadership of Miss Elkus, who has created this much needed educational service, is also responsible for the Adults Students' Association. In other words the pupils of the day classes were organized for the purpose of increasing educational facilities outside of the actual classroom. Accompanied by their teachers the adult pupils have visited museums and attended lectures. They once made a trip to Albany and were received by the Governor. Several of them, quite a goodly number, went to Washington to meet there Mr. Franklin D. Roosevelt. Thus a richer and fuller life is provided for those who without these classes would have been isolated and remain unhappy aliens in our midst.

And all this because Miss Elkus saw a woman cry at the graduation exercises of her daughter.

What about the woman behind the scenes that about the personality of Miss Elkus? That she is able, her success has shown. That she has human sympathy and understanding, in clear or she would have never conceived the idea of these classes. Otherwise she is rather hurried, rather short, not caring much for the superficial graces and amenities, possessing an intellectual vigor which considers only the essentials. Miss Elkus is a member of the United States as Ambassador to Turkey, but proud as she must be of him, she does not speak of him, she does not speak of herself, she only speaks of her work. It is this work to which she has given her entire personality, her full creative power. Therefore it is something very much alive, a splendid testimonial to the fine service which modern woman renders the community.

Latvia Queries 20 On Nazi Boycott

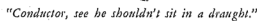

Froehlich DAW A Plea Creates Hardly a Breeze in Windy City

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CHICAGO, June 22.—So far as Chicago is concerned the DAWA is merely an alphabetical arrangement without meaning.

Efforts on the part of Hans Froehlich, president of the DAWA in New York, where the Deutsche Amerikanische Wirtschafts Ausschuss (German American Protective Alliance) is being used as an anti-Jewish boycott weapon in the hands of Nazi sympathizers, to create a DAWA cell in Chicago are a complete flop.

DAWA leaders are sorely disappointed over the outcome of their meeting held last night in the Atlantic Hotel, which attracted about thirty per cent of the expected turn-out. Nazis had estimated from 500 to 800 persons would attend. Those who did attend were obscure unknown. Not a single important German American merchant was present.

Froehlich advised Chicago to use the DAWA for purposes similar to those being pursued in New York, where, he said, 30,000 boycott buttons have been sold to consumers at \$1 apiece. He said in New York the DAWA office keeps its staff of men busy distributing literature. He urged that all Chicago German American merchants be brought into line, and asked that

everyone possible travel to Germany, taking advantage of cheap rail fares there, because the Fatherland needs tourist money.

National Labor Group To Fete Sprinzak Here

The National Labor Committee for the Jewish Workers in Palestine arranged a banquet for Saturday night at Central Plaza in honor of Joseph Sprinzak and Goldie Myerson, of the Palestine Labor Delegation, who will sail for Palestine the beginning of July.

Young Judaea Parley Will Honor Memory Of Theodor Herzl

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CINCINNATI, June 22.—The thirtieth anniversary of the death of Theodor Herzl, founder of Zionism, will be commemorated at the national convention of Young Judaea, to be held in Cincinnati July 6 to 9 inclusive. There will be a memorial service, sponsored by the Hadassah and other local organizations in association with the convention committee.

A feature of the program will be the virtual transfer of the Avondale Synagogue, of which Rabbis Louis Feinberg is spiritual leader, to the convention hall of the Net-

Reich a Tomb for Young Jews, Zion Only Hope, Says Traveler

(Special to the J.D.B.)
SEATTLE, Wash., June 22.—"In Munich, Hitler's stronghold, I was told that the little Austrian housepainter who today has the German nation under the iron heel of dictatorship, will topple from power within a year and a half or two years. Germany is feeling the boycott—and it hurts!"

This was the observation of Emanuel Rosenberg, pioneer communal leader, who has just returned from a five-months' trip with his wife which took him to the two centers of world Jewish attention—Palestine and Germany. He spoke on his travel experiences at a B'nai B'rith luncheon.

"As long as Hitler reigns, German Jewry's fate is pitifully hopeless," declared Mr. Rosenberg, who spent some time in Berlin and Munich.

Tomb for Young
"And for the young Jews, Germany is a tomb. In grammar schools Jewish children are taunted and mistreated; after graduation there are no jobs for Jews. The Jew cannot leave Germany because he is not allowed to take his money out of the country. Socially ostracized, the Jew in Germany today lives always in dread of new oppression."

