The Pilsudski government has outlawed the Naras, the anti-Semitic terrorists, as a menace to peace and order. Since their organization last 'April, the Naras, the Nazified elements of the National Democratic and anti-Jewish party in Poland, resorted to violence and Jew-baiting in its worst forms. They attacked the Jews and plotted against the Pil-

Poland, therefore, needs above all internal nomic position. Poland, there-fore, needs above all internal peace and stability, and not the destructive and self-destructive methods of the Hitlerites.

Hitler's "Truth"

Before making his full "explanation" to the Reichstag on Friday, Adolf Hitler gaye a "message" to the United States in the form of an interview with Dr. Alfred J. Pearson, a former American Minister to Poland, and now Dean of the College of and now Dean of the College of Liberal Arts of Drake Universi-ty at Des Moines. The inter-view, published in the Paris New York Herald, was arranged through Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank.

In that message, Hitler de-clares that he slew the traitors to save Europe. When Dr. Pearson asked Hitler what he could tell the American people about recent events in Germany, Hit-ler replied, "quick as a flash;" "Tell them the truth. Tell them

on Temporary Agreement

The lockout against poultry commission merchants by a num-ber of markets in Brooklyn which involved the laying-off of 200 slaughterers and 350 market workers was temporarily called off yes-terday according to Abraham Franzel, president of the Live Poultry Market Association and moving figure in the lockout, who told the Bulletin that a temporary settlement with the commission merchants had been effected gaining for the market men most of

their demands. More than 150 members of Shochtim Union Local 440, the organization of poultry slaughter-ers, met last night at the Bialystoker Auditorium, East Broadway and Clinton street, and voted acceptance of a temporary agree-ment with the market men under which they will return to work tomorrow in most markets.

Fear was expressed that certain market owners are trying to gouge the slaughterers by forcing them to slaughter more fowl or receive lower wages than the union agreement calls for.

A new agreement is expected to go into effect next Monday whereby slaughterers will be paid fifty-five dollars per week and will slaughter fifty coops of fowl per

Advises Hitler

Furnished Data OnArmaments. Turkish Jews Truce Declared Quiz Reveals

From Trust for Propaganda

Ivy Lee and his high-powered firm of publicity experts stood self-revealed yesterday as advisors to the German government on rearmament and as the prime propagandists for the Hitler ter-

ror reign. Although Lee himself did not appear before yesterday's open hearing of the Congressional Committee to Investigate Nazi and Other Subversive Propaganda in the United States, his partner, Burnham Carter, admitted on the stand that his firm has furnished the Reich with detailed advice relative to armaments.

Further revelations were con-tained in testimony which Lee himself gave at closed sessions of the committee several weeks ago and which were read into the rec-

ord yesterday. Burnham's admissions and Lee's statement, as heads of an organization which does publicity for the Rockefeller interests, the Pennsylvania Rallroad and a myriad other giant enterprises of national international stature, tained the following revelations:

1) That Lee receives \$25,000 a year as a retainer from the In-dustrial Gesellscha't Farben (the German dye trust) for his advice on how to improve the German-American trade relations.

That he paid his 28-year-old son, James Lee 2nd, who did contact work for him in Berlin, over \$33,000 in 1933, which was \$8,000 more than he himself received as

At Least 2 More Dead, 1 Missing, Many Injured

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, July 11. — To the long list of attacks on the Jews in Germany since the Roehm revolt, which included the slaying of nine Jews, the beating up of scores more and the arrests of numerous others, survey conducted by special in vestigators of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today adds cases of at least two more deaths, several more victims of attacks and a number of additional arrests.
It also disclosed that the Berlin

A sporadic wave of anti-Jewish terrorism in many parts of the country was revealed by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency investiga tion. In Hesse province, it was learned, a group of black-shirted S. S. men broke into Jewish homes and, shooting wildly in one, had wounded four Jews. One of those shot was reported to be critically

The charge against Klemperer is tax evasion. Announcement of the warrant was made in the ministry's official gazette, which warned Germans not to repay private debts due the musician. His property will be confiscated. Klemperer was dismissed from the State Opera because of his

Klemperer left Los Angeles last April, according to the Bulletin's San Francisco correspondent, and is believed to be somewhere in Europe at the present time.

According to Goldstein, the hitsche Zeitung, in a comment which it printed last Saturday under the headline, "Joseph Gold-stein Should Be Disbarred," characterized him as a "scurvy and unscrupulous prostitute before the bar" who "tried to seduce and in-timidate an American court through perjury."

