Syria Opens Gates to Jews

But Limits Immigrants To Wealthy

Bars Zionists, Restricts Land Ownership to Iraq Border

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BEIRUT, Syria, Nov. 27.—Envious of the millions of dollars which Jews are bringing into Palestine and apprehensive lest development of Palestine commerce weaken Syria's influence in Near Eastern trade, the government yesterday announced that it will welcome Jewish immigration into Syria.

The welcome, however, it was made clear, is applicable only to such Jews who can bring into Syria sufficient capital to build factories and other enterprises in the country. Furthermore, they must obligate themselves to employ native labor only.

Bortionists
Jews admitted to Syria under this law will be required to prove that they are not Zionists or, if they have Zionist ideals, they must officially renounce them. A concentration of Jews will not be permitted in Syria, it was indicated, in order not to encourage any aims for eventually uniting Syria with Palestine.

The purchase of land near the Palestine-Syrian border will be prohibited to the immigrants, the announcement declares. Any land transaction between Jews and Arabs in Syria will not be registered by the government's land department if the territory purchased is located near Palestine. On the other hand, Jews will be permitted to buy land near the Iraq frontier, which is distant from Palestine.

Vital Step by France, London Times Holds

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The decision of the Syrian authorities to permit Jewish immigration into Syria is considered in the London Times today a very important step on the part of the French government to attract Jewish capital into Syria.

Rabbi Seeks Sanhedrin Revival To Solve Present-Day Problems

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 27.—Revival of the Jewish Sanhedrin, ancient high court, as a means of solving pressing Jewish problems was suggested here today by Rabbi Julius Berger.

Rabbi Berger urged the immediate convocation of such a body to study anew religious problems, laws and traditions, which have been accumulating since the beginning of the second century. Thus modern Jews would be enabled to take a definite stand.

"Are Jews a creed, a race or a nation? This would be the most important question a modern Sanhedrin would have to answer," Rabbi Berger declared. "The Sanhedrin would also be asked to plan a course of action and a solution for the vexing problems which confront the Jew in a changing world."

Rabbi Berger made his proposal before the combined Jewish student organization in McGill University, where he teaches in the department of Semitics.

Welfare Board Unit to Hold Neighborhood Meetings

Steps to mobilize the Jews of this city in support of the movement for better motion pictures will be inaugurated by the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Associations, it was announced yesterday by M. Maldwin Fertig, former assistant corporation counsel. An important feature of the association's effort will be neighborhood meetings of adults, including parents' groups, to crystallize public opinion into a demand for improved films. The league is a division of the Jewish Welfare Board.

Yugoslav Regent Asks Jewish Data

Prince Paul, in Interview With Chief Rabbi, Evinces Interest in Palestine

BELGRADE, Nov. 27.—Comprehensive information on the Jewish world situation and the progress in building Palestine was requested by Prince Paul, Yugoslavian regent, in a recent interview, Chief Rabbi M. Alkalay revealed today.

Prior to his departure for London, where he will attend the wedding of Prince George and Princess Marina, Prince Paul received the Yugoslavian Chief Rabbi.

On behalf of the regency and the crown he expressed the highest appreciation for Yugoslavian Jewry's deep concern and manifestations of grief over the assassination of the late King Alexander.

Rioters Stone Vienna Stores In Race Attack

Nazi Students' Protest Against Czechoslovaks Turns on Jews

VIENNA, Nov. 27.—Jewish stores and newspaper offices in Vienna were attacked today by Nazi students in huge anti-Czechoslovak street demonstrations in which thousands participated.

The demonstrations started as a protest against the anti-German riots which took place yesterday and Sunday in Praha. However, they assumed an anti-Jewish character when the demonstrators began to shout anti-Semitic slogans.

Windows of Jewish firms were smashed and the premises of the Neue Freie Presse were attacked by rioters. Nazi students stoned the building of the Neue Freie Presse since the paper is owned by Jews.

Police and military units were called to disperse the crowd. They were, however, met with a shower of stones. The troops were compelled to use their bayonets.

Haaretz Prints Report; Reich Revokes Settlers' Citizenship

JERUSALEM, Nov. 27.—A report that the Palestine government intends to introduce restrictions against Jewish immigrants who wish to enter the country in the capitalist category with a sum for investment of not less than \$5,000, is published today by Haaretz, leading Hebrew daily.

No verification is given in the report. Haaretz is, however, considered as a usually well-informed and reliable newspaper which refrains from spreading negative reports calculated to harm the progress of the country and provoke

Chosen Chief Of Universal Boycott Body

Jewish Group Formed to Further Fight Against Nazis

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
LONDON, Nov. 27.—The first international anti-Nazi boycott conference closed here today after unanimously electing Samuel Untermyer, American boycott leader, president of the World Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi Boycott Council.

Three thousand persons met at Central Hall at Westminster in the closing session of the conference tonight and solemnly pledged "heartily support of the German boycott until the German government restores full rights and complete freedom of belief of all citizens."

The resolution to this effect was adopted by acclamation.

A world Jewish boycott organization was created here today by the Jewish section of the international conference, which met separately. A central Jewish committee was chosen to carry on the boycott work and to organize propaganda against Hitlerism among the Jewish people. The committee will work in close cooperation with the international non-sectarian group.

International boycott headquarters will be opened in London in the near future, it was announced today.

The entire day was spent in deciding upon the composition of the governing body of the international organization and in choosing officers of the working executive body.

Mr. Untermyer, it was announced, leaves for New York tomorrow on the Berengaria.

The conference which just closed in London was decisive in creating an international boycott movement with a central direction instead of the loose organization hitherto existing.

For the first time the aims of the boycott were clearly stated and the terms upon which the movement would end were defined.

Adherence of the British labor movement and the International Federation of Trade Unions is regarded as an important victory for the boycott forces.

The conference also showed that the anti-Nazi boycott was by no means a Jewish affair.

Milwaukee Drive Raises \$9,000 for Refugee Aid

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 27.—More than \$9,000 was raised at the close of the first week in the United Jewish Appeal campaign for funds here to aid German Jewish refugees and distressed Jews within Germany.

1,000 to Attend 10th Parley of Zion Aid Group

Labor Committee for Palestine Holds a 3-Day Session

About 1,000 delegates from all parts of the United States and Canada are expected to attend the tenth anniversary convention of the National Labor Committee for Jewish Workers and Pioneers in Palestine, which opens Friday night at the Hotel Pennsylvania, it was announced yesterday.

The delegates will represent various locals of the International Ladies Garment Workers' Union, Amalgamated Clothing Workers, International Cap and Millinery Workers' Union, United Hebrew Trades and other organizations, fraternal and labor. The convention will continue Saturday and Sunday.

The National Labor Committee for Palestine comprises 50,000 individual members and about 1,000 affiliated organizations with a combined membership of more than 250,000. Since its formation in 1923, the organization has raised more than \$1,000,000 in this country to provide modern tools and machinery for Jewish agricultural and industrial workers of Palestine and to help maintain Holy Land hospitals, schools, libraries and other welfare, cultural and co-operative institutions.

The work has received endorsements from Professor Albert Einstein, Associate Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis and William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Special importance attaches to this year's convention, it was pointed out, because Palestine has become the chief haven for persecuted Jews of Germany and impoverished Jews of Eastern Europe. The delegates will be called upon to devise means to help the new settlers.

Dr. Zalman Rubashov and Dr. Zuckerman, members of the Jewish Agency, will attend the convention and give first-hand information on the situation in Palestine.

