

Austria Aims To Oust Jews As Editors

Publishers Also Target of Decree Ordering New Licenses

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Nov. 23.—Austrian Jewish publishers and editors today became a target for the Schuschnigg government when a decree issued requiring special licenses for all newspapers. The new licenses require all publishers to state their religion.

All newspapers in the country, even those in existence for many years, must now obtain special licenses. The old forms, which merely required that the publisher prove himself of good character, have been withdrawn. The new application demand to know the religion and origin of the publishers.

In Jewish circles here, the government decree is regarded as a direct blow against the Jewish publishers and editors on the general daily newspapers, owing to the avowed aim of Chancellor Schuschnigg's regime to oust them from the general press.

\$20,000 Is Raised For Federation

Hotel Gotham Meeting Spurs Drive for Fund to Cancel \$20,071,000 Deficit

Twenty thousand dollars for the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies was raised at a meeting at the Hotel Gotham sponsored by Borough President Samuel Levy, it was announced Friday by leaders in the Federation's \$20,071,000 deficit campaign.

More Boycott Aid Is Sought By Untermeyer

Leader Calls Upon Non-Jews for Help as He Arrives in London

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Christian churches and labor organizations that work over are deeply concerned, perhaps even more than the Jews, with the defeat of Hitler's war against civilization, Samuel Untermeyer, American boycott leader, declared here today immediately upon his arrival.

The object of the international boycott conference which opens here tomorrow, is the "organization, centralization, expansion and intensification of the existing world boycott against German goods and services," he told British newspapermen at a press conference.

"This is not a Jewish question," Untermeyer continued. "I am the only Jewish member of the American delegation. Our success ultimately shows that world opinion approves of our actions."

"Incidentally I have been asked to preside at the conference. I am anxious that the coincidence of my being Jewish should not be used to falsely stamp this conference as a Jewish movement."

"Actually, the conference is a spontaneous uprising of all civilization against the Hitlerite attempt to undo the work of centuries."

Delegates from the United States, to New, East and Europe are arriving here for the conference.

Officials Deny Zionist Insult To Greek Flag

Accusations by Religion Minister Termed 'Fantastic'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

ATHENS, Nov. 23.—Fantastic anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist charges made yesterday by the Minister of Religions against the Jewish community in Serres, Macedonia, were today sharply repudiated by the prefect of the district and the commander of the military garrison.

Both officials issued the following statement to a delegation of leading Jews:

"We are astonished by these fantastic accusations and deplore the false indictment against the Jews of the district."

Reported Flag Insult

The Minister of Religion issued a report in which he alleged that the Jews of Serres had insulted the Greek people and flag at a memorial meeting held there in August on the anniversary of Dr. Theodor Herzl.

The prefect of Serres, following the visit paid him today by the Jewish delegation, ordered the chief of police to suppress at once any manifestation of anti-Jewish feeling.

Jewish leaders of the town also dispatched a telegram to Premier Panagiotis Tsaldaris, demanding an immediate inquiry to enlighten the

Only 7,500 Visas Granted by British

Jewish Agency Denies 9,700 Palestine Workers' Permits Were Given

JERUSALEM, Nov. 23.—The Executive of the Jewish Agency issued a statement today amending the report that 9,700 immigration certificates were granted by the Palestine government to the Jewish Agency for the coming six months.

Only 7,500 certificates were granted, the statement of the Jewish Agency says. It explains that the Palestine government estimates that 9,700 immigration visas could be issued to Jews in accordance with the absorption capacity of the country, but it actually granted not more than 7,500.

Tel Aviv Faced With Mail Strike Over Pay, Hours

26 Carriers to Quit Work Unless Given 8-Hour Day

JERUSALEM, Nov. 23.—Tel Aviv, the 100 per cent Jewish city, is threatened with a post office strike unless demands of the Tel Aviv letter carriers for higher wages and for an eight-hour working day are complied with by the General Postmaster of Palestine.

The Tel Aviv letter carriers—twenty-six in number—have submitted a memorandum to the Postmaster General, declaring that the strike will be called if the above-stated conditions are not granted during the month of November. The letter carriers also demand payment for overtime work. They complain that they are unfairly burdened in having to cope with mail for a population of 100,000

House Inquiry Also Questions Bank Employee

Eager to Query Other Associates Named by Gen. Butler

Cash transactions between Gerald P. MacGuire and Robert Sterling Clark and Clark's attorney, Albert Christmas, were the subject of scrutiny by the Congressional committee to investigate un-American activities in its executive hearing at the Bar Association Building Friday.

In addition to MacGuire, whom Gen. Snedden D. Butler named as an agent for important financial interests ostensibly prepared to spend \$2,000,000 to establish a dictatorship in the United States, Representatives John W. McCormack and Samuel R. Dickstein of the committee also examined a clerk for the Central Hanover Bank and Trust Company.

Afterwards they announced that their eagerness to question Clark, multi-millionaire broker, and Christmas, his attorney, both now abroad, is stronger than ever.

Promises Statement

Dickstein promised that the committee would give the press a written statement over the week-end regarding the fruits of its labors this week, which have produced what many regard as the most important disclosures yet unearthed by the inquiry.

