first Jewish Governor, Herbert H. Lehman, announced today, in spite of his "very strong personal sire to return to private life," he is a candidate for re-election.

In a formal statement which came on the heels of Minority Leader Assemblyman Irwin Stein-gut's opinion that the Republicans could not beat Lehman this year, the Governor set aside speculation about his candidacy. He declared:

"I have received many inquiries with regard to my candidacy for the Governorship this fall.

"I have not made any announce-ment before because of my very strong personal desire to return to private life. For six years as Lieutenant Governor I have given the best that is in me to the service, of the people of the state

#### "Has Been Compensated"

The satisfaction and enjoyment that have come to me through the discharge of my responsibilities and the knowledge of constructive work accomplished have compensated me for the unceasing de-mands of the Governorship during these trying times.
"My long service has however

imposed several sacrifices which I have been hesitant to continue. I had hoped that conditions would have so improved and that the economic situation would have so nearly returned to normal that I could with a perfectly clear con-science return to private life. "However, because of the many

#### List of Dead and Injured Runs Into Hundreds, Correspondent Says

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) CONSTANTINE, Algeria, Aug.

7.—A scene of utter desolation and horror, of Jewish girls with their breasts cut off, of little children with numerous knife wounds and of whole families locked in their homes and burned to death, was described by a Jewish Tele-graphic Agency correspondent, who succeeded in reaching this city today.

"It will take days before the world will obtain a true picture world will obtain a true picture of all the atroctites committed by the Arabs during the pogrom on the Jewish quarter," the correspondent wired.

"The only comparison I can think of is the Palestine riots of 1929. I found Jewish girls with their breats out of grayhearded.

their breasts cut off, greybearded Jews stabbed to death, little Jewish children dead of numerous knife wounds and whole families locked in their homes and burned to death by the rioters.

"Just as in Palestine in 1929, the lists of the dead and injured run into the hundreds with no of-ficial estimates available. The hospitals are filled with Jewish vic-tims and the doors of the hospitals are besieged with half-crazed wives and mothers seeking to ascertain whether their loved ones are among the dead or injured, or whether they succeeded in escaping the pogrom bands.

More than 16,000 persons paid tribute last night to the memory of the late Paul von Hindenburg, president of Germany, at Madison Square Garden Bowl in Queens in

were two storm troops and two Stahlhelm men at stiff attention.

#### Flares Light Dais

The dais was lit up by gasoline flares, the smoke fom which, swirling in the wind, cast wierd shad-ows on the picture of von Hindenburg. An airplane with a swastika on its fuselage wheeled overhead.

## Seize 80 Arab Suspects: Fear New Outbreak

#### Death Total Reaches 100 -Nomads Evade Cordon, Flood Cities

CONSTANTINE, Algeria, Aug.
7.—Eighty Arabs suspected of implication in the bloody pogroms in
the Jewish district were arrested
today by the French military. The pogroms raged for two days. Mili-tary forces now in control of the Race Bias Hit

More than 100 are dead as a result of the bloody pogroms and riots which swept the Jewish quarter of this city. While detailed lists of the pogrom-casualties are un-obtainable, authorities believe that most of the dead are Jews.

The riots were renewed last night by Arab pogrom bands, who once more invaded the Jewish district. Four more Jews were added to the death list by the outbreak last night.

At the same time anti-Jewish riots began in the neighboring towns of Hamma, Bizot and Ain-beida. Many Jews are reported to have been killed in the outbreak. The danger of further riots is

not over because armed Arab no-mads continue to flood the city. Armored cars and troops are pa-Armored cars and troops are pa-trolling the outskirts of the city, but the Arabs manage to evade the cordon. An eight o'clock cur-(Continued on Page Eight)

Henry Newman, Brooklyn con-tractor and philanthropist, was buried yesterday in Mount Hope Cemetery following services at Union Temple, 17 Eastern park-way, Brooklyn, which was attend-ed by several hundred persons. Newman died Saturday at Sacan-daga, N. Y.

Using as his text for the eulogy: Who shall descend into the mountain of the Lord and who shall stand in His holy place? He that walketh uprighteously and worketh righteousness and speaketh the truth in his heart," Rabbi Simon R. Cohen, Rabbi Emeritus of Un-ion Temple, said these words ex-

emplified the life of the deceased.
"He never failed to speak the truth from his heart," Rabbi Cohen said. "Yet in speaking the truth he always did so with a fine sympathy and generosity. There is an ancient proverb from the life of Confucious which reads: "Hear no evil, see no evil and speak no evil." Henry Newman was all this and more; he knew no evil, and this can well be made an epitaph of his life.