Party to Observe Jewish Blind Aid

'Braille Review' Marks Its Third Year—Event to Be Held at Morosco

In celebration of the third anniversary of "The Jewish Braille Review," the only publication in the world for the Jewish blind, a theatre party will be held at the Morosco Theatre, December 15. Gold Eagle "Guy" will be the attraction, unless it should close before then.

The party is being arranged by the Greater New York Women's Auxiliary of the Jewish Braille Institute of America, Inc., composed of representatives from the National Council of Jewish Women, the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, the women's branch of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations and the women's league of the United Synagogue of America.

S. Markevich Heads JNF Administration

Samuel Markevich, former Assistant District Attorney of New York County, will head the administration of the Jewish National Fund Council of Greater New York this year. The successor to Leo Wolfson was elected at the concluding session of the annual convention of the group held Sunday at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

Deutsch 'Sits Pretty' As Horvell Sculpts

Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutsch is "sitting pretty" these days. At least he is requested to do so, when in his office, by Joseph Horvell, internationally-known sculptor, who is doing a bust of Mr. Deutsch in bronze.

Mr. Horvell, for whom such personages as Queen Marie of Rumania, the late President Harding, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, Albert Coates, British orchestra conductor, and others have sat, is making himself at home in Mr. Deutsch's office and when the busy Aldermanic head happens to sit down at his desk Mr. Horvell gets to work with his sculptor's trowel.

Mr. Deutsch said he doesn't know what will be done with the bust when it is completed—but vetoed a suggestion that it adorn the portals to one of the city's parks.

Wimpfheimer, Merchant, Dies In Long Branch

Philanthropist, Business Leader Passes Away at 76

LONG BRANCH, N. J., Nov. 27.—Charles A. Wimpfheimer, seventy-six, president and treasurer of A. Wimpfheimer and Bros. of 456 Fourth avenue, New York, well known velvet merchant and philanthropist, died at his home today.

A director of Mount Sinai Hospital, New York, the American Velvet Co. and the Chase National Bank, Mr. Wimpfheimer was a generous donor to charity. In 1916 he gave \$150,000 to Mount Sinai Hospital, which he followed with later donations, and eleven years later he donated \$87,000 for a nursery school at Vassar College. Subsequently he gave \$25,000 more for the nursery. He also was a director of the United States Finishing Co. and Litt Bros., Philadelphia department store.

A vice-president and member of the board of governors of the Monmouth Memorial Hospital here, he built a four-story wing to the hospital in memory of his son, Jacques E., who was killed during the World War.

Mr. Wimpfheimer is survived by a widow, the former Annie Nordlinger, a daughter, Mrs. Andre Blumenthal of Norwalk, Conn., two sons, Clarence E. and Harold D. Wimpfheimer, both of this city, and two sisters, Mrs. Theodore Weil and Mrs. Frederick C. Goldsmith, of New York City.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock at Temple Emanu-El, Sixty-fifth street and Fifth avenue, New York City. Interment will be in Salem Fields, Cypress Hills, Queens, New York.

Horovitz to Retire

CORNWALL, Ont.—Retirement of Aaron Horovitz after five years as Mayor of Cornwall was indicated at the municipal nomination meeting today when he proposed the nomination of a colleague for the Mayoralty in 1935. Mr. Horovitz was the first Jew to be elected Mayor of an Ontario city. He has held office for five terms, three of which were accorded him by acclamation.

Saarlanders to Vote

MONTREAL, Que.—Thirty Canadian, formerly Saar residents, are being urged to return to their one-time homes in time to vote for Germany in the plebiscite on January 13, Ludwig Kempf, German Consul General in Canada, admitted here today. He stated that the money for the trip is being supplied by "patriotic German organizations." He denied that the German government is paying expenses.

Rochester Aids HIAS

ROCHESTER, N. Y.—Rochester Jewish organizations today were pledged to assist in raising the \$1,000,000 fund sought by the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society to aid Jewish immigrants from Germany. Henry M. Stern heads the movement. Presidents of congregations and lay organizations have been asked to reserve a day for the HIAS appeal.

Atlanta Scare

ATLANTA, Ga.—Using the sensational subject, "How to Destroy the Jews," W. H. Knight, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle here, told an audience of more than 1,500 persons Sunday night: "Destroy the heavens and the earth, then Israel will cease to be a nation." His unusual topic attracted considerable comment in local Jewish circles. This apprehension, however, was immediately quieted by the tone and content of the sermon.

BALTIMORE.—Rabbi Edward L. Israel, president of the Seaboard Zionist Region, issued a call today to members of the regional administrative committee to attend a special meeting of the committee to be held here Sunday afternoon, December 9.

Baltimore Drive Extended a Week

Jewish Charities Campaign Is
Within \$75,000 of
\$478,000 Goal

BALTIMORE, Nov. 27.—With pledged subscriptions within \$75,000 of the goal set for this year, it was decided yesterday to continue the campaign of the Associated Jewish Charities for one week more in an effort to raise the \$478,000, minimum figure to cover the budget of the thirteen member agencies for 1935.

Since the last tabulation of reports, on Friday, \$55,552 has been pledged or collected, making the total to date \$402,986.

Swiss Honor 75th Birthday Of Noted Leader

Dreyfuss-Brodsky Gets Praise for His Long Service to Jewry

GENEVA.—The seventy-fifth birthday of M. Jules Dreyfuss-Brodsky, president of the Federated Jewish Communities of Switzerland and also president of the Jewish Community of Basle, was celebrated here.

The central committee of the Federated Jewish Communities sent the following message:

"All Jews in Switzerland and abroad join in honoring our venerated president, and thanking you for your great work, especially the method in which you have carried it out. You have stood for a lifetime at the helm of Jewish life in Switzerland. You have been largely responsible for the shaping of the future of Swiss Jewry. And in addition, you have rendered great services to your native town Basle, and to our beloved Fatherland."

M. Dreyfuss-Brodsky is the representative of Swiss Jewry on the Council of the Jewish Agency. He is the founder of the Jewish Orphanage in Basle, and he is the head of many Jewish welfare institutions in Switzerland.

Library in Milan Files Rare Papers

Catalogues Jewish Mss. Pope Pius XI Handled as Librarian

ROME.—The collection of 122 rare Jewish manuscripts in the famed Catholic Ambrosian Library in Milan is now being catalogued and arranged by library officials. This is the library of which the present Pope, Pius XI, was for many years chief librarian. During his stay at the library, the Pope did considerable research in connection with these manuscripts in collaboration with his friend Professor Alessandro Fano, the chief Rabbi of Milan.

The Jewish items in the library's collection date back to the early seventeenth century when Cardinal Federico Borromeo commissioned Giampaolo Eustachio, a baptized Jew, to make a collection of rare Jewish manuscripts. Eustachio was instructed to get originals from the various neighboring libraries, and where the originals could not be obtained to have copies made.

Union Asks Observation Of Sabbath by Pupils

BERLIN.—The Reichsvertretung der deutschen Juden has issued a statement to the Jews of Germany that Jewish children need no longer attend school on the Sabbath and they therefore appeal to the parents to make application so they can be released from Sabbath attendance.

Sabbath observance, the statement points out, is the groundwork "for a spiritual reconstruction for inner upbuilding."

Moslem Faction Forms New 'Defense Party'

JAFFA.—Under the leadership of Ragheb Bey Nashashibi, deposed mayor of Jerusalem, the opposition Moslem faction has organized itself under the name, "The National Defense Party." Two thousand pounds has been collected and pledged for the party and will be expended on running a daily newspaper and for other propaganda.

