

‘Charities Operate As Congregations’

Organize Under Religious Laws And Avoid Licensing Necessity

Judge Goldstein Reveals Tactics of ‘Free Kitchen’ Outfit

At least four organizations are known to be incorporated as Jewish congregations, functioning primarily as “charity” organizations.

These organizations are: The Downtown Center of Relief, the United Relief Association, the Gates of Mercy Center and the East Side Free Kitchen.

“I don’t believe that any relief organization that incorporates as a religious corporation and has honest intention,” Magistrate Jonah J. Goldstein, lifelong campaign against charity rackets, told this reporter, “for usually such incorporation is solely for the purpose of avoiding the necessity of applying to the Department of Welfare for a license.”

Under the existing charity ordinance, charities incorporated under the Religious Corporations Law are exempt from the necessity of procuring Welfare Department permits.

The Downtown Center of Relief, 257 Henry street, was formerly known as the Henry Street Center. It was forced to give up that name when the Henry Street Settlement, located on the same block, showed how its reputation was being exploited and succeeded in securing an injunction.

The head of the Henry Street Center, Rabbi Jacob Eisenfeld, was held for Special Sessions Court last Wednesday by Magistrate Richard McKinty on a charge of conspiracy to defraud. Assistant District Attorney John Sullivan succeeded in convincing the Magistrate that there was a prima facie case of fraud.

In court testimony was adduced and not refuted which showed that the Center used the name of a Port Jefferson Justice of the Peace without permission, that the Center gave the impression that the Justice was a New York City judge, and that the telephone solicitor, speaking in his name, promised judicial favors to contributors.

Push Pencilboard

The Gates of Mercy is located at 53 Lewis street. Complete information concerning this organization is lacking, but there is a record of a number of court convictions.

Philip Becker received a suspended sentence on July 24, 1933, for unlawful possession of a Gates of Mercy pencilboard. Previously, Becker had received a suspended sentence for unlawful solicitation.

The East Side Free Kitchen, 40 Gouverneur street, is headed by Nathan N. Salant. In connection with this charity, Judge Goldstein said:

“They got Joe Goldstein, a thirty-day magistrate, and used his name over the phone as Magistrate J. Goldstein, thereby giving the impression that it was I. With four friends I went there and told him that if they didn’t stop using my name for what I regarded as a racket and if there were no other way of stopping them, I would physically throw the damn kitchen into the gutter.”

“Two years ago I and some friends gave them \$400 to dispose of unpaid bills and close down. They closed down for a while and then opened again.

“Think of a synagogue calling itself the East Side Free Kitchen.”

On September 28, 1933, Edward Forest and Edith Douglas, connected with the East Side Free Kitchen, were convicted of having unlawfully solicited \$100 from Marie Dressler, and received suspended sentences.

Appeal Raises \$757,000 for Refugee Relief

Part of New York Drive for \$1,200,000 in United Campaign

The sum of \$757,000 has been raised by the New York campaign of the United Jewish Appeal for German Jewry relief, it was announced yesterday by I. Edwin Goldwasser, Nathan S. J., and Ira M. Younker, co-chairmen of the drive in Greater New York. The United Jewish Appeal, which represents the combined efforts of the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign to bring aid to German Jewish refugees, is engaged in a nation-wide campaign to raise \$3,000,000 for this cause. The objective of the New York drive is \$1,200,000.

Activities of the various branches of the campaign organization including the Women’s Division headed by Mrs. Roger W. Straus, and the Trades Council headed by Michael Schapp, have been carried on through the summer, with the result that \$500,000 has been obtained for German Jewish relief during the past six weeks.

Samuel Bitt, executive director of the New York drive, declared yesterday that plans had already been made for intensification of the campaign efforts in the weeks to come. These plans provide for the presentation of a mammoth outdoor entertainment festival at the Yankee Stadium on September 20. It is expected that \$100,000 will be realized through this enterprise. A large stage which will accommodate an orchestra of 1,000 is being built.

and distributive occupations are being filled each year beyond their capacity of absorption. As time goes on this scope and opportunity will be still further restricted. It is obvious, therefore, that if the Jews are to adjust themselves to the changed economic conditions they must broaden the basis of their economic life by participating in all the economic activities of the country, and, in particular, by taking a far greater active part than hitherto in agriculture and in industrial pursuits. This necessity has been realized more and more in other countries, and in South Africa too the time has come for the Jews to give this matter their earnest consideration.

