King Alexander and the lone

The assassination of King Alexander of Yugo-Slavia has removed a ruler who paid with his life for his ambition to be a dictator. Alexander could have been a popular king of the Serbs, Croatians and Slovenes if the militarists among the Serbs had not won him over to their side and if he had not attempted to impose the lower culture of the Serbs upon the Croatians whose cultural level is higher. The Serbs had lived long under the Turk-ish voke, while the Croatians dominated by the old Austrian Empire.

During the past few years he followed the lead of the father of the Little Entente, Edouard Benes, in international matters. His orientation until the last His orientation until the last few months was in line with France who had helped Yugo-Slavia financially for years. Re-cently, after the break between Mussolini and Hitler, the Yugo-Mussolini and Hitler, the xugu-Slav government was falling un-der Nazi influence, chiefly for the reason that, under existing circumstances, Yugo - Slavia would side with any nation or would side with any nation or bloc of nations opposed to Mus-solini. King Alexander's visit to France was intended for the purpose of re-establishing cor-dial relations with France and incidentally to obtain further financial aid and the promise of military aid in the event of a new European war.

In internal affairs, King Alrander did not follow the advice of his ally, Czechoslovakia. It is known on good authority that Dr. Benes, the Czechoslovak Foreign Minister, had urged King Alexander to give up the dictatorship and to establish a constitutional form of govern-ment. He also warned him of the dangerous consequences of his dictatorship.

Personally, King Alexander was regarded by those who knew was regarded by those who knew him as brave and broadminded. As far as the Jews of Yugo-Slavia are concerned, the late King displayed on all occasions a spirit of fairness toward his subjects of the Jewish faith. He was also very sympathetic to the cause of the Jewish rebuilding of Palestine.

The Jews of Yugo-Slavia reai-ly had no Jewish problem dur-ing his regime. The Jews were treated there upon terms of equality and many of them were elevated to high positions in the government and in public life. The Chief Rabbi was chosen by the King as a member of the Senate. Royal Scott Gulden, leader and organizer of the anti-Semitic Or-der of '76, also succeeded in ohtaining sufficient names on his pe-tition to permit him to run for Congress in the Eighteenth Dis-

William Ingles, Gulden's lieuten-William ingles, Guiden's neuten-ant, who also had Congressional aspirations, fell by the wayside when he was unable to procure enough signatures in the Seventeenth District.

Gulden was still pulling strings last night in an effort to convince Louis Zahne and other Nazi lead-Louis Zahne and other Nazi lead-ers to come into the open with an endorsement of his candidacy. Nazi approval of Gulden appeared less certain yesterday than it had earlier this week. Another development in politi-cal circles was the withdrawal of

car circles was the withdrawal of Charles Oberwager from the Con-gressional race as a candidate in the same district in which Gulden will run, despite the fact that his nominating petition had been filed

nominating petition had been filed on the preceding day.

Oberwager, a former active par-ticipant in German-American so-ciety activities here, and a mem-ber of the Steuben Society, gave no reason for his decision except to state he is "too busy" with

to state he is "too busy" with other matters.

It was generally believed that Oberwager was unwilling to buck the Nazi group in his district. which partly takes in Yorkville.

Hold 20 Cuban Jens For Military Courts

Twenty Jews were arrested today here and will face a military tribunal for having kept
their factories and stores closed during the general strike. The government ordered all busi-nesses to remain open during the strike. Factories and stores owned

by the arrested men have been sealed on orders from the cen tral government and the groun turned over to the military authorities.

An attempt made by the Jewish Juridical Committee to intervene on behalf of the men failed. Military officials declared that they must now be tried by military courts.

Zionists Report Good Progress In Peace Move

Extend London Parleys Between Opposing Factions

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
LONDON. Oct. 10.—Negotiations between the Executive body of the World Zionist Organization and the representatives of the Zionist Revisionist party are proceeding satisfactorily, the Executive in-formed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

The meeting, which is designed to achieve peace among the various factions in the Zionist move-ment, began yesterday and was to have been ended today, but, ac-cording to the Executive, both groups decided that further meetings are necessary.