"Though he saw much guile, he was without guile. He saw much falsehood but was ever truthful. He experienced much dishonesty but was a man of great honor. The secret of his many friends was due to just this face—that he was the man of the highest integrity and yet of the finest sympathy."

## Adjusting Our Lives

Psychiatric Service and Social Welfare

The growing complexity of modern industrial society has led social scientists to formulate a consistent theory of maladjustment. The serious effects of these most unfortunate results of industrialism and urbanization are borne out by disturbing statistics of nervous disease and insanity.

Therefore, the strengthening and enlarging of all types of psychiatric service is one of our

foremost needs.

The impact of the disturbing forces of our new civilization must affect the Jewish people even more than their neighbors, because of the peculiar Jewish makeup growing out of centur-ies of persecution, maladjustment and urban life. The predisposition to nervous disturbances has increased during the long depression as a consequence of the intensity of economic and social problems, and of the letdown in the mor-

problems or delinquency. This, needless to add, is a noteworthy

demonstration of the necessity and

possibilities of community super-

vision with special reference to industrial placement. Such service as this is urgently needed for boys also, and the Wel-fare Council of New York, the

ale in the wake of unsettlement and business trouble. The increasing burden of support of Jewish insane has now

Few people in America are familiar with the appalling fact that nearly five per cent of all Ameri-can babies at birth have the prospect of becoming so mentally disased in adult life as to require admission to some institution. the average, approximately one person out of twenty-two be-comes a patient for mental disease comes a patient for mental disease during the life of a generation. They rise gradually with the age from 13 to about 60 years, and thereafter increase rapidly three to four-fold.

The rates for foreign-born men and women are considerably higher than those for native Ameri-cans under 60 years of age. All the same, no reflection is cast upthe foreign-born by these sta-ics. As all competent and obtistics. jective students of the problem ex-plain, these higher adjustments incident to a life in a new and un-familiar environment, in which the struggle for existence for the new-comer is sometimes made unbearably hard.

In a few words, mental malad-In a few words, mental malac-justment is a consequence of the way of life, in a large number of deplorable cases, rather than an outcome of racial inferiority.

New Field of Social Service Feeble-mindedness is seldom an individual misfortune. It affects group life and the community at large in a vastly greater measure than physical disease. Take the than physical disease. Take the case of the straightening out of the snarls caused in family life, so frequently, by a feeble-minded person. This unfortunate human being has virtually been forgotten until he or she got into trouble. With enlightened people, facts of this kind have gone a long way to drive the argument home as to the importance of building up community supervision over the mentally ill.

Up until the last few years this consideration has been the least developed aspect of mental-deficiency work.

Here, as in many other fields of

the new philanthropy and social work, the door is wide open to cooperationd and coordination between private charity work and state welfare activities. A corps of state field agents, experts in the mental deficiency and hygiene problems, and closely in touch with state asylums, public schools and courts, should be able to ren-der valuable assistance to the social worker and the community in adjusting this or that case in which mental disease or serious disorder is involved.

Vocational Adjustment A Vocational Adjustment Bu-reau was established in New York as a privately supported, non-sec-tarian welfare agency in 1919.

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## Goethe and the Jews

Amos as a cowherdsman, of course, does not use the lofty language of an Isaiah, who is supposed to have been a prince."

It is interesting to note that the ancient Rabbis make a similar observation on Isaiah and Ezekiel The former, they say, describes his vision of the throne of God and the angels like a city dweller, that is to say, is more refined, whereas the latter, like a villager, is crude and uncouth.

Again and again Goethe reverts to the Bible which has exerted an incalculable influence on the world. "That great veneration which many races and peoples have bestowed upon the Bible is due to its inner worth. It is not merely a national book but a book of the nations, because it sets up the des-tinies of a nation as a symbol for all others, because it connects its history with the origin of the world and leads it through a gamut of terrestrial and spiritual develop-ments, through a scale of indispensable and accidental events into the remotest regions of the uttermost eternities

Spinoza Exercized Goethe If Goethe never tired of acknowl dging his profound indebtedness to the Book of Books, he never ceased to reiterate till the end of his days his deep gratitude to the "God-intoxicated Jew" Spinoza.