Midwest Nazis Drop N. Y. Deutsche Zeitung

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 27.—As a result of abandoning its anti-Semitic policy, the Deutsche Zeitung of New York has been dropped as the organ of the Milwaukee unit of the Friends of New Germany, George Froboese, chairman, announced.

The Deutsche Zeitung was the official paper of the local unit, as well as of other "Friends" chapters around the country.

Savant to Quit Royal College After 15 Years

Sir W. Rothenstein, 62, Plans Retirement Next Year

LONDON.—Sir William Rothenstein, head of the Royal College of Art, will retire soon upon the expiration of fifteen years of service in that post, he announced in a letter to the president of the Board of Education.

Sir William, who will be sixty-three next year, received his appointment in 1920, when the school was demoralized by the effects of the World War. His reputation as a great artist, coupled with his inspiration as a teacher, attracted students from every section of the Empire.

Under his direction a notable teaching staff was gathered and students of the college in painting, engraving, sculpture and interior decorating achieved outstanding successes.

In 1928 the college gained the unique distinction of winning three awards in painting, engraving and sculpture in one year.

Veteran Given Order

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Greeks Using Nazi Swastika In New Attack

Salonica Placarded With Anti-Jewish Signs in Outburst

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

SALONICA, Nov. 27.—Greek anti-Semites have resumed their campaign against the Jews with posters containing anti-Jewish slogans and signed with the Nazi swastika, which were pasted on many public and private buildings throughout the city earlier in the day.

The renewed anti-Semitic drive is regarded here as a direct result of the fantastic charges made by the Minister of Religion against the Jews of Serres, Macedonia. He alleged that they had insulted the Greek nation and flag. The charges were immediately repudiated by the local officials directly concerned.

The story was, however, immediately seized upon by anti-Semitic newspapers as an excuse for a new attack on the Jews.

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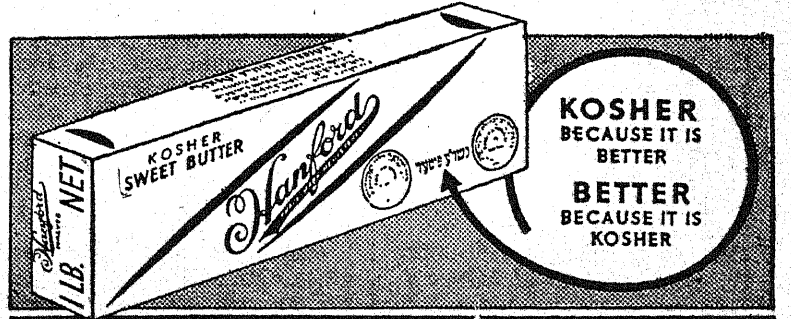

The Syrian Invitation

The authorities in Syria must be very poor diplomats. Otherwise they would not think that Jews would be foolish enough to bring capital into Syria without even having the right to employ Jewish labor there or to buy land wherever they wish.

The stipulation which the Syrian authorities make that Jews must renounce their Zionist ideals before settling in Syria is also a sign of poor diplomacy. There may be some German Jews who, as non-Zionists, would be willing to settle in Syria under this condition. The bulk of Jewish immigrants will however, hardly agree to exchange their Zionist ideals just for the privilege of living in Syria.

Syria needs the Jews today more than the Jews need Syria. Without an influx of Jewish capital, Syria will soon be overshadowed by Palestine and will be dead to the entire East. This explains why the authorities in Syria have suddenly issued their invitation to the Jews. The conditions which this invitation contains are, however, far from encouraging a Jewish migration into Syria. They only show that the Syrians wish the Jewish money but are not ready to give anything in return for it.

The Scapegoat

The anti-Jewish attacks in Vienna yesterday which were a part of the anti-Czechoslovak demonstrations are very significant of the Jewish position in Europe today.

When Czechoslovak nationalist students have their grievances against German students in Praha, whom do they attack? The Jews. When in return German students in Vienna demonstrate in revenge against the Czechoslovaks, who is attacked? The Jew again.

The Jew in Europe today is the scapegoat for every discontent. He is blamed for everything that is wrong, even though he has nothing to do with it. He is everyone's target of attack.

The anti-Jewish events in Praha and in Vienna during the past three days make it worthwhile to think of what may happen to the Jews in Central and Eastern Europe at any moment. These events are the best illustrations of the unexpected dangers to which the Jews are exposed under the present state of affairs in Europe.

EXILES IN NEW HOME

When the Hitler regime in a single day destroyed the foundations of the German Jewish community built and fortified in the course of generations, two voices were raised. One voice protested, the other proclaimed plans of rehabilitation. Among the latter, the constructive plans, none met with louder acclaim than that which provided for the withdrawal of the Jewish youth from the poisoned air of Germany. The proposal was not to provide a refuge, but an opportunity, the opportunity to live untrammelled in the Jewish spirit and secure the education and the training that fit for a life of useful activity. Palestine alone, of all the countries of the world, offered such an opportunity in a measure at least approximately adequate to the need.

The German youth themselves, the boys and girls of adolescent age, responded to the idea of removal to Palestine as quickly as the leaders and planners. The youth organizations, of which there were not a few, had been imbued from their inception with the national ideal. For them, therefore, the natural way out of the impasse, spiritual and economic, into which the Nazi ideology and Nazi action had choked them, was Palestine. To Palestine their number would go for a new life, with their parents, if so it could be, without their parents if circumstances or views stood in the way of sympathetic cooperation from the side of the parents. To realize the plan all the Jewish youth organizations of every shade of political and religious opinion united in a Federation called the Joint Committee for Children's Emigration.

Aid for Children Progresses Rapidly

There is a children's village in Palestine called Ben Shemen. For seven years it has been collecting funds in Germany and in other European countries, and children have been sent to it in numbers by parents who wanted them to become adjusted to Palestinian life.

There is a second institution, a children's home, called Ahawah, at Belin. The system of education in the home had always been Palestine-directed. When a change of scene became imperative its patrons, its directors and its wards all were ready to make a reality of what had long been an ideal. In the course of years these two institutions, Ahawah and Ben Shemen, had gathered a clientele accustomed to raising funds for the education of children in and for Palestine. They agreed to join forces with the Juedische Jugendhilfe to the end of bringing the plan of Jewish youth immigration into Palestine to their former contributors as well as to new circles whose hearts could be made to respond to the idea. So there was formed a union of the two institutions and the youth immigration movement and this union propagated the idea and won adherents and supporters in England, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and a number of other European countries in which committees were formed to raise the other required funds.

Education Planned For Absorption

Meantime, connection was made with Palestine. The Jewish Agency busied itself with

negotiations to secure from the Government of Palestine the youth certificates enabling entrance into Palestine. A survey of the financial possibilities made it seem likely that funds could be raised sufficient to bring over five hundred boys and girls in the year 1933-1934. A second survey, of another kind, made it seem advisable to limit the first year's detachment primarily to boys and girls between the ages of fourteen and seventeen, though parents in Germany were pleading to have their younger children included, too.

Palestine's second duty was to find the proper places for the settlement, the education, and the training of the boys and girls, and to develop the general lines along which their education should be planned to ensure their absorption into Palestinian

life as farmers or as artisans at the end of their training. Buildings had to be erected to house the expected young immigrants, for since they were destined chiefly for settlement in rural districts, housing accommodations could not be counted upon.

