Turkey will pay American claimants damages to the extent of \$1,300,000 for losses inflicted by the Turkish army in Palestine during the World War, the agreement provides.

It is estimated that American-Jewish citizens will receive \$750,-000 in settlement of their claims against the war-time Turkish gov-

Aba Chushi, of Palestine, a special delegate of the Jewish Agency, is now in Poland, where he is selecting the candidates for dock work in Haifa from thous-ands of Jewish applicants in every section of Poland.

A similar procedure was fol-lowed at Salonica, Greece, where the Jewish Agency chose 130 young Jews for work in Haifa harbor. The Salonica Jews, however, have been harbor workers for generations.

#### Mosley and 3 Cronies Held for Riot Trial

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, Nov. 15.—Sir Os-wald Mosley, "fuehrer" of the British Fascists, and three of his henchmen were committed to stand trial at Worthing today on a charge of riotous assembly after a blackshirt meeting in that city on October 9. They were also charged with assault. All four were released on bail after pleading not guilty.

Thirty witnesses testified dur-ing the preliminary hearing, which lasted four days. The prosecution contended that after the meeting, Fascists led by the four accused men walked up and down assaulting innocent and inoffensive pedestrians.

Voluntarily Resign Citizenship Rights' Guaranteed by Peace Treaties and Constitution

VIENNA, Nov. 15.—Austrian Jewry will never voluntarily resign its citizenship rights and all other rights guaranteed by the peace treaties and the Austrian constitution, leading Austrian Jewish personalities declared today at a mass meeting called by the Austrian Zionist Organization. They called on the entire Jewish population for united support in the struggle to defend Jewish rights.

Five representatives of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League to Champion Human Rights, headed Samuel Untermyer, president, will sail for England on the Be-rengaria tonight to attend the International Boycott Conference beginning in London November 25.

The conference in London is intended to extend and strengthen the boycott movement, initiated here by the league eighteen months

The delegation will, in addition to Mr. Untermyer, be made up of Dr. Paul Hutchinson of Chicago, editor of the Christian Century; Mrs. William McAdoo Jr. of Los Angeles; Richard J. Beamish, for-mer secretary of the Common-wealth of Pennsylvania, and Mrs. Mark Harris, chairman of the wo-men's division of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League.

# The principal speakers at the meeting were Dr. Desider Friedmann, president of the Vienna Sail Tonichtfor mann, president of the Vienna Jewish community; Dr. Lowen-London Parley betz and Dr. Ehrlich, vicepresidents of the community. Dr. Gruenbaum. Austrian Zionist leader, presided.

"We demand living room for the Jews of Austria," the Jew-ish leaders declared in discussing the newly proclaimed Corporative Fascist State in Austria.

"We want the world and all the governments of the world to know that we will never voluntarily resign our citizenship rights, which are 'sacra non tangere' and not to be touched).

#### Fulfill Duties

"We are not peevish, but we react when we are hurt and facts and occurrences causing justified complaints necessitated these dec-larations. We know that ninety per cent of the Austrian popula tion is Christian and German and that they are entitled to a consti-tution of their own choosing.

"We are fulfilling our duties to our country, but at the same time we are a national and religious minority and we demand the same equality of rights, not only con-stitutionally, but in actual administrative practice.
"Force may do much, but we

will never surrender one iota of the rights safeguarded us by the peace treaties and by the consti-tution," the Austrian Jewish leaders said. Drs. Friedmann and Ehrlich also

stated that they will present the viewpoint of the Austrian Jews to the Austrian government. They appealed to the entire Jewish population, regardless of party or fac-tion, for united support for the program presented at the meeting.

# Arabs Demand Mount Canaan Under 500-Year-Old Document

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) SAFED, Palestine, Nov. 15 Development of the northern Jewish settlements in this district is seriously threatened as the result of a dispute begun by Arab agitaimported from Jerusalem concerning ownership of land on Mount Canaan.

In Jewish hands for forty years, the land on Mount Canaan is now being claimed by the Arabs as part Moslem religious hi Bey Khadra, property. Subhi Bey notorious Moslem agitator, whom the Shaw Commission called "a sinister figure." appeared at Safed accom-panied by the extreme nationalist lawyer, Auni Abdul Hadi Bey, and produced a document alleged to have been written 500 years ago, purportedly proving that the land belonged to the Moslems. This document, if upheld, would annul the rights of the Jewish Colonization Association, which purchased the land forty years ago.