MacGuire, who appeared at Friday's hearing with Norman L. Mackay, his attorney and an active American Legion worker, attempted to discredit part of Butler's testimony when he declared he and the General were 1,000 miles apart on the day in September of last year when the former Marine head said he had been approached by the bond salesman with an offer to act as the "man on the white horse" and lead an army of 500,000

Kappe Thought His Own 'Crawl' A Secret, Attacked Colleague's

New cause for amusement in the local newspaper situation was uncovered Friday when a letter written by Walter Kappe to Dr. Hubert Schuch, national president of the Friends of New Germany, attacking W. L. McLaughlin, was made public.

As revealed in Friday's Jewish Daily Bulletin, Kappe wrote an apologetic letter to a letter writer, Gerald Hays, attorney for Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, in which he pleaded with the lawyer not to bring a criminal libel action against him on the basis of articles he had written in the Deutsche Zeitung

reviling the exiled former Prussian Minister of Justice.

Unaware that this letter would be made public, Kappe left the Zeitung when its anti-Semitism was actually ended by a criminal libel suit which former Magistrate Joseph Goldstein forced McLaughlin, English editor and part-publisher of the paper, to republish. Kappe, who had been printed regarding Goldstein and his attempt to change the entire policy of the publication.

Rosalsky Pleads for Jewish Faith On Eve of JEA's 13th Birthday

The Jewish Education Association comes of age next month. It will be thirteen years old December 2 and the occasion will be celebrated by a Bar Mitzvah party at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, at which will be present a host of men and women noted for their contributions to the political, economic and social life not only of Jewry but of the nation as well.

Not the least prominent among the persons who will help to celebrate the association's thirteenth anniversary is its new president, Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, who has distinguished himself in all the fields listed above.

Long a champion of Jewish education for Jewish youth, Judge Rosalsky has devoted much of his time and effort to bringing the Jews of New York City to an increasing realization of the necessity for such education.

On the eve of the Bar Mitzvah celebration, Judge Rosalsky, in an interview with the Jewish Daily Bulletin yesterday issued an appeal for support of the Jewish

Education Association. "Throughout the world," he said, "Jewish life is being lived under conditions of great stress and strain. Even against the stormy background of Jewish history, the present appears to be a period of exceptional uncertainty, turmoil and danger. We are absorbed and preoccupied by the emergency problems that confront us. In most countries in the world, including our own, there are many Jews who are not only distressed but bewildered by the hostile forces that have raised their heads against us.

"In these circumstances, our anxious thoughts are naturally directed towards our children. What kind of world, we ask ourselves, will they have to live in? Are we preparing them to cope with the problems that are going to face them as Jews and as citizens of America? There are parents who think that this question is to be answered in terms of material possessions. Such possessions, they seem to think, will insure the

happiness of their children under all conditions. But they are mistaken. Material possessions, important as they are, offer no guarantee of happiness and security in a vindictive world where established ideals and relations are being disintegrated. It is needless to enlarge on this truth. An ounce of example is more convincing than a ton of argument. Germany, today, offers us the example.

"Our history is our surest guide. Many a time in the past we were confronted with similar emergencies and dangers. Many a time in the past our ship was tossed about by bitter storms of malice

and cruelty. Nevertheless, it sailed on. It carried a wonderful ballast; the ballast of our faith and our incompressible way of life. One word expresses it all: the word Torah.

Pleads For Faith
At all times Jewish life was like a deep ocean, its surface broken by storms, but calm and strong in its depths.

"Does Jewish life today consist of surface only? Are its depths no more? Were that so, our lot would be tragic indeed. As for our children, all our anxiety is futile unless the Jewish faith and the Jewish way of life is made part and parcel of their being."

"Our Jewish community of New York, not excluding its leaders, is not sufficiently aware of the magnitude of the problem and the few in training of our young. There are over 350,000 Jewish children of school age in the City of New York, of whom less than 100,000 are receiving Jewish instruction. All Jews, and our leaders in particular, should be deeply disturbed by these figures. We have nearly 500 Talmud Torahs and other Jewish schools and most of them are still engaged in a bitter struggle against the effects of the economic and spiritual depression. Thousands of parents, eager to see their children instructed in the

New Austria Curb

The day after the Executive of the American Jewish Congress made a special trip to Washington to intervene with the Austrian Minister there for the Jewish rights in Austria, the Austrian government came out with a new decree aimed to oust Jewish journalists from the Austrian press.

The decree issued requires that the publisher and editor must state his religion before he can obtain a permit from the government to continue his work. This decree is nothing but an imitation of a similar order issued last year by Goebbels in Germany. Under the best circumstances it can be interpreted as nothing else but a measure to curb the free press and to put Jewish editors and publishers under a special control.

The anxiety reported from Vienna in connection with this decree therefore has its justifications. The product of eliminating the Jews from public life in Austria, though carried out less openly and more diplomatically than in Germany, is nothing but an imitation of Germany's way of ousting Jews from their professions and from public life.

History repeats itself. What took place in 1933 in Germany is now taking place in Austria. About 1,200 Jewish journalists lost their positions on German newspapers as a result of Goebbels' decree last year. Nobody can tell how many Jewish journalists will lose their positions in Austria as a result of the new decree issued by the Austrian government. It is, however, clear that the "Aryan paragraph" is now being silently introduced in Austria in full force and in every branch of economic life.

One wonders, therefore, whether the sending of a delegation to the Austrian Minister in Washington is not a sufficiently strong measure. The anti-Jewish developments in Austria are reaching the point where stronger measures must be taken. The new press decree is the best proof of this.