It took a few months to make the necessary arrangements and adjustments at both ends. The young candidates had to be selected and listed from the point of view of their fitness, physical and temperamental, for transplantation in general and for Palestinian life in particular. That was done in training camps organized at several points in Germany. The personal data on the life and status of each candidate had to be secured and a physician's certificate testifying to the candidate's physical and

The JDC-Zionist Rift Again

There is no desire whatsoever on the part of the Joint Distribution Committee to break up the existing agreement with the Zionist Organization for a united drive for funds. A modus must, however, be found for a more logical distribution of these funds.

The leaders of the Joint Distribution Committee are of the opinion that the Zionist Organization is not entitled to fifty per cent of the money collected, for the following reasons:

The Issues

Firstly—the need of European Jewry is today much greater than the need of the Jews in Palestine.

Secondly—independent of the sums which the Zionist Organization receives from the JDC as its share in the United Jewish Appeal, the JDC grants a good proportion of its funds for Palestine work. Approximately \$300,000 of the JDC funds assigned this year for helping German Jews has gone for supporting the Palestine Office in Berlin, the Hechalutz in Germany, the farms on which the Hachshara—the training of Jews for Palestine agricultural work—is conducted, and for paying the fare of German Jews to Palestine.

Unequal Partnership

Thirdly—the partnership between the JDC and the ZOA is not exactly an equal one, because the Hadassah, the Mizrachi, the Palestine Labor Campaign and the Jewish National Fund are conducting separate drives of their own. These organizations have raised about a million dollars this year in the United States, independent of the United Jewish Appeal, from which the ZOA receives fifty per cent.

Fourthly—because of these separate Zionist drives many in America are contributing to them directly rather than to the United Jewish Appeal, to which the ZOA is a partner. The situation is therefore such that while the non-Zionists do not share in the contributions made to Hadassah, Mizrachi and the others, the Zionists share in the contributions which the United Jewish Appeal gets largely from non-Zionists.

Old Arrangement Wanted

Fifthly—the Joint Distribution Committee has now in Palestine not less than \$1,800,000 invested in the Palestine Economic Corporation, which is very active in assisting the Jews in Palestine in every possible way. This sum in itself is a sufficient contribution for Palestine.

Sixthly—in the allied campaign which the Joint Distribution Committee conducted with the Zionist Organization in 1930, the Zionists agreed to receive less than fifty per cent of the funds raised, and even prohibited the Mizrachi and Hadassah from conducting separate drives. Why should the ZOA not agree to less than fifty per cent now?

All these arguments of the JDC are very reasonable. The strongest argument is, of course, that millions of Jews are now starving in Eastern Europe and are in urgent need of relief, while in Palestine the Jews are all working and are not in need of any relief.

The starving Jews in Poland, in Austria and in Germany must not be treated as step-children. This is why the Zionist Organization will have to compromise with the JDC. This is why the JDC is justified in its demand.

Anti-Semitism in America

The great weakness of anti-Semites everywhere is their lack of common purpose. While they

hate Jews, this is usually not the only axe they have to grind. Thus an anti-Semitic Socialist like Goebbels hated equally the anti-Semitic Junkers. The anti-Semitic pervert Roehm, hated

all normal men perhaps more thoroughly than he did Jews. When anti-Semitism, like any other body, find a common ground on which to unite themselves, despite the many divers opinions which necessarily guide them in all else, they become truly dangerous, since decent men who do not subscribe to these bloody medieval ideas still remain disunited.

This is our great danger in America, as it is, indeed, in France, England, or any other nation in the world where Jews live: That anti-Semites who find a common ground for unified action, such as the bogey of Communism in Germany, will find on this subject only a tissue paper opposition resisting them. If Jew-haters in the Social Register are thus provided with a ground to make common purpose with Jew-haters in the professions, the laboring unions and elsewhere, you have an irresistible wave of anti-Semitism in the making.

This will occur despite the fact that the majority of the population is never in accord with Jew-baiting and may have marital ties and life-long friendship among the Jewish population. The disorganized majority is totally unable to resist the impact of the anti-Semitic phalanx.

Friendship Passive

Friendship for any people can be viewed at best as being largely passive. That is, no one is going to stick his head deliberately under the axe in order merely to achieve rights for the Jews. The stock reaction probably will be that an injustice is being done, but that it up to the Jews to take care of themselves.

I say, therefore, that every stock property exists here to put on a first-class anti-Semitic show. Jews who fancy that mere liberalism and the abstract principles of justice will save them from a performance of this kind are as assinine as the assimilated Jews who feel that by donning lion's skin they will be taken for the lion. That the first fury of anti-Semitic action will be leveled against them is comprehensible only to a rational-minded person who is able to see clearly both cause and effect; but of course assimilated Jews do not possess rational minds, a lack of which is universal among hypocrites and renegades, for all their peacock posturings.

The German Jews, of course, set a classic example in neo-Gentilism. They conformed so strictly that if one had wanted to find a letter-perfect picture of a German Gentile, he would have been forced to seek out a Jew. These Germans who hid their Jewishness in every guise that the escapist, cowardly psychology could conceive, demolished at the same time the unity, the intelligence and the manhood which might have saved them.

Fools Voice Fears

Foolish men among them undoubtedly spoke forth, as foolish men speak forth here: "How can so few stand up against so many!" I assert again that this is a mere

Digest of World Press Opinion

Praise for Soviet Franchise Decree

The Jewish Layman, organ of the Temple Brotherhood of America, brings the news about the recent Soviet decree restoring the franchise to the clergy and comments:

A new ray of sunshine has penetrated the Russian Socialist Federated Soviet Republic, the largest unit of the Soviet Union. A half million Jews have been granted a new lease on life, with the order issued this past month by Michael Kalinin restoring the franchise to a vast portion of the population of former outcast and declassed groups of Russians. The former bourgeoisie class, ex-clergy-men and even present employees of religious bodies—provided they "have performed five years of socially useful labor and have proved their loyalty to the Soviet State"—are once again given the privilege to vote, "the right to bread cards, low rents, jobs, social recognition and educational opportunities for their children."

While Jews are only a small part of the people affected by this new order, it is a hopeful sign of a changing attitude by the Soviet government. Perhaps the next step may be the enfranchising of the Rabbis and its attendant official recognition of the individual's right to religion.

Rail Men's Organ Comments on 'Protocol'

Labor, official weekly newspaper of the railroad labor organization of America, prints the following editorial on the "Protocols of the Elders of Zion":

One of the strangest trials in human history was conducted in Berne, Switzerland. Certain Jewish leaders have brought a criminal libel suit against a group of Swiss Nazis, who have been circulating the so-called "Protocols of the Elders of Zion," outlining an elaborate scheme to make Jews the dominant force throughout the world, in government, finance and industry.

These mysterious documents have been used to excite anti-Semitic feeling in a score of countries, and particularly in Russia and Germany. Now reputable witnesses testify that they are forgeries drafted by agents provocateur of the late Czar.

"They are gross inventions which no historian, no cultivated man, ever took seriously," says Paul Miljukow, a noted Russian man of letters who served as a

member of Kerensky's short-lived government, and is well known in the United States as a lecturer.

Miljukow declares the protocols were responsible for the bloody pogroms which drove millions of Jews from Russia. Eventually, he says, they contributed to the destruction of the Czar and the triumph of the Soviets, because the embittered Jews supplied the brains and driving power which wiped out the old regime.

Hitler is using in Germany the same material which proved fatal to the Romanoffs.

If the Berne trial accomplishes nothing more, it should call world-wide attention to the wickedness and futility of racial and religious bigotry—a weapon the ruling class has used in every land to divert the people's attention from their political and economic wrongs.

