Body to Rule AJC Election

National Groups Asked to Control Voting Proce-re

Leading national organizations have been asked to establish a non-partisan board to supervise the elections in April for the creation of an enlarged American Jewish Congress, the administrative committee of the Congress announced yesterday at local headquarters, 122 East Fortysecond street.

The board is to formulate the election procedure, set up the necessary machinery and see that the voting is properly carried through. The elections will be the second of their kind in the history of the Jewish community in the United States.

Twenty-five seats on the board are to be held for national organizations, it was explained, and the administration of the AJC as such will not be represented, in pursuance of a decision of its administrative committee.

Seek 500 Delegates

Among the unaffiliated national prganizations invited to send representatives to the board are the American Jewish Committee, B'nai B'rith, the Council of Jewish Women, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Workmen's Circle.

Other organizations whose cooperation is sought, it was said, include the Zionist Organization of America, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, Mizrachi, Hadassah, the Jewish War Veterans Association, Young Israel, the United Synagogue of America and the Free Sons of Israel.

The April elections will be for 500 delegates to an enlarged American Jewish Congress and in addition of twenty-five per cent of the total for representatives of national Jewish organizations.

Formation of a national campaign committee to direct program work was also announced yester-Prof. Horace M. Kallen, Louis Lipsky and Dr. Samuel Margoshes are co-chairmen.

Nazi Drive Leaves 46 in Law Schools

Anti-Jewish Campaign Succeeds in Ban-No More Are Being Enrolled

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Dec. 9.—The supreme efficiency of the government's drive to oust Jews from the professions was revealed here with the release today of law school statistics which show that of 13,163 law students registered in Germany only forty-six are Jews.

Commenting on these statistics, Juristische Wochenschrift, official organ of the lawyers, explains that the forty-six still studying in German universities are carry-

overs from previous years. Recent matriculations, the publication points out, reveal that/no Jewish students whatever are being enrolled in the law faculties.

PRAHA, Dec. 9.—Indignant over the recent anti-Semitic forays on the part of the National Democratic Party of Czechoslovakia, Dr. Max Reiner, Jewish leader high in the councils of the party, today severed all connections with it.

Dr. Reiner is known to have been particularly incensed at the role played by the National Democrats in the recent student riots attending the transference of insignia from the German to the Czechoslovakian university here. German and Czechoslovakian Nationalist students clashed over the shifting of the ancient insignia and in the ensuing disturbances both factions turned on the Jews. Many Jews were injured in the melee and much Jewish-owned property, pri vate and business, was damaged.

Streicher Balks At Removal to Silesian Post

Suspects Motive Behind 'Promotion'; Job Goes to Wagner

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, Dec. 9.—Suspicious that his transfer from Franconia to upper Silesia is only a manouver to shift him out of his stronghold, Julius Streicher, notorious Jew-baiter and Nazi overlord of Franconia, refused to accept the position of governor of Silesia, to which he was appointed two days ago by Reichsfuehrer Hitler, it became known here today.

Joseph Wagner, Nazi governor in the Ruhr, was therefore given the post of deputy governor for Silesia until the conflict between Hitler and Streicher will be set-

Fears Curtailment

Rumors reaching Berlin today from Nuremburg state that one of the principal reasons why Streicher declined the governorship of Silesia is that he felt he would not be so free in his Jewbaiting activities in Silesia as he is in Franconia. Since Streicher's political career was built chiefly on his mania against the Jews, he was said to fear that his position would be greatly weakened in administrating Silesia, where Jewish minority rights have to be observed by the Nazi government under existing international treaties with

Centenarian, 108, Dies; Oldest East Polish Jew

WARSAW, Dec. 9.—Preparations were being made today for the funeral of Saul Krinsky, oldest Jews in the Bialystok region, who died yesterday in the village Koryczin at the age of 108.

During his lifetime the centenarian was noted for the superb state of his health, a condition he attributed to his abstemious habits. To the very end, he persisted in his custom of fasting every Thursday in addition to the regular fasts prescribed by the Jewish religion.

Aids Schuschnigg Drive to Split United Front

VIENNA, Dec. 9.—The government press came out into the open yesterday as backers of the current campaign to split the Jewish community of Austria. The campaign, launched with the intention of weakening the resistance of Austrian Jewry to the government's anti-Jewish policies, is being particularly directed against the Jewish community of this city, which is presenting a united front against the Schuschnigg brand of anti-Semitism.

Yesterday's issue of the Reichspost government organ, published a memorandum to the government purportedly by the most exfreme faction of Orthodox Jewry, which is centered about the Schiff Syna-

Thin Screen on Stand

This memorandum was characterized by the Reichspost as indicative of the rebellion against "the neologian Jewish majority." Publication of the note is considered a thin screen thrown up by the Reichspost to camouflage its own anti-Jewish tendency.