The document produced by the Arabs describes the boundary of the land as being "a spring and a pomegranate tree," neither of which are to be found on the ter-

None of the Arabs was arrested, but M. All plans for the urban development of Safed, including construction, town planning and the building of a resort on the mountain, are at a complete standstill. The land was sold under the old Turkish administration and approved the Turkish government. der the British administration the title of the Jewish owners was up-held in 1925. Subsequently the land was divided among a number colonization groups, including an American unit.

Not only do many investors face heavy losses if the Arab claim is upheld, but such a result, it is pre-dicted, would mark the beginning of numerous suits contesting the validity of Jewish land titles in every part of Palestine

# Mosley Raked By Rundschau; Italy Is Cited

Zionist Paper Gives Lie to 'Fundamental' Opposition

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN.—"It is not our business to engage in polemics with Sir wald Mosley, because this is an internal concern of British politics," the Zionist Juedische R chau says in a long article on Mosley's attack on the Jews at his recent Albert Hall meeting.

"Those who know British conditions must be astounded at what Mosley said. For even if it were true that the majority of the Jews in England are opposed to British Fascism, the same holds good of the majority of the British people, right up to the most conservative

"British statesmen, members of parliament, leaders of public life, the British press, which is almost the British press, which is almost entirely without Jewish influence, are united in opposition to the Mosley group. Why then does Sir Oswald complain of the Jews? Is it because he thinks that agitation against the Jews will create new sentiment for his movement?

His Explanation

"Mosley says that his movement and anti-Semitic, and that it is calumny invented by the Jews that it is anti-Semitic, and in order to punish them for this calumny now becomes actually anti-nitic. The assertion that Jews are fundamentally opposed to Fas cism is not tenable.
"In Italy many prominent Jews

are definitely adherents of Fascism and entirely in its service. In Italy, Fascism is not anti-Jewish; in England the Jews are as little in England the Jews are as little
Fascist as the non-Jews. And with
Mosley's present attitude, it is
hardly to be expected that the
Jewish population should be more

favorable to him than the others. Meanwhile the Jenaische Zei-tung reprints an article which aptung reprints an article which appeared in the Hammer, written by the English Fassist, Leese (the leader of the Imperial Fassist League, which is anti-Mosley), in which he writtes:

"Sir Oswalc Mosley married a woman of Jewish blood, so that

his children, too, have Jewish blood. The paid agents of the British Union of Fascists spare no effort to hide this important fact, or to confuse it. It is obvious that all the threats which Sir Oswald directs against the Jews are a

"When Mosley created his party he said. according to the Jewish Chronicle of August 26: 'I shall neither conduct nor tolerate anti-Jewish propagenda, and in the Daily Mail of January 29, 1934, he wrote: 'We are accused of anti-Cemitism and racial and religious persecution. This charge is un-

# GamoranFinds Security Lies

Integrate With Group for Anchorage, His Admonition

"There is need of anchorage and of a feeling of security. The Jew can find such anchorage only by integrating himself into the life of his group."

This warning was laid down by

Dr. Emanuel Gameran, education al director of the Commission on Jewish Education, in an address explaining the objectives of the Jewish religious schools. "It makes no difference whether

we conceive of ourselves as essentially a religious group or a cul-tural group," he declared. "If we conceive ourselves to be a religious group, we must remember that religion with us never meant a di-vorce from life, which it some-times seems to mean to those who use the term.
"Certainly, if we think of our

selves as a cultural group, and if we are true to Jewish history, we must recognize that our culture is essentially a religious culture.

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S. O. S. The call which the Jewish leaders in Austria issued yesterday "to the world and to all governments," stating that the Austrian Iews will never resign their citizenship rights voluntarily, must be taken as a signal that the Jewish position in Austria has reached the point

of gravest danger.

This call is the S. O. S. of
Austrian Jewry. It has been issued by the three leading figures of the Jewish community. The people who issued it and who constitute the presidium of the Jewish community of Vienna, have more than once been accused of not being brave enough to fight openly for Jewish rights in their country...

Now even they have raised their voices. Not only do they no longer hesitate to declare that they "demand living room for Austrian Jewry," but they go even further. They address themselves to the world and to

This urgent call for help must be picked up by the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the B'nai B'rith, the Joint Consultative Council and every other existing Jewish organization interested in the fate of Ausrian Jewry. Immediate rescue must be organized.

It may be true that international treaties are in our present time merely scraps of paper. It is however, reasonable to think that the Austrian government in its present sit-uation could not afford to ignore the national minority proisions imposed upon her by the Saint-Germain treaty, if existing Jewish organizations would see to it that the League of Nations institute an inquiry as to how the Saint-Germain treaty is being carried out in

The case of Austria's mistreatment of its Jewish population must come up before the League of Nations. There is sufficient ground for bringing this case up before the League. The equal rights for national minorities, stipulated by the Saint-Germain treaty, have been sufficiently violated by

Austria.