Boston Transcript Scotches False Idea

The Boston Evening Transcript, in connection with the Artkino libel suits, publishes the following editorial on the misapprehension that was spread through the United States that Jews have been barred from the Massachusetts jury.

It seems incredible that any misunderstanding could have arisen as to one phase of a case completed today (Nov. 22) in the Superior Court for Suffolk County. Nevertheless, in certain quarters, a misconception occurred, and even reached print, spreading abroad a false

idea which, for the honor of the bench and bar in Massachusetts, needs to be swiftly scotched. At the outset of the case in question—an action for libel, based upon gross accusations made against Jews—Reuben L. Lurie, as counsel for the plaintiff, requested that the case be heard by a justice himself not a Jew and also that the jury should not include Jews. His motive in so doing one would say was completely transparent, a characteristic expression of Mr. Lurie's spirit of fairness. The purpose was to avoid any chance that, if verdict were given for the plaintiff—as it was so given today—the charge could be made that either the judge or any member of the jury had been prejudiced, by reason of Jewish faith or blood, in behalf of the plaintiff.

But this obvious fact somehow failed to make itself evident to some one or two obtuse minds. After the court had acceded to counsel's request, a statement went out to the effect that "Massachusetts had excluded Jews from a jury," as though this were done in hostility! Naturally, if this false idea were to gain currency, it would make the Americanism and common justice of the courts of this Commonwealth appear weak and ignorant. Wherever the story appears in headlines or whisper, it should be put down. The truth is that the action of the court, as well as of counsel, proceeded upon grounds of the highest right, as further attested by the verdict which the Gentile jury gave today for the plaintiff.

psychic health was indispensable.

Arrivals Distributed To Various Settlements

Meantime the committee carried on its fund-raising to meet the expense of equipment, of traveling, and of maintenance and education for the average period of two years. The monthly outlay for maintenance and education is \$15. This monthly rate should be guaranteed until the candidate reaches the age of seventeen, the age up to which the Government of Palestine requires a guarantee from the Jewish Agency against the possibility of a minor's falling a burden upon the community. A simple calculation will show that the sum of five hundred youthful settlers is not small.

By the middle of February of 1934 the preparatory steps had been achieved in Germany and in Palestine. The groups began to arrive. The first, of forty-three, later joined by eighteen additional candidates, was destined for Ain Harod; the second, of twenty-four, consisting entirely of girls, went to the Girls' Training Farm near Talpit, the suburb of Jerusalem within sight of the High Commissioner's stately residence; the third, of thirty, was the first Ahawah contingent; the fourth was settled at the Kibbutz Rodges near Petach-Tikwah; the first, again composed entirely of girls, went to the Technical School established at Jerusalem by the Miz-rachi women; the sixth went to Tel-Yosef, adjacent to Ain Harod. Then there was a cessation until the Fall. In October a second detachment was to arrive for Ahawah, a second detachment for Rodges and still others for Mishmar Ha-Emek near Nahalal and for the group of four settlements known as Emek Ha Yarden, at the south-

ern end of the Sea of Tiberias. Meanwhile the number at Ben-Shemen reached over one hundred and fifty.

Work and Study Basis of Program

In all places the general program has a two-fold basis, work and study—agricultural and manual work, Hebrew, general, and technical studies. The Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews in Palestine of the Jewish Agency exercises general supervision over the young settlers. They are in reality its wards. It is responsible for them, legally towards the Government, morally towards their parents and the Jewish nation. At the same time, while the general plan of living and study and work is laid down and secured by means of a contract endorsed by the Jewish Agency between the Juedische Jugendhilfe and the Palestinian institutions, each place and institution is autonomous as to details, especially such as the work bound up with the locality. In all cases the aim is to give the boy or girl the chance of becoming an independent worker in his chosen department by the time he reaches the age of seventeen and to place him so that by then he can enter into the practical life of Palestine.

This great constructive movement has only just begun. Five hundred young people is not more than five per cent of the number that should be drawn out of Germany into the productive, promising life of Palestine. Funds will have to be provided for another detachment of at least fifteen hundred for maintenance, education and training. It is obvious that the old fund-raising groups cannot be permitted to rest on their oars, and new fund-raising groups will have to be organized in additional countries of the Diaspora.

BLACK on WHITE

Despite all the din about dictatorship, real or threatened, Americans have only the faintest notion of what the word means. They know its dictionary definition. They can describe it in cold, obtuse political terms. But they know nothing of its inner essence, its flavor, its overtones of terror and desperation. It has not yet been burnt into their flesh and their minds.

For six years I lived under one dictatorship and sojourned frequently under several others. Because of my special status as a foreigner and an American reporter I did not taste dictatorship in its undiluted strength. But enough of it seeped through to me to give me a working idea of its essential qualities.

And since my return, with the memory of what I had experienced even though vicariously fresh on my nerves, I have squirmed every time the word dictatorship is used lightly. I hear President Roosevelt referred to as a dictator and his economic innovations as a dictatorship. Only the Russians, the Germans, the Italians can appreciate the gargantuan absurdity of such statements.

Even so well-informed a person as Heywood Broun seems to share in the hazy, generalized notion about dictatorships and dictators held by the average American. Speaking of Roosevelt, just after the recent elections, Broun insisted that "not Hitler, nor Mussolini, nor Stalin possess greater command that has been won by the Groton boy who made good."

To anyone who has lived under Hitler, Mussolini or Stalin long enough to penetrate below the surface, such an assertion sounds utterly wild. Yet that assertion is fairly representative of the ordinary American preconception of dictatorship, a preconception that is worlds away from the European reality.

What the average American mind conjures up as his vision of dictatorship is so much milder than the reality that to the ordinary Russian, German or Italian (unless he is in the governing minority) it would look like untrammelled freedom beyond imagining.

But I have small hope of making an American aware of dictatorship in the way that its victims are aware of it. I have tried and failed.

I have tried to evoke the picture of millions of human beings stripped not only of all rights and hopes, but of all human dignity, both their minds and their bodies the absolute chattels of a super-state. I have tried to suggest the fear that is as thick as a fog over an entire people and eats into the human fibre until it reduces all life to a bitter dust. I have tried to convey the atmosphere of dictatorship so complete that not only revolt but even martyrdom are unthinkable.

It seems to me desirable that we in America come to understand the reality of dictatorship. As far as possible the benign picture of hurrah-shouting hosannah-singing dictatorship painted on our minds by Fascist and Bolshevik publicity should be replaced by a truer understanding of the groaning drowned out by the cheers and the horrors covered by holiday bunting.

Let those who cry for the Castoria of dictatorship know, at least, what they are crying for.

\$300,000 Left To Institutions By Phila. Will

Weinbergers Bequeath Vast Sum to 27 Charities

(Special to the J.D.B.)

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—Twenty-seven local charitable institutions will receive approximately \$300,000 from the combined trust estates of the husband and son of Mrs. Louis H. Weinberger, who died last Friday at eighty. Louis H. Weinberger, the husband, died October 8, 1931, and Harry L. Weinberger, the son, died June 11, 1929.

The money is bequeathed to hospitals, homes, welfare and educational institutions and provisions for its distribution include establishment of a number of scholarships and endowments of free beds and rooms for the poor and needy.

The Federation of Jewish Charities receives bequests totaling \$100,000 and is the largest single beneficiary, while the Jewish Hospital, with \$60,000, is next.

Scholarship funds of \$10,000 each are created at the National Farm School, near Doylestown, and at the Foster Home for Hebrew Orphans, this city. Temple University is given \$4,000 to endow a scholarship.

The following institutions are to receive \$10,000 each for endowment of a free bed.

