Martyr Beilis

The death of Mendel Beilis, the Kiev brickyard superintendent, who was falsely ac-cused by the Tsarist govern-ment of "ritual murder" and who was acquitted by the jury, recalls the criminal methods resorted to by the decomposing Tsarist regime in its efforts to justify its pogrom policy and to discredit the Jews everywhere. An ordinary innocent Jew was charged with having killed a Christian boy and used his blood for ritual purposes. Minister of Justice Scheglovitov set in motion the entire government machinery at his disposal, fabricating evidence and securing unscrupulous experts to testify that certain sects of Jews used Christian blood for ritual purposes.

The whole civilizat world was aroused at the Tsaist attempt to revive the long-exploded myth and to convict the innomyth and to convict the inno-cent Jew. Protests came from various lands. The Vatican also denounced the resurrection of the ritual murder legend in un-mistakable terms. The Russian liberals, aroused by the criminal folly and cruelty of the Tsarist government, came to the aid of the counsel for the defense of Mendel Beilis — G Margolis and others. Gruzenberg,

conspiracy of the Russian government against the Jewish
people was revealed in all its
horror and stupidity. The government's experts discredited ernment's experts discredited themselves. Mendel Beilis was acquitted.

The "ritual murder" conspir-The "ritual murder" conspiracy, by which the Tsarist government sought to divert the attention of the suffering Russian people from its real enemies, served to hasten the end of the decaying autocracy. This mies, served to hasten the end

conspiracy was followed by the
reign of Rasputism, which precipitated the revolution.

15,000 Jews Enter Palestine in Half Year

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, July 9.— At least 15,000 Jewish immigrants entered and settled in Palestine in the first six months of the current year, it was announced today by the Jewish Agency for Palestine. According to the Agency's calculations, nearly 3,000 of this number were capitalists who brought approximately £6,000,000 into the Holy Land.

This figure, the Agen states, establishes a record for immigration unequalled by any other country in the world during so short a period.

Columbia Medical School Professor Goes on Settler's Visa

Scientific research and the practice of medicine in Palestine and the Near East, particularly in the the Near East, particularly in the fields of otology and laryngology, will be augmented with the arrival in the Holy Land of Professor Morris Levine of the faculty of the Post Graduate Medical School of Columbia University.

Professor Levine, accompanied by his wife and nephew, Robert A. Ehrlich, is sailing today on the Excambion of the American Export Line.

This will be his third visit to the Jewish National Home. He had al-ready visited Palestine in 1921 and reacy visited Paiestine in 1921 and 1931, when he spent several months there, during which he evoked in-terest in the medical and govern-mental circles of the country. His present trip differs from his for-mer visits as he goes on a settler's view with the intention of monitors. visa with the intention of spending a considerable part of the year in Palestine, while returning for the summer each year to the United States. This arrangement was entered into since he will continue his post-graduate lectures at the Columbia school

Professor Levine is the author of several medical textbooks, including one on "Practical Otology." which are being used in many medical schools in the United States. He is a fellow of the New York Academy of Medicine, the American Board of Otolaryngology, a member of the American Editors and Authors Association. the American Medical Association and other scientific bodies. His connection with the Columbia Med-ical School dates back over twenty

Professor Levine was horn in Vilna in 1882, and is an orthodox Jew. He is a member of the Zion-ist' Organization of America.

Dr. Heinrich Jordan Weighs Merits of Political System

The merits and faults of Fas-cism, National Socialism and Communism cannot be properly appreciated without an understanding of their theoretical and historical foundations, Dr. Heinrich Jordan, exiled German professor, told his class in "Recent Developments in the Philosophy of the State," at the first session of New York Uni-versity, Washington Square sumssion yesterday.

"Consciously or subconsciously, the elements of political philosophy, as evolved through the great systems of political thought in the 'last century, are contained also in present day ideologies, whether their originators admit it or not," said Professor Jordan.

The Beilis affair was, how-ever, the most brazen attempt ever made by a government to manufacture proof that the Jews used Christian blood for religious purposes.

