The campaign of anti-Semitism has stirred the Reich by diminhas stirred the Reich by dimin-ishing exports, reducing its sup-ply of foreign exchange. Conse-quently Germany has had to take measures resembling those war time to regulate imports, . . A regime of terror unknown since the days of Metternich has reduced the German press to a state of dull monotony and driven thousands of German readers to buying foreign publi-

Sum to Go Toward New Relief Body Projected By McDonald

(Special to the J.D.B.) BRADLEY BEACH, N. J., June 24.—Prospects of relief for vic-tims of the scourge of Hitlerism received tremendous impetus toreceived tremendous impetus to-day when Louis Lipselty, American Zionist leader, told the Jewish Daily Bulletin that Albert D. Lasker of Chicago will donate \$500,000 toward a new corporation to deal with the refugee prob-lem, now being formed by High Commissioner James G. McDonald.

The revelation came during the opening session of the twenty-fifth annual convention of the Order Sons of Zion, being held at the Lareine Hotel here today and tomorrow. There were approximate-ly 300 delegates and visitors from six states present, most of them from Greater New York and New

"The Jews, throughout their history, in addition to bearing their share of the general burden, have been compelled to undergo special trials and suffering. The Germany of today is only one milestone on the long road which the Jewish people have travelled. Let us be grateful that our own country is free from these brutal excesses of bigotry. But no less do we owe our children the duty of strengthening their characters by teaching them the faith of their fathers—its practices, its doctrines and its ideals—which, I am convinced, will make them better Jews, better Americans and happier human beings.

The tragedy that has befallen German Jewry serves to emphasize the need of Jewish educa tion and Jewish ideals for the Jewish youth. Many of the German Jews would have found derman Jews would have found it less difficult to bear their present sufferings, if they had known better the history, the ideals and the moral contribu-tions of their own nation. They would not have lived in a fool's paradise by imagining and trying

to be what they are not.

A distinguished German Jew ish artist, who declined to sing in the Wagner operas in Germany, even though the Nazi authorities were anxious to make an exception in his case, remarked:

"The unexpected blow that has been dealt to the Jews of Germany has convinced me that no matter what kind of a Jew you try to be or not to be, it makes no difference to the anti-Semites. To them all Jews are Under these circumstances, I would rather be a good Jew than a bad one."

This is a sensible recipe for Jews everywhere. Through Jewish education, through a knowledge of the Jewish past and of Jewish ideals, the Jew-ish youth would be better equipped to face the problems of to-day and of tomorrow with understanding and courage, and to play their role in the life of the community in the spirit of the finest humanitarian traditions that came down through the ages and that still hold good to this day.

"Inbreeding and isolation," he stated, "have developed what is considered to be the segregated racial groups of today. If blood groupings are used as a basis, it is difficult to find a difference be-tween the German Jew and the German so-called 'Aryan.'

Therefore, when anthropology and ethnology are turned to an instrument of politurned to an instrument of poli-tics, as is being done in Naziland today, they may become a boom-

Brought to Canada by his parn turn newsboy, shoe-shiner and arrand boy in Windsor. At twentyive he was called to the bar. At thirty he was elected mayor of Windsor, receiving an overwhelm-ing vote in spite of whispering campaigns on the grounds of his Jewishness. He was re-elected as mayor in another fine demonstration of loyalty on the part of his constituents. Now, at the age of thirty-four, he emerges the victor in the Ontario Parliamentary been chosen by Premier-elect Mitchell F. Hepburn to be the Mini-ster of Labor in his cabinet.

Strong Following

uncompromising Mayor Croll has built up one of the strongest followings boasted of by any political leader in Can-ada. Seeking election to the Ontario provincial Parliament in the Windsor-Walkerville district, he received 9,828 votes against the combined vote of 8,691 for the

three candidates who opposed him.
Mayor Croll was born in Moscow, Russia, on March 12, 1900, the first-born son of Hillel and Minnie Croll. His father was a cattle dealer who found life un-bearable in Russia and left to pearable in Russia and left to bettle in Canada, in 1904. Two years later he brought his family to this continent. Only a handful of Jews lived in Windsor at that time. This city of 60,000, of whom only 1,000 are Jews, was then a village compared with the beautiful city of today, which borders on Detroit. It was a hard struggle for the Crolls - but the future mayor and the minister-of-laborto-be found the hardships to be a school of experience,
Hillel Croll remained in the

business, but it was not sufficiently fucrative to educate five sons and a daughter. The boys had to ply for themselves, and David set out to sell newspapers. With Jacob Geller, now the head of the Windsor News Company, Dave acquired sor News Company, Dave acquired a newsstand. He graduated from Patterson Collegiate in 1918, se-cured a place for himself in the office of the late Frank D. Davis, K.C., and became a law student. It was at Collegiate that he met his wife-Sarah Levin of Detroit. his wife—Sarah Levin of Detroit, University of Michigan graduate, mother of his three daughters, the youngest horn only a month ago.

His Studies

In 1921 Croll enrolled in Osgoode Hall Law School in Toronto. He served as a student with Mr. Jusserved as a summer with art. Jus-tice Hughes, now of the Supreme Court of Canada. He graduated in 1925, was called to the Bar in May, married in June. Then began the law career and the eventual entrance in politics. He was elected Mayor of Wind-He was elected Mayor of Windsor in 1830 because he had very decided ideas on how to run a city of 60,000 people. And he missed not a single opportunity to tell the voters what his views were. When he became mayor, Windsor suffered from the tremendous burden of earing for the unemployed. About 10,000 who had previously commuted to Detroit were barred by United States laws were barred by United States laws from retaining their positions. Tax collections were declining, but the cost of running the government was mounting.