Simultaneously with taking up this case in Geneva, something must be done by organizations in America to make the Austrian government feel that the Jews have no more patience with Austria. Immediate ac-tion is the crying need of the hour.

# JERUSALEM'S MAYOR

By ISAAC GRUENBAUM

The recent municipal elections in two Palestinian cities have shown to what extent the Yishuv has grown during the past few We have four Jewish councilmen in Haifa and six in Jerusalem. In Haifa, the Jewish councilmen are a third of the council: in Jerusalem, they are half. In Haifa, the Jewish cilmen formerly were only a fifth of all the members; in Jeru-salem, they were a third. It is acknowledged quite without dispute that the vice-mayor of Haifa will be a Jew; the same is true of Jerusalem.

But in Jerusalem the Jews are laying claim to the mayoralty, for they are really the strongest group, one which is uniform as well. The Arabs are divided into well. The Arabs are divided into Moslems and Christians and, moreover, lack political agreement. The Arab opposition has suffered a major defeat: its leader, who has been mayor until this year, lost the election. His place has been taken by Dr. His place has been taken by Dr. Khaldi, an Arab of lofty lineage, who was supported by the Mufti although he does not belong to the Mufti's party. Dr. Khaldi thus brings upon the scene a third titled family to add to the Husseinie and the Nesheshike Husseinis and the Nashashibis who are ughting for the control of Arab society. The internal fight in the Arab community has thus become even more involved and complicated.

#### Nashashibi

Clings to Post

Nashashibi refuses to step aside. He is still looking for some way in which to remain in the saddle. The post he held as mayor of Jerusalem was not only an honor to him and a position of power, but was also a good source of income. During his terms in office there was considerable corruption in the city council and the city administration. That is why he is exerting every effort to win back his power, which is not impos-sible to do despite the fact that he was not elected to the city council, from among the members of which the mayor is chosen. He can enter a protest against the voting in the district in which Dr. Khaldi was chosen; t the same time, one of his adherents, who was elected, car withdraw. In both cases new elections are ordered and Nash-ashibi could win. Should he be elected he is certain of being appointed mayor by the ment so great is his belief that the government is favorably dis-posed towards him. Whether or not he has definite grounds for mor me has definite grounds for this certainty may perhaps be more easily disputed than one would think.

The situation is further complicated by the fact that among the Arab councilmen Dr. Khaldi is the only one suitable to hold the post of mayor. All the other likely candidates are among the Jews.

Thus the question of appoint-ing a Jewish mayor has arisen for the government. It is a bite the government is having difficulty swallowing. For should such an appointment be made, it would constitute an admission that Jerusalem is really a Jew-ish city, that Jewish influence has greatly increased, that the Jews have gained the leadership of the capital of the country, of the Holy City in which the Christians have so many sacred places and where the Moslems are making every effort to in-crease their holy places.

It is evident that all this will not readily be admitted.

Question of Tactics To Be Considered

Should the fight for the Jerudem mayoralty be begun now? The answer to this important political question is being gen-erally sought. As usual, the question has already been ex-ploited in various intrigues and an attempt has been made to accuse the Labor Party and the Agency (or rather, the head of Agency (or rather, the head of the political department) of not wanting a Jew as mayor of Jerusalem, of being afraid to make a demand to this effect and of renouncing the idea at the outset. An attempt was even made to stir up public opinion in the matter.

It is not a question of whether ne demand should be made the demand there can really be no two opin-ions about this—but of whether it should be made a causus belli-That is, in the event that the demand is set aside, should the mandates in the city council be surrendered and the council left to the Arabs? That was done in a previous council when it became impossible to bear any longer the Arab majority's reto consider the Jewish rity. The municipal counminority. cil was not dissolved-it continued to function without the Jews. That the Jewish interests in Jerusalem gained nothing by this state of affairs does not need to be pointed out. But at that time there was really no alternative: the Jewish interests would not in any case have been taken into consideration, so that it was better not to

share the responsibility. But now the situation is some what different. The Jews have ceased to be a minority. If the Araba—the Moslems and the Christians, the Mufti's party and the opposition-are not in agreement, the Jews may even win a deciding place, even should the High Commissioner take advan-tage of his right to appoint one or two members of the council, probably one Christian English-man. Should such a position be surrendered in the event the de-mand to appoint a Jew as mayor is set aside? Would it not be better to be content, this time, with but the demonstration, and to concentrate on transforming the post of vice-mayor into a position of real power. To attain this, the vice-mayor should be given the opportunity to work. That is, he should be paid a sal-ary and permitted to administer municipal matters.