Officials of the Zionist Executive plan to hold separate confer-ences with the representatives of each group, find a basis for action, and then call a general conference of all the groups together.

Peace among the various fac-tions in the Zionist movement is held to be essential, since the pres-ent disharmony is injuring Jew-ish interests in Palestine.

"And," he reminded, "the lar ger amount of money which you would be compelled to donate, if only for the sake of your own business and peace of mind, would do less actual good to the needy, since such a large percentage would be absorbed by fund-raising

Goldstein Talks Miss Kaplan Tells of Amazing Pick Speakers Meat Workers At Federation | Growth of Zion Laborite Group | To Go on Road | To List Claims

Jewish women in that country is related in plain matter of fact fashion by Elisheva Kaplan, secretary of the Women's Council of the Histadruth, the Central Labor Federation of Palestine

In an interview with the Jew-ish Dally Bulletin, Miss Kaplan, who came here to address the na-tional conference of the Pioneer Women's organization in Chicago, described the phenomenal growth of the women's labor group in the

Miss Kaplan, tall, athletic and bronzed through years of work in the fields, told how she and her comrades came to Palestine from war-torn Russia.

Summoned by Trumpeldor

"I was in Minsk, Russia, in 1918 when the call came from Joseph Trumpeldor, come to work in Pal-estine," Miss Kaplan related. "Eight hundred of us, travelling "Eight hundred of us, travelling in small groups, sneaked across the Russo-Polish border, in spite of the frontier guards. We had no pass-ports, no documents of any kind. There were no trains. So we had to walk. We walked to Warsaw on foot. It took weeks to reach the city and it was months before we reached Palestine.

In Warsaw we were provided with documents and travelled to Czechoslovakia. More delays, more halts. Then we reached Vienna and finally Trieste, where we embarked

"Since that memorable through a continent in the grip of war, I have been in Palestine," Miss Kaplan said. "I have worked in the fields at Rehoboth, Dgania, Mishmar Hayarden and other co-operative groups.

"Our organization is the wo men's division of the Histadruth. We were of the opinion that the woman worker has distinct and separate problems from that of the men. We also believed that We also believed that h women of Palestine Jewish have a definite contribution and a distinct message for Palestine, so the Women's Council was organize

"We began with seventeen members. Today we have a member-ship of approximately 25,000 members, with 10,000 single women workers and some 15,000 married women.

Train Young Girls "There is not a single village or town in Palestine where we do not

have our representatives and an organization. We have organized ten schools where girls are trained work of all kinds in Palestine "Our organization is an integral

part of the Histadruth and adheres closely to the ideals of the general organization, but our special problems cannot be solved by the general organization. We must solve them ourselves.

"For example the problems of the men and women workers are entirely different. A man is paid a minimum wage of \$2.50 a day, even for unskilled labor. But when a woman comes into a factory she is paid a fourth of what a man is paid. We therefore found it is paid. We therefore found it necessary to train girls, so that when they did work in factories they could do skilled work and command a living wage.

"In certain types of work, which are easier for women to do, we demand preference. For instance in packing and grading oranges. We also found that it is hard for We also found that it is hard for a woman to compete with men in agriculture. So we set out to train women in specialized types of work, such as poultry raising. But we also trained women to do heavy work on the fields and they work side by side with the men" side by side with the men.

The Palestine Jewish women's leader will remain in the United States for one year. After her participation in the Chicago conference, she will tour the United States in the interest of the Pio-neer Women's organization, with which her group is closely bound.

Paganism Hit By Lewisohn In Burlington

City Hall Packed to Hear Writer's Address

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence)
BURLINGTON, Vt., Oct. 9. Speaking at a meeting for the benefit of victims of religious persecution before an audience of 600 packed Burlington's small city hall auditorium, Ludwig Lewisohn reiterated his indict-ment of modern civilization, which he says is returning to the paganism of past ages.