And now we have in Germany, a movement headed by Julius Streicher, close friend of Adolf Hitler, inciting Jewish massacres by conducting a most victous campaign against the Jews on the ground that they are guilty of "ritual murder." ermany, where the press is absolutely controlled and muzansolutely controlled and muz-zled, Streicher is permitted to carry on his murderous cam-paign, which may thus be re-garded as being officially sanc-tioned.

When the foreign press ex-pressed its indignation at the "ritual murder" propaganda conducted by Streicher, the Nazi government gave half-hearted orders to stop the circulation of the special "ritual murder" issue of Streicher's organ in Berlin. All precautions were taken to prevent the circulation of that issue abroad. But Streicher is allowed to continue his dastardallowed to continue his dastard-ly "ritual murder" agitation. Streicher is part and parcel of the sadist Hitler government, and the "ritual murder" accusations against the Jews are part of the Hitler anti-Jewish pogrom-program. Just as in Tsarist Russia, this "ritual murder" frame-up in Nazi Germany is hastening to drive the nails into the coffin of Hitler-

The death of Mendel Beilis also reminds us that this inno-cent victim, who suffered un-speakable hardships merely because the Tsarist government selected him as a Jewish symselected min as a Jewish sym-bol through which it sought to discredit all Jewry, was quite an ordinary Jew of average in-telligence. But in his tragic plight he developed remarkable qualities of martyrdom and con-ducted himself with remarkable courage and dignity. When he was released from prison, a broken man, without the means of earning a livelihood for himself and his family, he declined all sorts of luring financial of-fers from American impresarios, on the ground that he did not want to commercialize his martyrdom and thus reflect discredupon the Jewish name.

Hitler Is Still Idol of Reich, Traveler Finds

Removal Would Cause Indescribable Chaos, Says Denby

(Special to the J.D.B.)

PHILADELPHIA, July 9.—

Adolf Hitter today is the unchallenged idol of the German peopleand his removal, forcible or otherwise, from the German political
picture would precipitate a condition of indescribable chaos.

Although he left Germany the day before Hitler's bloody "purg-ing" of Nazi leaders, Charles Denby Jr., Philadelphia attorney Denny Jr., Financipnia attorney and son-in-law of U. S. Senator David A. Reed, said yesterday that the better informed classes in Germany, particularly business groups, had been uneasy for uneasy for

Mr. Denby, who arrived in New York on the Europa Thursday, spent three weeks in Germany.

The possibility of a restoration of the Hohenzollerns to the monarchy, he said, is very remote, and is viewed approvingly by but a small segment of the German na-

"I don't think that anyone in Germany had the slightest apprehension that the 'purging' as it is called here, would take place when it did," Mr. Denby said, "When I was in Germany in December and January, the more conservative and better-informed people were uneasy, but their fears had no focus. They had the feeling that Hitler didn't have sufficient control over the more bloodthirsty of his lieutenants, and that the party leaders in the provinces would break loose from the central authority and assert their power in their own local communities.

Fear of Anarchy is Strong

"Fear of anarchy is too strong and I think it would be more accurate to say that they feared that Germany was drifting steadily to-ward a period of lack of govern-mental discipline.

"I was not in Germany when

the events of late last month took place but even had I been, I am convinced that there would have been nothing visible to indicate the sub-surface events. In Germany, the discipline is so perfect, the censorship of the press so rigid, that the ordinary people simply don't know what is taking place. They may sense it, and they place. They may sense it, and they may hear reports, but that is all, and superficially the life of the people remains normal and placid. "My own impression, gained from conversation with the better

informed groups is that Hitler will remain in power indefinitely. I don't think that there is anyone who could or would want to dis-

place him.


"He is the unquestioned idol of the German people. Their attitude toward him is actually that of idolatry, and if there is blame to be assigned, it is not attached to him, but to his associates. Even among the better informed the principal criticism of him is that he is not strong enough as a man and as a leader

family is not wanted.

New York Rabbi Speaks at Virginia Public Affairs Meet

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., July 9.—The world economic crisis was given as the chief reason for the aggravation of religious intolerance and "unhappy Germany's out-break against the Jews," by Rabbi D. De Sola Pool in an address last night before the Institute of Public Affairs

Although misery sometimes makes men kin, it often obscures reality and drives them to a refuge of inferior prejudices, where "they find a scapegoat on whom to blame their misery," he declared. This is also the explanation, the speaker said, "of the sudden weed-

like growth in America of nume-rous movements of organized pre-judice and hate."

