Histadruth Assails British Stand On Non-Jewish Illegal Entrants

While Government 'Turns the Screws' on Jews, Arab Laborers Flood Holy Land, Labor Head Reports—Damascus Papers List 35,000 Syrian Immigrants

TEL AVIV, Aug. 3.—Severe criticism of the government's inaction against the Jewish illegal immigrants, while it "turned the screws" on Jews who entered the country unauthorized, featured a meeting here of the council of the Histadruth, the general Jewish Labor federation in Palestine. The council discussed labor and immigration problems and also the Arab Ussishkin project of the Jewish National Fund.

Speaking of Arab labor from other countries, H. Frumkin, head of the Central Labor Exchange, declared that the figure of thirty to thirty-five thousand of such immigrants as reported in the Arab press of Damascus was not exaggerated. He said that they have come in illegally. He cited a few examples, pointing out that 1,400 Hauranis from Syria are working in Petah Tikva while residing in the surrounding Arab village of Haifa, he said, there are 1,200 on road and house construction alone, and including porters and others, he estimated that the number of 2,000 in all. In this city, a count of 387 Arab laborers in the building materials industry showed that 278 were Hauranis.

Work Admits Many
He then delivered his criticism of the government's inertia in dealing with these illegal immigrants. He also dismissed as fallacious the government's argument of a possible economic crisis among the Jews here. There is still a huge reserve capacity for Jewish labor in plantations, agriculture and industry, he said.

Mr. Frumkin also discussed particulars and highlights of an exhaustive survey he made in regard to government revenues, of imports and exports, industry, and of State and private activity. During 1934, he pointed out, Jewish activity had increased enormously. He mentioned that the number of certified labor newcomers had increased only six per cent. from January to June. He analyzed the economic absorptive capacity of the country, showing how apallingly out of touch with the crying demand for labor were the actual labor immigration schedules granted.

Demand World Wide Drive
Berni Katznelson, Labor leader, discussed the Kfar Ussishkin project. Citing the great importance of the necessity of supporting the Jewish National Fund development. He also paid a tribute to Menahem Ussishkin, after whom the village is being named.

Several other members contributed to the debate on immigration, some of whom demanded a worldwide public Jewish campaign to urge increased immigration into Palestine. Thus, he pointed out, the Jewish Agency's efforts in its negotiations with the British authorities would be supplemented.

35,000 Syrians Enter Holy Land in Quest of Work

DAMASCUS, Syria, Aug. 3.—Commenting on the severe economic stress in the Hauran district of Syria, local newspapers report that some thirty to thirty-five thousand Hauranis have immigrated to Palestine as a result of the depression. Within the past few

months, the papers add, large sums of money, aggregating 400,000, have been remitted to their families left behind in Syria by the Hauran immigrants, who are experiencing a mild sort of prosperity since settling in the Holy Land. Some have even sent for their wives and children.

Another 10,000 Jebel Druze farmers of Syria have migrated to Palestine because of similar economic conditions in their native land, it is stated.

In addition, thousands of Egyptians and Transjordanians are slipping across the Palestinian border illegally. The High Commissioner of Palestine is reported to be taking action against the illegal entrants. He has ordered that an enumeration be taken of the non-indigenous Arabs working in the country who are suspected of entering the country unperceived within recent months.

Arab Traps Await Illegal Immigrants

One Party of 75 Jews Falls Into Self-Appointed Spies' Clutches

HAIFA, July 31.—The self-appointed task of Arabs and Bedouins, known as "the secret service" and in the Hebrew press as "the Arab militia," in trapping and handing over to the Palestine authorities parties of Jews and Jewesses who attempt to enter the country without authority, is becoming into a full-time job for them.

Seventy-five Jews were captured near Wadi Hawareth while landing from a sailing vessel, which left them stranded. Tulkarm Arabs were prominent among the spies. Further parties were arrested between Haifa and Acre, it is reported.

Authorities are preventing the volunteer guards from carrying out their work of man-hunting wherever possible.

