The Flood Disaster in Poland

The flood disaster in Pol-and has reached huge propor-tions. Hundreds of people have lost their lives and thousands are shelterless and without food. Many of the vic-tims are Jews. The Jews of Poland, in dire economic distress, are mobilizing their various charitable organizations to give immediate relief to the stricken population in the flood area. The Polish government and the Red Cross are doing their utmost to meet the emergency. But the magnitude of the calamity makes it impera-tive that the Jews of America, through the organized relief agencies, shall dispatch additional relief without delay.

Dollfuss Took Post Shunned By All Others

Tiny Chancellor Sought to Be 'Big' Man but Failed

Dr. Engelbert Dollfuss, tiny Austrian Chancellor slain by Nazis yesterday, had on several previous occasions escaped death at the hands of assassins by the narrowest of margins.

The would-be iron man, who tried to make up in importance what he lacked in physical stature, was born in 1892 and studied at Berlin and Vienna Universities.

VIENNA, July 25.—Chancellor Engelhert Dollfuss was assassinated in the Chancellery here today by a band of Nazi putschists, whose unrelenting foe he was, and potentially one of the most explosive situations since the end of World War was

of the most explosive situations since the end of World War was thereby precipitated. The killers, who gained entry wearing the uniforms of a Vienna regiment, took possession of the Chancellory and made prisoners of members of the Cabinet, including Emil Fey, for-mer Vice Chancellor.

36 Jailed: Entered Palestine Illegally

Pathetic Scenes Enacted as Sentence Is Passed; 32 Are Girls

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, July 25.—Pathe-tic scenes were enacted in a Haifa court room today when Magistrate Curry sentenced thirty-two Polish Curry sentenced thirty-two Poiss Jewish girls and four men to serve three-month sentences in jail and recommended deportation for the entire group at the end of their sentences for having entered Palestine and settled there illegally.

The girls created a commotion in the court. Several fainted, while the others wept bitterly. The group were removed in prison vans to the jail at Bethlehem, where they are to serve their sentences. No one was allowed to approach or talk with the prisoners. The prisoners were arrested near Tiberias on July 7 and have been detained.

Late tonight, by agreement, the ministers were released and the Nazis departed for Passau, just across the Austro-German Dorder. Martial law was proclaimed

(Premier Mussolini was reported in dispatches from Rome to have AustrianRevolt in dispatches from Rome to have ordered all Italian military forces to hold themselves in readiness for any eventuality. Troops were said to be massed at the border, pre-pared to cross.

(It was reported also that Great Britain has decided upon diplo-matic intervention under a recent declaration, guaranteeing the inde-pendence of Austria, entered into by France, Italy, Germany and Britain. The London government will demand of the Reich what it

proposes to do, it was asserted.)

A haggard woman, back from Palestine in a search for her only son, missing for five years, had almost given up hope yesterday. "God must know here he is. God must know," she sobbed.

The woman is Mrs. Dora Meyers who sailed for Palestine in 1926 who sailed for Palestine in 1926 with her daughter. Her son, Her-man J. Meyers, a young play-wright, promised to follow if she decided to live in Palestine.

A Jewish Daily Bulletin reporter met her yesterday in the office of Harry Zellman, a lawyer and lifelong friend of the family, who is supervising the search from his office at 45 John street.

Sent Mother Money

"He was such a good boy, my Herman," she said. "Every week he sent me a letter with a check for three dollars. He was living in the Bronx on Fox street, near my daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ray Rich-

"In the last letter that I got from him he told me he was writ-ing day and night only for me and his sister. He wanted nothing for

himself.

"Suddenly, in 1929, I stopped getting letters from him. I waited. I worried. My daughter, Mrs. Schlome Pollack, told me maybe he was busy. Finally I couldn't wait any more, so I sent a night cablegram. I got an answer from him by wire. He said he was very busy. He would write soon.

"I waited one month, two months, three months. He didn't write. So I sent another cable-gram. This time Mrs. Richman answered. She said she had written the other message and I shouldn't worry. She said Herman had walked out of the house and hadn't come back.

