Jews Protest Tax Revision In Palestine

Proposed Single Levy on Land Finds People Up in Arms

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, Dec. 30.—Jewish Palestine was up in arms today against the taxation of land proposed by the government which may seriously affect the future of the flourishing Jewish citrus industry in Palestine.

The government proposes to abolish the fifteen per cent tax on all income derived from real estate, known as the "verko," and the ten per cent tax on all income derived from agricultural land, known as the "osher."

A single land tax is proposed to replace the two separate taxes, consisting of a levy of one to two piastres (five to ten cents) on each dunam of land used for ordinary agricultural purposes, and a tax of eighty-two piastres (\$4.10) on each dunam of land used to grow

The World Zionist Executive announced its opposition to the proposed new land tax and asked a commission of lawyers for an opinion as to the constitutionality of the measure.

A delegation of prominent Jewish leaders was appointed to visit High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope and ask him to postpone the introduction of the land tax.

The proposed tax, in the opinion of Jewish leaders, will place a heavy and unfair burden on the flourishing citrus industry which has contributed materiall; to the present prosperity of Palestine.

The government, it was pointed out, has been strict in enforcing the tax on real estate incomes, but has been very lenient in collecting the "osher." In the past year the tax was not collected on the ground that the crops of the peasants were poor.

Trades Union Congress Issues Appeal Till Reich Lifts All Restrictions

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, Dec. 30.—An appeal for a complete boycott of Nazi goods and rail and shipping services was issued yesterday to British labor by the British Trades Union Congress.

The appeal called on British labor to boycott German goods and services in every possible manner so long as the Hitler regime persists in its policy of suppressing of the German labor movement and oppression of racial and religious minorities.

Leaslets bearing the appeal were distributed among thousands of British workers.

TelAvivGivesWeizmann Title of Honorary Citizen

TEL AVIV, Dec. 30.—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former president of the World Zionist Organization and chairman of the Zionist commission for settlement of German-Jewish refugees in Palestine, tonight was unanimously elected an honorary citizen of this all-Jewish city by the municipal council. Even the Revisionist members of the council, who are bitterly opposed to Dr. Weizmann, joined in the tribute to the noted scientist who recently celebrated his sixtieth birthday.

Outlawed Party Comes Out Openly in Wilno and Warsaw

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, Dec. 30. - A new anti-Semitic campaign flared up in Poland today as the Nara anti-Jewish and anti-government party. ppressed last July after a brief but hectic existence, emerged into the open again in various sections of the country and incited the population against the Jews.

Centering activities chiefly in Wilno and Warsaw, the Naras smeared the doors of Jewish lawyers' and doctors' offices with signs of "down with the Jews," while Jewish shops, street lamps and the walls of buildings were placarded

with glaring anti-Semite signs. Anxiety was expressed in Jewish circles lest the new Nara campaign culminate in a series of bloody riots similar to those instigated by them last spring and summer. At the same time hope was expressed among the Jews that the government was fully aware of the Nara menace and was prepared to cope with the hooliganism of the anti-Semitic bands.

Reich Warns Jews Against Breaking 'Law'

Stringent Anti-Semite Edicts Still in Force, **Orders State**


(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Dec. 30.-New orders issued yesterday sharply reminded the Jews of Germany that discriminatory legislation set in motion in the early days of the Hitler regime is still strongly in force and are to be obeyed.

The first order pointed out that schechita, the Jewish ritual method of preparing meat, is forbidden by law everywhere within Germany. It warned the Jewish population that any transgression of the anti-schechita laws, even including importation of kosher meat from adjoining countries, is punishable by a fine of 10,000

The second order struck a cruel blow at the "non-Aryan" lawyers debarred from practice by Nazi decrees "purifying" the administra-tion of justice. It forbade them to advertise themselves as "former lawyers" and to seek positions in that capacity. The standing which many of the "non-Aryans" enjoyed in the legal profession brought them, despite disbarment on racial and religious grounds, many clients seeking advise in cases which would not require appearance of the attorneys in court. Reiteration of the ban on these former lawyers calling themselves "former lawyers" is expected to deprive them even of this amount of patronage, since now they cannot identify themselves at all with their former calling.

Enforcement of this order is expected to work grave hardships on these men and to aggrevate further the problem of furnishing re- spoiling the property. Today, Arabs lief for former professionals.

World Leaders Attend Parley In New York

Jewish Position in Holy Land to Be Discussed at Conference

The economic and political situation in Palestine and the financial status and problems of the Jewish Agency will be thoroughly discussed at the meeting of the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency which opens at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in the Federation Building. The meeting will be attended by thirty-five members and deputy-members.