Eagleville Sanitarium for Consumptives, Jewish Seaside Home for Invalids, Temple University (to be divided between Samaritan Hospital and Garretson-Greathart Hospital) Jewish Hospital Association for use of the Lucien Moss Home for Incurables of the Jewish Faith, Lankenau Hospital, Jefferson Medical College Hospital, University Hospital, Jewish Hospital and Mt. Sinai Hospital.

Other charitable bequests are \$2,000 each to the following:

Hebrew Sheltering Home, Jewish Welfare Society, Women's Homeopathic Hospital, Northern Liberties Hospital, Children's Hospital, Presbyterian Hospital, Big Brothers Association Boy Centre, Willow Crest for Convalescents, Neighborhood Centre, Congregation Rodeph Shalom, Salvation Army, Northwestern General Hospital and the Foster Home for Hebrew Orphans.

The bequests are memorials to the son, Mr. and Mrs. Weinberger, Mr. Weinberger's sister, Hannah Weinberger, and his parents, Samuel and Julia Weinberger.

Library, Museum Added To Milwaukee Temple

MILWAUKEE.—A library and museum have been added to the Congregation Emanu-El B'nai Jeshurun here. The library, modeled after a similar department in the public library, has a rental department under the direction of one of the congregation women.

The museum contains some 300 items, including historical and ceremonial objects and documents which shed light on the history of the Jews in Milwaukee and Wisconsin.

Synagogue Sponsors Chanukah Broadcast

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 27.—The second annual Chanukah broadcast sponsored by Shearith Israel Synagogue will be sent out over WSB here next Sunday afternoon.

Reich Allows Foreign Jews' Trade at Fair

Consulate Protests Bring Rescinding of Ban at Oranienburg

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—Acting upon the vigorous protests submitted by several foreign consulates, German government authorities have ruled that Jewish traders who are citizens of foreign countries are to be permitted to display their wares at the annual autumn fair at Oranienburg.

A police order prohibiting all Jews to exhibit their merchandise among that shown by "Aryans" at the fair and assigning the Jews to a separate market at a distance from the fair brought vigorous protests from German Jews and from many foreign Jewish traders who came to Oranienburg for the fair. Not until the consulates of several countries had intervened did the authorities permit foreign Jewish traders to participate in the fair. A similar order also admitted members of the League of German Jewish Front Soldiers.

Sobeloff Chosen In Insurance Plan

Maryland Governor-Elect Appoints Former U. S. Attorney Group Head

(Special to the J.D.B.)

BALTIMORE, Nov. 27.—Simon E. Sobeloff has been appointed by Governor-elect Harry W. Nice as head of a committee to draft unemployment insurance legislation for Maryland.

Mr. Sobeloff, former United States District Attorney and Deputy City Solicitor of Baltimore, sponsored the unemployment insurance bill that was passed by the Maryland House of Delegates in the session of 1933, but was killed in the Senate. Other members of the committee included:

Walter Hollander, treasurer of the Maryland Pharmaceutical Company; Daniel Ellison, attorney and sole Republican member of Baltimore's City Council; David London, president of the Al-Lon Manufacturing Company, and Sidney Lansburgh, president of the Associated Jewish Charities.

Altman to Head Drive Of Atlantic City Charity

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 27.—Joseph Altman, speaker of the Assembly of the New Jersey Legislature, will lead the 1935 fund campaign of the Atlantic City Federation of Jewish Charities.

Dr. Philip R. Goldstein of New York, national director of campaigns for the Jewish Welfare Board, is to come here December 1 to complete organization for the drive, which opens the week of December 9.

Expansion of Colonies Noted In Palestine

Cooperatives Stronger Than Ever, Says Jewish Agency

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM.—Important economic achievements and the extension of activity in most centers were recorded in 1933-34 by the Jewish settlements, according to a report made public by the Agricultural Colonization department of the Jewish Agency. The achievement, the report points out, is all the greater because the bulk of the settlements had not received the full budget planned for them by the Jewish Agency. It refutes, the report states, the predictions of experts who predicted the settlements would show signs of failure as soon as Keren Hayesod appropriations were withheld from them.

The explanation set forth for the healthy condition of the settlements were the good use made by the rural centers of prosperous conditions in the country, the strengthening of their co-operative buying and selling organizations ("Thenuva" and "Hamashbir"), the extension of cattle raising, poultry breeding and grain farming activities and the higher degree of productivity in many fields.

confession of weakness. It is for us who are attacked to be calm, clear-eyed and fearless. It is for us to seek those other lovers of freedom and decency who are our natural allies. The forces that would degrade us also will annihilate everything that decent men hold dear.

When decent Gentiles who might be our friends turn their eyes towards us and see an unappealing picture of cringing and flight, they can only shrug their shoulders in resignation. They can hardly be expected to fight the battles which we are too lazy or too decrepit to fight for ourselves.

A young Jewish girl who steps into an employment agency and is contemptuously repulsed when it is discovered she is Jewish has in her hands more of the portent of the future than is contained in all the mouthings of our orators. Their mumbo-jumbo only serves to mislead and detract us from our real task, that of living both collectively and individually as free men, spiritually hearty, emotionally healthy and physically safe.

Loyalty, fealty, courage, pride sacrifice are not mere words. They will remain virtues whether men recognize them or not. Jews who hide out in the jungles of economic determinism, assimilationism, class-struggle and fearful renegade thought have much to learn.

The anti-Semitic monster will scotch them first. Being both weak and elusive they are the better game.

Rulings Bring Trials to Aliens In Dominion

Restrictive Citizenship Laws Prevent Many From Naturalization

(Special to the J.D.B.)

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 27.—Would-be Canadians now encounter many difficulties in securing naturalization papers as result of the regulations which recently went into effect.

Some weeks ago it was announced that severe restrictions would be placed on would-be citizens, especially those who have families in the countries of the origin or are recommended by witnesses who are not possessed of the necessary qualifications.

At a recent hearing five cases in which the wives and families of applicants for naturalization papers were not residents of this country the applications were referred to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa. In a number of other cases, where witnesses supporting the application did not themselves possess the necessary qualifications, the petitions were postponed to an unnamed date.

In certain quarters it is believed that the present Conservative government is creating barriers for the naturalization of its foreign-born population.

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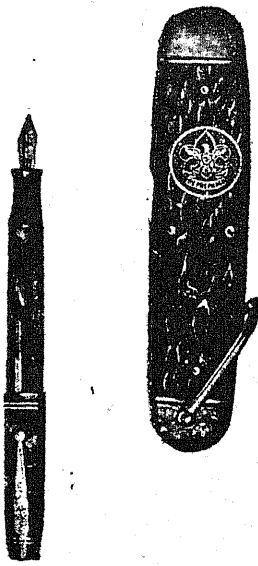
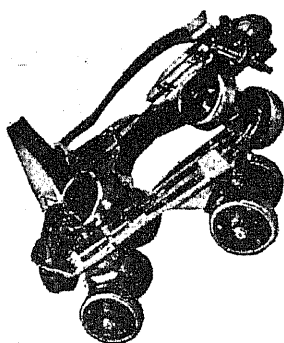

City College opened its 1934 court season in whirlwind style by sweeping the Saints from St. Francis to a 39-28 defeat. Although erratic in form in the first half, the Beavers clicked in Holman fashion and revealed what can be done along St. Nick Terrace with a first team that averages six feet in height.

Basketball has always been the king of sports at City College, and Lavender court teams have been living up to this tradition. In the past three years Coach Holman's fives have rolled up the impressive total of forty-three wins in forty-six games, losing only one game each season.