Came to America

"I begged my daughter to let me go to New York. She said it was better for me to stay. Maybe Herman had gone to Hollywood to write for the movies, as he had said he would. Finally I told her, Why do you keep me here to die rom worry? Better I should go to America to look for my son.'
"I came here and I cannot find

Golden-son, rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, 1 East Sixty-fifth street, will officiate at both the funeral services and the interment today. The funeral services will be held in the Beth-El Chapel in the Temple, and the burial will be at Beth-El Cemetery, Cypress Hills, Brook-lyn. Dr. Goldenson will begin the services at 11 a. m.

Body Brought Here

The body of Dr. Kohler was brought from Long Lake, N. Y., a summer resort in the Adiron-dacks, Tuesday by his sister, Miss Lili Kohler, and his brother, Ed-gar, to the Universal Chapel, 597 gar, to the Univer-Lexington avenue.

The family announced that no the family announced that ho honorary pall bearers will be named, and that leading represen-tatives of American Jewry and communal life expected to attend the services and the funeral.

Dr. Kohler, who had been on a vacation at Long Lake since July 8, became ill on Monday, but his physicians believed he was on the road to recovery. On Tuesday he succumbed suddenly to an attack of angina pectoris

To the struggle against the threat to civilization offered by the Nazis, he made many valucontributions."

His intensive interest in his work, no doubt, brought about his illness and death."

Jewish Agency **Cuts Grant for** Zion Education

Will Give Vaad Leumi £10,000 Next Year for Schools

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
JERUSALEM, July 9.—The decision of the Jewish Agency Executive to halve its present grant of £20,000 for Hebrew education in Palestine, and to give the Vaad Leumi only £10,000 next year for the public school system, formed the main subject of discussion at the first meeting of the Vaad the first meeting of the Vaad Leumi held at Tel Aviv yesterday since the meeting of the Assephath Haniycharim.

E. Berligne, of the Vaad Leumi pointed out that when Palestine Jewry took over control of the Jewry took over control of the Hebrew public school system from the Agency, the latter undertook to furnish £40,000 annually to-wards the budget; the next year this grant was halved, and now it is to be cut down still more drastically.

The Vaad Leumi resolved to sup port the attitude of its Executive in the question of decentralization, which it opposes. The meeting de-cided that if the Agency could not continue its grant at the present figure, as a cut would necessitate a chaotic condition of finance, ther it would have to withdraw its re sponsibility for the school system

The existing Executive was re-elected to hold office until the next elections to the Assephath Han-ivcharim. Rabbi Ostrowsky offered himself for re-election as an individual, and not as representative of the Mizrachi Organiza-tion, which has informed the Vaad Leumi that it will no longer be represented on that body.

'Epic of a Nation' Stage, World's Largest in Area, Is Under Construction

Charges 'Politician' Is Behind Unlicensed Coney Peddlers

Blanshard May Investigate Evidence; Magistrates Face Problem

The question of peddling on the beaches of Coney Island, long a problem to the resort's business men, graduated |today from its limited circle, of merchant-peddler-policeman to include the Mayor of the City of New York, the Police Commissioner and the Commis-sioner of Accounts.

This became evident yesterday when Acting Borough President Charles H. Ward of Brooklyn, charged that a "prominent Demo-cratic politician" was behind the operations of unlicensed Coney Isoperations of unicensed Coney is-land peddlers. Preparations, he said, were being made to forward evidence of the man's operations to Commissioner of Accounts Paul Blanshard.

In addition to Ward's complaint nadation to warts companie, parents of the youths of sixteen and seventeen, who make up a large portion of the small army of peddlers, and several magis-trates, have been finding fault with the manner in which the police enforce the law against peddling at public beaches.

Arrests have been made this summer at the rate of 200 a week. The campaign was launched after business men complained that ped-dlers, with the advantage of no overhead such as rent, taxes or overhead such as rent, taxes or license fees, were cutting into their profits. As the result of the com-plaint, arrests of peddlers have be-come one of the chief occupations of Coney Island police.

