Rothenberg Urges Adoption of More Hitler Retaliations Wider Program to Aid Jewry

For 'Uprisings' Rumored

Jews Not Involved in Der Fuehrer's Sanguinary Coup; Goebbels Warns 'Conspirators'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, July 1.—Rumors of new "uprisings" and of retaliatory measures by Adolph Hitler and the forces loyal to him continued today to agitate the Berlin capital as the general population, only partly aware of the dramatic developments yesterday, buzzed in a ferment of speculation over the implications of what had taken place.

Hitler himself, following the blood-bath given by him to his closest and most trusted followers of more than a decade, was definitely committed to the course of the conservative elements which he used in suppressing his radical followers.

Julius Streicher, Arch Anti-Semite

of the Nazi move-ment, including Col. Ernst Roehm, Hitler's most intimate friend, and Edmund Heines, the Silesian Fehme murderer, long one of his derer, long one of his staunchest supporters, were dead and disgraced. General Kurt von Schlei-cher, former Chancellot of Germany, and his wife were shot and killed while von Schleicher allegedly was resisting arrest as a conspirator with Roehm and an unnamed third person against the Hitler regime.

Julius Streicher, Nazi overlord of Franconia, publisher of Der Stuermer, and most vicious of all the Nazi anti-Semites, was reported under arrest. The report was denied at several sources of information and it was reliably learned tonight that Streicher was

Jews in No Way Affected

The Jewish population in Berlin was in no way affected by the "uprising." There were no repercussions involving the Jews and the Jewish question had not, today, been raised in

connection with the "plot."

While the developments did not affect the Jews, a new anti-Semitic economic movement continued to make headway in some of the provincial regions, such as Bernkastel. Residents some on the provincial regions, such as bernkastel. Residents of the communities there were circularized with leaflest denouncing as "traitors" any one buying in Jewish-owned stores and threatening such purchasers with publication of their names in a newspaper blacklist.

It was announced today that the scheme for so-called People's Courts of summary judgment which was to have gone into effect

tomorrow, has been postponed.

In a radio broadcast tonight, Minister of Propaganda Dr. Paul oseph Goebbels sought to intimidate conspirators planning further revolution. He warned that "those who conspire against the state

may be sure that they are playing with their heads."

The prime propagandist of the Third Reich described the situation as having been restored to normal with the storm troopers one hundred per cent behind Hitler and "the entire nation endorsing the Leader's determined action."

The country was swept today by official orders, statements and speeches of Premier Goering, Goebbels and General von Blomberg, head of the Reichswehr, hailing Hitler's moves for the speedy restoration of order.

Von Blomberg declared that a state of emergency has been raised. Goering announced his intention of watching to see that upon the government representa-tive were Rabbis Levin, Minzberg order, threatening severe punishment for any attempts to convoke and Wistlick.

Mobilization Plan Seeks to Coordinate All Appeal Work

The work of consolidating na-tional and international appeals in behalf of Jewish relief and welfare agencies was given impetus yesterday when announcement was made by the National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds that plans had been com-pleted for a Jewish Welfare Mobil-ization and the organization of a Mowization Committee of 150 community leaders from all sections of the country.

According to William J. Shroder of Cincinnati, president of the National Council who made the announcement, the Mobilization Plan is intended to sponsor joint, co-operative fund-raising campaigns operative fund-raising campaigns throughout the country. These joint campaigns will replace the individual and frequently overlapping and duplicating drives fostered by numerous welfary, relief, educational and other Jewish organizations

The plan is the work of the Interim Committee, headed by Ira M. Younker of New York, which was appointed last January at the annual session of the National Council in Chicago for the express purpose of fostering a mobilization organization.

A basic feature of the plan, Mr. Shroder pointed out, will be consideration of every type of Jewish interest and activity. To this end a mobilization committee has sought which would reflect American Jewry in its entirety.

Reporter for Variety 'Berliners Nervous' Finds Nazi Stage in Doldrums

By HENRY W. LEVY Economists have dissected the economic fallacies of the Nazi policy and have shaken their heads as they predicted the immi-nent downfall of a regime so heretic; historians, with all the heretic; historians, with all the world in back of them, have in-dicated the inevitability of the overthrow of any government based on racial prejudice; psychologists have returned from the land of the Nazi to testify, as did Abraham Lincoln before them, that you "can't fool all of the people all of the time" and poli-ticians, sniffing rumors, as does the bloodhound, report that the political winds are wavering.