Because of the superb brand of coaching, City College has earned the reputation of being the smartest basketball team in collegiate circles, and the high scores the teams have piled up support this statement. For the last three years the Beavers have averaged thirty-six points a contest while holding their opponents to the amazingly low score of twenty-one points per game.

'Greatest Player' Coach

Nat Holman, who has earned the reputation of being the greatest basketball player the game has ever known, has been the head coach at C. C. N. Y. for the past fifteen years. During his tenure as Lavender court mentor, his quintets have set records never approached by any other college five. He has been associated with big-time basketball for sixteen years as player, coach, lecturer and author. He captained and starred with the Original Celtics, generally recognized as the premier professional team in the world.

He has everything a coach desires—speed, power, a good eye and cleverness. Coach Holman claims he has the ideal athletic temperament. Quiet and reserved during the week, he expends all his pent-up energy in action. On the floor he has earned the sobriquet of 'Gentleman Sam' because of his excellent sportsmanship.

The rank of captain should rest easy on this lad's shoulders. He led both the St. Clare McKelway's quintet and nine; captained the Thomas Jefferson baseball team the year that school won the city championship; and in his freshman year at college he was the leader of an unforgettable jayvee five that wreaked havoc with most of the fresh outfits in this part of the country.

Winograd is also captain-elect of the 1935 baseball team.

Justice Tompkins Gets 1934 Service Award

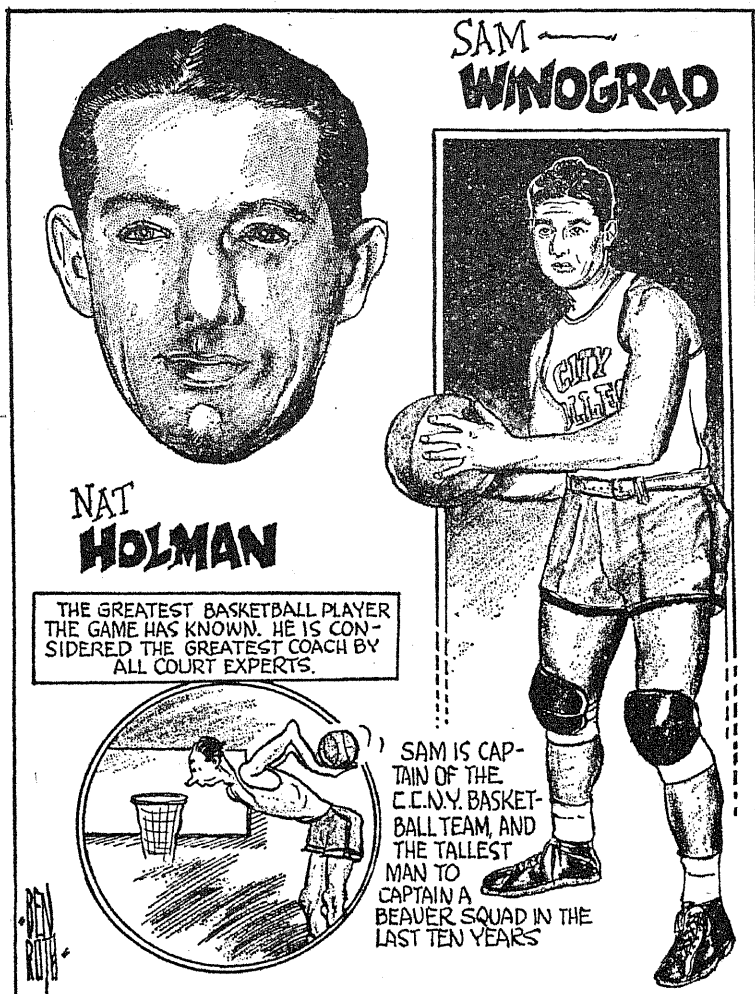

Nazis Lay All Ills to Jews In Proposed Education Drive

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN.—The C. V.-Zeitung, official organ of the Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, reproduces the text of a suggested school curriculum which appeared in the National-Sozialistischer Erziehungs, Nazi education publication.

The school year is divided into ten periods of four weeks each, according to the draft, which lists studies under the following four headings: date, subject, relation to Jews and reading matter.

Under "subject" and "relation to Jews" the following sub-headings are stipulated:

Pre-war Germany, class-war, profit, strike—The Jew makes himself at home!

Agrarian State to Industrial State, colonies—The peasant in the clutches of the Jews!

Conspiracy against Germany, Germany hemmed in—The Jew rules!

Germany's struggle, German want, blockade! famine! death!—The Jew grows wealthy, exploits Germany's need.

Stab-in-the-back, collapse—Jews as leaders of the November revolution.

Germany's Golgotha, Erzberger's crime, Versailles—East European Jews swarm in; Judas' triumph!

Adolph Hitler, National Socialism—Judas the enemy.

Blood-drenched frontiers, Germany's enslavement, voluntary corps, Schlageter—The Jew exploits Germany's needs; Dawes and Young loans.

National Socialism grapples with the underworld and the criminal world—Jews instigate murder; the Jewish press.

Germany's youth forward! The victory of faith—War to the end against Juda.

Reading matter specified in the last column includes Der Stuermer, Feder's "The Jews," and Hitler's "Mein Kampf."

"There has been much discussion among Jewish parents and in the German Jewish movement," the C. V.-Zeitung comments, "concerning the possibility of Jewish children's taking part in State political instruction. The overwhelming opinion was that the character of this State political instruction would make it a heavy spiritual burden on Jewish children. We believe this view will be strengthened by this draft curriculum."

Youth Unity Urged To Fight Fascism

Masada Head Scores Apathy in Face of Growing Anti-Jewish Sentiment

Jewish youth must organize to combat anti-Semitism, Isaac Imber, national president of Masada, Zionist youth organization, declared yesterday at a meeting of the national executive committee which discussed plans for the coming Masada convention in Philadelphia.

He criticized apathy in the face of "a growing Fascist and anti-Jewish sentiment, not only in other countries of the world but here, in our very midst, in our own country."

Asserting that "you cannot meet an attack without a plan of action," Imber said:

"The program is the Zionist program, the program that calls for the rebuilding of Palestine as a Jewish National Home, as a place where Jews can live as Jews, free from the distorting influence of the Exile."

Deutsche Zeitung Quits, Leaving Beobachter to Carry On

The Deutsche Zeitung, which for several months stirred up a hornet's nest of agitation with its pro-Hitler and anti-Semitic articles, announced yesterday that it has decided to suspend publication.

Stripped of its prejudicial effectiveness by a libel suit which forced W. L. McLaughlin, its managing editor and part-publisher, to abandon his tirades against the Jews rather than spend a year in jail, the newspaper lost its reason for existence when the Friends of New Germany disowned it as the official Nazi mouthpiece in this country.

Its successor in the racial discrimination field is the Deutscher Beobachter, published by the "Friends" and edited principally by ex-members of the Zeitung staff, who walked out when McLaughlin printed a retraction of libelous statements he had made against former Magistrate Joseph Goldstein and announced the entire policy of the Zeitung would be altered.

The Beobachter news staff, Dr. Hubert Schnuch, national president of the Friends, declared yesterday, is to be headed by Adolf Haag, former Deutsche Zeitung reporter and one-time member of the force of the Staats Zeitung. Haag will bear the title of "responsible editor."

Walter Kappe, whose apology to Dr. Kurt Rosenfeld, fugitive from Nazi Germany and former Prussian Minister of Justice, evoked many chuckles because he had voiced scathing criticism of McLaughlin's "lack of courage," is not to be connected with the Beobachter, Schnuch said.

