Dynamiters of Civilization

Reichsbishop Ludwig Muel-ler, the Nazi church dictator, has launched a drive against Catholics and Protestants in order to force them to join the Nazi church. He has also openly declared war on Jewry and is calling on the Christian world to help the Nazis crush the Jews.

Reichsbishop Mueller told a church meeting that it is the intention of the Nazis to cre-ate a single Christian state

"What we want is a church free from Rome," declared the Nazi church dictator. "The goal for which we are fighting is one state, one people, and one church. If any one cannot join us in this church, cannot fight as we do for the Third Reich, he must be quiet or step aside. If he doesn't, I shall force him to."

Regarding Jews, the Reichs bishop said:

"The Jews always killed whoever told them the truth, and finally even Jesus.

"For the first time one nation has dared to wage war against Jews. We Christians are bound to keep together in this battle, even if we are compelled to suf-

fer privations for half a year." The "spiritual" head of the Nazis, favorite of Adolf Hitler, is threatening to employ force in dealing with Catholics and Protestants who refuse to be servile to the Nazi church dic-tatorship, to the Nazi regime. Many priests and pastors have already been placed in concenarready been placed in concen-tration camps, and now the Bishop of Wuerttemberg, Dr. Theophil Wurm, has been im-prisoned, held in "protective custody."

This is the Nazi brand of Christianity, the mailed fist be-hind the crucifix, the very anti-thesis of the teachings of Jesus.

The Nazi Reichsbishop then oes still further and openly declares war on the Jewish people appealing to the Christians "to appealing to the Christians "to keep together in this battle" against Jewry. He boasts that Nazi Germany is the first nation that has dared to "wage war against the Jowa."

Pay Charges, Says NRA Director

Interminable delay in the soluinterminable delay in the solu-tion of the city's Kashruth prob-lem appeared likely following a second conference yesterday at City Hall between Judge Otto Rosalsky, Aldermanic President Ber-nard S. Deutsch and representatives of the slaughtering industry and the shochtim. A third con-ference will be held on Wednesday.

Supported by objections raised by Leroy Peterson, NRA Code Authority for the industry, to the terms of Judge Rosalsky's decision as mediator, the market men yesterday complained that the terms fixing the minimum compensation for shochtim would cost \$500,000 a year, increasing the present costs of Kashruth almost

hundred-fold. Mr. Peterson, who attended the conference, declared that the Federal Government, through the NRA, was entirely willing to leave conduct of the industry in the hands of a duly constituted Rabbinical board of supervisors but that that there was a serious economic question involved in saddling upon what he regarded as a none-tooprosperous industry, such a con-siderable additional burden.

No Jew on Code Board "As the chairman of the code authority for the industry," Mr. Peterson said, "I want it understood that we have no Jewish rep-resentatives in our administration and therefore know comparatively

and therefore know comparatively little about the more important aspects of the Kosher situation. "I do believe that the Jewish housewife who desires kosher poutry should be able to obtain duly certified kosher poutry at a fair price. To this end we are entirely ready and willing to leave the conduct of the Kashruth procedure and certification to a Rabbidical board as proposed in Judee binical board as proposed in Judge Rosalsky's decision. We think these matters should be left to the industry and a Rabbinical supervisory board.

Market Owners Cannot Only Foreign Jew on German Stage Loses Post by Order

> (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Sept. 20.—Max Hansen, famous Danish Jewish artist, and the only foreign Jew employed on the German stage, was suddenly ousted from his post today, the result of an order issued by Minister of Propaganda Paul Joseph

Goebbels Otto Walburg, German Jewish comedian, only remaining Jewish comedian on the stage, was also dismissed because of the same or-der, despite the fact that he der, despite the fact that he fought in the German army at the front during the World War, which is supposed to carry exemption from the "Aryan clause."

The excuse used by Dr. Goebbels was that he was afraid of possible riots against the Jewish artists on the German stage, owing to the "proclaimed anti-German boycott by the Jewish world conference in Geneva."

A dispatch from Berlin, published yesterday in the London News Chronicle, reported that a wide drive was under way in Ger-many to oust the few Jews remaining in German theatrical, lit-erary and artistic life.

His Country Treats All Equally

GENEVA, Sept. 20.— Reports
outside Austria of discriminations against the Jews of the country do not correspond with facts, Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg declared here today in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic

Commenting on his conversa tion with Neville Laski and Dr. Nahum Goldmann, Jewish leaders on the position of the Jews in his country, the Chancellor said that Austria does not recognize two categories of citizens.

"There is equality for all," he said, "according to their outward and inward attitude toward the state and society. Thus reports of discriminatory treatment cur-

rent abroad are not true.
"It is true, however," Chancel-lor Schuschnigg stated, "that the specific character of the Jewish question in Vienna is primarily due to the political conditions and to the post-war naturalization system, strengthened by the Jewish influx from Eastern Europe. As a consequence there has been a cer-tain reaction, but the law protects all citizens equally if they are

support Poland was receiving, representatives of the great powers withdrew their names from the list of speakers for today and decided

of speakers for today and decided to speak tomorrow, when debate on the subject will be resumed. The Polish viewpoint was placed before the commission by Jan Rac-cynski, who began by declaring that his government has no inten-tion of raising a new discussion with the Jacob Association with the League Assembly on the declaration made by Colonel Josef Beck, and that the Beck statement "was not within the competence of the Assembly."