All the gains made by mankind since the French Revolution have been destroyed in the last few years in a great series of tragedies, Lewisohn said.

The golden image of paganism as arisen in the totalitarian state, now represented by Italy, Germany and Russia, which destroy, or attempt to destroy, body and soul of those who refuse to pour libations to the spirit of totalitarianism, he asserted.

They are trying to reduce man-ind to the state of bees and ants, he added.

Drawing a parallel among Nazism, Communism and the old city state of Sparta, the author said: "The Nazis had to repudiate

the Mazis had to reputate the fundamental scripture and ethical feeling of the western world in the development of the tendency to arrogance which led totalitarian leaders to seek scape-goats for the national wrath."

Both of the stories, "The Calf" and "Jacob the Watchman," are autobiographical, describing the emotions of a sensitive boy his pet calf is slaughtered and when the town watchman dies.

350 Are Named to Committee for Annual Ball

Three hundred and fifty Brook-lyn Jewish leaders were mobilized in the campaign for the tenth an-nual \$100 dinner and ball to be held by the Brooklyn Federation Jewish Charities at the Hotel St. George, Sunday evening, Nov-ember 18.

Announcement of the full list of committee members. vice-chairmen, and division chairmen for the dinner and ball was made last night at a dinner at the Unity Club by Harry Zeitz, president of that club and chairman of the Federation affair. The dinner and ball, outstanding Brooklyn Jewish social event of the year, is to fur-nish the major share of funds for hish the major share of funds for the support of the Federation's twenty-five constituent agencies during the late Fall and early Winter months.

The meeting last night was the first at which the full membership of the dinner and ball "army" gathered. Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May, president of the Federation, introduced Zeitz, who heads the dinner and ball commit-tee for the second successive year.

Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, executive director of the Federation, warned the large committee that allotments from the Brooklyn Fed-eration of Jewish Charities to its twenty-five constituent agencies may have to be reduced, or in may have to be reduced, or in some instances totally curtailed for the remainder of this year, if the dinner and ball proceeds do not reach at least the figure attained at last year's affair. Second of a Series

The article from which the above summaries are taken is the second of a series on Germany by Kelly, the magazine's traveling correspondent. It is called, "Ber-City of Gloom." Excerpts from the article fol-

low:
"I am constantly surprised by Tows in Berlin, the number of Jews in Berlin, who, despite the Jewish persecutions, appear to be getting along rather well. One group, I discover, is treated with great courtesy and consideration. These are the junk dealers—I mean the dealers in such items as old iron and copper, who operate on a big scale. Their business takes on great importance in these times of shortage of all kinds of goods; and it is a kind of busi-ness that only Jews understand.

"Nobody else has had the necessary training in collecting junk
and determining values. Likewise,

"An American friend living in Berlin asked me to walk along and visit with him, while he went to call on his family physician regarding a minor ailment. This physician turned out to be a Jew, and his outer office was well filled with patients. They went to him, my friend explained, because he happened to be an extraordinary good doctor.

'I asked him how other doctors of his race were making out.

"Oh, those who were established in private practice are getting along well enough; he said. "But those connected with hospitals, with insurance companies, or in any kind of state jobs are not. At that, we are far better off than Jewish lawyers are. Criticizes Boycott Publicity

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin: In the September issue of The New York Times, there appears an interview with Mr. Samuel Un-termyer, President of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League to Cham-pion Human Rights, in which he challenged the Secretary of State Cordell Hull's "ill-considered and short-sighted opinion on the economic soundness or unsoundness of the boycott." He goes on to "It is not the first time that mild-mannered gentleman has un-wisely surrendered to the pressure of the propagandist who is masquerading as an Ambassador." Since the appearance of this in-terview, Mr. Untermyer has pre-sented an official protest to the Secretary of State upon the sub-ject of the latter's attitude toward the boycott.