Mutli Organ Attacks Arabs' Labor Combine

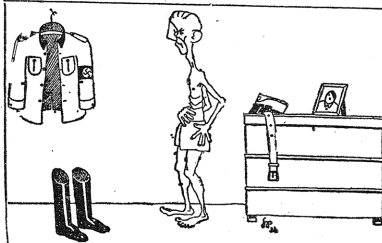

Polish Flood Victims' Suffering Revealed by JTA Investigator

WARSAW, Aug. 1.—Terrible distress in the flood-stricken areas of Poland has been found by an investigator for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, it was revealed today.

In the Jewish quarter Pieklo, in the town of Nowy Sancz, there are about 350 Jewish families living in desperate poverty. They are all unemployed artisans, pack-carriers, etc. The Jewish quarter looks like a devastated cemetery. The hovels in which those people lived are in ruins. The streets are heaped high with mud carried in by the floods, making them impassable. These 350 families have been given shelter in the synagogues and Talmud Torah schools.

Over 2,000 Jews have been rendered homeless. The local people, Jews and non-Jews alike, are doing their utmost to help, but they are unable to cope with the great need.

The situation is equally desperate in the districts of Jaslo Mielec and Milnowa.

In many places the wells are polluted.

The Jewish communities of Sandomez and Szczuczyn have ap-

pealed to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency to make public opinion aware that there are hundreds of Jewish families in these places absolutely destitute and starving.

The general population is helping the Jewish sufferers. In Grzybow, Madan, Pankowa, a non-Jewish brewery owner, has taken in fifty-two children from Nowy Sancz. In many villages the peasants are sharing their bread with the Jewish refugees.

The board of the Warsaw Jewish Community has decided to issue an appeal to the Jewish population of Poland to help the flood victims.

The Rescue Committee in Warsaw includes as Jewish representatives the president of the Representative Council of the Warsaw Jewish Community, M. Trochenheim, the vice-president of the Jewish Community, M. Lerner, and M. Stueckgold, member of the board of the Warsaw Jewish Community.

The Jewish Community of Warsaw has undertaken to raise a considerable sum for the rescue work, and it is calling upon all the other Jewish Communities in the country to do the same.

Egyptian Jewry To Honor Rambam

Will Celebrate 800th Anniversary of His Birth in Cairo March, 1935

CAIRO, July 29.—Preparations are being made here to celebrate the 800th anniversary of the birth of the Egyptian Jew, Moses ben Maimon, or Maimonides. A committee has been formed to take measures for the observance of the birthday here in March, 1935.

Joseph Cattaul Pasha, president of the Jewish Historical Research Society of Egypt, and Chief Rabbi Haim Nahum Effendi, have selected Dr. Max Meyerhoff, leading researcher in medical practices of Islamic times, Dr. Israel Wolfensohn, young scholar in Jewish history, and Dr. Isaac H. Lurie, Islamic times, and Dr. Isaac H. Lurie, and Moshe Zanna, as members of the committee.

The celebrations will be held in the Royal Opera House or another large hall in Cairo. The language services will be held also. Rambam's manuscript on "Kitab Al-Akaki," dealing with medicine, is to be printed, and other publications are contemplated.

Poland Sent Largest Quota of Immigrants To Palestine in 1934

WARSAW, Aug. 5.—The Palestine Emigration Office here is informed from Jerusalem that in the course of the last year the largest number of immigrants arriving in Palestine came from Poland. Of the total number of 147,475 immigrants who arrived in the country during the first half-year of 1934, 5,035 came from Poland. The number is expected to increase in the second half-year, and it is believed that in the course of the whole of the present year there will be about 19,000 immigrants arriving in Palestine from Poland.

5 Jews Are Candidates For Jerusalem Council

JERUSALEM, July 31.—A tentative list of nominations for the Jewish bloc of six councilors on the forthcoming Jerusalem Municipal Council, to which elections are expected shortly, consists of A. Elmalah (Sephardic Jews), I. Ben-Zvi (Labor Party), Joseph Hochman, bank manager (Sephardic and Agudath Israel), Daniel Auster, lawyer (General Zionists), Samuel Eden (Agudath Israel), and one other, still to be decided upon. It is assumed that the Labor Party may not agree to a united Jewish ticket unless it receives one more representative.