While religious differences are historical conditions and inevit-able, nevertheless, asserted Rabbi Pool, religious prejudices are en-tirely avoidable.

How to Outlaw Was

Possibilities of war can be forestalled only when all men sub-merge their petty religious prejudices and cooperate in mutual re-sistance to the many evils threatening human welfare, Rabbi Pool maintained.
"When we are faced by the in-

numerable problems of race rela-tions, political corruption, the fartions, pointeat corruption, the far-flung network of crime, gangster-ism and racketeering, industrial unrest, unemployment, poverty, hunger and human misery, prob-lems threatening the very stability of our society, how can men in their sanity spend their souls in the contemptible pettiness of pre-judices instead of joining hands to work together against these tre-mendous evils which threaten to engulf us all alike?" he asked.





The following is the third of a series of articles, "This Fascist Racket," by Mr. McGrady, exposing, from the inside, the workings of a typical Fascist organization here, and revealing, through publication of the Fascist "chieftains" correspondence, how and in what manner these radial rackets are operated. until he decided to go from construction to economic engineering. It is possible that he gained the germ of his idea from that excellent work by Bellamy, "Looking

Backward," but, aside from an unimportant snatch here and there from the Bellamy theory, his plan indicates little similarity to any ever conceived by any sane mind.

Supporters Don't Understand

It is Christians' complaint that few of his supporters understand his plan, and he invariably charges who do understand it and ider it destructive to the rights and welfare of the people with being "negative personality with being "negative personanty types." The positive types, i. e., those who agree with Christians, are so few that they may be dis-cussed at length in this brief consideration of the Fascist situation.

Christians' Secretary of State, a member of the Klan, which, inci-dentally, is understood to be be-hind his movement, is C. A. Hester of Chattanooga. He, admittedly, does not appreciate the tremen-dous worth of Christians' plan, and during our discussion of it he ap-peared to agree that its implications would wreak havoc among the working classes. He told me about Christians' development of this masterpiece. According to Hoster.

Not Sociable

Christians was never a very sociable sort of a guy. Sometimes he would greet his friends, but whenever his moods came over him (and these were frequent) he would pass old acquaintances on the street, wall among those who worked with him, and lock himself in his office without a hello to anybody. When he began writing his manuscript this mood devel-oped. He would spend hours gazing out his window, write a line or two, then spent another hour

or two, then spent another hour or two gazing out the window."

This went on for about five months, during which time he wrote his manuscript (now a fiftynine page volume published by himself which could be copied by an expert typist in about seven

hours). It is called "The Depression."

The manuscript finished, Chris-The manuscript finished, Christians showed it to a number of his friends, all of whom expressed agreement with him that it was a mighty fine piece of work. Some of them later (when Christians

started building a political movement around his scheme) admitted that they didn't understand the thing at all. Nevertheless, he sent it to one or two economic journals, and it was returned with the brief but courteous and impersonal note stating formally that the editors enjoyed reading it but that they could find no place for it. It was the utter formality of these notes that got Christians as it gets so many writers who sense lack of literary appreciation among editors who return their submitted manuscripts. Then Christians knew that he had become the obctive of the press' "campaign of

Warned Editor

silence.'

He went to a leading economic ournal in New York, and they told him they could not use the manuscript. He brought it to the New York Times financial editor, and at the first show of resistance on the part of that gentleman he unloosed such language as has seldom if ever been heard in the waiting rooms of The Times. He vowed before the shocked editor that the day of reprisa against capitalistic oppression would come and went back to Chattanooga to

prepara for the event. At length he got in to see Con-gressman Louis T. McFadden of Pennsylvania. As Christians said, "I was real nice to him. I handled him with kid gloves, because it wasn't necessary to cut loose. He came through. McFadden Introduced Bill

In introducing the bill known as H. R. 4747 to the 72nd Congress, McFadden insisted upon in-serting the clause "by request" to the introduction. This, Christians says, he permitted.