THE JEWS' LIVES IN THE HANDS OF THE ARYAN

The report on the activities of the American Joint Distribution Committee, published this week by Joseph C. Hyman, the secretary of the committee, is the best key to the Jewish position in Europe. It not only discloses the fact that the Joint Distribution Committee has spent \$82,000,000 since 1914 for helping the Jews abroad, but gives us a clear picture of what the actual Jewish situation in each country is today.

The major portion of the work done by the Joint Distribution Committee was naturally concentrated this year to Germany. But mistaken are those who think that the work of the JDC was limited to Germany alone. Almost a third of the money which the Joint Distribution Committee assigned for helping German Jews was actually spent for Palestine; it was spent in Berlin; it was spent for supporting the Hachsharah in Germany; it was spent for the Hachsharah; the adjustment of German Jewish youth to different forms of labor in Palestine.

Huge Sums Spent For Refugee Relief

The JDC Distribution Committee spent during its calendar year of 1934 for Germany, about \$300,000 was given to the different Jewish organizations inside and outside of Germany dealing chiefly with preparing the German Jews to migrate to Palestine. Less than \$50,000 was spent for transportation of German Jews—from Germany and from the countries of exile—to Palestine. This does not include the sums which the Joint Distribution Committee allotted directly for child care work in Palestine and for other activities there.

In addition to helping German Jews to migrate to Palestine, the Joint Distribution Committee has also done a tremendous piece of relief work for the Jews in Germany by helping their vocational readjustment. The funds spent by the Joint Distribution Committee this year in Germany was of great assistance to those German Jewish organizations which were engaged in training

the Jews for new professions, in preparing them for citizenship and for agriculture, in taking care of emergency relief and welfare aid, in helping with small loans the Jews in the small communities, and in reconstructing the entire German Jewish life along new lines not yet affected by the "Aryan paragraph."

East European Jews Aided

With the serious obligations which the Joint Distribution Committee felt that it had towards German Jewry, it has also not forgotten its obligations towards the Jews of the East European countries. Relief and reconstruction aid was given by the Joint Distribution Committee during the year to the Jews of Poland, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Russia and other lands where Jewish life has been operating since the very first days of its existence. The work of the JDC in Poland was especially helpful this year, since the misery of Polish Jewry has assumed unprecedented proportions.

The JDC report made public this week by Mr. Hyman is therefore a document which will be thoroughly studied by every student of European Jewish life. It gives the facts and figures of the actual Jewish position in many countries and illustrates the great need which European Jewry is now facing.

The wide scope of the work which the JDC is conducting in Europe makes this organization outstanding in comparison with other Jewish relief organizations. No other Jewish relief organization existing today has such a variety of activities to its credit as the JDC. While other Jewish organizations limit themselves to specific fields of work, the JDC is active in almost every phase of Jewish life requiring aid.

Palestine Benefits Through JDC Funds

It must not be forgotten that in addition to the large sums of money which the JDC spends annually, this organization is also responsible for immense activities conducted with revolving capital by institutions such as

the Palestine Economic Corporation, the Joint Foundation, the Loan Kasse and other institutions which are recognized as great factors in the reconstruction of Jewish economic life. The Palestine Economic Corporation which was organized in 1926 on a business basis, for productive aid in Palestine, has been substantially supported by the JDC. The JDC has turned over to the Palestine Economic Corporation approximately \$1,800,000. It was with this asset that the Palestine Economic Corporation was able to conduct its work of assisting the economic development of Palestine.

This brings indirectly to the forefront the present conflict between the JDC and the Zionist Organization, which is growing in the scene of American Jewish life. This conflict—which I believe will eventually be settled peacefully—due to the fact that the Joint Distribution Committee wishes to renew the arrangements with the Zionist Organization of America for a united campaign for funds, on condition that the Zionist Organization should receive not fifty per cent of the funds raised, hitherto, but a smaller proportion.

I shall still have the opportunity to explain why the Joint Distribution Committee is justified in its demand that the Jews in Palestine today live more prosperously than the Jews in Eastern Europe, where urgent JDC relief is now required; there are also other motives as to why a larger proportion of relief funds must be the forthcoming year be sent to the countries other than Palestine.

More Palestine Land May Be Acquired

A report from Palestine this week discloses that the Jews are about to obtain 400,000 dunams of new land on the Palestinian border. This report, though coming from Arab circles, ought to be taken seriously. Though the figure of 400,000 dunams may be exaggerated, there is some truth in the report that large stretches of Huleh land will now come into Jewish possession.

There have been lengthy negotiations between certain Jewish groups and those Arabs who hold the concession on the Huleh land. These negotiations, I understand, have now been concluded. The Jewish government, as well as the Colonial Office in London, has approved of the deal. A large plan for draining the Huleh region for Jewish settlement may therefore soon come into operation.

The deal now concluded is the result of efforts made by private Jewish figures in Palestine to obtain the Huleh land. Mr. Smilansky, the president of the Farmers Association in Palestine, figures as the largest investor in the project.

Austria and Germany Show No Letup

While the Jewish growth in Palestine is expanding, Jewish persecutions in the countries of Eastern Europe are assuming a more and more serious character. In Germany a new drive against the Jews was started this week in many provincial circles. The German population is beginning to feel the first signs of the approaching winter. Under the pretext of "Jewish" unemployment, the local Nazis have invaded many Jewish stores in different districts of Germany and have attacked Jewish merchants.