It seems that many human be ings are born with a certain Weltanschauung. It ordinarily lies dormant in them till it is awakened by some extraneous cause or causes. If it receives no impetus from without, the man of ordinary intelligence will, on the whole, adopt a Weltanschauung foreign to his nature, merely dictated by environment, association, or Not so, however, a person of su-perior intellect. His Weltanschauung will crop up at all events and under all circumstance

Refore Goethe knew anything of Spinoza's system of philosophy he was already conscious of a philosophy of life entertained and expressed by the latter. When a mere youth he was already dominated by pantheistic ideas. only twenty he wrote in his diaryhe had already discarded his faith in a personal God-the momentous

words, so thoroughly Spinozostic: "To act separate from God and nature is difficult and dangerous, for we recognize God only through All that exists belongs of necessity to the nature of God, since God is the sole existence." This idea is expressed in Spinoza's Ethic I. Prop. 29. "In nature there is nothing contingent, but all things are determined from the necessity of the divine nature to exist and

act in a certain manner. When Goethe wrote down his credo he had only known of Spin-oza from a booklet and Bayle's encyclopedia, in both of which Spinoza had been caricatured and viled. In the summer of 1773, however, he tapped the Spinoza fount himself. Thenceforth, he became infected with an unbounded admiration for the man and his teaching. Spinoza became his mas-ter, teacher, and inspiration. His Ethic became Goethe's breviary and companion. In time of travall and despair he took refuge in it from which he drew counsel, solace, and peace of mind.

Admits Debt to Philosopl When Goethe met his friend Jacobi in 1774 they discussed vital matters which touched the innermost recesses of their very souls. Goethe, in speaking of this occa-sion, says: "Fortunately I had already worked on myself, if not trained myself, from this angle and had absorbed the life and mode of reasoning of an extraordinary man, to be sure, incompletely and almost furtively; but I nevertheless some notable effects. spirit which had such a decisive effect on me and which was to have such a great influence on my entire way of thinking was Spin-oza. After I had searched in vain in the whole world for a medium of training of my singular being I finally came upon the Ethic of this man. What I may have read out of this work, what I may have

wide vista seemed to open up before me on the sensuous and moral world. What attached me to him especially was his boundless unlfishness which shone forth fro every sentence. That singular maxim: 'Whoever loves God right-ly, must not demand that God love him in return,' with all the prem ises upon which it is based, all the corollaries which ensue, filled my entire thought. To be unselfish in everything, to be most unselfish in love and friendship constituted my greatest joy, my principles, my practice, so that that impertinent later axiom 'If I love what does it concern thee? was just spoken out of my Moreover, it should be noted that the closest combinations only result from opposites. The tranquility of Spinoza, balancing every-thing, contrasted with my aspirations, agitating everything; his ma-thematical method was the coun-terpart of my poetic disposition and presentation, and just that regulated mode of treatment which was not considered adaptable to moral matters, made me his passignate disciple, his most decided Mind and heart, reason and disposition sought one another with inevitable elective affinity, and by it was brought about a union of the diversest beings.'

BERLIN, July 26.—"Non-Aryn" firms, and especially their
on a plane of equality in economic employees, will enjoy a lesser de-gree of legal protection than the employees of "Aryan" firms, if the decision of the German Labor Front, exempting "non Aryan" firms from the wage scale, is el-evated into a principle, the Frankfurter Zeitung reported editorially, basing its discussion on issue No. 21 of the Deutsche Volkswirtschaft, (German Economic Life), which dealt with this decision.

"We can agree with the Deutsche Volkswirtschaft, the Frankfurter Zeitung proceeds, "in so far as it says that the results must be ca-tastrophic, if the concept'on of the Berlin Labor Court is carried into

"The Deutsche Volkswirtschaft takes the view that the decision is legally too untenable, and it produces sound reasons for its belief. It points out that the decision is based in reality on the idea of the old collective agreements whose validity depends on membership of one of the parties to the agree-ment. Against this, there is the law for the regulation of National Labor, which in principle rejects collective rights in that sense, by setting up in place of wage agree ments an authoritative order by the Leader, which does not depend for its validity on membership of any organization.

#### Objections Are Sound

According to the Berlin decision, says the Deutsche Volkswirtschaft, "all those 'Aryan' firms who on April 30, 1034, did not yet belong to the German Labor Front, must also remain outside the wage ar-"It is for similar reasons, we

understand, that the National So-cialist Economic Service has come out against the decision, which it declares to be legally untenable.

