ROME, Nov. 6.—A preliminary
foreshadowing of what will be foreshadowing of what will be one of the most important events in deciding the ultimate destiny of the Saar took place here today when French and German delegates conferred with members of the League of Nations Saar Terthe League or Nations saar rer-ritory Commission on the prob-lem of policing the district during the plebiscite next January 13. Reliable reports stated that use of French troops was under con-sideration by the Commission,

sideration by the Commission, which is headed by Baron Pompeo Aloisi, who led today's discussion.

Expect Violence

Expectation of widespread dis-turbances on the day of the plebiturbances on the day of the pien-scite, because of intense feeling among members of the various Saar factions, has induced the Commission to give serious Saar factions, has induced the Commission to give serious thought to the policing problem. Several neutral countries are known to have 'een approached with requests to supply guards for the polls, but 'hus far all have shunned the responsibility. France, it is believed, would be

eager to take over the task, under the conviction that, although it entertains no hope of being se-lected by Saar voters as the nation of their future allegiance, its troops could at least keep Nazi intimidation to a minimum, with a possible resultant vote in favor of maintenance of the status quo,

Survey Notes Sharp Decrease This Year in Need for Relief

A considerable drop in relief ex- | ly. Total declines, figures show, penditures of forty-two Jewish family agencies for the first eight months of this year is noted in a report made public yesterday by the Bureau of Jewish Social Research

The monthly average for the January-to-August period this year was \$237,153, as compared with \$460.116 for the same months in 1933, the report states.

While the Bureau statement admits that the largest single fac-tor in this drop has been the shifting of the major share of Jewish dependency in Baltimore, Cleveland, St. Louis and San Francisco to public agencies in those cities,

An equally striking feature of the report is the fact that there were only 14,329 families under care of the forty-two agencies in June, 1934, as compared with 21,-911 families for the same month of the preceding year.

Slaughterers Decide

Developments yesterday were: Shochtim Union Local 440 voted 145 to 118 to disregard the issur (ban) and slaughter. The Kashruth Association declared every shochet who

slaughtered in violation of the ban was disqualified to slaughter further and all poultry killed by them is non-kosher.

The Kashruth Association reported twenty-three market men agreed to accept its plan, including supervision and tagging.

Bronx poultry markets did business as usual. Slaughtering continued in upper Manhattan markets, but not in lower Manhattan or Brooklyn. Observers reported the issur about sixty per cent effective.

The Kashruth Association appealed to the Jewish community to support the issur and to Jewish congregations to expel shochtim who defy it.

Rabbi Menashe Margolis, head of the Knesses Israel, issued an alternate Kashruth plan and said the organization would give special dispensation to shochtim to slaughter under this plan in defiance of the issur.

Jews Prepare to Evacuate Austria

Are Spurred by Bleak Outlook Under Cleric-Fascist Regime

Robbed of Jobs and Degraded by Flood of Anti-Semitic Measures, Old and Young Pack Luggage, With Eves on Palestine and Other Lands

Mass emigration of Jews from Austria has now started. The Jews have lost hope that conditions in Austria will not become the same as in Germany. Vienna papers are full of advertisements. Forwarding agencies and travel bureaus are besieged by

Many Jews are packing up their belongings and are preparing to leave Vienna, once so attractive but now so unpleasant for hhem. The Clerical-Fascist program has brought mishap to the country; and a still lower Hitleristic anti-Semitism which robs the Jew of his livelihood, drives him away quietly, without pogroms

and without excesses, but most effectively nevertheless.

Would Go to America
If America or any other civilized country were open for immigration, half of the Jews of Austria would have left the country within a week-mot only the ry within a week—not only the Eastern Jews who came here from Galicia and Bukovina, but even the 100 per cent Western Jewish aristocracy and particularly those who have been fully emancipated for several generations, are disgusted by this display of anti-Semitism.

