ics, Inc., and the Silver Shirt Legion of America, Inc.

The latter two organi-zations developed from this oc-cultism and were the militant organizations designed to bring the United States under Pelley's con-

Apologetic in Jabotinsky Hails Freeing of Revisionist

Justice, Leader States

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
LONDON, July 20.— Vladimir
Jabotinsky, president of the World Jabotinsky, president of the World Union of the Zionist Revisionists, today issued a statement hailing the acquittal of Abraham Stavsky in Jerusalem, thanking the court for its judgment and urging Pales-tinian authorities to continue their hunt for the real murderer of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff.

"The court may be sincerely congratulated for having acquitted an innocent man, thus vindicating the fair name of British justice," Mr. Jabotinsky said.

"We are glad to see in the ver dict of the court a promise that whatever controversy may be pending or will further arise between Zionists and the mandatory power will be confined to issues of purely political and administrative character and will not involve apprehension as to the basic character of the social order and impartial justice.

Sees Hope for Achimeier "We now confidently expect that the higher courts will take a further step in the same direction and revise the sentences imposed on Aba Achimeler and others accused in the Brith Habiryonim trial.

"We also hope that all efforts will be made to discover the mur-derer of Dr. Arlosoroff and no track which is now at the disposal of the authorities will be neglected.

"We trust that now the Pales-tine administration, guided by the advice of the imperial government, will be enabled to quietly readjust riminal investigation practices in Palestine in order to bring it up to

Local Zionists Laud Stavsky **Court Ruling**

Leaders Are Unanimous in Gratification at Verdict

Unanimous gratification at the setting aside Friday by the Pales-tine Court of Appeals of the con-viction of murder against Abra-ham Stavsky was expressed by Zionist and Jewish communal leaders of the metropolitan area when they were asked by the Jewish Daily Bulletin for their reaction to the news flashed from Jerusalem. Some representative opinions voiced by these personages are as follows:

MORRIS ROTHENBERG, President, the Zionist Organization of America: The news of Stavsky's acquittal is most gratifying. It ends the grave doubt which was left in the minds of many as to the correctness of the conclusion the correctness or the concussion of the trial court, and it removed the stain of guilt of the foul murder of Dr. Arlosoroff from the hands of a Jew. The decision of the Court of Appeals is another evidence of the fairness and highmindedness of British courts of justice.

ELIAS GINSBURG, Chairman of the Central Executive Committee of the Zionist-Revisionist Organization of America: We are of course, happy that an innocent man has been acquitted and that the sinister shadow of the gallows that loomed over him threatening Zionism and the future of the Jews in Palestine has been re-

Huge Throng Goes Wild With Joy at News

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, July 20.—
Abraham Stavsky, convicted of
the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff by the Criminal Court of Assizes, was acquitted today by the Palestine Court of Appeals, which set aside the verdict of the lower court and ordered the immediate discharge of Stavsky from custody. After more than a year of imprisonment Stavsky stepped out of the courtroom a free man

There was a hush in the courtroom as the red-robed, be wigged judges entered and sol-emnly took their place. Amids a strained, anxious silence Chief Justice Sir Michael Francis Jos seph McDonnell began to read the verdict which freed Stavsky of the onus of having killed Dr. Arlosoroff.

The Judgment

"I cannot agree that the failure of the lower court to set out detailed findings vitiated their judg-ment, although it is unfortunate that no details were given," the Chief Justice declared.

"I cannot agree that Mrs. Arlosoroff's identification of Stavsky was vitiated by Captain Stafford's support, though this was also un

fortunate. "With all respect to the diss ing judgment in the Assize Court (a reference to Judge Moshe Va-lero, who wanted to acquit Stay-sky) I take the view that a sexual motive for the crime is pure hypothesis.

"In England Mrs. Arlosoroff's evidence alone would have been sufficient, but here corroborative evidence is necessary, which was not forthcoming. The evidence given by the trackers was unsatisfactory, while the evidence of the scratch on Stavsky's hand falls with that of the trackers. The evidence given by Weiser is incon-sistent and unsatisfactory as corroboration

"I cannot agree that a fleeting glimpse of Stavsky after three weeks is enough to corroborate the testimony of Mrs. Arlosoroff. The restimony of Mrs. Ariosoroff.
Therefore as no corroborative evidence is available, the conviction
is capable of being set aside.
"The appeal is therefore allowed

and the accused is discharged."