J. N. F. Receipts Increase

JERUSALEM, Aug. 6.—Receipts for the first half-year of the current fiscal year amounted to 180,410 pounds, reports Jewish National Fund headquarters here. This total compares with 129,528 pounds collected during the same period (October-June) in 1932 and 1933.

Some would call it poetic justice, but the boys around the district office are not at all sure of it anything—they're too busy laughing.

The assistant D. A.'s have voluntarily imposed upon themselves a mission to laugh only at the most suspicious occasions. Most of them lean to robustness, and their guffaws have frequently rocked their shaky building at 137 Centre street.

This shows how deserving of hearty laughter was the following case.

The D. A.'s have for years been combating charity rackets, hampered by an outdated ordinance which practically legalized flagrant swindles. They have been obliged to seize upon other laws to break up these rackets.

Since a telephone charity racket usually involves telephone solicitation with the unauthorized use of prominent persons' names, the district attorneys have prosecuted under the civil rights act, which makes it illegal to represent oneself as another person.

An arrest is made, and it is usually difficult to establish a prima facie case in the hearing before a magistrate. When the district attorneys are called upon to hold a man for Special Sessions he regards himself as fortunate.

Well, it seems that a magistrate in one of these cases considered the district attorney and the man held for Special Sessions. As luck would have it, Judge Cauldwell of Queens was the presiding justice.

The assistant district attorney tried his damndest to show how the accused had misrepresented himself over the telephone. Judge Cauldwell mocked the attempts of the assistant D. A.—the assistant tried this story—to establish the identity of the voice over the phone.

Judge Cauldwell succeeded in convincing one other justice and the case was thrown out of court. The assistant D. A. returned to his office much chagrined, for this was the fourth case his office had lost in a group of sixty-eight.

Sometime later a Rabbi Caldwell in New Jersey who had once been a justice of the peace opened operations in New York City, phoning suckers for contributions to his "charity."

"This is Judge Caldwell," he would say, "and I'll fix up cases for you if you contribute. You know, I never forgot a friend or a favor."

He was not long before traffic violators were calling the rabbi justice and asking to have tickets quashed. Justice Cauldwell was very much annoyed.

"Say," Judge Cauldwell is reported to have asked an assistant D. A.—the same one who had lost the case in his court—when you going to do about this guy giving the impression he is a judge and gettin me mixed up in this charity racket at the theatre.

"That's why the assistant D. A.'s are laughing today and that's why some would call it poetic justice." —D. L. S.

Jewish Actor Gets Big Role In Polish Film

Jonas Turkow First of Race to Be So Honored

(J. A. Special Correspondent) WARSAW, AUG. 15.—Jonas Turkow, Jewish actor and stage director, has been invited to play one of the principal roles in a new Polish motion picture called "The Young Generation." The invitation is the first ever extended to a Jewish actor by Polish film officials.

Turkow made his first appearances on the Jewish stage in 1917, usually in companies led by his brother Sigmund, who founded the "Warsaw Jewish Comedy and Drama Theatre." In 1924 Jonas Turkow was one of the actors in the Jewish movie "Pledge" and played the principal role in "The Saint" in 1925.

Jonas Turkow also translated a number of theatrical works, published a brochure entitled "Guide for Dramatic Circles" (1924) and is the author of a number of articles in the Jewish press. He was one of the editors of "The Jewish Stage," organ of the Jewish Actors' League of Poland.

Critical Moments

Leslie Howard the Detective
Leslie Howard, one of the better English actors, whose commanding stage presence has caused a general increase of bile trouble among American actors, returns to the screen in a slight comedy called "The Lady Is Willing," which bears the imprint of Columbia Pictures. My research bureau reports that this picture was made in England about two years ago under the direction of Gilbert Miller, the theatrical producer. It may not be classed as a major achievement, but it is a credit to Mr. Miller or Mr. Howard.