Croll managed to save his city. Not only did he solve the various problems which oppressed his government when he assumed reins, but he made of Windsor a model of good government, now being copied by mayors through-out Ontario. It is no wonder, therefore, that he was re-elected by the largest clear majority in the history of the city—a majority of 6,780 in a field of three.

This phenomenon is attributed by the newspaper to fear on the part of the firms that Jewish lawyers would be unable to defend their interests successfully in the

German courts. German courts.

"Even non-Jews deprecate this lack of solidarity," the CV-Zeitung declares. "We do not want Jews who for years have employed non-Jewish lawyers to send them away and retain Jews, but we protest against exchanging Jewish lawyers, after years of confidence, and solely because they are Jews

"The German judges have not given us any cause to doubt their impartiality. They are not con-cerned whether the lawyer is a Jew or a non-Jew. These firms which run away from their Jewish brethren are deserting those of their co-religionists who are struggling for existence," the paper warns, "and at the same time have no possibility of gaining any advantage for themselves thereby."

Zion Receives Pinsker Remains **Amidst Impressive Ceremonies**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
TEL AVIV, June 24.—Impressive funeral ceremonics were held here today over the remains of Dr. Leo Pinsker, noted Jewish writer, author of "Auto-emancipation," and hailed as the direct fore-runner of Dr. Theodor Herzl, founder of modern Zionism.

After the remains had been car ried in a huge procession through the principal streets of Tel Aviv, including Pinsker Street, recently named for him, the funeral cortege proceeded to Jerusalem, to a tomb on the grounds of the Hebrew University, where final in-terment took place.

Dr. Pinsker died in Odessa, Rus-sia, in 1891, and was buried in a Jewish cemetery, His remains were recently brought from Odessa to Tel Aviv, where plans were made

for a national Jewish funeral.

All business in Tel Aviv was at a standstill during the funeral. The procession followed a route which led through the main streets of this all-Jewish city, and wound up at the city hall, where vice-mayor Israel Rokeach delivered an eulogy for Dr. Pinsker.

Children Head Procession

The procession was headed by children from the upper grades of Tel Aviv schools. An honor guard was furnished by the Boy Scouts, Jewish policemen, representatives of Jewish national institutions, the municipality of Tel Aviv and dele-gations from all Jewish colonies.

From Tel Aviv the funeral corwound to Jerusalem, where a huge crowd waited the procession in the courtyara of the Jewish Agency building, headed by members of the Jewish Agency and the Vaad Leumi, the Jewish Naand

tional Council of Palestine. Following a short halt, the remains were taken to the Hebrew University grounds, where the life and writings of Dr. Pinsker were extolled by Menachem Mendel Ussishkin, veteran Zionists' leader, and Dr. Jehuda Leib Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University.

Edited Early Jewish Paper Dr. Pinsker was born in Tom-aschow, Poland, in 1821, son of the noted Orientalist, Simcha Pinsker. He studied medicine, but after his graduation turned to journalism. A convinced assimila-tionist, he became one of the edi-tors of the first Jewish weekly to be printed in Kussian, Rasswjet. In his articles Dr. Pinsler urged the Russian Jewish masses to learn Russian and educate their children in Russian schools.

By 1880, however, he became convinced he had been on the wrong track and published his famous work, "Auto-emancipafamous work, "Auto-emancipa-tion," in which he asserted that there would be no solution for the Jewish problem until the Jews were a territorially independent nation. As a scientist Dr. Pinsker regarded anti-Semtism as pathological in nature and his brochure on the subject, "Judophobia," at-tracted wide interest.

He became an active leader of the Choveve Zion, pioneer Zionist organization in Russia and was very active in the work of the group until his death in 1891.

The resolution called on the Department of Justice to prosecute leaders of the League of Friends of New Germany in this country, alleging that the organization was formed with the sole purpose of disseminating religious prejudice.

The resolution, copies of which were sent to the federal government departments, charged that the Friends of New Germany were financed and directed by the Nazi government through accredited diplomatic representatives in di-rect violation of the privileges accorded foreign nations.

"The Kian has delivered in every crisis since the war between the States and can be counted upon now. Kiansmen in action, competent and courageous, will lead the American people to see that indi-vidual liberty and constitutional government shall not perish and that this nation will no longer be the victim of allen propaganda. The Klan, a living vital movement in itself, is not a party to any other movement whatsoever, There is no laison between the Klan and fascism, communism, or shirtism, for all such are abhorrent to na tional liberty." In accepting the appointment,

Mr. Dunning, at one time winner of a trophy "for the most meri-torious public service performed by a Savannahian," stressed the fact that the creanization would tolerate no violence or intimida-tion, and added that both national and state directorates would be composed of "men of prominence and sound judgment. The Klan will not condone lawlessness," he said. "It vill devote its every thought and action toward curbing lawless-ness."

Reciting his observations on a European tour last year for the agricultural adjustment administration, Lamport declared that "if this cancer which Hitler is spreading over Europe is not cut out, that continent will be a place only for people who seek to gouge and tear until another war wipes out half its population."

Suddenly, according to Dr. Zeisler's statement, a burly individual accosted him and asked if he were seeking the committee. Dr. Zeisler answered in the affirmative and asked if the questioner were also going to be present.

"Need Men Like Hitler'

Thereupon, according to the Thereupon, according to the physician, the husky person, later discovered to be Harry Scholz, a Chicago detective, pulled out a short club and set about beating him up, the while saying, "We need men like Hitler in America who'll do to the Jews what he did to them in Germany."

Disheveled and bruised, the doctor said he was dragged from the building and thrown in a squad car full of police which was waiting at the curb. At the Chicago avenue police station, he was taken into the basement and subjected to brutal treatment.

After several hours, during which he had not been booked by the desk sergeant, he was permitted to phone his office and finally released on hall, booked on a charge of disorderly conduct.