Instead Kappe now becomes an official of the "Friends," serving as its press representative. This, Dr. Schnuch hastened to explain, does not mean that Louis Zahne loses his status as publicity agent for the Nazi organization, but merely that Kappe will be the immediate contact man between the "Friends" and the Beobachter, in whose offices, at 305 East Forty-sixth street, he will make his headquarters.

Convinced that the Beobachter will find a reading public as least as receptive as did the now defunct Deutsche Zeitung, the "Friends" have bought machinery for a plant, now being installed at the East Forty-sixth street address. The newspaper will be issued twice weekly, on Tuesday and Friday evenings, with an English section on the latter day.

motion picture" committee of the Metropolitan League have already been held, Mr. Fertig said yesterday, at which progressive steps in this movement, preceding the neighborhood meetings, have been decided upon. These include a conference of presidents and executive directors of such organizations in New York City and its metropolitan area, to discuss the motion picture problem from many angles.

To Train Leaders

The plans of the Metropolitan League includes an intensive training course for prospective leaders of motion picture groups, Mr. Fertig stated. Some of the more popular lectures in this will be open to Jewish community center club leaders in general.

The Metropolitan League, Mr. Fertig said, has taken cognizance of efforts being made both by religious and lay groups to improve the quality of motion pictures and feels that these efforts should receive the League's support both for the good of the public and for the exhibitors as well.

"It has become only too evident," he said, "that the usual kind of cheap pictures to which too much objection has been made recently, are in the long run bad for both audience and exhibitors."

Demand for Good Films

"If the leaders of the industry studied the matter as they should, they would quickly realize that there already exists in the masses of the people a strong demand for finer motion pictures."

"I wish to stress that our movement has not in the remotest degree the purpose of eliminating the zest, the interest and the recreation provided by motion picture houses. Nor, is it in any way intended to foster a narrow or supercritical attitude. It is intended, solely, to stimulate public interest in, and as a consequence, encourage the industry to produce a better grade picture."

In addition to Mr. Fertig, the special committee of the Jewish Welfare Board includes Judges Edward L. Lazansky and Edgar J. Lauer; Dr. Paul Klapper of C. C. N. Harris Salit Succumbs to Heart Ailment

Wealthy Real Estate Man and Philanthropist Dies at 69

Harris Salit, who made a fortune in Brooklyn real estate and long a leader in Jewish philanthropies, died late Monday night at his home at 1307 Carroll street, Brooklyn, it was learned yesterday. Heart trouble was the immediate cause of his death. Mr. Salit was 69 years old.

Born in Russia, Mr. Salit made his home in Brooklyn for the past fifty years. Before prohibition he headed one of the largest wholesale liquor firms in the borough.

Among Mr. Salit's philanthropies were donations of land to the Brooklyn Hebrew Home for the Aged and the Congregation Mount Sinai. To the former he gave the entire cemetery grounds at Springfield Cemetery, Queens. The latter's temple at 305 State street was purchased with funds realized from the sale of property he donated to the congregation.

Prominent in Boro Affairs

Mr. Salit was a member of the board of directors of the Brooklyn Hebrew Home for the Aged. He was the oldest member of the Mount Sinai Congregation, of which he was formerly president. He was also on the board of directors of the Brooklyn Jewish Center and a life member of Zerezzatha Lodge of the Masons.

Mr. Salit is survived by a widow, Mrs. Kate Salit; a daughter, Mrs. Jeanette Lipshutz; two sons, Maurice and Theodore, and three brothers, David, Michael and Mendel Salit.

Funeral services will be held at one o'clock this afternoon at the Congregation Mount Sinai.

buy land along the Palestinian frontier. This measure, the Times says, is considered necessary in order to avoid possible Jewish claims for modifying the Syrian frontier in favor of Palestine.

Invitation Result Of Long Deliberation

PARIS, Nov. 27.—The invitation to Jews to migrate to Syria and Lebanon is a result of long deliberation between Jews and the French government, which is the mandatory power over Syria.

A memorandum on the situation in Syria, in connection with the rapid development in Palestine, was submitted recently to France by the French High Commissioner of Syria. It was pointed out in this memorandum that with the growth of Palestine Syria's trade is dwindling. Not only have Syrian exports to neighboring Arab countries shrunk, but many Syrian traders are closing their branches in Damascus and Beirut and are proceeding with their capital to Palestine to do business there.

Jewish leaders have long been negotiating with the French authorities to permit German Jews to settle in different parts of Syria. Zionist leaders asked the Syrian government to permit Jews to settle near the Palestinian frontier, but a delegation of non-Zionist Jews from Germany recently visited Syria to negotiate with the Arab government there to permit settlement of German Jews near the Iraq border.

The German delegation was welcomed by Arab notables and taken for a three week's tour of the country, for the purpose of investigating whether the land near the Iraq frontier would be suitable for Jewish colonization.

Rosenwald Kin Wins \$2,500 Design Prize

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Ernest A. Grunsfeld, nephew of the late Julius Rosenwald, won first prize of \$2,500 in a competition to design and decorate the interior of a theatre to be incorporated in the new building being erected for WGN, the Chicago Tribune radio station.

The winner, who designed the Adler Planetarium, won over 182 competitors, including many of the leading architects of the country. He is thirty-one.

Ouster of Jews From Lithuania Trade Sought

Merchants and Artisans Group Proclaims a Boycott

KAUNAS, Nov. 27.—A united front of Lithuanian merchants and artisans to oust the Jews from all economic positions was decided upon today at a congress of the "Werslas," Association of Merchants and Artisans.

A vigorous anti-Jewish demonstration was organized by the congress, which proclaimed "Lithuania for the Lithuanians." A proclamation was issued appealing to all citizens: "Lithuanians unite. Buy only from Lithuanian stores."

Approximately 600 delegates are attending the conference, which is being held in Siauli.

"Werslas" is the most influential anti-Semitic group in the country. It has branches all over Lithuania and has been active in demanding anti-Jewish legislation. The organization has considerable influence in governmental circles.

anxiety among the Jewish population.

Up to the present there have been no restrictions on Jewish immigrants in the capitalist class. Only last month about 1,000 were permitted to enter the country without trouble.

Over \$100,000,000 has been invested in Palestine by Jewish capitalists in the last five years, it was estimated here today. Any restrictions contemplated against capitalist immigrants will affect not only the industrial development of Palestine but also sources of revenues for the government, it was pointed out.

The Palestine government had a large surplus which amounted in August, 1934, to about \$20,000,000. This surplus is the result of the revenue which the government derives from Jewish enterprises in the Holy Land.

Reich Revokes Citizen Rights of Settlers

JERUSALEM, Nov. 27.—The German consulate in Palestine today notified a number of German Jewish residents that their German citizenship has been cancelled on orders from the central government in Berlin.

Those German Jews who have lost their citizenship rights will now become stateless until they are citizens of Palestine. According to existing regulations, persons who came into the country legally may become citizens of Palestine after two years' residence.

Vets to 'Deal Militantly' With Boycott Evaders

The Jewish War Veterans of the United States were committed yesterday to undertake "an immediate, aggressive campaign of picketing Jewish merchants who continue to deal in Nazi merchandise." This course was determined upon by unanimous vote at a meeting of the anti-Nazi boycott committee of the organization.

A statement issued by Edgar H. Burman, chairman of the boycott group, said:

"The committee feels that the methods used heretofore... have reached the height of their utility, and that from now on more militant methods of dealing with these merchants must be resorted to."