The comment further referred him, Goldstein declares in his fidavit, as "a lying criminal Jew wyer," as "the fithy Goldstein," s "a professional liar of the lowest possible sort," and concluded with, "New York City must be rid-ded of such dirty, contemptible wolves as Joseph Goldstein."

The case referred to in the artiele dates back to June 20 last, when County Judge Fitzgerald in the Kings County Court sentenced three high school youths to jail after they had pleaded guilty to third degree assult for attacking a seventeen-year-old girl who was a pupil in the same high school which they attended.

Charged Persecution

After sentence was passed, Goldstein moved to set it aside, declaring that District Attorney Geoghan and Assistant District Attorney John Kean, who prosecuted the case, had led him to believe the boys would not be sent to jail.

He charged, at the time, that there had been a deliberate perse-cution of the boys because they, as Jews, had attacked a girl who was not Jewish.

Conference of Parties Security of the Regime and Organizations Ends in Fiasco

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, July 11.—The con

ference of all Polish Jewish partles and organizations, which was held here today and which was called for the purpose of forming a united Polish Jewish front, ended in a figure

The failure to achieve unity ame despite the fact that every apeaker at the conference emphasized the dangerous situation in which Polish Jewry finds itself today. Speaker after speaker pointed out that not only is Polish Jewry threatened with economic ruin, but that even elemental rights enjoyed by citizens everywhere are being

The Agudath Israel, ultra-orthodox Jewish group; the People's Party, the Zionist Revisionists, Jewish economic organizations, and the Judenstaat Party, formerly the Grossmanite Revisionists, agreed to join an all-Jewish representa-tive body without laying down any conditions. However, the central committee of the Polish Zionists insisted that only politically inde-pendent organizations be allowed to join the new group, hinting that since the Agudath Israel is affili-ated with the Pilsudski government majority, it would be impossible for it wholeheartedly to de-fend Jewish interests if non-Jewish factors were involved.

Agudath Israel representatives contended that in internal Jewish affairs their organization is com-pletely independent, but refused to agree to the withdrawal of the uda deputies in the Sejm from the government club.

At the same time the Agudath group rejected a motion made by the Revisionists and the Juden staat party to form an all-Jewish group without the participation of the Polish Zionists. Speakers for the Aguda contended that the only value in an all-Jewish body would lie in the fact that all Jewish organizations would be repre-sented and that without the Zionists it would be of no use.

Tiberias Police Arrest 36 Jews on Illegal Entry

the charge that they entered Palestine illegally. Information leading to the arrests was furnished the police by an Arab chauffeur of Tiberias. The entire group was jailed pending deportation.

Jewish World Conference Postponed Until August 20

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) GENEVA, July 11.—The Jewish world conference scheduled to have been held here on August 6, has been postponed until August 20. The Committee of Jewish Delega-tions informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the postponement was due to the special de-mand of the American delegates that the conference be postponed to enable all Jewish groups to participate.

First U. S. Jewish Settler

Brings Order-New **Body Is Formed**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
MOSCOW, July 11.—The Soviet secret police, the dread GPU, were abolished today by order of the Tzik, the Central Executive Committee of the Soviet Republic, and all functions transferred to the newly-created People's Commissariat of Internal Affairs.

Henry G. Yagoda, head of the GPU, was appointed Commissar of Internal Affairs, and his assistant, Yakov Saulowich Agaranov, was named vice-commissar. Both are Jews. George Prokofiev was ap-pointed second vice-commissar.

The Tzik decree also ordered hat the judicial functions exercised by the GPU be turned over to the regular courts, which will be enlarged. The GPU had its own police force, courts and pris-ons and also had the power of senons and tase had the power of sen-tencing prisoners to death. Hated and feared by opponents of the Soviet regime, it was regarded by the Communists as one of the most important departments of government. important

However, the growing security of the Soviet regime has brought open demands for the abolition of open demands for the abolition of the GPU. Recently the Soviet Ab-torney General, in a speech at a Soviet congress, demanded the end of the secret police on the ground that its duty was only to punish and it was unable to edu-cate in the fashion that courts

The newly-established commis-sariat will have many of the investigating powers formerly vested in the GPU, but in all cases evidence will be turned over to the regular courts, where offenders will be tried by regular judges.