## Christian Demands

For Vice-Mayoral Post
This, too, is not easily done. Christian circles are pressing the government to appoint a Christian as second vice-mayor, Christian as second vice-mayor, so that none of the faiths will feel excluded. Moreover, the question is not so much that of the actual title of vice-mayor, but of power and influence. The honor might be foregone, but the power attendant upon the conduct of the city's affairs is quite another matter. The same problem has already arisen in Haifa, and is now being faced

in Jerusalem. The opinion that the striving should not be for honors, no matter how great they may be, but for a true opportunity to work, to influence the municipal administration and to help carry it on has every chance of win-ning. No one has any great eagerness to declare war to the limit—that is, to withdraw from the city council should the demand that a Jewish mayor be appointed be rejected.

#### Politics Intensified With Yishuv's Growth

The intensification of political questions is concomitant with the growth of the Jewish Yishuv. It no longer suffices to be con-tent with declarations and demonstrations. The political de-mands are no longer general, ex-pressing our desire to achieve our highest aims all at one time. Our struggle for Palestine is being broken up into a series of battles, as is every great war. Every battle won is a new position for us, a new opportunity to move forward to our goal. the mixed cities, especially in Jerusalem, a new situation is arising which will have growing importance. The same is true in Haifa. In Jerusalem, because of the holiness of the city and its historic role, and in Haifa, because of the economic importance of this seaport which is growing apace and because of the international character

# Between the Lines

The Jewish Congress Postponed The convocation of a World Jewish Congress in 1935—a matter which for the last four years and up till now has been the cause of the deepest conflict be-tween the leading Jewish organizations in America—has practically been postponed.

The American Jewish Congress has indicated its willingness to forego its determination to sum-mon the World Jewish Congress in 1935 if the opposing Jewish bodies in America would agree to the creation of a united council in which all groups and parties should participate.

The plan proposed by the American Jewish Congress may not be accepted by the opposing groups exactly in the form sug-gested. It will however serve as a good basis for the conciliation of the groups in American Jewry which have been divergent since the summoning of the first American Jewish Congress, seventeen years ago.

#### Unity is Possible

That unity in American Jewry is possible has been demon-strated in one form or another within the past few years. The Joint Consultative Council is one example of possible unification. The United Jewish Appeal con-ducted by the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign is another example of unity in American rish life.

But while these efforts for But while these efforts for unity have been of temporary nature only, the plan suggested by the American Jewish Congress may result—after some modification — in permanent unity. It may bring unity not only in the ranks of American Jewry, but also in the ranks of World Jewry.

Never before has the need for Never before has the need for a united Jewry been so great as now, when the solution of Jewish problems throughout the world must receive the most serious attention. What world Jewry needs today is a permanent process of the serious attention. nent organization planning long-range action and prepared for emergency situation such as the one in Germany, such as the one now cropping up in Austria, such as the one in Poland.

as the one in Poland.

Following the American Line
It must be recognized that
just as the American nation has withdrawn from its isolationist policy in practice, if not techni-cally, the Jews of America, in the light of the peculiar anti-Jewish conditions now existing in many parts of Europe, must also take a more active interest

in the fate of European Jewry.

American Jewry is today the most dominant factor in the somost commant factor in the so-lution of Jewish problems, be-cause of its favored position as the largest, freest, richest Jew-ish community in the world. Unity in American Jewry would lead to unity in world Jewry and to a better protection of Jewish

rights. Any plan which would make such unity possible is therefore to be welcomed. The further developments of the offer made by the American Jewish Con-gress will therefore be watched with great interest.

This referendum is, in the first place, quite superfluous. It is certain that those who come to vote in the elections to the American Jewish Congress are for both. Otherwise they would not bother to vote. And why should the American Jawish Congress ostensibly "challenge Jews to come and vote

against these two principles?

And because it is superfluous, this may arouse a certain con-fusion and present an obstacle to the peace negotiations.

The decision to hold a super-

fluous referendum bears stamp of a concession to the stormy petrels of the Congress movement. That is to say: true, we are going to a round table with the opposition, but we shall show them that we are strong as iron

This is a bit of a dissonance to the other decisions and to the generally peaceful spirit of the action. In the same way, it was unnecessary to say what the American Jewish Congress will do should, God forbid, the unity

not come. The present oppo-nents of the Jewish World Congress will not be impressed by such a referendum, which will ich a referendum, prove nothing for the great mejority of Jews will stay at home.