The bill, according to its terms provides that: "There shall be coined, printed and issued by the Government of the United States of America a new form of money to be based upon human effort as stabilized in this act. The money to be coined, printed, and issued as to be coined, printed, and issued as required in this Act shall be of the same denomination as metallic coin as now in use. No gold or ouner precious coined. The metal shall coined. The standard to be used as a basis of value of the money required to be coined, printed and issued in this act shall be the average wage of male, unskilled, common labor in the states of the union only at the 1928 level, which is assumed to be 42.62 cents per hour.

"The standard of value of the money to be coined, printed, and issued as required under the provisions of this Act shall be main-tained by adjusting the interest rate at which this money shall be loaned so as to stabilize the labor wage set out in section 3 hereof. The interest rate shall be negative, if necessary, to restore the said labor wage to the standard as fixed in Section 3 of this Act. The interest rate "hall be approved or changed at intervals of not more than one month nor less than one week and shall not be changed more than one per centum upon any occasion, except in case the President shall declare that an economic emergency exists, in which case the rate may be changed by geometric progression."

Only Citizens Eligible

Those eligible for loans are, ac-cording to the bill, "only American citizens or combinations of Amerian citizens, only on first mort-gages on real estate situated in the United States and its possesthe United States and its posses-sions only or United States Govern-ment bonds. The ratio of the value of collateral to money applied for shall be, in case of real estate mortgages, not less than two-and-one-half to one, based on the market value of the real estate pledged, and in the case of bonds not less than one and one-fourth to

Section 9 of the bill provides that, "The paper money to be printed and issued as required by this Act shall bear the following notation: "The Government of the United States of America pledges its honor and its entire resources to control the value of this money inancier. by means of the interest rate at
Then followed six months in which it is loaned so as to stabilize,

42.62 cents per hour.'

The bill further provides for the buving of the Federal Reserve Banking System by the govern-ment with funds gained from governmental bond issues and for creation of governmental labor markets, which may be inter-preted as being governmental employment agencies hiring men out at the 1928 wage level . . . providing there are employers.

Christians' bill requires little discussion. He hopes to stimulate industry, and hence employment, by printing money hand over fist and loaning it to all who have accredited collateral. This is his admission. The negative interest rates will make loaning money from the government very attractive, for, at ten per cent negative interest, as an example, anyone with sufficient collateral could bor with suncient collateral could bor-row from the government \$110 and be required to repay only \$100. Everyone likes a bargain. Every-one eligible will borrow.

Admits Price Rises

Christians concedes that under his system, whereby money will be printed in wholesale quantities to meet the needs of capitalists eager to take advantage of negative in-terest, prices will rise. Despite this, he is determined to keep the average wage of unskilled, male, common labor at forty-two cents an hour, with other wages ranging hour, with other wages ranging accordingly. He admits that the wage will not buy as much as it does now or as it did in 1928. Still he persists in maintaining it con-When asked whether or not he

did not think the capitalists would quickly take advantage of his government's generous offer of gratui-ties for borrowing free money, Christians declared:

"These here rich fellows are too dumb to know what it's all about Before they realize the bargain, the little fellows will be in there ahead of them borrowing all they can get hold of."

Christians did admit, however, that while "these here rich fel-lows" might be awfully dumb personally, they were smart enough to hire alert assistants strategically placed to take advantage of every opportunity to make more money for their masters. When asked whether or not he

believed it true that all but a few would be ineligible for his generous negative interest, Christians ad-

negative interest, Christians au-mitted that he did.
"But," he said, "the little fel-lows will get work."
As far as my questions and his answers would disclose he bases this assumption purely on faith.

"What will become of Germany
when all the Jews are gone?" his

They are making it impossible absolutely for a Jew to earn a living," he said.

"From the beginning both the government and the people wanted to see the country rid of Jews. What is happening today makes me believe that this is still true of the government, but not of the German in the street.