The first session will be opened Palestine to Act by Neville Laski, K.C., chairman of the administrative committee. of the administrative committee. and president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, who will preside.

Felix M. Warburg will deliver the address of welcome.

A series of reports and discussions on political and economic questions concerning Palestine are expected to occupy the first twodays of the meeting. The last day, Wednesday, will be devoted to a discussion of the internal problems and organization of the Agency.

Important resolutions dealing with the various aspects of Jewish life in Palestine are expected to be adopted by the committee, after the two days of discussion of questions concerning Palestine industry, agriculture, employment, immigration and colonization.

The question as to why the Jewish Agency in Palestine does not check speculation in the country may also be considered, since this question has become very acute.

One of the subjects to be brought up for discussion at the meeting of the committee will be the problem of Arab-Jewish relations. The recent invitation extended for Jewish colonization in Syria may also be considered.

The present session of the comittee is the first g Jewish Agency to be held on American soil. It will not be open to the public.

Syrian Settlement Details Outlined

Land Recovery, ties arising from a confusion between the work of political Zion-Plans for Entry problem, although of vital neces-Are Revealed

Whole Land to Be Opened for Immigration of 10,000 Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
PARIS.—The admission and settlement of Jews in Syria, as announced recently by the French government, will probably be permitted throughout the whole of the land.

Industrialists, engineers and artisans, besides agriculturalists, are included in the categories to be permitted settlement.

The admission of agriculturalists the bulk of the new settlers, will entail a preliminary colonization preliminary organization. This work is essential in view of the fact that settlement is envisaged in the Valley of Ghab in the Haut-Oronte, where with a moderate investment 100,000 hectares of land (approximately 247,000 acres) can be cultivated.

Other tracts available for Jewish agricultural settlement include sections in the north of the Republic of Lebanon outside the Palestinian frontier, and the upper Euphrates and the Oronte.

Will Adapt Immigrants

Negotiations which finally culminated in the permission for 10,-000 Jews to settle in Syria and Lebanon were initiated by the Committee for the Defense of Jewish Rights in Central and Eastern Europe, of which Senator Justin Godart is president.

This Committee has worked out a plan for selecting immigrants, under control of the French administration and by the High Commissioner of Syria, and for their adaptation to the customs of their future homes and for their obligatory study of Arabic and French.

Drainage of the Valley of Amouk and the creation of a society for the study of Franco-Syrian relations, to further the increased progress of French industry in the deserted territories of Syria, in collaboration with French and Syrian personalities, is supported by the Committee.

Drainage Envisaged

According to the plan of the engineer Joseph Loewy, under consideration at present, drainage of both the Valley of Amouk and the Lake of Antioch can be accomplished by a direct flow through a tunnel bored through the Beilan Mountain and exiting into the Mediterranean Sea. This feat will recover for settlement 300,000 hectares of land approximately (740,-

Small model self - supporting farms for the settlers, hardly dependent upon local exports and entirely independent of the world market, is envisaged by the Committee.

The development of Jewish immigration into Syria and Lebanon, it is believed, will bring a moral rapprochment between the Jews and Arabs which may have a great influence outside the Syrian States.

Local Conditions Explained The diverse character of the inhabitants of the four Syrian States and of the autonomous Sandjak of Alexandrette, which has about a dozen churches of different sects, indoubtedly will facilitate the acclimatization of the Jewish colonists to local conditions.

It also promises to frustrate aims of extremist leaders who seek to foment discord between Syrian and Lebanese workers, on the one hand, and Jewish immigrants on

ism in Palestine and the modest sity, of the admission of Jews to the Levant States, trailed negotiations for a long time. Last April Count Martel, High Commissioner for Syria, announced it was impossible to admit any number of Jews to Syria or Lebanon.

Further study of the question and continued negotiations, headed by Senator Godart, Baron Alfred Goinzbourg and Boris Gourevitch, the latter two members of the Bureau and secretary general, respectively, resulted in a change in the attitude of the Quai d'Orsay, the High Commissioner and certain notables in Syria and Lebanon, who had opposed Jewish settlement on a large or medium scale.

On October 30 the Committee for the Defense of Jewish Rights in Central and Eastern Europe made an official request to the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Pierre Laval, for the admission of Jews to Syria and Lebanon.

On November 19 a letter of good will, in the name of Laval and signed by Alexis Leger, secretarygeneral of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, informed Senator Godart that the request had been communicated to the Syrian High Commissioner for his opinion as to the practicability of the scheme, with the results outlined above.

Jewish Salesmen Hounded in Austria

Many Report Police Confiscate Licenses and Stocks Under Recent Trade Law

VIENNA, Dec. 30. - Itinerant Jewish merchants and salesmen seeking trade in the provinces are being harassed and maltreated by the gendarmerie, a number of the tradespeople reported here today.

