Hitler Substitutes

IN AN interview with the British correspondent, Vernon Bartlett, Chancellor Hitler said with regard to the boycott of German goods abroad that the last thing he wanted was that Germany should be isolated, but he declared that no difficulties in the way of German exports would break the German spirit. He explained that Germany had lived on substitutes during the war and, if necessary, would do so again, with still greater success. He said that Germany would be able to make artificial cotton, that oil from coal would be used as a substitute for petrol.

In answer to the correspondent's question whether Nazism would do itself in Europe to the Left, Hitler answered that it would go straight ahead and that those who did not understand it or called it would be crushed and suppressed.

Then he banged the table with his fist and declared: "As the risk of appearing to talk nonsense, I will tell you that this movement will go on for a thousand years. They follow me wherever I go and will continue to do so."

Hitler has become a past master in the art of imposing substitutes on the German people. His Nazism itself is Ersatz-Fascism. He himself is a psychopathic substitute for Mussolini. He has been substituting falsehood for truth, bigotry for tolerance, cruelty for justice, hate for love, war-madness for peace, suicidal isolation for friendly cooperation, propaganda for education, Hitler jargon for David's psalms, paganism for Christianity—barbarism for civilization.

His threats that Germany will be compelled by him to resist world public opinion by living on Nazi substitutes for a thousand years are the unmistakable symptoms of megalomania and insanity.

The eyes of the German people are opening. They are beginning to see the horror and the folly of the mad adventure into which they have been drawn.

Hitler is boasting that Nazism will go on for a thousand years. Only a maniac can make such a boast. It would be less nonsensical if he said that he would be remembered a thousand years hence. Even though for a brief period, he did succeed in transforming a nation once proud of its greatness into the followers of an unbalanced bigot and demagogue who attempted to destroy the achievements of civilization.

Hitler is being remembered as Herodotus. Hitler will be remembered as Haman.

WARSAW, June 25.—Five Jewish workers who were arrested in Warsaw for carrying out a demonstration against Nazi Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels on the occasion of his visit to Poland, were convicted today and sentenced to varying terms in jail. Rifka Kremer and Rifka Felga were each sentenced to one month in jail; Yehuda Sherman, Efram Richterman and Abraham Samanovitch to six months.

Sons of Zion Veto Fund for Stavsky

Affirm Belief in Innocence at Bradley Beach Convention

BRADLEY BEACH, N. Y., June 25.—The Order Sons of Zion, on the second and concluding day of its convention here today, voiced the concerted opinion that Abraham Stavsky is innocent. Stavsky was convicted by a Palestinian court of complicity in the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosroff, Zionist labor leader, who was shot in Tel Aviv last year. The newly elected executive board of the Order was charged with the authority to determine a sum which will be given to help organize Stavsky's defense. Isaac Allen of New York City pleaded for adoption of the resolution pledging faith in Stavsky's innocence.

Claims Boyir Fired Band on Race Grounds

Moss, Orchestra Leader, Makes Charge; Viereck Fund Reported

New information regarding activities of Carl Boyir, mentioned during open hearings of the Congressional committee investigating Nazi activities as being pay-off man for Hitlerite publicity in this country, came yesterday with charges by Joe Moss, orchestra leader, that Boyir had discriminated against his orchestra because of its Jewish leadership.

At the same time George Sylvester Viereck, business associate of Boyir who was reported at Congressional hearings as having received funds from both the Byoir office and the German consulate here in connection with publicity for Germany, refused to comment on reports that for some time he had been receiving additional remittances of \$500 monthly from the German consulate. Viereck, who has been paid \$1,000 monthly and expenses for the upkeep of his office, said that any information he had concerning the reported receipt of an additional \$500 monthly from the German diplomatic office would be given to the Congressional committee itself.

Storm Trooper Jailed; Walked With Jewess

Storm Trooper was Today Sentenced to Serve Two Months in Jail because he disregarded warnings by his commander to end his friendship with a Jewish girl. When the Nazi was observed, as he was strolling with the Jewish girl, he was arrested.

His punishment was made heavier because he replied to threats of expulsion from the Nazi party with the remark that he "did not give a hoot for the storm troops."

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Stavsky Plea Stirs Wrath In Palestine

Factious Tense as Labor Groups Score Rabbits' Defense Appeal

JERUSALEM, June 25.—Tension among the various Jewish factions in Palestine, which is daily becoming more serious, received added impetus today when posters were issued by labor organizations condemning the appeal issued by rabbis and other Jewish leaders affirming the innocence of Abraham Stavsky, convicted of the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosroff.