To make the picture unanimous a student of frivolity, a connois-seur of the box office, an expert in gaiety and a judge of the thea-tre returns to this country pro-claiming that Berlin has gone to the dogs, that this formerly conand cosmopolitan capital has been thoroughly enervated in the process of Hitlerization and that the citizens of Berlin, fearful of another day when the mark is valued at a million to the dollar, have gone on a spending spree that extends to everything but

Afraid of Tomorrow

Afraid of Tomorrow Wolfe Kaufman, a member of the editorial staff of Variety, the showman's Bible, recently returned from Germany after a brief tour of investigation of Germany's gay spots. He found the old town de its theatre wrecked, its night life a thing of the past. He found Berliners a group of worried per-sons afraid of the morrow. He found, in the midst of a spending spree, a most depressed citizenry. It seemed for all the world a city of persons condemned to be hanged next morning.

Kaufman had known the Berlin Kauman had known the Benin of yesteryear; he knew things were not what they used to be but he little suspected they were what they are. The last German Jew, he found, is out of the film business in Germany and as a result the pictures have reached a new low. The German stage has been purged of its Jewish actors and as a result is in a state worse than the doldrums. The cabarets than the doldrums. The cabarets are lifeless, what few are open, and all of the girls are dyed blondes—for the Nazis, like the American men of a decade ago prefer blondes. A brunette, it seems, might be mistaken for a Jewess and being in company with one might mean serious complica-tions. The ladies, ever obliging, are blonde.

In a Spending Frenzy

Money is being spent like water in Germany, but not for frivolity. The Germans are in a spending frenzy. They are buying anything of utility that might have a value when money hasn't. One German, Kaufman noted, had bought eight bicycle tires for his one bicycle; another six winter overcoats.

"At first glance," the Variety reporter told us the other day as we chatted in showland's capital, "you'd think that at last, in Germany, you had discovered a pros-perous country. But after a day or so, you note what the public or so, you note what the public is buying, things they have no use for, and you realize that they buy so they have anything but money. "The Berliners I met are in a

most nervous state. The Jews will talk to no one; the Gentiles will guardedly express their hopes and guardedly express their hopes and fears. Hitler is still popular but his advisors are looked upon with disfavor as though they had be-trayed him.

"Militarism," the Variety re-porter continued, "is in the air. You can't walk the streets, look out of your hotel window without seeing a parade. They seem to be an hourly occurrence, as regular as clockwork.

Hungry for News "News from the outside world is a highly valuable commodity in Berlin. The citizenry, aware of the internal censorship and suppression of news, is hungry for the true story. In accordance with all laws of human nature, people

who never seriously read new pers will now go to any lengths to get a Warsaw or Prague publication. A current newspaper is the first thing a visitor is asked for by a large part of the persons

"In this respect," Kaufman said "it is strange that most Germans don't seem to know that foreign newspapers can be obtained at the newsstands that have always sup-plied this want. It is just proof of a new interest for the larger part of population."

One of the outstanding things noted by the Variety reporter in his tour of things theatrical was the theatre of the Juedische Kulturbund (Jewish Culture Society). He calls it "the most exclusive and toughest to crash theatre in the world."

The organization is permitted to function by special dispensation of the Hitler regime on the promise, solemnly given and rigidly to, that no "Aryans" tend the performance.

Had to Be Endorsed

"In order to attend a performance," Kaufman said, "I had to obtain the guarantee and endorse ment of three prominent Berlin Jews. To secure entrance one needs a bona fide stamped, checked and double-checked membership eard of the Kulturbund, each card bearing a photograph of the bons file bearer. Out of towners find it almost impossible to attend the per-formance. I was very lucky to gain admittance.

"But when one does gain admit tance, it is well worth all the trouble. The reason being that the dramatic performances are made up of some of the finest actor in Europe. Before Hitler, eighty per of the German stage was Jewish: now this small the of talent. The performances are so good that the fame of this theatre has passed around Berlin's non-Jew-ish quarter with some embaras-sing results. Requests for entry and admissions are coming mor and admissions are coming more and more frequently from 'Ary-ans.' To see a good show in Berlin, the theatre lover has to go to the theatre of the inferior Jew. But the troupe and its managethe rules might result in the ganization losing its license.

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ADJUSTING OUR LIVES

By DR. HERMAN FRANK

The following is the first of a series of articles, to appear on Mandays, Wednesdays and Fridays in the Jevish Daily Bulletin, dealing with the problems of Jouish life in America, by Dr. Herman Frank. A brief Diographical sketch of Dr. Frank appears elsewhere on this page.