Malbin Takes a Hand

The problem has become more complex since last Saturday when complex since has fasturally wise Magistrate David L. Malbin, who presides from time to time in Coney Island Court, was walking on the boardwalk with a friend. Near West Twelfth street he observed the common practice of a policeman arresting a peddler.

The magistrate followed as he saw the patrolman and his prisoner disappear beneath the boardwalk distance underneath in a small room which he described as "damp, dark coop," he found urteen other boys under police

Questioning the boys, the mag-istrate learned that some had been there as long as three hours. The patrolman on duty, however, said Questioning the boys, the magpatrolman on duty, however, said none had been there more than forty-five minutes, and explained that the delay was caused by the difficulty in getting a patrol wagon.

"Don't you know that all prisoners must be taken to the station house at once?" he asked. He then ordered the policeman to see that this was done.

Patrol Wagons Too Busy Arriving at the Coney Island po

lice station the magistrate found thirteen other peddlers waiting. He inquired of Police Captain Bauer why the boys had been held beneath the boardwalk. Captain Bauer said that more than 100 peddlers had been arrested at the resort during the day, and patrol wagons had been busy taking them to cells in four neighboring station houses after the local one had been filled.

The captain said he thought it was cooler beneath the hoardwalk than in the sun.

The following day Magistrate Malbin announced from the bench of the Concy Island Court that he would tell Mayor LaGuardia of the 'un-American, barbaric spectacle' he witnessed Saturday. He then suspended sentence on 103 peddlers, most of them boys.

Magistrate Jeanette G. who on Monday followed Magis-trate Malbin as presiding magistrate in Coney Island Court, joined him in denouncing police treat ment of peddlers.

Selecting fifteen of the eightysix peddlers who appeared before her, she had them dictate to a court stenographer their stories of ill treatment by the police. She said these statements would be forwarded to Police Commissioner O'Ryan. All the men said they were not fed and several complained they had not been per-mitted to telephone their relatives. "Why did you arrest these boys?" Magistrate Brill asked the arresting officers. "Why don't you

serve them with summonses? She was informed that none of the men could identify themselves but when some showed her chauffeur's licenses and Health Department food handler's licenses.

patrolmen admitted he had been ordered by his superiors to make arreste Arrests "Ilu-American"

"This seems so un-American," the magistrate remarked. "You boys are locked up with hardened criminals when all you have been doing is trying to make a liveli-hood. The law prohibits peddling but it should be noticed in a manner which does not injure or abuse those arrested.

"It is all right for the Coney Island Chamber of Commerce and Borough President Ingersoll to fight peddling at Coney Island. They have three meals a day; most of the peddlers don't.'

Chief Inspector Edward A. Bracken, in charge of Brooklyn police, was the official to whom parents and Mrs. Rae Josephs. president of the Ocean Front D. ocratic Club of Brighton Beach, directed their ire. Accompanied by a large delegation, Mrs. Josephs visited the inspector and charged that those responsible for beach peddling were the jobbers who pro-vide the merchandise which the boys offer for sale.

The Coney Island Chamber of Commerce plans to support "to the limit" the drive against unlicensed peddlers, George F. Kister, as president of the organization, said. said:

Death of German **Editor Reported**

Communist Writer Believed to Have Died in Concentration Camp

Word has reached the Friends of the Soviet Union here of the death of Erich Baron, former editor of the German magazine, Sow-jet Russland Heute, the official organ of the German section of Friends of the Soviet Union. Baron had been incarcerated in a Nazi prison camp since the begin-ning of the Hitler regime.

At the advent of the Third Reich the magazine was suppressed and the whole organization was declared illegal. Leading members of the organization were herded into concentration camps, where they languished many months.

Dr. Ernest Stocker, international secretary of the Friends of the Soviet Union, was among those im-prisoned. Because of the recent disprisoned. Because of the recent dis-turbances, his life is despaired of by the American section of the F. S. U.

