Center Opens Unique Library

Built on Ash Of Nazi Fire In May, 1933

500 of 20,000 Books Burned Included in Collection

From the ashes of a Nazi bonfire in Germany on May 10, 1933, the nucleus of a unique American library has arisen.

On that date 20,000 books were fed to the flames throughout Adolph Hitler's Third Reich, because their authors held and wrote of ideas that were considered inimical to Germany.

Hardly had the ashes of this conflagration cooled than the rest of the world began to set on foot plans to give special honor both to the volumes thus immolated and to their authors.

Paris started such a library. London was not long in following suit.

Brooklyn Center Joins

New York, site of one of the world's greatest collections of books and huge center of publishing activities, was not far behind.

A movement was started to gather together under one roof as many copies of the burned volumes as possible and culminated Saturday night in the dedication ceremonies before a distinguished audience of civic leaders, liberals, clergymen, authors and book-lovers at the Brooklyn Jewish Center.

Started by the Brooklyn Jewish Center, the library will be temporarily housed under its roof at 667 Eastern Parkway until a more central point is found for it in Manhattan.

Notables Commend Project

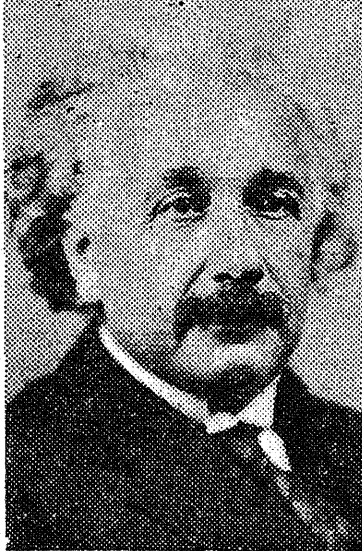
Officials of the Center have expressed the hope that by the time the second anniversary of the Nazi bonfire arrives, May 10, 1935, the library will have on its shelves the full quota of 20,000 books. At the dedication ceremonies there was a total of 500 volumes available.

Official opening of the library was marked by the receipt of many messages from literary notables throughout the world. Among the outstanding greetings are the following sent through the medium of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and The Jewish Daily Bulletin by Bertrand Russell, philosopher, Lion Feuchtwanger, novelist and Andre Gide, Frenchman, known as "the novelist's novelist" because of the flawlessness of his art:

"I send warmest good wishes to Prof. Albert Einstein and Heinz Liepmann, American Library Dinner tomorrow and congratulate the Brooklyn Jewish Center on its valuable effort in inaugurating an American Library for Nazi burnt books. Bertrand Russell."

500 Honor Noted Exiles At Dinner

Prof. Einstein, Heinz Liepmann Guests at Opening

A genial man with an unruly shock of white hair and a smallish chap with flashing brown eyes, to whose other achievements has been added the fact that they are exiles of Hitler's Germany, were to be guests of honor at the dinner Saturday night marking the opening of the American Library of Nazi Banned Books.

Outstanding among the victims of the Nazi regime, the two honored guests were Prof. Albert Einstein, world-renowned scientist, and Heinz Liepmann, author of "Murder—Made in Germany."

Figuratively prepared over the flames of a Nazi bonfire which destroyed 20,000 volumes in Germany nearly two years ago, the dinner attracted a host of notables in the literary, civic, religious and commercial life of the city.

Distinguished Speakers

Among the principal speakers was to be Raymond V. Ingersoll, Borough President of Brooklyn. Louis J. Gribetz, chairman of the banquet committee, was to act as toastmaster.

Other speakers scheduled to address the distinguished list of about 500 diners were Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Edwin Markham, Dr. Will Durant, Rabbi Israel Herbert Levinthal, Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, Dr. Samuel Margoshes and Joseph M. Schwartz, president of the Brooklyn Jewish Center.

How Einstein Spent Day of the Dinner

Escorted From Princeton Home by Rubenstein, Taken to See Anti-War Film

The itinerary to be followed by Prof. Albert Einstein on the day of the dinner at which he and Heinz Liepmann were to be honored was carefully mapped by the committee in charge of arrangements.

Z. H. Rubenstein, city editor of The Day, was to call for the scientist at his home in Princeton, N. J., and escort him to the Criterion Theatre in New York City. At the theatre they were to be met by a reception committee from the Brooklyn Jewish Center and together they will view the anti-war film, "Dealers in Death."

From the theatre, Prof. Einstein was to be driven to the home of David Shapiro in Brooklyn, whose guest he was for the remainder of the afternoon until brought to the Center at 667 Eastern parkway.

Men's Clubs Set Date for Sixth Annual Parley

National Body to Meet in
Lakewood, N. J.,
Feb. 1-3

The sixth annual convention of the National Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs will be held in Lakewood, N. J., February 1, 2 and 3 at Grossman's Hotel, it was announced here Friday by Theodore Charnas, president of the organization.

Men's clubs affiliated with conservative congregations throughout the country will be represented.

The convention will discuss methods by which the clubs can further religious life in their communities, as well as highest ideals of civic life. Adult education, vocational guidance for Jewish youth and strengthening of the Boy Scout movement among the Jewish youth are also on the agenda.

Emphasizing the increasing importance of Jewish men's clubs, Mr. Charnas declared that "the Jewish laity represented in the men's club movement has come to realize that at this time of uncertainty in the Jewish community it must play a more active part in the affairs of Jewry than ever before. The manifest problems confronting Judaism challenge us to place all of our energies towards their solution."

Urge Speeding Of Biro-Bidjan Work Program

Far Eastern Communist
Head Calls Task
'Historic'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW, Dec. 21.—Biro-Bidjan must become a Jewish Soviet Republic in the shortest possible time, M. Lavrentieff, head of the Far Eastern Communist party, declared today in an address before the first All-Biro-Bidjan Soviet Congress, now in session in the town of Biro-Bidjan.

The Communist leader referred to a statement of Michael Kalinin, president of the Soviet Union, in which he said that a Jewish republic must be created within the next eight years.

"It is our historic task to change the Jewish autonomous area into a republic in less time even than was assigned to us," Lavrentieff declared.

Pointing out that the Soviet government had assigned 40,000,000 rubles for work in the autonomous territory in 1935, Lavrentieff declared the area would soon be capable of absorbing large numbers of Jewish workers, "who will build a great Socialist economy, a highly developed national Jewish culture,

and will change the area from a wilderness to a flourishing republic."

Last night's session was the occasion for an enthusiastic demonstration by local inhabitants in honor of the congress. The newly written "Biro-Bidjan March" was played and aroused great enthusiasm.

The Jew has witnessed during the course of his existence the extremes of light and darkness, happiness and sorrow, freedom and slavery, richness and poverty, glory and infamy, of power and of debility.

Guild Chooses Riskin Picture As Best of Year

'It Happened One Night'
Authored by Former
N. Y. Playwright

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Dec. 21.—Robert Riskin was honored by the Screen Writers' Guild today as the author of the best film play of the year, "It Happened One Night." The picture, a tale of hitch-hiking, was directed by Frank Capra for Columbia Pictures. Starring Clark Gable and Claudette Colbert, it was one of the biggest hits of the year both from box office and critical points of view.

Riskin, a former playwright in New York, has of late been a singularly successful screen writer. His most recent release is "Broadway Bill," an adaptation of the original story by Mark Hellinger. He is also the author of the screen

version of "Lady for a Day," the first of the Damon Runyon stories to reach the screen.

The selection of "It Happened One Night" as the outstanding piece of film writing of the year was made by Riskin's colleagues of the Screen Writers' Guild.

LET'S TAKE STOCK!

By ABEL BORDEN

(The following is the first of four articles outlining American Jewry at work today. "Abel Borden" is the pseudonym of a well-known American-Jewish writer. The second article will appear tomorrow.

I.

There are 4,228,000 Jews in these United States. They have furnished the nation with two Justices of the United States Supreme Court, three Governors of States, eleven members of the House of Representatives, a Secretary of the Treasury and a host of other important officials.

But there has not been found a successor of the late Louis Marshall as the voice and conscience of the Jewish people.

There are at least one hundred national Jewish organizations which claim to be representative of large segments of the American-Jewish population.

All Represent Minorities

Yet not one of these organizations actually represents more than a trifling minority. Not one of these organizations is truly national or representative of more than a few closely associated groups or individuals.

The voice of four million Jews is not clear and distinct. It is a babel of conflicting shouts, bellows and murmurs.

America has more and finer synagogues than any section of Jewry since the fall of Jerusalem. Her synagogues compare architecturally with the houses of worship of all other faiths.

Rabbis Review Plays

But the synagogue is a negligible factor and its influence on the younger generations is minute in most instances. Its rabbis furnish book reviews, theatre criticisms

and political advice from the rostrum of the pulpit, give lectures on the Dionne quintuplets, the NRA and the munitions inquiry, competing with the Washington correspondents and the editorial writers. They have press agents and publicity directors to fight for space in the papers against actresses and athletes, evangelists and radio stars.

And they come out second best. The youngsters go to the movies and the parents play bridge.

