his venture. DR. M. WALDMAN It seems that a number of circumstances combined to actuate boy to take up its study. As a child, he tells us in Dichtung and Wahrheit, he was already greatly interested in the antiinterested in the antiquities of his native city and in the personages of bygone times who had made a name for themselves:

Fettmilch, a rebel, had incurred debts among the Jews which either he could not or would not pay. The safest way to get rid of the debts was to get rid of the Jews. And so it happened that on the twentysecond of August, 1614, the gates of the Ghetto were stormed, the Jews fled in mortal fear to their cemetery, ready to throw themselves into the river rather than rely upon the tender mercies of the criminals, For three days the are crimmais, For three days the rabble deliberated whether to massacre the Jews or to expel them from the city. They finally decided upon the latter course. Their synagogue and its sacred scrolls were described in the vilest and foulest management. vilest and foulest manner: even vilest and foulest manner; even the cemetery was not spared. Their property and their personal be-longings were plundered by the mob. Robbed of hearth and home, of all earthly possessions, they were allowed to leave the city to the number of 1,380, and to seek a refuge wherever they could. The Jews of other cities, of course, came to their rescue.

Matthias Proscribes Fettmilch

The Jews, however, were not without influence. They succeeded in reaching the ear of the Emperor Matthias. He proscribed Fettmilch and his accomplices and had them executed in the most barbarous manner in February, 1616, and brought the Jews back 1616, and brought the Jews back to their former homesteads against the protests of the Frankfort burghers. Thus ended the last pogrom in the city of the poet.

This event is described in poetic
form in Yiddish by an eye witness
under the title Vinz-Hans-Lied.
His first name was Vinzenz. This poetic description of the horrors was, as already mentioned, incor-porated in the Merkwuerdigkeiten. It is, therefore, more than likely that the lad with his inquisitive mind, ever endeavoring to search and scrutinize, trained to read in the original instead of a transla-tion, felt the desire to read the account in the original. That is why he may have taken to the study of the "baroque" language, as he later styled it.

Textor, son of the chief magisstrate, was an attorney who had a large Jewish clientele. The oungster, no doubt, met them in youngster, no doubt, met them in his uncle's office and overheard their conversations, which he hardly understood. The desire to get into personal contact, to un-derstand others was, in all likelihood, a contributing factor to his study of Yiddish . . . A Mythological Poem

Young Goethe was at the time of his uncle's marriage a student at the University of Leipzig. Prior to the wedding his father requested him to compose a poem in honor of it. He, therefore, pictured a conclave of the entire Olympus to hold council over the marriage to hold council over the marriage of a Frankfort attorney. Venus and Themis got into a broil on account of him, but a roguish stratagem, which Amor played upon the latter, caused the gods to render a favorable decision in behalf of the former and sanctioned the marriage. His poem applauded and he received a letter of commendation from his father. However, Goethe was not quite satisfied with this poetic effusion. He, therefore, submitted it anonymously to his professor of stylismously to his professor of stylis-tics, Clodius, who massacred and subjected it to a profuse bloodbath of red ink. He also criticized the contents very severely; he thought it preposterous to invoke such a galaxy of mythological personages and to employ divine means for such a trite human business. The author was somehow recognized and received a great many jibes an. jabs from his fellow students, so that out of chagrin he destroyed it. Since that time he was careful never to write any wedding poems. Even the wedding of his beloved sister, Cornelia, he let pass without celebrating in song . . . We can understand why the boy

Goethe feared to enter the Ghetto and we can sympathize with him. He might have feared never to return alive, for did not the Schandgemaelde stand out as a "historic" record and warning to the non-Jews? And was it not put up by "learned, educated" people and officials to boot? But he did return alive more than once and as he states, was well entertained and allowed to see the ceremonies without let or hindrance. The im-pression he carried away was, of course, very unpleasant. This also is quite intelligible, for how else could a lad, living in luxury, decould a lad, hving in hixiry, de-scending suddenly into a cesspool, be affected? In addition, the cus-toms which must have appeared strange to him and the language which sounded to him like some sort of gibber which he did not understand must have had peculiar effect on him. And very failure to understand that gabble might have been another and perhaps a decisive factor in his determination to learn Judeo-German.