Included among the appointments of former German Professors, awaiting ratification by the board is that of Professor Ludwig Halberstaedter, formerly in charge of the Department of Radiobiology of the Cancer Institute of Berlin, who has been nominated as the head of a similar department at the Hebrew University. Dr. Georg Goldhaber, who was Dr. Halber-staedter's assistant in Berlin, has already been appointed to the University's Einstein Institute of Physics, and will assist Dr. Halberstaedter in the new department, it was said. Dr. Halberstaedter introduced the first radium introduced the first radium brought into Palestine where he is at present connected with the Cancer Therapy Department of the Rothschild-Hadassah Hospital.

Other appointments to be brought before the board include that of Dr. H. A. Krebs, formerly of the Kaiser Wilhelm Physics stitute, who is now at the University at Cambridge, England. He will be proposed at the head He will be proposed at the head of the Department of Physiological Chemistry, in the new depart-ments of cancer research to be established at the Hebrew Uni-versity during the coming year, through an anonymous gift of over \$200,000. The appointment of Dr. Leonid Doljansky, formerly of the University Institute of of Pathology of Berlin and now at the University of Copenhagen, as head of a department to be devoted to tissue culture research and morbid anatomy, will also be acted upon by the board.

"When the board ratifies the appointments of these outstandappointments or these outstand-ing men as the heads of the three new laboratories in cancer re-search," Dr. Rosenbach said, "the Hebrew University will take its place as one of the outstanding institutions in this field."

I do it to keep up the contact with my native civilization, my own race. Were I not doing it I should lose something vital and important, something that would make me less acceptable to my European Te always have to keep in contact with the soil we sprung Firences, we always have to keep in contact want all soil we spring from. If that contact is entirely broken we perish, just as the giant Antaeus perished when he could no longer touch his Mother Earth from which he derived all his strength."

These words seemed to me so true and so significant that, as a constant reader of your column, I want to hand them on to you and your audience. For I do feel that the modern Jewess is too apt to forget in the acceptance of Western civilization the roots that bind her to her own people and its distinctive traditions. The modern Jewess becomes easily deracines and loses thus one vital power. Do not think for a moment that I advocate a return to the restricted formalism of orthodox life. By no means. But every Jewish woman should, I feel, do at least once a week some beautiful and definite thing that will remind her that she is the daughter of an ancient race with an age-old culture. The mere lighting of a candle on Sabbath eve, even without any prayer or formalism, or a similar gesture would be enough. But to ban everything that is typically Jewish from our life seems to me a grave mistake that tends to devitalize the race.

I should be glad to have your and your readers' reactions to this suggestion.

The great Belgian poet-philosopher, Maurice Materlinck, once wrote that every great sorrow brings us unexpected gifts to enrich our life. Only the majority of us are too weak and cowardly to receive these gifts, and our sorrows leave us bereft and impov-

It is, therefore, a special privil-ege to present today to our read-ers a woman who was suddenly thrust from the heights of wealth, position and world grandeur to the very depths of privation and poverty, and who yet refused to de-spair. She was one of the few among us ready to receive the un-expected gifts her sorrow brought her, and with the help of them she as built for herself a new life, a life of creative work, of rich hu-man contacts, of usefulness and happiness.

This woman is Princess Catherine Radziwill. Her moving and fascinating story can be read in her interesting book "It Really Happened," a human story full of power and sincerity. Knopf Will Gives Greek Jews Swindled Fund for Students Of Large Sums by Man Who Posed as 'Rabbi'

Provides Free Scholarships for Needy Jewish Collegians

(J.D.R. Special Correspondence (J.D.B. Special Correspondence)
PHILADELPHIA, July 19.—Isador Knopf, in a will filed for probate yesterday devoted a large portion of his estate to a fund for the benefit of Jewish students.

The fund, to be known as the Isador and Flora Memorial Schol-arship Fund, will provide "free scholarships to any college or university for deserving young men and young women of Jewish faith who shall find themselves financially unable to pay tuition for their education."

