Menace Seen Pogrom Kept Secret; In Attacks on Polish Jews

Official Attitude Brings Gloom as Hooligans Grow Bolder

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, Aug. 9.— Renewed
attacks against the Jews in Lodz
and in Warsaw today have aroused the gloomiest forebodings among Polish Jewry. Feeling is gaining ground that serious days are ahead ground that serious days are anead for Polish Jews, particularly in view of the passive attitude adopted by the Pilsudski regime toward the hooliganism of the anti-Semites.

In Warsaw, just as in Lodz, Jews were attacked on the streets by bands of anti-Semitic hooligans. It is feared that unless the government takes immediate and energetic steps to suppress anti-Jew-ish attacks, the hoodlum will be encouraged to resume attacks against the Jews on a wide scale.

Although the Nara party was suppressed, Nara hooligans are still at liberty and are daily grow-ing bolder and resuming their outrages against Polish Jews. Recent attacks had all the earmarks of organized and planned affairs. Nara bands appeared on streets frequented by Jews at hours when and disappeared.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency LONDON, Aug. 10 (Friday). Moslem attacks on the Jews i Algeria began last Tuesday and were kept secret until they reached such proportions in the city of Constantine last Saturday

that they could no longer be con-cealed, the Daily Herald charged cealed, the Daily Merau unasythis morning.
The massacres began in the town of Setif, about seventy-five miles west of Constantine, and continued there for three days because the French authorities would admit their existence, the Daily Herald asserted. Many Jews were killed there and Jewish homes and

shops were pillaged, the account continued. The Herald based its charges on disclosures in a letter from Setif received by the Paris newspaper

Populaire.
Existence of the riots prior to their outbreak in Constantine dis-proves reports that the massacres proves reports that the massacres were the result of the one-man invasion Saturday of a Moslem holy place by a drunken Jewish soldier, Elle Kalifa, and corroborates charges made by the London Times and other sources that the riots had been premeditated and fol-

lowed a careful plan of action.

According to the Herald the anti-Jewish rioting has been widespread and to a far greater extent than the authorities have admitted. The French paper, it was said, is about to publish a document on this of highly sensational nature.

Sabbath Cases Are Dismissed By Magistrate

Leather Association Had **Brought Complaints of** Sunday Selling

Magistrate Anna M. Kross dismissed two cases of Sabbath law violation yesterday in Tombs Court when Abraham Kaufman, 67 Mott street, and Leo Kaufman, 63 Mott street, were brought before her on the charge of keeping their leather stores one of Sur their leather stores open on Sun-

Herman Koenigsberg, counsel for the Jewish Sabbath Alliance of America, represented the defendants. On cross-examination he disclosed that the police had observed no sales on Sunday, that the defendants kept closed on Saturday and that no complaints had come from the neighborhood.

It was further pointed out by Mr. Koenigsberg that the com-plaint had been brought by the Metropolitan Leather and Findings Association, of which Louis D. Greenzweig is the organizer.

Abraham Kaufman, who is a partner in the firm of Banks and Kaufman, declared yesterday that Greenzweig was "working a Greenzweig was "working a racket." Although president of a synagogue, Greenzweig was using the Sabbath law to force Jewish dealers to keep closed Sunday and open Saturday, he declared, Kauf-man further stated that Green-zweig was being paid by the New Jersey group of leather and find-ing dealers in order to gain for themselves some of the trade that normally went to New York on Sunday.

Parley on Day of Rest

William Rosenberg, Secretary of the Jewish Sabbath Alliance, an-nounced yesterday that an attempt would be made to confer with the Metropolitan Association to see if it would agree to one day of rest in seven, whether it were Saturdays or Sundays. The conference was scheduled for last night.

Both the firms of Banks and Kaufman and that of the J. Miller Leather Company, the latter firm employing Leo Kaufman, stated they were opposed to joining the Association under any circum-stances because of the "underhand methods used by Greenzweig."