Under the government of Premier Schulenburg made another step this week to invalidate the citizenship of 410 more Jews. A delegation of the American Jewish Congress visited this week the Austrian Minister in Washington and told him what American Jews think of the anti-Jewish discrimination now going on in Austria. The Austrian Minister will convey the opinion of American Jews to his government in the form of a memorandum.

Laski Urges Pressure on Poland

The Jewish situation in Poland is still growing worse. Bombs have been thrown this week by anti-Semites into Jewish stores and anti-Jewish riots have taken place in the Krakow University. The Jewish position in Poland has reached a point where the Polish government has reserved Jewish leader and president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, came out openly this week and urged that the Jews should stand up against Poland, since no signs of alleviation are seen.

THE JEWS' REPENTANCE WEEK

This was hair-shirt work along the Nazi front.

Walter Kappe, militant Nazi editor who had lustily assailed the Jews from the editorial offices of the Deutsche Zeitung, and quit that paper with his editor's last words in a change of heart resulted in a change of policy with regard to the Jews, himself joined the ranks of apology-makers.

Faced with a \$100,000 civil libel suit and threat of a criminal action for his vicious attacks on Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, former Prussian Minister of Justice, Kappe acted Thursday to save his skin by making a sweeping apology to Arthur Garfield Hays, attorney for Dr. Rosenfeld.

Columbia Dean Under Fire

Another notorious Jew-baiter was forced to book in Boston when Edward Hunter, attorney and executive secretary of the Industrial Defense Association, an organization which fought "Jewish-Communists" and battled the "Jewish red menace," lost two libel suits brought against him and against the or-

ganization by the Artkinio Guild, Inc.

A New York City official who has his name in "Peacock" outfit, American Concentration, Inc., built out of the wreck of the "Khaki Shirt" organization, found himself in hot water as the subject of two investigations.

Mayor LaGuardia, after being advised by the Jewish Daily Bulletin that the JDC's "Peacock" outfit, confidential clerk to Comptroller McGoldrick, was head of the Fascist organization, promised an immediate investigation. Comptroller McGoldrick promised likewise. Mayor Proust hastily denied that he was anti-Semitic and insisted the libel suit was only "gutting the Communists."

The Columbia University campus shared in the excitement following allegations that Dean Thomas Alexander, of New College, had engaged in anti-Semitic activities and that students were being organized into anti-Semitic groups. Nathan G. Bissell, 3rd, son of the New York judge, denied acting as "contact man" for Royal Scott Guldman. Dean Alexander

was reported visiting in Germany.

He was hearing a vigorous denunciation of the un-American and subversive aims of the League of Friends of New Germany, Supreme Executive McGoldrick reserved decision on an application by the organization for a New York State certificate of incorporation.

American Fascists
Smellie H. Butler, retired commander of the Marines, hurled a bombshell into Wall Street last week with his sensational charges that a Nazi party had tendered him an offer to lead a Fascist veterans' army into Washington to seize command of the government.

General Butler told his story to the Congressional Committee investigating un-American activities. Despite a storm of denials from all quarters, the "Old Glimlet-Eye," the committee appeared impressed by his story and promised a full investigation of the "Lankford-Nazi and Social Registerite anti-Semitic groups and the "conspirators behind the Butler plot" were to be sought.

I once acquired a colored woman whose puddings and custards and junkets and blanc manges were simply splendid, what made her concoctions so supple and delicious and with a broad smile she answered: "Well, honey-chile, I 'ae puts in good so I 'ae take out good."

The old woman was patently unaware that she had uttered one of the deepest ethical truisms, that in her terse words there lay hidden the secret of all happy human relationships, of all success and satisfaction we can attain to. She thought merely of her cooking, and there, too, she was more than right. To achieve culinary excellence we have, above all, to choose the right ingredients, for the quality of these insures the perfection of the finished product.

This is doubly true in all kind of dairy cooking. The best eggs are none too good, the freshest butter is indicated in high quality milk is quite imperative. Best of all is Borden's milk which has a high cream content and gives even to a simple rice-pudding a smoothness and richness that is truly enjoyable. If the proper ingredients are used the following recipe for a junket—the ideal dessert for growing children or invalids—will give most satisfactory results.

Needed ingredients: 2 cups of milk, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 teaspoons rennet or ½ junket tablet and 2 teaspoons lukewarm water. Heat the milk to lukewarm in a double-boiler. Add sugar and rennet and stir until sugar is dissolved. Add junket dissolved in water and pour into dish from which the curd is to be served. Let stand until cool and firm. Serve with cream, fresh fruit, or fruit syrup. Cinnamon, nutmeg, coconut, raisins, or cocoa or chocolate flavor may be substituted for vanilla.

STATE CONTROL

By ABBA HILLEL SILVER

The post-war era has been dominated by the idea of State corporatism to an amazing degree.

The power and authority of the State have been augmented even in those countries where no actual dictatorship exists. Everywhere the State is stepping in to check the power and scope of the individual. The democratic apparatus which middle class individualism advanced to safeguard its rights is being pushed aside or discarded. There are no areas which are exempt from group control and interference. The individual is steadily being deprived of his "inalienable rights." The State is beginning to dominate not only the political fortunes of its people but their economic fortunes as well—and their cultural and spiritual lives, too.