For years now, we have heard dire warnings regarding the fate of Jewish youth. The young ones are falling away from the flock, they are being seduced into the Communist fold, they are growing into maturity without the proper religious and educational background.

'Y' Rents Its Hall

Yet in the city of Hartford, Connecticut, with a Jewish population of 28,000—most of them in moderate or fairly wealthy circumstances—young Jews have no place to congregate and their Y. M. H. A. organization must meet around in rented halls.

With all the solemn warnings that Jewish young men and women are over-crowding the professions and are disproportionately filling the white-collar stratum, no intelligent effort is under way to correct this. The country boasts one institution—the National Farm School—which teaches the dignity of manual labor and trains the young Jew for tilling the soil right here in the United States.

What's wrong with the Jews! They recognize many of the dangers that beset them, they preach against them and warn against them. But they do nothing else about them. And many of the grave dangers (not Hitler who has done more to bring the Jews out of a fool's paradise than all the Jewish leaders) go unheeded.

City to Slice Veal Itself, Mayor Says

Politely Refuses Offer of Aid By Butchers' Union on Meat for Poor

Mayor LaGuardia on Friday politely rejected the offer of the Hebrew Butcher Workers' Union to place at the city's disposal 100 skilled butchers to prepare the 11,000,000 pounds of veal stored in the Bronx Terminal Market for the relief of the city's poor.

In a letter to Joseph Belsky, secretary of the union, the Mayor stated that the Welfare Department has found itself able to handle the situation adequately

and cut 500,000 pounds of the meat a week.

"If at some future time," the Mayor's letter said, "an emergency situation should arise the city will be very glad to avail itself of your proffered assistance."

The purpose of the conference, according to an announcement by Aldermanic President Bernard S. Deutsch, who is chairman of the conference committee, will be to organize Bronx Jewry in support of the enlarged program of the Zionist Organization of America in behalf of the development of Palestine.

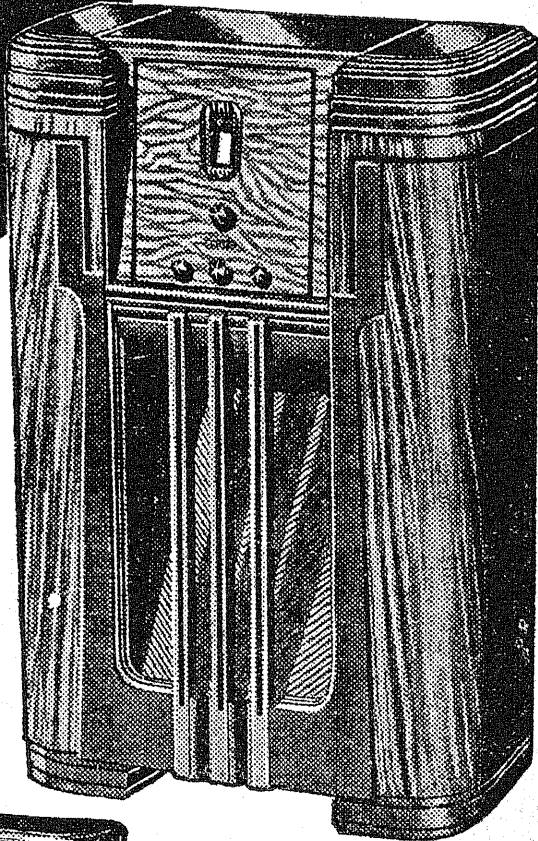

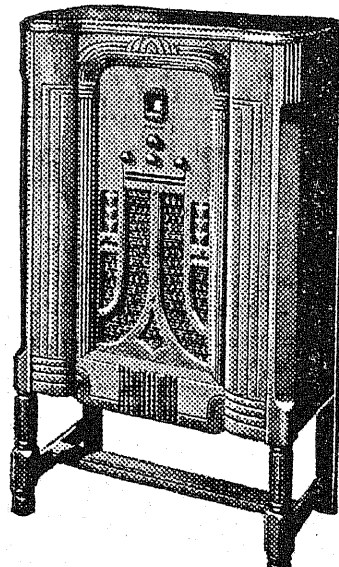
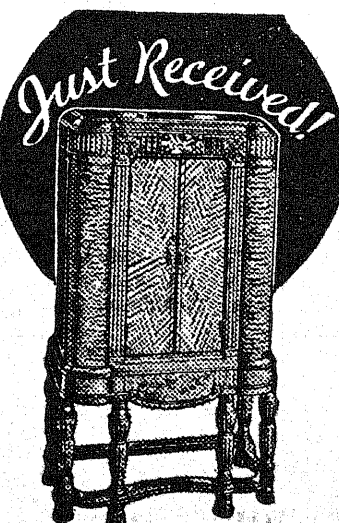

A Large Grant

The grant of \$1,500,000 by the American Joint Reconstruction Foundation in Paris for constructive relief in various European countries is a result of the increasing difficulties which the Jews in these nations are now facing.

Only recently the Polish directors of the Joint Distribution Committee made a special trip to Paris with a report on the precarious position of the Polish Jews. At about the same time a Jewish delegation was sent to Paris from Austria to acquaint the leaders of the Foundation with the urgent need of Austrian Jewry.

These delegations had no difficulty in convincing directors of the Foundation of the necessity to assign special sums for constructive relief activities, it seems from the present decision.

The American Joint Reconstruction Foundation, which plays a big role in Jewish life in Europe, is now in the tenth year of its existence. It was brought into life by the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Colonization Association in May, 1924, to carry on certain of the reconstruction activities in which both organizations had separately been interested. Its chief work is in stimulating, assisting and financing Jewish credit cooperatives.

The Foundation operates not only in all parts of Europe but also in Turkey and in Palestine. Its financial resources are provided entirely by the JDC and the ICA. Each of these organizations has a number of representatives on the board of directors, which also includes representatives of Jewish communities of European countries.

The work of the Foundation has been especially appreciated in all parts of Poland, in Rumania and in the Baltic countries. Now this work has been extended to Germany and Austria.

The funds just assigned by the Foundation indicate that the directors realize the economic plight of the European Jews. The news about the new credits will be received with enthusiasm especially by the Jews of Poland and Austria, for whom the major proportion of the credits will probably go.

A WEEK'S EVENTS IN REVIEW

Is a World Jewish Congress necessary?

This issue, which is keenly watched by many Jewish communities abroad, for whom the Congress is chiefly intended, was clarified this week, when the American Jewish Committee and the B'nai B'rith, the two leading American-Jewish organizations, definitely rejected the offer of the American Jewish Congress to join the movement for the convocation of a World Jewish parley.

Both the American Jewish Committee and the B'nai B'rith are cooperating with the American Jewish Congress in a Joint Council comprising representatives of these three organizations, which confers on all matters common to Jewish interests.

In the question of convoking a World Jewish Congress, these two organizations do not, however, see their way to join the movement for many reasons, chief of which is that such a congress may bring more harm than good.

Disagree on Congress As Proper Body

Those who are acquainted with the serious position of the Jews in the countries of Central and Eastern Europe as well as in the Balkan and Baltic states, would perhaps approve of the well-intentioned movement for the establishment of a central world body to fight for Jewish rights. They would, however, hesitate to agree that this institution should necessarily be a congress. Much better results could perhaps be achieved if this projected body were created in the form of an international Jewish committee dealing with Jewish problems silently, without the noise which a congress usually provokes. Such an international body could consist of representatives of the existing central Jewish organizations and could be formed along the same lines as the Advisory Council to James G. MacDonald, the League's High Commissioner for Refugees from Germany.

See Little Hope for Parley in 1935

With the American Jewish Committee rejecting the idea of a World Jewish Congress, it is difficult to believe that this project will be reached in 1935 as scheduled. In addition to the

outspokenly negative attitude taken by the non-Zionists in leading organizations throughout the world, the Zionist attitude towards a world congress is also less than favorable. Certain elements in the Zionist movement are afraid that the world Jewish congress may develop competition to the World Zionist Congress. They would, therefore, not like to see another world Jewish body established. Especially since this new body could claim to be the representative all-world Jewish organization.

Opposed by both the Zionists and the non-Zionists, the idea of a World Jewish Congress hardly stands a chance. The situation becomes even more complicated when considering that in most of the European countries democratic elections to a World Jewish Congress are absolutely impossible.

Situation in Poland, Austria Grows Worse

While the pros and cons of the World Jewish Congress are being discussed, the situation of the Jews in Poland and in Austria is growing more and more catastrophic and this week reached the point where it overshadowed even the Jewish situation in Germany.

In Austria a new trade law went into effect this week depriving 10,000 Jewish salesmen and peddlers and their families of their livelihood, by forbidding them to call on customers to take orders. This wholesale blow to Jewish traders is one of the many which are undermining the Jewish economic existence in a quiet but most efficient manner. Similar laws were promulgated only a few weeks ago, making it impossible for Jews to open any enterprise, whether commercial or artisan.

With the process of segregating Jewish school children completed, the dismissal of Jewish doctors from municipal institutions in Austria continued this week, the number of dismissed Jewish doctors now totalling more than 300.