Greenzweig could not be reached for a statement yesterday. In a similar case last month against Charles Horowitz, Mott street leather dealer, Greenzweig claimed he was simply trying to enforce the rules laid down by the NRA and that no personal motives were in-



Union Men, Employers Meet in Fruitless **Knitgoods Parley**

Ten men were arrested yesterday when a large crowd of strik-ing workers of the knit goods in-dustry staged a demonstration in front of the Star Sportwear Cor-poration, 568 Broadway. Included among the arrested were Harry Duddstein, 32, of 180 Grand street extension, Brooklyn, who was charged with assault by Elsie

Several thousand pickets were on duty on Seventh avenue be-tween Thirty-fourth and Fortyfourth streets, Manhattan. An-other thousand pickets marched in Brooklyn. Trouble was also reported in North Bergen and West New York, N. J., where strikers stormed knit goods mills.

Representatives of employers and union men met at the office of Samuel Blumberg, counsel to the Metropolitan Knitted Textile Association, the employers group, at 200 Fifth avenue, but nothing was accomplished. Morris Dubinger, president of the Association, and David Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, of which the strik-ing Knit Goods Workers Union is a branch, attended.

Efforts should be made by intellectual and spirit-ual leaders and educators to curb this tendency among the film producers and directors, and to offer a constructive proposal to remedy this serious fault.

But what about the countless number of stupid, almost idiotic pictures that are offered for the entertainment of the American motion picture public, young and old, that give them distorted views of life, that are an insult to the intelligence of intelligent people, and that tend to lower the intellectual standard of the masses? The Interfaith Council will have no ground to object to these pictures and other forms of entertainment, although they are perhaps even more injuri-ous than the so-called salacious

It would seem that Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein could find some more urgent problems to bring to the attention of the Jews during the coming Holy Days than this film crusade.

Adjusting Our Lives

Jewish Contributions to American Music

"It should not be forgotten that while the form and type of our civilization are in the main English, into that English framework have been poured millions of individuals from the most artistically



gifted peoples of the western world, whose genius made up the great artistic past of Europe. Since the beginning of the century the Jews, to take a single example, have exerted an influence out of proportion to their numbers—in music both as patrons and performers, and in pictorial arts chiefly as patrons, though more recently

rather conspicuously as exhibitors as well."

In these words, the Jewish share in American art has been underlined in the report on the social trends in the United States. This highly important investigation has been carried out by eminent social scientists entrusted with this mission by former President Hoover.

A short time ago the Jewish Statistical Bureau featured some authentic data on Jewish musicality which fully confirmed the above opinion expressed by a distinguished student of American art.

The statistical material on Jews in American music has been obtained from a pecial study by a trained psychologist and sociolo-gist, Dr. K. Sward, published in "Journal of Applied Psychology."

Jewish Conductors and Virtuosi

In the season of 1932-33, out of 1048 players in the twelve best symphony orchestras in our country, twenty-five percent were Jews. The permanent conductors of these twelve orchestras in that season. and the guest conductors of the four foremost symphony societies (New York Philharmonic, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia) during the last thirteen seasons, numbered thirty-seven. Of these, seventeen, or forty-six percent, were Jewish.

By and large, about fifty percent of the violin virtuosi and of the maestros and the first violinists of American symphony or-chestras, and one-quarter to onehalf of the piano virtuosi, are

In connection with the revealing figures, these high percent1 ages, one has to remember that the Jews constitute only three and six-tenths percent of the total American population.

Jews as Composers

The recently issued manual "American Composers," compiled by the American section of the International Society for Contemporary Music, containing a record of musical works written between 1912 and 1932, has provided the investigators with a proposition tween 1912 and 1932, has provided the investigator with an approximate index of Jewish achievements in modern original American composition. Among the 145 prominent composers listed therein, twenty-one, or fourteen and five-tenths percent, are Jews.

Again, by another criterion of statistical measurement, out of the forty-two composer-artists, who appeared as soloists with the four first-class symphonic orchestras of America, enumerated above, ten, or about twenty-four

percent, were Jews.

