

Greece, Flouts Regime's Efforts

Part Year Saw Anti-Jewish Feeling Grow Despite Government's Friendly Attitude; Venizelists Source of Trouble; Suicides Mount

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A review of the Jewish situation in Greece during the year 1934 brings to light two salient facts: a perceptible aggravation of the economic conditions and an aggravation of political position. The first of these factors is a terrible weight that oppresses Jewish populations. But if the second factor, the political situation, hardly permits an exaggerated optimism, for it is accompanied by disquieting symptoms for the future.

The economic disaster that is overcoming the Jews began in 1923, when a large number of Greeks from Asia Minor arrived in Greece. Having excellent commercial advantages, and protected by the State, which exempted them from taxation for ten years, these refugees took possession of little by little of all sorts of economic positions formerly occupied by Jews. This, with the help of the general economic situation, led to the process of pauperization of the Jewish masses.

Imports Limit Hits Jews

The past months saw the situation grow worse. The measures taken by the government to protect the drachma from a greater devaluation include special limitations on the importation of merchandise. This was, in the first place, a blow to Jewish merchants. Furthermore, two new laws affected the commercial activity of the Jews. The first enforced the closing of all businesses on Sunday. It had only been partially enforced up to this point. The second provided as closed days six Christmas holidays, aside from Christmas and Easter when the lay-off was obligatory. Finally, an anti-Jewish boycott made its appearance. Although the organized movement, it exists in a latent state, and its effects are visible principally in the country, where anti-Semitism was negligible until now.

The continually growing misery among the Jews was the cause of several tragedies. Never had so many suicides been recorded as in 1934. Unemployment, which already had been a grave problem increased tremendously with the closing of the tobacco workshops. Living conditions, particularly wretched since the great fire of 1918, grew worse. It is a common sight to see long lines of the poor seeking to seek aid at the doors of Jewish institutions.

The participation of the government and the municipalities in relief for Jews was more satisfactory this year, but it is still very far from answering the tremendous exigencies of the Jewish masses.

Venizelists Hostile

The ascension of the popular party to power marked the beginning of a period of reconciliation and cooperation with the Jews. But the success of the party was the last of the concessions was obtained with the support of a large bloc of Jewish votes. This provoked the Venizelists to a great political reaction of the country—to constant hostility. The leaders of the opposition at Salonica profited by this to make a political electoral issue. For the first time in the history of the country a "purely Christian list" appeared to combat the "Judaized list" of the governmental coalition. It appears that M. Venizelos, leader of the opposition, is opposed to an anti-Jewish policy for his party. He has made several official declarations on the subject. But his will is certainly over-riden.

ish leaders have been trying, unsuccessfully until now, to better the relations between the Venizelists and the Jewish element.

The material welchdom of Judaism, the development of anti-Semitism in Europe, the development in Greece, have given the Zionists a new impetus to their popularity. Almost all of the Zionist leaders, however, have established themselves in Palestine during these last years. With the result that the movement is leaderless.

Emigration to Palestine has extended considerably. It has broken all records in a new year. The most important aspect of this emigration is the installation of 200 Jewish dock workers from Salonica in the port of Haifa, where they have attained a new position for Jewish labor. Thousands of families desperately await the certificates which will permit their emigration to Palestine, and entire communities are enrolled at the Greek Palestinian office.

The misfortunes that have affected Greek Judaism during the last few years have killed all traces of Jewish cultural progress. Dr. Koretz, the new rabbi of Athens who has just assumed office, has made an effort to change this state of things.

Economic difficulties for the present; political complications for the future. These are the two factors that weigh down Greek Jewry. Nothing less offers illumination beyond the dark clouds on the horizon.

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Polish Jewry Spent Bitter Year Fending Anti-Semite Onslaught

the two together, the strongest being the fact that forty to fifty per cent of Palestine immigrants are Polish Jews. (Statistics show that the natural increase of the Polish Jewish population is diverted to Palestine.) As a result, the Polish Jewry has become the institution foremost in the consciousness of Polish Jewry.

Naturally, Palestine immigration restrictions have caused disappointment in Poland, but the protest movement which might have developed to great strength failed to do so because of the lack of unity in Zionist circles.