When last seen, Howard played opposite Ann Harding in a screen version of the play "The Sign of the Cross," which was one of the truly great pictures of the year. Such a vehicle as "The Lady Is Willing" is somewhat of an anti-climax but even at that the current offering at the Palace is better than the average film. The cause for regret lies in Mr. Miller's inability to get the most out of the possibilities offered by the story.

The plot "The Lady Is Willing" concerns a private detective, Albert Latour, played suavely by Mr. Howard. He seems that Gustav Dupont (Cedric Hardwicke), a French swindler, has been, up-to-date, unusually successful in separating respectable people from their money. Three of the dupes who fall to see any humor in being robbed here Latour to trap Dupont. But, however, it is not until he has been taken in by Dupont's financial manipulations and is willing to undertake the task. He finds that Dupont, who is not beyond a bit of marital philandering, is very eager to have his wife (Binnie Barnes) sign her name to a deed. Latour decides to kidnap Mme. Dupont and hold the lady for ransom for a sum sufficient to reimburse both Latour's clients and himself. He is successful in capturing her, but makes a cinematic mistake of falling in love with her. Before he can collect the ransom the lady escapes and Gustav Bolton, the detective story, does not let you down so easily. There is a divorce and Mme. Dupont becomes Mme. Latour and Dupont for various reasons pays back his stranded client.

With Mr. Howard in the cast the acting is lively and amusing. The supporting roles are handled easily and skillfully. All the ingredients for a really fine comedy are on hand but the director and scenario writer have failed to mould them into a lifelike sketch. "The Lady Is Willing" is a picture of missed possibilities.

House of Greed
Down at the Acme on Fourteenth street—certainly the house showing the most unusual pictures in the city—the attraction this week is another picture production, entitled "The House of Greed." It is an Amkino production and coming from the land of the Soviet it is of course a picture of the customary amount of propaganda.

Although the acting of V. R. Gardin in the leading role is good and although the photography of settings are superior to our domestic brand, the story itself is woefully weak and unconvincing. "House of Greed" is out to be a slam at the cruelty of the rich landowners who were powerful in Russia in the middle of last century. It shows how the landowner, played by Gardin, sends his sons to Siberia, ruins his nieces, cheats his peasants and acts generally as an evil influence upon the people, finally overthrown by the sincere protestations of his sweet niece. The final scene pictures him galloping off into the night, a broken man.

Flourishing Coin-Box Swindle Mulcts Thousands in New York

Legitimate Charities Suffer From Tactics of Predatory—"Muscling In" Causes Feuds Among Racketeers Preying on Cullible

By DANIEL L. SCHORE One of the most widespread forms of charity racketeering today—a form which is especially prevalent in closely settled Jewish communities—is the coin-box swindle.

Agents make the rounds of stores and apartment houses asking the occupants to take one of the coin boxes. There is the usual appeal to the charitable instinct, and many storekeepers and apartment tenants take the boxes.

Periodically, the agent calls and empties the box. Most stray pennies find their way into these receptacles, and it is astonishing to what large sums pennies can amount in a year.

It must be noted that many reputable charities employ this method of solicitation, and we are here concerned only with the fraudulent racketeering who compose the boxes in the coin-box agencies.

Some storekeepers are paid commissions to display the coin boxes in their stores. The agent takes a sizeable "cut," the promoter takes even more, and the swindler racketeer who composes the boxes in the coin-box agency is negligible if, indeed, the promoters keep up any pretense of contributing to the cause for which the money is donated.

Most of the coin-box agents are versatile and carry boxes and receipts for many charities. Occasionally an agent commits the error of displaying a person the receipt for a different charity that mentioned on the box. It is all the same to the agent.

A racketeer has sprung up around the coin-box business, and the right to operate in certain sections is often closely contested by rival swindlers. In many cases,

an agent sells his "route" to somebody else, and then the successor to the business takes off, making the honest visitors to empty the boxes.

Some agents, to mollify the skeptical, forge permits to paste on the boxes. Others take advantage of the exemption from the necessity for permits offered by Section 198a of the Code of Ordinances, the much debated paragraph which exempt charities organized as religious corporations from the necessity of procuring Department of Public Welfare licenses.