The posters claim that the appeal was issued not for the purpose of saving Stavsky, but to "blat the truth concerning the murders and assassinations."

At the same time unknown persons painted the walls of numerous Jerusalem houses with slogans in red paint reading "ply the nation whose priests protect murderers."

'Putzy' Refuses to Aid Das Vaterland in Nazi Atrocity Inquiry Here

BOSTON, Mass., June 25.—Not wishing to mar his pleasure trip in the United States, Ernst "Putzy" Hanfstaengl today announced that he will not accept the invitation of the American Inquiry Commission to testify at its hearings on Nazi atrocities.

The Nazi press chief and midnight Hitler pianist, who is staying at the home of Louis Agassiz Shaw here, said that he will occupy himself with aquatic sports before he sails for Germany and his old friend Adolf. He stated that he may visit Canada before leaving American shores on July 9.

Deutsch Warns Against Racket In Chicken Unit

Parley Seen as Aiding Work Prospects for Slaughterers

Prospects of additional employment loomed on the chicken slaughterers' horizon yesterday as various agencies moved efficiently and in concert to bring prompt relief to Jewish poultry slaughterers sorely tried by the depression, racketeering and a multitude of other unfavorable factors.

For the first time since Arthur Simon, confidential investigator for the Department of Health, submitted his report to Mayor LaGuardia on the situation in the Scholeschitz Union, Local 440 of L., a meeting was called yesterday in the office of Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutch, attended by the newly-elected officers of the union and a number of officials.

Although the major difficulties appeared to be far from ironed out, there was a general agreement on the urgent need of an immediate cleanup. Mr. Deutch expressed the administration's impatience with racketeering and pointed out in Mr. Simon's report and warned union officials that henceforth the city will show a watchful eye over the matter, and will give it an opportunity to the organization to start with a clean slate, no "monkey business" will be tolerated, and "at the end of the summer we want another report," he added.

Rabbis Secured
Elimination of the "speed system" which was cited as one of the principal causes preventing re-employment, was thoroughly discussed, and prospects of improvement were enhanced when Leroy Peterson, poultry code supervisor, who attended with Arthur M. Loeb, his cousin, promised cooperation of the city.

Max Belkin, vice-president of Local 440 and a spokesman for the group, in referring to the "speed system," laid the blame at the doorstep of the racketeers. "We do what they say," he declared. "But they can't agree themselves. We are ready to stop such practices unless we see the result."

In regard to the removal of Charles Herbert, delegate of the union, which was recommended in Mr. Simon's report, Mr. Simon reminded union representatives that he had eighty-six affidavits on Herbert's practices and also reviewed the huge sums of money which had been paid out to Herbert by the union.

"How about it?" Mr. Deutch asked.

"Can you give us somebody better than Herbert?" Belkin countered.

Further conferences were agreed on for this week.

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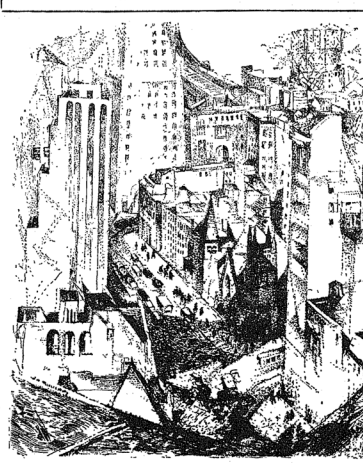

Palestine Pioneers Hail Unity As Aftermath of N. J. Parley

Unification of sentiment on behalf of the Palestine pioneer movement was hailed yesterday by those who participated in the conference Sunday on the training farm for the Hechalutz organization in Hightstown, N. J. Three prominent Zionists, representatives of Jewish organizations and the press, joined in a thorough consideration of problems involved.

On behalf of the general Zionists Abraham Goldberg and Jacob Fishman pledged to share in future responsibilities. Forty-five delegates came by bus from New York, among the more than 100 persons attending, including Philadelphians and others. They made

a tour of inspection before the session. Speakers included, in addition to those mentioned, Leo Wolfson, who represented Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America; Berl Locker, of the World Zionist Executive, who arrived here recently; Joseph Sprinzak, Goldie Myerson, E. Gallil and Louis Segal. B. Sheinin presided.