The Schiff Synagogue memorandum is being used to disguise the bigotry of the Reichspost contention that it is interested in the protection of true adherents of the Jewish faith, and, to this end, is advocating the separation of the Orthodox group from the rest of the Jewish community.

In a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Dr. Desider Friedmann, president of the Vienna Jewish community, expressed amazement that the Reichspost had obtained the memorandum before the Jewish community itself.

Dr. Friedmann pointed out, however, that existing laws would prevent fulfillment of the alleged desire of the Schiff Synagogue faction for separation from the rest of the community. Furthermore, Dr. Friedmann declared, he doubted whether the government (Continued on Page Two)

Belgium Extends Stay of Refugees

Feb. 15 Set as Time Limit for Palestine and U.S. Travelers as Raids Continue

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BRUSSELS, Dec. 9.—Intervention by Jewish organizations here has resulted in the Belgian government extending to February 15 the time limit allowed German refugees who have indicated their intention of going to Palestine and America.

The extension has not, however, served to check police activities in the Jewish quarters in Antwerp. The police, it was reported today. carried out new raids in the section and made many arrests.

Buy 500 Dunams: to Raise \$25,000

A tract of not less than 500 dunams will be purchased in Palestine as national property at the disposal of Jewish families exiled from Germany and immigrants from other countries, it was deyesterday at a Palestine land redemption conference at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

The parley unanimously voted to form the Palestine Land Redemption Council, which will cooperate with the Jewish National Fund and raise \$25,000 for land

Four hundred delegates, representing nearly three hundred Jewish fraternal societies, congregations and mutual aid agencies, attended the session, which was presided over by former Congressman Nathan D. Perlman, vice-president of the American Jewish Congress.

Land Necessity Emphasized Dr. Israel Goldstein, president Dedicate Alabama of the Jewish National Fund of America, emphasized the importance of land to the Jewish people

Felix M. Warburg was guest of honor last night at the tenth annual dinner of the Bronx division of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, held at the Commodore. More than 1,500 attended.

The sum of \$56,222 was raised toward the Federation's \$2,071,000 emergency campaign, now in prog-The amount brings the Bronx's \$200,000 quota to \$181,-

Outstanding Bronx Jewish leaders joined in paying tribute to Mr. Warburg.

Mr. Warburg should be our guest of honor tonight," declared Post-master Albert Goldman, chairman of the Bronx division.

"He was the honored guest at our first dinner ten years ago. At the close of the decade of our division's history, we are met here again to testify to the debt which we who are vitally interested in Federation owe to him.

Warburg Responds

The philanthropist expressed his alification over the enthusiastic response to Federation's call.

"Since Federation was founded," he said, "it has never faced a more trying time than the present. I am grateful that you have asked re to be your honored guest, but more than grateful because the deeper purpose of your gathering is to aid Federation.

"Your wholehearted devotion to the cause of Federation is known to me, and has been indeed heartening. The work in the Bronx is in good hands. How important that work is to the Jewish community, and indeed the entire city. I need not stress here.

Vital to Community

"Federation serves ninety-one affiliated organizations, including hospitals, clinics, dispensaries, old-age homes, child-care institutions and direct relief agencies, all indispensable to the life of the entire community, and never more so than now.

"It would be nothing short of catastrophe if the work of these essential institutions should now have to be curtailed."

Schneider Is Chairman

Max J. Schneider was chairman of the dinner committee, which numbered 300 members. Acting with him were Mr. Goldman and Ira J. Sobol, chairman of the board of directors of the Bronx division.


"Our choice fell this year once more on Mr. Warburg," said Mr. Schneider, "because of the unprecedented crisis threatening the very continuance of Federation.

Slight Infractions Bring Down Wrath of Austria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA.—Here are a few actual cases to illustrate how Jews of Austria are affected by the anti-Semitic policies of the Schuschnigg government:-

1. A woman, resident in Vienna to the age of 35. All her family is here, too. Through marriage with a German citizen she became an alien. She went to live in Germany, working as a music teacher. When Hitler came in, she, being a Jewess, had to leave.

In her escape from the Nazi scourage she crossed back into Austria, returning to her relatives. She is in no way a burden on the public. Nevertheless, she is being sent out of the country because, returning without a passport, she is alleged to have "violated public order." Where is she to go?

2. A man of more than 70. He changed \$70 for a friend out of courtesy. Under the present currency laws this is not permitted without the consent of the National Bank. A fine of 50 schillings or five days' imprisonment has been imposed.

There is no other offense of which he is accused, but he, too, is being sent out of the country as an "undesirable."

3. A man born in Galicia, an Austro-Hungarian subject under the old empire. In 1914, twenty years ago, he was sentenced to a fortnight's imprisonment for a trivial offense.

Recently he engaged in business in Czechoslovakia, in the course of which he had a dispute with his partners. They brought suit against him in a Czechoslovakian court. Thereupon the Austrian authorities ordered his expatriation. But Czechoslovakia doesn't want him. He is being expelled from Austria, nevertheless.