"All these objections appear to thoroughly sound, in the sense of the new Labor Law, and we must add that the 'non-Aryan' firms themselves must be vitally interested in not accepting such conceptions with regard to Labor rights. However much the 'non-Aryan' head of a business may desire to be free tc pursue his eco-nomic activity and to be placed on equality with other enterprises, he will not wish by reason of legal vagueness, particularly in relation to his employees, to be exempt from duties which all others have

Proposition Is Vague
"That there is a certain amount of vagueness in this matter, and that it was not easy for the Labor Court to arrive at a decision which will be in accord with the new Labor Law, is fairly easy to understand. The old ware agree-ments applied only to those who were parties to the agreements. If it is now assumed, as Deutsche Volkswirtschaft does, that the ex-tension of these agreements must be effected under new legal forms of the wage ordinance, it remains doubtful whether mere further exdoubtful whether mere further ex-tension, accomplished to a cer-tain extent automatically, has changed the field of validity, if no special ordinances are issued bearspecial ordinances are issued bear-ing upon this particular point. That clearly does not appear to have been done, and there, it seems, lies the reason for this

encounters many hindrances and obstacles.

The exclusion in principle of all 'non-Aryans' from the German Labor Front has brought about sev-eral quite unexpected consequences arising out of this decision. It is hardly necessary to point out that it may be found to be oppressive and full of material consequences for the 'non-Arvans themselves, too. Things are so placed that the German Labor Front has made it its aim to or-ganize within its ranks all of German race who are economically active, and the social and economic protection which proceeds from such membership is in no way to such membership is be regarded as slight.

#### Sees Business Hurt

"Of those economically active in Germany, only the group of 'non-Aryans' is in principle barred from membership. But how can these outsiders be placed on a level of equality with the rest in economic life without establishing some equanty with the rest in economic life without establishing some body to which they can be ad-mitted? This is only one instance, and perhaps not even of these ems which call for a new authoritative order.

"But it is repeatedly emphasized that the frontiers of 'Aryan' legis-lation have been laid down by the Reich government itself, the Reich Supreme Court only recently based itself on that well-known circular of the Reich Minister of the In-terior, which warned against the extension of the 'Aryan' legisla-tion to fields where it was not tion to fields where it was not intended to apply, and no less consideration must be given at this time of day to the text of the laws than to the divergencies which have been created in practical life.

to be embittered in us; rather should be a memory that the fallen heroes of our religious community fought and died in the conviction their blood was given for their German Fatherland.

An incalmighle number of decorations and distinctions are available to prove our part. And yet it is a fact that in most countries we had as Jews to bear a special burden, for we shared the fate and the losses of the belligerent nation, and in addition our exclusive loss

"If we have often been dubbed pacifists, with the word intended pacinists, with the work intenses, as a reproach, we can only answer that we do in fact perceive the maintenance of peace as a tremendous civilizing influence, and that we regard the devastation of war, measurable suffering of human beings as a calamity. But 1914 is evidence that in time of need we do our duty just the same as our fellow-citizens.

"We Jews have no influence on the decisions of the nations. The idea that has been repeatedly put forward in recent years, that Jewry incites to war, is utterly absurd. 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# Funeral Rites

#### Reichspresident Buried in Tannenburg War Memorial

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
TANNENBURG, Germany, Aug 7.—Guns boomed, muffled drums sounded, battalions marched, and military bands played dirges as of Field Marshal Paul von Hindenburg, Germany's hero was escorted to its final resting place in the Tannenburg war memorial, scene of Hindenburg's tri-umph over the Imperial Russian army.

Escorted by Reichswehr detachments over a sixty-mile lane of blazing torches, the funeral cor-tege reached Tannenburg at dawn. Aiready thousands of Germans had gathered there to pay their last respects to the dead war hero. last respects to the dead war hero. Special trains brought thousands of specially invited guests, includ-ing the entire diplomatic corps and several hundred newspaper-

The funeral began promptly at the stroke of eleven and was over in an hour. After Chancellor Hit-ler finished his eulogy, the coffin, ier inisated his eulogy, the coffin, borne on the shoulders of eight officers of the Reichswehr, was carried into the Tannenburg me-morial, where it will remain.

Chancellor Hitler praised the late Reichspresident for his life of Saldiarly dayston to the Commen

soldierly devotion to the German and hailed him for "having opened the door to the representa-tives of the German resurgence," a reference to the Nazi movement. "Twice in the life of a soldier honorable mention comes to him

alone-after a great victory and after death," Chancellor Hitler said.

He then reviewed in detail the life of the Field Marshal, beginning with his service in the war against Austria in 1866 and con-tinuing on to his World War ser-

vice.