They feel themselves person-ally degraded by each blow dealt the Jews, veiled one day in a diplomatic government commu-nique and effected the next day in a mean and brutal manner by the various administrative offices

Robbed of Hope Jewish youth flees because the present economic program has robbed it of all hope of building careers in official or private oheres. The middle-aged and oldeads of families and the intelals prepare to make the jour-before they have spent their cent. There is little doubt that a precipitate exodus of Jews from Austria must be reckoned

The chief desire of the Jews is to go to Palestine. They sacrifice all their possessions in order to acquire the amount required to ob-tain a "capitalist" or professional

certificate for Palestine.

The young Jew is eager to go there as a chalutz. Intellectuals, dismissed from their posts, own-ers of factories and merchants

are less eager.
Advertise Belongings

The newspapers are full of ad-vertisements: Jews offer all their belongings for sale, purchasers of works of art and more or less expensive furniture are wanted. But the more advertisements in the papers the less purchase money is to be found, the fewer buyers are located and the less the sales rea-

This situation is much worse than it was in Germany. Other Jews will buy nothing from the prospective emigres because they fear that tomorrow they, too, per-haps, will be forced to sell their own belongings. Young Jewish couples make no effort to furnish homes, they live provisionally in furnished rooms; they prefer to hold the money in order to have

something with which to emigrate.

The non-Jewish population, witnessing the haste of the Jews, re-frains from buying in the belief that the fleeing Jews will sell much cheaper tomorrow or the day after tomorrow.

mark, is the medium of exchange in that district. This is important. because it means the Saar hasn't been hit by inflation and by the uncertain monetary fluctuations that have worked such havoc with German business

"Another fact to be considered is that the Saar depends almost exclusively on its coal mines for income. France already has made it clear that if the district goes over to the Reich, she will refuse to purchase Saar coal. Germany herself is in no position to support the mines. Therefore the area's chief industry stands to suffer drastically if the plebiscite decides in favor of Hitler

Threats May Swing Vote "While residents of the valley are undeniably German, racially and in their sympathies, I don't believe they have much sincere love for the Nazis. Many of them have been frightened, however, by threats of 'what will happen to you after January, 1935, if you don't stop shooting your mouth off, and if you don't vote right.'"

Liepmann expects to go to Mon-treal to lecture this week-end. He plans eventually to take up resi-dence in London. Asked whether he would seek British citizenship,

he smiled quizzically.
"I don't think so," he said. "You know, my family has been in Ham-burg since the seventeenth cen-tury."

Is Only 29
Although he is only twenty-nine
years old, the writer seems much
older. The physical brutalities to which he was subjected in a Nazi concentration camp have left in-delible marks on him. Physicians have told him he has only a year

or two to live.
"But I don't mind," he says.

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Eastern Europe

For some time past, suggestions have been made to the American Jewish Committee and to the Joint Foreign Committee in London that the personal visit of an officer of those committees to Eastern Europe would be welcome.

Emphasis was put upon the distressed condition of the Jewish population in Central and Eastern Europe and the feeling which has grown up that they had been forgotten, and that the German Jewish crisis had served further to remove an appreciation of their difficul-

In response to this sentiment, Mr. Morris Waldman, secre-tary of the American Jewish Committee, on his recent visit to Europe, made a tour in Austria and in Poland which was followed later by a longer visit made by Mr. Neville Laski, president of the Board of Jewish Deputies of England, to these countries.

After a complete survey of the Jewish situation in Poland, in Austria and in Danzig, Mr. Neville Laski returned to London with the following recommendations:

1. Visits should periodically be made by Western European and American Jews to Central and Eastern European Tewries for the purpose of making contacts with these Jewries and also with the Governments of the countries concerned.

2. An effort should be made to survey the Jewish position in those countries from a legal and statistical point of view so that any representations to governments may be based upon well attested facts.

3. verv encouragement should be given to the occupa-tional redistribution of Jews.