Read First, Then Wrote

In view of the fact that Goethe

had added a new language to his repertoire, he struck upon the felicitous idea of coordinating all his languages, and practiced them at the same time in order to save time. He, therefore, edvised a novel in (letters) which was to be car-ried on by six brothers and a sister, who lived far apart, scat-tered over the western part of Europe. The idea was not a new one, for Richardson's Pamela and as well as Rousseau's Julie had appeared in epistolary

The oldest of the brothers wrote in German, to which his sister replied in feminine style in her vernacular, giving an account of the happenings at home and her love affairs. The second brother, a student of theology, couched his letters in Latin with an occasional letters in Latin with an occasional postscript in Greek. The third, a clerk, stationed at the port of Hamburg, communicated in Eng-Hamburg, communicated in Eng-lish. The fourth, who had landed in Marseilles, used French. The fifth, who acted the part of a fifth, who acted the part of a musician, employed Italian. The youngest, a "smart Aleck" not conversant with any of the lan-guages, contributed his part in Yiddish. The cryptograms of this idiom drove the other correspond-ents to despire and acrowed salves. ents to despair and aroused salvos of laughter on the part of his parents. German-Americans Assail Nazis Pick Columbus As Menace to the Peace of U.S. For Conference

Friends of the Truth, an organization of Cincinnati German-Amer icans, none of whose members, it is asserted, is Jewish. The pamphlet is signed by a publication committee composed of August Hamelberg, William Lohmeier, Fred Bender, John Wainz and August Hauck.

The brochure is entitled, "The Menace of Nazism," and carries menace of Nazism," and carries the explanatory sub-title, "As sob-er thinking German-Americans View Hitlerism." An introtion states that the pamphlet "has been compiled by Cincinnatians of German extraction and one of its purposes is to bring home to all Cincinnatians of German origin that their first duty, at present, is to cooperate actively in keeping out of this country the malicious ness and unsavoriness of Nazi propaganda."

'Friends' Tool of Hitlerites An excerpt states: "To st the legues of far as Cincinnations are concerned, briefly and clearly: They must decide now. If they continue to have any relations at all with those organizations and their members that support Hitlerism, they make themselves accessories to the repellent crimes which have been committed, are being committed and will be committed in Germany and elsewhere by in Germany and elsewhere by a gang of raving manlacs with no other purpose than to satisfy their lust for power and blood. The Friends of New Germany. of course, are known to be, without any qualification whatsoever, part and parcel to the brutalities and murders perpetrated by their mas-ters on the other side of the Atlantic "Worst of all and entirely

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Rulletis Enclosed find a money order for three dollars which will cover the cost of my past subscription for the J. D. Poland Does Nothing to Check Drive of Endeks, Says Smolar

Of course, the government does not act always as the antigovernment party would like it too, but it disregards some of the actions of the Endeks and deems wise to maintain silence.

One of these actions is anti-Sem

One of these actions is anu-semitic propaganda.

The Endek party carries on an intense and widely spread anti-Semitic propaganda c am paign which hints of possible pogroms, both in the press and in the open, at secret meetings and at public gatherings. Never do the leaders of the Endeks allow an opportu-nity to slip by without inciting the public against the Jews. The spreading of this anti-Semitic propaganda is one of the underlying principles of the party. The war on Jews is one of the Endek's chief commandments.

Never before in the history of Poland has a Polish government een as strong as the present one. It has the power as never before to suppress disturbances and maintain order. Should the present government so be determined, it of remove the menace of Jewish at-tacks and curb the anti-Semitic press overnight.