The slogan of "State Control" has become popular in recent years, especially among those sections of our population who dislike to use the more forthright and definitive term "Socialism." Young Jews are especially captivated by it. But few of them have taken the trouble to inquire what a maximum state control would mean to a minority group like ours. In Russia it has destroyed the Jewish group culturally and religiously. In Germany it is destroying it politically, socially and economically. In Poland, whenever a government monopoly is established over a trade or an in-

dustry, the Jew is almost always squeezed out.

As a free individual, secure in his constitutional rights, in an open, competitive market, the Jewish business man and working man could hold his own with the non-Jew. But where government in a capitalistic country controls and determines its economic life, it will represent, as a matter of course, the preferences and prejudices of the majority, and the Jewish minority group will always be disfavored. Our political and economic security in the last century lay in constitutional guarantees, in charters of fundamental human liberties, in the doctrine of man's inalienable rights to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." When these liberal doctrines are discarded, and all constitutional guarantees are scrapped, we become an unprotected and defenseless minority, left to the mercies and the moods of dictators or their underlings.

Liberalism and democracy in the 19th and early 20th centuries gave us the opportunity in the Western World to live free lives and to advance to new positions of equality in all fields of human endeavor. The recent tendency towards state absolutism with its mystic yearnings towards "coordination," "Gleichschaltung" and the "monolithic society" has begun to play havoc with our people both materially and spiritually.

Those Jews who sing the praises of state control are, of course, thinking exclusively in terms of the Russian model. They should bear in mind, however, that long

before the Russian model will become the dominant form in the world (if ever) the other form of maximum state control—the Fascist and the Nazi—will, unless it is strenuously opposed, come to master the countries of the earth. And Fascist state control is everywhere anti-Jewish. If Italian Fascism, on the face of it, seems to be an exception, it is only because the Jewish group in Italy is numerically negligible. Everywhere else, Fascism is avowedly and determinedly anti-Semitic.

State absolutism may be inevitable but what reason is there for Jews to welcome it with hallo-lujahs? . . .

In all Fascist lands, side by side with the absolute totalitarian state, runs the doctrine of militant and aggressive nationalism which always claims as its first victim the Jewish group. Fascist nationalism automatically makes the Jewish group suspect and tends to ghettoize and disfranchise it anew. For state control, carried to its logical conclusions, does not stop at economics. It is omnivorous and insatiable. . . .

In Germany, Fascist nationalism is still further narrowed by the concept of race. Nationalism is made synonymous with racialism. Only those belonging to the racial stock of the dominant majority are recognized as citizens. It is clear that in a state where race becomes the criterion and prerequisite for rights and preferences the Jew is sacrificed. It is no longer a question of personal character or of ability but of hereditary fatalism. One's claim to equality can no longer be based upon constitutional rights or upon a shared human destiny or upon worth or merit but upon a factor which is beyond the individual's control—ancestry.

The Jew would do well not to permit himself to be beguiled in his quest for social justice by the millennial promises of state messianism. All dictators promise so much and achieve so little. They ask men to surrender all their rights and liberties on the glowing promise of achieving "Kingdom Come"—the Golden Age—in no time. And hard-pressed men are easily beguiled. They yearn for some quick escape from all their difficulties. They surrender their charters of liberty. They even condone at the first terrorist means which dictators employ to achieve the promised goal. But somehow the promised goal is never achieved. They never behold that. But the means they behold and experience—all the brutalities and oppressions which devastate their lives.

Liberalism seems to have forgotten that liberalism is as much a matter of means as of ends. Liberalism is decidedly a matter of method and technique. If the methods are those of democratic justice, fairness, tolerance and freedom, then human life is enriched in the very process of attaining the far-off goal. But if the methods are those of tyrannic force, oppression and intolerance, then human life becomes brutalized in the process and the goal becomes increasingly more difficult of approximation. Liberals undermined their own position in the world because a great hope prompted men to sanction the sacrifice of means to ends, leading them into the tragic intellectual morass of endorsing and condoning illiberal and dictatorial methods and practices in one part of the world and of condemning the self-same methods and practices in another.

They were taken to an exceedingly high mountain and shown all the kingdoms of the world and

their glory and—they succumbed to the great temptation. . . .

Jewish liberals, with so much more at stake, seem to be committing the same folly.

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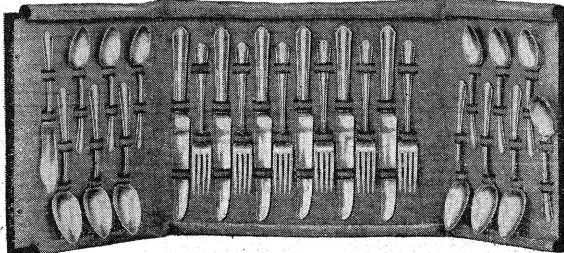
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STAGE CRITICAL MOMENTS SCREEN

An Adler Going Back to Work



This member of the noted theatrical tribe is comely Stella. She will appear in "Gold Eagle" Guy," which opens at the Morocco on Wednesday evening as the Group Theatre's first play of the season.

Broadway has lived through much more active theatrical weeks than the last, but it has been a long, long time since two such plays as "The Children's Hour" and "Anything Goes" arrived in town within the space of one week. Despite the fact that I am inclined to be carping I cannot find it in my heart to say anything unkind about two such unusual and excellent productions.