These cases are only a few among hundreds. They show the tendency of the administration.

Holds Fascism Seeks to Crush All Minorities

J. W. Wise Says Jews Have Special Stake in Fighting It

Jews have a special stake in the struggle against Fascism, James Waterman Wise, editor of Opinion, declared yesterday at Temple B'nai Jeshurun, 270 West Eightyninth street.

The reasons for the situation, he explained, are that Fascism "will inevitably victimize and scapegoatize all minority races and religions" and that "the Jewish people recoils from and revolts against everything that Fascism

Triumph of Reaction

"Fascism," the speaker said, "is the triumph of reaction, and where reaction triumphs, there the Jew is defeated. Alike for the preservation of our liberties as Americans and our ideals as Jews, let us fight this thing."

Decrying efforts to silence Jewish opposition to the menace by raising of "the specter of radical-ism," Dr. Wise added:

"Let us make it known to both our friends and our foes that we can neither be bribed nor blackmailed into abandoning our struggle against Fascist tyranny and for social and economic, and hence human, emancipation."

Rabbi Landman's Sermon

Rabbi Isaac Landman, in his sermon yesterday at Congregation Beth Elohim, Eighth avenue and Garfield place, Brooklyn, drew a parallel between the religious crisis that confronted the world when Jewish and Greek civilization clashed more than two millenia ago and the religious situation confronting people today.

"What the Greek Antiochus attempted to achieve was a totalitarian state, much like the modern Nazi political ideal. He sought to coordinate all the elements in his empire, to regiment the various peoples under one pattern, into which he hoped to weave himself as a demigod."

Rabbi Landman said it would surprise Hitler and his henchmen to learn that what they are seeking to achieve in Germany has already been tried and failed.

Will Aid Jews' Cause

"In the field of faith, when Greek meets Jew it is the Jew whose cause the thinking, believing world will espouse."

This assurance was given by Rabbi William F. Rosenblum in his sermon at Temple Israel Broadway and Ninety-first street.

"Deeper than the attempt to drive Jews out of the professions and out of business," he added, "is the campaign to drive Christianity, which is a development and an interpretation of the religion of the Jews, out of the souls of the German people."

Hits at Germany

Rabbi Joseph Zeitlin, preaching at Temple Ansche Chesed, assailed Nazi Germany as a country which in the past "contributed greatly" to civilization but which, because of its ignorance and bigotry" has gone back to abysmal degeneracy.

"Its perverted conduct at the present time has caused much of the good that it effected in the past to become forgotten memories," he asserted.

Austrian Schemes

The Austrian government, failing in its diplomatic attempts to mask its anti-Jewish action by official and worthless statements, has now embarked on a new scheme. It is endeavoring to split the Jewish community in Vienna for the purpose of finding at least some Jewish backing.

The efforts which the Austrian government now is making to create the impression that the extreme Jewish orthodox groups favor the government's present policy will fool nobody. We know that they do not express the opinion of Austrian Jewry.

The trick of splitting the Jewish population in order to weaken the resistance of the Jewish community and be able to say that not all Jews in Austria oppose the government's anti-Jewish measures will not work this time. The Austrian government is making a mistake if it thinks that Jews abroad do not know who is who in Austrian Jewry.

The anti-Jewish policy of the Austrian government is an open book. The revival of anti-Jewish agitation in the Nazis press, now permitted by the government, cannot be shielded by any statements is= sued by the Jews of the Schiff Synagogue in Vienna. The Austrian government will have to show actual-and not diplomatic-goodwill towards its Jewish population if it is interested in preventing a worldwide Jewish campaign against Austria.

The Last 46

The tragic results brought about for the German Jews by the "Aryan paragraph" are best illustrated in the brief dispatch which we carry today from Berlin, reporting that there are now only forty-six Jews among the thousands of law students in the German universities.

These forty-six are the last of the Mohicans. They are the remnants of the large number of Tewish students who attended German law faculties only two years ago. They may graduate, but whether they will be permitted to practice as lawyers is another question.

Hitler is reaching his aim. There are practically no more Jewish students in Germany. A few years from now there will be no Jewish lawyer or doctor there, which is just what Hitler wishes.

GERMAN JEWRY TODAY

By MORRIS WOOD

BERLIN.

There is a Jewish saying that persecution befits Israel as a scarlet cord befits a camel. And it is certain that the outbreak of ruthless anti-Semitism in Germany has strengthened the solidarity and the Jewish consciousness of German Jewry. The report has just appeared of the first year's work of the Central Committee which was set up in the Summer of 1933 for relief and reconstruction (Zentralausschuss fur Hilfe und Aufbau); and it is a document striking in its dignity, its absence of complaint, its lucidity, and best of all, in its record of work accomplished.