New Trends in American Jewish Life
With immigration restrictions remaining as strong as in the past ten years, a regrouping of the Jewish population in the United States is bound to occur. The position of the older immigrant generation is on the decline. Its place is being taken now by the sons and daughters of the for-

eign-born Iews who have already grown up to

mature manhood and womanhood.

Again, the tendencies for restriction of the birth rate are even stronger among the Jews than they are in the other cultural and racial elements. The reduced birth rate, combined with the ceasing of immigration, will result in a lower ratio of Jews in relation to the total American population, whereas during the last fifty years the Jewish community continuously increased its percentage. In 1927, the four and one-half million Jews in the United States formed 3.5 per cent of the people in our country.

The Americanization, it now ap-ears, is but an effacing of superficial distinctions between various ficial distinctions between various branches of the Jewish people that meet and enter into interdepending relationships on America's soil. relationships on America's soil.
Therefore, it is rather conducive to the strengthening of the Jew-ish minority and its organization than destructive of our group existence and future

The American Jews want to sunvive as a group more than before in the past thirty years and to a extent than other minority ater groups. Jewish social life is for a long time to come likely to be largely a group matter. The fur-ther development of Jewish social life, that is, recreational institu-tions and facilities, such as community centers, clubs, camps, etc., is very important and wholly in line with recent social trends in our communal life. Group education, both of children and adults. merits and gets greater attention on the part of the enlightened leaders of the Jewish minority.

In this way, as a by-product of the frank admission of the existence of the Jewish group, improved Jewish-Gentile relationships are also created. The experience, for instance, of the Hillel Foundation, established in the larger colleges

To overcome it, a counter action by the central Jewish social-political agencies is called for. Through coordinated efforts, backed up by an aroused public opinion, this eco an aroused public opinion, this eco-nomic problem would be suscept-ible of alleviation. A policy of drift, on the other hand, would make the social-economic problem of our rising generation greviously difficult of solution.

Expect 100,000 To See Pageant At Chicago Fair

Epic of a Nation' Will Climax Celebration of Jewish Day

(Special to the J.D.B.)

CHICAGO, July 1.—History will repeat itself at Soldier Field here on July 29, when the spectacle known as the "Epic of a Nation" will climax the second celebration of Jewish Community Day at a Century of Progress.

Technicians, trained in the me-chanics of large-scale theatrical production, are already at work assembling casts, choruses, symphonic groups, costumes and scenic properties.

Last year more than 130,000 per

sons crowded Soldier Field, break-ing all attendance records, to see the "Romance of a People." Ac-cording to advance estimates, this year the audience will again exceed the 100,000 mark.

Spectacular Effects
Spectacular effects are to be achieved with special lighting, sound and costuming as well as with the groups of the huge cast and musical organizations in vivid patterns on and around the gigantic stage.

The stage itself will measure 100 feet in diameter, with a brilliant Star of David painted on its sur-face. On either side of this stage massed choruses in colored cos-tumes will form replicas of the American and Jewish flags

An extensive sound amplification system will carry the voices of the singers and the actors to all parts of the vast grandstand. This year the entire field will be required as the setting for the show's action. Organization of the cast of more than 4,500 is a mighty technical problem to which Blake Scott, dramatic director, is devoting his

energy.

Dr. Frank Gained Wide Background

Editor, Writer, Student of Social Problems, Was Born in Russia

Dr. Herman Frank, a journalist of more than twenty years' experience in Europe and the United States, today begins in the Jewish Daily Bulletin a series of articles on the problems of Jewish life in America, under the heading, "Adjusting Our Lives.

Born in Bialystok in 1892. Dr. Frank came to this country in 1923. Between the years 1915 and 1918, while Bialystok was occupied by the German army, he was in constructive communal work as a lecturer, cooperator and expert on the needs of the Jewish populathe needs of the Jewish popula-tion in the social-economic crisis created by the war and military occupation. In 1919, he published in Yiddish two original and well-documented works based on his experiences and research during that critical period.

For three years, from 1920 to 1923, Dr. Frank lived in Germany, where he was editor of the Russian-German publishing company, Argonauten Verlag, while at the same time studying under profes-sors Stammler, Sombart and Cunnow at the University of Berlin.