Poland Revokes Right To Teach in Yiddish

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WILNO, Sept. 20.—Polish authorities delivered another blow at Jewish schools when officials at Jewish schools when officials here ordered that general his-tory, geography and singing be taught in Polish only in the Yiddish and Hebrew schools of this city.

The new decree means the Polonization of the entire Jewish school system because other subjects are already taught in Polish in conformity with a previous law.

Leading Jewish educators. aroused by the new decree, have called a special conference to discuss the future of the Jewish school system in Poland.

That Is Only Way to **Build Homeland**

Jewish workers in Palestine have the right to demand that Jewish entrepreneurs employ Jewish labor only, and this demand must be complied with to the fullest feasible extent if the ideal of an indepen-dent Jewish national home is to be furthered, Dr. Chaim Zhitlow-sky, veteran Socialist Yiddish publicist, declared in an article in vesterday's Day, local Yiddish daily

Discussing the slogan, "Jewish enterprises for Jewish labor," s cry which has created one of Pal-estine's most difficult problems since the day it was first raised, Dr. Zhitlowsky indicates that capi-talist elements, for both class and personal profit reasons, would tend to minimize the demand for Jewish labor.

Arab laborers have always been available at lower rates than Jew ish, and money thus saved was put to work in new undertakings which brought increased incomes to the inhabitants of the country, he

At the same time, he declares Arab labor is the more tractable. Except where the Jewish worker was the more productive, Arab labor was therefore preferred, though not expressedly, especially since it constituted a sort of threat to the Jewish worker, the writer

Dr. Zhitlowsky declares that the argument, such as might be made in Socialist circles, that the Jewish labor slogan violates the prin-ciples of international solidarity is not applicable here, since the sim of Jewish colonization in Palestine is not to further the interests of the private entrepreneur but to create an independent Jewish state

The Jewish masses have con-tributed generously towards the materialization of this ideal, and without their aid the capitalist group in the country could not attained its present status,

Moreover, Zhitlowsky says, the first aim of the working class any-where is to achieve a decent standard of living, and this the Jewish worker of Palestine must also be permitted to do for himself.

Whatever aid he wishes, and eventually must, give to the Arab in his struggle against the Arab capitalist, the worker cannot be part of this aim but must be independent of it, the writer says, if the ideal of the Jawish state is to be advanced.

Jews are also employed in the hospitals and schools, which are distributed along the 1,250 miles of

the railway.

A number of the Jews formerly situated at Harbin now have moved to Shanghai, Tientsin, Mukden and

The Jewish community at Harbin possesses two big synagogues, several smaller praying rooms, a soup kitchen, a bank, a home for aged people, a hospital, a Talmud Torah, a Jewish Women's Club, a branch office of the emigration organization "Hicem" and two Rusganization "Hicem" and two Rus-sian-Jewish weekly papers, one of which follows the general Zion-ist policies, whereas the other is revisionistic.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 5.—Since
Constanza, Rumania's port on the Black Sea, became an important harbor because of the regular transports taking Jews from Ru-mania and Poland to Palestine, and since the establishment of a Rumania-Palestinian chamber of commerce, general interest in Palestine has grown here to a con-siderable extent. This interest is best exemplified by the increase in the number of articles on Palestinian subjects, such as the Levant Fair, which have been featured in the non-Jewish press.

This increased interest is still stronger, of course, in Jewish circles. The East European Jew of Rumania, like the Polish Jew, predisposed to Zionism, for political and economic reasons, and Palestine is for him the oband Patestine is for him the ob-ject of positive activity, not mere-ly of sentimental yearning. But, for economic reasons, the Zionist movement here has not reached considerable proportions, although the leaders have sought to make every person who calls himself a Zionist a paying member of the Zionist Organizations.

Zionist funds have fared somewhat better, especially the Na-tional Fund. The work is headed by Ludwig Bato, who has suc-ceeded in enlisting the aid of Jewish student youth. Frau Vidoveci, delegate of the Keren Kayemeth Central Committee in Palestine, is also active in this work. Dr. M. Heifman, former Jerusalem eye specialist, heads the work for the Keren Hayesod, acting as speaker and writer.

At the suggestion of the Keren Hayesod the Zionist Organization has also begun the publication of a number of brochures on Zionism, relating its history and ideals, and providing information about Palestine. The various efforts de-scribed have resulted in the raising of a million lei (about \$10,000) for the Keren Kayemeth fund for German refugees in but a few months, despite the internal party incentive struggles which obtain here, as tion believener, and the economic diffigures.

Says Germany Talk on Council Aids Migration Held Object of To Palestine Wauchope Trip

Reich Official Sees No Arab Papers Say He'll Friction in Operation of Bureau

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, Sept. 4.—There is no friction between the German government and the Jews who wish to emigrate to Palestine, Dr. M. Weidner, head of the German state emigration bureau, declared in an interview with the Deutsche Zeitung.