There has been a real revolution of Jewish economic life as well as thought in Germany; and the committee, which represents the whole of German Jewry, and which is active throughout Germany, has set itself to prepare the way for thousands who have been thrown out of the learned professions, tens of thousands who have been thrown out of business employment, tens of thousands more who have been forced to emigrate, and tens of thousands of children who have been excluded from the national schools.

Committee Branches Are Subsidized

The Central Committee for Relief and Reconstruction is the executive instrument of the representative body of German Jews, known as the Reichsvertretung der deutschen Juden. With characteristic German thoroughness its activities are divided among four main departments - emigration, charity, economic help, and cultural work. Each of these departments, again, is subdivided

- the emigration into three sections, Palestine, migration to other lands, and remigration; economic help into credit facilities, economic advice, reorientation, etc.

The committee suffered two tragic lessons in the first months of its work. Its two principal artificers, Dr. Ludwig

Tietz, scion of a well-known German house, was the acknowledged leader of German Jewish youth, and Dr. Carl Melchior, the economist and representative of Germany after many reparation conferences, died under the stress of work within a few months of each other last Winter. But their spirit has survived, and the work has gone on steadily and unremittingly.

Taking emigration first, the report records a migration of German Jews during the year of some 50,000. It has been the principal aim to replace a panic flight by a planned and prepared movement. The yearning Palestine, the Jewish "Drang nach Osten," is greater than can be satisfied. More than 30,000 in Berlin alone came for advice about life in the Jewish National Home. Actually, of the certificates for workers granted by the Palestine Administration, some 3,000 were allotted to the German Committee.

Many Go Overseas To Seek a Haven

That migration does not take account of the large number who went out with capital, or as dependents of those already in the country, or as children whose maintenance was assured by philanthropic bodies. Of the 3,000 who went half were manual workers, twenty-three percent were land workers; the rest were business men, employees, academic and professional persons.

The-migration to other lands is not less. The flight to European states, however, in which there is little chance of absorption, has been greatly reduced, and the organizations are directing the migrants to countries overseas, where there is a chance for genuine settlement. Since the Winter of 1933 the proportion of those going overseas has steadily increased, and the number now reaches about 400 a month.

The other aspect of migration is the assistance of Polish, Rumanian, Czechoslovakian, or other subjects who were living in Germany to return to their country of origin. Nearly 20,000 persons had been so assisted by April, 1934, and it is calculated that the total number of Jews of foreign nationality who have left is over 25,000.

New Schools Find Support

The charitable organization of the Central Committee offers no dramatic feature. The principal effort has been so to rationalize the existing institutions of the Jewish communities that they may provide for the everincreasing number of those needing public assistance with the steadily diminishing resources of the communities. The cultural activity, on the other hand, manifests a striking change of outlook. Before the revolution Jewish opinion in Germany was, broadly opposed the extension of Jewish Today, the necessity for these schools is universally recognized, and the Central Committee has provided means for their erection.

A survey made by the American Jewish Congress disclosed the fact further that as a result of the consumers' resistance to products made in Nazi Germany, a number of new industries have been established in the United States to supply substitutes, and that a number of existing industries have been greatly expanded for the same reason. Thus it appears that the boycott against the products of Nazi Germany is in a real sense aiding national recovery. New York.

Between the Lines

It is very fortunate that the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, in which Zionists and non-Zionists are equally represented, this time will hold its sessions not in Europe but in New York.

This undoubtedly will help very much to eliminate certain unfriendly feelings between the non-Zionists and Zionists, which have grown up recently due to aconfidential communique sent out by the Zionist Executive in London, in which misstatements were made affecting the prestige of the non-Zionist section in the Jewish Agency.

The Zionist Implications

The Zionist section of the Jewish Agency always has maintained that non-Zionists are not contributing their full share towards the Agency's work for Palestine. At every Zionist gathering in Europe activities. of the non-Zionists in the Jewish Agency were criticized as insufficient. Implications were made that the non-Zionists are actually a burden on the Agency and that the entire work of the Agency is done by Zionists only.

The members of the Zionist section of the Jewish Agency who are now expected to come to the United States for the meeting of the Administrative Committee will have their chance to see that these contentions on the part of the Zionists are not at all justified. It may be true that in Europe the non-Zionists are less active for Palestine than the Zionists. In America this is, however, not the case. Here the contributions of individual non-Zionists to funds intended for Palestine are incomparably larger than those of Zionists.

The Tactless Communique

The non-Zionist leaders in America may therefore be justified in saying that the Zionist Executive in London was not at all tactful when it sent a communique to leading Zionists throughout the world, asserting that the non-Zionists agreed to a less than fifty per cent representation on the Executive of the Jewish Agency. Those who remember the investigations conducted in Prague last year between Zionists and non-Zionists at the Jewish Agency Council know very well that the non-Zionists never will give up their right to a fifty per cent representation on the Executive of the Agency. The fact that today they are represented in the Executive with three members only does not obviate the principle of the fifty per cent representation agreed upon in Prague and, more recently, in Zurich.