"I talked with many Jews, who, if they had been overheard in their conversation with me, would have been punished with imprisonment—even death—at the hands of the Nazis. For although millions are not in sympathy with Hitlerism in Germany today and even in the Nazis' own ranks there is dissension that is kept from the outside world—the gag of anti-Hitlerite sentiment keeps everyone mum."

In contrast to Jewish misery in Germany Mr. Rosenberg told how he had found happy Jewish workers in the lands of Palestine, which he has visited previously in 1922.

"There is no unemployment, no depression, no anti-Semitism in Palestine," he said.

Refuge in Palestine

"And from what I saw in Germany the young Jews in that land of terror must be sent to Palestine, where they can live proudly as Jews, instead of without hope and without a future, their lives shattered."

Mr. Rosenberg returned to Seattle in time to celebrate his sixtieth birthday yesterday. He was born in New York, came west to Portland in 1888 and settled in Seattle in 1888. He witnessed the great Seattle fire which wiped out the city's business section, helped found Seattle's first synagogue and was a founder of Seattle's only Reform synagogue, Temple de Hirsch, of which he is now a vice-president.

BOOKS

The Nazis Didn't Like This Book

THE reason for which the Saturday Evening Post was "verboten" in Hitler's Germany has just come out in book form. It is a novel by I. A. R. Wylie bearing the title of "To the Vanquished" and is published by Doubleday, Doran.

In the baldest of outlines "To the Vanquished" is the story of divided loyalties among Hitler's storm troopers, of soldiers of the swastika whose hearts and whose minds question the brutalities, horrors and injuries which they are forced to commit for that meta-physical entity known as Germany. The scene is a frontier town in Germany, just before, and after, the call of Hitler to the Chancellorship. Essentially a love story in a social setting, the chief protagonists are Franzl, the daughter of the liberal pacifist, Dr. Roth, and Wolf von Selteneck, a starved lad and head of a gang of starvings who are known as "hooligans" or sub-leaders, of the town's storm troops.

The story starts with Wolf breaking into the home of the Roths ready to murder for a bit of food and being vanquished by the calm and affectionate understanding in the eyes of Franzl. Then Wolf, by act of "heroism" in a raid on a pacifist meeting, makes himself a member of the newly quartered troops, and from then on Franzl and Wolf together fight against and finally submit to the love which calls to each across the artificial line of cleavage which Hitlerism has set up.

Wolf's act is the essential story in "To the Vanquished," but it is given in settings which make the book a social-historical docu-

ment of a minor character. The raid on the pacifist meeting, the raid on the hospital, the raid on the home of the Roths, the parade of the troops' victims through the streets, among them the Franzl whose spotless integrity even the troopers have to recognize, and then the final scene in the concentration camp where a typhoid epidemic lays low prisoners and captors until the final logical, but unexpected, denouement, are among the elements of social data in the book.

The value of the story is in the pleasant fusion Miss Wylie has made of fiction and fact. Persons who could not be persuaded to read such a work as "The Brown Book of the Hitler Terror" will read a love story in which the social data, although an integral part of the book, does not outweigh the fictional elements. And despite the suppression of the magazine in which the book ran serially, I believe it can be said that Miss Wylie keeps the scales even, giving reasonable motivations to the storm troopers, trying to see in their own terms their justification for doing the things they do. It just can't be helped if those things outrun a stranger's sense of justice when she puts them into story form.

Jewish Scholars Get Brazil Posts

(Slovak Telegraph Agency)

SAO PAULO, June 22. The University of Sao Paulo will have three German Jewish professors this summer, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned today from Theodor Ramos, who was sent abroad by the university to close contracts with a number of scholars.

Ramos declared he had placed under contracts Professor Felix Raivitcher of Freiburg, Professor Ernst Breslau of Cologne and Professor Reinhold of Bonn, all of whom will arrive at Santos on the General Oazi on July 27.

Before the teachers were permitted to leave Germany their appointments had to be ratified by the German education ministry and the Brazilian government was obliged to intervene in their behalf, Ramos revealed.

The Jew in Science

THE JEW IN SCIENCE, by Louis Gershenfeld, The Jewish Publication Society of America, Philadelphia, 1934.

This book is of value principally for its chapters on the place of Jewish science and scientists in history and for its lists of Jewish sci-

entists of the past century. The lack of a complete index, however, makes it difficult for one to find names quickly. The brief biographical notes, too, are incomplete. Mr. Gershenfeld promises an elaboration of the volume; perhaps it will then really fill the need it attempts to fill at present.