Several paragraphs of Knopf's will explain why he bequeathed nothing to various relatives whom he said he had already assisted.

He left \$300 to his attorney, A. Alfred Wasserman, who is to be one of the trustees of the scholarship fund, and \$500 each to a niece and nephew, Hattie Littlefield and Joseph Davidson.

Knopf also created a \$2,000 trust fund for the benefit of his daughfund for the beneat of his daugn-ter, Dr. Rita K. Braven, of Pitts-burgh, until she is 45. At that time she is to receive one-half of the principal outright and the other half is to revert to the residuary

All the rest of the estate is to be included in the scholarship fund, which is to be operated by Wasser man, Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of Dropsie College, and Judge Horace Stern, president judge of Common Pleas Court No. 2, of this city.

WASHINGTON.-Ballyhoo and | come sooner or later. excuses of governmental leaders are always poor substitutes with which hungry masses may fill their empty stomachs. Hungry people are a threat to the stability of any government. And when hunger is nation-wide, something is bound to happen.

On top of all of her current difficulties resulting mainly from the self-centered policies of the Nazi regime, a serious threat of a food shortage this winter is con-fronting Germany. New perils have fallen on the shoulders of the Hitler power.

Official reports received in Washington show that the situation in Germany is becoming more and more acute each day. For some time now, that country has been in the throes of financial, political and social difficulties. All of these are menacing Hitler's hold on the German government. But now comes the most serious menace of all—a scarcity of food. When people are hungry, they become restive. No appeal from officials in power can be made strong enough to appease a wrath which has been brewing up to not and which will find expression and which will find expression. sion under hunger pains.

What makes the situation more troublesome to the Hitler govern-ment is the fact that the threat of a food shortage is not confined to Germany alone. All of Central and Eastern Europe is suffering from a long and continuous drought which was broken at times only by a few scant rains. Reports received here from D.

F. Christy, assistant agricultural attache stationed at Berlin, indicate that crops of both bread-grains and feed-grains have been reduced in Germany, and unfavorable prospects, due to drought, are also reported in Poland, Austria, Czechoslovakia and Russia.

The United States Department of Agriculture, in reporting the European food situation, says, "The continued drought in these areas now threatens a bread and potato shortage in addition to the shortage of feed-grains." Crops in Germany have been reduced by the drought from one-third to a half of last year's production.

To a country that normally is To a country that normally is on a food import basis and now operating on a highly self-cen-tered nationalistic basis, the severe cut in agricultural produc-tion resulting from the drought is alarming. This becomes more striking when in the midst of such an unavoidable situation the country is in the center of a political and economic crisis.

Observers in Washington are of the opinion that the delirious enthusiasm which marked the first Nazi year is fast disappearing. Student revolts are indicative of rising discontent and disillusion-ment. The Hitler regime has been banking on support from German youth. Dislocated domestic and foreign trade, political troubles and vanishing food supplies are beginning to place the German masses in a questioning state of

In the meantime, Nazi policies as they have reacted on the world as they have reacted on the world at large are resulting in further distress to Germany. Her credit-ors, including the United States, are defining immediate steps toward fulfillment of international toward fulliment of international obligations. Germany's credit is extremely weak. Nazi policies have wrecked her export trade and brought on boycotts against German goods.

Thyssen, Real Power Behind Hitler

TITLER Over Europe" would be an astonishing piece of work if it were pure fiction. Coming to us as the statement of a situation, it has the characteristic of nightmare; it is, in effect, a fantasia of fact. Whoever the author, Ernst Henri, may be, his painfully annotated statement reduces all the novels that have been written around Hitlerism to so many mounds of cold beans. This

is the truth that out-fictions fiction.