War Over Territorial Rights
Violent feuds and, it is reported, one or two murders, have resulted from owners where promoters have had the temerity to "muscle in" on districts where other promoters have established their exclusive right to milk the public by the coin-box "method."

Just how far charity racketeers have gone toward being institutionalized is indicated by the fact that one enterprising person on the East Side opened a school for panhandlers. This person, who is well known on the lower East Side, also made a side-line of "muscling in" on "high pressure telephone solicitors" for one of the racketeering charity organizations on the East Side.

"The trouble with you Jews is, you can't drink."

"I had a grand-uncle—May God float his soul in his favorite spirit—Fetzer Scholme, or Scholme der Genshteler to his cronies. That means Solomon the Salty One, so called because his thirst was so enormous and so constant that he would believe he had just dewoured a stick of salt."

This Was a Man!

"To my dying day shall I regret that when I knew him I was a little smelly, just old enough to carry his sidder and talk to schul of his sidder and his sidder along by his side, three hops to his one stride, completely ignorant that I was racing in the shadow of his heel."

"But some of his feats I saw with my own eyes. On Shabbas, after schul, he would say to me, 'Well, my little sinner'—he was prophetic, too—"now we'll call on a few dear friends and make kiddush." He intoned the words 'kiddush,' with loving musical care and smoothed his long woolly beard."

"By the time I was familiar with him, he would walk slowly, as one who goes about his pleasures leisurely, and first we would call on a cousin Rab Yacov—'behold, the (stingy one). My grand-uncle would come in and roar 'Goot Shabbas' and the wife would say, 'You brought me bring to the table a bottle of spirits, a piece of gefilte fish and a slice of sponge cake. Palestine Factories Ignore Foreign Trade As Home Needs Grow

TEL AVIV, Aug. 2.—Grave fears are expressed in local industrial circles at the outcome of the present neglect by Palestine factories of the foreign markets built up laboriously in past years. In view of increased domestic consumption, the factories are unable to produce sufficient for the local markets, and consequently are forced to ignore the export trade.

Complaints are reaching Palestine from Syria and neighboring countries that factories here either do not fill or only partly meet the stream of orders flowing in. Several factories in this city have stopped accepting orders for export, and are working double shifts in order to ensure an adequate output for the home markets.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1.—Salman Schocken, former German department store owner who has settled in Palestine, has established the Bialik prize of \$300 per annum for Hebrew authors or poets writing compositions on Jewish thought or research. Originality and new contributions to Hebrew literature or language will be considered the main factors.

The announcement will be made annually on Tamnuz twenty-one, the date of the death of Bialik. The gift is particularly appropriate, as Bialik had intended on his return to Palestine from Austria, to help improve the difficult economic conditions of Hebrew authors and poets in the Holy Land.

INTO a world full of good ideas, invented by anticipating ancients, Bergdorf Goodman has managed to launch something that deserves the often abused description of "new"—a talcum-powder atomizer. With this implement you may spray powder on your lately bathed self, without the bother of refractory cans or the mess of puffs. Although by virtue of its very modern design it seems to belong in a white-tiled kind of bathroom—sunken bath, concealed lighting, peach colored towels, and all that—its practicality should give it a place beside the most sternly utilitarian bathtub. It seems to me a very good idea—am I wrong?

LET me tell you that no matter how lovely the weather seems to you now, there's going to be rain and lots of it before the summer winds to its close, and a good idea would be a trip to Saks Fifth Avenue, with the object in view of purchasing one of these very and very smart umbrellas. Many of them have leather-covered handles, some of them are polished wood, and the new model has a handsome look like those mercury balls in suburban flower-gardens—awful there, but rather nice as an umbrella handle. But what I particularly like about these umbrellas is that they are longer than the ones we have been carrying, long enough to reach the floor when carried by the handle. I'm delighted with them, I like an umbrella that I can lean on myself.