“It is in order to promote agricultural development, which is one of the mainstays of the Jewish people among South African Jewry that this Association has been formed. To achieve this purpose, it is proposed in the plan to make a thorough investigation of the possibilities in South Africa in regard to promoting such pursuits among Jews, and, in the second place, to have been a gathering of South African Jews, and more particularly to the Jewish youth, in finding employment on the land and in industry.”

South African Jews Organize To Widen Scope

Form New Association To Promote More Varied Pursuits

(U. T. A. Special Correspondence)

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, July 25.—To enable Jews to adjust themselves to changed economic conditions so that they may broaden the basis of their economic life by taking more active part in agriculture and industry, an Association for the Promotion of Agricultural and Industrial Pursuits among South African Jews has been formed here. The executive board consists of Maurice Franks, chairman, Walter Pollak, president, and Dr. S. L. Feldman, vice chairman.

A statement issued by the Association points out that the African Jewish Board of Deputies has welcomed its formation, expressing sympathy with its purposes and objects.

“The Jews in South Africa have from the first days of Dutch and English settlement played a very important part in the economic development of the country,” the Association’s statement declares. “As traders they not only brought the necessities of life within the reach of those scattered in this vast sub-continent, but they also created markets for the products of the country, and thus contributed to the economic development of the country. Likewise, the Jewish citizens of South Africa have taken the initiative in the industrial development which has been so prominent a feature of South African economic life during the last twenty years.

“But conditions are changing, and it is becoming increasingly clear that in South Africa, as in most other countries, the position of the middleman is gradually being undermined and that in many spheres the middleman is being entirely eliminated. The professions

Adjusting Our Lives

The Care of Crippled Children

Since the war, interest in children has vastly increased. The widespread propaganda for relief of children in Europe and the education of many communities, coupled with an agitation over juvenile "crime waves," have stimulated many groups to deliberate action, and programs have become comprehensive as well as varied.

Of extraordinary social value indeed is the welfare work on behalf of crippled children. Here as in many other fields of organized social service, such as mothers' pensions and old-age security, the fraternal order movement is playing a prominent and ever growing part. Also a Jewish fraternal organization has participated in this field of philanthropy, and does incalculable good for unfortunate crippled children in New York City.

Work of Fraternal Orders

The Order of the Mystic Shrine, active mostly in the Middle West and on the Pacific Coast, pioneered in this field of social welfare. It has built hospitals in several large cities, to which all crippled children are eligible without charge. Each hospital has fifty beds. Mobile units of twenty beds each have been established in various cities of the United States and Canada, and even in Honolulu, capital of the Hawaiian Islands.

Admissions to these hospitals are apportioned to contiguous states. The best orthopedic service is given by local physicians who are in charge of the technical work.

Among the Jews of America, the fraternal women's organization "United Order of True Sisters," established in 1846 in New York, has several years ago taken up the work on behalf of crippled children. Its eight lodges in Manhattan have formed jointly the New York Philanthropic League in aid of Crippled Children, founded by Mrs. Rose Baran.

"True Sisters" at work. This League provides relief, extra nourishment, medical attention, eyeglasses, crutches, trusses, etc., clothing, hot lunches, recreation and physio-therapy in public schools. It also through the membership of the U. O. T. S., embraced by its thirty-four lodges and numbering 12,000, is entirely Jewish, this Order does not function as a sectarian body. All its activities and benevolent work are extended to all the needy and suffering regardless of sex or creed.

The United Order of True Sisters also maintains a vacation home for crippled children in Spring Valley, N. Y., with a capacity for sixty crutches, girls from six to eighteen. The children stay three weeks. Almost 75 per cent of vacancies are for non-members of the fraternal order. Rates are \$1 to \$5 a week. Fifty per cent of the vacancies are free.

