A Wrong Start

The new Chancellor of Ausstria, von Starhemberg, leader of the Heimwehr in a statement to the London Daily Express, defined his attitude toward the Jewish problem in Austria thus:

"Austrian Jews occupy a number of posts in the profes-sions and services out of all proportions to their percentage of the population. We have such an influx of refugees that the late Chancellor Dollfuss was nicknamed 'the Pontius Pilate of Austrian Judea.' Our measures against the Jews are purely defensive. They are not aggressive. There will be no persecution and no pogrom in Austria."

Von Starhemberg was known to be intensively anti-Semitic at the time he cooperated with the Hitlerite Nazis several years ago. In fact, it was believed then that he was even more hostile to the he was even more hostile to the Jews than Hitler himself. Dur-ing the past two years, von Star-hemberg has altered his attitude toward the German Nazis, and has opposed them bitterly. He also modified somewhat his stand with regard to the Jewish ques-tion, He has become less rabid. He promised a short time ago and now reiterates that there will be no persecution of Jews and no pogroms in Austria. At the same time he announces that his government's measures against the Jews will be "purely defensive" and "not aggressive."

He is apparently preparing to remove a number of Jews in the professions now holding municipal or governmental posts. This is quite in the spirit of his former friend and co-worker, Adolf Hitler. Von Starhemberg is en-deavoring to deal with the Jewish problem more "humanely," to crush them without pogroms, in order not to arouse the indig-nation which the Hitler policy aroused in the civilized world.

. Von Starhemberg, as Chancel-lor, has thus made a wrong start. Instead of treating the popula-tion of Austria upon terms of equality, he announces that with regard to the Jews he will adopt "defensive" measures. The Jews have been accorded fairer treatment under the Hapsburgs, and have done much for Austria. Literature, art, music, science, Literature, art, music, science, commerce in Austria have been advanced by the Jews. Schnitz-ler, Richard Beer Hoffman, Franz Werfel, Sigmund Freud and other universally acclaimed personalities have given world prestige to Austria. These names

Newspaper's Editorial Is Approved by Non-Jews in Germany

BERLIN, July 29.—Important
non-Jewish circles are quietly expressing general approbation of
Thursday's editorial in the Frankfurter Zeitung, which called upon the Nazi regime to loosen its restrictions on Jews in the economic

sphere. The editorial is believed to have been inspired by important personages, since the newspaper is sup-ported by big industries, particu-larly the chemical, thus indicat-ing direct backing by Ministers Schmidt and Frick.

Both have constantly insisted that the "Aryan principle" should be disregarded in business and finance, but have not been able to influence the official policy whereby Jews are excluded from the economic life of the country.

She is the granddaughter of Rabbi Chaim Solodaughter of Rabin Chaim Solo-veitchik, a great Talmudic autho-rity. Miss Soloveitchik won the trip because she was among the group of Jewish National Fund volunteers who distinguished themselves in a recent fund-raising activity for the benefit of the Fund.

Adjusting Our Lives

New Trends in Jewish Social Welfare Activities

In the last ten or fifteen years, with the ceasing of the Jewish mass immigration, our philanthropic and social-cultural work has been directed along new lines.

American-Jewish charitable activities were mostly devoted to the giving of help to the large masses of the poor and helpless newcomers from Europe. The immigrants were aided to adjust themselves to the strange and complex American scene through a variety of agencies, such as educational alliances, philanthropic settlements, free loan societies, placement offices and the like. The After-War Period

But a new era was opened in the aftermath of the World War. The Iewish immigration has only in the first few years (1921-1923) preserved its familiar mass character. In July,

1924, the quota law was put on the statute book, and the Jewish immigration into the United States was virtually brought to an end. Instead of the former clients the "green" new arrivals, an entirely different human elements

entirely different human element, has become the object of the wide community work programs during the years of relative prosperity, 1928 to 1929, Naturally, in this period the amount of need and privation among the Jewish masses of America has grown smaller. Al-though, even then, seasonal unemployment and a slump in the needle trades did affect a large mass of Jewish workers, yet this was an ill of rather eld standing and not a matter of exclusively Jewish