NOW that we are all wearing clips and hiding them very much indeed for themselves, forward-thinking shops seem to have decided that there should be some utilitarian purpose beyond mere decoration connected with clips, and so Altman has come out with some that contain watches. These are clips that you must love for something beyond their lovely selves, they are clips with a serious purpose in life. One kind is of rhinestones in a nice direct geometric design with the watch set right on top, where you can't, it, clipped to your cuff. Another is made of vari-colored stones—rubies, emeralds, and so on—and has a dangling appearance like the same jewels with the watch underneath, reminding one faintly of the watches that were pinned to starched shirtwaists in the pristine years of this century. They are extremely well-made pieces of jewelry, and, although not real, approximate the effect and the workmanship, and the prices are nothing to sneeze at, either.

cover opponents of the regime are preparing to make considerable capital. Whether the document will have an effect one way or another on the so-called referendum to be held August 10 to obtain "official" approval of Hitler's assumption of the presidential powers is problematical.

The document as made public follows in full:

"To the German people and its Chancellor:

"In 1919 I wrote in my will to the German people: We were finished. Just as Siegfried fell under the treacherous spear of the evil Hagen, so our wearied front broke down. In vain it had sought to imbibe new life from the drying springs of domestic strength.

To Save Remains

"It became our task to save the existence of the remains of our army for the later reconstruction of the Fatherland. The price I was lost. Only hope for the future remained. Now to work.

"I understand the thought of flight from the world which took possession of many officers faced with the collapse of all that was dear to them. I understood the desire not to know any 'g more about a world, in which surging passions overwhelmed, to the point of obliteration, the true inwardness of our people. It was humbly comprehensible.

Saw Glory for Germany

"And yet—I must say openly what I think—comrades of the erstwhile great and proud German army: Can you speak of failure? Remember the men who more than 100 years ago created a new inner Fatherland. Their religion was a belief in themselves and the sanctity of their cause.

"You created the new Fatherland, not founding it on a frenzied doctrine foreign to us, but building it on the basis of the free development of the individual within the frame and responsibility of the entire nation.

"Germany will once again tread the same path as soon as it again is able to walk.

Spirit Will Triumph

"I am firmly convinced that now, as in the past, the link with our great and glorious past will be safeguarded and wherever it was destroyed it will be restored. The old German spirit will light its way up again through the fierce fire of suffering and passion.

"Our enemies knew the power of this spirit. They admired and hated it in the daily work of peace, they wondered at it and feared it on the battlefields of the great war. They sought to explain

it to their peoples with the empty word 'organization.'

"But the spirit which created this garment, which lived and acted within it, escaped them. With and in this spirit we will courageously build anew."

Zion Paper Hits Arab 'Secret Service' Move Against Illegal Entry

TEL AVIV, Aug. 1.—Davar publishes a strong denunciation of the practice of spying on innocent persons, which the Palestine government is openly permitting by not interfering with the activities of the Arab "secret service," youths who are volunteering to guard the frontiers and to apprehend persons whom they suspect of being "illegal." This is a reflection upon the government itself, says the paper.

These uneducated, ungrained youths, who persuade residents on the borders to join in the manhunt, are embarking upon a course which is bound to lead to the direct consequences, Davar warns, pointing out that the permission of this practice will induce a psychology among the Arabs that they are masters and owners of this land, which is false.

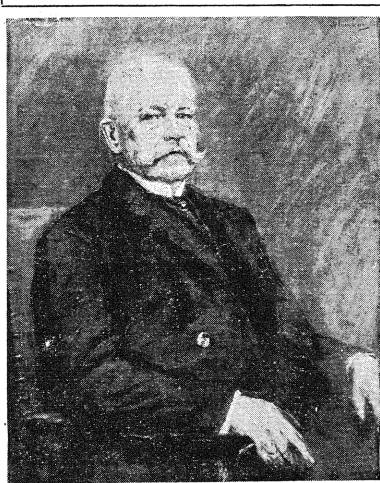

Ask 500 Planes To Halt Arab Riots in Algeria

Paris Set to Grant Demands of Constantine Mayor for Peace

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Three startling recommendations to prevent recurrences of the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Algeria, which cost the lives of at least twenty-three Jews and four Arabs, were received here today by the Minister of Colonies from Mayor Marinand of Constantine, who urged a permanent guard of 500 military airplanes to patrol areas of the country not readily accessible to the army and gendarmery.