The Parley in New York

The communique sent out by the Zionist Executive in London and to which the non-Zionists in America are strongly objecting certainly is not contributing to the good-will spirit which the non-Zionists here are exhibiting in their work for Palestine. The European members of the Zionist section of the Jewish Agency, coming now to New York to participate in the session of the Administrative Committee, will realize it was a mistake on the part of the Zionist Executive in London to send out the provocative communique. They will realize that the non-Zionists, though less active in Europe, are sufficiently active in the United States. They also will realize that the misstatement made in the London communique affecting the non-Zionists must be corrected, as requested by the non-Zionists of America.

Decline of Reich Trade

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin: May I call attention to an erroneous conclusion reached in The New York Times editorial of December 6, and quoted by you on December 7, entitled "Trade With Germany," which is based on two fundamental errors of statistics.

In the first place the editorial cites American exports and imports in terms of dollars while the fact is that several currencies have been employed. We pay for German imports with reichsmarks of various designations and of varying values (blocked, registered, etc.). Up until 1933, we paid for these reichsmarks in gold German goods in 1933, we could obtain a much smaller amount of reichsmarks than for the seven million gold dollars paid by us in 1932.

Therefore it is correct to state that both the volume and the real value of our exports to Germany in 1933 show a tremendous decrease as compared to 1932, a decrease of at least thirty-five per cent. In 1934, according to your own figures, imports from Germany showed a drop of forty per

Secondly, it must be emphasized that it is impossible to arrive at any conclusions as to the trend of our trade with Germany without a comparison of the trend of our trade with foreign countries in general, and in particular with countries supplying substitutes for German merchandise.

An analysis of our trade figures with such other countries would show that whereas our imports from Germany in terms of dollars were practically unchanged in 1933 as compared with 1932, our imports from such countries as Japan, Czechoslovakia and France show a tremendous rise in volume and value during that period. We should like to cite several illustrations of this latter fact.

In the fields of import of china, porcelain and stoneware; women's and children's leather gloves; blown glass articles, beginning with 1932, and a comparison with 1933 and the first 9 months of 1934, these figures show that while dollars, since that period with de- imports from Germany have conpreciated dollars. For the seven sistently decreased, there has been million depreciated dollars paid for a corresponding rise in substitutes a corresponding rise in substitutes for these articles from other coun-

Statistics Exaggerated

It should be noted further that the figures for 1934 denote imports for immediate consumption and represent the value of goods taken out of bond, whereas, the figures for the previous year denote products arriving for consumption and their entrance into bond. It is therefore fair to assume that imports from Germany up until January 1, 1934 and placed in bond, because of the consumers' resistance to German-made products, have been included in the import figures for the previous year and that this merchandise taken out of bond during 1934 is listed again in the import figures.

The conclusion therefore is that the statistics of German imports

Digest of World Press Opinion

Alien Restrictions In England

Speaking of anti-alien legislation, now an idea beginning to gain popularity in some quarters in England for the purpose of preventing German Jews from settling in London, Lord Ponsonby writes in the Manchester Guardian.

It is amusing to note that the strongest and wealthiest advocates of "Britain for the British" lose their vehemence and change their tone when it is suggested to them that the French chefs who cook their dinners and the French dressmakers who supply gowns for their wives should return to their native land. The closing down in London of all the Soho restaurants would certainly be resented. So a category known as "undesirable aliens" is invented i order to prevent poor rfugees and those fleeing from persecution in foreign countries from landing on our shores. Regulations, passports, and tariffs continue more effectively than ever to set up barriers between nations. That they should be considered necessary only shows how extreme nationalism tends to isolation and economic self-sufficiency leads to international discord. Greater facilities for travel may in time alter this narrow outlook, but for the time being free intercourse and free exchange have ceased even to be ideals to be aimed at.

The assertion that the English speaking races come from Israel is made in the *Hampshire Chronicle*, English daily newspaper, which writes:

Recent researches into the history of Israel from the time she left Assyria until she came into the promised resting place in the Isles, have been and are being so successful that there is no doubt that before long all her journeyings will be traced, and the proof that the English speaking races are indeed Israel will be established by irrefutable evidence.

For many years, however, before these journeyings could be traced, many people were drawn to recognize the fact from the evidence of prophecy fulfilled in history. Two sets of prophecies exist, one with regard to the Jews (i.e., mainly the tribe of Judah) and one vastly different with regard to Israel. Those relating to the Jews have been, as everyone knows, marvellously fulfilled, and thoughtful people began to reason that if God had fulfilled the prophecies relating to Judah He must also have fulfilled those relating to Israel. They began to look round for "a nation and a company of nations" whose history and circumstances answered a prophecy and they found what they sought in the English speaking race.

The clues in Scripture are so numerous that the late Mr. Hine published two books containing no less than ninety-four identifications.

possible to report substantial progress.