Welfare and relief work now have been directed in the first place toward those elements, present in any type of society, that have been helpless or maladjusted in the struggle for existence, such as widows and orphans, poor aged dependents, invalids or persons of impaired health in need of special occupational adjustment, and so forth

With the care of the unadjusted new immigrants out of the picture a wider measure of public atten-tion could be given to the question of Jewish health service (hospitals on sewish neath service (nospitals and sanatoria), care of children (child help and training), homes of the aged, and other institutions for the needy men and women.

Cultural Functions Grow But also in the field of social-cultural work, the seven years of

prosperity coincide with a period of fruitful and significant endeavor. Many Jewish schools, Talmud Torahs, and other educational institutions have come into being over the length and breadth of the country.

A great number of Jewish Con

munity Centers, in addition to the older cultural organizations, such Women's Hebrew Associations, have also been built up. The Jewish centers inaugurated a compre-hensive cultural program in be-half of adults, adolescents and

Their essential aim is to bring an increasingly large number of Jewish families into intimate touch with the Jewish cultural heritage as an active fount of inspiration. To this end, Jewish holiday tradi-tions are fostered, and interests in reconstruction of Jewish life in Palestine and Europe, as well as world-wide Jewish solidarity and sympathetic understanding, are aroused. Not least, a fruitful union of Judaism and Americanism is the goal to the attainment of which

ne centers bend their efforts.
In its exterior, that is, through new imposing communal buildings and very impressive individual contributions, the Jewish social wel-fare work has become more gen-erous and important than ever before. Also in its contents, however, by the inclusion, that is, of social and cultural Jewish activities, has the program of Jewish communal work, since 1923, grown in stature

In the previous thirty to forty years, the

the efforts toward social help and cultural Jewish endeavor brought the community face to face with problems of centralized communal planning. The Federations of Jewish Charities, in pre-war times agencies for centralized money-

raising and distribution, have now

in many instances undergone a no-ticeable extension and moderniza-

Even the very names of the central and directing offices here and there have been changed. Instead of the former United Hebrew Charities, we have now Jewish Social Service Bureaus or United Jewish Social Agencies. The same tendency toward a wider and deeper program of social action is reflected in the constantly growing reflected in the constancy growing prestige of the central organiza-tion of Jewish social workers in America—the National Conference

of Jewish Social Service. At the same time, the Jewish rs are given advice and guidance by the Jawish Welfare Board so as to coordinate their activities and secure for them, and for the Y. M. H. and Y. W. H. Associations, a permanent place in the Jewish communal life. There is so a professional organization with aims of cultural advancement Jewish life in America—the National Association of Jewish

Center Executives. Hebrew schools of all descrip tions have also coordinated their efforts to the end of improving their standards and methods. Out of the Central Bureaus of Jewish Education in the several cities, a National Council for Jewish Education, with a head office in Chi-

cago, has arisen. This national council, in cooperation with the two national agencies mentioned above, have cently taken steps toward the organization of a permanent co-ordinating committee of national

Not in a few cities, the Jewish Welfare Federations have included representatives of Community Centers and of the school organiza-tions. Thus, a federation, originally a fund-raising agency, auto matically has become a sort of a Jewish Community Council, embracing and all-directing. Ryan Charged With Suppression Emigration of Jewish Aliens From Reich Brings Problems

Passport and Citizenship Requirements of Native Lands Hinder Movement-Staatenlose Are Among Greatest Sufferers

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, July 19. — Passport and citizenship requirements of their native countries has hindered the re-emigration movement of Jewish aliens living in Germany to their lands of birth, it was revealed here in a report appearing in the new issue of the Bulletin of the Central Committee of German Jews for Aid and Construc-

In many cases these passport and citizenship questions have placed in a dilemma the agencies cooperating in the re-emigration movement. Many of these foreign Jews have been living in Germany for decades, the report says, and have become economically and culturally incorporated in German life. The passport status of these people is most uncertain because their citizenship and nationality claims must first be cleared up in their native countries.