The mayor of the third most popular city also demanded that the present garrison of Constantine be maintained and requested the relief immediately to mobilize all French citizens resident in Algeria up to the age of sixty. The Jewish population of Algeria is made up almost entirely of citizens of France, while the native Arabs have been loath to assume citizenship, going so far as to brand such action traitorous.

Gov. General Jules Cardot, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns, as well as the French government, have approved M. Marinand's demands, which also include the request that an official fact-finding committee be nominated to estimate the losses attending the fierce Moslem pogrom. At the same time M. Marinand asked that the proposed body be empowered to authorize the creation of a huge relief fund.

Those injured during the Arab riots, when whole families were wiped out in certain Jewish quarters, the throats of women and children slashed from ear to ear, have been placed unofficially in the hundreds. Property damage is reported to have exceeded \$5,000,000. Seventy Arabs have been jailed thus far, receiving sentences of from two to three years each. Approximately 150 others are under arrest, awaiting trial. Unofficial estimates of the dead range from sixty to 100.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon for Mrs. Fanny Kaplan, mother-in-law of George Z. Medalie, at 14 Balfour place, Brooklyn. Mrs. Kaplan died Tuesday morning at Camp Pontusa, Pittsfield, Mass. She is survived by her daughters, Carrie K. Medalie, Ruth Sylvester, Sylvia Weeden, and a son, Edward I. Kaplan, all of this city.

Mrs. Kaplan's sudden death came as a shock to Mr. and Mrs. Medalie, who returned from a six weeks' European tour yesterday morning on the Rex. They learned the news at the pier and proceeded directly to the funeral. Burial took place at Union Field Cemetery, Jamaica. Dr. Elies Solomon officiated.

37 Knit Goods Pickets Serve Day in Jail

More Arrested Tuesday on Disorderly Conduct Charges

Nineteen women and eighteen men who were arrested Tuesday on charges of disorderly conduct while picketing the Star Knit Goods shop, Broadway and Prince street, yesterday were given the choice of five dollars fine or one day in jail by Magistrate Richard McKinley in First District Magistrate's Court.

All the pickets served the day in jail. The strikers were also charged with violation of a Supreme Court injunction, which had been taken out by the Star Knit Goods, but their counsel disproved this.

Cap Makers Union Men Meet to Take Stock

The strike committee of Cap Makers Union Local No. 1 met in special session last night at its headquarters, 130 Broadway, to take stock of the present strike, which is in its third day. More than 1,200 members were reported to have walked out of factories.

The committee men discussed the demands of the union—an increase in wages and division of work equally in both slack and busy periods—and means of preventing manufacturers from putting out their product.

300 Painters Demonstrate

More than 300 daughters of striking painters of the Brotherhood of Painters and Decorators met on Park avenue, Sunday morning.

The Association of Master Painters and Decorators, which will meet this afternoon at its headquarters, Two Park avenue, to reconsider the suggestion of Ben Gerson, executive secretary of the Regional Labor Board, to effect a settlement.

White Russian Anti-Semite Slain

Trio Lure Soulgouff, Wounded Army Officer, to Death in Montreal

MONTREAL, Quebec, Aug. 15.—Miguel A. Soulgouff, former White Russian army officer, was actively associated with anti-Semitic activities in his native country and in Canada, was lured to his death today by three men in a typical gangster slaying. The motive for the crime are not known.

Soulgouff was known to have been actively associated with the newspaper Novoye Vremya, which in the days of the Czar was the bitterest anti-Semitic paper in Russia and the organ of the Black Hundred pogrom bands. He claimed to have been governor of Odessa one time. He served as an officer in the White Guard army of General Baron Peter Wrangel.

Of late years Soulgouff was employed here as a court interpreter. He became notorious in Jewish circles here for his anti-Semitic activities, which included supplying the violently anti-Jewish-French language weekly, Le Patriot, with records of court cases involving Jews.