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Ohio Doctors Invent Better Blood Device

Jewish Hospital Installs Apparatus Which Prevents Fluid Obstruction

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CINCINNATI, July 25.—Experiments conducted at the Jewish and General Hospitals in Cincinnati have resulted in the creation of a new machine for improving circulation in the arms and legs where thickening of the blood and obstruction of the blood vessels has set in, it was announced here today. The machine is now in active operation in the Jewish Hospital, Dr. Walter E. List, superintendent declared

The machine eliminates in many instances the necessity for ampu-tation of limbs, being especially tation of limbs, being especially valuable in cases in which diabetic patients develop gangrene. The major feature, Dr. List says, is a transparent glass boot, encasing the limb to be treated, and sealed the limb to be treated, and sealed at the top by a rubber cuff. Alter-nate positive and negative pres-sures are produced rhythmically to stimulate and restore circulation of the blood.

Dr. List stated that the machine has proved "dramatically helpful" in restoring frozen legs and arms, and has been used successfully in cases of arteriosclerosis and acute obstruction of blood vessels caused



Asylum Inmate Seems Saner to begins: Writer Than Fascist Leader

Correspondence Between Occupant of Navy Psychopathic Ward and Christians Shows Latter in Less Favorable Light

So without further comment since comment on a Chesterton foreword would be like so much gilt on the lily, the column is turned over completely to the stout journalist from across the pond And may he never fall into Hitler's hands! Forewords G. K.:

"Anyone old enough to remem ber, even faintly, the last days of Queen Victoria, and the gradual change in international informachange in international informa-tion which had appeared even be-fore the Great War, will be as-tounded at two things about the tribal triumph now parading among the Germans. The first staggering fact is that a fresh generation can boil up again, in so frothy a fuss, over anything so utterly stale. The second staggering fact is that a whole huge peoshould base its whole historical tradition on something that is not so much a legend as a lie. A legend is something that grows slowly and naturally and generally symbolizes some sort of relative truth about history. The legend of Arthur is legendary in this sense; but it does symbolize the enormous and once neglected truth; that if Britain had not once had a Roman basis it would never have had any basis at all. But the myth of the modern Germans, es-pecially in its relation to the ancient Germans, was made quite recently and quite artificially; it was invented by professors and imposed by schoolmasters, and it has not even the remotest connecwith any historical truth whatever.

"The first fact, the strange stale ness which makes the racial relireins which in our nostrils with the odors of decay and as of some-thing dug up when it was dead and buried, need not principally concern us. A man who has revelled in Carlyle as a boy, reacted against him as a man, re-reacted. with samer appreciation, as an old-er man, and ended, he will hope, by seeing Carlyle more or less where he really stands, can only be amazed at this sudden reappearance of all that is bad and arbarous and stupid and ignorant in Carlyle, without a touch of what really quaint and humorous aim. The historical theory in him. which Froude and Freeman and others shared with Carlyle, the theory of a Teutonic root of all the real greatness of Europe, has been criticized by saner historians, with a broader outlook which the Victorians never imagined, and often with a number of new facts which the Victorians could not be expect-ed to know. Today no well in-formed person has any right to be ignorant of the part really played, not by the Germanic chaos by the Roman order and the Catholic faith, in the making of everything civilized or half-civil-ized, including Germany.

"In the light of this elementary degree of education, examine some of the statements . . from two function the most popular and enthusiastic Nazi writers. Passing over, science, was formed in Paris.

contradiction where the Nordic notion contradicts not only every Christian virtue, but every common human generosity, as in saying that "the conception of Chr tian charity causes national degeneration inasmuch as it involves caring for the physically weak and infirm," let us take first the virtues on which the Christian the Nordic man may agree; though the Nordic man has the cheek to claim them as his alone. Take the ridiculous statement. repeated again and again in the passages quoted from both books: the notion that there is something specially German about the "idea of honor." There is not the faintest historical truth, or even historical meaning in this claim. Imagine the Prussian professor slowly and carefully reading Horace's version of the story of Regulus and duly noting down the fact that no noting down the fact that no Latins or men of the Mediterranean have had any idea of honor. One would suppose that anybody could see the absurdity of that; that everybody can, in a general way, trace the conception of keeping faith, refusing cowardly comfort or safety, feeling surrender as a stain, through all the great story of antiquity, through the Pagan philosophers defying tyrants, philosophers defying tyrants, through the Christian martyrs accepting torments, through the Christian knights and paladins careful to keep the vow, or fulfill the conditions of the quest. To call it a German idea is about as sensible as to call it a Finnish idea or an Icelandic idea. Since all men, even the rudest, have some rude form of conscience, it did doubtless exist more or less in various Teutons, as in various Celts and Slavs and Semitic Arabs. But the most powerful examples of it, the clearest traces of it, the longest tradition of it, descend to us all down that long Roman road which connects ancient with modern civilization.

