Lets Space to Anti - Semite

Congress Probers Act on Disclosures by the Bulletin

This is the first of a series exposing several new merchants engaged in the lucrative racket of formenting anti-Semitism.

Wall street, which has spawned more than its share of Fascist and anti-Semitic agitators, was revealed yesterday as the breeding ground for another messiah of

prejudice. He is John B. Snow, former statistician for Reynolds, Fish & Co.; important brokerage firm which indicates its continued friendliness for him and his downwith-all-Jews program by affording him the hospitality of large office space in its uptown headquarters at 18 East Forty-eighth

Object of Quiz

Snow's anti-Semitic activities, which include the peddling of a Chicago edition of the forged Protocols of the Elders of Zion, are the object of two separate government inquiries.

Armed with information given it by the Jewish Daily Bulletin, the Congressional Committee to Investigate Un-American Activities is scrutinizing the ex-statistician's connections in an effort to learn whether he has been linked with powerful financial figures named by Gen. Smedley D. Butler in a purported Fascist plot to seize control of the United States.

Snow also has played unwilling host to a United States Department of Justice agent, a Bulletin reporter learned yesterday.

Poses as Anti-Communist

Described by former business associates as a person of independent means, this nervous, shiftyeyed purveyor of inciting literature hides his true colors behind the petticoat of anti-Communism, as do most of his colleagues.

On the day a Bulletin reporter visited Snow in his spacious and fairly luxurious office in the Reynolds, Fish suite an amusing inci-

dent occurred.

Snow was chatting with a man later identified as E. C. Riegel, pamphleteer and president of the Consumers Guild of America, Inc., of 521 Fifth avenue. Riegel, who revealed himself in a subsequent interview as a "radical right winger" and "a true individualist, of whom there are very few," is

Million Sent To Holy Land As Aid to Labor

1,000 Attend Parley of Palestine Pioneers Committee

More than \$1,000,000 raised in this country has been sent to the Palestine Labor Federation to further welfare work and purchase tools and machinery for workers in the Holy Land, it was disclosed Friday night at the tenth anniversary convention of the National Labor Committee for Jewish Workers and Pioneers in Palestine.

The convention, held at the Hotel Pennsylvania, was attended by about 1,000 delegates from all parts of the United States and Canada. They represented locals of

France Plans To Give Aid To Refugees

Reported Set to Grant 6,000 Work Permits for Reich Exiles

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
PARIS, Nov. 30. — Despite the drive against aliens now under way here, the French government will shortly announce the granting of 6,000 work permits for German Jewish refugees living in Paris, it was learned today.

Jewish organizations have been conducting negotiations with the French government, which are said to be proceeding smoothly. French officials have expressed sympathy for the refugees who were ordered to leave France but have absolutely no place to go.

Granting of the work certificates will, it is hoped, lead to gradual and planned emigration of the refugees, instead of a disastrous flight.

An anti-alien drive of the greatest magnitude has been going on in France. Whole sections of Paris have been roped off and systematically combed by heavy police detachments for aliens.

Suicide Attempt Fails, Another Succeeds

Special Visa To Travelers

Precedent Stuns Population After Assurance Had Been Given

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) SALONICA, Nov. 30.—No foreign Jew will henceforth be permitted to enter Greece unless by special permission coming from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Athens, it was officiously announced today by the Greek government.

Greek consulates in foreign countries were instructed today by the government to inquire by cable of the Foreign Office in Athens whenever a Jew applies for a Greek visa. An exception is made only in the case of Jews of foreign citizenship already settled in Greece. These Jews can freely live in and enter Greek territory.

Foreign Jews proceeding to Palestine through Greece will not be permitted to pass the Greek frontier as transient travelers unless they possess a Palestinian visa on their passports, the official announcement of the government states.

Comes As Shock

Jewish leaders here were highly embarrassed by this sudden rerestrictive measure. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent understands that representations will be made to the government by Jewish leaders against this measure, which is considered a specific discrimination against Jews, since the restrictions are not intended for foreign citizens of other religions.

The official announcement of the government came as a blow to the Jewish community in Greece, especially since It was made a few hours after Periclis Rhallis, governor-general of Salonica, had stated that no such order would be issued and that free entry would be secure to all forin possession of an ordinary Greek

This is the first time a country is prohibiting foreign Jews to enter or pass through the land because of their religion.

The Jewish population in Greece has always been loyal to the Greek government and the present administration was, as a matter of fact, elected mainly because of the huge number of Jewish votes, which played a decisive role in defeating the candidates of the opposition party.

Fund Observes 21st Flag Day In United States

Volunteers to Canvass City for Palestine **Land Program**

Zion Flag Day, sponsored by the Jewish National Fund, will be observed for the twenty-first time in manv Jewish communities throughout the United States on Sunday. Flag Day serves annually to acquaint the Jewish public with the Fund's progress in the upbuilding of Palestine as a Jewish national home, and to secure popular financial support for its national land redemption program.

A large part of the \$16,000,000 raised by the fund over a period of thirty years to purchase Palestine land, was obtained as a result of popular street collections, arranged twice a year, one on the occasion of Palestine Flower Day observed in the Spring, the other on the occasion of Zion Flag Day.

Zionist volunteers, recruited principally from among students in the upper classes of the Hebrew Schools and Talmud Torahs, Jewish youth and sport organizations, as well as adult members of Zionist units, form the army of can-vassers. Equipped with the blue and white boxes of the Keren Kayemeth and identified by appropriate arm bands, the volunteers offer to the public on Zion Flag Day a miniature reproduction of the Zionist emblem, in anticipation of a contribution towards the Palestine Land Redemption Fund.

A number of radio broadcasts during the week-end will mark the observance of Flag Day sponsored by the Jewish National Fund.

On Saturday evening, from 9:30 to 9:45 p. m. a Flag Day program was to be rendered over radio station WBNX. Rabbi Henry A Schorr, chairman of the Jewish National Fund Council for the Bronx, was to be guest speaker.

On Sunday, two programs on this subject will be broadcast. From eleven to 11:15 in the morning a program will be given over station WINS, with Louis P. Rocker, chairman of the finance committee of the Zionist Organization, as guest speaker.