It appears to me that Mr. Un-termyer does the Secretary of

State an injustice, particularly when one recalls that Mr. Hull in an official statement to the German government stated its policy did not have the approval of many of the nations of the world. In the face of such an official representation of the policy of the State Department, it is a most extraordinary thing to accuse Mr. Hull of having "surrendered to the pressure of the propagandist who is masquerading as an Ambassa-

It is unfortunate that one who at is unfortunate that one who has boycotted the Jewish religion all of his life, should attempt to exploit the sufferings of his people in the interest of his own undis-

guised and exaggerated passion for publicity. His attempt to mass the Jews in a blocade of the Ger-man people, and in an economic war against the Nazis, does not have the support of many reli-giously-minded in Israel. His constant proclamation from the housetops that the American peo-ple should boycott the Nazis, is an undemocratic and un-American attempt to trespass upon the lib-erty of the individual. It is the right of the individual to boycott right of the individual to boycott German commodities, and that right is being wisely, quietly and dignifiedly used by a great many people who thus silently protest against the insane policies of the Nazi government, but that indi-vidual is not attempting to mass the American resole into such as the American people into such a boycott, nor is he exerting pressure upon the liberty of other individuals or of commercial organizations. It is his belief, in con-sonance with the dictates of the Jewish religion, that if we shall pray for and assist with dignity and with peaceful methods, in the elimination of wrong, the wrongdoer will quite naturally disappear. It is high time that those who believe in the religion of Israel should protest against the publicity-seeking of the boycotter who all his life-long has boycotted the Jewish religion, and who if he were not a stranger to the history of Jewish thinking, would be much more interested in its dignity, than he apparently is in his own self-dramatization.

Briton Finds Poland Very Poor, Yet Determined to Play Big Role

London Newspaper Correspondent Writes Pilsudski Land Is Weak Relation of Great Powers of Europe: Marshal Reported Jerking Strings

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) LONDON, Sept. 27.—Poland is a country of extreme poverty cou-pled with a fierce national pride and a determination to play a leading role in European affairs, a special correspondent of the London News-Chronicle declared after a tour of the country.

after a tour of the country.

"After an extensive tour of the country I find the Poles more united than at any time in the last fifteen years on a policy of semi-political and wholly spiritual

isolation from the rest of Europe," the correspondent wrote.

"A high official of the Polish "A high official of the Polish Foreign Ministry summed up the Polish foreign policy by telling me we have no intention of be-coming the battle-ground of Europe in the next war. This opin-ion in itself is a sure reflection of the opinions of the people.

Isolation Rampant

"Polish opinion is today more intensely anti-nationalistic than that of any other European country. I found an epidemic of isolationism' that would delight the hearts of Lords Beaverbrook and Rothermere.

"My friend in the Foreign Ministry described it as 'an absolute determination not to become endetermination not to become en-tangled in a foreign alliance.' And in this connection it is interesting to note that opinion in Warsaw is rapidly stiffening against French

influence.

"Poland is no longer content to be the catspaw of French statesmanship. She aims to rank as one of the Great Powers. One of the innumerable causes of friction between Poland and France was the complaint that inferior war matewas sold to the Polish army. The latest source of friction is the Eastern Locarno pact.

In name Poland is governed by a national bloc, but from be-hind, Pilsudski pulls the strings. Dictator Seldom Seen

"He is almost the mystery statesman of a mystery thriller seldom seen, seldom heard. "I have seen Marshal Pilsudski only twice in the course of five years,' a foreign diplomat stationed in Warsaw told me. Poland's mili-tary dictatorship is thus well disguised, but it is none the less very real and active.

One becomes conscious here of the almost pathetic anxiety to be-lieve in the German-Polish pact. Before the signing of the treaty Germans and Poles would hardly speak to one another. Now they slap each other on the back,' a Polish industrialist told me.

"But your countrymen wonder continuously whether the slap on the back may not suddenly be-come a blow," I replied. 'If it does Poland will be ready,' he answered tersely.