AMONG THE LITERATI

Inside Publishers' Offices

No matter when you call the office of Alfred Knopf the inevitable reply from the publisher is, "He is in conference." This set phrase applies to almost everybody but the office boy. As a matter of fact all executives are called in meeting at least once a day.

Very few Dutton books consist of but one edition and that is not because of large sales. The practice in that house is to split the normal first edition into two or more printings.

Ever so often when the office manager says that the Simon and Schuster employees are becoming stale he chatters a large part of the force off for a week. After the Macaulay

we called all his employees together and asked them to air all their grievances. Result: each person working in this agency has received a salary raise.

You are not a graduate of Princeton University your chances of getting a job at Scribner's are practically non-existent. At a meeting publishers held some time ago head of this house was in the course of the meeting the question of borrowing money from banks arose. One of the gentlemen turned to Mr. S. and asked him what his views on the matter were. Mr. S. replied, "I hardly know, we never have borrowed any money."

The Macmillan company, besides having their own skyscraper building on Fifth avenue, also occupy a private house right next to the office space which is used as a dining hall for the heads of departments. There are so many employees that this was found to be the most feasible way for various department heads to meet. The largest publishing house in the city is one run by a couple of wealthy men's sons. If an author, one of their own, walks into the place and has made a definite agreement with one of the partners he is told to return when he has made one.

Publishers who issue many books each season have a difficult time remembering their authors. Some years ago the editor of Harper's accepted a manuscript and wrote the author asking him to call. When he arrived the editor called him into his office, told him how much he admired the book and then went on to say that Harper's welcomed new authors, and would do much to help acquaint the public with the author's work, etc. When he had finished, the author, who had been listening patiently, exclaimed: "But Mr. C, you already have published two of my books."

Impure Gossip

A female novelist who received from a publisher at least five times as large an advance as she deserved solely because her husband was a successful novelist on his list and whose novel was a terrible flop is now so sore at this publisher that she won't let her husband write for him any more. The poor publisher's work is not only his generous advance but the chance to make it up on her husband's future work.

Nat Ferber's latest attempt to gain recognition as a novelist, "One Happy Jew" hasn't made either his Gentile publisher or himself very happy. It is not selling and received scant attention from the critics.

Wolf Kaufman of Variety who went to Berlin to see Hitler about the condition of the show business in Germany has returned without seeing Herr Hitler but he did see a great many other things about which you will soon hear.

Wins Journalism Prize

Hannah Fried of the class of 1933, Columbia University, is one of the graduates of the School of Journalism awarded scholarships by the Lafayette Centenary Committee at a luncheon given by Dean Carl W. Ackerman at the Faculty Club. All three sat on the steamship Lafayette Saturday for summer study in France.

Scientist and Wife Go to Dutch Guiana

The Herskovitses Emerge With 'Rebel Destiny,' Book of Travel

REBEL DESTINY. By Melville and Frances Herskovits. Whittlessey House, New York.

An American Jewish anthropologist and his wife travelled up the Suriname River in Dutch Guiana in 1929. They have brought back with them an absorbing story of their experiences there. They had gone to get data on Negro tribes which, imported from Africa for the slave trade in the New World, had managed to free themselves and return to their traditional manner of life.

Dr. and Mrs. Herskovits' book tells the story of their trip, dramatizing the facts about the simple, superstition-ridden tribesmen. Many of the passages, revealing in narrative form the mentality and point of view of the Bush Negroes, are extremely interesting. A clear picture of the life these transplanted Africans lead is presented, but one misses the background that would have been supplied by a full description of the country they live in.

Dr. Herskovits is associate professor of Anthropology at Northwestern University, and has written several very scholarly books on the American Negro. Although Mrs. Herskovits accompanied him on his excursions to Africa and South America, this is the first time they have collaborated in the writing of a travel book. On the whole, the combination seems to be a happy one.

Cedar Lake Camp for Boys and Camp Nah Jee Wah for Girls were formerly located in the Palisades Interstate Park. With the dedication of the property, which is owned by the "Y" Federation, these camps will henceforth be located in the Pococo Mountains, 1,300 feet above sea level.

400 Acres Planned
The property consists of more than 400 acres of land, most of which is virgin forest, two natural lakes and enough open fields and playgrounds to take care of the needs of each individual child.