From 12:15 to 12:30 afternoon, a Flag Day program will be broadcast by the Federal Broadcasting System (Station WMCA), with Mrs. Israel Goldstein, chairman of the Jewish National Fund Com mittee on cooperation with women's organizations, as guest speaker. A program of Palestinian songs will be rendered by Cantor M. Nathanson.

History of Congregation to Be Enacted By Many Pupils

The religious school of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun, which was chartered by New York State as the first Jewish synagogue in America using the Ashkenazic rit-ual in 1825, will hold a Chanukah pageant Sunday afternoon which will portray the history of the congregation.

The following afternoon the sisterhood will hold its celebration with a symposium on the subject, "Women's Part in the Making of a Better World." Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt will participate.

On Tuesday evening Rev. Jacob Schwartz, cantor, will conduct an evening of Hebrew liturgical choral music to be rendered by the B'nai Jeshurun choir.

The celebration will close with a banquet December 16, at which Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, spiritual leader at the congregation from 1893 to 1900, will speak. Sol M. Stroock, chairman of the board of directors of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and honorary secretary of the congregation, will be chairman.

Accuse Bible Head Of Fomenting Bias

Institute Leader Challenges Midwest School Chief to Prove "Protocols" Charge

(Special to the J.D.B.) BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 30 .- Dr.. Harold P. Morgan, president of the Buffalo Bible Institute, has hurled a third challenge at Dr. William B. Riley, president of the Northwestern Bible School, Minneapolis, to debate the genuineness of the "Protocols of the Elders of Zion." Dr. Riley has been accused of fomenting hatred of the Jew in church addresses, using the "Protocols" fabrications.

Dr. Morgan, who has lectured on the false accusations contained in the "Protocols" and who has proven them to be base lies and forgeries, also implicates Dr. James M. Gray of the Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, and Dr. Arno Gaebelein, editor of Our Hope and author of books on Biblical exposition, of pursuing the same tactics as Dr. Riley in furthering racial

Dr. Riley, who has been conducting a series of meetings in Prospect Avenue Baptist Church under auspices of the Christian Laymen's Association, points to the Soviet experiment to bear out his claims. He has twice declined a challenge to debate with Dr. Morgan, according to Walter J. Bartz, dean of the Buffalo Bible Institute.

World Marks Feast of Lights

Old Festival Celebrated InManyLands

Sephardic Jews Adhere to Oldest Rites, Tel **Avivians to Latest**

By S. ERNST

Chanukah, the Feast of Lights commemorating a Jewish victory, is celebrated in various ways among the Jews of the world. In each country something has been added to the old traditional celebration to which Young Jewry looks forward principally because it includes pancakes, gifts of money and stories of the prowess of the Maccabees.

The oldest Chanukah customs have been retained by the Sephardic Jews, those who speak Ladino and trace their traditions back to Spain. The newest manner of celebrating Chanukah will be found among the Jews of Tel

The Sephardic Jews are concentrated in the Balkan countries and in Turkey. Salonica is their principal city and the most important Jewish center in the whole of the Orient, Palestine included. It is in Salonica that the Sephardic tradition has been best preserved.

When Chanukah comes, the Sephardic teachers lead their pupils from one wealthy home to the other, asking for a different kind of food at each stopping place. The housewives deem it an especially good deed to give the visitors fruit, wine, cakes, raisins and other sweets. All these goodies are then taken back to the synagogue, where the teacher and pupils hold a party, at which they repeat certain of the psalms a great many

Some of the Sephardim of Jerusalem observe the custom of visiting the grave of Simon the Holy. They tell stories about how Arabs stoned a Sephardic holy man as he was on his way to the grave. The Arabs dropped in their tracks and could not rise until the Holy Man had prayed for them. I have heard similar stories about the grave of Mother Rachel and other sacred burial places.

The Sephardic Cabbalists stay up in "minyans" all night and read the Zohar. After that they drink black coffee and eat various fruits.

Chanukah Masks

In other Sephardic circles, as among the Ashkenazim on Purim, it is the custom to wear masks on Chanukah. The maskers sing in the streets and go from house to house performing plays. This cusvearing masks on Chanukah is thought to be very old. We find mention of it in a book published in Smyrna in 1731 and probably written by the followers of Sabbatai Zevi.

To the students at the yeshivas of Poland and Latvia Chanukah signified good meals and all too infrequent good times. They indulged in various games of cards, dominos, dreidl and kvitlach. And they regaled themselves with stories of the ancient Jewish men of might.

Among the Chassidim

Of particular interest are the Chanukah celebrations in the courts of the Chassidic wonder rabbis. One of these courts, that of Reb David of Talna, is described in the memoirs of the famous can-Pinous Linkofsky.

Chanukah in Tel Aviv

The Chanukah celebration in Palestine is much different and quite original. There all sorts of Jews-Sephardim, Yemenites, Bukarians and Jews from the Causasus gather for the celebration near the high water tower in Tel Aviv, where Burgomaster Dizengoff lights the first Chanukah candle.

The city is filled with visitors from Jerusalem, Haifa and the surrounding colonies. The school children form in lines, each child with a candle in his hand, and ten or fifteen youngsters march through the streets of Tel Aviv. At the head of each group there is a band which plays various national songs which the children

This is the greatest part of the celebration and is called the Celebration of the Candles. The Chanukah lamp of the municipality is placed high up on the water tower and can be seen not only from the city but from the surrounding region, where it excites the admiration of the Arabs.

To the Hasmoneans

In Palestire it is the custom to go to the town of Mudiem every Chanukah. Mudiem is a small forsaken village about which Josephus Flavius tells in his histories, where it is called the home of the Hasmonean family.

I visited the town last year, going by auto from Tel Aviv and passing the town of Ludd and the children's school at Ben Shemen on the way. Now Mudiem is called Al Mudia. It is very poor and full of old ruins which the Arabs call "Kirbat Al Yahud." There is a legend among the Arabs that here is the grave of the old Jewish heroes, and it may indeed be the site of the graves of Judah Maccabee and his brothers.