Protest on Visas Held Justified

It is, therefore, no wonder that the Jews of Austria now consider their position worse than that of the Jews in Germany. This was pointed out this week in a protest which

they sent to the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency. In this protest the Zionist Federation of Austria complains that the number of immigration certificates for Palestine granted for Austrian Jews by the Executive is altogether too small in view of the desperate position of Austrian Jewry. The Federation considers it unfair that the Executive, allocating 1,250 immigration certificates for German Jews, has given no more than 117 immigration certificates for the Jews of Austria. This number is even smaller than the number of certificates granted to each of such small countries as Latvia, Lithuania and Czechoslovakia.

A similar complaint was addressed to the Palestine Executive from Poland, where the situation of the Jews is becoming more and more unbearable.

Rottenstreich's Speech Before Sejm

Addressing the Polish Parliament this week, Dr. Rottenstreich, one of the Jewish deputies, gave a heartbreaking picture of the Jewish situation in Poland which surpassed even the one given a few weeks ago by Dr. Joshua Thon. While Dr. Thon stated in general that a million Polish Jews have been degraded to beggary, Dr. Rottenstreich, one of the best economists in Poland, went into details to impress upon the Polish Parliament a more concrete picture of Jewish despair.

Dr. Rottenstreich said that in most of the cities in Poland sixty per cent of the Jewish population is compelled to apply for charity. Even in such a large city as Lwow fifty per cent of the Jews are starving. In Warsaw, he said, every fourth Jew is reduced to beggary and in Lodz and other industrial cities the proportion of destitute Jews is even larger.

Some for Bureya, Most for Palestine

Exposed to hunger and starvation, the Polish Jews are seeking their way, on one side to Palestine and on the other to Biro-Bidjan. The number of Polish Jews ready to migrate to Biro-Bidjan is today quite large, while those desiring to go to Palestine can be counted in hundreds of thousands.

In Palestine, the situation became somewhat complicated this

week when the government granted immigration certificates for Arabs from Syria and Egypt to enter Palestine for permanent residence and labor. This is the first such instance and sets a precedent for legal entry of Arabs from neighboring countries with the intention of becoming citizens of Palestine. This precedent, if converted into a permanent feature in the immigration program of the Palestine government, will mean that the Palestine administration intends not to permit the Jews ever to become a majority in Palestine. It may also lead to the legalization of Arabs who enter the country illegally.

64,000 Arabs Entered Illegally

Should the last be the case, the population of Palestine may be increased by at least 60,000 new Arab citizens. Figures compiled on the illegal immigration of Arabs to Palestine show that not less than 64,000 Arabs have entered Palestine illegally from Syria, from the Sinai desert and from other neighboring countries.

Another anti-Jewish feature in the policy of the Palestine government was registered this week when the government approved a special loan for Transjordan from the surplus which Palestine has acquired chiefly from Jewish income. The news of this loan came as a surprise to those who know that the Palestine government has never been keen on issuing loans for Jewish interests.

Only recently the municipality of Tel Aviv, in need of a loan, had to obtain this loan from London financiers. Similarly the Jewish Agency obtained a loan this week, but not from the Palestine government.

See Further Concessions

The exception which the Palestine government has made in granting a loan to Transjordan, coupled with the issuance of visas to Arabs from Syria and Egypt, is indicative of the liberal policy which the Palestine government has now adopted towards the Arabs. It gives ground to believe that the Palestine government has up its sleeve some further concessions for Arabs, of which the Jewish world will probably soon learn.

The new loan obtained by the Jewish Agency this week is for \$2,500,000, repayable within fifteen years at four per cent interest. It was granted by the Lloyd Bank of London and will be used to consolidate the outstanding debts of the Keren Hayesod and the Palestine Executive.

Though the loan could be considered one of the best achievements for Palestine, it was nevertheless received in Palestine with mixed feelings. While many hailed the loan as a sign of recognition of the stability of Palestine, certain groups, including general Zionists and Mizrachists, have expressed the opinion that the present Zionist Executive had no right to mortgage the incomes of the Keren Hayesod and its properties for a period of fifteen years, since this will create difficulties for the Executives to be elected later.

THE AMERICAN SCENE

The Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities wound up its career at Washington last week in a red flurry in which it apparently forgot its main purpose—to get at the bottom of the Nazi propaganda situation here. Taking a lead from Ham Fish's notebook, the committee went off on the Communist chase toward which Nazi publicists such as George Sylvester Viereck had tried to direct it from the very first.

The committee, the term of which expires January 3, is now engaged in drawing up its report for presentation to the House or Representatives. In the period of its existence the probers brought to light much information concerning subversive activities by Nazis in this country and some interesting data on the spread of anti-Semitic propaganda by our own native-born bigots. It was unfortunate that the committee hearings frequently were something less than decorous and that its members

permitted them often to degenerate to the level of a farce. Several constructive measures to check the spread of racial prejudice here by alien agitators can, however, be offered by the committee in its report on the basis of its investigations. It is to be hoped that these will not be overlooked in the hue and cry over the "red menace."

The Barter Pact

Secretary of State Hull, as indicated by his recent Nashville speech opposing barter agreements to develop international trade, put his foot down hard on the agreement reached by George N. Peek of the Import-Export Bank for a thirty million dollar barter deal with Germany, and the deal was reported on the verge of collapse, well-nigh buried.

Although the agreement is now in Peek's hand for revision, the firmness of Secretary Hull's opposition to that type of agreement, as well as his squeamishness regarding further financial transactions with Germany in view of her tactics toward Am-

erican creditors, made it appear definite that American citizens opposed to the Hitler regime would not be forced into the position of giving it financial support by any action of their government.

A Nazi Falling-out

Yorkville presented an interesting spectacle last week as two Nazi factions fought it out for control of the Friends of New Germany organization. In the course of the battle, a few skulls were cracked and shins bruised, and much dirty linen was washed in public.

Anton Haegle, a Nazi extremist, booted the National leaders of the movement out of control in New York, seized the official organ of the bund and accused his adversaries of playing high and mighty with their positions and with the funds of the Friends.

The fight for leadership revealed again that profits are to be found in Jew-baiting and that it is not necessarily devotion to Hitler that makes a man a good Nazi.

At the Crossroads

IT IS true that we are at the cross-roads. We will either as a people tread the way of the auto-emancipation and cooperate with liberals and Christians toward the creation of the pluralist and pacifist state or be plunged for ages into chaos. But there is another and a false dilemma being placed before the Jewish people. For this second choice I deliberately use the shabby word dilemma, since it is indeed a choice having two murderous horns on either of which we are doomed to be gored to death. Crudely and briefly, that false dilemma runs thus: To escape Fascism we must embrace Communism.

The proposing of this dilemma and of this choice is defeatist and therefore un-Jewish; it is un-historical and an act of treachery against civilization itself and therefore un-Jewish; it is Jewish only in the low and grovelling sense that under Fascism we lose the body but may save the soul while under Communism we can save our skins but must sell out completely to a red assimilation. God knows that I, too, have literally passed sleepless nights of fever agonized over the fate of our people in Germany and in Poland and I am glad that the famine-stricken people, a few thousands at least, can go from Poland to Biro-Bidjan. Living Jews are better than dead Jews.

Where there is no hope, none at all, not of naked life, even a desperate remedy is a remedy. But it is inexcusable, it is an act of the most sordid treachery to the Jewish people, to America, to such hopes of a humane civilization as America still holds out, to propose that dilemma to the Jews and to the Jewish youth of America. (Once and for all let us nail to the door-post of history the lie that Marxian dialectic materialism and the society built according to it have anything to do with the innate prophetic radicalism of the Jewish people.

Our radicalism means peace within society and between societies; it means the widest flexibility and tolerance; it means justice in the form of a tireless understanding and mercy to all men as men, as sons of Adam.

What has the dark and rigid fundamentalist tyranny of the Soviets, with its proscriptions and "liquidations," its brutal heresy-hunts, its complete annihilation of all the expressive forces of man to do with prophetic radicalism? We have not been brought so low in America that we must sell out Isaiah for a Soviet bread-card.

I AM moved to make these observations by an article in the January number of Harper's Magazine called "Jews at the Crossroads" by William Zuckerman. The article is ably and carefully calculated to arouse Fascist anti-Semitism; it "saves face" before the Gentile world by a single kindly paragraph about "simple Jewish folk"; it re-stamps into the Gentile consciousness every subtle and deadly misunderstanding concerning the Jewish people and then proceeds to announce that the Jewish people is about to make common cause with those who would not only—that would be a bagatelle—substitute a cooperative for a competitive economy, but who would tear up by its very roots that historical civilization with all its values which still exists among us and for the defense of which thousands of pacifists and liberals and friends of mankind, both Christian and Jew, are dying in Italy and Germany and Poland and Russia. (I have been told that it is part of Communist tactics to hasten the coming of Fascism in order that the foretold subsequent dictatorship of the proletariat may also be hastened.)