"Mr. Filene was the first man
in America to advocate establishment of a credit union movement," Mr. Doig declared, "Credit unions are associations of a group of peo-ple—members of a firm, members of a church or synagogue, an American Legion post and the like —who band together to save sys-tematically and to lend from \$5 to \$2,000 to members at a low rate of interest. Has Spent \$900,000

'To sell the Credit Union to America Mr. Filene has already spent \$900,000. He has footed the bill for the Credit Union National usion Bureau, with headquarters at Boston; and the Twentieth Century Fund, which he endowed in 1919 with \$1,000,000, and of which such notables as Newton D. Baker, Owen Young and Max Lewenthal are directors, annually contributes \$50,000 for credit union work in America.

was first conceived by a German,
William Reiffeisen, in the little

Reich Hate Losing Hold, Rabbi Finds

Sees One Victory Already Non by Liberalism in German Nazi Crisis

(Special to the J.D.E.)

CAPE COD, Mass., July 9.—

"One victory for the cause of liberalism and the protection of the Jewish community of Germany has already been won, and it dates back to the Sportpalast address of Paul Goebbels several weeks ago," declared Rabbi Louis I. Newman in a speech during the dedication of a Torah scroll in Hyannis, befor the Jewish Community congregation of Cape Cod yesterday, "Germany's crisis finds Jews as mere onlookers, praying that the outcome will be helpful to liberal ideas and the cause of humanity. "German leaders have come to

dreadful blunder in persecuting the Jews," he continued. "It may well be that the day of official persecution of the Jews is over, and Goebbels may have made his last authorized anti-Jewish speech. Whether or not a new Hitler will emerge from the present 'blood purge' remains to be seen.

"But it would be folly for Jews or liberals to congratulate themselves prematurely that the vic-tory has been won for the causes they have upheld during the tragic days since January, 1933," the Dr. Newman pointed out "C tinuous vigilance is required "Conliberals everywhere until the world can discern the true direction of German forces, and there must be no abatement of the economic pressure against Germany.

July 5, 1934. To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin As a General Zionist, neither Revisionist nor Laborite, permit me to make these comments upon the Atlantic City Zionist conve tion, in the hope you may find room for them in your column.

An attempt was made by the pro-Histadruth or pro-Labor group to "raid" the convention on behalf of its viewpoint and in condemna-tion of the Revisionists. Berl Locker, Louis Lipsky and Jacob Fishman were the spearhead of this attack, and with addresses, vitu-perative and venomous, they attack, and with addresses, vitt-perative and venomous, they sought not only to win the con-vention, but also to provoke the General Zionists to the use of their tactics of abuse and villifiown cation.

On Monday afternoon they seemed to have a clear field, but on Monday evening the pro-Labor "offensive" received its first major setback in the approval which the delegates gave to the address of Robert Szold and others on behalf of "General Zionism." We asserted that the Z. O. A. should not commit itself to anything except the fundamental principles of classic Herzlian Zionism, that the Z. O. A., whatever the private and per-sonal opinions of delegates as to sonal opinions of delegates as to party issues, should hold the scales of justice firmly between all groups, parties and factions. On Tuesday afternoon, when

finally the resolutions committee finally the resolutions committee was able to report, it was evident that the Locker-Lipsly-Fishman viewpoint, not only had been checked, but had been placed on the defensive. No resolution was introduced which in any way indicated a preference for any party viewpoint. Moreover a resolution killed in committee which would have supported the Histadruth in tis effort to secure and maintain a monopoly upon labor organization in Palestine. (This resolution was presented to the committee, let it be said, in mime-

ographed form).