Staatenlose Suffer

Thus there are two groups who confront the organization with almost insoluble problems. The first of these groups are the Staatenlose who went to leave Germany of their own will, or are compelled to leave because of an expulsion order, but have no way of going to another country because they not meet passport ments. Then there are those peo-ple who were by the law of July 14, 1933, revoking naturalizations deprived of the German citizenship which they had acquired.

As for the Staatenlose group

there are only a few countries which have accepted a limited number of them during the last few months. At present the openings are rapidly diminishing. This, therefore, makes the position of this class very desperate.

It needs such longer preparation and careful consideration of the openings exist elsewhere before famiites can contemplate emigration, and much more assistance is called for from the Welfare Office.

According to nationality, the 18,694 comprised 8,804 Polish citi-18,694 comprised 8,604 Folian dazens, 1,951 Hungarians, 1,917 Czechoslovakians, 968 Austrians, 890 Rumanians, 207 Russians, 187 Lithuanians, 118 Latvians, Palestinians, eighty-three Dutch. and thirty-five Americans. The na-tionality of 1,494 re-emigrants is not known. 1,461 were Stantenlose. The remainder, 476, belonged in smaller numbers to various coun-

In most cases these re-emigrants went back to their native countries. Exceptions were made only where there were special considerations, economic or otherwise, which made it preferable for them to go to other countries in Europe or overseas.



Tips Nazi Secret Police
Kruppa points to Wendel del
Monteroca, a former "mystery
man" of the League of Friends of New Germany as the principal communication link between the Friends and the secret police in Germany. Del Monteroca left for Trieste about two weeks ago aboard the S. S. Vulcania. He was the head of the Bunaste (Bundes Nachrichten Dienst — Association Information Service) which kept the German government informed on the public and private utterances of all who spoke on Germany.

Members of the Friends of New Germany and others served the Bunaste by clipping news items containing, remarks on Germany. In this manner the political atti-tudes of every person in the United States might be made known to the Nazi regime. Bundles of these climbings were sent off on Germany. clippings were sent off on German ships, according to Kruppa.

"The Deutsche Maedchenschaft, which was part of my Deutsche Jungenschaft, did the best job. They turned in the most and neat-eat clippings in this regard," Kruppa sald proudly.

I have reported before that virtually all American Jewish leaders and Jews active in German American society have been reported to Germany by the Bunaste. I have knowledge of the identities of some of the reporters, but because of the difficulty in confirming this, it is impossible here to men-tion their names. I have encountered some documentary evidence of their having reported to Germany and of the secret police there having visited the families of the American offenders, but the evi-dence is not actionable.

Del Monteroca is said to have been an old comrade of Hitler. He is said by those who know him to have been with Hitler as early as 1919 or 1920. There has come into my hands two mutilated pa-pers, one Del Monteroca's appointment by Heinz Spanknoebel as leader of the Bunaste here; the other a communication from Wil-helm Brueckner, Hitler's adjutant at the Munich Brown House, in-forming del Monteroca that Hitler was out of town and could not be interviewed.

Asked for Armed Aid

Kruppa has told me that a cer-Artippa has told me that a cer-tain leader of the Friends of New Germany, who departed for Ger-many shortly fter having been summoned to testify before the last open hearings of the McCor-Congressional Committee, incause. "He said," Kruppa declared, on August 15.

"I know you have the courage to fight for what is best for America and Germany. I want you to swear to take up arms against the en-tire line of traitors to our move-

Kruppa said he promised this at the time, but now, overcome with the sordid significance of the oath he had taken wishes to rid himself of any responsibility.