The camp at Spring Valley, N. Y., is primarily for health. Special recommendations from physicians are noted, and subsequently reports are sent upon request to organizations which have sent children to the camp.

State Societies for Cripples

Recently, an International Society for Crippled Children was organized in Ohio, and rapidly took root in many sections of North America. Its purpose is to give assistance of crippled children by the coordination and development of public and private resources for medical, hospital, educational and by the formation of state societies.

The main aim of these societies is to protect the crippled children, by census and also through friendly social agencies, and to spread facilities for care as widely as possible in order to place them within reach of a great number of the unfortunate children.

Such societies are now organized in over a dozen of our states and Canada. The New York State Society was responsible for securing the first State Commission for the Survey of Crippled Children, whose legis-

lative recommendations became law on April 1, 1925.

The Elks of New York State and other fraternal groups aided the Commission to make the survey on which its important recommendations were based. The legislation of New York State in this branch of child welfare is considered a model achievement in many respects.

Activities by City and State

Also the Board of Education of the City of New York maintains a wide service on behalf of the crippled children, mainly through the Division of Physically Handicapped Children.

An assistant director of health education is in charge of supervision of classes of crippled children in public schools and hospitals and convalescent homes. There are also classes of cardiopathic children, that is ones suffering from heart trouble, and outdoor classes, open air classes, outdoor classes for tuberculosis children and home instruction—for physically handicapped children.

The State Department of Education has a Rehabilitation Bureau. It functions under the Division of Vocational and Extension Education and provides counsel, advice and assistance. Training is given when necessary and feasible, for physically handicapped persons and for organizations, interested in the reestablishment of employable handicapped persons in occupations of self-support.

Junior Hadassah Will 'Adopt' 43 Reich Refugee Children

Convention on Sunday Expected to Pass Aid Plan

Provision for home and education in Palestine for forty-three German Jewish children will be the major consideration of the eleventh annual convention of Junior Hadassah, to be held at the Hotel New Yorker in New York to Tuesday, it was announced yesterday by Alice Bernstein, executive secretary.

The 1,000 delegates who will attend will be asked to ratify a plan to admit the refugee children to Junior Hadassah's model home farm school at Meier Shiferyn, near Haffa, and to an agricultural training farm to be established at Fardess Anna, where the organization now has a large orange grove. Junior Hadassah has undertaken this new project to help solve the problem of settling German refugees in Palestine. A report on the progress of the "German nurses' training school in Jerusalem, which Junior Hadassah supports, will also be presented to the convention.

A review of the committee activities of the 10,000 members of the organization will be followed by the presentation of gold "fellowship" keys to the sixteen members who this year attained the highest record of achievement in a prescribed course of study in Jewish history and literature, Hebrew and religious. Mrs. Frieda S. Ullman, of Boston, honorary president of Junior Hadassah, will make the awards. A symposium will be held on "Palestine Today." Mrs. Samuel W. Halprin, national president of Senior Hadassah, will speak on the political and social life of Palestine; Robert Scheraga, president of the Zionist Organization of America, will discuss the economic development of the country.

Chileans Send Jew on Mission To Pacific Isle

Will Represent Country on Expedition of Three Lands

(S.T.A. Special Correspondence)

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 3.—Dr. Israel Drapkin, a local Jewish physician, has been named by the Chilean Government as its representative on the scientific expedition sent by the museums of Paris and Brussels to the Pacific Isle of Pascua, near the Polynesian Archipelago.

The expedition is headed by Professor Matraux, successor to Professor Luis Charles Whetstein, who died at Puerto Montt after the expedition got under way.

The purpose of the scientific group is to discover the relationship, if any, between the writings found a short time ago in India and others found at Pascar. There is great similarity between the two, both as yet undeciphered, and it is believed they may shed light on the theory that inhabitants of India and the Malay Peninsula crossed the Polynesian archipelago to reach the islands of the South American continent.