Already, two weeks before camp opening, capacity registration has been achieved with 400 enrollees; 250 boys and 150 girls. According to Max Schwartz, administrator of the camps, this capacity registration means no further enrollees can be taken for the summer.

Religious instruction and discussions as to Jewish history and customs are as much a part of the camp programs as are athletics and dramatics and play projects.

Will Sail for Melbourne
on Tuesday; Other
Appointments

Judge Julian W. Mack, chairman of the board of trustees of the Jewish Institute of Religion, announced Friday that a call has come to Rabbi Martin M. Perelman, of Montreal, Que., Canada, graduated from the Institute in May, 1934, to the rabbinate of the liberal Jewish congregation at Melbourne, Australia.

He is to sail for Melbourne on the S. S. Mariposa from San Francisco on Tuesday. Rabbi Perelman, of Canadian upbringing and education, received the B. A. degree at McGill University in 1930 and was awarded the Palmer Prize by the Institute this year as the most meritorious student.

Synagogue was founded a few years ago by a group of Australian Jews who have been served in recent years by an American rabbi.

Perelman, of New York City, to serve as associate director of the Adas Emuno congregation in Worcester, Mass. (B.A., University of Rochester, 1930), winner of the Guggenheim Fellowship in 1933, to serve the congregation in Florida Park, N. Y.

Shabbat goes to Brighton. Rabbi Joseph Shabbat, 33, has accepted the post of rabbi of the B'nai Moshe, Brighton, Mass. Rabbi Shabbat at present is director of the New England branch of the American Jewish Congress. He has taken an active part in the Zionist movement in America and was one of the founders of the American Jewish Zionist organization. He also edited the Brandeis seventieth birthday anniversary volume published through the efforts of Avukah. He received his academic education at Harvard University.

The Nathan J. Miller Fellowship in Jewish history, literature and thought, which is awarded annually for the next academic year has been awarded to Isaac Levi, who also is a member of the class of 1933.

Doom of Hitler is Predicted; Monarchy Seen as New Regime

and definite understanding between Wilhelm and the heads of the Reichswehr. He named General Werner von Blomberg, leader of Germany's standing army, as one of those who had informed the Kaiser that a revolt of the German proletariat was impending.

Realization of this situation, the Herald informant added, would in all probability swing the Nazi regime toward Communism. To avert this extreme result, the Reichswehr, General von Blomberg will proclaim a military dictatorship and declare martial law, he declared.

"The next steps," the Kaiser spokesman predicted, would be the Nazi repressions, restore Germany to the League of Nations and re-establish the nation's commercial credit.

This program, he then said, would ultimately result in the restoration of the Hohenzollern monarchy at some time before the end of the winter.

The von Papen speech that has brought the German crisis to a head was characterized by the spokesman as having delighted the Kaiser because of surprising him.

Fake Assassination Planned

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
LONDON, June 22.—Justification for the report recently published in the London Daily Herald that high Nazi officials were plotting to stage a fake Hitler assassination attempt and blame a Jew for it in order to divert the public's attention from the tottering state of the regime, was seen to come in reports that Nazi agents were busy tracking down rumors that an attempt on Hitler's life has been made.

Early this week the Herald in a front-page heavily headlined story, revealed details of the warning plot that was being foisted by the Nazis:

Jew to Be Guilty

"An attempt to be covered in the 'Jew' and fatally shot while trying to 'escape' capture. The mock assassination attempt, a live Jew as the fatal prey of the ensuing chase, was to have been enacted this month, according to the story. Its enactment was deferred when the regime decided that the Hitler-Mussolini tele-tete, the Goebbels junkie to Warsaw and the Hantstaedt trip to the United States would provide the public with sufficient distraction for the time being.

However, with the sudden sensational turn that events have

taken since the von Papen blast at the Nazis, revival of this plot is expected. The original informant who disclosed existence of the mock assassination is a German of importance and integrity, according to the Herald's correspondent.

Goering Awaits Target

Thus far, however, the reports of the supposedly actual attempt on Hitler's life has not been connected with a Jew. Tracking the rumors down, they have simmered down to one fact. This is, that an unknown person on Wednesday took a pot shot at one of the automobiles en route to the funeral services of Frau Karla Goering, wife of the Premier of Prussia and a government minister.

The bullet, according to the best information available, was not fired on the road Hitler took to the funeral and was not intended for any high Nazi official.