Now, the study under discussion ascribes the fact that pro-ductivity in musical composition is less common among Jews than instrument success to the difficulty of economic survival as composer—and as Jew—plus the well-known historic dependence of composers on church and patronage.

Jews in Amusement Music Twenty-three amusement orchestras, principally in the city of New York, had a total of 596 play-ers, including 212 Jews, or thirty-

five and six-tenths percent.

Here again the propensity toward the string instruments is in strong evidence. Over half of the string section is manned by Jewish players, and nearly three-quarters of the violin assignments are in the hands of Jews. A promin-ent band leader reports, however, that a trend exists among Jewish violinists to retain themselves on various novelty instruments in view of an oversupply of violin-

The clarinet, trombone and horn are sections strikingly "non-Jew-ish." Among the players in amish." Among the players in am-usement orchestras, American birth is probably much more fre-quent than among symphonists and virtuosi, the investigator assumes.

A Brilliant Adjustment

"The majority of our Jewish virtuosi," says the author of the study, "sprang from Hungary, Poland and the Ukraine—countries richly steeped in musical culture." Now, environment, especially in early childhood, accounts for Jew-ish musicality to a degree not less than that of hereditary gifts and temperament. One-fifth of the entire Jewish

population in Eastern Europe emi-grated to the United States begrated to the United States be-tween 1882 and 1912. Musicians formed 21 percent of the Jewish immigrants in the liberal profes-sions at the time of entry.

The association between the urbanized mode of life and musical culture is one of the chief reasons which stimulated Jewish musicality intensly. Jewish people have been town-dwellers, historically, due to the urban nature of possible Jewish employment, and later due more to custom and preference: Now town civilization is peculiarly favorable for the devel-opment of exceptional musical tal-

Jewish musicality, thus, can be reduced to a brilliant and desir-able adjustment of natural gifts to social conditions and historical

forces. Preference for Violin

Certain social and habitual roots can also be found for Jewish fond-

ness for the violin.

The instrument is inexpensive and had a religious precedent in Hassidic usages. Last but not least, the professional demand is great for this instrument.

great for this instrument.
However established, the Jewish
preference for the violin could
have perpetuated itself by tradition. So, for example, innumerable Jewish parents expose their children to the violin in the belief that the child may "have it in him.'


Finally, provided the emotional Jewish temperament be taken for granted, the greater expressive-ness of the violin and opportunity for display conspire to make this instrument a Jewish favorite.

"As soon as I entered, the man-

ager came up and asked me whether I was a Jew," Rothschild declared. "My appearance is hardly 'Aryan.' I confirmed the fact that I was a Jew and he replied he was

Many Fine Points of Legality Enter Palestine Potash Šuit

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
LONDON, July 18.—Fine points of international law were involved in the recent lawsuit against the in the recent lawsuit against the Palestine Potash Company which the judges of the King's Bench adjudicated in favor of the de-fendants. In this case a concesrendants. In this case a concession granted by the Palestine government to Moses Novomeysky and his associates, organizers of the Palestine Potash Co., to exthe Palestine Potash Co., to ex-ploit the potash and other mineral deposits of the Dead Sea in Pal-estine was completely upheld by the court. The suit demanding the vacating of Novomeysky's concession in favor of the plaintiff

At the first hearing of the suit, on July 11, the plaintiff's lawyers stated their client's claims. They declared that in 1910 the Sultan of Turkey, then conquerors of Pales-tine, had conceded the plaintiff's sole right to extract salt from the waters of the Dead Sea. The defendants, on the other hand, had obtained a similar concession in 1930 from the High Commissioner of Palestine. Thus the dispute was which of the parties had prior rights to exploit the Dead Sea for mineral deposits.

mneral deposits.