Since coming to this country he has been engaged in writing for various American and European periodicals hundreds of articles. many of them dealing with social, economic and political subjects. has contributed numerous essays such publications as Zukunft, Reflex, Jewish Tribune and American Hebrew.

Wide experience, gained in New York, Detroit and Chicago, in various Jewish community projects, combined with an exhaustive study of the American social and economic scene, have made Dr. Frank a recognized authority on the subject which he will discuss the Bulletin every Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Goebbels, whose position yesterday was one of doubt, triumph-antly broadcast tonight that "Hitler never was so much the master as now. The whole world," he said, "can see Germany calm and in order."

It is understood that following references to an unnamed power supporting von Schleicher and Roehm in their alleged "conspiracy," the French and Czechoslovakian embassies vainly inquired of the Foreign Office in the Wilhelmstrasse which foreign power conspired

Forewarned, Hitler, aided by Prussian Premier Goering, the loyal elite guard, the police and the Reichswehr, the standing army moved with dramatic suddenness yesterday against the factions in his own private army which had become disaffected.

Roehm and Heines Both Die

"A government by assassination cannot live very long," Senator Borah said. "What a pity it is that a great people like the German people must be visited with such a scourge."

Although both the White House and the State Department are fol-lowing reports from Germany closely, officials could not be in-duced to comment in their official capacities.

There is much to be done in our midst. There is need to strengthen Jewish education. We must protect the foundations of Jewish relief activities. It is important that Jewish adults as well as children have a better conception of the purpose of the Jewish community. For these various tasks we have need of people of enthusiasm, devotion and idealism. Surely there could be no finer addition to the ranks of those workers than the Zionists. Those of us who do not share your particular outlook upon the future the Jewish people neverthele will be happy indeed to work with you to assure you the preservation of the truths upon which all of us were nurtured."

In the book his com-plete mental degradation is the moving motive but the picture is not satisfied with such a spiritual ending alone and adds a touch whereby Carey loses his material assets as well.

Leslie Howard is an actor of consummate skill. He is sensitive, intelligent and able and possesses the ability to get the most out of a character part. In "Of Human Bondage" he does not fail. The surprise of the film, however, is the fine acting of Bette Davis in the role of Mildred, the woman who ruins Carey's life. Heretofore her screen work has been ordinary and confined to ingenue roles but in this picture she attacks a difficult part successfully and courageously and actually steals the spot-light from Howard.

The convention paid tribute to Berl Locker, Zionist Labor leader, on his report which he presented concerning the situation in Zion-ism and the activities of the Zionist executive during the year.

Pick up 2nd para natl. edit. p. 8 Rerl Locker, Laborite member of the World Zionist Executive, on Saturday discussed the basic discrepancies between Marxian Socialism and the abstract Socialism described at length by Chaim Greenberg at the Friday evening session.

Prior to Greenberg's address there had been a talk by Professor Fineman, who had discussed the necessity of the group's affiliation with the Socialist Party of Professor Fineman advocated

Saturday afternoon's session concerned itself with discussion of the party's cultural activities. Segal read a report, prepared by Joel Entin, on the progress of the Jewish folk schools in America.

The Poale Zion-Zeire Zion has been interested in these schools for twenty years. Entin's report included mention of sixty elementary schools, four high chools and Jewish Teachers' Seminary summer camps maintained by the party together with the Jewish National Workers Alliance.

Zionist Body in the history of the Socialist and Herr Hitler Learned Lessons Well, Says Bulletin Observer Head Silent

Perhaps the most salient rea-ture of the "Second Revolution" is the fact that Hitler has learned at last a lesson well known to all revolutionists, a rule that one cannot gain and maintain power by the same means. Hitler has been brought to see that he can not brought to see that he can not make administrational policies of his personal fetishes. His enlight-enment, somewhat more sudden than that of his aldes, particu-larly those whose deaths were brought about Saturday, was ac companied by the execution of some of his dearest friends. Rochm some of his dearest friends, roomin and Heines were close personal friends to Hitler, and they are dead. Julius Streicher, another intimate of the Chancellor since long before Hitler aspired to power over Germany, is reported arrested. arrested.

Hundred and Ten Percenters

Most of those who fell before Hitler's sudden thrust were of the hundred and ten percenters"—the ultra-Nazis. There remain many "two hundred per centers." Whether it will require a "Third Revolution" to bring them to sanity is yet to be seen. Uneasy must rest the heads of Paul Joseph Goebbels and his extremist school of thought.