Of the German scholars and scientists displaced since April 1933, 200 have found permanent places and 325 have been provided with temporary facilities for continuing their research outside Germany. This means that at least two-thirds of the total number who are justified in hoping to continue their scientific work have been assisted to remain in the academic world.

The total task is limited and manageable, but requires steady and energetic work for a long time. So far as the Academic Assistance Council is concerned we are at present giving emergency grants to seventy-one scholars and scientists in the universities of this country to maintain them while seeking permanent posts. Of the scholars to whom the council made grants before April, 1934, approximately one-third have already found positions outside this country, and we are convinced that this absorption will continue, provided that emergency grants-in-aid can still be given. There is serious danger, however, of funds being exhausted before permanent placement is achieved.

Masses Hold The Solution

The Pariser Tageblatt carries an article by its editor Dr. Georg Bernhardt, dealing with the question of whether a world Jewish congress is desirable. Dr. Bernhard writes:

Opponents of a world Jewish congress are wrong in their belief that with the higher circles, which stand out above the level of the general Jewish lot, and live peacefully in the lands of equality, lies the future of the Jew. On the contrary, the future of the Jews in the lands of equality will in the next few decades depend on the lot of the masses of Jewry. And the changed situation in Germany proves this.

Jews of France and England pride themselves on their activities in the political, cultural and economic field in those countries in which their ancestors have lived for hundreds of years. But was that not the case in Germany? Yet all the Jewish achievements in Germany were wiped out almost overnight.

What guarantee is there that under certain conditions similar things will not happen also in other countries of the world? It is not the Jewish lord, nor the Jewish factory magnate, nor the Jewish intellectual; but the protection of the masses of Jews in the lands of mass Jewish settlement in the Galuth, and the improvement of their status and position, which will in the future also influence the West.

Hebrew Writers Face Hardships

Haaretz, Hebrew daily in Palestine, publishes an article by Dr. Klausner on the distress which Hebrew writers and artists face even in Palestine. Dr. Klausner states:

"Even here in Eretz Israel, the situation is very far from satisfactory. Books which are published in the country have only a very small sale abroad. And since a small section of the nation cannot support a national literature, there is not even one publishing house in the country which can support itself honorably and also give honorable support to Hebrew writers. Not one of these houses could exist without the artificial measures of

prizes and lotteries. Thus cultural creative work really deserving of that name has almost stopped.

JNF Work In Other Lands

The Florida Jewish News, speaking of the proportion in which American Jewry contributes to the Jewish National Fund, states:

Many American Jews feel that they are bearing the brunt of supporting the Jewish National Fund, the purpose of which is to redeem land in Pales ine so that Jewish refugees may have a foothold on a national homeland.

The actual fact is that other Jewries are much more active than American Jews in contributing to the Palestine land problem. We have recently looked up figures to verify the above statement. English Jewry, for example, with a population one-tenth of ours have during the past year produced a greater amount than we have for the "Keren Kayemeth." South African Tewry, with one-twentieth of our population, has yielded almost as much as we while Polish Jewry, economically crushed, has given an amount almost as large as ours.

(Continued from Page Four) school age almost one-third are today attending Jewish schools. There are ten higher schools, half of them preparing the students for technical work, and eighty primary schools. schools and the new circumstances of the community have combined to evoke a fresh enthusiasm for Jewish study. The Central Committee has had also to undertake the support of long-established and leading institutions of Hebraic learning in Germany which, till these last years, exercised the intellectual hegemony.

Economic Life Is Replanned

But the most remarkable activity of the Zentralausschuss is not the work of emigration, charity, or schools, but rather the economic replanning of Jewish life within Germany. The committee has established over fifty economic centers in the Reich.

It is their function to facilitate the reorientation of the lives of those thrown out of their previous employment, to provide manual and technical education, and to give advice to the vast number of men and women, young and old, who must by their own activity, reshape their lives. We know the problem among the refugees. It is far larger in extent within Germany, but there it can be dealt with in an orderly and scientific way.

The mere figures are illuminating: 2,000 academically-trained officials have lost their positions through the "Aryan" clause, 4,000 Jewish lawyers and jurists have been driven from their professions, 3,000 medical doctors have had to abandon the profession altogether, and a thousand more are restricted to private practice. Nearly 1,000 "non-Aryan" high-school teachers have been retired, 1,000 writers, editors, and journalists have been thrown out of employment, nearly 2,000 singers. actors, artists were deprived of their positions.

From the last class the committee has been able to establish a Jewish dramatic and artistic group which provides a liveli-

100,000 Seek Aid Of Committee

It is an indication of the extent of the economic distress of German Jewry that nearly 100,000 persons have sought advice in the centers of the committee. The practical help is given partly by credit facilities, loan funds in the towns, and subventions to instituttions of general utility. The total capital which has been applied to the loan funds is well over 1,000,000 marks. Another form of help is organized through Jewish employers and industrialists who find places for Jewish workers and apprentices. Another activity is the establishment of labor bureaus. In the last three months of 1933 35,000 persons passed through the Berlin bureau.