Organizations represented included the Zionist Organization of America, Poale Zion, Jewish National Workers Alliance, Avukah, Masada, Pioneer Women's Organization, Young Judaea, League of Jewish Youth, Junior Hadassah and others.

School Graduates 10 Invalid Children

Ten students were graduated Friday morning from Public School 401, the School for Crippled and Cardiac Children, in the auditorium of the specially constructed building at 157 Henry street. The edifice was donated in 1919 by Emanuel Lehman, uncle of Governor Lehman, for the use of the city's invalid children.

Speakers were Dr. Elliott Lovjoy, dean of the Ethical Culture School; Miss Mary Frasca, secretary and representative of Mayor LaGuardia, and Mrs. Herbert Lehman. Plays were presented by the kindergarten and upper classes. Participants made their own costumes, despite their handicaps. One of the graduates, under treatment for a cardiac ailment, is a candidate for the Samuel Stern scholarship, an award open to city-wide competition, it was announced.

All alumni will continue their educations in higher schools.

Jewish Girl First to Go to Camp In City Drive to Aid Needy Tot

Ray Rosenbaum, thirteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Rosenbaum of 570 Ralph avenue, Brooklyn, was selected as the first of the 500,000 children on the city's relief rolls to be presented with a two weeks' vacation at camp, marking the beginning of the city's "Send a Child to Camp Week."

Ray, proud and happy, was formally presented yesterday by Mayor LaGuardia at City Hall with a certificate entitling her to a two weeks' stay at Camp Mikam Y. Arden, N. Y., beginning July 10, as the guest of the Workmen's Circle, of which her father is a member.

In greeting the little Jewish girl from Brooklyn, Mayor LaGuardia said:

"This is a campaign which should get the backing of every responsible citizen in the city. The

health of our children must be protected. With the warm weather already with us, we should do all we can to get our needy children out in the country."

Mayor LaGuardia's decision to designate a special "Send a Child to Camp Week" was announced by information from the Children's Welfare Federation of the precarious financial condition of the 190 camps, a Federal Government report that while there are over 100,000 children on city relief rolls, the capacity of the camps is at best 100,000.

The 195 camps include sites in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, sponsored by churches of all creeds, clubs, settlements, welfare agencies, newspapers, magazines, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A., U. Y. W. H. A. and Y. H. A.

Palestine Archaeologist Finds Egyptian 'Heart Scarab'

A "heart-scarab," the first discovery of its kind in Palestine, has been found, with other objects belonging to the Fourteenth Century B. C. E., by the Hebrew University of Jerusalem at Tell Jericho, Palestine, near the Yarkon River, according to word just received here by Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, president of the American Friends of the Hebrew University.

The large stone scarab, dating from the XVIII Dynasty, uncovered by Dr. E. L. Sukenik, archaeologist of the Hebrew University and leader of the expedition, is of the type termed "heart-scarab," because it was placed on the heart of the mummy, and bears a hieroglyphic inscription of a passage from the "Book of the Dead."

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Jewish Life Reviewed in Latest Cables and Letters

London Sees Woe in Reich As Nazis Split

Possibility of Hitler's Fall Discussed, Says Morning Post

LONDON, June 25.—The leading story in the editorials in London newspapers indicate the belief that the Nazi regime is facing serious difficulties, while the Tory Morning Post went so far as to declare editorially that "it is evident that Hitler is no longer riding with his former élan and self-assurance. Moreover, the stability of his fall is beginning to be openly canvassed in Germany."

London Times headlines declared that "Nazis are divided"; and "Hitler Faces Criticism of Nazi Leaders"; while the London Daily Telegraph featured prominently a Berlin dispatch stating that Vice Chancellor Franz von Papen had received a visit to the residence of Hindenburg with assurances of support, and together with the moderates was moving to check the radical reaction.

The Times also pointed out that Premier Goering of Prussia, who is ranked as a moderate, is being employed to handle the Nazi party congress in Frankfurt, and the fanatical anti-Semite Julius Streicher has resigned unbecked.

Steel Says Hitler is Doomed

A picture of Hitler as a bewildered onlooker whose rule is at an end and who will go almost any moment is painted in an article yesterday in the New York Post with the headline "Steel Says Hitler is Doomed." The article is by private secretary to Hjalmar Schacht, Reichsbank president, and for several years prominent as economic adviser and member of the Prussian Diet.

Steel makes startling predictions of changes impending in Germany in the near future. Some of them are:

"The Nazi dictatorship will be succeeded by a military dictatorship.