Could Have Been Killed The resolution asserting the su-premacy of the World Zionist Congress, could have been killed in committee had the representatives of "General Zionism" desired to combat it. In its original form (like mimeographed) it contained a violent attack upon the Revisionists. I had the honor to rewrite the body of the resolution, and it was transformed from a specific attack upon the Revisionists into a statement of general principle, expressing disapproval of any action, whatever its source, in any action, whatever its source, to contravention of the principle of the supremacy of the World Zion-ist Congress. Fishman's amend-ment of the words "whatever its source," to "by any group or party within the Zionist organization" was acceptable. Ezra Shapiro of Cleveland, after a reckless attack upon the Revisionists, sought to condemn them in the resolution by name, but even Lipsky opposed this amendment. Nevertheless Lipsky sought to turn the text of the resolution, which a rereading will demonstrate is in general terms, into a direct criticism, if by implication, upon the Revisionists. I de-clared that the resolution was drawn so that it would be applicable tomorrow as well as today, and that "what was sauce for the goose was sauce also for the gan-der." The Stavsky Resolution Another rebuff to the Locker-Lipsky-Fishman viewpoint occur-red in the passage of the Stavsky resolution. This resolution, drawn with utmost care, asked only that in view of the dissenting opinion of one of the judges and the establishment of a committee of distinguished Palestinian Jews, such aid might be given Stavsky as to enable him to present adequately and fully his appeal for a new trial. In defense of the resolution I mentioned that similar resolutions have been passed by the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Young Israel and the Order Sons of Zion and would doubtless be passed by other conventions of Jews: that it contained no criticism of the court and made no comment upon the case in question. Jacob de Haas, regrettable interruptions by Jacob Fishman, also described the work of the Stavsky Non-Partisan Defense Committee in cooperation with Rabbi Kook. Shelvin's motion to table the resolution was defeated almost unanimously, just before Lipsky arose to speak. Though originally opposed to any resolution, Lipsky admitted that the mood of the convention was favorable to a resolution and, amid the most severe resistance antipathy he has ever encountered at a Zionist convention, Lipsky, professing to favor the resolution, sought to draw into the discussion of it every manner of irrelevant implications, apparently with a desire to stampede the convention against it. But former Congressan Perlman and Morris Rothenberg, president of the Z. O. A., after a slight verbal change in the after a slight verbal change in the text of the resolution, called for the previous question, and the Stavsky resolution was unanimously passed. A Labor spokesman is said to have remarked: "If I had been in control of this convention, no such resolution would have even been presented."

Opposition to "Raid" In short, despite press reports and headlines, and despite your staff correspondent's narrative in The Jewish Daily Bulletin of July 5, not only did the attempted pro Labor "raid" meet with vigorous opposition, as the fine declaration of Rabbi Joseph Shubow on b of sixty delegates who had affixed their signatures, clearly proved, but widespread resentment was erystallized at the tactics of those who sought to transform the Z. O. A into an appendage and auxiliary of the Histadruth. The forcing tactics of the pro-Labor group is sol-idifying the General Zionists, and new realignment of forces is under way. The "Avukah Group," consisting of splendid young Zionists, trained in an understanding of the economic emphasis and in the Maximalist policy, which Judge Bernard Rosenblatt advocated in his plea for concentration upon the problems of a larger immigration into Palestine, and the great body of General Zionists will not permit the Zionist movement to be-come an arena in which parties and factions may leap at each other's throats. We asked Lipsky and his collaborators to avoid in vective, to make no effort at provocation, but they would not listen. The General Zionists held themselves in restraint, and their viewpoint, in the resolutions adopted as the true expression of the convention's will, gained the victory it deserved. The "opposition" to the pro-Labor cabal did not lack a program; on the contrary, its program is to keep Zionism true Zionism, without restrictive adjec-

Leroy Peterson, supervisor of the Live Poultry Code Association, and William Fellowes Morgan Jr., commissioner of markets, made fruit-less efforts yesterday to bring less efforts yesterday to bring about a settlement of the dispute between the poultry commission men and the retail dealers. The strike called last Thursday by the Live Poultry Slaughter House Association, the organization which controls eighty-five per cent of the business in Greater New York, continued unabated.

Peterson said he would go to the capital today instead. Morgan probably will see Secretary Wal-lace later in the week.

Abraham Franzel, president of the slaughter house association, declared his organization is deter-mined to hold out in its demands for lower coop hire, trucking and storage charges and for termina-tion of the practice of setting an arbitrary daily figure for the wholesale cost of chickens.

Of thirty-eight carloads of poultry on the tracks yesterday, only ten were unloaded, according to reports. These crates were deliv-ered principally to retail dealers, it was said.

9 Jews Slain In Germany

(Continued from Page One) the city of Glogau, in Silesia, about sixty miles from Breslau. No de-tails were available today as to how they had met their deaths.

A shocking tragedy was revealed as having occurred in Berlin. Po-lice last Wednesday evening en-tered the home of Maximilian Stein, one of Germany's best known lawyers and commercial counsellors, and arrested his twenty-yearold son. The youth's body was re-turned to his distraught parents that evening with the curt expla-nation that the boy had committed suicide by throwing himself out a window of police headquarters.