Nearby, there is an old ruin the Arabs call the "grave of the forty," who are supposed to have been Jewish heroes who died in the battle for liberation. The Arabs say that when Jews will

Austria Prohibits

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) VIENNA, Nov. 30 .- A book accusing the Jews of systematic practice of ritual murder was confiscated yesterday by the Austrian government. The book had been enjoying a wide circulation in every section of Austria, to the indignation of Austrian Jewry.

The Vienna Jewish community and other central Jewish organizations repeatedly protested to the government, requesting the Minister of Justice to prohibit the spreading of a vile slander against the Jews, particularly since it is clearly forbidden under the Austrian law.

Greece and England

The order which the Greek government has just issued, that no Jew can enter or pass through Greece unless by special permission from the central authorities in Athens, is a direct result of the pressure exercised by the British Legation in Athens.

For some reason or other the British government has formed an opinion that it is via Greece that numerous Jews from East European countries are smuggling their way through to Palestine. Representations have therefore recently been made by the British Legation in Greece to introduce a stricter control at the Greek border ior foreign Jews.

It is not so easy to understand why the present government in Greece, which owes a good deal to the Jews and is, as a matter of fact, warmly disposed towards them, should permit itself to be used as a tool in the hands of the British government against the Jews. If the British government wishes to check illegal entry into Palestine it has plenty of means for doing so on the Palestine borders, and does not need to start the checking at the Greek frontiers.

The Greek Foreign Office must understand that the foreign government whose Jewish citizens have been affected by this discriminating order may have something to say in the matter. Furthermore, the Jews of the world-if their opinion ans something to the Greek Cabinet—will definitely consider the order a direct insult to the Jewish nation. The kind of insult which has never before been inflicted upon the Jews by any other government.

Whether the Greek government acted willingly in censoring Jewish entrants to Greece or whether this was done under the pressure of the British Legation, it is none the less a slap in the face for foreign Jews.

Every Jew in Europe and in America, whether he intends to travel to Greece or not, will feel this insult. The Greek government would have been wiser if it had not permitted itself to be misled by the anti-Jewish interests of the British government.

The Austrian Fascist constitution was inaugurated this week by the opening of a State Council whose fifty-four members are all nominated instead of being elected.

This puts an end to the democratic constitution of Austria. This also puts an end to practically all privileges which Jewish citizens of Austria have enjoyed as equals under constitutional rights.

There is only one Jew among the fifty-four members of the State Council. This is Dr. Desider Friedmann, head of the Jewish religious community. It is needless to say that his influence in the Council will amount to nothing. Under these circumstances it would seem to have been wiser for Dr. Friedmann not to have accepted any councilorship at all in this body, since it replaces the Australian Parliament, which provided a legislation where no differences between Jews and non-Jews were made.


New Industrial Law Is Placed in Force

Parallel with the opening of the State Council, the recently promulgated new Industrial Law entered into force in Austria this This law falls into the class of laws whose text has no bearing on Jews but which acquire, as a result of attendant circumstances, a character that is primarily directed against Jews.

The new Industrial Law denotes for Austrian Jewry right now a specific aggravation of its econonomic distress. As for the future, it denotes the destruction of an immense number of opportunities for Jews to earn their liveli-

The road to a large number of occupations is barred to the Jews by the new Industrial Law. Similarly the new Industrial Law hands over entirely to the Corporative Councils the decision on whether anyone in Austria may start, expand or convert a business firm or workshop.

Young Jews Will Find **Employment Barred**

The new Industrial Law, which went into effect on December 1, will therefore ruin the entire Jewish industry and commerce and will make it impossible for young Jews to find any work. This new law provides that none can be employed without obtaining a certificate which shows that the applicant has been trained for a period of years as an apprentice in trading or in industry. Needless to say, no young Jew will be in a position to acquire such a certificate at a time when most enterprises in Austria will not employ any Jew as apprentice.

The economic situation of the Jews in Austria, bad as it is, is thus expected to become worse. A Jewish delegation therefore left for Paris this week to approach the Joint Distribution Committee offices there for relief and assistance. The delegation carried along a plan as to how constructive relief can be organized by the J.D.C. for the Jews of Austria in the most speedy and practical way.

Vienna Students Parade Perish Judea Slogan

In addition to the economic abuses, Austrian Jewry also underwent physical abuses this week. 'Perish Judea" was the slogan under which thousands of Austrian students displayed in the streets of Vienna. The youths protested against Czechoslovakia and at the same time smashed windows of Jewish firms and attacked Jewish newspapers. This demonstration was a repercussion of the fight which took place this week be-

in Praha, capital of Czechoslova-

Despite the fact that the Jews had nothing to do with the issue which caused the fight between the Czechs and the Germans, the clash between the two culminated in anti-Jewish attacks also in Praha. Czech nationalist students, fighting their German colleagues, utilized the clash as an excuse for smashing windows of Jewish houses, for looting Jewish stores and for attacking the Beth Haam in Praha, where the Zionist offices are located. The Czech students also made attempts to invade synagogues in Praha but were dispersed by police.

Upon the intervention of Jewish leaders in Praha, the Czech government took immediate measures to protect Jewish lives and property. The measures taken were strong and effective. As a result over 100 Czech students are now in prison awaiting trial.

British Statesmen Refer To Jews in Germany

The Jewish problem in Germany came to the forefront this week during a debate in the House of Commons. Leading British statesmen such as Sir John Simon, David Lloyd George and other declared from the platform of the British Parliament that Germany must make peace not only with her immediate neighbors but also with the Jews. Lloyd George was especially emphatic on this point. An advocate of international equality for Germany, he stated that the Hitler government makes it difficult even for its best friends to advocate equality for the German nation, since the Nazis have renounced equal rights for German Jews.

Direct reference to the Jewish question, made by Lloyd George and the others, came as a climax to the debate on Germany's military forces and aimed to indicate that the British government is watching the situation of the Jews in Germany very closely. It is understood that the American government is also keenly watching the Jewish situation in Germany and that the American embassy in Berlin is instructed to submit from time to time reports on anti-Jewish discriminations in the Reich.