Representing the plaintiffs were
Sir Leslie Scott, Gordon Alchin,
Quintin Hogg and Kenneth Diplock. Lawyers for the defendants
were Sir William Jowitt, J. W. Morris, Leonard Stein and Patrick Morris, Leonard Stein and Patrick Devlin. Attorney - General Sir Thomas Inskip and Kenelm Preedy watched the proceedings for the Crown. Mr. Justice Roche presided.

An adjournment of one week was granted to the plaintiffs when Sir Leslie Scott asked for more time to peruse a number of docu-ments which had just come into his hands.

These documents, Sir Scott stated, were important evidence dealing with the point raised by the defense that the English Court had no jurisdiction to deal with the case. He added that as the case included a claim to real property in a foreign country he must admit that the action could not be maintained in an English court unless the plaintiffs' lawyers could find in the new documents some contractual or equitable tie be-tween the parties that would give inrisdiction

Trial Resumed July 17

On the resumption of the trial on July 17 Sir Scott declared that, after studying the new documents he had come to the conclusion that he could not resist the plea of no jurisdiction which the defense had raised. Therefore, he added, on behalf of his clients he must consent to judgment.

At this point Sir Jowitt adduced evidence that the defendants had carried on business with success for several years, that it had be-come desirable for their company to extend their operations to the ital, and that the claim outstanding against them was clearly detrimental

Sir Jowett also pointed out that the British government had never recognized the plaintiffs' conces-sion. Moreover, he stated the de-fense's plea of no jurisdiction had been before the plaintiffs since December 1932, yet the latter had persisted in their claim. To de-fend this lawsuit, the defendants had been obliged to incur great expenses in bringing eminent law-yers from Turkey, Palestine and Paris, Sir Jowett added.

Paris, Sir Jowett added.

"Now the plaintiffs consent to judgment," the defense lawyer continued. "But my clients must have the action dismissed generally and not on the narrow ground that there was no jurisdiction to deal with real property abroad. The plaintiffs' claim was entirely unded, and I ask that the a tion be dismissed generally, with costs on the higher scale declared in favor of the defendants."

After a brief recess Justice Roche pronounced the decision. He said that as no evidence or argument had been put before him gument had been put before him he would simply give judgment for the defendants with costs. Ad-mitting that he did not know enough about the case, since the facts had not been gone into ex-tensively, the justice added that he could not make a definite order himself on the question of costs on the higher scale. However, he directed that the Taxing Master should consider the position and if in his discretion it was found proper to do so the Master should allow costs to the higher scale.

Aside from the final findings by Instice Roche lawvers here show deep interest in the points of in-ternational law involved. In replying to the plea of "no juris-diction" at the July 11 hearing, Sir Scott admitted that the con-cession granted by the Sultan to his clients deal with real property, or what in international was called "immovables." In In view of this, Sir Scott said, the English courts had no jurisdiction over immovable property situated in another country.

"There was a demise of land con "There was a demise of land con-tiguous to the Dead Sea for set-ting up a factory," Sir Scott con-tinued, "and I am obliged to ad-mit that the court has no jurisdiction unless I can establish a contractual or equitable obligation on the defendants which the plaintiffs are seeking to enforce. No pleading has been put in of such contractual or equitable obligation because my clients had not had enough knowledge of the facts."

It was then that Sir Scott made

a request for a week's adjourn-ment, so as to study the new documents secured by the plaintiffs and in which he indicated a relationship of equitable obligation might be discovered.

Movomeysky, who is a Jewish chemical engineer, graduated from Russian technical schools and who Russian technical schools and who fied from Russia after the Bol-shevik Revolution, has been in Palestine since 1918. After many attempts he obtained the concession in 1930 and organized the Palestine Potash Ltd., of which he is managing director.

German Day N. Y. Bank Denies Giving Nazis Funds

Secretary Sends Letter to Anti-Nazi League, Which Had Received Inquiries

Denial of reports that the Central Savings Bank of New York had contributed funds to the Nazi movement in this country has been made by August Sidler, secretary of the institution, in a letter to Ezekiel Rabinowitz, secretary of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League.