Party strife in Palestine also was reflected in Poland, and the Stavsky trial growing out of the Arlosoroff case caused particular notice because Stavsky is a Polish Jew. Very often, indeed, the difference of opinion between the Revisionists and the Laborites became so sharp in various places that clashes, sometimes, bloody, resulted. Attempts to create peace between the two groups were unavailing.

Nahum Sokolow, president of the Zionist World Organization and of the Jewish Agency, spent three months in Poland, and succeeded in interesting a number of politically influential persons in a pre-Palestine committee, while his presence in Poland was rare on the occasion of a number of Jewish utterances on the part of

government officials.

Naturally, the tragedy of the German Jews occupied the minds of the Polish Jews often, and, frequently, to the exclusion of everything else. The Jewish movement became widespread despite the fact that German agents flooded the country with tempting offers. A few Jews, as in other countries, were drawn outside the action, but received their due from public opinion. The whole boycott movement was jeopardized for a time by the Polish non-aggression pact and the trade agreement, but the Jewish group was not stopped for long.

In connection with these negotiations, the Polish government minister Paul Joseph Goebbels visited Poland just when the Nazis excesses were at their height. His visit aroused much bitterness, the Yiddish newspapers all greeting him with the same slogan on an otherwise blank first page.

Unfortunately, the relief activities on behalf of the German Jews did not produce the wished-for results in Poland, nor is the economic situation able to blame for this fact. Vice by League High Commissioner James McDonald and Norman Bentwich in connection with their work on the Jewish Refugee Commission, also were less successful than might have been anticipated.

The Bulletin's Day Book

It seems the Day Book's epic contest has caught on. But, judging from the first results, I should say it has caught on with the wrong type of people.

After all, when I announced the contest the other day, the purpose of which was to help me decide whether columns of the future were to eschew the anti-Semitic motif and be devoted to spreading the gospel of polyannism or to continue to twist the Nazis, I hardly expected that the Nazis themselves would have the gall to enter it.

However, they have had the gall. On second thought, though, it may not have been entirely a spirit of meanness that prompted these scum of the earth to submit their poisonous, obviously subversive essays to this department. They may, after all, simply have been actuated by an overweening desire to win that prompted introduction to Oscar Ostreich, der Fuehrer of the anti-Semitic bloc in the Empire of Zoo.

Whatever it was that prompted these beklagted souls to throw their poisoned darts at this Day Book, they got the jump on the friendly forces.

Evidently they comprise a highly organized crew. They probably drill until night in some dank, swastika-decorated crier in Yorkville. Instead of rifles they wield typewriters. In place of swords they drill with pens. And in lieu of bullets they use a rank "ersatz" ink that mightily resembles ordinary mud.

That these cellar-dwelling Nazis from Yorkville are no ordinary "Leut", but have at least the meanness of those animals once lured to destruction by the famous notes of the "Ereignis" paper, is suggested from the ratty way at least one of them has gone about attacking this citadel of pleasure.

In the following letter (yes, I print it) I fail not merely to confound my enemies, but to show the world that even the bitterest criticism leaves my sense of fair play and good nature undisturbed (and unruined) it is readily apparent that the method of attack is to create dissension within the ranks of the Jewish Daily Bulletin staff. The intention there, of course, is chidishly obvious. Once the seeds of strife are implanted in the minds of certain staff writers as H. W. and Morris Weiner, the damage, this writer reckons, will have been done. (The method, of course, is to praise one at the expense of the other.)

With the staff torn by internal strife more vicious even than that which under the Zionist rank, it is pretty understandable that the Bulletin will not be able to devote so much time to impeding the Nazis in their nefarious undertakings. So, to speak, so Machiavellian a plot, on more mature thought, could not possibly have come out of the Yorkville cellars. I am especially sure that the plot was hatched in the Berlin hotbeds and that Hitler, Goebbels, Goering, Streicher and Hans-Steinberg had their bloody hands in its concoction.