The family was warned to conduct the funeral services with the utmost quietness.

The nine deaths thus far reported were not believed part of a general campaign of terror against the Jews but, to represent sporadic attacks incidental to the general disorders which followed the execution of storm troop beginning a union of the general contracts. leaders and suppression of incipi-ent revolts by the present regime.

Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, who was delegated to arrange for an interview with motion picture pro-ducers in which the three faiths represented at the luncheon would explain their objections to current films, declared that it was essential for Jews to assist in the cleansing.
"A careful study of the motion

picture industry reveals the fact that production, distribution and exhibition is largely controlled by Jews. To the degree that this is true, a special responsibility rests upon the Jewish people, more par-ticularly upon Jewish leaders, to do their utmost to cleanse the mo-United Polish Unit ton pictures of all suggestiveness, indecency and obscenity," Dr. Goldstein declared.

"We are cooperating with the Catholic and Protestant groups both because we believe the moboth because we believe the mo-tion picture is frequently a danger to the moral life of the commu-nity, and because we are con-vinced that many pictures pro-duced by Jewish concerns and is-sued by Jewish executives are a dishonor and a disgrace to the Twwish people. Jewish people.

"The New York Board of Jewish Ministers and the Central Con-ference of American Rabbis mean to do everything within their power to purge the motion picture industry and theatre, and to re-make both the theatre and the motion picture into what they ought to be, an instrument of art, education and entertainment. There are certain occupations from which we are excluded by others. There are also certain enterprises from which, because of the ideals of Israel, we must deliberately ex-clude ourselves."

> An attack on general Zionism and Labor Zionism for swerving from the ideal of Herzlian Zionism was the keynote of a memorial meeting by the Zionist-Revisionist Organization and the Brith Trumpeldor for Dr. Theodor Herzl and Chaim Nachman Bialik last night at Plaza Hall, Fifteenth street and Irving place.

> "When in 1897," said Louis Alt-man, Revisionist leader, "Dr. Herzl assembled the first Zionist Con-gress, the Jewish Socialists assembled somewhere in Eastern Europe to establish their organization entitled 'the Bund.' A bitter struggle between two antagonistic ideologies—that of Herzlian Zion-ism on the one hand and that of Marxian Socialism on the other determined the course of Jewish public life for decades.

> "The Poale-Zionists have tried for the last decade to reconcile the Zionism of Herzl with the Marx-tan Socialism of the Bund. But instead of bringing the Jewish Socialists into the Zionist camp, they converted Zionists to Socialism." Other speakers included Beinesh Epstein and Mordecai Danzis.

Epstein compared the Stavski case to the Dreyfus affair. "Offi-cial Zionism today," he declared, is displaying its inconsistency by holding memorial meetings for Dr. Herzl. They who have abandoned the nationalistic teachings of the great leader have no right to shel-

great leader have no right to shel-ter themselves in its shadow. "Supine leadership and weak policies, which are characteristic of present-day Zionism, have nothing in common with the Herzlian

"We are told that Dreyfus was greatly instrumental in influencing Dr. Herzl in his determination toward the idea of Zionism, bee he lost all faith in the possibility of Jews to continue to live in the European atmosphere, Dr. Herzl was fundamentally shocked by the display of cruelty and slander against the Jews that the Dreyfus trial brought about.

"What shall we say now when among ourselves in the Zionist ranks the same thing is being re-peated? Stavsky is being sacrificed on the altar of political machina-tions of the Histadruth in Palestine. The hatred displayed on the pages of the Histadruth press reminds one of the French press in the days of Dreyfus." In his speech Mordecai Danzis

drew a parallel between Dr. Herzl and Vladimir Jabotinsky and asserted that the Revisionists were the only Zionists who had followed in the footsteps of Dr. Herzl and propagated the founder's ideals as he expressed them in his Yudenstadt

Danzis pointed out that the Revisionists constitute at the present time the only political Zionists in the entire Zionist movement, After the Balfour declaration, he said, when Dr. Weizmann came into power, political Zionism had dis-appeared. The movement then reverted to its original status of the "lovers of Zion." With the appearance of Jabotinsky, world Revi-sionist leader, Danzis declared, political Zionism was revived.