But England Is Less Friendly in Palestine

Interested in protecting the Jews in Germany, the British government does not, however, show the same interest in matters concerning Palestine. A report this week from Jerusalem discloses that the British administration in Palestine intends to introduce restrictions for Jewish capitalist immigrants. Hitherto every Jew possessing 5,000 when entering Palestine found no difficulty in obtaining a Palestine visa. Now the Palestine government intends to curb the entrance of even such Jews as possess a capital of not less than \$5,000. This despite the fact that during the month of October not less than \$5,000,000 was brought into Palestine under the capitalist category. This also despite the fact that the Palestine government has now a surplus which in August reached not less than \$20,000,000 and which is all due to the capital which Jews are importing into the country.

French Extend Invitation To Settle in Syria

American eyes were directed towards Europe in the week just passed to observe a series of developments of importance-Great Britain's warning to the Reich, the international boycott conference, the Syrian proposals. the Praha disturbances and others. The major developments of the week were on the other side, but several interesting ones took place here.

German hopes of negotiating a barter deal with the United States to provide a market in this country for German manufactures in exchange for German acceptance of 500,000 bales of surplus American cotton were apparently dashed down by a strongly-worded note of protest sent the Reich government by Secretary of State Hull which denounced as "unacceptable and dangerous" the Nazi theory that "debts should be paid only from a direct sale of goods in the creditor country."

Probes and Probers

The proposed barter deal was also hit by Francis T. Cole, vicepresident of the American Manufacturers Export Association, who pointed out that "buyers feel that they cannot be sure of quality products, or of products manufactured according to specifications in making purshases from the Reich.

The Congressional Committee on un-American Activities, in a thirteen-page report, revealed definitely that over \$100,000 had changed hands in the alleged plot for a Fascist coup revealed by General Smedley D. Butler. The report, however, failed to disclose the Nazi-Wall Street links which the committee was known to have under investigation.

The committee also went into case of Raymond Healey twenty-two-year-old anti-Semite who began publication of an "Irish" anti-Jewish weekly in Yorkville.

The Deutsche Zeitung, former organ of the Friends of New Germany, converted into a pro-Jewish weekly by suspended sentence of a year hanging over the head of its editor for criminal libel, failed to appear for a second issue following its "conversion." It is replaced by the Deutscher Beobachter.

Zionist Affairs

Louis Lipsky, addressing the Jewish National Fund Council, roundly scored land speculation in Palestine and warned against an attitude of complacence with regard to the country.

Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, completed a successful nation-wide swing in behalf of the Zionist membership drive and its fund activities.

Masada, Zionist youth movement, in convention at Philadelphia, heard pleas for strengthening the Zionist ideal among the youth in order to keep them within the fold.

The National Labor Committee for Jewish Workers and Pioneers in Palestine went into convention session Friday evening with over a thousand in attendance.

Other Developments Rabbis joined with Protestant and Catholic clerics in singing an impressive statement expressing concern over the threat to religious liberty in Mexico revealed by that country's attitude toward the Catholic Church. The statement was circulated for signatures by the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

Steps to mobilize the Jews of New York City in support of a movement for better motion pictures were announced by M. Maldwin Fertig, president of the Metropolitan League of Jewish, Community Associations.

Philanthropic drives throughout the country, notably in New York City, Baltimore and Milwaukee, reported progress in reaching their goals. Support of the communities made itself felt not only in the local organization fund activities but also in the refugee and Palestine aid drives.

Remedies

FINKELSTEIN! But why Finkelstein at all? Or Goldfarb or Turteltaub or Perlmutter or Rosenbluth? What have these German vocables, bad jokes as proper names from the first, to do with us? Need I say here that they were imposed upon us from without primarily by brutal and stupid Austro-Hungarian bureaucrats, fellows unworthy in any moral and spiritual sense to unlatch the shoe-string of the humblest sincere and faithful Chassid? Or, if these names were ever voluntarily assumed, they were assumed by people as yet ignorant of the tests and tastes of the West and hence innocent of the fact that they were condemning their children to be the butt of every coarse or ribald jester.

And these jesters, of whom the world is full, have had their way Their jests have made our people wince and that wincing has reached the marrow and it has reached the soul; the process has begotten self-contempt and self-contempt has led to flight and flight has led to all the devious apostasies and among them to the Communist apostasy which is such a grave danger to us today and which no gentile can comprehend as the final result of his own and his ancestors' attempt to degrade us and to rob us of that just pride in kith and kin, in ancestry and tradition, in history and in faith without which any man is stripped and defenseless of soul amid the contentions and clamors of the world.

ELL, many of the Abie Finkelsteins of the world have obscurely felt and resented the wrong done them. And they have become A. Sparklestone, which hardly improved matters and next they have become Arthur Stone, which did not improve matters at all (contrary to a wide-spread belief) but made them a great deal worse. For the Gentiles thought they knew where to place Abie Finkelstein and the relation, though difficult and unjust, was at least clear. But there is something equivocal about Arthur Stone from the beginning and the equivocal always arouses ugly suspicion.

And it is worst and most dangerous when Arthur Stone is theoretically believed to be Arthur Stone and is then seen to be (as the Gentile world thinks) Abie Finkelstein. It is on this principle that the Nazi press never mentions the Arthur Stones (Heine, Reinhardt, Kerr, Salten, etc.) without adding in parenthesis: eigentlich and then giving the half comic and half-contemptuous Ghetto-name which it supposes the personality in question to have originally borne. And there is no fouler lie and grosser slander than that eigentlich, in reality, or in fact. For, to stick to my theoretical example, the man's true name was Abraham and neither Finkelstein nor Stone. Both of these are veils and subterfuges and disguises and it takes no great knowledge of human psychology to know that when many, many thousands of men are either forced or tempted to hide their people and their faith and their origin by their names or to caricature these instead of freely and proudly expressing them, that then the spiritual substance of that people is diseased and in need of healing.

SUPERFICIAL scientific rationalism again and again obscures the true inwardness of things. Names are magical and mystical. Man felt from the beginning that his name was part of himself or, at least, a symbol of himself. He feels so still. An ugly or comic name degrades; a false name falsifies the character that bears it. Daily experience teaches us how irritated people are by a mis-spelling or mispronunciation of their names. If Abie Finkelstein had a profound tenderness for those generations of his kin and clan who bore that wretched name manfully and not ignobly, he might have called himself Avraham Zur in memory of the blessing after the Haftarah (zur kol ha-olamim) or, by a pardonable solecism: Avraham Benzur, even as a well-known family translated a probable Bluthaupt and Blutkopf into the dignified and euphonious Damrosch.