The letter came in reply to in-quiries made by the League, be-cause of the numerous complaints received by the League office that such contributions had been made. Officers of the bank are largely of German extraction. Mr. Sidler's letter reads in part:

"We beg to acknowledge receipt of your inquiry in which you state that you are in receipt of many inquiries as to whether or not it is true that this institution has any affiliations with the Nazi movement in this country or abroad and whether any of its officials have made contributions to this cause.

"We appreciate the care which you exercise to avoid giving mis-leading information and, accordingly, pleased to inform you that neither this institution nor any of its officials have any affiliations or sympathy with the Nazi movement and have not made and are not inclined to make any contributions in support of it.

"It is quite inconceivable that any such affiliation or sympathy should exist. You can, therefore, safely dismiss inquiries indicating a belief that they might exist."

Religious Rackets Mulct Thousands

Prev on Jews' Best Instincts Hits Police Methods Synagogue Raids in 'Racket' While City Law Protects Them

(Continued from Page One) clause permitting the "congregation" to carry on charity and re-

lief work. From this point on the method of operation varies little. An office is opened, usually on the lower Sham religious services are held once a week or less frequently.

In the meantime, at some disin the meantime, at some distance from the office, a "boiler room" is opened. This is the technical name for a bare, obscure garret where a battery of telephones is installed to carry on the real operations.

Fictitiously Listed

The telephones are listed under a fictitious name. From here "coxeys" do their work. The "coxeys" are the high-power salesmen of the firm. More than half of them have been found to have court records, usually for fraud and obtaining money on false pre-

The next step is to obtain the name of a judge to employ in soliciting funds from prospective victims. Usually the prospective victims. Usually the name of an out-of-town judge, whose last name corresponds to that of a prominent New York jurist, is used. The judge is either paid for use of his name or duped into giving permission.

one case it was found that "coxeys" were using the name of a commissioner of deeds, equiv-alent to a notary public, which corresponded with that of the New York Police Commissioner.

"Commissioner O'Ryan asked me to call you for a donation. . . . "
the "coxeys" then told their victims over the telephone. And it was entirely legal.

High-Powered Salesmen

Using the Blue Book and other directories, the "coxey" calls a prominent person, tells him that Commissioner Jones or Judge Jones asked him to call for a donation to the . . . Then follows a high-powered talk on the great work the charity organization is doing. The fact that it is a relidoing. The fact that it is a reli-gious corporation is never men-tioned.

Jews have been found to make the best "caps." ("Cap" is the name applied to a prospective victim). In the first place, the Jew is indiscriminately charitable by tradition. Secondly, many Jews, striving to be "regular" and fit into the community, think that responding to a 'phone solicitation is the "regular" thing to do.

Let us take a typical case. The "coxey" 'phones a "cap." "Good day, sir," he opens, "I am calling for Judge Jones. He has asked me to call you for a donation to

me to call you for a donation to our charity. We are engaged in helping the poor. We give out bread and coal, we..." and so on. Levine, our fictitious "cap," promises \$10. Immediately the "coxey" 'phones the office from where a messenger is sent out. These messengers are often young rabbis or rabbinical students.

The Split

The Split
The messenger arrives at the victim's place of business with surprising speed. If the donation is forthcoming, the messenger keeps ten per cent., twenty-five to forty-five per cent. goes to the "coxey," and the rest to the pro-

There is no honor among the thieves. The "coxey" calls the promoters to find out whether the "cox" "car" "ca "came across." If the promoter says he didn't, the "coxey" checks up by 'phoning the "cap" again.

A pretense of doing relief work is kept up by handing out free lunches and, sometimes coal. It was found on investigation that in almost all cases the food and coal

were not bought but received by donation or solicitation.

In the meantime the Department of Welfare can do practically nothing. On occasion, the "boller rooms" are raided on some pretext or another with the aid of the district attorney's office, but the racket cannot be wiped out.