Under pretext of enforcing the new licensing decrees, police are taking away licenses held by peddlers and salesmen and are confiscating their stocks of merchandise, according to protests made to the authorities.

Several cases were reported in which the victims had been insulted by police and told that "there are enough Christian merchants. We don't want Jews."

LODZ, Dec. 30. — The last two Jewish officials in the Lodz chamber of artisans were unceremoniously ousted from their posts yesterday.

The chamber of artisans is an important factor in the life of this industrial community which has a large Jewish population. Since the chamber has the power of granting certificates enabling their holders to work at the crafts the removal of Jewish officials, it is feared, may affect the number of certificates granted to Jews.



Delegates From 50 Cities to Attend N. Y. National Council Sessions

Representative Jewish social workers from over fifty American cities, both lay and professional, will meet here beginning Thursday at the four-day conference on Jewish welfare sponsored by the National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. The conference, which will open with a luncheon meeting at the Temple Emanu-El Community House, One East Sixty-fifth street, is under the general chairmanship of Felix M.

Addresses at the luncheon will be made by Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York City, Paul U. Kellogg, editor of The Survey and member of the Committee on Economic Security, and Samuel A. Goldsmith, executive director of the Jewish Charities of Chicago.

Prominent Speakers

Speakers at other sessions will include James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for Refugees from Germany; William J. Shroder, of Cincinnati, president of the National Council; Dr. Samson Benderly, director of the Bureau of Jewish Education in New York City; B. Charney Vladeck, general manager of the Jewish Daily Forward; Professor Morris R. Cohen, of the College of the City of New York; Rabbi Mordecai M. Kaplan, leader of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism; Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and Mrs. David de Sola Poole, president of the New York chapter

Ira M. Younker, vice-president of the Council, in summing up the purpose of the conference, said that "events of the past several years have brought an ever-increasing burden of responsibility for welfare activities to Jews throughout the United States. The scope of such responsibilities has widened greatly and the nature of the responsibilities themselves become more complex.

"It is the purpose of the conference," he continued, "to throw added light on these problems, to consider the means by which federated and unorganized groups may deal with them and how in-dividuals may relate themselves to such programs.

To Discuss Relief

The opening session will be devoted to a consideration of Jewish welfare problems and facilities on the American scene. A general session, in the afternoon, will discuss problems of relief abroad, with American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, presiding. Thursday evening Mr. Warburg side at a dinner, where the program of the National Council will be presented. 4-Day Parley Ambitious Schedule Faces Laski, On Welfare Aid Dynamic Leader of British Jewry

Eastern U. S. and Canada to Hear Him After Agency Sessions

Take a high-geared American business executive of the top flight, multiply him by two and you have a pretty fair thumbnail impression of Neville Laski, president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, in New York to attend a series of conferences of far-reaching import to world Jewry.

In America for the first time, Laski, pacing restlessly to and fro in his fourteenth floor room at the Hotel Commodore, seemed thoroughly at home. Although impressed by the architectural magnificence of New York, by the traffic jams, by mid-Manhattan's mazda brilliance and symmetrical street layout, the distinguished leader of probably the world's most influential body of Jews didn't seem in the least miffed by it all.

Strenuous Schedule

Mr. Laski is taking New York and a considerable slice of the East and Canada—in stride. And what a stride! He has mapped for himself one of the most ambitious schedules a visitor to these shores has ever undertaken. The day he doesn't participate in at least three or four conferences with American Jewish leaders—such as Paul Baerwald, Felix Warburg, Dr. Gottheil -deliver a like number of speeches at luncheons, dinners and conventions, Mr. Laski will probably feel as if he's loafing.

And the youthful British leader he spent his forty-fourth birthday on the boat-train from London -didn't come here to loaf and invite his soul, despite the counsel of the Irish poet, George Russell

The pace at which he is driving himself during his fortnight's stay here is characteristic of the handsome, ruddy-faced, nattily-dressed Briton and reflects the life he has led during the past two years.

Surveyed Jewish Plight

"I haven't had a holiday in two years," he told The Jewish Daily Bulletin reporter who was struggling helplessly to keep up with his clipped, rapid-fire flow of words.

"I've traveled all over Europe surveying the Jewish situation. Besides scores of crossings to France, I've been to Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Belgium, Holland and Switzer-

"And now," he added a bit ruefully, "here I am in America spending my twentieth wedding anniversary. Celebrate it? probably send a cable."

By avocation a leader of British Jewry—and by inheritance as well, since his father was long treasurer Paul Baerwald, chairman of the of the British Board—Mr. Laski by profession is a barrister, having attained the highest rank in that ieid, King's Counselor.