The GPU was in charge of combatting all counter-revolutionary activity in the Soviet Union. Aboli-tion at this time would indicate that the Soviet regime is no longer afraid of internal enemies

Yagoda, head of the GPU and now commissar of Internal Affairs. is regarded as one of the most efficient officials of the Soviet regime. He was in direct charge of digging the White Sea-Baltic Sea canal with workers, most of sea canal wint workers, most of them disaffected peasant prisoners of the GPU. Not only was the canal finished in less than the scheduled time, but the prisoners cheered their GPU chief and praised him highly. Thousands of the prisoners were freed and their citizenship rights restored as a result of their good work on the

Young Windsorite First Jew Ever Named to Crown Ministry

(Special to the J.D.B.) TORONTO, Ont., July 11.—For the first time in the history of Canada a Jew today held office as a Minister of the Crown.

He is David A. Croll, Windsor attorney in his early thirties, who was sworn in late last night as Minister of Municipalities and Wel-fare in the new Liberal govern-ment of the Province of Ontarlo.

The induction ceremonial took place at the Government House, where the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario administered the oath of office to the new Minister.

Croll, who also is mayor of Windsor in this province, was elected to the provincial legisla-ture in the recent elections, in which he defeated his conservative opponent.

Croll's career has run true to the Horatio Alger pattern. Brought to Windsor from Russia at the age of six by impecunious immigrant parents, he was selling newspapers on that city's streets before he had reached his teens.

With money he earned in this
and other work he paid his way
through school and studied law at
Osgoode Hall. Admitted to the
bar in 1925, he began practice with the firm of Sheppard and Shep-pard, later opening his own offices under the name of David A. Croll

and Co.

'His entrance into politics, as a member of the Liberal party, eventually led to his election to the mayoratly of Windsor his first public office—at the age of thirty. 'Start a Rebellion of Your Own,' Christians Advised 'Disciples'

Correspondence Files of U. S. Fascist Chief, Opened to McGrady, a Hodge-Podge of 'Banana Oil' - Iowan Salved Into Ranks of 'Economic Revolution'


The following is the fifth of a series of articles, "This Fascist Rachet," by Mr. McGrady, exposing, from the inside, the workings of a typical Fascist organization here, and revealing, through publication of the Fascist "chieftain's" correspondence, how and in what manner these racial rachets are operated. The series appears daily in the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

In the files of George W. Christians, commander-in-chief of the Crusader White Shirts, president of the Crusaders for Eco nomic Liberty, etc., are many interesting letters from cranks of all sorts, revolutionaries and congressmen, econ-

omists, and leaders of obscure political, religious and social movements. There are letters to and from (for the most part to) Presidents of the United States.

Christians habitually writes without compromise. He feels that he has been destined to order, and order he does. No doubt his language occasions shocked resentment among the more sensitive of his correspondents but, as he ex-plains it privately, he "burns 'em up" partly for the fun of it and partly to startle persons into agreement.



he thinks they will do the most good. Hence, he writes the following to Rabbi Abraham Feinstein in Chattanooga and sends copies of the same to Harold Loeb, of New York, The Jewish Daily Bulletin, the Jewish Advocate and the magazine Opinion: "Dear Rabbi Feinazine Opinion: "Dear Rabbi Fein-stein: You will see from the en-closed (copy of the Nazi paper, Weckruf) that the Nazis are Weckruf) that the Nazi breaking loose in Chicago.

"I believe we can handle this and keep it within reasonable limits, but we shall need some help from your side of the question to do it." All these letters he signs, "Yours in the Fellowship of Free-dom, George W. Christians, Com-mander-in-Chief, Crusader White Shirts."

Would Stampede Rabbi

The purpose of this letter ap parently is to stampede the good rabbi onto the side of Christians and to make him use his influence among the Jews for the promotion of the White Shirt movement. There were other letters of a similar nature to rabbis everywhere.

On the other side Christians has On the other sade Christians has catered to the Nazis, as will be evidenced in the following exchange of correspondence, taken from the Christians file (with his consent) between C. F. Fulliam, 200 East Ninth street, Muscatine, Town and the White Shitt Exchange. Iowa, and the White Shirt Fuehrer Fulliam it was who was accused of circulating anti-Semitic speeches of Representative Louis T. Mc-Fadden under the congressman's frank. Fulliam, regional leader of the Germanischer Bund, which is now cooperating with the Friends of New Germany, denied the of New Germany, denied the charges. But McFadden, with whom I talked at the time, ad-mitted that it was his custom to send out batches of his speeches send out patches of his specches under sealed envelopes bearing the congressman's frank. At public expense these attacks could be sent later through the mails from propaganda centers.