I venture to say that Avraham Benzur would have led a life wholly different from the life led by Abie Finkelstein, a straighter, more natural, more self-affirmative life, a life of higher human dignity and therefore of higher human freedom and that his relations to the Gentile world would have been in both their happier and in their less happy aspects upon an incomparably higher plane.

ENCE deliberately as one of the remedies for the hurts of the ENCE deliberately as one of the remainder of names in our own exile, I suggest the wide-spread adoption of names in our own magnificent tongue and I would have the patronymic ben become as well-known and unmistakable in the Western world as the Scotch Mac and the Irish O and the English son, and if my own name were not in a humble way a trade-mark today by means of which I earn bread for my family, I would even now call myself Ari ben Levi. Ponder this matter carefully before calling it trivial; examine your own psychological relation to your own name. Language is magical; names have the power to conjure; they can express or betray and he whose name either expresses unworthily what he is or betrays it, will have an unworthy or traitorous attitude to that ethnic substance which his name should proudly symbolize.

It provides that such Jews who are ready to migrate to Syria must agree not to employ any other labor but Arab and must also not spread any Zionist ideas in the country. They will also not be permitted to buy land in those parts of Syria which are adjacent to the Palestine frontier.

The provisions of the Syrian authorities, though they look uninviting on their surface, may nevertheless attract certain classes of Jews from Germany who are not particular about Zionism and who also do not care whether they will reside in sections neighboring to Palestine or in any other sections of Syria. Negotiations for buying land on the Iraquian frontier have been going on between certain groups of German Jews and the Syrian government for the last six months, and the present announcement of the Syrian government may be the result of these negotiations.

Poland Eliminates Jewish Bake Shops

Mechanization Law Is Forcing Many Small Enterprises to Close Doors

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, Nov. 30.-Elimination of Jews from another aspect of Polish economic life became a reality yesterday as a result of a government order insisting on the mechanization of bakeries throughout the country. Sarah Smith Learned Yiddish To Become Newspaper Woman

She Broke Down Barrier Against Sex; Was First of Sob Sisters

Can a woman be a good newspaperman? Ask Sarah B. Smith, who in twenty-two years of newspaper work has carved for herself not only a splendid career as journalist, novelist and playwright, but has also been an equally successful wife and mother and has acquired a vital and stimulating personality.

As quite a young girl, faced with the necessity of earning her living, she turned to Jewish journalism and obtained her first position with the Jewish Morning Journal. The tremendous difficulties, which would have daunted a weaker heart, faced her right at the beginning. The one was the prejudice entertained at that time against women journalists, the second was the language in which she had to express herself. For although European born-of Hungarian stock-and brought to America as a little child—Yiddish was almost unknown to her and she had to learn it in order to make it an effective medium for her literary talent. How well she succeeded not only her journalistic work but twenty-two widely read and much-translated novels testify. Sarah B. Smith is the most beloved Jewish newspaperwoman, the first who ever served as a reporter on a Jewish paper, and the one who has triumphantly overcome the misgivings of editors who mistrusted the abilities of a mere woman writer.

Joined The Day

From the Morning Journal she went to The Day. In fact, she joined The Day in its very dawning, twenty-four hours before it was actually born. For twenty years now, she has been one of the most valuable staff members of this paper and her success-material as well as personal-has been great and well deserved. She covered all possible assignments during her long career, and specialized in criminal court news and divorce court proceedings. She had and has the gift to transform a mere news item into a column of deep, human interest, a column that brought her in intimate touch with thousands of readers, who wrote to her for help and service. When the honor system was installed in Ossining, she spent six days there under an assumed name, studying the psychological reactions of the prisoners to the new system and reporting on them in one of the most vivid most remarkable news stories any journalist has ever written.

delighted with the generous praise she gives to all who have been helpful and sympathetic to her. She warmly lauds The Day where the usual prejudice against women did not prevail and where she was able to do the work she loves to do and does so well; she insists that without her husband's encouragement, sympathy and understanding, without his friendly yet strict criticism, she would never have been able to achieve her success; she is full of tender love for her charming, twentyyear-old married daughter and her son, a sturdy and clever lad of fourteen. The children in turn both adore their brilliant mother and are inordinately proud of her.

Mrs. Smith has dramatized one of her most successful books, 'Charge It to Me," in collaboration with Viola Brothers Shore and it is just now in rehearsal. It will open in Baltimore on December 10 and come to New York about Christime time. The title of the play is "Piper Paid."

Another play, "Premier's Wife," is about to be produced in Stockholm. It deals searchingly with European politics.

Mrs. Smith is, of course, very pleased at having grined Broadway production, but she is not unduly excited. "After all," she says smilingly, "human hearts, human destinies are the same on East Broadway or on Big Broadway. I have always tried to picture life and its problems just as I saw it, sincerely, and with real compas-That's why my public responded to me on East Broadway, and I hope and trust that I shall find an equal response in the more glittering but still human world of Big Broadway."

For the woman journalist Mrs. Smith has as recipe for success the admonition: "When you work forget you are a woman. Don't ask or expect privileges, con't try to make your way with the help of dress, makeup, feminine fripperies and flirtations. Do your work competently, loyally, carefully. Be reliable. In Guernsey, one of the Channel Islands, they have a quaint cus tom. If a young man experiences, a quickening of his heart-beats whenever he meets a certain dam sel, his mother makes haste to invite the potential daughter-inlaw to come and stay with the family for one week as a guest During this visit the young woman prepares meals twice a day and each time she must cook eggs. But-and that is the supreme test in which she dare not fail-each egg-dish must be entirely different and distinctive. Repetition is not permitted if the future bride is to be regarded as a desirable wife for the son of the house.

The mothers in Guernsey and also in Sark think a lot of this egg-test. They feel that if a woman can take so unexciting a thing as an egg and create out of it fourteen delightful, appetizing and different meals she will be able to make the quiet and often humdrum life of the islands likewise a thing of pleasant change, of joy and happiness. Whether or not you subscribe to this philosophy of life, I trust you will enjoy the following egg recipes which will vary and enrich your supper and luncheon menus.

