Golden Gloves Rise to Top

A young Jewish lad with great ring aspirations submitted his application to a New York paper in 1928 in order to fight on the Golden Gloves team of that year. He was a small, fat, and weighing 175 pounds, which qualified him for a heavy-weight division.

He hadn't done very much in amateur boxing. He had participated in eight bouts and had won every fight.

This lad placed in the finals of the Golden Gloves made his debut before a Garden audience late in 1928. He won the light heavyweight Golden Gloves title. At that time he was a far-sighted manager: took hold of young Bobbie Olin. Although he kept Bob in the amateur ranks for some time, he was a good professional fighter.

Olin fought in thirty-five amateur bouts before he became a professional boxer and he emerged victorious in every one of these ring battles. At this time his manager, who had him in mind for the championship and he came through.

Excellent Fighter With Good Record

Young, too—he is only twenty-five years old—in the type of fighter who should bring the light heavyweight division back to the standard of the days when Paul Bernbach, Jack Delaney, Mike McGuffee and Tommy Loughran fought in the 175-pound class.

He proved his ability to take it in six years he has been fighting to reach the top. Lately his long list of knockouts and victories rolled up in his years as a pro has shown that he can dish it out as well.

In Bob's first year as a pro fighter he fought fifteen times. He knocked out ten of his opponents in the first five rounds of the fights and took the decision from five others. A crackerjack record for a lad in his first year of money making and, according to the books, his opponents were far from being pushovers.

All in all, Olin has participated in fifty-five fights in the eight years he has been in the ring as a professional. In this time he scored eighteen knockouts and twenty-two victories. On the red side of the ledger he has only been beaten four times and on the short end of the game ten times.

Olin Was Once Wall Street Clerk

Bob was born in New York's lower east side—where a great many good Jewish fighters have come from. He was graduated from high school and then his family moved over to Brooklyn. Four years at Boys' High School were enough for him and he left school to get a job. "All this," he told your scribe, "was a high school diploma and a good left. It was pretty good on those days."

"I got myself a job in a Wall Street brokerage house and was making out pretty well as an amateur boxer. I liked the fight game ever since I was a kid on the east side and had to fight with the Irish in order to get the ice for the family. I won the Golden

Gloves contest in 1928 and shortly after that Harry Saddon picked me up."

Saddon, a debonaire fight manager who knows good thing when he sees it, wrote in at this point and said, "When I saw Bobbie fight that night in the Garden I nudged the guy next to me—and told him that I was going after the future light heavy weight champion of the world. The guy next to me didn't think so. He was Joe 'Muscle' Yussell Jacobs. I sent Joe a wire the night we beat Rosenthal."

The depression cut short Olin's career as a broker's clerk and as soon as he lost his job he asked Saddon if he could get him some money. The latter didn't think he was ripe for the money ring and nursed him along until he had won thirty-five consecutive fights in six months against the cream of the amateur ranks.

Olin Third Jew To Hold Title

When Bob Olin took the title from Maxie Rosenbloom last month he became the third Jew to hold the 175-pound championship. Barney Williams took the title away from Jack Dillon on October 24, 1910, to become the first Jew to wear that crown. Boxing fans knew Barney by the name of 'Big Boy' Winkey.

Maxie Rosenbloom knocked out Jimmy Slattery early in 1930 and held the title for four years before he lost the division to Bob Olin at the Garden last month. Maxie was the second Jew and Bob the third of his race to be champion. At this time he had percentage when only fourteen bouts have held this crown since 1903.

Light Heavyweight Title Began on Grudge

Jack Horman, a famous promoter of another era, instituted the class between heavy and middleweight boxing back in 1903 to settle a long standing grudge between Jack Root and George Gardner. Since that time the light heavyweight division became a real money proposition. In 1926 Paul Bernbach fought against Jack Delaney in a fight that drew more than \$400,000. This division was the only one where the fight fans until Slagade Maxie Rosenbloom came along and knocked out Slattery. In the last four years Maxie's name alone the ring had made the fight fans very uninterested in the 175-pound class. Maxie's bag of tricks in the ring have made the middle customers absolutely apathetic to this class and Bob Olin will encounter many difficulties to erase the present sentiment against this division.

Bob, however, is the man to do it. He is a good hard fighter who will do everything he can to be liked by the ring. Before his championship battle with Maxie Rosenbloom he told your sports scribe, "I'll shoot the works in this fight. I can contain it, I'll win. I'll Maxie fight with me or jump out of the ring."

Three Arabs Quit Jerusalem Council

Cite Irregularities Under the City's Present Mayor, Soon to Be Displaced

JERUSALEM, Dec. 13.—The Jerusalem municipality government, which is now nearing the end of its term, underwent a crisis today when three of the eight Arab members of the Municipal Council suddenly resigned.

The resignations were explained as a result of protests against irregularities in the Jerusalem municipality under the present Mayor, Ragab Bey Nashashibi.

Mayor Nashashibi is now in the last days of his administration, since he was defeated in the municipal elections held in Jerusalem three months ago. He is, however, contesting the elections, claiming irregularities took place during the voting.

Polish Jews Act To Save Future Of Cooperatives

Units Combine in Effort To Offset Lack of Aid by Government

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, Dec. 18.—Deprived of government assistance, all Jewish cooperatives in Poland today formed a united body to protect their existence and to combat the competition of non-Jewish cooperatives which are receiving extensive credits from government funds.