The publisher of the Americane edition, Simon & Schuster, had planned to bring out "Hitler Over Europe" some time in August. Hitlers block-navers of the left sleet. blood-purge of the left elements among the Brown Shirts put forward the publication date. The world believes, and even Germany believes, that the Hitler revolution is the upsurge of the lower middle classes. Ernst Henri tells us that the power behind the throne of Hitler is none other than Fritz Thyssen, the coal master and iron-monger of the Ruhr, the heir of Stinnes. He is the man who furnished Hitler with his sinews of power, with his election funds— earned by a rise in the price of coal throughout Germany—and with such intermediaries of in-trigue as Hugenberg and von Papen. It is Fritz Thyssen, more than any other individual, or group, who is getting his in return for favors granted, getting his against rival groups of bankers and industrialists, Jews and Catholics mainly; getting his against the lower middle class which now must pay vastly more for its subsistence requirements:

Politicians in Row Over Race Tolerance as Party Plank

The July 20 issue of the Kings County News appeared Friday with a leading article in which it reported candidates for Democratic leadership for the Second Assembly District have begun set-ting forth their records of tolertoward Jews as campaign

According to the article: "At a meeting of the Brighton Beach Democratic Captains Organization on Wednesday night, Assembly-man Albert D. Schanzer, Harry L. Raffel, Clerk of the Supreme Court, and Ben Freedman, Deputy Internal. Revenue Collector, three of Thomas G. Ryan's principals, publicly assailed the 'snipers' in the opposition and declared that any attempt on the part of the Marcus group to characterize their leader as intolerant was 'an out-rageous lie.'"

The article says this of Ryan: "Ryan asserted that his associates did not inform him of their intention to address the Brighton meettion to address the Brighton meet-ing, and added that he personally wished to keep the racial issue out of the fight and never started it. He challegned any one to compare his record of tolerance with theirs, and pointed as evidence of an unprejudiced mind to his charitable activities and the fact that his last two appointments went to Jews."

Of Marcus, the article says: "Bernard Marcus, the chief opponent of the present leader, laid the responsibility for bringing the racial issue into the contest at the door of the Ryan elements and heatedly asserted that at no time had he or his associates ever made capital of race and never would.

"'Many of my confederates are not of my faith,' Marcus said, 'My attitude and associations are definitely liberal and non-religious. The conduct of my opponents is a despicable attempt to ward off the powerful opposition they see impending against their incompetent leadership. It is deplorable that members of my own race should stoop to such tactics."

Find 4.500 Germans Ready to Emigrate

League of Nations Committee Discusses Reich Situation at London

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, July 20.—The committee of experts attached to the League of Nations German refugee body, met in London yester-day for a full survey of the situation, High Commissioner James G. McDonald informed the press

The experts found, the High Commissioner said, that 4,500 of the refugees are fitted for immediate emigration. Their transfer overseas with maintenance until they are absorbed in the economic life of the countries to which they are going will come to fifty pounds per individual or a total of £22,500. This sum would enable f22,500. This sum would enable the refugee commission to liqui-date the bulk of the present refu-gee problem, High Commissioner McDonald declared.

The committee urged the organ ization of banks of commerce and industry in the countries to which the refugees are going in order to further the work of refugee rehabilitation.

The High Commissioner was instructed to obtain the large capi-tal funds needed, for which public contributions are necessary, be-side the main burden, which will fall on private organizations.

result of an investigation by Der Angriff's star reporter, the infor-Angrin's star reporter, the infor-mation is revealed that Jews are contributing between ten and fif-teen times more than "Aryans" towards the unemployment welfare funds organized by the Nazi regime. The investigation was conducted in Berlin's highly fashionable West Side

Non-Jews Refuse

Fourteen homes of wealthy
commercial leaders were visited by the reporter to establish their

contributions to the above funds. Of these fourteen, the reporter discovered to his surprise, a large majority not only refused to conmajority not only rerused to con-tribute to the Nazi relief funds, but even went so far as to refuse to permit the Nazi collectors to enter their homes.

He found that a few of them contribute only a monthly average of one or two marks. The only one contributing as much as fif-teen marks monthly is a Jew.

"This Jew," Der Angriff's re-porter adds, "is not only paying

an average of fifteen marks a month towards the Nazi unemployment fund, but is easily approach-able by Nazi collectors for other contributions as well.