About "The Children's Hour" by Lillian Hellman which I hope will run lustily and long at the Maxine Elliott, I have already had my say but this is to supplement my previous remarks. Whether Miss Hellman purposely set out to break the hearts of her audiences I don't know, but she succeeds in arousing your emotions to a state bordering on mild hysteria. "The Children's Hour" is a tense, closely written, beautifully acted, superbly directed and staged play that cannot fail to move the most unhardened of theatre patrons. It is a mature, sincere, completely absorbing dealing with a hitherto tabooed subject. Even if the general thesis is repugnant to you there is still the problem of the psychopathic child who lies, in creating this role Miss Hellman has shown such an amazing, clear insight into the minds of children that you cannot afford to miss it.

"Anything Goes"

"The Children's Hour" is stark tragedy, "Anything Goes" is complete comedy, filled with all those things that make people forget themselves. The eternally amusing Victor Moore, cast in the role of a gangster who to escape his enemies on the stage—disguises himself as a clergyman and goes aboard a trans-Atlantic liner, manages to be even funnier than you can imagine. The idea of a gangster-clergyman who can't quite hide his real characteristics is all in the germ of great comedy and Guy Bolton, P. G. Wodehouse, Howard Lindsay and Russell Crouse who wrote the book

and dialogue have squeezed from it the last possible drop of honest laughter.

True, Mr. Moore is the main prop in this musical play but there is also Ethel Merman as a night club singer on her way to Europe with a troupe of Broadway girls; William Gaxton as a "round-the-goner" pursuing his lady love, played by Bettina Hall, and a large talented cast of singers, and dancers.

Naturally, your first impulse is to compare "Anything Goes" with "Of Thee I Sing" because the Moys and Gaxton, but the two plays

really having nothing in common. "Of Thee I Sing" was satire which made oblique digs at our stuffed-shirt politicians. The present piece is nothing more than pure, (I don't mean this literally, because some of the lyrics and dialogue were never meant for a Sunday School picnic) unrestrained entertainment. You don't have to think, all that is required is the easy and pleasant task of sitting back and allowing yourself to be amused.

Ethel Merman, last seen on the stage in Laurence Schwab's "Take a Chance" and more recently in

the picture "Kid Millions," supplies the jazz touch to "Anything Goes." Her singing of "You're the Top," easily the musical hit of the show, is just about "tops." The other leading singer of the piece is Bettina Hall, who warbles delightfully throughout and especially when she does "All Through the Night." Cole Porter wrote these numbers and also supplied the other tunes and lyrics, some of which you will soon be humming.

"Anything Goes" is a welcome addition to the surprising small musical comedy contingent which at this moment consists of only "Life Begins at 8:40" and "Say When." It will come as a boon to the tired and otherwise gamy who still feel that girls, lights, dancing, singing, and comedy are necessary for an enjoyable evening.

The Cinema

Paramount offers "College Rhythm" as feature this week. This is the musical film in which Joe Penner, Lanny Ross, Jack Oakie, Lydia Robert, Hans Macfadyen and Mary Brian all go to college with surprising results. . . .

"Ménace" is the film now at the Rialto. It is a fast moving, thrilling mystery about an insurance policy whose brother has committed suicide because he has witnessed destruction of his sister's home. It is well acted and above par for this sort of thing.

At the Strand the Warner Brothers are presenting "Gentlemen Are Born." Margaret Lind-

say and Franchot Tone are the leading players. For a moment I thought that Warners, who have been flirting with a picture of sociological import had decided to go the whole hog, but I was soon disillusioned. The story concerns the plight of four young college graduates who are faced with the economic necessity of adjusting themselves to a world which is in a state of depression. They are resentful and blame the college for not fitting them properly to meet the situation. However, very little happens of any consequence and the film ends happily. 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Of 10 Plays Listed by Mantle As Best, Jews Produced 9

Annually for the past sixteen years Burns Mantle, drama critic of the New York Daily News, is represented by the book stalls with a new volume of "Best Plays" (Dodd, Mead & Co.). Issued each Fall it compiles a yearbook of the drama in America and is featured by Mr. Mantle's selections of the ten best plays of the preceding theatrical year. For his 34th list, Mantle chooses "Mary of Scotland," "Men in White," "Dodsworth," "Ah, Wilderness!," "They Shall Not Die," "Her Master's Voice," "No More Ladies," "Wednesday's Child," "The Shining Hour" and "The Green Bay Tree."

The critics join in the game of selecting a "best ten" list, only Mr. Mantle achieves the distinction of a place between cloth covers. He is not an astute picker, a devotee of no inns and extremes, and his list annually approximates the critical consensus. Therefore, with the great Jewish participation in the theatre, it is interesting to note how Jews fared in Mr. Mantle's list. Do they, as the critics maintain, charge, produce the dregs of the theatre or do they hold their own or better in the more worthy effort to shine the light of New York production?

An Envious Record

Based upon Mr. Mantle's choices, an amazingly enviable record is unfolded. It indicates that among the Jews in the theatre the producers are possessed of a fine, sensitive taste; that the producers are judicious in their artists, serious thinkers and skilled technicians; that the directors are careful, studious and artistic; that the designers are high grade artists who draw assignments for the best plays.

Nine of the ten plays on Mr. Mantle's list were produced by Jews. Three of them were written by Jews, five of them directed by Jews, three of them played against sets created by Jews and one of them had a cast which numbered several Jews in its leading roles.