But the most important and constructive help is given through reorientation activities. The committee has set itself in Germany to prepare for a healthier and more normal economic distribution of the majority of German Jews who must remain in Germany, and at the same time to prepare that part of the young generation which will leave Germany for manual occupations in the countries of emigration. Actually over 6,000 young persons are now undergoing retraining. Of these forty. three per cent are learning agriculture; fifty-seven per cent other forms of manual and technical work.

Year's Record Is Heartening

The report emphasizes that retraining is the kernel of the whole work of reconstruction. Its extension has been made possible in the straitened circumstances of German Jewry by the generous help granted by the Jewish communities of England and America.

In a tragic situation this record of a year's earnest and constructive work is a heartening document. The report contains no statement of the money which has been expended on the work, but it is abundantly clear that German Jews are making a material sacrifice to their utmost capacity in order to equalize conditions and to give an opportunity for the 500,000 who remain in the country to have the basis of an economic, a social and a cultural life.

Plan 1935 Bureya Program

Soviet Allots HugeAmount For Building

40 Million Rubles to Be **Spent on Construction** and Mines

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) MOSCOW .- In connection with the decision of the Soviet government adopted on October 1 to take measures for the economic and cultural development of the Jewish autonomous region in Bureya the agencies concerned are now intensively working on a concrete plan of building construction for 1935. Main attention in drawing up the plan is being given to the capital buildings.

It is proposed to invest half of the sum which has been assigned for the entire industrial and social-cultural building program in the region during the course of 1935. The development of industry is considered in government quarters as the pivotal point for the entire future economic development of the region and the first condition for settlement of large numbers of Jews in Bureya.

The amount for general investment in economic development and social-cultural building in the Jewish autonomous region next year is fixed at forty million rubles. This is twice as much as was put into Bureya building this year. Of the forty million rubles, twenty million will be put into building the capital and preparations for its construction. The first step will be to develop iron ore mining in the Chinghan. It is intended during 1935 to open the first ore mines and carry on extensive prospecting for new ore.

Construction Program

The construction of houses, schols and centers is provided for to the extent of five million rubles during 1935. Steps will be taken to construct a plant to manufacture coaches, ten million rubles are allotted for this. It is also planned to put 4,500,000 rubles into the building of work which will employ 850 workers.

Another plan for 1935 is constructive of a big mechanized chalk works in Londóko. The cost of this works is estimated at 8,350,000 rubles. This will be the large technically-equipped chalk works in the Far East.

In 1935, 1,350,000 rubles will be expended on this project, which will employ 250 workers and produce 60,000 tons of chalk a year.

Colony Opened German Jewish School For Refugees In Holy Land

Central Bureau Project, Gan Hashomron, Is Second One

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM.—Representatives of all Jewish organizations in Palestine attended the ceremonies officially inaugurating the establishment of a colony of German Jews in Karkur, near Hederah. The new settlement is named Gan Hashomron (Garden of Samaria).

Addresses were delivered by Dr. Werner Senator, on behalf of the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews in Palestine, Dr. J. Pinner, agricultural expert on the staff of the Central Bureau, and Dr. A. Korrolick, representing the Association of German Immigrants in Palestine.

Each settler is provided twenty dunams of land and loans for equipment by the Central Bureau, sponsor of the settlement, the second of its kind for refugees. Previously agricultural training to the colonists was given by the Bureau.

According to the Central Bureau, some 20,000 refugees have already settled in Palestine. Employment for them varies, 2,500 being engaged in hotel and cafe work, an equal number in Tel Aviv in handicrafts, industry and construction, and 1,600 in Haifa and 600 in Jerusalem in the same types of endeavor.

Of the 500 physicians from Germany, 300 have remained at their professions, more than 200 in the cities and the others in colonies, while the remaining 200 have chosen other occupations, about seventy agricultural.





JDC, British Board to Meet On Polish Aid

Americans Quit Warsaw for Paris Parley on Plans

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, Dec. 9. - Directors Giterman and Neustadt of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee were reported to have left for Paris today to participate in a conference of the Joint Distribution Committee with representatives of the British Board of Jewish Deputies.

The Paris conference of the two bodies, it is understood here, will be for the purpose of discussing plans to aid Polish Jewry.

Plans are on foot to inaugurate large-scale constructive help for the more than 3,000,000 Jews of Poland, a majority of whom are in desperate straits.

Neville Laski, president of the Jewish Deputies board, is understood to have conferred in Paris with Dr. Bernhard Kahan, chief European director of the Joint Distribution Committee, on the Polish Jewish relief problem.