Kruppa further stated that s former boxer, now a member of the local Nazi storm troops, had the local Nazi storm troops, had been appointed to "get him" after he had broken faith with the League of Friends of New Ger-many. Kruppa said that because he had once befriended the storm trooper, his appointed assailant made a clean breast of the matter

made a clean breast of the matter to him and refused to act. — According to Kruppa, Walter Kappe, one of the "Big Three," all alien Germans controlling the Friends of New Germany, wrote to a Mr. Barnhart in Cincinnati, demanding that Halve Speakers to a Mr. Barnhart in Cincinnau demanding that Heinz Spanknoe-bel be driven from his position of absolute leadership over the Friends. This, Kruppa said, was done by secret police here. Kappe Denies Story

I have talked with Walter Kappe with reference to Kruppa's inforwith reference to Kruppa's infor-mation. Kappe said that he knew Barnhart in Cincinnati, was a friend of his, in fact, but he de-nied that Barnhart, now in Ger-many, had anything to do with the secret police or that Spanknoe-bel was forced to leave the country by influence of German gov-ernment operatives here.

Kappe recognized the existence of the Bunaste, but he said that this has not been in operation for many months. He said that many bundles of clippings are gathering dust at the Friends' headquarters because there is no place to send them. Kappe expressed the opinion that there are no German secret police in this country, but he said that it is possible that individuals, operating independently of the League of Friends of New Germany, reported cases of treason to the fatherland. He professed to have no knowledge of this, how-

Kappe said that del Monterocs was ousted from the Friends of New Germany after an Uschla had found him guilty of misappropri-ating organization funds. He said that to his knowledge del Monte-roca had no connections with the

roca had no connections with the Nazi secret police nor did he ap-pear to believe that such agents were in this country. New-Style Camps Take Children Goebbels and Papen as Castor and Pollux From Blistering City Streets

Camp Ta-A-Noog, Typical of Idea, Perched on Roof of Institutional Synagogue-Jewish Welfare Board Promotes Development

By HY WISHENGRAD

The sidewalks of New York are being returned to the adults who paid the taxes that helped to build them. And the streets are being left severely to the petrol wagons, the busses, the trolleys and the few horses that are still plodding through monoxide fumes and humidity.

It's the child who is doing the returning.

Your child and your child; also yours and your neighbor's. The same who only yesterday, it seems were dancing in the streets to the sour strains of a hurdy-gurdy, tragically getting under the wheels of a truck, or colliding ungently with the hurrying adult pedestrian to the discomfiture of both.

The long campaign of social welfare agencies, police depart-ment and any numbers of recreation commissions, park offi-cials and even parents to keep the children off the streets in their play-time is finally bearing fruit. the children have at last been given something that approximates a real inducement to stay off of New York's sidewalks and streets with their terrible fascination for the child mind.

Playgrounds Fall Short

The inducement is not the play-round. Playgrounds have been nly partially successful. Their element of failure lay, for one thing, in the fact that there were altogether too few of them and, for another, the few there were for another, the few there were failed to offer children sufficient variety of entertainment. More-over, there was a complete lack of individual treatment of the child, for reasons that are quite under-

No, the inducement that is fin-No, the inducement hat is na-ally dragging children out of dan-ger to life and limb is not the playground. It's the camp. Not the camp tucked away in the hills, on the shores of a beautiful lake, or on the banks of a rushing river. That sort of camp is only for the children of the well-to-do, not for those children of the depression who seem to be in the vast majority.

The camp we are about to speak of is the home camp, a comparato is the nome camp, a compara-tively recent development. It's the camp of the rooftops, of New York. The camp of the public parks, the museums. The camp that is tucked away on the banks of an indoor swimming pool.