The first recipe is called Oeufs Marguerite. To make it you need the pretty French ramekins which can be used for so many tempting dishes. Melt some butter in the ramekin, line it with toasted breadcrumbs, break in this layer an egg and season it carefully. Cover the egg with another layer of toasted breadcrumbs and a few dabs of butter and bake in a moderately hot oven till the breadcrumbs are brown and the white of the egg quite solid. This dish is delicious to the taste and very sustaining, and can serve as a main luncheon course.

For a Sunday evening supper, cold eggs a la Henri are universally liked and easy to prepare. Cook the eggs for twelve minutes in salt water and let cool. When cold, peel, cut in halves, remove the yolks and chop them with butter, a dash of cayenne pepper or a bit of anchovy paste. Fill the egg halves with the chopped yolks, garnish with a slice of olive or a caper and serve on fresh lettuce leaves.

Warsaw as Fees Endanger Careers

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, Nov. 30 .- Hundreds of Jewish students whose univerhigh registration fees demanded in Polish schools are besieging the Warsaw Jewish community offices demanding a subsidy to enable them to continue in college.

The siege began Wednesday

when 700 students invaded the Jewish community offices demanding help. A hurriedly-called and stormy session of the cultural committee decided to assign 5,000 zloty (approximately \$1,000) for the students, but they objected, demanding at least 100,000 zloty (about \$20,000).

Community leaders assert there are no funds available for the purpose, and that in any event preference must be given to Hebrew and artisans schools.

Left wing Jewish students also stormed the office of the community, demanding a similar subsidy for left wing Jewish students. They denounced the "clerical Fascist Zionist community leadership.

Police detachments are guarding the community offices. No arrests were made.

This weekend sermon will probably sound more garbled than usual-what's more it is secondhand stuff. You see, since Monday your reporter has been tucked away with a mild and rather uninteresting case of the flu. Whatever information theatrical you find herein has arrived at his bedside through indirect routes, to be exact, from a close perusal of the daily prints plus a few things I know myself.

Up to Friday morning seven new plays opened on Broadway. They were "Page Miss Glory" (Mansfield,) "Africana" (Venice), "But Not For Love" (Empire), "Gold Eagle Guy" (Morosco), "Revenge With Music" (New Amsterdam), "The Lord Bless the Bishop" (Adelphi), and "The Night Remembers" (Playhouse).

According to the boys and girls who never miss a thing, having been forced to stay abed was not entirely a punishment, in fact, about a few shows the wish was expressed that bed actually was preferable. However, I am sorry I had to Miss "Gold Eagle Guy." Not only because the long-mustached sad-faced Melvin Levy wrote it, but also because the Group Theatre who did "Men in White" sponsored it and because I knew something about the play.

Critics Hail Play

It was, in script, a robust, lively, fast-paced melodrama about an ambitious sailor who, coming to San Francisco about 1862, determined to make his way to the top of the shipping industry. A ruthless man, he allowed nothing to deter him and he reached the pinnacle, even though he sacrificed the lives and careers of many men. How he got what was coming to him makes "Gold Eagle Guy" a lesson in retribution.

The critics, with few unimportant exceptions, hailed Levy's play, Bromberg's acting and the Group's work with fine words.

Another thing I should have liked to have witnessed was the return of Libby Holman. Selwyn and Franklin fashioned a Spanish setting for the wealthy widow and reports state that she has lost none of the charm and appeal of her low-pitched, mellow voice.

The third miss of the week seems to be "Page Miss Glory." This is Lawrence Schwab's production. It was written by Joseph Schrank and Philip Dunning and staged by George Abbott. From what I can gather it is written in the "She Loves Me Not" tradition, only not quite so funny. The plot deals with two confidence men who make a composite photograph of a girl which wins a beauty prize. They are then confronted with the problem of pro-ducing the girl, which I under-

Wide Canadian Protests Force Apology for Slur on Jew

WINDSOR, Out., Nov. 30.—An anti-Semitic attack upon David A. Croll, Minister of Welfare in the cabinet of Premier Hepburn of Ontario, resulted in complete vindication of the former mayor of this city and in an apology.

The attack followed suspension of Milton A. Sorsoleil, a deputy in the welfare department, until such time as he was able to prove charges he made of immorality throughout this Province.

Hits Croll, Hepburn

When the suspension was announced, Dr. George A. Little, editor of the Sunday School Publications of the United Church of Canada, attacked both Premier Hepburn and Minister Croll. He especially attacked Croll as a Jew, declaring:

"Just let a border city Russian Jew dismiss a lifelong Christian worker like Mr. Sorsoleil for trying to reduce the number of children born out of wedlock in Ontario, and there will come a Province-wide demand that the Minister of Welfare follow his deputy."

This statement aroused indignation throughout Ontario. Toronto officialdom was swamped with callers and telephone messages protesting the attack upon Minister



Among the foreign events holding Washing-NATHAN KOENIG ton's immediate attention are:

1. France's increased budget for national defense. 2. Japan's demand for increased naval strength.

3. Yugoslavia's charge that Hungary is responsible for the assassination of King Alexandria at Marseilles.

4. The situation surrounding the coming Saar plebiscite.

Most of the trouble brewing in Europe has some tie-up with what has happened and what is happening in Germany. The United States has quite frequently ex-pressed formal disapproval of Hitler's policies on Germany's international relationships and obligations. The sore spot with government officials in Washington is Germany's outright discrimination against American holders of German financial paper,

When Congress convenes in January, it is expected that much time will be devoted to sounding off on the foreign situation. Armaments and international trade are expected to be the two main topics for debate.

The French budget for national defense, exceeding \$800,000,000, which was approved by the Chamber of Deputies, has resulted in considerable comment. The fact that this large budget was approved without debate is significant. In ordinary times proposal of such a large budget would have been sufficient reason not only for fiery oratory but even for personal

One of the outstanding incidents in connection with approval of the budget was that Edouard Herriot, Socialist leader and champion of pacifism in France, denounced Laval's pacifism and urged the Chamber to vote for the budget, not only because he is a member of the cabinet but because he realizes that France must be stronger. The determining factor which prevented any opposition to the new national defense budget was Herriot's changed position favoring great military strength.