While the method described shove is the usual mode of solicitation, circular letters also are used. The letterheads never mention that the organizations are incorporated as Jewish congregations. Some even mention that they are non-sectarian. A nonsectarian Jewish congregation!

Sometimes Falls in Net Once in a while a promoter over-steps himself. In his self-assur-ance he uses an official's name permission, or some other error which pushes him over the pale of legality next to which he hovers so precari-

Then the Department of Welfare tract the Department of Weifare cracks down. The promoter is taken to court and penalized. But it has been found that promoters usually open rackets under different names immediately afterward.

In the case of Rabbi Ja Bienefeld, connected with Downtown Center of Relief, Her-man N. Levin, Welfare Department investigator, charges the Rabbi said over the 'phone that he was a certain official. The person who was asked for a solicitation, Levin said, recognized the voice. An arrest followed, and the case is now going through the process of numerous adjournments.

A Typical Charter

All these organizations are in-corporated as Jewish congregations. A typical charter reads in part:

"Purpose: To congregate on Sabbath and other days of the week for the purpose of prayer and religious work and to voluntarily aid . . . its members, coreligionists, and other persons in

The letterheads of the four or-ganizations were inspected in an extensive Jewish Daily Bulletin investigation. None of them mentioned religious affiliation. One said

Two "honorary officers" of one group recently asked to have their names removed from the letterhads. They were Senator Rob-ert F. Wagner and David Marcus. Neither of these could be reached to discover their reasons for be-coming dissatisfied with the organization.

Arrests Scored by Magistrate

Police tactics used in the ar- defendants. asked Magistrate rests of four men charged with Kross to deny the request for fursoliciting funds for charitable purposes under false pretenses were scored by Magistrate Anna M. Kross when the accused were arraigned yesterday in the First District Magistrate's Court. The ar-rests were part of a city-wide campaign against charity rackets intituted by city authorities.

Promise Arrest Urges Jews Turn Of 2 in Medical School Swindle

Probers Believe Racket Has Been National in Its Scope

Two arrests are expected today as a climax to an exposure of racketeers preying on Jewish premedical students who seek trance into bona fide medical schools. Professor W. C. McTavish, chairman of the Committee on Recommendations to Medical and Dental Schools of New York University, has presented evidence of such racketeering to Maurice G. Wahl, Assistant District Attorney, it was revealed yesterday.

Evidence in addition to that presented by Professor McTavish kept pouring into Wahl's office yesterday, a fact which led officials to believe the racket is of national scope. Wahl declared he will conduct a thorough investigation.

Complete evidence has been gathered against two persons, one of whom represents himself as a certified public accountant, the other as a Georgia professor. The two have been working in New York among Jewish students.

Got \$500 From One Man

The men have been asking Jew-ish students for specified sums, in return for which they have guaranteed the students would be admitted into good medical colleges. According to Professor McTavish this racket has been abetted by unfounded rumors that many medical colleges discriminate against

One of the cases disclosed yes terday was that of a nineteen-year-old youth who was induced to turn over \$500 for which he was told he would receive entrance into either Long Island Universit Medical School or Bellevue Med Island University cal School.

The Jewish student's parents school despite the fact that the boy's scholastic record was not of the best. When the two men prom-ised to place him in a college, the father, a clothing contractor of limited means, borrowed the \$500 from his daughter and handed over the money.

The contract between the stu dent and the men stipulated that cal school, the money would be returned. The racketeers, of course, did not keep their promises and the money has not been accounted for, according to Detective Harry Leichtblau, who is assisting Wahl. Also working on the case is Dr. Perry M. Lichtenstein, medical adviser to the District Attorney.

Another case, not unlike the first, was recently reported to Wahl. This one concerns a Jewish student who studied in a German medical school. Upon his arrival here for his vacation at the end of one year, his parents refused to permit him to return because of the Hitler regime.