Fulliam's relationship with Chris-

appeared to afford Christians no end of amusement.

Correspondence began, when on March 2, 1933, Fulliam wrote briefly as follows to Christians: note in this week's issue of the Liberty magazine an article men-tioning your organ. Being in sympathy with such a movement I would appreciate very much hearing from you in regard to same with the purpose in view of such an organization in this city and state. Yours very truly, C. F. Ful-liam."

changes, in which Fulliam ex-plained the purpose of the Ger-manischer Bund, which holds Hitler's ideals as its prime policies. On March 10 Fulliam wrote in

"I am convinced of your sin-cerity in the great movement that you champion and God will bless you champion and God will bless you for your great fight to give the people economic liberty as well as political liberty. . . I myself am convinced that the time for am convinced that the time for ac-tialk is past and the time for ac-tion is here. You speak of what you did at Warm Springs, What was that? . . I have written my congressman for copies of HR-11898 (the Christians-McFadden bill for Economic Liberty) . . . It might interest you to know that I towa farmers are in onen revolt Iowa farmers are in open revolt right now and they are a lot more right how and they are a lot more aroused than the newspapers tell you. In Chicago, 200 miles from here, the people are rioting and running loose in the streets plundering food stores and fighting over garbage cans for tins of food but the papers tell you nothing of it. The population of this, my town—Muscatine—is a little over 16,000 and one-fourth or a little over 4,000 depends on the country for support. What's going to hap-pen. God knows."

A Sweet Reply On March 13, 1933, Christians wrote this sweet missive to Ful-liam: "Thanks very much for your 'A Malaprop Puppet

scarcely a score of members-Editor). . . . Roosevelt is moving just as fast as we can push him, no more. We made him listen to us for an hour at Warm Springs or face a demonstration of 6,000 of our crusaders from Columbus, Ga. We made him agree to our program, but he is in an impos-sible position. . . ."

There was enclosed a sheaf of "General Orders," the "Declaration of Economic Liberty" and other documents put out as propaganda by Christians.

Some time later Fulliam re-sponded with Nazi propaganda, including a volume of Hitler's Reichstag address of March 23, 1933, and outlines of the activities and purposes of the Germanischer Bund. On March 21 Fulliam wrote:

Enjoys His Literature

"Keep in touch with me and send me more of your literature. I read and enjoy it. Now I have a model 78 A. B. Dick Mimeograph and I sure know how to use it and if I can help out anyway with getting out literature let me know. Am going to run off a bunch of A. C. Hester's letter and nece A. C. Hester's letter and pass around. In your military organi-zation when the time is ripe here will get things started. I served in the National Guard, was in the artillery on the Mexican border in 1916 and served in the infantry during the World War. Would ap preciate a personal letter from you. Yours for economic liberty, Long live the Economic Revolu-tion! Down with financial tyranny.

On March 24 Christians gave his Nazi aide a little more salve, as follows: "Your letter of the 21st is very gratifying. It is rarely that we gain a recruit who has the in-telligence to comprehend our movement as you have, combined with the courage to fight, striking right and left with all the power I have for nearly two years, and if I have an active enemy anywhere I don't know it. Indifference and ignor-ance are our only obstacles. Cut loose on them. Start a rebellion of your own. Maybe it will be bigger and better than ours. Let's hope

so.' Fulliam, in a letter written March 29, surrendered body and soul to Christians' movement. He didn't want to work alone on his own movement as the White Shirt chief had so generously suggested. He wrote, "I would prefer to work under your guidance and instruction, because you have provided for everything and your organization is functioning. . . Today we are headed towards the Fascism of Italy and Germany because our financial kings will choose a Fas-cist regime because such a regime

But the trouble would be the financial end of it. . . . How are we to overcome the financial end of it?"