McLaughlin was attempting to justify his introduction of the racial issue into a printtion of the racial issue into a print-ed attack, couched in guttersnipe language, on a Jewish lawyer. Hamid was being prosecuted for some amazingly disgusting street corner exhortations he had delivered up in Harlem. Ingles, over the telephone, ru

fully admitted that his attempt to gather together the required numer of names on a petition nominating him as a Congressional can-didate had fallen short of the

To paraphrase a nursery rhyme, "Four little blackbirds looking for some fun. Along came a h laugh, and then there was one.

Not that Hamid, McLaughlin and Ingles are through, by any means. Whatever the outcome of the two court cases, the Negro agitator and the Irish-Catholic Nazi mercenary will be back again -sorry representatives of two races which in general are staunchly aligned with the Jews in a battle against bigotry. Ingles will continue to be active in the anti-Semitic campaign of the so-called Order of '76, which acknowledges him as one of his leaders.

A curious point in each of these cases, and in the many similar ones, is that all these fellows invariably say, "Some of my best friends are Jews." Oddly enough, what they say is ue. Some of their best friends

true. are Jews-cringing Jews who are rotten enough at core to snicker with self-conscious pleasure when any low-born son of a miscegena-tion says to them, "Oh, I don't mean you. I mean those other fellows-those typical Jews that you find here, there and every-

my best friends are Jews," that se persons who utter it don't understand themselves.

Some of their best friends are Jews whom they've never even met or seen.

Among the staunchest friends of the Hamids and the McLaughlins and the Ingles are the what-busi-ness-is-it-of-mine Jews, who haven't felt the squeeze themselves yet, or at least aren't conscious of it.

These Jews yawn with smug self-satisfaction when they hear or read of various incidents which don't seem to them to come close enough to home to make any dif-ference to them as individuals. But this Day Book is degenerat-

But this Day Book is degenerat-ing into ar editorial, which it never was meant to be. Let's examine the case of Royal Scott Ingles, the fourth little blackbird, who sits perched on the fence smiling contentedly at the way things have been going for him.

Gulden, as you all probably know by now, is the organizer and leader of the Order of '76, which pretends to be a "patriotic" Amerlcan organization but which actu-ally partakes of all the worst characteristics of the Ku Klux Klan and other mystic appeals to ignorance and bigotry. He admitted to a Jewish Daily Bulletin reporter yesterday that a statement made in yesterday's issue of that paper by the mustard concern's president is correct in every detail, and that he is in no connected with the company. nor has he ever been at any in the past.

Meanwhile the mustard manu-facturers have felt the unfair repercussions of an irresponsible gabber's idea of humor.
One of the incidental laughs in

the situation is that some of the Nazi leaders who have half-promised Gulden their backing have been under the impression that he is "in the money."

Finds It 'Jewish Impudence' Nazi Reviews Rothschild Film;

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
LONDON, Sept. 25.—The film
ntitled "The House of Rothschild," now being shown here, is but another attempt on the part of the Jews to strengthen their position in the eyes of a world becoming more and more hostile to them, says Walter Ewald in the Westdeutsche Beobachter, prom-inent Nazi newspaper, in a recent

issue. The solution of the Jewish question in Germany has found an echo throughout the world. In every country one now finds po-litical groups discussing the Jew-ish question," the writer says. He points to the Mosleyite Fascists here as the most apt students of Germany.

The Rothschild film, which "is being shown in London to the accompaniment of the shouts of the whole Jewish-influenced press" at-tempts to picture the banking family as "noble persons" who ramily as "noble persons" who came upon their wealth "only indirectly," says Ewald, but as a matter of fact, he 'reveals," they obtained their power through a series of swindles.

Naturally, the Nazi writer says, the Rothschilds saw to it that none of these exploits were mentioned in the annals of history, which is why a film such as the one in question could have been made and distributed in the hope that the ignorance of the specta-tors would protect the subjects of the picture.

The facts of the case differ from those presented in the film, Ewald declares, and proceeds to explain that the Rothschild family could only have gained a footbold at a time when-Germany was ensanared in long drawn out wars and her ruling princes were unscrupulous money wasters.

"Had the Rothschilds lived in a rata the Rothschilds lived in a healthy time, under a good gov-ernment, they could never have established their family power; at the first swindle they would have wandered into jail," asserts Ewald. He then goes into a lengthy "true history" of the family.