The conference will be continued between them and the American directors of the J.D.C. on the occasion of Laski's and Kahan's forthcoming visit to New York, scheduled for the latter part of

Vienna Chief Rabbi Seventy Years Old

He studied in Berlin and Vienna and was appointed rabbi of Nikolsburg in 1892 in succession to his father, Rabbi Meier Feuchtwang. Grossman Puts Etchings O'Casey Listens ToRabbi's Talk On Latest Play

Then Speaks Himself on Jewish-Irish Amity, Other Topics

(Continued from Page One) 70 West Fifty-fifth street, where he makes his New York home, he brought him to the Temple, sat with him on the platform, escorted hi mto the hotel and spent two hours at tea in his apartment discussing a wide variety of subjects. O'Casey talked of his plays, art in general, of the Jews and the Irish, of Palestine, of the situation of the Jews in Germany, of the future of the Jews, their omission in life and a multitude of other subjects.

Admits Ignorance on Jews

On the subject of the Jews, he admitted a lack of great knowl-His views were always predicated on that assumption. But he was intensely interested in the Jewish people, in their ways, in their traditions. He asked many questions, the questions of an astute observer. The synagogue, particularly, interested him and he admitted having long had a desire to enter one. His shyness, the thought that in his ignorance of customs he might offend, kept him

"Just what," he asked immediately after our meeting, "am I to do in the synagogue? Do I wear a hat? How do I pray?" These were just a few of the questions. But despite his failings in this respect, O'Casey comported himself perfectly. His audience warmed up to his few words and the Temple was a half-hour in emptying, so many were the congregants who availed themselves of the opportunity of greeting the playwright when he stepped down from the platform. A considerable scattering of Irish, and other non-Jews, were present to hear one of his few public addresses.

On Irish-Jewish Amity

Both in his address and later O'Casey stressed both the friendship of the Irish and the Jews and the good that will come for the Jews with the development of Palestine as a Jewish country. He sees Palestine in the future as a country with a population of several million Jews.

The writer expressed a desire that Palestine should expand to its Biblical size. Also, he voiced the opinion that Jewish Palestine might expand to the west, to Asia Turkey, he thinks, is a country that cannot long endure.

O'Casey talked not of tomorrow, nor of fifty years from now. He talked of an indeterminate future after explaining that a hundred years, or five hundred years, means little in the history of the world. Although he stated that Palestine can never hope to harbor all Jews. it is even today a great thing for Jews in that it gives the Jews a home, something to stem from.

Compares Palestine, Ireland "Ireland, likewise," he pointed out, "can never hope to harbor all the Irish. But the Irish, without Ireland, would be in a sorry state. "The Soviet," he said, "should afford a haven for many Jews, a country without persecution, with

equality for all." His philosophy, as expressed in "Within the Gates" is a cry for faith. Rather than an attack on religion he is a Communist. It is a criticism of it, an invitation to organized religion to release the ties that bind it to conventionality. His philosophy is a plea for surging power, vibrant life. In the words of some of the lines from the play he said:

His Philosophy Way for the strong and the fearless:

Life that is stirred from the

fear of its life; let it die;

Let it sink down, let it die, and pass from our vision forever. Sorrow and pain we shall have, and strugggle unending:

We shall weave courage with pain, and fight through the struggle unending.

Way for the strong and the swift and the fearless:

Lift that is weak with the terror of life let it die:

Let it sink down, let it die, and pass from our vision for-

Sympathy for Reich Jews

For the plight of the Jews in Germany, O'Casey had nothing but sympathy. Stating that he heard Hitler is a degenerate, he said Germany is ruled by "mad men." The Germans, however, he said, do not hate the Jews. He blames the present government on the neighbors of Germany that pushed her against the wall, made her pay impossible reparations.

In his forty years of residence in Dublin, O'Casey said he never saw so much as even a street brawl between the Jews and the Irish over a racial question. During the war, he amended, one or two Jews were molested in an anti-German frenzy, but that was because they were thought to be German sympathizers, not because they were Jews.

Hold Jews Vital "The Jews today," he said, "even in time of persecution, are as vital as ever in their long history—maybe more vital."

In his talk at Rodeph Sholom, the playwright said he didn't feel as strange as he thought he would in a synagogue because "no Irishman could be really uncomfortable among Jews." He recalled the Irish legend that they might be descended from the Israelites, one of the lost tribes, having settled in Ireland after the flood

acteristics in common. peoples, he said, are sentimental. They have an abundance of folk lore, love music, are both racially proud and extremely sensitive.

Have Common Mission

"Both the Jews and the Irish," he laughingly said, "would have been destroyed many years ago had it been their fate to be destroyed. Today, it is the mission of both peoples to bring peace to the hearts of men. We will bring peace by contributions to art, literature, music and by a display of fortitude and courage. These are great qualities of the Jews and the Irish. By these things we make our contribution to the world."

O'Casey's new play, "Within the Gates," is written in an experimental form. It is utterly different from his older and completely realistic writings, such as "Juno and the Peacock," "The Plough and the Stars," and "The Silver Tassle."

O'Casey, who has been in this country for the past month, will return to London, where he now resires on Friday.