Dr. Drapkin, who in addition to representing Chile will function as the entomologist of the expedition, will also take advantage of his stay at Pascar to study leprosy. The disease is prevalent on the island, where there is a leper colony (Pascar is also known as Hanga Roa).

Dr. Israel Drapkin is the son of Isaac Drapkin, one of the first Jewish communal figures in Chile.

University of Munich Continues Jewish, Nazi Student Squawks

Writes Letter to The Stuermer, Complaining Because Anti-Semitism Has Failed Entirely to Grip School

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, Aug. 10.—Complaining that the University of Munich, in spite of the National Socialist regime, is still strongly Jewish, a student at the school, in a long news letter to The Stuermer, suggests that "it wouldn't do any harm if the university disappeared altogether some day."

"It makes one want to run away from it," the dissatisfied student writes. "The Jews are just as much about as ever, and allied with them are the reactionary black Catholics."

The writer cites an experience in which he encountered "the much prevalent Jewish arrogance." Entering the university reading room to read The Stuermer, he says, he found scrawled across the front page: "When is this infamous paper going to be stopped?" In retaliation he struck his pen through the first inscription, and wrote beneath it: "What Jewish scribbles did this?" The next day the complainant's writing was blacked out and the previous legend again repeated.

Spied Without Success
"I obliterated the scurrilous remark once more," the letter writer continues. "Then I kept watch every day to see who was doing this but I have not yet been successful."

"Racially the university is completely degenerated," another part of the letter reads. "People who in ordinary life are Jews go about here as 'Aryans.' It really seems as if we have become a bastion of a nation. So far as this university is concerned, it doesn't do any harm if it disappeared altogether some day. These mixed-blood Jewish half-breeds are a fertile soil for incitement. And under these circumstances the blacks—I mean the Catholic students are delighted."

Three years ago, the writer contends, "the students here demonstrated in support of a professor who has not been declared free from objection by the State. Professor Mittels. He is well known as a Liberal Democrat and as no friend of National Socialism. But his lectures are packed. At his last lecture there was a bouquet on his desk. An S. S. man walked across and tore the bouquet to pieces; the only right thing to do, says the writer. He then called to us to discipline and the lecture went on. An attempt was made to start a demonstration of sympathy for Mittels, but an S. S. man boxed the ears of the first man who was going to start it, so he thought better of it."

Compliments Stuermer
"Soon a half-Jew went up to the professor, saying that he would bring thirty people to deal with the S. S. man. That is typically Jewish. Professor Mittels, too, looks suspiciously Jewish. The whole business becomes clear to me when I look at the people who go about the university."

The writer concludes the letter with a compliment to The Stuermer. "It is my only friend and I am happy every Saturday when it arrives. I wish it came daily."

Commenting on the news letter, The Stuermer says: "This German student is looking things straight in the face. It is the Jewish blood, the Jewish half-breed, the bastard who is all the trouble. Only when the last Jew who has managed to get an 'Aryan' certificate by baptism or some other quibble is cleared out of the university, whether he is a Jew or has Jewish blood in him, will our universities be places in which the German spirit is dominant."

Athletic Upsets of the Week

Two Jewish athletes helped cause the biggest upsets of the week in the sporting world by their remarkable playing ability. In a strange coincidence both of these startling reverses in the 1933 Eastern tour occurred Tuesday.

Baroness Maud Levi didn't live up to expectations as the "most feared batter in the American League" last Tuesday, his name and first name helped the Detroit Tigers considerably when they shelled the Ruppert Rifles in the twin bill at the Stadium.

Hospital for Joint Diseases Ltd. In Free Service Given in 1933

27th Annual Report Reveals Harlem Institution Rated 64.3%—5,000 Patients Treated—Deficit \$125,229.95

Of twenty-nine Jewish hospitals inspected in a survey of the country, the Hospital for Joint Diseases, Madison avenue and 123rd street, gave the highest percentage of free service to patients in poor circumstances in 1933. This information, based upon statistics of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research, is disclosed in the twenty-seventh annual report of the hospital, made public yesterday.