Washington is awaiting with much interest the Hitler government's reply to Secretary Hull's most recent note on Germany's discrimination against American bond holders. Although the usual plea of unability to pay is expected, observers are interested in its youth affiliate, G'dud Zion, will seeing if Germany will give any indication as to what she actually intends to do concerning these ob-

Germany has taken the position that unless she sells more goods to the United States this country cannot expect payments on her obligations to American citizens. Increased trade with the United States would make it possible for Germany to get dollar exchange with which to make payments. Also, such trade would enable Germany to buy much needed raw materials, particularly cotton. Secretary of State Hull, however, holds the payment of debts as one thing and the sale of goods an-

is owed to American investors, Haynes Holmes.

has been indicated by the Foreign Policy Association, the organization which sponsored Secretary Wallace's "America Must Choose." This body points out that Ger-

many's economic relations with foreign countries now are in a critical stage as the result of Hitler's measures to regiment imports and rigid control over exchange. If Germany continues her pres-

ent policy of achieving the greatest possible self-sufficiency the Foreign Policy Association foresees a serious economic crisis ahead. It is pointed out that such a policy would involve indefinite extension of the present debt transfer moratorium, perhaps ending in tacit or open repudiation.

Germany's alternative course would be gradual expansion of foreign trade through reciprocal agreements with foreign countries. This would entail gradual resumption of the debt service.

Although there are many indications that Germany is making a decided drive toward self-sufficiency the evidence is seen to be confused and contradictory. One thing is certain. The Reich is not likely to relax or abandon existing import restrictions unless foreign governments agree in return to create a definitely larger market for German goods.

Germany has made several efforts to conclude a trade agreement with the United States, but without success. The last note on debt discriminations sent by Secretary Hull further doomed the immediate possibility of a pact. Other factors against a trade agreement with Germany include a growing lack of confidence in the quality of German products, the tightening boycott against German goods which is being developed at London, and continued monetary exchange complications.

Shortage of Bricks Hinders Building

Output Is Insufficent for Palestine Needs - New Factories Built

TEL AVIV.—Despite three new brick factories that are operating or are ready to operate in this district, there is a scarcity of bricks because of the great building boom here. As a result individual workshops and factories operating inside Tel Aviv are doing a thriving business.

A brick factory on Jewish National Fund land in the Haifa Bay zone produces 18,000 bricks daily and is now in process of increasing its production. Picket Firm Antique Expert Which Violated Pro-Arab, Quits Boycott Pledge Palestine Post

Sales Co. on East Side **Buys Nazi Goods**

Charging that the Jewish-owned Mills Sales Co., which has stores at 901 Broadway and 85 Orchard street here, is violating a written pledge not to purchase German goods, the Anti-Nazi Minute Men on Friday planned to continue picketing the establishments.

Sol Elton, national vice-chairman of the Minute Men's boycott committee, displayed a letter written him by Robert Gottsegen, a partner in the Mills firm, which imports and exports notions and novelties. The letter follows:

"Pursuant to our conversation. we hereby wish to assure your organization that we will not purchase any German merchandise as we are in full accord with the commercial boycott of Germany. We have also decided not to display any German goods that we may have on hand in our windows."

Despite this promise, Elton charges, the concern has continued to purchase and feature Reich products and has further bought several thousand dollars worth of German marks.

At a conference between members of the firm and his organization, Elton says, Mills executives were offered the choice of taking all German goods off their shelves, packing them up and placing them in storage until the boycott is lifted, or of being subjected to picketing by the anti-Nazi group.

Gottsegen and David Jacoby of Brooklyn, his partner, refused to comply with the Minute Men's request to retire Nazi merchandise from their active stock, the organization asserts. It plans to continue picketing until a satisfactory agreement is reached.

Minute Men Charge Mills E. T. Richmond, Former Aid to Samuel, to Be Retired

Zionist Group End Case Against Rabbi Parley in Tel Aviv Taken From Court

Ask Peace in Ranks, Coalition Executive; Oppose Plan for Legislative Body

TEL AVIV, Nov. 30.—The convention of the Palestine General Zionists closed here after adopting a series of resolutions calling for peace within the Zionist movement, a coalition executive and the unity of all Zionist factions. The convention went on record as opposing the proposed legislative council and the immigration policy of the Palestine government.

The peace pact signed by David Ben Gurion and Vladimir Jabotinsky was hailed by the convention.

Discipline and unity in the ranks of the General Zionists in the face of present conditions, were called for by M. M. Ussishkin, venerable Zionist leader and president of the ewish National Fund in an address before the convention. In the course of a half-hour speech, he analyzed conditions in and affecting the Zionist movement and pleaded for unity in the ranks. Dr. Ben-Zion Mossensohn also spoke against establishment of a new labor federation in Palestine.

Trade Unions Ask Guarantee Of Saar Rights

International Unit Sends Resolution to League of Nations

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, Nov. 30.—The hope that the League of Nations will take eleventh hour measures to protect Jewish rights in the Saar and to guarantee absolute fairness and freedom for all the region's inhabitants during the Jan. 13 plebiscite, is expressed in a resolution adopted here by the International Federation of Trade Unions.

The resolution was dispatched today to the League of Nations. It demands that the plebiscite should not be postponed but that secrecy of ballot should be made a primary and indispensable condition of the plebiscite.

Asks Status Quo

In an appeal to the people of the Saar, the Executive of the International Federation of Trade Unions recommends the Saarlanders to vote for a status quo as the only way, under the present circumstances, of safeguarding freedom in the Saar. A return of the Saar to Germany under Hitler will mean the irretrievable loss of rights and liberties, the appeal

Meanwhile, much satisfaction is heing expressed in Jewish circles here over the report from Saarbrucken that the Saar government



Juvenile Anti-Semite Tells Quiz Soviet Lauds How His Irish Weekly' Started Prof. Weisbord,

who says he was twenty-one in September but who looks several years younger, and who wears a large metal swastika in his lapel, appeared before the Congressional Committee to Investigate un-American Activities in the Bar Association building Friday afternoon and testified concerning the recent birth of the anti-Semitic Healey's Irish Weekly.