That is why I believe that the chances for achieving harmony would be greater if this super-fluous referendum were to be omitted

#### Views of Coughlin Are Disputed

Dr. S. Margoshes, commenting in the Day upon the views which the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin expressed in his interview with a entative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, states:

Father Coughlin's is, perhaps, one of the most important and surely one of the most resound-ing voices in America. When he speaks, people listen, and cer-tainly when he chooses to sound his views on Jewish questions. as he did yesterday in an inter-view, Jews are bound to give him a respectful hearing. We doubt, however, whether they will take his advice.

Father Coughlin advises Jews in America to pay no attention to the efforts now made to provoke an anti-Semitic movement in the U. S., since Jew-hatred in America is "either dead or dy-ing." We wonder where the Reverend Eather takes his information. Has he followed the spread of the "Silver Shirt" movement throughout the South West? Has he watched the rise and growth in the Eastern part of the U.S., diverse anti-Semitic organizations, such as the "Order ganizations, such as the "Order of "76," "Security League" and other groups parading in the cloak of patriotism, but really preaching racial and religious antagonism to the Jew? Is he familiar with the machinations of the far-flung Nazi campaign in America, and has he kept an in America, and has he kept an eye on the astounding facts brought to light by the McCor-mack Congressional investiga-tion into the insidious and un-American activities of the Nazi agitators in the U. S.? We are afraid that in his zest to con-vert the country to a silver program he has not For otherne could not have given it as his reasoned judgment that anti-Semitism in America is either dead or dying. We wish the facts would warrant this opinion, but they do not.

The Jewish representatives in the Jerusalem municipal council are faced with a long and difficult struggle. Let us hope that it will be conducted with unity, as heretofore.

quite recently in other Arab countries, ground for anxiety. The undoubted latent hostility towards Jews is obviously ex-ploited and strengthened, morally and financially by the German consulate in Baghdad.

German Consul, who till lately was esteemed a man of liberal thought, and who was friendly with the Jewish merchants in whose hands a large proportion of the import trade lay, now openly and completely follows the instructions of the Hitler government. Young nationalism in the newly-created State of Iraq sees in Nazism its ideal and in Hitler a hero of national emancipation: hence the Consul's propaganda falls on fertile soil. The fact that in many stores and on boardings Hitler's photograph with Arabic texts, are to be seen, is certainly due to German propaganda. A Hitler film was a short while ago to be shown before King Ghazi and high officials and other influential persons at the German consulate, had not the otherwise always available projector failed just on that night.

Iragian Jewry is too weak and too poorly organized alone to resist the danger which threatens them. The British Govern-ment also has certainly no interest in discrimination against an important section of the population and a feeling of in-

security arising in a State which has been established by its co-operation.

Dr. Schnuch, who has assumed editorial responsibility for the Beobachter, in the last post office statement published by the Deut-sche Zeitung was listed as one of the three stockholders of the D. Z. Publishing Company, publishers of the Yorkville paper.

At the same time, it was learned

that Walter Kappe, editor of the German section of the Deutsche Zeitung is no longer connected with that publication. An unconfirmed report stated that Kappe is now the guiding editorial spirit of the weekly.

In the meantime, McLaughlin, whose name is signed to the apology, bobbed up as president of the D. Z. Publishing Company. "Accordingly we very earnestly wish to disclaim and disavow any incitement to racial or religious animosities for which this publication may hitherto have been accused. Henceforth we will permit nothing to appear in this paper which can in the slightest degree either by direct, expression or by race or people or of any individual referred to by name or by imputation to the disparagement of any race or people.

"We will adhere strictly and un-swervingly to the highest princi-ples of decent and lawful journalism and not only will we eschew all encouragement of racial prejudices but we will absolutely re-frain from all libelous and inflammatory articles, editorials and statements of any kind.

"We shall have nothing to do with any organizations or movements which made for strife and friction between various groups of citizens and persons who reside in this country. We have come to the conviction that those persons in this land who sincerely feel that the boycott of the merchandise of foreign land is heir only eful weapon with which to combat the inhumanity of which the government of such foreign land may be guilty are fully en-titled to the use of that weapon. We will not support any counter-action against such boycott.

We have not now and will never in the future have any connection or association either fin: ncially or or association either in healify or otherwise with any foreign gov-ernment or with the propaganda agencies of such government if such propaganda is found to be inimical to the hest interests of