Mr. Zuckerman sticks pretty closely to the common slanders. There is anti-Semitism in Poland because the Jews cling closely to their religion and their folk-ways; he admits the servile character of ultra-assimilationism but concludes that even in New York, London and Paris assimilationism hasn't gone far enough. We still live within "invisible Ghetto walls." (This after admitting to what extent the assimilationist will sell out. Who, then, keeps these invisible Ghetto walls in repair?) In italics he places the whole onus on us: We, we have broken the "natural laws of normal social relationship."

That accounts, I suppose, for the cry: *Juden raus!* and for quotas in educational institutions and for the whole net-work of social and economic exclusion. *We* have caused it. But that is not all. According to Mr. Zuckerman we have invented and are responsible for Fascist "racism" because as a people we have opposed inter-marriage. He is, of course, perfectly aware of the entirely different kinds of motives which have caused that policy. If he is capable of this conscious perversion he will next begin to talk of a Jewish world-conspiracy and the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. Last comes the *salus mortale* which negates flatly all his previous arguments and substitutes a new fallacy for the old: "Anti-Semitism is but a form of economic unrest."

But we thought it was caused by a separatism and by our breaking the laws of "normal social relationship"? When both Jews and Christians were slaughtered for not worshiping the busts of the deified emperors of Rome, was that also a form of economic unrest?

Our enemy in America today is less Pelley and fellows of his kidney than the Communist *saboteurs* who confirm the wrong suspicions of higher types and inflame the yokels' passion for demonology.

Dr. Honor Misquoted

To the Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin: The report of the address delivered by Dr. Leo L. Honor of Chicago at the Jewish Religious Teachers' Conference held in Washington, November 30-December 2, which appeared in the Dec. 5th issue of The Bulletin was both inaccurate and misleading.

I cannot understand how anyone who heard his address and heard his stirring interpretation of the Exodus story in which he indicated the great ethical content which our people in the past extracted from this experience and which our teachers must convey to their students, I repeat, I cannot understand how anyone could have made the comments that were contained in the press report.

What he did say, is that the Bible stories, because they contain such profound religious teachings, ought not to be used merely as story material in the lower grades where their spiritual values cannot possibly be appreciated, but rather that they should be reserved for the higher grades where they can be discussed and understood adequately, and where their inspirational character can be a very important character-building influence.

Maud Nathan Can Look Back On Life of Splendid Endeavor

Social Welfare Fighter Comes From Distinguished Family

When Hans Andersen, beloved Danish poet, grew old, he wrote in wonder and gratitude: "My life was a beautiful fairy-tale; so rich, so full of color."

Maud Nathan (Mrs. Frederick Nathan), looking back upon a long life of splendid endeavor and success, can say the same thing; indeed, she has said it most enchantingly in a book of memoirs "Once Upon a Time and Today" that has all the flavor and mellowness of a ripe fruit sweetened in sunshine. A second book of hers, "The Story of an Epoch Making Movement," dealing with the founding and the development of the Consumers' League, is likewise full of dramatic interest, and perhaps the most thrilling contribution to the economic history of our times.

Mrs. Nathan, daughter of an old Spanish-Portuguese family, whose ancestors settled in America in 1654, inherited from her forbears not only worldly goods, but cultural treasures which she has guarded jealously. Many great and good men and women have been members of this distinguished family—one of them is United States Supreme Court Justice Benjamin Nathan Cardozo, and Maud Nathan holds a worthy place among her illustrious relations.

Aided Working Girls

Married very young to a cousin whose unflinching love and sympathy enriched her life, meeting the most brilliant minds, the most fashionable members of American and European society, no one would have wondered had she become merely a worldly society leader. Yet always she had a clear eye for social injustice and the moral courage to protest against them. When tragedy darkened her days and she lost her only child, she did not selfishly bury herself in her grief, but devoted her life to the task of making this world of ours a better place to live in.

Though always strongly conscious of her Jewish heritage and proud to belong to a race that has given the world the first conception of ethical duties toward stranger as well as neighbor, she did not limit her activities to purely Jewish causes. There was not one worthy movement, political, philanthropic or economic, to which she did not give generous help and support, though the Consumers' League of which she is honorary

president is perhaps nearest to her heart.

Through this League she was instrumental in bettering the lot of the working girl, in abolishing child-labor and the menace of the sweat-shop, and in insuring for the saleswomen in department stores reasonable hours, a half-holiday in summer, and the privilege to rest between sales.

With National Council

In the Jewish philanthropic field Mrs. Nathan was and is most closely allied with the National Council of Jewish Women. The New York Section of the Council, of which Mrs. Nathan is an honorary vice-president, celebrates this year the fortieth anniversary of its inception, and Mrs. Nathan tells fascinating tales of the early days of Council activities when the social welfare worker went over to Blackwell's Island in an open boat to bring cheer and succor to the unfortunates there.

Equally interesting is her description of the work done by the Council in the cause of religious education, the protection and Americanization of immigrants, the physical and moral regeneration of the unmarried mother which culminated in the Lakeview Home, the probation work in Night Court as well as the various female penal institutions.

What Mrs. Nathan specially values in the work of the National Council of Jewish Women is the fact that it is never static but always dynamic. It never becomes standardized but always moves on to new problems and is continually ready to meet new social and political conditions with new methods of endeavor. "We give the necessary impetus," says Mrs. Nathan, "and when once the movement is established we leave it to others to continue the routine."

Women Look Up to Her

At present the Council is occupied with three main projects: settlement work in The Bronx, centering around the Council House at 1122 Forest avenue; the Service for Foreign Born at 1776 Broadway where the German refugee situation is handled with competence and sympathy, and finally the work on Welfare Island, where, as the official organization appointed by the City, the New York Section directs the activities of the Jews in the City Home and Hospitals.

When Mrs. Nathan was graduating from high school, she was chosen salutatorian and her essay was written around the title: "Awake, 'tis day!" This choice of topic was not accidental; it represented her inmost nature which always urged her to be awake and to work for social bet-

Sabotage

By ABBA HILLEL SILVER

MUCH is happening in Naziland behind the cloak of secrecy and censorship which points to a steady disintegration of the National Socialist Party and to the abandonment of nearly all of the twenty-five points of its famous "unalterable" program. A second purge, less bloody than the first, but under the same pretext of cleansing the party of its moral pervers, is on. The Reichswehr is determined to reduce both the S. S. and the S. A. to a position of political impotence— and the Reichswehr is now in the saddle. Opposition to the policies of Ruhrized Hitler who has thrown overboard every article of the Nazi platform (except its anti-Semitism) and has left it nothing but the chauvinist rhapsody which has turned sour—is being ruthlessly suppressed but cannot be destroyed.

The economics of Nazism which had such a large element of Socialism in it went down to final defeat at the hands of that stalwart champion of old-time capitalism (with all of its knavery and jockeyship)—the present financial dictator of Germany, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht. The symbol of this defeat is the elimination and total eclipse of Gottfried Feder, the real papa of Nazi economics, the author of that famous antithesis of "raffen-des" and "schaffendes" capital, which so enthralled the mind of Hitler. They made Feder ride in a tumbrel to a dry guillotine. . . .

GERMAN stock exchanges and banks have not been nationalized nor have the great trusts. The profits of the large concerns in Germany have not been distributed. "Interest slavery" has not been outlawed. Even the department stores remain. The economic salvation which the Nazis promised the German people has not materialized. Unemployment has not been abolished nor reduced, only camouflaged. Wages have fallen sharply. The cost of living has risen. Germany's export trade is crippled. Her shortage of raw materials is menacing.

The German people are coming to realize that the great national awakening by which they had been beguiled has turned out to be a miserable coup at their own expense and in the interest of their age-old unconscionable exploiters. Some day soon the real national awakening will take place in Germany and an outraged and embittered people will arise in its unleashed wrath and wreak its vengeance upon its lying prophets, the physical and intellectual pervers who misled them and all the bloody hirelings of Junkerdom and big business who tricked, robbed and degraded them—and terrible will be that day of reckoning! . . .

THAT day is sure to come; and all those, within and without Germany, who help to undermine that unspeakable regime are making a major contribution to civilization. The economic pressure upon Germany by way of an organized, directed and intensified world-wide economic boycott is the surest way of undermining this regime. Those who directly or indirectly, by word or act, contribute to any relaxation of this economic pressure are rendering a distinct dis-service to the cause of civilization.

A favorite dodge among certain Jewish leaders who want to provide themselves with an accident insurance policy in their fight against Hitlerism is to proclaim a distinction between an unorganized, unofficial and private boycott which in their minds is legitimate and praiseworthy and an organized boycott which is altogether blameworthy and which should be abandoned.

To some this may appear as subtle and profound diplomacy. In reality it is nothing but a camouflage for cold feet. . . . It is sheer futile and swivel-chair dialectics. You cannot fight Hitlerism with hushed and muted indignation and with little private pinpricks when nobody is looking. . . . The only

real difference is the one between an effective and a non-effective boycott! A private, unorganized, undirected boycott is sure to be ineffective. An organized, planned and directed boycott might be effective.