The Theatre Guild, five of whose directors are Jews (Theresa Helburn, Lew Simonson, Philip Moeller, Lawrence Langner and Maurice Wertheim) produced three of the plays on the Mantle list, "Mary of Scotland," "Ah, Wilderness!" and "They Shall Not Die." One of these, "They Shall Not Die," was authored by the Jewish John Wexley and directed by Philip Moeller, with sets by Lew Simonson. Moeller also directed "Ah, Wilderness." "Mary of Scotland" was directed by Theresa Helburn.

Gordon Produced
Max Gordon, among the most successful Broadway producers to date, sponsored three productions on the Mantle list, "Dodsworth," "Her Master's Voice" and "The Shining Hour." Jo Mielziner, an art scenic designer, created the sets for "Dodsworth."

The Pulitzer Prize play, "Men in White," was written by Sidney Kingsley, presented by the Group Theatre in association with James R. Ullman and Sidney Harmon. It was directed by Less Straessner and played against highly regarded sets designed by Mordecai Gorelik. The cast included J. Edward Bromberg, Luther Adler, Morris Carnovsky, Clifford Bruck, Harold Rainer, Sanford Meisner and Bob Lewis. Probably more than any previous successful play, it represented almost 100 per cent Jewish effort.

The two other Jewish-produced plays were Lew Shubert's "No More Ladies" and Joe Harris' "Green Bay Tree," which was also directed by Mr. Harris. The tenth play, of which one not produced by a Jew, "Wednesday's Child," was written by Leopold Atlas.

Mr. Mantle contributes an interesting review of the theatrical year to the volume and for the first time it is made up of the familiar features of the annual, Mr. Mantle's synopsis of the plays he selected as the ten best of the year and statistical information concerning all the shows produced on Broadway from the late August of 1933 through June of 1934.

"1918," the second of the three plays included in the collection of Feuchtwanger's plays written in 1917 to 1919, marks, in the prefatory words of the author, what he terms "a subtle attempt to immerse himself in mass emotion." This attempt at sharing sentiments that would lead to belief in some sort of anarcho-communist program, was foredoomed to failure; there was finally a return to the confession of individualism which had been his intellectual starting-point. For Feuchtwanger values highly an artocracy of intellect and feeling. The spiritual plebes, he would seem to believe, almost inevitably reduce the high aims of a leader to immediate satisfactions. And this reduction, Feuchtwanger has it appear in his sometimes portentously allegorical play, fatefully allows the old powers to climb back.

The first play, "Prisoners of War," was published in Germany in 1917. It was most tolerated in some of the Allied countries of a sympathetic literary treatment of prisoners—during the war. In the play the author beats, not ineffectively (but all the time, of course, hampered by the censorship), to get some idea of the dog of nationalism. Those for whom the dog still whistles may read the spectacle cheering.

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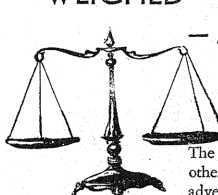
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Money Shortage Slows Transfer To Palestine, Refugee Men Say

German Jews are eager to migrate to Palestine. Palestine needs German Jews. The only factor retarding the logical transfer is limited funds.

This is the message to American Jewry of Dr. George Landauer and Dr. Martin Rosenbluth, who arrived in New York this week to acquaint America with the story of the great migration. The former is secretary of the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews in Palestine with his post in Jerusalem. The latter is head of the London office.

Dr. Landauer's work is to usher the bewildered refugees out of the Old World. When they dock in Haifa, they come into Dr. Rosenbluth's hands.

The Palestine Bureau finds positions for them, trains them for the new life, seeks out homes for them, extends credit where needed and tries to mitigate the subtle psychic torments of settling in a strange land.

Paint Rosy Picture

Interviewed together in the office of the United Jewish Appeal, they painted a rosy picture of the transplanting of German Jews to Palestine.

"There have been settled to date some 20,000 German Jews, constituting the largest number that has been absorbed by any country since the flight of the refugees from Germany began," said Dr. Rosenbluth. "It must be emphasized that this is not the maximum that Palestine can settle, but represents merely the amount of that could be done with the limited funds placed at our disposal."

The two pretended to explain that, of the 20,000, between 6,000 and 8,000 are capitalists. The rest are professionals and laborers. When the refugees arrive in Palestine, they are encouraged—almost forced—to enter agriculture rather than a profession. This is accomplished by providing homes for them only in agricultural colonies.

When the refugees come to Palestine, they are no longer refugees—they are settlers. Dr. Landauer spoke glowingly of the enthusiasm with which the German Jews set about remodeling their lives.

From Doctor to Farmer. "They delve deeply into Hebrew culture," he said, "after learning the language in a marvelously short time. They eagerly attend the training schools we have built for them and two years suffices to make a farmer of a doctor."

Many of the German Jews who come to Palestine have no means. These are attached to the already existing colonies. To erect new colonies would require more money than the Bureau can at present command. Even those in the capitalist category—owning \$1,000 or more—need assistance in the new land. Besides cultural acclimatization, the bureau supervises collective purchase of land for groups of capitalists, provides the necessary irrigation and digs the wells. The initial outlay is repaid by the settlers.