"In these few lines, by way of introduction, I have confined myself to the preliminary point that the Nazi literature, with which this pamphlet deals, is on the face of it opposed to common sense and common historical information. will leave to the pamphlet itself the special task of explaining where it has of late conflicted with the Catholic conscience and the principal religious authority of Europe. It is worth while to note how much the two elements of normal instincts and of supernatural doctrine are at this moment in agreement. Rome stands just now not only for reason, but rather especially for common sense, and, as in this case, for common justice to the common people. It is this influence which the Nazi writers describe as so subtle a social poison; the southern influence which, creeping north into the virgin forests, corrupted the simple Germans with the habit of building houses, of making roads, of riding horses, of talking in an intelligible, or more or less intelligent, manner. For those great gods, the early Germans of the forests, to whom all "creative" energy is due did ergy is due, did not, of themselves, set up one building that has re-mained, or carve one statue of even prehistoric value, or express in any shrine or symbol the confused mythology which some would substitute for the radiant lucidity of the Faith. The great German civilization was created by the great Christian civilization; and its heathen forerunners left it nothing whatever, except an intermittent weakness for boasting."

coming a reality."

Bevan declared that "it is difficult to over-estimate the value to the human race of the defeat of Hitler." He defined Fascism as "the last trump up the sleeve of the capitalist class" and warned that "the working classes must unite" to fight the menace in this country.

The rallies were held under the auspices of the Milwaukee unit of the International Committee to Aid Victims of German Fascism.

Klansmen Will Fight 'Alien Radicalism,' Communism in U. S.

The long-awaited Nazi putsch
against the Dollfuss regime began early this morning with the cap-ture of the government broadcasting station outside Vienna and the announcement by Nazi revolution-ists that the Austrian government

had resigned. nad resigned.

Other government officials who
were not captured by the Nazis
and who are headed by Prince
Ernst Rudiger von Starhemberg, Vice Chancellor under Dollfuss, constituted themselves a government. They immediately served no-tice on the Nazis holding the Chancellory that the Heimwehr would attack unless the prisoners would be released. The action of the rump government is understood to have the endorsement of President Wilhelm Miklas.

Nazis Rule Capital

For hours Vienna was isolated from the rest of the world. While the entire situation is complicated and news is uncertain, it seems definite that the Nazi revolt has been suppressed. Austrian army troops aided by the Fascist Heimwehr engaged in a battle with the Nazis, it is understood.

Vienna Jewish residents are alarmed and frightened by the Nazi revolt, but so far no clashes Nazi revolt, but so far no classes have been reported in the Jewish districts. A Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent has been dispatched to the suburbs around Vienna, where most of the Jews live, to ascertain their fate.

Troops Claim Victory

According to reports the Chan-cellory was stormed late today by loyal troops who arrested the Nazi terrorists who had been holding the building. At the same time it was also announced that troops and police have succeeded in storming the government radio station in which the Nazis had entrenched themselves and from which they had announced the resignation of the Dollfuss government. Immediately government officials began to broadcast assurances to all European listeners that conditions had returned to normal and that the Nazi putsch had been unsuc-

While the total number of casalties is unknown, ten were listed as dead and thirty among the wounded. It is believed that the total number of casualties is much higher.

Fey Warns Troops Away

Negotiations with the Nazis who held government leaders as hostages was carried on for some time before the word was finally given the troops to capture the building by storm. Twice Major Fey. strong by storm. Twice Major Fey. strong man of the Dollfuss government, made dramatic appearances on the balcony of the Chancellory, telling regular troops who surrounded the building to retire. Troops were marched away, but returned late when negotiations broke down.