This student's record was rather poor so the two men now de-manded \$900. At the same time they wired to the student who had previously paid \$500, advising him to "keep his mouth shut." The to "keep his mouth shut." The student, although not in the best of circumstances, managed to scrape together the money and turned over \$900. A hearing into these racketeer

Iushewitz Last night at the Brooklyn Little Last night at the Brooklyn Little Theatre, "City Called Heaven," Richard Rohman's "fabulous comedy," which takes a group of cafe habitues to Heaven for eternal life and at the end makes them plead with God for the return of death, was presented before an audience composed in the main of people concerned with the stage.

Using the cafe, strikingly like the Cafe Royale, as a springboard, Mr. Rohman projects his charac-ters, many of whom are quite recognizable and may be found any evening at their customary tables at the Royale, and others who are composites of Royale habitues, composites of Royale nabitues, into Heaven where they have been granted the gift of life eternal. But to this Heaven they bring their lusts, their schemes, nefarious and otherwise, and their pergonalities

Freed of the fear of death, they are at first exceedingly grateful and bask in the freedom. But the thrill wears off, and they still plot and scheme and carry on as before, only the fear of death is gone. Dullness descends on them and when they realize what they are in for, they organize a march to the throne of God, demanding the restoration of death. After all pleas fail, the pleading of the cafe prostitute, the only one to resent from the start the gift of immortal life, succeeds, and the Gates of Heaven open wide for the disillusioned throng. They are permitted to leave Heaven, and death once more reigns in the kingdom of the living.
This is the bald outline of the

play. It must be seen, however, to realize the richness of dialogue, the complete realization of character, the lyric simplicity of mood, and the possibilities conjured up by the fantastic situations as en visaged by Mr. Rohman. Portrayals are Excellent

Strikingly original in content and done with a boldness that must have left the commercial Broadway theatre agents gasping, Mr. Rohman takes his group of assorted characters from the cafe to heaven, to the throne of God, and then back, to the cafe, perhaps.

The characters of the prostitute Sappho, played by Hazel O'Connell Hellsped, the eternal schemer and low theatrical agent, portrayed by You Adler and the theatre owner Willmer, played by Robert Harri-son, stand out as the most completely realized in the play. Seldom has there been such a sympathetic and honest portrayal of a prosti-tute. The plea voiced by Sappho and her explanation of her path in life are extremely moving, without evidence of stupid sentimentality. As for Hellsped, the "schemer," he is probably a com-

For the rest of the cast there is little to say. The lines are spoken in a wooden fashion that deprives them of their worth. Cues were missed and if characters are pro-jected, it is despite of the actors and not because of them. Miss O'Con-nell, Mr. Adler and Mr. Harrison carry the burden of the play on their capable shoulders. Earle Mc-Gill directed and staged the play. The settings were designed by Jack Hertz.

Mr. Rohman's play is said to be destined for Broadway. What re-ception it can expect from the commercial theatre is questionable. If it does get there, that famous street will see a bold, fresh pre-sentation of a fascinating theme, truthful and direct. Can Broadway stand it?

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Aug. 9.—The Hitler government, in an amnesty decree today, will free from 8,000 to 10,today, will free from 8,000 to 10,000 minor criminal offenders and political prisoners. Hitler will deliver a plea for popular support on August 17, two days before the scheduled plebiscite on his policies, it was also learned today.

It was indicated that no Communists will be liberated. The decree will affect most of the Nazi storm troops incarcerated in con-nection with the alleged Roehm

Offenses made subject to am-nesty by Hitler's decree include: acis arising from overzealousness in the Nazi cause, acts against the national prestige if they were not deliberate, and slander against the Hitler government

Prisoners convicted of treason, violence and terrorism will not be

Observers saw the amnesty decree as a move by Hitler for popular support in the August 19 plebiscite

Hitler accompanied his decree with an explanation that it was issued as a mark of generosity to make memorable the accession of a new chief executive

in every public square. Nazis in
towns throughout Germany are inviting families without radios to come to their homes to hear the Hitler's "election campaign"-

'Shechita' After a Long Prohibition

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Aug. 9.—Reichsminis-er of the Interior Dr. Wilhelm Frick today issued an order per-mitting shechita, the killing of mitting shechita, the killing of animals for food according to the orthodox Jewish ritual, in Upper Silesia, which is a plebiscite area under the control of the League of Nations.