"This military dictatorship will be exercised by the Reichswehr, the police and the Steel Helms. Its spearheads will be Herr von Papen, Lieutenant Colonel Oskar von Hindenburg, son and special A.D.C. to the President and the commanding generals of the army.

"The administration of the economic and commercial policies of the Reich will be entrusted to Dr. Hjalmar Horace Greeley Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, who for the past six months has been the real ruler of Germany.

"Herr von Hindenburg will retire and either appoint the ex-Crown Prince or one of the grandsons as Regent, vesting all executive power with the office of the President or Regent.

"Or Hitler may succeed Hindenburg and reestablish with the executive powers remaining with the office of the Chancellor and either General Goering or Colonel Franz von Papen, both monarchists, assuming the Chancellorship."

Germany is Now Described as 'Country of Dreadful Silence'

LONDON, June 18.—"The country of dreadful silence where one may not speak of much except harmless things, art galleries, the weather, the beauty of Munich—this is Germany of Nazism," W. N. Ebor writes in the Daily Herald. "In public and in semi-public; in trains, in trams, in cafes, in factories, in shops, the great silence reigns," writes the correspondent. "No one talks, for no one dare talk. Goering's secret police have strict orders to watch for 'Miesmacher'—grumblers. Nor is it only the secret police.

"Every storm trooper, every party member, has orders too: to listen and to report, inside the party, inside the 'SA' contrived must keep watch on comrade. Goering has his spies in the ranks with orders to keep sharp look-out, even on their leaders.

Crime of Grumbling
"And it is no joke to be reported for grumbling. At the least it means a brusque warning to keep quiet, but it may easily mean the loss of a job, the wrecking of a business, prison or a concentration camp.

"So, with spies everywhere and the terror of the camps in the background, men sit silent, or talk constrainedly of such topics as cannot possibly give offense.

"The other night I was sitting in a Munich cafe. There came in a small boy, five or six years old, in a brown shirt, selling photographs of Hitler.

"He is too young to be doing that. He should be in bed," said I to my neighbor.

"He looked cautiously round, gave me a searching glance. Then in a low voice:

"One may not say such things here. For you it is all right. You are a foreigner. But—" and then quickly asked how long I had been in Munich, did I not see the picture galleries, did I not think it a beautiful city?"

What is Courage

"After a week in Germany, I felt it was courageous for him to say as much as that to a stranger, even to an obvious foreigner.

"Nobody talks because of the fear. Also because there is little enough to talk about. No one knows what is happening.

"The newspapers say nothing.

They too are afraid. And they may well be; punishment has followed even an accidental misprint in the report of a minister's speech, so they are silent.

"They print official announcements, reams of dull propaganda emitted by Goebbel's department, tiresome ministerial speeches, which never say anything.

"For comment, they will paraphrase some tiresome speech and obsequiously remind their readers that what Herr Reichsminister So-and-So says is undoubtedly right; since the Herr Reichsminister has the confidence of the Fuehrer.

"At times one suspects irony.

Causes of Grumbling
"One day last week in an unobtrusive paragraph, the Frankfurter Zeitung remarked that, in addition to denouncing grumblers, the government would be wise to remove some of the causes of grumbling.

"The sentence was one gasp by its daring. It needs much courage to write and print such a thing in Germany today.

"So the press is dead, a dull and empty relic of its old self.

"I will, said Goebbel's, when he became Propaganda Minister, 'play on the press as on a piano.' The trouble is that he only knows one tune—the Horst Wessel Lied.

"Therefore, just as nobody talks, so nobody reads.

"For five minutes by the clock in the Graf Adolfsstrasse in Düsseldorf, I watched two lads selling the Panfare—the local organ of the Hitler youth movement.

"In five minutes, though they worried everybody, they sold one copy—to me! Then I watched a man selling the 'grown-up' Nazi evening paper. In five minutes he sold two. In a Berlin underground car, in the rush hour, I counted the readers of newspapers. There were three.

Propaganda Everywhere

"The bookshops and bookstalls are stuffed with Nazi propaganda.

I have never seen anybody buying the Nazi youth paper only once or twice have I seen anybody reading it.

"So it is. The Country of Dreadful Silence, where, about public affairs, nobody cares to talk and nobody cares to read.

growing rumble of criticism and dissatisfaction.

"The government is alarmed. And its nervousness may lead to a new outbreak of that open violence which seemed to have died down.