However, the Polish Govern-nent, although bitterly opposed to the Endek party, does not attempt to check its anti-Jewish agitation in the least. The Polish Government never finds it necessary to confiscate even one issue of the Jew-baiting Endek press. The government is afraid to wage a campaign against the Endeks be-cause of their antiSemitism. It is afraid to appear in the light as a government opposed to anti-Semit-

What to Be Expected Under these circumstances, when

even the government fears to say a friendly word for the Jews, what can be expected of the political parties whose very program are unrelentingly anti-Semitic? What can be expected of the Endeks? What can be expected of those sports organizations around whose banners the members of the forbidden Nara party are now rally-ing? What can be expected of the average Polish citizen who is continually fed this anti-Jewish streets; days of pogroms when propaganda, and who is really bethey had to hide themselves in ginning to believe that the Jews garrets and cellars. The Jewish leaders in Poland know full well that danger to Po-lish Jewry is imminent. They can do nothing, however. They are divided and split into different fac-tion and parties and cannot find a solution on which they all can

agree.

At a recent conference called by an enterprising group in Warsaw to organize a strong representa-tive Jewish body comprising the leaders of the several parties, one could hear such statements as "Polish Jewry stands on the brink of martyrdom." Pessimistic speeches by some made one's hair stand up. All the speakers—important lead-ers of Polish Jewry—were in ac-cord that within a few months severe and even bloody days for the Jews in Poland are to be expected. Nevertheless, a strong united

Jewish body was not organized. The various factions found it impossible to agree on a modus op

Tragic Split in Ranks

This split in the ranks of Polish Jewry is at present the most tragic episode in the lives of the three million Jews in Poland. This disunity is certainly not in the interest of these three million unprotected Jewish citizens. It plays right into the hands of the a Semites and into the hands of the government, which prefers a broken and separated front to a united Jewish front.

As a result, the great Jewish community in Europe now stand in immediate physical danger. The danger is made greater by the Nara party, which is supposedly forbidden, but whose members remain and carry out their inframous work through legal channels. They have new means with which to adhere to their old program of Jew-baiting and of molesting and stabbing Jews in the streets openly and without fear of either police the law or the government

The Jews in Poland are accustomed to days of terror. They have already gone through days when their beards were pulled in the streets; days when they were they were hurled off speeding trains; days when no one dared go out into the

Poland have already lived through a period of anti-Semitic unrest such as is not known even in present day Germany.

These outrages had always occurred, however, in the provinces. Never in Warsaw. Never had they occurred in the city where the government sat.

Now-in the last Nara excesses —such outrages have taken place openly even in Warsaw, before the eyes of Polish cabinet members in the capital of the so-called Polish Democratic Republic

Why They Will Recui

In this fact lies the chief danger should such outrages ever occur again. When it comes to pass that in the capital of Poland, under the eyes of the police, in broad day-light, Jews are stabbed in the streets, it is ample proof that the government policy of protection is inoperative with respect to Po-land's Jewish citizens. People who know conditions in

Warsaw, and who know the sentiment in government circles, realize that the Nara hooligans would never have dared to come out into the main thoroughfares of Warsaw with knives in their hands, had they not felt certain that the government would tolerate that, erhient would tolerate that, re-liable persons say that if not for the tragic murder of Minister Pie-racki there would now be such pogroms in Poland as have not been seen since the days of Bogdan Chmelnitzsky. Alliance Israelite Official Dies at 78

Jacques Brigart at Work at Paris Headquarters When Death Comes

PARIS, Aug. 6.—Jacques Bigart, secretary general of the Alliance Israelite Universelle, central French Jewish organization, died suddenly today as he was working in the office of the Alliance. M.

Bigart was 78 years old. He was born in Mutterholz, sace, in 1855. He was educated in the lower French schools, the rabbinical seminary in Paris and in binical seminary in Paris and in French universities, where he stud-ied law. In 1881 he became as-sistant secretary of the Alliance and in 1892 he succeeded Isidore Loeb as secretary.

For in dying he now wanders above us amidst the immortals of our people sur rounded by the great spirits of the past as an eternal patron and protector of the German Reich and the German nation."