Hundreds With Marital Woes Find New Way to Cure Them

with marital problems are receiving a new deal at the Court of Domestic Relations in Brooklyn through an experiment which may shortly be extended to similar courts throughout the city, it was announced by the Welfare Council of New York. The experiment was started by the Welfare Council committee headed by Dr. Charles Zunser, of the National Desertion Bureau, and Dr. John Slawson, of the Jewish Board of

It is an experiment in settling acute family troubles out of court—on a social work rather than on a legal basis. Since it was initiated last December by the Weifare Council's Domestic Relations Court Committee, this unofficial arm of the Family Court has di-rected more than 100 families to privately financed welfare agen-cies for solution of their probcies for solution or their problems instead of involving them in court action. Four hundred other families already involved in various stages of court procedure have been referred to private family agencies for auxiliary aid, ranging from relief to adjustment the marital situation. The sultation with Judge Edward F. Boyle, presiding justice of the Domestic Relations Court and has had his hearty cooperation.

Come in Despair

"People come to the Domestic
Relations Court in moments of "People count in moments or anger, jealousy or despair to seek legal redress," said Miss Grace A. Reeder, Secretary of the Domestic Relations Court Committee of the Traifers Council Friday. "We be-Welfare Council Friday. "We be-lieve many of them could be better served by case work treatment of the situation, and by the alleviathe situation, and by the allevia-tion of acute problems, such as unemployment, destitution and physical and mental ills, and con-flicts in the family group, rather than by redress through legal ac-In many cases action of the court may be permanently harmful to the marital situation rather than helpful to it."

On the basis of this belief, held by many legal authorities as well as by social workers, a trained case worker, Miss Helen Thoma, was loaned by the Brooklyn Bureau of Charities last December to reau of Charities last December to work in cooperation with the Brooklyn Family Court in behalf of the private family agendes of the United Jewish Aid. Society and the Brooklyn Bureau of Charities and with the hearty approval of the borough division of the Emergency Home Relief Bureau. A similar plan is also being tried though an arrangement, agent. out in the Borough or Queens through an arrangement spon-sored by the Catholic Charities and Big Sisters of that borough. Families whose marital tangles

could not very well be aired in open court were interviewed, often every member of the family meeting Miss Thoma privately to pour out his troubles to her. Cases have been referred to her by the probation officers and by the judges of the court.

Demonstrates Methods Before Minneapolis Medical Parley

heart movements of several of his patients, Dr. M. H. Nathanson of this city presented one of the most widely discussed demonstrations before physicians attending the Minnesota State Medical associ-ation's annual meeting in Duluth

ation's annual meeting in Duluth which ended yesterday.
Using an amplifying device to carry the sound of the heartbeat to his patients, stopping their heartbeats for several seconds. After applying several drugs, including adrenalin, he caused the resumption of the heart move-

In outlining his demonstration Dr. Nathanson pointed out that work on this particular experiment had been prompted by an analysis of 142 autopsies on coronary disease terminating in sudden death. In only seven per cent of these cases, he said, was a heart con-dition found incompatible with life. This being true, he set about to determine if certain drugs might not be used at least to postpone angina pectoris. His experiments he said, proved this possible.

At the same gathering another Minneapolis physician, Dr. M. J. Shapiro, gave an address on ju-venile rheumatism. Youngsters between six and seven years old are most often the victims, he said, usually in the fall or spring, in usually in the fall or spring, in cases studied here. He drew a sharp distinction between so-called "growing pains" and rheumatic fever. No effective specific treat-ment has been discovered, Dr. Shapiro added.

A crowd gathered immediately outside the home of Dr. Avnieli and demanded that Stavsky speak. The young Revisionist came out on the balcony of the house and addressed the crowd briefly.

Thanks J.T.A. for Reports

Stavsky greeted the Jewish Tele-graphic Agency correspondents warmly and issued the following exclusive statement through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency:

"Just as I was released today so will the Jewish people ultimately be emancipated. I thank the Jews of the world for their sympathy and support during my ordeal. I am too overcome to speak, but I thank the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for its excellent reports on the trial."

Horace Samuel, who defended Stavsky and who was standing near, smiled his assent to Stavsky's statement.

A continual procession of callers streamed into Dr. Avnieli's house to congratulate Stavsky on his acquittal. The city of Jerusalem was excited by the verdict. Hebrew newspapers were on the streets with extras soon after the verdict. with extras soon after the verdict. The news vendors were almost mobbed by the crowds, who literally tore the papers from their hands.

