Past Year Saw Anti-Jewish Feeling Grow Despite Government's Friendly Attitude; Venizelists Source of Trouble; Suicides Mount

The first of these factors is a weight that oppresses populations. But if the Jewish populations. But if the second appears to be favorable, it hardly permits an exaggerated optimism, for it is accompanied by disquieting symptoms for the future.

The economic disaster that is overcoming the Jews began in 1923, when a large number of Greeks from Asia Minor arrived in the country. Having excellent n the country. and protected by the State, empted them from taxation for empted them from taxation for ten years, these refugees took possession little by little of all sorts of economic positions forsorts of economic positions for-merly occupied by Jews. This, with the help of the general crisis, has-tened the process of pauperization of the Jewish masse

Imports Limit Hits Jews The past months saw the situ-tion grow worse. The measures taken by the government to pro-tect the drachma from a greater devaluation include special limitations on the importation of mer-chandise. The continually growing misery among the Jews was the cause of several tragedies. Never had so many suicides been recorded as in Unemployment, which already had been a grave problem increased tremendously with the closing of the tobacco workshops Living conditions, particularly wretched since the great fire of 1918, grew worse. It is a common sight to see long lines of the poverty-stricken come to seek aid the doors of Jewish institu-The participation of the govern-

ment and the municipalities in re-lief for Jews was more satisfying this year, but it is still very far from answering the tremendous exigencies of the Jewish masses. Venizelists Hostile

The ascension of the popular party to power marked the beginning of a period of reconciliaginning of a period of reconcilia-tion and cooperation with the Jews. But the success of the popular party at the last elec-tions was obtained with the support of a large bloc of Jewish votes. This provoked the Venizelists—the other great political faction of the country—to con-stant hostility. The leaders of the opposition at Salonica profited by this to make anti-Semitism an by this to make anti-semitism an electoral issue. For the first time in the history of the country a "purely Christian list" appeared to combat the "Judaized list" of the governmental faction. It appears that M. Venizelos, leader of the opposition, is opposed to an anti-Jewish policy for his party. He has made several unequivocal

Violent press campaigns were directed against the Jews by the journals of the opposition. of these campaigns utilized the pretext of the establishment of Yom Kippur as a legal holiday, and succeeded in creating such a wave of opinion that the government hastened to annul the decree in question. But the principal cause of the anti-Semitic situa-tion is the already famous problem of the separate Jewish elec-toral college at Salonica. One of the first acts of the government was to abolish the separate election, against which the Jews had protested. The Venizelists furi-ously combatted this measure and accused the Jews at the same time of being enemies of the country. On several occasions, mem-bers of the government and the Prime Minister himself rose emphatically against such accusa-tions, and eulogized the Jewish

Serious Threats Made

The continual agitation against the Jews sponsored by the organs of the opposition does not fail to cause a certain uneasiness. Rather serious threats have been made The energetic attitude of the authorities prevents an overflow of and aside from a few anti-Semitic excesses which were quickly suppressed at Salonica and Castoria, there were no serious disorders in 5694. But a large part of public opinion is slowly becoming poisoned. It has even been discovered that German propaganda encourages anti-Semitism in the country. Fortunately, the anti-Jewish organization E. E. E., which was transformed into the National-Socialist party, has been deprived of its power to harm by the government. A change of

ish leaders have been trying, unsuccessfully until now, to better the relations between the Venizelists and the Jewish element,

The material wretchedne Judaism, the development of anti-Semitism in Europe, the develop-ments in Germany, have given the Zionist party a new access of popularity. Almost all of the zionist party a new accesso di popularity. Almost all of the Zionist leaders, however, have established themselves in Palestine during these last few months with the result that the movement is leaderless.

Emigration to Palestine has extended considerably. It has brok-en all records in 5964. The most important aspect of this emigra-tion is the installation of 200 Jewish dock workers from Salonica in the port of Haifa, where they have attained a new position for Jewish labor. Thousands of families desperately await the certificates which will permit their emigration to Palestine, and encommunities are enrolled at the Greek Palestinian office.

The misfortunes that affected Greek Judaism that have the last few years have killed all traces of Jewish cultural progress. Dr. Koretz, the new Grand Rabbi who has just assumed office, has made an effort to change this state of things.

Reich Prisoner Slated to Get Peace Award

Ossietzky, in Nazi Jail, Expected to Receive Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 6. — The
committee which will select the
winner of the Nobel Peace Prize today had under consideration the name of Carl von Ossietzky, German pacifist and a political pris-oner of the Hitler regime.

Ossietzky's name was submitted by the League for the Rights of Man. Messages supporting the proposal that the prize be awarded to him have been received from Lion Feuchtwanger, the German Jewish novelist now in exile, and other prominent individuals.

Ossietzky was arrested the night of the Reichstag fire and taken to a concentration camp, where beatings and severe drilling maneuvers are said to have undermined his health. He was editor-in-chief of Die Weltbuehne, a pacifist weekly, until the advent of the Nazis, who

The suggestion has been voiced that if he receives the Nobel Prize, his release will follow.

France, Italy Leave for Holy Days Join to Block

French Delegates Claim Accord for Common Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
ROME, Sept. 6.—The rearmament of Germany will never occur unless the combined might of Italy and France are insufficient to frustrate Adolf Hitler's ambitions along military lines.

This was learned today from French delegates to the Levantine Fair at Bari, who said the Paris government and Italy have reached an accord for common action to block restoration of the Reich to its former fighting prowess.

The delegates declared also that France and Italy have come to a complete agreement on the ques-tion of Austrian independence, and have pledged themselves to take common action against the Nazis.

Italy will join France in her fight to keep German armaments at the level fixed by the Treaty of Versailles, the visitors said, although it is not to be inferred that Premier Mussolini has abandoned his desire for revision of that instrument.

"While all the men and wo-men connected with the United Jewish Appeal have worked zealously for the cause, we find that the needs we are trying to meet are far greater than any means we have for meeting

"In the past few weeks, turning travelers, competent to observe and comment, as well as well as our own representatives on the ground in Europe, have brought us stories of suffering and sorrow which makes it dif-ficult for us to approach the New Year without the greatest feeling of concern for the pres-nt and futuer of untold thousands of our people.' The Jews of America, the most prosperous portion of the

Jewish people, even during these vears of depression, have joined their efforts in behalf of our stricken brethren abroad through the United Jewish Ap-peal. There is no disagreement American Jewry regarding e need for relief to be extended to our unfortunate neonle in Europe who are suffering privation and want as never before. A vast portion of Polish Jewry is starving. A large number of German Jewish refugees, scat-tered in various lands, are stranded, unable to find employ-ment, unable to find sufficient food and adequate shelter for themselves and their families. The funds that have been raised in this country have been dis-tributed and are still being distributed, but they are insufficient to meet the great and immediate needs. The response to the United Jewish Appeal has thus far proved apathetic. The Jews of America have given proportionately far less than the Jews of England have contributed toward the German Jewish refuge relief fund. The conscience of American Jewry has not yet ex-pressed itself in terms of gen-erosity in accordance with the unparalleled tragedy that has befallen German Jewry and with the ever-increasing ruin of Polish Jewry.

During the coming Holy Days the Jews of America should make a demonstration of gener-city in their response to the appeals in behalf of the victims of Hitler who are homeless and hopeless unless we provide this shelter and unless we give them new hope. The victims of Hitler must be saved now. The refugees must be cared for without lay. They must be provided with food and clothing and homes. If food and clothing and homes. If we fail in fulfilling this obliga-tion to our people, the noblest trait of Jewry will become dis-credited.