IF A man is so greatly persuaded that a boycott of Nazi Germany is morally justified and politically wise that he "will not buy five cents worth of German goods," then he certainly should want to tell others about it. He should not keep it hidden as a great secret in his bosom. He should want to explain to everyone why it is necessary to boycott German goods. He should seek to merge his single act with those of others into a powerful collective action which might get results.

It is not clear how an organized boycott "interferes with the commercial transactions of one's country" and indicates that one has permitted "his emotions as a Jew to interfere with his duty as an American citizen," while a private, unorganized and whispering boycott, if effective, does not "interfere with the commercial transactions of one's country" and does not indicate that one has allowed his emotions as a Jew to "interfere with his duty as an American citizen." This stale, "patriotic" argument, has the smell of Captain Max Neumann about it. . . .

We are in the midst of a war! Nazism has declared war upon us in every part of the world. It is out to destroy us politically, economically and socially. It is pouring its poison gas over all the habitations of Israel. World Jewry has established its front line of defense—just as England has—on the Rhine. . . . We must fight it out along that line if it takes a generation. We must stand in the muck and the cold, the filth and the nastiness of this war which is not of our choosing until Nazism is destroyed. Jewish leaders would do well not to stab our fighting forces in the back. . . .

OF COURSE our principal defense lies in our appeal to the fundamental concepts of justice, freedom and human equality. But when these are brutally rejected in one country or another and our rights are trampled under foot, those countries must know that we will not lightly surrender our hard-won rights. We will do more than appeal. We will fight back with every means which the law of life and of survival makes mandatory upon self-respecting men. Our persecutors must learn that they will not escape unscathed.

It is intolerable that fifteen million people should everlastingly be made the easy victims of the hired agents of decaying economic classes, or the charlatans of special privilege, or of embittered chauvinists or of breeds of excitable morons whom the Ho-jo-to-ho

Tells Mother's Side of Raising A Boy Prodigy

It's No Bed of Roses, Mrs. Musikonsky Informs Writer

Child prodigies are in the news again. One of the greatest, and certainly one of the most successful of them, Yehudi Menuhin, and his twelve-year-old sister Hephzibah, who recently made a successful debut as a pianist in London appeared this week in a joint recital in New York.

Recently, the newspapers were filled with stories about two unknown Jewish prodigies, possessors of amazing I. Q's, the letters being the abbreviation for the well-known psychological test given as a measure for intelligence. The ratings of these youngsters would place them above Albert Einstein in intelligence.

About a month ago, young Grisha Goluboff played a \$100,000 Stradivarius on a national radio program sponsoring an automobile. And a week ago, eleven-year-old Paul Musikonsky gave his third New York violin recital—his third violin recital at the age of eleven. This youngster had made his debut at the age of nine. There are other prodigies, too. Reviewing a concert given by three of them, Samuel Chotzinoff, well-known music critic, had the following to say:

"This may not be an age of musical creativeness, but it is certainly rich in wunderkinder. So numerous and so extraordinary are child prodigies these days that any aspirant for a virtuoso career who is past the age of nine can hardly hope to interest the public."

It was thus that I welcomed the opportunity of interviewing Mrs. Abraham Musikonsky. I was interested in finding out the whys and wherefores of prodigies. Her first statement astounded! "Child prodigies," she said, "are not all glamor and profits as the world seems to think."

We were seated in the comfortable living room of the Musikonsky's. Paul, a chunky dark-haired youngster, sat in one corner nervously eyeing the writer as she conversed with his mother. He was a perfect example of what the well-mannered young man should be. Quiet, attentive and respectful, he joined in the conversation only when addressed. When he spoke, it was full mouthed and well-phrased. Sure of himself, his composure was pleasant to behold. There was nothing irritating about his precociousness, a fact that was readily discernable even before I discovered that, despite the time he devoted to his violin, he had successfully passed the Board of Education's requirements for a grammar school diploma.

Parents' Sacrifices There was an undeniable pride in Mrs. Musikonsky's voice as she spoke about Paul. "The world," she continued, "little realizes what parents give up when a child of theirs is an artist of one sort or another. People think it is all headlines, wonderful publicity and amazing profits. Well, there is some pleasure in the publicity but as for profits, we're not even thinking of them. As a matter of

of irresponsible propagandists turns into pogromists.

Soviet Encyclopedia Lists Work Of I. L. Peretz in Special Article

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW.—The eighth volume of the Soviet Literary Encyclopedia, just issued, devotes more than four columns to I. L. Peretz, who is described as one of the classic writers of Yiddish literature. There is also a full-page portrait of him.

The article, written by Prof. Nusinoff, is one of the few essays listed in the table of contents, where it appears under the head of "Special Articles."

The volume also contains appreciations of S. Nigam, M. J. Olgin, J. Opatoshu, Ber Orshansky, Nahum Auslander and S. Persoff, all distinguished Jewish literary figures.

Prof. Nusinoff's account tells of Peretz as a short story writer, playwright and poet, as well as an

active social worker. It stresses in particular the period when he turned to the working masses, expressed in his works, "In the Cellar," "Bontze Shweig," and "The Three Seamstresses."

Peretz was at fault in viewing things from the viewpoint of the class doomed to disappear, the article says. In the period of the 1905 revolution, Prof. Nusinoff writes, Peretz stood close to the revolutionary movement, lectured to workers and tried to create a Labor University.

In later years he expressed his sympathy with the labor movement and socialism but, according to the account of the professor, the leading motives in Peretz's work are petty bourgeois humanism and Jewishness.

"But Peretz had a colossal influence on Yiddish literature and the whole of Jewish culture in his time. He was an exceptionally bold and clear creative personality, and is still today deserving of study."

"Critics," said Mrs. Musikonsky, "often condemn a parent for allowing a child to perform in public. They call the parents 'hungry.' This, though, is not the case. Both Mr. Musikonsky and myself have but one hope, that is of making Paul a great artist. Financial rewards will come later, they will come of their own accord."

"The reason Paul gives public concerts is that it is a part of his musical education. When he grows up, and is the great artist that we hope he will be, he will not be afraid of an audience, that is the reason Paul gives concerts today. If we were to keep him playing in private until he is eighteen, and then make a debut, he would not do justice to himself. All teachers realize this. That is the reason so many young artists give recitals these days. The reason, most assuredly, is not to make profits. Ask me, I know."

Eats Spinach I was interested in learning the daily program of a child soloist. Does he play? How long does he rehearse? Does he eat spinach? In other words, is he a normal youngster? I asked all these questions of Mrs. Musikonsky.

"It tells to surprise people when I tell them that Paul is a normal child," she replied. "They seem to be of the opinion that a prodigy should be something apart. That belief seems to be just as much a part of the American credo as the one about all artists being temperamental."

CRITICAL MOMENTS

SCREEN

The week preceding Christmas is usually a theatrical interlude. Most of New York spends its days pushing in and out of department stores and by evening the energy to go to the theatre has been left in the shops. This year was no exception to the rule and Broadway was quiet. There were three openings—but these plays were started so as to be ready to catch the crowds which will clutter up Broadway this coming week. Katherine Cornell, who has been touring the country for nearly a year, returned to give "Romeo and Juliet" at the Martin Beck. Ina Claire, one of our better comedienettes, opened in "Ode to Liberty" at the Lyceum. This in an adaptation of the great French success "Liberte Provisoire." The third opening was "The Sky's The Limit" but I fear that it will not survive the arrival of Santa Claus.

Mighty Barnum
And Gene Fowler

For the first time, cinema patrons have a chance to read the script of a film before they go to see it. "The Mighty Barnum," which opened at the Rivoli on Saturday, was produced by Twentieth Century Pictures and released through United Artists but before it was shown to the public, Covici, Friede issued the scenario of the film in book form. Having read the script and seen the picture I can report that "The Mighty Barnum" is, for sheer entertainment, in a class by itself.

But before telling you more about this picturization of the life of America's greatest showman, I must have a word about its author, Gene Fowler. This tall gray-thatched Westerner, who looks as though he would have made a swell football end, is the most disturbing writer in America today. Whether he turns his hand to writing novels, biographies, plays or scenarios, the results invariably cause a furor. Critics refuse to take Fowler calmly. Either they praise him with glowing adjectives or pan him with violence. No matter what he does, critics either say that he could or should have done better or that he was the only man who could write the work in question.

—Fowler and Shaw?

When "The Mighty Barnum" was published in book form, his publishers compared his footnotes to those of George Bernard Shaw. Wham! Down jumped some of the critics stating that such a comparison was not only odious but an outrage. Yet one of these fellows who objected strenuously, turned around and wrote an essay comparing Shakespeare's career to that of Fowler's. Another columnist thought that Shaw was the wrong name with which to link Fowler's, he suggested that Rabelais was a better measuring standard.