The German official stressed the fact that the official regulations for foreign exchange do not handicap the country, since the emi-grants export that part of their possessions which they are allowed to take with them in the form of merchandise to be sold in Pales-

"Our official dealings with the "Our official dealings with the emigrating Jews now work with-out friction," Dr. Weidner said. "The majority of those who leave Germany for Palestine are Zionists. They are to be distinguished from the Jews who adapted themselves to the West European man-ner of living and who refuse to return to the land of their ancestors to till the soil. The emigration of those Jews who go to Amster-dam, Paris, Prague or London, in order to trade, just as they did in Berlin has been stopped in the

'It is quite interesting to listen to the reports given by Jews who settled in Palestine and who returned to Germany for a short visit," Dr. Weidner declared. "These Zionists are full of praise for Pal-estine. The deepest impression they experienced was to see for the first time in their lives their co-religionists as farmers.

"There are numerous farming settlements in Palestine. This has brought about a most remarkable state of affairs. Whereas the Jews in Germany were the middle-men between producers and consumers, this role in Palestine is played by Arabs."

The statement of the German official is in glaring contrast to the stand taken by Der Deutsche, official organ of the Nazi Labor Front. Under a headline "Jewish Usury in Palestine" the paper de-clares that the Arab farmers have suffered for generations under the unbearable interest on loans which the Jews have exacted without fear of punishment.

3. The fate of Akaba, Red Sea port, and the necessity of an agreement on this point with the Saudi-Arabian government which claims ownership of the port.

 The question of Iraq where fears have arisen as a result of recent tension with Persia and the attempt of a neighboring state to fight Iraq's independence and English influence in the kingdom.

There are still rumors that General Wauchope is to become High Commissioner for Iraq or British minister to that country.

He also declared "that now for the first time in the Christian era, a man has dared to war against the Jews and we must unite behind him, even if we are forced to go hungry for six months.

But he dedied to blow it, of all places, in the one spot in Jerusalem where blowing the shofar is an invitation to grief. They are strategically deployed to cover every approach to the Wall. Lined up in front of them, also in something like football garb, are groups of young men. One of them firmly grasps a shofar.
The legend on the posters read:

ANNUAL SHOFAR RUSH The stated admission price is one shilling tuppence.

I'm seated, by some miracle, on the fifty-yard line in the stadium erected specially to permit the pub-

lic a good view of the Annual Sho-My seat must be on the side where the cops have their rooting section. For all around me there are Arabs hopping up and down and whooping it up for the cops. There's no organized cheering, but

the boys are doing a pretty good job of encouraging their heroes just the same. "Come on, you cops!" they roar.
"Mop 'em up! Hold that line!" And so forth.

From the opposite stands, the cheering seems to be somewhat organized. A young lad, in what appears to be a scout uniform, with a megaphone in his hand. bounces around here and there in front of the stands. Once I think I heard him yell, "Give 'em the long locomotive, now! Put everything you've got into this one! Show 'em we're behind 'em!"

The Shofar cheering squad then gives a pretty fair imitation of the Columbia locomotive. Following that, they break into "Roar, Shofar, Roar!" It goes something like this, if I remember correctly:

The crowd likes that one. Even the Arabs politely applaud. Fol-lowing that number the Jewish boys give a perfunctory yell for the cops. The polizel acknowledge the courtesy by bowing stiffly and raising their cork helmets a trifle above their noggins.

Immediately thereafter, the referee comes to the center of the gridiron and, blowing a tune upon a piccolo, (it sounds very much like, "Did you ever hear Pete go tweet, tweet, tweet, on his pic-colo?" and roar:

"Are you ready, Police? Are you ready Shofar?"

They're ready, and how! Hardly has the referee scampered to safety when the brilliant Shofar quarterback, shofar tucked tightly against his chest with four of his galloping mates running in-terference for him and mowing down would-be tacklers with dead-ly precision, crashes through the police lines for the first touch-Standing on the enemy's goal line, at the Wailing Wall, he toots a mighty toot on his Sho-far that brings a thunderous cheer from the stands.

Sees DAWA Handiwork

An employe of one of the stores principally affected (who asked that his name and details be withheld) said there was good reason to believe DAWA was behind the vandalism. This store was one of the first to be attacked, if not the very first. The scratched windows were discovered Saturday morning at opening time. A report was immediately made to the Sixty-sev-enth precinct station. The clerk at the store in ques-

tion stated that on Friday night there had been a serious alter tion between one of the owners of the shop and a man notorious in the neighborhood as one of the most fanatic Nazis and members of DAWA. It is understood details of the affair have been placed in the hands of a prominent attorney, and, if investigation discloses suf-ficient evidence, criminal prosecu-tion will be demanded.

Prominent members of both the Friends of New Germany, local Nazi organization of which Dr. Hubert Schnuch is national president, and DAWA were quick to deny that either of their organizations would countenance or encourage such outrages.

It was recalled by the Jewish shopkeepers that about a year ago similar cases of vandalism had oc-curred and the offenders were never brought to book.

Contradict Police