"The 'Rothschild Case' gives us much to think about," he says in conclusion. "The time of the wars of liberation was a time of terrible need for the nation. The Jews profited by it. . . . Was it not ex-actly the same a hundred years later. at the time of the World War? . . . The Rothschilds, so celebrated today, were the forerunners of the Kutiskers and the Barmats.... Three Testify Hamid Spoke No III of Jews

'Never Even Mentioned Them,' Negroes Say on Stand

Three Negro witnesses placed on the stand yesterday by the defense to testify that Sufi Abdul Hamid, self-styled "black Hitler of Harlem" did not verbally attack Jews at a street meeting on September 15.

Abdul Hamid has been hailed into court on a charge of disorderly conduct, preferred by Edgar H. Burman, leader of the Anti-Nazi Minute Men of America.

Robert O. Jordan, auto painter; Ross B. Brown, "lecturer" on Hamid's staff and Josephine Beckton were the witnesses.

Brown admitted that he

lecturer on Hamid's staff and stoke at Hamid's meetings. He and the other two witnesses insisted that not only had Hamid never spoken against the Jews, but that they had never heard Hamid men-tion the Jews at any of his meet-Ignorant of Complaint

Assistant District Attorney William Margolles, in charge of the prosecution hammered at the credibility of the witnesses emphasizing that Brown had volunteered to appear for Hamid without even knowing the nature of the complaint against him.

"Do you mean to say that you volunteered to appear in court without knowing what you were going to testify about?" Brown asked.

was asked.
"I didn't know what I was going to testify until the testimony developed," Brown replied.

Jordan then took the stand and evoked laughter when he testified under cross-examination by the prosecution that he had listened to the same speech by Hamid for "ninety consecutive evenings be-cause I was interested." A contradiction appeared in Jordan's testimony when he de-

clared that he volunteered to tes-tify about Hamid's meeting on September 15, and the prosecution demonstrated that Jordan could not possibly have known that the aint referred to the September 15 meeting, since the com-plaint did not specify that particular meeting.

Before presentation of testi-mony favorable to Hamid, defense attorney John Boles complained to Magistrate Overton Harris that three of Hamid's witnesses had been intimidated by a police sergeant, ejected from the court room and that one witness had been hurled violently down a flight of stairs. Judge Harris refused to take any action on the complaint.

Hamid was the first witness yesterday, continuing his testi-mony of Tuesday. Asked, "are you a Hindu?" he replied, "I am an American."

BERLIN, Sept. 28.—Jewish doctors and lawyers who, in accordance with the "Aryan para graph," are permitted to continue "Arvan paratheir practice in Germany, will start a campaign for legislation similar to that proclaimed recently by the Reich Minister of the In-terior for Jewish pharmacists, it is predicted today in the Wahrheit.

The order by the Minister of the Interior to which the Wahrheit refers provides that no discrimination should be practiced by municipal and state institutions against Jewish pharmacists who have had their licenses renewed under the Hitler regime. Orders from state and municipal hospitals as well as from sick funds can be placed with such Jewish pharmacists who are not to be boycotted, the regulations emphasize.

The order is now causing great dissatisfaction among the Nazi party officers. A sharp difference party officers. A snarp difference is evident between the order issued recently by Rudolf Hess to boycott the Jews in every walk of life, and that given by Minister Frick which warns against boycotting Jewish pharmacists.

American Jewish Congress Sends Condolences

A message of condolence was sent yesterday to the French government by the American Jewish Congress on the assassination of Foreign Minister Barthou. At a meeting of the Adminis-trative Committee of the Congress, Professor Horace Kallen reviewed the career of the deceased French statesman. He referred to the late Foreign Minister "as a distin-guished democrat and lover of peace" and declared his death peace" and declared his death "a great loss to the French Republic, to the cause of peace and good will in Europe, and to the human rights of the Jews in the family of nations in Europe."

Pro-Nazi Editor Is Indicted