Fear for Jews

"There may be in the next few weeks a new campaign against the Jews. I am not sure. But there are signs of it. It would, some of the leaders think, be a fine distraction—as the coming Thaelmann trial is also designed to be.

"Blame the Jews for everything" has been a useful enough precept in the past.

"Socially the Jews seem to have, it is now, drawn in their horns. You do not see them, as you used to, in the cafes or smart restaurants. They live at home, and visit each other, or such Aryan friends as are not afraid of being thought pro-Semites."

"The biggest sufferers are the younger, not yet established, professional men; and the new generation, who can get neither a technical nor a professional training.

New Madhouse

"To all this there is one exception—the country around Nurnberg. Here personal and economic factors combine unhappily. For a very long time the Franconian peasantry—it is the big hop-growing district—have suffered from exploitation by Jews.

"It may come, or it may not, which has been the economic basis of ferocious anti-Semitism farther East.

And, as a result or by coincidence, it is just here that Julius Streicher, a half-crazy, sadistic Jew-hater and Jew-baiter is the 'Gaulster', the local party boss, the local autocrat.

"It is in Streicher's domain that the worst excesses have been. It is in Streicher's domain that a new explosion is likely to come.

"It may come, or it may not. One cannot be sure. I doubt, though, if it would achieve its purpose. Fewer and fewer Germans believe that the Jews are the source of all their troubles—or even the 'Marxists.'

"The Jews have been repressed. The Marxists have been suppressed. And yet—"

"In public nobody speaks his thoughts. The dreadful silence holds. But the thoughts are there. "And not only Goebbel's publications, not all Goering's espionage, can stop the quiet spreading of discontent and disaffection."

Hadassah Critic Head Receive Palestine Visa

Prof. Zondek, Brothers Obtain Permit for Holy Land

JERUSALEM, June 25.—Professor Bernard Zondek, noted German Jewish gynecologist, who has accepted the post of director of the Jerusalem Hadassah clinic for women, was today granted visa by the Palestine government. At the same time the Palestine government granted visas for Professor Zondek's two brothers, a noted for their work in medicine.

Previous to the ascension of Nazism the three brothers Zondek were regarded as one of the outstanding physicians in Germany. Despite their prominence and the value the acknowledged value their contributions to the science, they were ousted by Nazism and forced to leave Germany.

Prof. Zondek Named to Jerusalem Hospital

Professor Bernard Zondek, eminent German gynecologist who was a co-director of the Aachheim-Zondek test for diagnosed pregnancy, has been named director of the obstetrical department of the Hadassah-Rothschild Hospital in Jerusalem. Dr. Zondek, now the Rockefeller Foundation in Stockholm.

Foe of Nazism Doubts Hitler Near Collapse

Von Papen's Speech No Criterion, Declares G. H. Brown

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence) CHICAGO, June 22.—Vice-Chancellor von Papen's recent speech does not mean that Hitler's regime is on the eve of collapse, said G. Harrison Brown, European representative of the Chicago Committee for the Defense of Human Rights Against Nazism and a student of German affairs, who is in this country for a few weeks, in discussing the repugnance and meaning of the recent statement by the vice-chancellor.

"Herr von Papen's last speech is one of the most interesting recent symptoms of internal disunion within the German state," declared Mr. Brown. "It is being interpreted largely according to the preconceived notions of those who make the observations. One interpretation, however, perhaps the commonest, is almost certainly erroneous. It does not mean that the regime is on the eve of collapse. It is additional proof that Hitler has not united Germany, but it does not affect the fact that he has centralized authority as never before in that country."

"This therefore is no time to relax efforts in the fight against the menace of Hitlerism. The march to the north largely the character of the situation in Germany. It seems probable that public support of the anti-Semitic program is increasing. It was noted recently that officially it has been pressed to the utmost. To give Hitlerism even a breathing spell at this present juncture would be lunacy. There must be irrefutable evidence that this cancer in the body politic of Europe has been cut out before anyone who cherishes liberty and freedom of conscience dare slacken his efforts to destroy it."

Judge Assails Nazi Persecution As Attack on World Intelligence

(Special to the J.D.B.) PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—Persecution of the Jews in Germany is "an attack upon the intelligence of the entire civilized world," Judge Harry S. McDevitt said in delivering the main address at the dedication of the new Fridenberg Memorial Surgical building at the Jewish Hospital, York and Thibault roads.

