BudgetShows Vienna Plight But Is Ready to Help in Other Jewish Affoirs

2,500,000 Schillings Set Aside to Aid Destitute

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, Dec. 20.—Revelatory
of the present state of the once highly prosperous Jewish commun-ity of Vienna is a tentative apity of Vienna is a tentative ap-propriation of 2,50,000 schillingsg obtainings in the preliminary budget of the community organization for the community organization for the comming year for social relief pur-poses. The relief appropriation is the largest single item in the or-ganization's budget of 6,600,000 schillings. It has been made ne-cessary by the growing impover-ishment of the Jews in Vienna, Dartity by reason of separal ecopartly by reason of general eco-nomic conditions and largely as a result of the discriminatory de-crees virtually barring Jews from public office and the professions and restricting their activities in

trade, commerce and the crafts.

Other items on the budget include 600,000 schillings for education. Part of this sum will be used for teaching the Hebrew language to Vienna Jewish youths many of whom are desirous of emigrating to Palestine because of the dark outlook for the future here. Allocation of funds for teaching Hebrew here is a signifi-cant sign of the present state of the Jews of Austria.

Nazis Win Right To Hold Rallies In Union City

But Must Stay Within the Law, Chancery Court Ruling States

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Dec. 20.—

A permanent injunction restraining the mayor and police of Union City, N. J., from prohibiting meet-ings of the Nazi Friends of New Germany was granted today by Vice Chancellor James F. Fielder

Vice chancellor James F. Fielder in Jersey City Chancery Court.

The court ruled that the police of Union City have no right to interfere with the meetings as long as they are lawful, but if the meetings are conducted in an unlawful manner then the police may prosecute under the criminal

Condemns Nazis -Vice Chancellor Fielder severely

condemned the Nazified organiza-tion for anti-Jewish propaganda and for distributing anti-Jewish leaflets. He urged the police to watch the meetings carefully for violation of existing laws.

WARSAW, Dec. 20.—A desperate plea for government intervention in behalf of the destitute Jewish population of Poland was sounded here tonight at a meeting of the Parliament budget committee by Dr. F. Rautenstreich, Jew-ish member of the Sejm.

One in Four Starving

"One out of every four Jews in Warsaw is starving. Fifty per cent of the Jews in the city of Lwow are in the same desperate position and so are thirty per cent of the number of Jews in Lodz and Bialystock."

His appeal for immediate assist-ance for destitute Polish Jewry impressed all but the National Democratic (Endek) anti-govern-ment deputies. The Endeks launchment deputies. The Endelss launched a bitter attack on the government for giving subsidies to the

subscribed by foreign Jewish reiler agencies. A large part of the

merstein complained today in the debate in the budget commission. He blamed the government for the liquidation of the Jewish pub-lic schools in Poland and the withdrawal of rights from Yiddish, Hebrew and artisans schools,

The Jewish deputy also pointed out that university authorities in the medical and law schools were applying a strict numerus clausus against the Jewish students, and that the existing difficulties of the Jewish medical students were being aggravated by the demand that Jewish students dissect only Jewish corpses