One year ago it was my pleas-re to have lunch with Julius Streicher. Prince August Wilhelm. Baldur von Schirach, Lieutenant Obernitz, Nuremberg district leader of the storm troops, and one or two others. We had just watched 60,000 Franconian youth from 6 to 20 parade through the crooked streets of that city. They marched with the precision of an army, and the Nazis expressed pleasure with the performance. Streicher, who had arranged the

demonstration, glowed. He is a squat, impetuous individual, boissquat, impetuous individual, bois-terous under the influence of beer—and there was plenty of it. He told me how he had worked with Hitler for fifteen years for this day, which he considered the crowning e ent of his career. He told me how he had beaten down public opinion and official resistance to put the "Jewish case" be-fore the people. He indicated that in solution of the "Jewish case" rested Germany's salvation, and he made no bones about the fact that the "solution" must come about forcibly. He sent an at-tendant to his office to fetch numbers of his notorious publication, "Der Stuermer," to give me docu-mentary evidence of his "solution."

Could Not See Future

Streicher, at the peak of his success, did not realize that there might be a sheer descent into the chasm of oblivion. On that after-noon his thoughts and speech concerned themselves mainly with the fact that he had arrived. He did not doubt 'hat he had arrived to stay. He was a bosom friend of Hitler, and in this, he assured himself, was insurance against all evil.

Streicher, two days previously, had marched into the public square almost two hundred Jews, the most prominent in Nurem-berg. There he held "choir pracberg. There he held "choir prac-tice," forcing the unfortunates to sing Nazi songs, drill, climb trees, and, some said, chew grass. He told me he had merely gathered them together for questioning with regard to an alleged Communist plot. Streicher, as so many other Jew-baiters have since told me, said that he personally was not anti-Semitic.

Where Prince August Wilhelm,

Germany's favorite of all the Ho-Germany's favorite of all the Ho-henzollerns, is today, reports do not say. Von Schleicher, recog-nized as having plotted for the restoration of the monarchy, is in no position to tell. Some reports have it that all members of the royal family fled when von Schleicher's coup proved abortive.

Edmund Heines I met twice in Breslau, where he served as police president and district leader of the storm troops. He was one of the most remarkable characters I have ever met. Tall, broad shouldered, powerful and lithe, he appeared every inch a man. Press reports carrying insinuations of his g insinuations of his ab-sexual behavior are the normal first intimations I have had of such, although I have heard many stories of a different nature about

Outstanding Soldier

Heines during the war was an outstanding soldier. His patriotism at the time is taken today as a standard of patriotism in Silesia, standard or parriotism in Silesia, which he ruled with an iron hand. At the close of the war he was a leader of the famous Fehme Mord—bands of German troops that refused to recognize Armistice. He continued fighting, am tice. He continued inguting, am-bushing former enemy troops at first, and later looting what had been enemy territory. Eventually the Fehme Mord degenerated in-to troops of renegade bandits who robbed the hungry German people of their sustenance.

Heines smiled as I was intro-duced to him. "I am one of the famous Fehme Mord." he said jokingly, taking his cue perhaps by given him. He was as amiable as Streicher, and decidedly more personable. His hands, the size of hams but somewhat more sensitive, his blue eyes, flashing good humor, and his curt but curteous manner, were impressive.

Smile Falls

When I mentioned the German Jewish situation his smile fell as though a lead weight had sudden-ly been attached to his features. His eyes were possibly the coldest I have ever seen. His features became hard.

"What you hear," he said,
"about the Jews is lies. I person-ally am not anti-Semitic, and I
do not punish Jews unless they are
Communists, as many of them
are." He ended that interview abruptly.

Heines was master of all he surveyed. Early in July, 1933, members of his stormtroop organization plotted against him and his superiors. The nuclear group of conspirators consisted of four former army officers. Learning of the mer army officers. Learning of the plot, Heines summoned the lead-ers to his office, dismissed the at-tendants, locked the door, pocket-ed the key, and without further ado got down to business. Singlehanded he pummelled the rebels until they were no longer able to stand. He then sent them to the hospital for treatment, and rebellion in the vicinity of Breslau had Lever since shown itself

Heines had the reputation handling many party and criminal disturbances himself. He is said to have kept fit by beating up miscreants.

Public Attitude Divided

The public attitude toward the police department and leader of the stormtroops appeared to be sharply divided. Where he was not openly loved he was secretly and bitterly hated. Some would have it that he commanded more respect in his particular part of the country than Hitler; and in this there may be a key as to his sudden