The report presents a complete resume, including detailed statistics, of the medical and social services offered during 1933 by both the main building of the hospital in Manhattan and the country branch maintained at Far Rockaway, L. I. It also includes the annual statements submitted by the retiring presidents of the board of directors and the medical advisory board, and a financial account by the trustees.

In achieving the highest rating among the nation's Jewish hospitals for free service to patients—the bureau credited it with 64.3 per cent of such services offered. The Hospital for Joint Diseases operated practically at full capacity, serving the community with 855 patients in Manhattan and Country branches.

Over 5,000 Patients More than 5,000 patients received 110,000 hospital days' care. The significant part about this service is the fact that 4,900 days' care were given in the hospital's wards to patients in financial straits. This is equivalent to eighty-two beds occupied in the hospital days. In addition, the outpatient department was visited by 26,000 patients who made 191,000 calls and received as many treatments.

This service, the report states, was performed by the 329 doctors and medical staff, by 400 other employees and 252 volunteers. There were more than 1,000 workers in several capacities served the hospital's patients.

Commenting on these statistics, Frederick Brown, the retiring president of the board of directors, states that "at no time in the twenty-seven years of the hospital's existence has the character and quantity of the service to deserving patients been exceeded." He also declares that the maintenance of high standards was not easy during the past year, owing

to lessened resources of revenue, but that they were nevertheless maintained in the face of a mounting deficit."

The United Hospital Fund, in its distribution of funds on the basis of free service, gave the hospital the second largest amount of all its special hospitals and the sixth largest amount of all its fifty-seven hospitals, general and special. In its statement Brown points out that this large financial dispensation by the Hospital Fund as an implied compliment for the generous free service rendered by the hospital. The Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies also supports the hospital, contributing about \$100,000 annually.

Dr. Philip M. Grauman, retiring president of the medical advisory board, points out in his review of the hospital's work that 4,900 surgical procedures, or an average of more than sixteen for each operating day, were carried out in the operating rooms during the year.

The hospital has undertaken to share some of the responsibility falling to the medical profession for the financial assistance in Germany, according to Dr. Grauman. During 1933 an opportunity was provided for several of the younger German physicians to visit, to join the hospital's residential staff. To more mature physicians, the facilities of the outpatient department were made available. In addition, the board of trustees and the medical staff have joined to raise a sum of money for the financial assistance of these victims. Dr. Jacob Sobel succeeds Dr. Grauman as president of the Medical Staff.

L. F. Rodichuk, a treasurer of the hospital, reports that a total operating deficit of \$125,229.95 for the main hospital and that of \$19,122.85 for the country branch. Donations contributed by the United Hospital Fund, the Federation and other donors reduces the total deficit for the year to \$58,409. Income for direct services rendered by the hospital totals \$488,007.66 and \$29,137.35 for the main hospital and country branch, respectively. But departmental costs included of \$533,237.61 and \$48,250.03.

Britain Ignores Jews' Dissent In Zion Scheme

Will Form Legislative Council Despite Protests

(Jerusalem Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, Aug. 16.—The Palestine government intends to carry out its plans for the formation of a legislative council in Palestine as soon as High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell leaves the country. When he returns here from leave, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned from reliable sources today.

The High Commissioner, it was said, has been discussing the council with Palestinian Arab and Jewish leaders, who were informed by him that Great Britain was definitely committed to carry out the scheme. He informed the leaders with whom he conferred that if the population of Palestine would boycott the elections for the council the administration would appoint the members.

Jewish Palestine has vigorously opposed the creation of a legislative council on the ground that it would vitiate the mandate and would give the combined British and Arab members of the council a majority over the Jews.

"The religious examination is to be held by a board of examiners composed of Rabbi M. A. Rabin, Rabbi R. Barishansky and a third rabbi to be selected by the other two, and two shoachim, one to be selected by the present Local 440 and the other by the present Vaad Shoachim Offices.

"This examination shall be completed within two weeks.