Nazis in the suburbs of Vienna concentrated in an attempt to invade the city. At Stainz the gendarmerie post was attacked by Nazis, who killed the post com-mander and a gendarme.

The electric power station at Graz was dynamited, supposedly by Nazis. The entire city is in darkness.

(Continued from Page One) Austrian army during the World War and afterwards became active in politics, joining and assuming a position of prominence in the Christian Social Party.

His first important post was that of secretary of the Lower Austrian Agricultural Chamber, which he held for a short time until 1927, when he became director of the Chamber for three years. From 1930 until 1931 he was president of Railways. In the latter year he was named minister for Agriculture and Forestry in the Buresch

His importance—and his trou bles-really began in May of 1932. however, when he took over the chancellorship of Austria after President Miklas had spent two weeks searching for someone who was willing to take the position. Austria at that time was in a

state of political confusion. Vienna, in which approximately one-third of the country's total population resides, was under Socialist con-The remainder of Austria had been dominated by conserva-tive forces prior to Dollfuss' as-sumption of the chancellorship.

A year after it took over control of the government the Dollfuss regime became a dictatorship. This was a signal for alarm on the part of the Socialist forces, who scented armed warfare in the centralization of power—a warfare which finally came, with spectacular finally came, with spectacular bloodshed, in February, 1934, when the cooperative Socialist apartment houses in Vienna were raked by the fire of Dolfuss guns and many were killed.

many were killed.

Suppression of the Socialists was an obvious attempt on the part of the little Chancellor to shy away from the real menace which threat-ened his regime—the growing Nazi strength, which was looming in-creasingly important in its oppo-sition to Christian Social control.

Tried to Avoid Blas

Dollfuss made half-hearted ef-forts to avoid the stigma of anti-Semitism, but pressure from within was too strong for the little man and many edicts, proclamations and semi-official declarations directed against the Jews were allowed to take root.

The Dollfuss dictatorship was le galized last spring when a rump Parliament met, voted itself out of existence, eradicated the old Austrian constitution, and replaced

it with a new one which did away with all semblances of democracy. Socialists had been barred from

Dollfuss was never able to can ture the imagination of his people, a large portion of whom refused to take him seriously in his attempts to establish himself as a person of Mussolini's or even of Hitler's stature.

Had Ruthless Will

Mild-mannered and soft-spoken through his life, Dollfuss by his quiet demeanor belied a strong sense of conviction and ruthless determination which motivated his

Born in the tiny village of Tex-ing on October 4, 1892, Dollfuss spent an early life akin to that of an ordinary peasant's child. His mother and step-father still live in the modest cottage near the Dan-ube where he spent his boyhood.

After completing his early edu cation, he attended the University of Vienna, where he developed an obsession for national economics. Through his university career, his friends knew him as a conscientious, reticent student imbued with

moral purposiveness. He finished his education at the University of

Dollfuss plunged into the war an unknown soldier. With a grim recklessness that drew for him praise and decorations he fought in his Tyrolean Alpinist regiment so he-roically that he was promoted to lieutenant, an honor rarely bestowed upon a peasant in the aris-tocratic army of Emperor Franz Joseph. He successfully defended a little

valley in the Dolomites against an overpowering Italian invasion. To this day the valley is known as Dollfussthal.

Took Up Peace Work

With the dynamic energy that made inactivity impossible for him, Dollfuss turned from the mael-strom of war to peacetime organization of farm co-operatives in lower Austria. He soon won a position on the State Railway Board and a year later became president of the Federal Railways.

In May, 1982, he formed a cabinet under President Miklas. The twenty-four hours after being called to office he spent in prayer. Throughout his rule, he acted according to the dictates of his con-

Only fifty-nine inches in height, Dollfuss received such bantering sobriquets as "Millimetternich" and "Vest-pocket Chancellor" from friends and enemies alike. Despite an edict against them, anecdotes concerning his size were popular in the cafes of Vienna.