Fowler also has trouble in making his critics realize what he is trying to do. In his introduction to "The Mighty Barnum," he very plainly writes, "it violates most of the canons of literature and kicks history squarely in the groin. It seeks to create and sustain a mood in consonance with an era of pioneer showmanship." You would imagine that after such a statement critics would not then greedily point out the imaginative phases of Barnum's life that Fowler injected into his script. Nevertheless, Fowler is called to account and accused of carelessness. Those who found fault do not realize that the picture was written to entertain and not to educate and the entertainment value came first.

"The Mighty Barnum" needs no apologies. It is a rollicking, exciting lively film ably acted by Wallace Beery, Adolph Menjou

and Janet Beecher. Barnum (Beery) is first shown running a grocery store but buying freaks instead of selling merchandise. His wife (Janet Beecher) wants him to go back to Connecticut. She is disgusted and gives him the money to pay his debts but Barnum, aided by a drunken newspaper man (Menjou), rents a building which he turns into a museum of oddities. He is immediately successful and all is well until he imports the bearded lady. New York refuses to accept her as anything but a man and when Barnum tries to prove her sex he is nearly lynched because a rival promoter has bribed the lady into allowing him to act as her substitute. Barnum thinks he is licked but in walks the famous midget, General Tom Thumb, and Barnum is again a success. He is at the top of the world but after a fiasco with Jenny Lind, with whom he things he is in love, he loses all that he owns, including his wife who returns to her home in New England. How he is finally rescued from his downfall by his former freaks and how his star once again rides high because of an elephant, makes this one of the most enjoyable films of the year.

"The Mighty Barnum" is lifted above the ordinary run of pictures by the sparkling pointed dialogue supplied by Mr. Fowler. When the bearded lady sorry for her trickery to Barnum wants to convince him of her sincerity she says as a final shot: "Look at the gray hairs in my beard—just from remorse." Such humor is not of the stale trite Hollywood variety. It is something a little different, slightly pathetic yet humorous.

As Barnum, Wallace Beery is pictured as a great oaf, an illiterate fellow born with a genius for showmanship. He was lucky but he knew an attraction when he saw one. Perhaps the real Barnum was possessed of stronger stuff, but he could not have been as amusing and easy a fellow to fathom as Fowler's Barnum. Wisely, Fowler has made his Barnum a successful "schlemiel" and what more can an audience ask for? Adolph Menjou as the drunk saved from rum by Barnum, gives a fine restrained performance, and Janet Beecher, as Mrs. Barnum, is particularly skillful. Her New England sense of propriety makes a



delightful foil for Barnum's boorish conduct. A word should be said for the scenic effects, they are unusually fine. Building a section of New York one hundred years ago was no simple task and the reproductions are excellent and very much in the spirit of the film. "The Mighty Barnum" belongs on your "must" list.

Other Film Notes

Shirley Temple in "Bright Eyes" is the holiday week attraction at the Radio City Music Hall. James Dunn is also in the film. At the Paramount, Bing Crosby and Kitty Carlisle in "Here Is My Heart" is the film. The stage show is headed by Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians. At the Capitol, after two disappointing weeks, Greta Garbo's picture moves on and "The Band Plays On" takes its place. John Fogarty, Slate Brothers, Ching Ling Foo and others make up the vaudeville. "Anne of Green Gables" is the film at the Roxy.

In the Realm of Authors and Literature

Two Books on Russia

CITY OF FRIENDS. By Elias Tobenkin. Putnam. \$2.50.

I PHOTOGRAPH RUSSIA. By James E. Abbe. McBride. \$3.

For people interested in Soviet Russia, these two books will make interesting reading. They add color to the literature on Soviet Russia because the form in which they are written differs from that of most of the books hitherto published on the subject.

Mr. Tobenkin, who was resident correspondent in Moscow for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for a year, is the first American writer to present Soviet problems through fiction. The new approach to the sex problem in Russia, the reasons why some are satisfied and some are dissatisfied with the Soviet regime, the life of American specialists in Russia, the industrial ambitions of the Soviet government, the uprising of collectivized peasants, Jewish colonization—all these problems are touched upon by him in his novel, "City of Friends."

The central figure in Mr. Tobenkin's book is an American girl. Losing her job in Wall Street, she makes a trip to Soviet Russia merely on a visit. At first, she is not at all satisfied with what she sees there. Later, however, she falls in love with a Communist leader and begins to see things in a different light. She does not notice that little by little she is adapting herself to the Communist psychology. She discovers it only when she is about to give birth to a child.

Not legally married, she hesitates as to whether to bear the child. Ready to undergo a birth control operation, she realizes at the last minute that there is really no reason for her to forego motherhood. Married life is so free in Russia and divorce is so easy there that if he eventually decides to leave her, this would not affect the upbringing of the child.

Impartial Reporting

The entire Soviet theory of sex, love and marriage is brought out by Mr. Tobenkin in a simple but interesting way. Mr. Tobenkin does not criticize the theory nor does he voice approval of it. As an impartial psychologist, he simply discloses to the reader the mind of an American girl unexpectedly caught in the mill of the Soviet love code and her reaction to the situation.

In "City of Friends," numerous Americans who are active in Soviet Russia pass before the eyes of the reader as in a kaleidoscope. There is the popular American correspondent in Moscow. There is the well-known American builder of Soviet industry. There is the anarchist deported from America who became one of the leading figures in Soviet life and with whom the American girl falls in love. These figures in the Moscow American colony are easily recognized in Mr. Tobenkin's book which makes especially interesting reading for Americans.

Mr. Tobenkin's book is written in a way which opens for him the possibility to continue to write more volumes on the same characters. He could for instance follow up this book with another describing the life and the mentality of his American girl as a Soviet mother. He could thus bring out the further changes in Soviet life

which have taken place since the period with which the "City of Friends" deals.

A Critical Work

The book, "I Photograph Russia," by James E. Abbe, should no doubt provoke great criticism among those who would like to read more favorable accounts of the Soviet experiment. Mr. Abbe however describes the situation in Russia just as he has seen it. In justice to him it must be said that the witty tone of the book makes its informative contents all the more interesting.

Mr. Abbe, who was the first American to photograph Stalin in the Kremlin, has had wide experience in Soviet Russia. His book is an account of his personal experiences mingled with gossip talk about everybody in Soviet Russia worth knowing. Mr. Abbe is one who has seen all, knows all and tells all. His references to Soviet leaders are interwoven with very sharp and intimate characterizations of them. One can see that Mr. Abbe has met the people of whom he speaks.

The advantage which Mr. Abbe's book has over other works on Soviet Russia is that the book is illustrated with splendid photographs taken by Mr. Abbe during his stay there. As a professional photographer, considered the best American news photographer in Europe, Mr. Abbe managed to take outstanding photos, not only of Stalin but also of occurrences in Soviet life. Some of his photos have been forbidden by the Soviet authorities.

It may be interesting to know that Mr. Abbe, whose book will not enjoy the favor of pro-Soviet elements, was very enthusiastic about the Soviet experiment during the first few months of his stay in Russia. The book shows, however, that his enthusiasm evaporated after he spent a lengthy time under the Soviet regime.

Kaplan, leader of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, and Rabbis Ben Zion Bokser, Ira Eisenstein, Israel Goldstein of Congregation nai Jeshurun, Eugene Kohn, Leon S. Lang of Congregation Cheb Shalom, Newark, N. J., and Milton Steinberg of the Park Avenue Synagogue.

Dietary Laws Observed

Among the Literati

During the past few weeks the literary pages of our magazines and daily newspapers have devoted much space to the printing of selected lists of books, published during the past season, recommended for holiday gifts. This is an annual custom, something like picking All-American football teams, and it is very hard to resist the temptation of doing one for this column, but this column will contain itself and confine its effort to debunking this practice.

The lists that have been printed are revealing, especially those contributed by authors and critics who have other jobs on the side. The authors use the opportunity as a chance to pay debts to other writers. This results in an exhibition of back-slapping, log rolling and the recommendation of obscure and practically unknown books. One author went so far as to place a book on his list that never was published. He had recommended its publication and labored under the delusion that it had been accepted. Another fellow who writes under two names recommended his works and a lady novelist placed her husband's tome on her list, even though the critics were unanimous in panning the bridegroom's effort.

Most interesting, however, was the spectacle of a critic for a weekly magazine who set down eighty-eight books as his recommendations, twelve of these books were issued by the publishing house for which he acts as editor. Of this dozen, only two found places on any other selections.

Will the immigration authorities make the same mistake they did last year John Strachey arrived buy his book as soon as they could

in this country? He is getting in again tomorrow for another lecture tour. Last year he was listed as "a Communist Jew." Strachey coming from one of the most prominent Church of England families is about as Jewish as Yeats, the Irish poet. . . . Strachey, incidentally, will make his first American address at the Mecca Temple on December 28, when he will talk against war and Fascism. . . .

Alexander Woolcott is to be admired for his honest and shameless plugging of his own book "While Rome Burns." There is nothing coy about the hefty writer. He is on the radio once a week and on one of his broadcasts he told his listeners to go out and raise the money. Last season when his play "Dark Towers" was enjoying its short run on Broadway he was not reluctant about urging people to go and see it. . . .