All of which, I believe, should be a sufficient warning in the desperate introduction to one of the letters received which bears out this point. The fact that this one was typed with so much in decorative flourish and displayed a somewhat elemental ability to use the English language persuaded me to reprint it in full. The fourth letter, however, was so lacking in intelligence that I hesitated to offend the taste of the Day Book's intellectual audience by reproducing it.

The letter follows: (In the event

no one bothers to read to the end of it, I hasten to affix my initials right here.)

Dear Mr. H. W.:

"I am a constant reader of Mr. Weiner's column 'Slants on Sports'. In fact I can safely say that I haven't missed reading one issue of the Bulletin in which M. Weiner's breezy, informative, newsy and altogether pleasant sport gossip appeared.

"At the same time let me say that it is only lately that I have turned to the Day Book feature and have read it—more or less matter-of-factly. (Hear! Hear!—Ed.)

"My dear H. W., I have never met your wife but I must say that I admire her address, her perspicacity and her criticism when she withholds her approval of your column. I agree with her in all respects when she terms your journalistic efforts lousy. She is perfectly right in her claim of being fed up with "that sort of stuff." Why be destructive when you can so easily be constructive? Is the purpose of the Day Book purely one of satirical jibes with anti-Semitism as the sole butt?

"In a recent advertisement the Day Book was featured as a witty, critical, nonsensical piece of journalism. It seems to me that you must have had a finger in that pie somewhere. Yet, if you ask me, the emphasis should be on the word "nonsensical."

"But to get down to my real issue. (And I don't mean your severe criticism.) You mention someone who has been a constant reader of 'Slants on Sports', affects me deeply. I have nothing to say about the person, as regards the pulchritude of our sports editor. However, I object strenuously when you say that the purpose of the Day Book is to argue the merits of the sports editor. My good man, I am sure he would come home and I, for one, resent them.

"You object very much to the fact that Mr. Weiner's readers enter his contest. (I made no such objection.—Ed.) These contests are worthwhile. (Oh, yeah?—Ed.) But, it seems to me, in the very same breath in which you deliver your diatribe against readers of the sports columns who enter the contests you say something that really surprises me. It is the most astounding piece of editorial frankness I've seen in any paper I've ever read. You wrote, "Trundle out your portables, you Day Book devotees! Sharpen your pencils (and your wits, too, while you're at it.)"

"My dear fellow, you strike the contest in the matter right then and there. You do admit that devotees of your daily stint need their wits sharpened. Did it ever occur to you, my good H. W., that these very same wits may be dulled by constant hammering on the same subjects day in and day out? Did it also occur to you that the wits of your Day Book following be sharpened you would lose every devotee that you now superficially lead by the nose?

"Then again, I have plenty to say. This matter has been boiling and seething in me for weeks but your unethical slanting has made the pot run over! Honorable H. W., you are merely writing drivel to fill up space. Your wife was perfectly sincere in her criticism, and I am especially sure that the editor justified (you said that nice, damn!—Ed.). You do ask your readers to let you know what sort of editor they would like to see in writing. But how do you treat it? Evidently you accomplish a very different feat and disguise your pen behind a very bland smile and burlesque whatever answers you

PATERSON, N. J., Sept. 6.—The closing down of all silk mills in the city presents a problem for the thousands of Jews connected with the silk business, coming as it does just before the observance of the High Holidays.

As has been the custom of Jews over many years, more money is expended for clothes and food in celebration of the New Year.

It is doubtful if there will be much rejoicing over tables and in synagogues on Rosh Hashanah as men connected with the silk industry worry about financial and business troubles.

Few in the industry have saved money. It has been next to impossible for the workers to get support his family and lay aside definite sums of money weekly. It has only been since the New Deal that anything like a fairly decent wage and decent hours have come to the warper and weaver.

It is a black picture that faces the Paterson Jews as the New Year opens, but there is hope for speedy settlement of the strike.

Federation Seeks More Funds

The project for a World Jewish Congress, for which plans were made for a recent meeting in the Conference at Geneva, have met with a mixed reception from American Anglo-Jewish weeklies. Again the subject of the World Jewish Congress is on the agenda. A group of Jews, some of whom are very distinguished and for whom we have a very high regard at Geneva, to consider, as the lodge phrase goes, 'the good and welfare' of Jewish life. One can have no quarrel with that," says an editor of the Hartford Jewish Ledger in its issue of August 31st.