Reversal of Stavsky Conviction **Ends Stirring Cause Celebre**

Jerusalem at Time of Crime

The acquittal by the Palestine appeals court of Abraham Stavsky on the charge of having murdered Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, head of the political department of the Jewish political department of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and outstand-ing Laborite leader in Palestine, brings to a close a cause celebre which has stirred the Jewish world to its very foundations and caused great bitterness between various Zionist factions all over the world.

One June 16, 1933, late in the evening as Dr. and Mrs. Sima Arlosoroff were walking along the seashore near Tel Aviv, the thirtyfive year old labor leader was shot and fatally wounded by two men who had been following the couple. One of the killers asked for the time in Hebrew and when Dr. Arlosoroff answered a light was flashed in his face and the second of the two shot twice at the Zion-ist leader. Several hours later Dr. Arlosoroff died in a Tel Aviv hos-

A round-up of suspects followed by Palestine police. Several days after the murder Mrs. Arlosoroff selected the picture of Abraham Stavsky from a group of photo-graphs shown her by the police declaring that he resembled the taller of the two men who took part in the murder of her husband.

A sensational turn in the case came when the defense learned that an Arab convict Abdul Mejid, held for another murder, had confessed to the murder of Dr. Ar-losoroff, implicating his crony Issa Darwish. Placed on the stand, Abdul Mejid utterly denied his confession, stating that he confessed at the behest of Stavsky and Ros-

enblatt, who had urged him to do so and promised him £1,000 and assistance if he would shoulder the blame for the killing. Stavsky and Rosenblatt indignantly repudiated the confession and denied having anything to do with the convict save an exchange of greetings in the fail courtvard.

Hit Identifications

During the entire trial the defense hammered at the identifica-tion of Stavsky and Rosenblatt pointing to the faultiness of the identifications. Attorney Samuel insisted that his clients were innocent declaring that he would prove that Abdul Mejid and Issa Darwish killed Dr. Arlosoroff. He made a passionate summation de-claring that the murder was nonpolitical and demanding full exoneration for his clients.

On June 8, 1934, the court hand-ed down its verdict. Stavsky was found guilty of the murder of Dr. Arlosoroff and sentenced to hang Zvi Rosenblatt was acquitted.

As soon as the verdict was read Stavsky sprang to his feet with a shout: "I am not guilty."

Stavsky's mother who had come
from Poland to be near her son
during his trial burst into tears,
sheuting: "He is innocent! He is
innocent!"

Given an opportunity to make a final statement to the court Stav-sky declared: "I know nothing of the murder. I was sleeping during the murder at the Turgeman Hotel in Jerusalem.

"This is a provocation by the Jewish Labor party and the Pal-estine government against me. I am totally innocent.

am totally innocent.

"You judges will be responsible for my life and for the lives of my parents. Those who have sworn falsely here will have to bear a guitty conscience. I believe British justice in England will not teach how to sentence innocents.

"You have convicted here the honor of an entire nation—not mine—because I am innocent."

Stavsky concluded his statement stavsky concluded his statement amidst a deep silence broken only by the sobbing of his mother. As police guards moved forward to remove him, his mother rushed and clung to him, sobbing hysterically. Police were able to separate her from her son only with the great-est of difficulty.

The verdict created a deep im-pression in Palestine and all over the Jewish world. The verdict was greeted with indignation everywhere.

A movement was set on foot immediately to secure a review of the case by the Palestine Appeals

Brazilian Nazis Worsted in Tiff On Flag Display

Banners Are Torn Down in Sao Paulo and Santos

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) SAO PAULO, Brazil, July 20.— Brushes between Brazilian Nazis and the Brazilian Liberal Youth organization resulted in the pro-Hitterites coming off second best both here and in Santos.

The skirmishes developed over The skirmishes developed over display by German business and banking firms of Nazi flags along-side of Brazilian flags on the oc-casion of proclamation of the new constitution. Led by the Liberal Youth factions, crowds rushed by police guarding the banks and com-mercial houses and tore the Nazi banners down.

Another vigorous anti-Nazi dem-onstration was staged before the Cinema Odeon here where the Nazi propaganda film "Heroic Youth" being shown.