Enter, the Money Problem Ah ha, the touch. Christians is no one to spend much money in promoting his movement, and there is little evidence in his files of ling the hundreds of down-andouters that appeal to him for help. Unfortunately, the next few letters are missing from the file, but it is safe to assume that he urged Ful-liam to work the movement up to a paying basis and clip the cou-pons. On March 30, however, there is a note, Fulliam to Christians, asking how to extend the move-ment, and then, apparently following advice, Fulliam wrote a few days later to Edward Arps in Modesto, Cal., as follows:
"The Crusaders for Economic
Liberty, Mr. Christians, you and

I may be instruments in laying the foundations for an American Fascist movement — vastly different from that of Italy." There was a postscript, "I am very much in-terested in the book 'Hidden Hand' you mention in your letters. Would you care to send it to me to read. you care to send it to me to read.
Would return it after reading.
Would be glad to send you a book
I have on the same subject published by the Dearborn Publishing Company."

One may be privileged to pre-sume here that the latter book is that well known and now repu-diated compilation of anti-Jewish articles published some years ago by Henry Ford.

More "Banana Oil" On April 7 Christians applied a

little more banana oil to the Fulliam cog in his machine. It follows: "Yours of the 1st and 4th with enclosures received. I can't help patting myself on the back every time I think of you. Please send me copies of everything you get published. (Apparently Fulliam had announced his intention of going into big-time propaganda— Editor). I can use them on newspapers and in other places and on the politicians in Washington. I would suggest that you leave my name and the organization out of name and the organization out of these published articles for the present and build up McFadden and HRI1898, scientifically man-aged money and, most important, negative interest rates. McFadden is Okay. I wish you would write him. He has plenty of brains and courage but he realizes the political situation and knows that he must have some popular support before he can cut loose in Con-

Fulliam apparently differed with Christians on what makes good publicity, having hit on the per-sonality of the Fuehrer as surefire copy. He enclosed a copy of an article he had written for publication in the columns of the Chattanooga Times. (It did not Chattanooga Times. (It did not appear in print). Fulliam's article

egan in this manner:
"Permit me through the columns of your newspaper to pay tribute to a great southern gentleman living in Chattanooga. He is known, loved, and revered throughout America. I refer to the Hon. George W. Christians, founder and national president of the Crusaders for Economic Liberty. He is a great American, a great patriot, a great thinker. He will go down in the history of America as one of the Great Ones of the ages and" -etc., etc., for three or four type written pages.

On May 4 Christians wrote: Your letter of the Second enclosing your address received. It is fine. The papers describing your riot are good. I am sending them to Arps. Wish I had more. I wish you would try to contact with Mile. to Arps. Wish I had more. I wish you would try to contact with Milo Reno. He is a McFadden man, but I don't think he knows Econo-mic Liberty. I think you will find him plenty smart and easy to con-vert, especially if you tell him that McFadden is leading our fight in Congress.'

A number of letters from Fulliam to Christians of which I have heard much are missing from the Christians files. It is possible that, as is his custom, he has sent the letters along to be further circuletters along to be further circu-lated to enlighten and perhaps amuse interested parties. There was, for instance, the letter for-warded to Harold Loeb of the Technocracy group in New York, in which Fulliam described the international importance of the Ger-manischer Bund (said to have branches in all countries) and con cluded with: "Let me salute you as you will be saluted in days to come. Hail! Christians."

Christians was later given honorary membership in the Germanischer Bund by the national president, Oscar Pfaus of Chicago, whose enlightening correspondence will be revealed in later articles. It appears that the cooperation between the White Shirts and the Germanischer Bund is quite as strong as that between the latter and the Friends of New Germany.
About six weeks ago the Germanischer Bund and Friends of New Germany vowed eternal cooperation for the ideals of the latter, which are the ideals of the Hitler Government.

The Mass Trial at which the audience will give it: verdict on the Nazi regime take: verdict on the Nazi regime takes place on the day when Ernst Thael-mann is supposed to come to trial before the "People's Court," which has been condemned by the American Inquiry Commission as an instrument of legalized murder.

The witnesses at the trial will include Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, former Minister of Justice in the Prussian Cabinet, former member of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Reichstag; Aneurin Bevan member of the English Parliament for the Labor Party; Frank Hoellering, former German editor and Halberstadt, German high school teacher who was a witness at the American Inquiry Commission. Allan Taub, who partici-pated in the American Inquiry Commission will be the prosecutor.

When officials refused to intervene the populace was informed that the Turkish National Assembly at Angora had decided to rid the country of the Jews. The pogrom and evacuation then followed. nica. nica paper declared it was im-possible to suppose that the Turkpossible to suppose that the Turk-ish government was completely ig-norant of the bitter anti-Jewish agitation and the organized po-grom which followed.