Second Call on Jobs

"3. The present membership of the Vaad Shoachim Offices (except those who will be rejected by the Rabbinical Board of Examiners) are to be entitled to employment after the present membership of the Agudas Shoachim Local 440 shall have obtained employment."

"4. No member of the present Vaad Shoachim Offices shall be entitled to unemployment benefit or relief until such time as he has obtained a job and has contributed to the Unemployment Fund for at least three months and conformed to the rules of the Vaad."

"5. Upon the Vaad Shoachim Offices joining the Agudas Local 440, the former shall by resolution dissolve immediately."

"6. The executive committee of Agudas Local 440 shall be increased by two members to be selected by the admitted members of the Vaad Shoachim Offices."

"7. The arbitration board shall stand in effect until Sept. 1, 1937, as a board of appeal."

chine parts from which the mark "Germany" had been ground off.

Bergen was released on \$500 bail. The charges were preferred by the Anti-Nazi Boycott Committee of the American Jewish Congress. The case was the first under the Wald Act, Section 435 of the Federal Code, which makes the owner of a business personally responsible for articles in his place of business on which the label of the country of origin is defaced.

Goods Strikers Will Consider Golden Plans

Union Will Meet Soon On Proposals to End Strike

A general meeting of members of the striking Knit Goods Workers Union, branch of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, will be held soon to consider the proposals submitted by Ben Gold, executive secretary of the Regional Labor Board. The employers of the industry have already agreed to settle the strike, now in its second week, if the union agrees by the proposal.

The suggestions embody plans whereby both sides will appoint one arbitrator each to settle all problems that may come up. They also provide for a thirty-day week for the first year with a thirty-five hour week thereafter.

The original union demands were a reduction in hours from thirty-seven and a half to thirty-five weekly and ten to twenty per cent. increase in wages, according to the classification of the workers.

Cap Markets Strike

2. About 3,000 Jewish children, double the number of Arab children, enter the Palestine labor market each year.

3. Some of the labor shortage, such as citrus picking, is only seasonal. The building shortage is also temporary.

4. The Jewish Agency frequently includes professionals and non-manual workers in its labor schedule, instead of workmen only.

5. The Jewish Agency guarantees maintenance of immigrants for one year, but not for specific employment for each immigrant.

6. There is no real shortage of unskilled labor if Arab as well as Jewish workers are counted.

MacDonald's Stand on Labor
Secretary Hall added that the MacDonald letter to Dr. Chaim Weizmann said that if the cessation of the exclusive employment of Jewish labor by Jewish employers was the displacing of Arab labor, then this fact will be taken into consideration by the Palestine administration in considering the Jewish immigration.

Professor William Rappard and Vice Chairman Dr. D. van Rees of the Mandates Commission argued, according to the report that the explanations submitted by Hall were so because he interpreted but half of one paragraph from the MacDonald letter, omitting the first half, which offers Jewish organizations in Palestine the right to employ only Jewish labor.

Deals With Illegal Entry
The Mandates Commission report dealt in its closing pages with the illegal Jewish and Arab immigration into Palestine. Hall submitted the Palestine administration's explanation of the measures taken to combat illegal entry. He stated that the Jewish population of Palestine is hampering the police and that figures of illegal Arab immigration were greatly exaggerated.

Professor Rappard asked Hall whether the government action in reducing Jewish immigration into Palestine did not constitute an almost official connivance in illegal immigration. Secretary Hall denied the government's action tended to encourage illegal entry.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned that the commission submitted no recommendations to the League of Nations concerning the memorandum on points in dispute between the Jewish Agency and the Palestine government submitted by the Agency.

Rabbi Samuel Marks Of San Antonio Dies After Long Illness

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Aug. 16.—Rabbi Samuel Marks, former head of the Temple Beth-El and long a prominent resident of this city, died today after an illness of six months.

Rabbi Marks, who lived in this city for the last thirty-four years, retired from his rabbiship in 1920. He was a thirty-second degree Mason and Chaplain of the Elks and of the B'nai B'rith for many years. He was the first Reform rabbi in Montreal, Canada.