Raymond, a stunted, beardless youth, proved a recalcitrant witness whose memory was very poor for everything except declamations against the Jews, which he repeated parrot-like at the least provocation in the vain hope that they would go onto the committee's record and into the notes of reporters present.

Has Bodyguard

· Accompanying him was a motherly bodyguard of three women, said to be members of the Friends of New Germany, all of whom spoke with strong German accents and who beamed affectionately on the little fellow when he attempted to speak his invariably interrupted pieces in a quivering, immature treble.

Congressman Samuel Dickstein, vice-chairman of the committee, who presided Friday, took Raymond quite seriously, however, and fired stern questions which the youth stubbornly evaded.

After some contemplative remarks about the possibilities of citing the boy for contempt, Dickstein adjourned the hearing until next Wednesday afternoon, in-structing Raymond to bring counsel with him to protect his constitutional rights.

Takes Oath

The session started in fine fettle when Raymond took the oath with his arm extended in "Heil Hitler" fashion instead of in the conventional upright position.

Asked how Healey's Irish Weekly, whose second issue came off the press Friday, is financed, Raymond said he is its sole owner. He told the committee he started the paper with "several hundred dollars" which he had, not in a bank account, but "in my own

He denied having obtained financial aid from the Friends of New Germany or from Dr. Hubert Schnuch, that organization's national president, explaining that "several hundred dollars" really was \$200, which he claimed to have received from the sale of a pamphlet, "Nordics Awake!" which he said he had written.

Sum Totals \$20

A slight inconsistency appeared some time later when he declared that of 1,000 of these pamphlets printed, 200 had been sold at ten cents a copy-which would represent a total gross income of twenty dollars from the project.

Asked to be Courteous

When Dickstein ordered the boy to answer questions respectfully and to bear in mind that he was appearing at a Government hearing, Raymond asked:

What government"?

"The United States Government," Dickstein replied.

"I thought you meant the international finance government," the youthful editor and publisher re-

"New York University is enough evidence of that, isn't it?" Raymond responded,

Rants in Zionism

Later, in one of those little speeches which were nipped in the bud, he said:

"It is my conviction that Zionism and Judaism are un-Ameri-

"Have you any proof?" Dickstein inquired.

"I'll present it in time," Raymond answered. "The Protocols I'll present that."

Here occurred a melodramatic piece of business which left everyone in the room grinning. The boy yanked a little swastika banner from his pocket and slapped it onto the table, like a pinochle player drawing trump.

"That's what I believe in, see?" he exclaimed.

He proceeded to explain that "the red in it represents the blood of the people; the white stands for

As for the swastika itself: "That there," he explained, "is the symbol of the Nordic race."

Where's Shamrocks?

Why hadn't he brought in the shamrock? Dickstein asked, pointing out that the latter emblem occupies a place of equal honor with the swastika in the masthead of Healey's Irish Weekly.

"My face is enough," the boy replied. "I'm Irish."

When Dickstein characterized the paper as an attack upon "certain races," Raymond interrupted

"Upon the Jews," the boy amended.

Asked whether the paper was created to incite a campaign of racial disturbance, the witness answered:

"I'm only leading it-helping to lead it.'

Refuses Address

When the Congressman requested his resident address, young Healey refused to give it at the open hearing but agreed to write it on a slip of paper for Dickstein's eyes alone.

"I've had Communists come into my home plenty of times," he said. "I had a knife stuck into my hand. I don't want no stink bombs thrown into my house."

Questioned regarding the extent of his acquaintance with Schnuch, Hackl and Dr. Ignatz Griebl, the youth said:

"I know those peeple just like I know you, that's all, just by

meeting them." Later he declared:

"I've declared against the Jews because the Jews have declared war against the Gentiles."

T'm A Hitler'

Asked whether he is a follower of Hitler, Raymond said:

"I'm a Hitler." At this point he bit fiercely into the wad of chewing gum in his mouth and groped nervously for a cigarette.

Questions regarding his knowledge of Communism here evoked the following response:

"I put men into the Communist party. Those names I would never give out because they're still in there, see?"

Dickstein directed him to name these "men," but he refused.

Several questions were asked him in reference to the "Anglo-Saxon Celtic Alliance," the "organization" which publishes Healey's Irish Weekly. Noted Surgeon

Head of Moscow Surgical Clinic Marks 35 Years as Doctor

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) MOSCOW. - Soviet newspapers devoted much space to praise of Professor Boris Weisbord, leading Jewish surgeon, who recently completed thirty-five years in the

medical profession.

Professor Weispord is founder and chier of the Moscow Surgical Clinic and has an international reputation as the man responsible for the remarkable medical advances in the Soviet Union. He was personal physician to Lenin. During the civil war in Russia he held high posts in the Red Army.

He had intended to become an engineer, but the numerus clausus restrictions in Czarist Russia had prevented him from enrolling in the engineering school at the University of Kharkov. He entered the medical school instead,

Shortly before he was to graduate Professor Weisbord was expelled from school for revolutionary activities. He returned secretly, however, and took his examirations, passing out at the head of his class. Despite the fact that he had no diploma he was immediately made a member of the staff of a leading Moscow hospital. He made a great reputation as a surgeon, but was continually hampered by lack of a diploma. It was not until after the revolution that he finally obtained his desired di-

Wales Donates To Club Appeal For £20,000

Viscountess Bearsted **Lauds London Group** for Work

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON .- A donation by the Prince of Wales to the campaign for £20,000 to support activities of the Brady Associated Clubs in Whitechapel was announced.

The gift, size of which was not mentioned, was revealed at a dinner in the Savoy Hotel by Viscountess Bearsted, who presided at the affair in place of her husband, Lord Bearsted, and read a speech prepared by him. Illness prevented Lord Bearsted from appearing.

The Bearsted speech lauded the Jewish organization as performing "a real constructive work. It is a fine endeavor to instill into young lives the meaning of citizenship and cooperation."

"I speak to an audience of mostly Jews and Jewesses," Lady Bearsted went on. "Our position today is difficult. Not by noisy demonstrations, not by bitter words in the press, but by our lives and by the influence we have on those among whom we live we can show that we are a worthy people and a worthy race.