"Government Not Politics," Franklin Roosevelt's first book and written just before he was nominated, can now be purchased for 19 cents. It was originally priced at \$1.00.

CAPITOL COMMENT

BY NATHAN KOENIG

WASHINGTON.

Capitol Hill is beginning to buzz with new ideas, new demands, and old cranks. On January 3 the new Congress comes into session. The boys on the Hill are in the process of sounding off and calling the people's attention to what is needed to "save" the nation.

Congressional investigations which have been dormant for a number of months are taking on new life. The investigating committees are now making headlines with revelations resulting from their probings. All this is taking place to set the stage for legislative action.

* * *

Somehow or other, a Congressional investigation hearing held in Washington gets more national publicity than one held in any other part of the country. The boys know this to be true and so they save their best witnesses to make a first appearance in Washington.

The House committee investigating un-American activities, headed by Representative John W. McCormack, stirred up a hornet's nest during the two days in which it held public hearings at the Capitol. William Green, president, and Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, testified on Communist activities in the United States. These men charged that much of the Communist propaganda in this country was being sponsored by Russia in violation of the pledge that country gave the United States at the time it was recognized.

* * *

Woll had made similar charges some time ago and the press paid but little attention to them at the time. But when he repeated the charges before the committee and demanded withdrawal of recognition of Russia, more than one newspaperman got excited. And so did some Congressmen.

Sam D. McReynolds, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, intends to look into these charges. He expects to take the matter up with the State Department to determine whether the Soviet pledge has been broken. Maybe there will be another investigation.

* * *

In the meantime the members of the McCormack committee are beginning to turn their heads to new legislation. The investigation into Nazi activities in the United States is about complete. Soon a report on all the committee's findings will be made to Congress. This report will have to contain some recommendations.

From the way the hearing on Communism went and the questions asked by committee members, the committee has in mind legislation which will tighten up on radical agitators without arousing protests over freedom of speech and freedom of the press. It is expected steps will be taken by the committee to name a subcommittee which will secretly work out the necessary bills.

* * *

The report which the McCormack committee will make to Congress should prove to be very interesting reading. There are numerous details, however, which may or may not be printed in the report.

There is the interesting story of how Dr. Otto H. F. Vollbehr, at a hearing in New York, confessed his part in spreading Nazi propaganda in this country. Vollbehr is a German collector of rare books who sold the Gutenberg Bible and other precious volumes to Congress for \$1,500,000. Other angles include reported direct instructions received from the German government by Dr. Hans Luther, German Ambassador to the United States, concerning Nazi propaganda activities in this country.

* * *

Although the cotton barter agreement with Germany has received a serious set-back from President Roosevelt, there are many indications that it will be revived in the near future. Those

interested in exporting more cotton were greatly surprised when President Roosevelt sent the proposed agreement back to George Peek, head of the Export Import Bank, who had been negotiating the deal. They had expected the barter pact to go through in spite of the State Department's objections.

Secretary of State Hull maintains that the barter proposal is not in harmony with already adopted policies on foreign trade. He told President Roosevelt as much and evidently the President agreed with him. There is a loophole left, however. President Roosevelt sent the plan back to Peek with the suggestion that it be revised to meet Hull's objections. This Peek may be expected to do if at all possible.

* * *

Representative Samuel Dickstein, chairman of the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization, wants to humanize laws dealing with aliens. He has in mind a legislative program which will include measures to prevent deportation of meritorious aliens for technical or accidental breach of regulations; facilitate deportation of alien gunmen, drug peddlers, racketeers and other criminals, and provide for voluntary deportation of aliens who wish to go home.

During the closing days of the last session of Congress, similar legislation was defeated. Hundreds of law-abiding aliens were threatened with immediate deportation and separation from their families. They were, however, granted a reprieve until January, 1935. At the present time Representative Dickstein is seeking a further stay pending action on his legislative program.

* * *

Dickstein intends to seek legislation which will permit aged parents and young children to join immigrants already in this country. "The trouble with existing immigration laws," he says, "is too much red tape and too little humanity."

Head of Danzig Urges All Unite To Boost City

No Religious Distinctions for Those Who Co-operate, He Says

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
DANZIG.—The Jews of Danzig are a loyal element, a leading article in the Danziger Echo asserts. The article draws attention to a statement by the new president of the Senate that the State knows no distinctions as to occupation, race, religion or nationality. All sections of the population of the Free City were called upon by President Bräiser to cooperate "in the great work that lies before us."

"It is a great mistake," he said, "to think that the government wants to have only such collaborators as are members of the National Socialist party. Everybody who in any form is prepared to cooperate in the great aims of the National Socialist government of Danzig thus proclaims his positive stand toward the government."

No Distinctions

"The government knows no distinctions as to name and class, origin and rank, occupation and religion."

The Echo points out that "we have here two different formulations."

"In the one it is stated that decent people without distinction of race and religion enjoy the protection of the State, in the other, which deals in the cooperation with the constructive work of the State, the point about race is left out and is replaced by religion."

"We must ask, therefore, whether this twofold formulation is an intentional exclusion of the Jews from the constructive work. The Jews in Danzig are a loyal element, an element of constructive and economic advancement."

"Are we to repeat how much Danzig owes to Jewish commercial spirit and Jewish initiative?"

"We do not believe that the exclusion of Jews from the constructive work of the State could be useful."

"So far the Jews of Danzig are all subjects of Danzig, it is for them not only a question of loyalty but also of the duty of recognizing their own State and carrying out loyally their duties as citizens."

"How could it be otherwise unless the Jews also desire to surrender the rights which they enjoy as a result of their membership in this State?"

The article concludes that the economic interests of the Jews are bound up with those of Danzig.

"The economic prosperity and the possibilities of expansion affect Jewish trade just as much as the non-Jewish."

The Hebrew University of Palestine, which is perhaps the youngest educational institution of its kind in the world, recently completed its ninth year. Its formal dedication in 1925 was attended by representatives of almost every civilized government.

German Jews Mark Temple's 250th Year

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, Dec. 21.—The Jews of Altona on the Elbe River today celebrated the 250th anniversary of the establishment of their Great Synagogue. The Jewish community obtained permission to build a synagogue and elect a rabbi in 1661 from the King of Denmark.

In 1711 part of the synagogue was destroyed by fire. Two years later Swedish artillery bombarded it. Five Swedish cannon balls are still lodged in the walls of the synagogue.

Appeals for Aid As Unemployed Grow in Vienna

Work Exchange Head Cites Hardships of Businessmen

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA.—The number of Jewish unemployed in Austria "is growing with the speed of a hurricane," according to Dr. A. Schmerler, head of the Jewish Free Employment Exchange, who has issued an appeal in which he describes the mounting misery of the Jews of this country.

"Jewish employers are giving up their businesses because they no longer pay, and their numbers are added to the unemployed. And not only they, but also the members of their families, whom they previously maintained."

Live in Misery

"On top of that there is the flood of young people leaving school and being added to the labor market. The majority of the Jewish youth no longer can attend the higher schools."

"It is hard to read the descriptions of the misery in which these people live, but it is harder to live in this misery."

"Everything is pawned. They live in unheated rooms in constant fear of eviction because of rent arrears. Children and invalids, like the rest, are without sufficient food. There is not a penny for coal. Medical treatment is almost impossible."

"Many refuse to become a burden on the public welfare institutions. They want to work and earn their living—even the barest living."

Adjustment Essential

Two factors in the situation are causing particular anxiety: the numbers of Jews of the middle class seeking jobs and the highly-trained material available.

"People incline to the belief," Dr. Schmerler says, "that a change in occupational composition of the Jews will partly solve the problem, but when you look into the facts you become convinced that in the present circumstances the center of gravity of the problem

of Jewish unemployment lies not in a change in occupational composition, but in adjustment to economic life, to place them in the economic process.

"Merely training them in other occupations will not touch the problem, for we have plenty of skilled artisans and manual laborers who are out of work."

Board Approves Kapper Retirement

Justice Had Served Supreme Court Since 1909, 10 Years in Appellate Division

The Board of Estimate Friday approved the application of Justice Isaac M. Kapper of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court to retire January 1 after twenty-five years of service on the bench.

Justice Kapper, who recently passed his seventieth birthday, was elected to the Supreme Court bench in 1909 and ten years ago was elevated to the Appellate Division of the court. His salary as an Appellate Division justice is \$24,500 per annum. His retirement allowance, which has not yet been fixed, would be approximately half that amount annually.

J. T. A. Writer Forced to Quit Berlin by Spies

N. Y. Woman Reporter's Complaint to Authorities Unavailing

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, Dec. 21.—Lillian Zahn of New York, a correspondent in Germany of the Jewish Telegraph Agency, was forced to quit Berlin today after a week of close espionage at the hands of agents of the secret and state police.

A week ago two men followed Miss Zahn into a restaurant and robbed her handbag of her correspondent's credentials, copies of her dispatches and other memoranda.

She filed complaints with the authorities but they reported they were unable to apprehend the miscreants. Representations were made to authorities by the American consulate and the Association of Foreign Press Correspondents regarding surveillance of Miss Zahn's movements and were met with the reply that the authorities had no knowledge of the affair.