That's the inducement that is

being hailed by child associations, welfare agencies and recreation experts as the most successful yet devised to keep children from breaking their necks while playing during the difficult summer

In this development, one of the outstanding groups, if not the leading group, responsible for its suc-Welfare Board. About four years ago, the home camp idea was just ago, the nome camp idea was just an idea and nothing more. Here and there, social welfare and recreation people were playing around with it. In Mount Vernon, for example, the Y.M.H.A. and Y.W.H.A. had experienced a measure of success with the home camp ure of success with the home camp plan for children whose parents were unable to send them to the regular "Y" camps. Idea Taken Up

Four years ago, the Jewish Welfare Board saw the possibilities behind the idea and began to promote it for all it was worth. Today it has been taken up enthusiastically by XMCA's and other social agencies throughout the

and fascinated by the home camps conducted by J. W. B. supervised agencies throughout the country. As an official of the Jewish

Welfare Board explains it, the home camps "were originally initiated as a depression measure to provide vacation opportunities for provide vacation opportunities for needy children who had to re-main in the city during the hot summer months. An aimless ex-stence on the street was trans-formed into a balanced recreational, social and educational program under expert guidance."

That explains it in the formal language of the social worker, and the recreation expert. But it doesn't tell the story by half. As a matter of fact, the story doesn't need to be told at all. The needs to be seen to be appreciated.

Urges Visit to Camp

Take a day off, sometime, and visit Camp Ta-a-Noog. You'll find Camp Ta-A-Noog, which is Hebrew for Joy, perched on the roof of the Institutional Synagogue at

of West 116th street. Don't look for tents. There aren't any.
You'll also find the camp down in the pool. In the arts and crafts room. In the classrooms studying Hebrew. Or in the large, cool auditorium. large, cool auditorium, singing songs. And if it's on Wednesday, songs. And it its on wednesday, the camp just won't be anywhere around the building, inside or top-side. To catch up with it, you'll have to go up to Tübett's Brook in Yonkers; the Bronx Zoo; to the Yankee Stadium; to the Museum of Natural History. For on Wednesdays Camp-A-Noog, as well as all the other home camps throughout the city, strike their imaginary tents and go on the march.

The writer was fortunate enough to visit Ta-A-Noog on one

of the camp's days in He found one group of shiny-skinned youngsters clambering out of the pool. Laughter was in their eyes. "I went to the most recent meet ing of the Friends of New Germany, in the Turn Halle, at Lexington avenue and Eighty-fifth street," he said, "and I heard ething there that amazed me.

"Joseph Schuster (leader of the Brooklyn cell of the 'Friends' and one of the powers of New York Nazidom) was speaking to an audience of about 1,500 persons. He was attacking the older German residents for their failure to rally to the Hitler cause.
"Behind him, on the platform,

hung the Hakenkreuz (the swason one side and the American flag on the other. Schuster began ranting against American youth and what he described as its tendency to spend its time in movies and on street corners "Finally, working himself up in-

to a frenzy of oratory, he swung halfway around and pointed with trembling, melodramatic fervor to the Hakenkreuz, 'That,' he shouted, 'is the spirit

in which American youth should be educated! Let them learn the meaning of the Hakenkreuz, so that when the proper day arrives, they will know into which camp to throw their bombs and their hand grenades!" .

Mr. Schmidt paused in the telling of his story and fanned him-self with his straw hat. He had become quited excited while he was recounting it. Unconsciously, with his voice and his gestures, he had been imitating the choleric Schuster, and his face had flared somester, and his race had flared into a beet-redness while he was pantomiming the apoplectic hys-teria of the fanatic Schuster.

"I have been to a number of these meetings," he said, "but this is the first time I have ever heard such an open incitement to sedition and violence. Schuster was showing himself and the Nazi gangster rule in their true colors. From an inner pocket Mr. Schmidt drew forth a letter which

bore a German postmark.
"This letter," he said, written to me by a good and harm-

less man a few days before he was killed by Hitler's thugs.

"He was a sixty-two-year-old employe in the offices of Vice Chancellor von Papen. He was what you might call a 'pen-pusher.'