4. The extension of the loan bank system in Poland is urgently desirable so that outlets may be provided for new in-

5. Polish Tewry should make arnest efforts for internal unity, and strive to achieve a betbalance between their religious and secular activities.

The conclusions to which Mr. Laski came show how serious the legal and economic position of the Jews in Poland and Austria is. The seriousness of the situation is substantiated especially by the press reports from Warsaw and Vienna this week.

THE ARGENTINE CLOCK

BUENOS AIRES.

The Jewish population of the Argentine is, like the Jewish element in every country, a reliable instrument for gauging the state of mind of the population as a whole. Just at present that state is one of uneasiness aroused by a series of events. The first was the Eucharistic

Congress, held every two years as a demonstration of Catholic strength, which took place in Buenos Aires last month. Preparations for the Congress preceeded it by several months.

One incident which aroused considerable comment was the fact that the organization committee invited all the school pupils to participate in Eucharist cere-monies. Distinction between Jewish and Catholic children, thus brought to the fore, was before that non-existent here.

Among the other factors con-tributory to the general uneasiness were a series of anti-Jew-ish attacks, some of them editorial, in newspapers in many parts of the country, the demon strations staged inside and outside film theatres where the "House of Rothschild" was being shown, and several attempted bombings and other vandalisms committed upon synagogues and

other buildings.

Among the latter were the throwing of acid upon the fa-cades of the temple on Libertad street, the synagogue on Papo street and the home of the Ga-zeta Israelita, a Yiddish news-

The beautifully ornamented temple on Libertad street has been defaced three times. Last year, when the first attack was made, the general press protested sharply against the dese-cration. But this year, when the same edifice was the object of two attacks during the High Holidays, mere brief uncommented reports appeared in the newspapers.

Indicate Stress

In Recent Months

These minor demonstrations, generally attributed to Nazis, are indicative of the disturbed are indicative of the disturbed atmosphere attendant upon the struggle for power which has been going on here since Sep-tember 6, 1930, when the "radical" middle class party lost to the conservatives. The ruling cal middle class party lost to the conservatives. The ruling party is attempting to entrench itself firmly through the crea-tion of a Fascist organization. But the Fascist legions, declared But the Fascist legions, declared legal under the dictatorship of General Uriburi and permitted the use of arms, are really, an exotic plant on Argentine soil. Despite the fact that there

is no room here for Fascism of the Italian, German or even Polish type, Fascism is used by the party in control to combat radicalism and other democratic forces, primarily through the creation of an artificial nationalist atmosphere in this melt-

ing-pot country.

The bill recently passed in the Senate for "press protection" is an excellent example of the reactionary parliamentary mani-festations of this party. The bill has aroused much criticism and it is hoped the Chamber of Deputies will defeat or at least modify it.

Judiciary Follows General Trend

A further example of the manner in which the clock is being turned back here is the way in which Parliament de-fended the police on the occa-sion when they were being accused of torturing arrested persons. Such action is definitely unconstitutional here. That the judiciary is following along the same lines may be seen from the fact that the chief tribunal the fact that the chief tribunal recently annulled the citizenship of a Spaniard on the ground that he was a Communist. In that particular case the court ruled that since Communism strives to overthrow the exist-ing government the oath taken by the candidate for naturaliz-ation to uphold the government is invalid.

The case is an exceptional one. In general, the foreigner here feels no restriction of his civil rights. But the verdict of the highest tribunal has now the highest tribunal has now placed the foreigner, even though he be naturalized, in a position which is worse than that of native Argentine.

In this atmosphere of reaction and police despotism, nationalistic demagogy, anti-Semitism, Fascism, and Fascism itism, Fascism, and Fascism linked with clericalism, flourish -especially when they are ac-companied by all the most modern devices for the spread of propaganda.