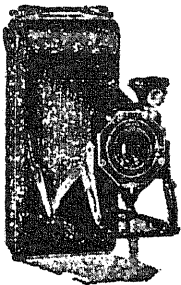
Capek Warns Praha Students Of Racial Bias

Noted Writer Denounces Recent Riots—Calls for Free Ideals

PRAHA, Dec. 21.—Karel Capek, noted Czechoslovakian writer, issued a proclamation to Czechoslovakian students today outspokenly condemning recent manifestations of anti-Semitism in Praha.

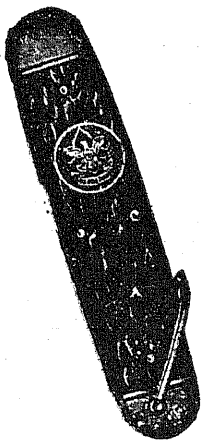
"We are now hearing the cry of 'out with the Jew,'" Capek wrote. "In democratic France or England, and even in fascist Italy, this cry is not heard. It is notoriously the device of the Hitler Reich and of the Austrian German Nationalists."

"Do you want to create the impression that our people and our government are so closely related spiritually to Hitlerism that they have taken over the anti-Semitic legacy? We must show that we will not allow ourselves to be spiritually Germanized," Capek declared.

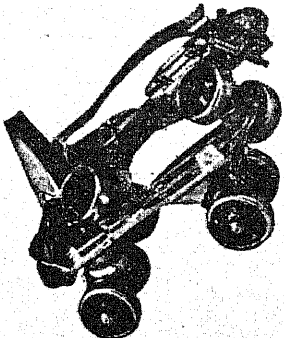
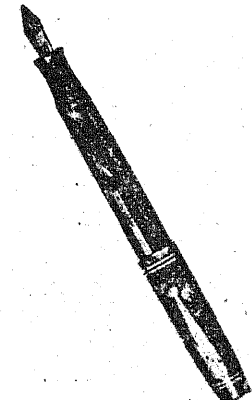

Nazis Lure Troops in Saar With Propaganda and Women

British Are Chief Objects of Attention by Agitators Seeking to Spread Anti-Semitism in Area Where Plebiscite Will Be Held Next Month

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
SAARBRUECKEN, Dec. 21.—The international force organized by the League of Nations to insure a peaceful plebiscite in the Saar in January 13, consisting of picked British, Italian, Dutch and Swedish troops, is being deluged with violent anti-Semitic propaganda, it was learned today.

British units and particularly British officers appear to have been chosen as special objects of Nazi anti-Semitic solicitude and have received numerous anti-Jewish leaflets through the mail, accompanied by "explanations" as to why "Hitler is persecuting the Jews."

Probe Instituted

Commanding officers of the British units instituted an immediate investigation to learn how the personal addresses of the officers came into Nazi hands so quickly, since the entire force reached the Saar only this week. All copies of the anti-Semitic literature were ordered confiscated.

Geoffrey Knox, head of the League Saar Commission which rules the area, was reported to-night also to have under investigation attempted Nazi agitation among the troops.

Hope to Spread Hate

Saar Nazis are hostile to the international force and have already issued stringent orders to the population not to fraternize with the soldiers, addressing themselves particularly to the women, who were warned "not to kiss or become too friendly with the troops."

It was learned, however, that picked Nazi women adherents have been ordered to make friends with the soldiers and to spread the Hitlerite gospel of anti-Semitism.

The Nazis in the Saar and in Germany attach a great deal of importance to their anti-Jewish campaign among the international force, it was learned, and plan to expend much time and money to make convinced anti-Semites of the troops.

It is hoped by this means to help spread anti-Semitism in the various countries from which the troops were drawn.

B'nai B'rith Accepts Bid of AJC For Parley on Vital Problems

While rejecting participation in the national board of elections for an enlarged American Jewish Congress, B'nai B'rith has accepted the invitation of the American Jewish Congress to join a conference between the representatives of the two organizations "for the purpose of arriving at an understanding on problems of common Jewish interest."

This was revealed Friday by the American Jewish Congress, in extending an invitation to B'nai B'rith to name its representatives and to set a date and place for the meeting.

In accepting the invitation to the conference, Alfred M. Cohen, president of B'nai B'rith, made it clear, however, that his organization reserves to itself the right not only to express its views with in the conference upon such subjects as may be brought before it, but to decide whether it will accept or reject the decisions made by the conference if not sanctioned by the B'nai B'rith representatives.

President Bernard S. Deutsch of the American Jewish Congress expressed regret that the B'nai B'rith

saw fit to reject the Congress invitation to send a representative to the board of elections, which will supervise balloting for delegates to the American Jewish Congress in 1935. B'nai B'rith declined on the ground that it was purely a matter for the Congress.

Knitgoods Union Rejects AJC Offer

Charging that the American Jewish Congress is "dominated by capitalist elements and is not opposed to Fascism as such," the Joint Council Knitgoods Workers' Union of the American Federation of Labor expresses agreement with the action of the Labor Committee on Jewish Affairs in refusing to collaborate with the Congress' attempt to form a "so-called united front of all classes of Jewish people as a way of fighting Fascism and anti-Semitism," it was announced Friday by the executive office of the Council.

A real movement against racial oppression must be "primarily a workers' international movement," the Council contends in upholding the Labor Committee in its stand.

LODZ, Dec. 21.—The 250,000 Jews of this industrial city, chiefly unemployed textile workers, today were handed over to the tender mercies of the Endek party, bitter anti-Jewish group in Poland, as a result of the Endek's victory in the municipal elections. The offices of city mayor, two vice mayoralties and the five municipal executive offices, went to Endek nominees.

Only two Jews and one government party man will represent the minority parties on the Lodz municipal council.

Yesterday Deputy F. Rottenstreich declared in the Sejm that at least 30 percent of the Jews of Lodz are actually starving and accused the government of doing nothing to ameliorate their condition.

The victory of the Endeks has aroused the gravest fears of severe anti-Jewish discrimination in every section of the Jewish population.

Emergence of Lodz as an important world textile center is entirely the result of Jewish enterprise, it was pointed out, and discriminatory legislation against the Jews in industry has caused widespread unemployment and suffering among the Jewish masses.

Minister Rebukes Endek Allegations

WARSAW, Dec. 21.—Endek anti-Semite allegations in the budget debate now going on in parliament that the government had "handed over the elementary schools to the Jews" were rebuked today by Minister of Education Jondrejewicz.

Government officials today confiscated an appeal issued by the Endeks calling for a pre-Christmas boycott of all Jewish business.

Vienna Nazis Ask Violence On Newsmen

Press Voices Reprisals
for Protests Against
Brutality

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, Dec. 21.—Jewish journalists and leading Jewish personalities were threatened with physical violence today in Austrian Nazi papers as reprisal for informing the world of the Jewish situation in Austria and causing the American Jewish Congress to submit a memorandum of protest to Edgar Prochnik, Austrian Minister to the United States.

The Nazi press, which also threatened all Austrian Jewry with violence, published the memorandum sent to Minister Prochnik and termed the document "a Jewish offensive against Austria."

Neueste Nachrichten, Viennese daily, indicated that the "government is interested in those people who live in Austria and furnish material which is used abroad for such impertinent memorandums."

A new and fatal blow to the hard-hit Jewish trade in Austria is expected to follow the decision asking the government to revise all 200,000 trade licenses here.

The action was taken at a meeting of the semi-official government economic agencies, including the Chamber of Commerce. The government was asked to determine whether the number of trade licenses was not too big and whether the commercial firms kept their books properly.

Jewish circles are anticipating in fear a wholesale ousting of Jews from legitimate trade.

Zahne to Quit Schnuch Camp

Hopes to Step In When
Nazis Here Discredit
Each Other

Louis Zahne will desert Dr. Hubert Schnuch, The Jewish Daily Bulletin learned Friday night.

Zahne's repudiation of Schnuch, who is fighting what appears to be a losing battle to retain national leadership of the Nazi League of Friends of New Germany, will constitute the most stunning blow yet dealt the Schnuch-Kappe-Gisibell camp.

Dr. Ignatz T. Griebel, notorious in German-American circles as a disturbing influence in the well-oiled machinery of other organizations, has been the heretofore hidden force behind the fight between the camps of Dr. Schnuch and Anton Haegle, leader of rebellious Nazis in Manhattan and the Bronx. The Bulletin further learned.

Dr. Griebel, it was disclosed, has maintained a tactical position in the background of the clash, but at the same time has indirectly prodded Haegle and his lieutenants to an increasing display of enmity against the opposing ranks.

It was at Griebel's advice that Zahne left New York on what Haegle henchmen described as a "political vacation." Zahne was expected to return to this city to spend Christmas with his family. He probably will return to his secret place of "convalescence," somewhere in southern Pennsylvania, after the holidays.

Formerly one of Schnuch's most outspoken supporters, Zahne will announce his withdrawal from all activities connected with the League on or about January 20, a Bulletin reporter learned.