Whether, from this meagre fact, the Nazi officials who have proved their ingenuity in the past at building ominous mountains out of Jewish molehills, will be able to build up the Jewish-assassin-plot remains to be seen. Those who are acquainted with their ability in this respect expect the Jewish angle to creep into the affair momentarily.

Pogroms Feared

What the development of such a plot, which ranks with the best that Herr Julius Streicher has been able to concoct and place at the door of the Jews, would mean for German Jewry is indicated in a statement made earlier in the year by Heinrich Himmler, head of the Nazi racial police.

Himmler declared that if a shot were fired at Hitler, unprecedented pogroms would immediately break out in Germany. According to the Herald story early this week, this statement of Himmler's would form the basis of the mock assassination. As a result of it, the newspaper declared, the Jewish regime was on the verge of taking measures that such a shot would be fired.

General anti-Semitic hysteria following the slaying of the Jewish would-be assassin trying to escape" would succeed in rekindling the popular enthusiasm for the Nazis and place him at least in the almost-martyr class.

Bernhard Warns Against Optimism in Nazi Situation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
PALESTINE, June 22.—A note of warning against undue optimism in seeing in the class between the von Papen moderate element and

the Nazi radicals a signal of the impending fall of the Hitler regime is sounded in the Paris Tagblatt today by Dr. Georg Bernhard, noted European political observer and former editor of the influential Vossische Zeitung.

"It is not advisable to draw incautious conclusions from the von Papen clash," Dr. Bernhard declares. "Things are not so far removed toward the crash of the Hitler regime. No other authority possesses the power to replace Hitler. There are only attempts to secure Hitler's alignment on this or the other side, but the impression that the Hitler regime is successful and firm is equally false. The Nazis, generally, are most uncomfortable."

participate in the meeting of the Zionist Federation.

Having spent the earlier months of this year in Palestine, which he visited in May, Dr. Locker described how German Jewish refugees are adjusting themselves. Some 2,000 are engaged in agriculture, and altogether, he estimates, there are about 12,000 of them.

He declined to express a reaction to the Arlosoroff case verdict, and was also reserved on the subject of the Soviet policy toward the Jews.

"We don't have to be thankful to any country which is not anti-Semitic," Mr. Locker declared. "We should hate those that are."

Skeptical on Biro-Bidjan

He expressed his skepticism in the possibilities of Biro-Bidjan from the Jewish standpoint. Throughout the interview he emphasized the desirability of concentrating on Palestine. That country's economic development, he said, was the large determining factor in the extent of cooperation between Jews and Arabs. There, he maintained, Jews are more secure than in any other country.

The best way to combat Hitlerism is to wage a world-wide struggle for democracy, according to Mr. Locker who urged Jews, in information available, was not fired on the road Hitler took to the funeral and was not intended for any high Nazi official.

Despite their protestations to the contrary, Mr. Locker declared, England's Black Shirts are an anti-Semitic organization. He felt that the British public taken by and large is not sympathetic to that movement.

N. Y. Lawyer To Quizz Il Duce On Jews' Stand

Leibowitz Also May See
Stalin on European
Trip

Armed with an August 16 appointment for a conference with Premier Mussolini, with whom he will discuss Mussolini's attitude toward the Jewish people, Samuel S. Leibowitz, attorney who achieved national repute as defense counsel for the Negro defendants in the widely publicized Scottsboro case, was to sail from Cherbourg Saturday aboard the steamship Champlain.

Leibowitz will spend ten weeks in Europe, during which he will visit nearly a dozen countries, for the purpose of studying their penal codes and court procedures, he told the Jewish Daily Bulletin Friday.

Asked whether the results of his study would be turned over in report form to any organization or inquiry commission here, the New York attorney was inclined to be reticent.

"There'll be no official report of any kind," he said finally, "but I will be telling you that I'll be coming on an unofficial mission, which I'm not at liberty to join yet."

He also has a tentative appointment with Stalin in Leningrad, Leibowitz said.

"I am interested in Mussolini's feeling toward the Jews," he declared, "particularly in view of his recent session with Hitler."

He will travel hundreds of unnecessary miles "for the express purpose of circling Germany and the Soviet Union," he said.

"It's not that I'm afraid of these countries," the attorney laughed, "but I have no intention of leaving one penny of my money in them."

In addition to France, Italy and the Soviet Union, Leibowitz will visit Great Britain, Sweden, Denmark, Czechoslovakia and possibly Rumania. He expects to return to New York August 29 aboard the Conte di Savoia.