The newly formed body includes all the Jewish cooperatives of every group and political party, including the extreme Orthodox Agudath.

The Jewish cooperative movement in Poland is considered one of the greatest relief measures for Polish Jewry. The movement covers every township and numbers hundreds of thousands of members.

The presidium of the organization consists of Raphael Sheresfotsky, president, and Levitz, Deputy Dr. Heinrich Rosmarin, Deputy Dr. Wisnietzky, vice-presidents.

Soviet Will Name All-Jewish Cabinet

The Far East, was greeted with cheers by the gathering when a message from him was read.

Anton Tagdelier, secretary of the national minority section of the Central Soviet government, was among the first speakers at the opening session.

Pointing out that founding of the Jewish autonomous region was not an accident, but part of the Soviet policy on national minorities, the speaker listed the national minority republics created in Central Asia during the last ten years.

Since the Jews were among the most oppressed of minorities under Czarism, M. Tagdelier declared, the Soviet government has made the beginning devoted itself to questions of agricultural construction among the Jewish masses.

He pointed to the fact that special land reserves in Crimea, Ukraine and White Russia have been settled with 75,000 Jewish collective farmers, while tens of thousands Jewish youth are engaged in various industrial projects there.

Position Made Better
"The position of the Jewish small town workers," he said, "has been vastly improved. The social appearance of the Jewish nationality in the Soviet countries has been radically changed."

"The intention of the Soviet government in allocating Birobidzhan to the Jewish autonomous region is to concentrate Jewish masses over a large area."

M. Tagdelier, in the course of his address, stressed the fact that the Birobidzhan region is rich in natural resources.

Other speakers expressed the government's hope that the Jews would convert the region into one of the most flourishing sections in the Far East.

Freidenberg, 77, Dies; Was Michigan Banker

DETROIT, Dec. 18.—Benjamin Freidenberg, banker and merchant of Monroe, Mich., died here at the age of seventy-seven. He was born in Monroe and came to Detroit twenty years ago.

Mr. Freidenberg was a former president of the Danabank State Bank of Monroe, president of the Erie State Bank of Erie, Mich., and head of Monroe's largest men's clothing store.

come disloyal to our government," he declared.

Communist V. L. Kirkman, testifying for the Navy Department, presented the committee with exhibits to show the various methods being employed by Communists to strike at the vitals of the nation's defense structure.

Women, he said, were being employed by Communists to board Navy ships to convert American sailors to Communism.

Asks Stricter Laws
Colonel Daniel W. McCormack, commissioner general of immigration and naturalization of the Department of Labor, testified that present laws permitting deportation of radicals are inadequate.

While the Labor Department has no specific legislation to suggest, Colonel McCormack said that it would be glad to cooperate with the committee in developing the required laws.

Others who testified before the committee and requested specific legislation included Michael F. Shannon, grand exalted ruler of the Elks; George F. Brobeck, legislative counsel for the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Dr. Thomas H. Healy, representing the American Legion.

The hearing adjourned today, subject to the call of Chairman McCormack.

Atlantic City Tops Drive Goal by \$350

Federation Nets \$25,600 in Campaign to Support 20 Institutions

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Dec. 18.—By a margin of \$350, the seventh day campaign of the Federation of Jewish Charities went over the top as \$25,600 was raised by the workers. The result assures funds for some twenty local institutions and charities during the coming year.

Harry Casman, an attorney, presented testimony that it is the first time in many years that a local campaign has exceeded its quota. He also pointed out that it was the only one of a score of city drives in New Jersey this year to do so.

Meyer Joins Haegels
Haegels insists he is acting within his legal rights as lessee of the property and as general manager of the paper and of the Germania Printing Co., Inc., which controls it.

Regarded as significant of the increasing strength of his group was the fact that Willie Meyer, notorious New Jersey Nazi leader who has been among the most violent anti-Jewish devotees of Hitlerism in this country, had joined his ranks.

Meyer, Haegels and Werner Brink, New York Nazi enthusiast, were scheduled to speak at a rally in Turn Hall, Lexington avenue and East Eighty-fifth street, last night. The meeting was open to any one interested, and shortly before it convened Haegels gave indications of a record turn-out.

Louis Zahne, who collapsed during his defense of Schnuch at a meeting last week, was reported as having left the city for a ten-day vacation, according to Dr. I. T. Griebel, his physician.

The Italian philologist Graziadio Isaiash Ascoli at the age of sixteen made a distinguished and sensational contribution to philology.

Meanwhile Haegels was getting in numerous telling blows against his opponents. He expected to be in complete control of the Deutscher Beobachter's offices by today when the time expires for Schnuch's men to quit the editorial and business rooms of the Nazi newspaper under the terms of a dispossession notice served last Saturday.

Although one or two Schnuch followers continued to maintain a twenty-four hour vigil in that portion of the publication's headquarters which it still held yesterday, their communication with the outside world was cut off.

Council Chairman Leaves London This Week for Sessions in N. Y.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Recovered from his illness, Sir Osmond D'Avigdor Goldsmid, chairman of the Council of the Jewish Agency, will leave this week for the United States to participate in the sessions of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, which open in New York on December 31.

A number of members of the Executive of the Jewish Agency have already sailed for the New York sessions, which are expected to last three days. This will be the first time an international Jewish body interested in the upbuilding of Palestine will hold its conferences in the United States.

The meeting was called by graduates of New England colleges and professional schools to increase the efficiency and usefulness of the teachers college and to encourage greater self-development of affiliated members.