"To me it seems incredible that any civilized country could sink to such depths of ignorant, arrogant bigotry as to persecute any creed," Judge McDevitt said. "The Jew is not oppressed; it is religious freedom that is under fire here in that country."

"We have enjoyed political and religious liberty so long in America that we forget how it came. Liberty always has been born of struggle; it came only through sacrifice, the blood of martyrs and the devotion of mankind. And it can be preserved only by the jealous watchfulness and stern determination to be free."

Turning to Mrs. Anna Esther Fridenberg, whose brother left \$400,000 with which to build and equip the building, Judge McDevitt said: "To you we offer homage. We offer thanks of a grateful community. You will be a benefactor for untold and unknown thousands who, during years to come, will

enjoy comfort and skill that only such a thoughtful philanthropist as you could provide." Judge McDevitt then cited her as the "representative of a race that has been persecuted for 2,000 years and still is so charitable that you made certain this would be a non-sectarian institution."

1,000 Present

More than 1,000 heard Judge McDevitt's address. Arthur A. Flesher, president of the Jewish Hospital Association, presided at the ceremonies, delivered the address of welcome and introduced the speakers.

Among the speakers were Solomon N. Fridenberg, lawyer and relative of the late Mme Samuel Fridenberg, who left the legacy; Arthur Loeb, president of the Jewish Federation of Charities, and Lee Nusbaum, chairman of the building committee.

The gold engraved key with which the bronze doors of the new building were opened was handed to Mrs. Fridenberg by Horace W. Cator, the architect. The ceremonies were opened with an invocation by Rabbi Louis Wolsey of Congregation Rodeph Shalom, and closed with a benediction by Rev. Charles B. McGinley, rector of the Church of the Holy Child. After the ceremonies visitors were admitted to the "L" shaped, five-story building.

Dr. J.M. Rice, Educator, Dies in Philadelphia

(Special to the J.D.B.) PHILADELPHIA, June 25.—Dr. Joseph M. Rice, founder of the Society of Educational Research and noted author and educator, died of heart trouble.

Dr. Rice was born in Philadelphia in 1877. He was educated in New York and practiced medicine there from 1881 to 1888, after which he went abroad to study at the University of Jena and Leipzig.

On his return he became active in educational work and in 1897 was appointed editor of the Forum Magazine, a post he held for ten years.

Newark Adopts Philadelphia Is K kosher Ruling, Ending Strife

City Is Empowered to Govern Sale of Products

(Special to the J.D.B.) NEWARK, N. J., June 25.—Following weeks of controversy between two orthodox factions, the City Commission has finally passed an ordinance granting the city authority over the sale of kosher products. A state statute has been on the books for some time.

Active in behalf of passage of the ordinance were Rabbi Joseph Kovitz, Chaim Glotzer and Louis Weller, who up to the present had unofficial authority, delegated by the city health department, to see to it that there was no misrepresentation in the sale of kosher meat or fowl.

According to the terms of the new ruling, the sale of kosher and non-kosher products in the same store is prohibited unless adequate signs are placed. Any advertisement of non-kosher products as kosher is strictly prohibited under penalty of a \$500 fine or thirty days imprisonment for a first offense or \$500 fine or ninety days imprisonment for subsequent violations.

"We forbid Jews appearing on the German stage not only as actors, dancers and singers, but also as authors and composers. We refuse to have Jews writing the librettos of our musical plays, just as much as we object to them acting in them, producing them, doing the scenic effects. We shall allow no compromise.

"And we object just as much to those of Jewish origin who call themselves front fighters. We refuse to allow on the German stage anyone who is friendly to the Jews, or has married into a Jewish family. This holds good, no matter how important or able these people may be."

An Economist on Rich Jews

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin: In appendix A to his "Principles of Economics," eighth edition, the celebrated British economist, the late Alfred Marshall, has a few interesting passages dealing with the place of Jews in modern economic thought. The following is from page 758:

"...and Germany contains a larger number than any other country of the most cultivated members of that wonderful race who have been leaders of the world in intensity of religious feeling and in keenness of business speculation. In every country, but especially in Germany, much of what is most brilliant and suggestive in economic practice and in economic thought is of Jewish origin. And in particular to German Jews we owe many daring speculations as to the conflict of interests between the individual and society, and as to their ultimate economic causes and their possible socialist remedies."

These words coming from the pen of the greatest modern economist, may be of particular significance at this time.