"In Germany itself," said Dr. Rosenbluth, "the Jews feel that their only hope of permanent salvation from the conditions which burden them—particularly for the youth—is emigration to Palestine. We have on hand applications from 5,000 Jewish families in Germany to settle in Palestine within the next six-month period."

"It is a matter of profound regret that we do not have the funds to make possible the colonization in Palestine of this entire number."

Germany, even the non-Zionists are clamoring to go to Palestine, added Dr. Rosenbluth. And Dr. Landauer attested to the jubilation with which the non-Zionists greet their new-found freedom in Palestine.

"You should see," he said, "how

soon they feel at home."

The budget for the next two years, which covers an irreducible minimum for the activities of interesting German Jews into the agricultural and economic life of Palestine will necessitate \$1,875,000, it was pointed out. Of this \$800,000 has already been collected.

With these funds, it is estimated that 1,000 families without means and 500 capitalist families can be transported from Germany to Palestine. A "meanless" family is estimated to contain two members and a capitalist family, four.

The German Jews are especially desirable in Palestine, the interviewer was told. They are readily assimilated into the Jewish life of Palestine. They bring with a certain characteristic talent for organization and thoroughness much needed in the New Land.

Dr. Landauer and Rosenbluth, who are staying at the Hotel Roosevelt, will remain in New York for at least three weeks. During this time they will negotiate with the United Jewish Appeal and speak at its meetings to explain the work of the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews in Palestine, headed by Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

Jewish faith and the Jewish way of life, are too poor to pay even the small tuition fees these schools require. Local school boards are faced with burdens that they are too weak to carry. Many of the teachers have not been paid their pitance salaries for months, but continue their work with heroic fortitude. Can the community afford to be indifferent to these conditions?

Duty to Children

"The emergencies that have come down upon us have brought into existence various organizations and agencies, philanthropic and political, that are striving to cope with them. In their separate spheres they are rendering service to the Jewish cause, and they deserve our encouragement and support. In the sphere of Jewish education, the Jewish Education Association stands unique. It seeks to embrace all Jewish groups and shades of opinion. It offers its aid and services to every type of Jewish religious school. It speaks to Jewish leaders, Jewish parents, Jewish teachers. It calls upon us to keep erect the only bulwark of Jewish life. Amid the tribulations of the present, it points to the past and it points to the future."

"There are today numerous Jewish parents whose fathers neglected to give them a Jewish education. We cannot give to others what we lack ourselves. These parents represent a lost Jewish generation. Shall we depend on others to rouse these parents to a sense of their own Jewishness and to an understanding of the duty they owe their children? It is true that many of them are being so aroused. But external forces should not be the monitor of our conscience. The Jewish Education Association strives to be this monitor for the greatness and glory of the Jewish faith, and the integrity of the Jewish way of life."

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CAPITAL ACCOUNT

WASHINGTON.

Last summer it was Dr. Wirt, Gary, Ind., schoolmaster, who charged there was a "plot" afoot to undermine the existing form of government in the United States. Now it is General Sundry D. Butler, retired Marine Corps officer and platform lecturer, who charges that Wall Street brokers tried to tempt him with a Hitler crown to set up a dictatorship in this country.

The Wirt charges were investigated by a Congressional committee, and after a thorough examination failed to find any basis. Butler got a laugh from the incident. As a matter of fact the affair now is a standing joke. Since the Wirt bubble burst the capital has been in dire need of a good laugh. Now along comes General Butler with his revelations before the House of Representatives Committee on Un-American Activities.

Butler's "publicity stunt," is inclined to have another good laugh. Representative John W. McCormack of Massachusetts, committee chairman, is not inclined to pass judgment on General Butler's charges, but intends to get at the bottom of the affair. Representative Samuel Dickstein of New York, vice-chairman and author of the resolution which established the committee, has apparently become excited over General Butler's allegations.

Representative Dickstein took Dr. Wirt seriously and was taken out on some of the laughs that Washington was then enjoying. There is great danger that he may miss out again in this sensational accusation by General Butler. Representative Dickstein is quoted as saying: "From present indications General Butler has the evidence. He is going to make any serious charges unless he has something to back them up. We'll have men here with bigger names than he."

General Butler made clear to the committee that he refused to be a dictator. But nevertheless, he claims to have had the offer, and that is shocking. What will Senator Huey Long of Louisiana say? Senator Long has gone no further than to give the country the general impression that he would like to be President of the United States by the Constitutional route. Senator Long is not doing a lot of dictating in Louisiana, but then, it is only one State and Huey is having a good time.

No one is likely to get ahead of Senator Long in a race for dictatorship honors—not even General Butler, who is the wealthy Wall Street broker.

As one editor put it, the American dictator will come neither from the ranks of retired generals nor from the United States Senate. This editor points out that if this country is to have a dictator, in all probability he will come from some obscure place.

Hitler was a house painter working by the day when he started his climb to head the German government. And that was not so long ago. Our future dictator may yet be in grammar school, or in a CCC camp, or in a cradle.

Contrary to what scare-heads have a long way to go before coming ripe for a dictatorship. Both Congress and the Supreme Court must collapse, as did the legislative and judicial branches in Germany, and Italy, before the dictator may appear before them to be sworn to office for life. And General Butler and the wealthy New York brokers know this to be a fact.

Mrs. Florence P. Kahn of California, whose wit and clever repartee is well known to members of the House of Representatives, needed all of her store of good humor in the last Congressional campaign. And she never hesitated