Naturally, the Jews here have Naturally, the lews here have the proper regard and objec-tivity of attitude with respect to the religious aims of Cath-olicism. Buenos Aires rabbis olicism. Buenos Aires rabbis even sent greetings to the Eu-charistic Congress held in their city. A delegation composed of representatives of various Jewish organizations also called unon Cardinal Verdier, Archbishop of Paris, to thank him for the of Paris, to thank him for the help he has given the relief activities on behalf of German refugees. Cardinal Verdier thanked the delegation for its message, adding that he had merely done his duty, since "we all belong to the same family." Incitement

Nevertheless, there were some priests who took occasion this year to deliver anti-Semitic speeches, most of them over the radio. The impression created is that Albara Carballalana. is that although Catholicism is officially not anti-Semitic, it gladly accepts the help of Fasgladiy accepts the help of Fas-cism, which it discreetly pro-tects. Strengthening political and cultural reaction in the country, this attitude definitely helps prepare the ground for anti-Semitism.

The strongest negative factor is the German Nazist movement here. This movement and its agents are the "spiritual strength" of all the anti-Semitic newspapers and organizations supported by the "educated" element. It is a power moving definitely towards its goal—to turn the clock back in the Argentine.

Should Jerusalam have a Tawish mayor?

This question is now the cause of an internal fight among Pal-estine Jews. With the defeat of Nashashibi as Mayor of Jerusalem in the last municipal elections, certain Jewish leaders in Palestine feel that for the first time in two thousand years the Jews now have their chance to rule Jerusalem by insisting that

a Jewish mayor be appointed.

The demand that the city
mayor of Jerusalem be a Jew is not based upon mere fantastic ambition. With the Jews and ambition. With the Jews and the Arabs holding six seats each in the municipal council, the chances of having a Jewish mayor appointed are as favorable as those for having an Arab mayor. The Argument Against It

On the other hand, certain Jewish circles in Palestine feel that it would be much better for the Jewish interests if the Jews did not insist on having a Jewish mayor but supported Mr. Khaldi, Nashashibi's competitor, instead.

Jewish circles which prefer to support Khaldi argue that from a political viewpoint it is more beneficial to split the Arab ranks than to have a Jew as mayor.

They feel that if Khaldi, and
not a Jew, were appointed
mayor, this would result in strong animosity between those Arab circles supporting Nash-ashibi and those siding with Khaldi. From this split the Khaldi. From this split the Arab ranks the Jews would bene-fit more than from having a Jewish mayor, who would only unite the Arabs against him. What does the Palestine gov-

ernment say in this dispute?
The Palestine government has indicated that it will under no circumstances permit the mayor of Jerusalem to be a Jew. The government has plenty of trouble with the Arabs and would not like to aggravate-it by endors-ing a Jew as mayor, it has been intimated.

The temptation to take advantage of the present situation which makes it possible for a Jew to become the mayor of Jerusalem is however, too great Jerusalem is however, too great for those Jewish circles in Pal-estine which feel that now is the time to see a Jew as the head of the capital of Palestine.

The Englishman Steps In As a result of this internal difference in the Jewish ranks. difference in the Jewish ranks, the Palestine government may modify altogether the status of the mayoralty in Jerusalem. It may appoint a town clerk, who will do all the managing in the will do all the managing in the Jerusalem municipality. This clerk will, needless to say, be neither a Jew nor an Arab. He will be an Englishman.

Semi-official reports about the appointment of such a town clerk circulated this week in London. There is no doubt that the ap-pointment of an Englishman as town clerk will take away all chances for the Jews ever to gain real control over the Jeru-salem municipality. Further more, should a town clerk be apmore, should a town clerk be ap-pointed for Jerusalem, similar clerks may eventually be nom-inated also for the municipalities of Haifa and Tel Aviv.

The present dispute in Pales-tine may thus not only result in destroying the chances of havdestroying the chances of hav-ing a Jewish mayor in Jerusalem. It may also eventually result in having the wholly Jewish city of Tel Aviv placed under the control of an Englishman.

who can tell whether it may not also be extended to Tel Aviv.