Shechita was prohibited in Ger many soon after the Nazis came into power on the ground that it was cruel to the animals. Display-ing the utmost solicitude for animals, the Nazis not only forbade shechita, but imposed unusually heavy prison terms for Jewish shochtim and butchers accused of practicing shechita.

While nothing is mentioned in the order as to the reasons actuating Dr. Frick, the successive defeats suffered by the Nazi government when it attempted to exter anti-Jewish measures to Upper Silesia are no doubt at the bottom of this unworted display of Nazi

generosity.

Jewish districts on the outskirts of the city appealed to the mili-tary forces for protection.

Anxiety is felt over the fate of isolated Jewish families in the remote hinterland of Algeria, on farms and in little townships where they are surrounded by savage Arab tribes. It is believed that most of the isolated Jewish families were exterminated Arabs.

Funerals of Jewish dead were held today and passed off quietly. Twenty-seven victims of the p groms were buried in the Jewish cemetery amid the deep mourning of the Jews of the city. Heavy detachments of Senegalese troo guarded the funeral processions.

The Jewish Sabbath Alliance of The Jewish Sabbath Alliance of America will renew its efforts to force the Board of Education to postpone the opening of New York's public schools from September 10 to 12 because of the Jewish New Year, it was announced yesterday by William Ros enberg, executive secretary of the organization.

"We will not stop our campaig to have the schools closed for the to have the schools closed for the New Year. As a last resort, we will appeal to all Jewish parents to keep their children from the schools should they be open dur-ing the Holy Days. We shall also ask Jewish teachers to absent themselves from their classrooms," declared Rosenberg. This state-ment is a complete reversal of the stand expressed by him on July 25. Each deal, except those involving the purchase of land, must be first certified by the German Consulate in Jerusalem, otherwise the acquired property becomes the session of the Reichsbank.

The order issued yesterday by the Nazi government stated that Jews still in Germany will be permitted to transfer funds to Pale tine up to 50.000 marks (approximately \$19,000 marks (approxi-mately \$19,000) by transferring their accounts to Haavarah, Ltd., of Tel Aviv. Two-thirds of the amount will be paid out when the owner arrives in Palestine.

However, the regulations made it clear that the money must be used to settle German export bills.
The remaining third is to be paid out in German marks. This means that the Nazis will benefit by receiving sterling for its inflated

Sixty Jewish pioneer settlers, including a delegation of the Jewish National Workers Alliance and fifty prospective settlers, departed for Poland and Palestine yester-day on the Gdynia-America liner Pulaski.

The ten representatives of the Alliance will stop in Poland for nine days to make a study in Gro-chow, Lwow and other centers, of the methods of training "chalut-zim" or young pioneers for settle-ment in Palestine. Poland has been sending the largest number of set-tlers to Palestine in recent years and the American organization is seeking to introduce in America the Polish training course used to prepare young men for life in Pal-

From Poland the delegation will go to Palestine, where it will be received by Histadruth, the Workreceived by Histadruth, the Work-ers Labor Organization of Pales-tine. A four-week survey will be made of all the possibilities for colonization and a report made to the American organization. fifty Jewish passengers on the Pul-aski who are accompanying the delegation will seek to purchase orange plantations for immediate settlement.

"In the past year there has been a remarkable increase in the number of American Jews leaving for Palestine," said Sol Bernstein, head of the Alliance delegation and secretary of the New York Commit-tee. "This may be attributed to the great strides made in Palesindustry and agriculture. Conditions in Germany, moreover, have emphasized the necessity for build-ing up a Jewish homeland in Palestine, and American Jewish youth particularly is responding to this