"When the German people four years later remembered von Hindenburg's name the clouds of war hung over Europe," said the Chan-cellor. "In the worst of these cellor. "In the worst of these times Kaiser Wilhelm called upon von Hindenburg to take over the zuprame command of the army. Six days later guns were booming and three days later church bells rang in celebration of the victory of Tannenberg."

"Large areas of German land were saved from devastation, and from then on everybody in Ger-many had von Hindenburg's name on his lips-the man who saved the country and led the army from

victory to victory."

"The might of von Hindenburg and his army threw back the greatest military power in the world, here in East Prussia. Unfortunately, he was called too late to head all the armies of the Reich. Mevertheless, for two years more he inspired that army to unexampled victories.

"The unfortunate end of the war can under no circumstances be charged against him. It merely passed judgment on the inability

of the politicians of that day.
"When the war was over, a
leader returned to private life, whose name is indelibly written on the book of history."

#### 18.000 Workers Await Goods Strike

Call to Paralyze Industry Is Expected Hourly—Union Sceks Higher Wage

More than 18,000 members of the Knit Goods Union are awaiting the call for a general strike to paralyze the entire industry. The call is expected hourly.

Strike machinery is well geared, Strike machinery is Well geared, according to union officials, and ready to swing into motion. Meeting places for the strikers have been designated and circulars have been printed. Workers are demanding a ten to twenty per cent. increase in wages, according to the classification of work, and a reduction in hours from thirtyseven and a half to thirty-five per week.

Union men held a mass demon stration in front of the Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce, 66 Court street, yesterday in protest of that body's alleged sponsoring of com-pany unions. Leaflets warning workers to beware of "company unions" were distributed in mills and factories yesterday.

#### Painters Break Off Their Negotiations

It was announced last night that at was announced last night that representatives of the striking Brotherhood of Painters, Paper-hangers and Decorators District Council No. 9 have decided to off negotiations to settle their differences with the Association of Master Painters and Decorators, the employer's group. The negotiations were being held in the offices of Ben Golden, executive secretary of the Regional La-bor Board, at 45 Broadway.

The break in the conference between delegates of the two war-ring factions developed suddenly Earlier in the day, it was under stood, that the representatives had agreed to reconsider Golden's proposal which would give the paint-ers nine dollars for a seven-hour day. Golden's proposal also em-bodied the suggestion that the union and the employers negotiate with regard to collective bargaining.

"The Jewish printer "The Jewish printer Attali, whose children were all murdered by Arabs and who was severely injured, as was his wife, told me of the bestialities practiced by the Arabs during the pogrom, which he characterized as worse than the Inquisition in Spain.

"I myself saw two Jewish girls on the verge of death owing to the fact that pogromists cut off their breasts.

"The city is calm now, but the authorities are prepared for re-newal of rioting."

## Rosalsky Calls For Parley Halt In Poultry Row

#### Mediator Says Delay Will Be Benefit to All Factions Involved

The poultry situation was left hanging in mid-air today after Judge Otto Rosalsky, the Mayor's mediator, declared an indefinite moratorium on conferences among the factions in the poultry indus-try aimed at averting a threatened shochtim strike. At a short meeting at the Hotel

Commodore yesterday, Judge Ro-salsky said that the delay would be for the benefit of all. He indicated that a plan is being worked out which will satisfy all groups.

It was authoritatively learned after the meeting that a new plan is being prepared which necessi-tates secrecy for a short while. Announcement of the plan is ex-

Announcement of the plan is ex-pected next week. In the meantime, Judge Rosal-sky said, the status quo must be maintained. No strike, lockout or change in existing agreements and conditions must be made, he said.

In a short address summarizing is views, Judge Rosalsky voiced his determination that the wholesalers must shoulder the rabbinical supervision and kosher

"There must be such supervision as the rabbis declare neces-sary," he said, "and money must be allocated to pay the supervisors

The industry cannot stand the added cost," declared J. Sidney Bernstein, counsel to the whole-salers, "and the market owners will have to close down if the costs

of slaughtering and supervision are forced on them." Figures adduced by Leroy Pe-Figures adduced by Leroy Peterson, poultry code administrator, showing that supervision and slaughtering would cost about \$1,-125,000 per year, were contested by Arthur Simon, special adviser to the Mayor, and Louis J. Gribetz, coursel to the shoethir who does counsel to the shochtim, who dem-onstrated that \$600,000 would be the maximum cost.

Judge Rosalsky and Simon con-ferred with the Mayor early yes-terday, and it was reported that they reached an agreement on a plan to avert the poultry strike. The plan, the same one alluded to by Judge Rosalsky at the conference, was not divulged.