"It is too bad that at a time like this when large sections of the world are under the influence of . . . Goebels and Der Stuermer about the Elders of Zion and a Jewish 'super-government,' that these well-intentioned people should have given this opportunity to our foes to find a false justification about the Jews. It is too bad and it is very, very tragic. When will we Jews learn to wash our dirty linen indoors? . . . This is not the time to convolve a World Jewish Congress."

Canadian Chronicle
The Canadian Jewish Chronicle expresses itself as follows: "The attitude of the editor and because of the seriousness with which it was looked upon it is desirable to . . . examine the sum and substance of the demonstrations. . . It is to be regretted that the news as it appeared in the press is not a little bit clearer. . . The reports are somewhat like the 'Examen' and 'the word synod' was used. . . All this helped to mystify the already nebulous character of the proceedings. . ."

The Worcester, Mass., Jewish Civic Leader comments: "If there ever was a time when Jewry can make nice unite to defend itself . . . it is now."
"Let us, therefore, urge upon our leaders the need to stop wangling and to get down to work and make of the forthcoming Congress a steadfast defense against present day trends. Jews the world over will wipe to give wholehearted support to the Congress."

Brooklyn Post Office Grants Jewish Workers Leave for Holy Days

Reich Prisoner Slated to Get Peace Award

Ossietzky, in Nazi Jail, Expected to Receive Nobel Prize

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
STOCKHOLM, Sept. 6.—The committee which will select the winner of the Nobel Peace Prize today had under consideration the name of Carl von Ossietzky, German pacifist and a political prisoner of the Hitler regime. Ossietzky's name was submitted by the League for the Rights of Man. Messages supporting the proposal of the prize were sent to him have been received from Lion Feuchtwanger, the German Jewish novelist now in exile, and other prominent individuals. Ossietzky was arrested the night of the Reichstag fire and taken to a concentration camp, where beatings and severe drilling maneuvers were used to break down his health. He was editor-in-chief of the Weltbuehne, a pacifist weekly, until the advent of the Nazis, who suppressed it.

The suggestion has been voiced that if he receives the Nobel Prize, his release will follow.

France, Italy Join to Block Nazi Rearing

French Delegates Claim Accord for Common Action

ROBESON, Sept. 6.—The rearmament of Germany will never occur unless the combined might of Italy and France are insufficient to frustrate Adolf Hitler's ambitions along military lines.

This was learned today from French delegates to the Levantine Fair at Bari, who said the Paris government and Italy have reached an accord for common action to block restoration of the Reich to its former fighting prowess.

The delegates declared also that France and Italy have come to a complete agreement on the question of Austrian independence, and have pledged themselves to take common action against the Nazis. Italy will join France in her fight to keep German armaments at the level fixed by the Treaty of Versailles, the visitors said, although it is not to be inferred that French Mussolini is abandoning his desire for revision of that instrument.

The funds that have been raised in this country have been distributed, but they are insufficient to meet the great and immediate needs. The response to the United Jewish Appeal has thus far proved pathetic. The Jews of America have given proportionately less than the Jews of England have contributed toward the German Jewish relief fund. The conscience of American Jewry has not yet presented itself in terms of generosity in accordance with the unparalleled tragedy that has befallen German Jewry and with the increasing economic ruin of Polish Jewry.

During the coming Holy Days the Jews of America should make a demonstration of generosity in their response to the appeals in behalf of the victims of Hitler who are homeless and hopeless. They should be sheltered and unless we give them new hope. The victims of Hitler must be saved now. The refugees must be cared for without delay. They must be provided with food and clothing and homes. If we fail in fulfilling this obligation to our people, the nobility of Jewry will be discredited. Our enemies, who are united and who are working energetically, will gather new strength from our failure to help our people at this critical moment.

For the sake of our self-preservation, for the sake of our self-respect, we cannot afford to leave unanswered the S. O. S. call of the United Jewish Appeal which represents all elements of American Jewry and which is directed to the heart of American Israel.