"You want a personal slant?" he repeated the reporter's query. "What is 'slant'?"

When the term was properly defined, Mr. Laski smiled and gave unstintingly of the desired "slant." Saw War Service

He found the seminary thoroughly charming in its atmosphere, architecture and spirit.

After the visit to the seminary Mr. Laski was taken to a session of night court at which Magistrate Jonah Goldstein was presiding.

Practically the only relaxation. aside from those two visits, which Mr. Laski is permitting himself during his stay here is attendance at a theatre sometime during the week. He hasn't selected the play he wishes to see. It would be the first time he's been in a theatre in six months, he said.

During his stay here Mr. Laski is being assisted by the American Jewish Committee, which has provided him with relays of secretaries, whom he is finding as efficient and capable as his own in England.

BUILDING ON ERRORS

By a Staff Correspondent

MOSCOW

The first conference of Soviets in the Jewish autonomous region of Biro-Bidjan, which recently concluded there, has attracted wide comment in the Soviet press and much discussion of the methods employed in settling Jews there.

Criticism of the measures taken in the past to attract Jewish settlers to the Far Eastern area and of the functioning of the agencies involved in the work is freely voiced.

The Emes, organ of the Yiddish Communists, devoted two full pages in a recent four-page issue to a discussion on Biro-Bidjan. It contains articles by M. Chavkin, secretary of the organization bureau of the Jewish autonomous region; Tadgieff, secretary of the nationalities council of the all-Union Central Executive Committee; P. Sprach, assistant editor of the Emes, who has spent some time in Bureya, and Hersch Brill, Comzet representative in Biro-Bidjan, all dealing with questions under discussion at the confer-

Chavkin deals mainly with the mistakes made in the work in Bureya in the past, and new methods to be applied. Describing the plan of operation for the coming year, he points out that the absorption and consolidation of the new settlers is one of the chief tasks involved, presenting many problems to be dealt with. As evidence of the unsatisfactory state of this phase of the work, he declares there has been tremendous re-emigration from Bureya.

During the last four years, from October 1930, 20,000 people emigrated to Bureya and 10,000 re-emigrated. In 1932, 6,000 out of 9,000 arrivals re-emigrated, and in 1933, the number of reemigrants was larger than the number of arrivals.

"This huge re - emigration movement," he states, "is entirely due to the inadequate manner in which preparations were made for the reception of the arrivals. This is proved by the fact that it is not the old settlers who go

back, but the new arrivals who leave generally within a few days of their arrival. It is only to be expected that after a journey of some thousands of kilometres, the new settler expects to be received decently and provided with accommodations and with essential needs. If he sees that there is not even an attempt made to do this, he goes into a panic and runs back.

"The Regional Party organization has now taken the question of settlement in its own hands, and has given the secretaries of the party committees personal responsibility for dealing with the settlement of each emigrant family and each single new arrival.

Definite Plans for

Handling Settlers
"A definite plan has been worked out for settling the trans-migrants in 1935, at specific points and in specific enterprises in the region," he declared. "The time has also been definitely fixed for the arrival of each group of emigrants in order to arrange for their reception and settlement, accommodations, work and food. Strict measures will be taken to see that the selection of the emigrants is carried out properly."

Chavkin also stresses the importance of having industrial construction work completed on schedule so that settlement of the new arrivals may be linked up with the realization of the industrialization plans.

There will be a great deal of attention paid to artisan cooperatives which are to produce goods to the value of eleven million rubles, during 1935," the writer revealed. "The area under cultivation will also be increased during the year, and there will be considerable development in the sphere of cattle breeding.

"There are still considerable difficulties to be faced in the work in the Jewish autonomous region, he concludes, but the fact that the entire country is interested in this work and helping to promote it, that the Soviet government and the Central Ex-

Enter 1935

The new year which dawns upon the world tomorrow promises to keep Jewish leaders very

Besides fighting Hitlerism, Jewish organizations must mobilize forces to better protect Jewish rights in Austria; for a stronger fight for Jewish existence in Poland; for helping Jewish refugees from Germany remain in France; for combatting the anti-Jewish measures in Latvia and in Lithuania; for finding new territories for the immigration of oppressed Jews.

The first to suffer with the new year will be the five thousand Jews of the Saar. Exactly two weeks from today they will have to take their belongings and begin the exodus from their homes, the Saar plebiscite on January 13 will turn this territory over to

Jewish Perspectives

Next to the Saar Jews come the Jews of Danzig. They too, will have a difficult year, since Danzig, though a Free City, is gradually coming under the control of a Nazi administration, despite the presence of the League of Nations High Commissioner

The most difficult problem for world Jewry during the coming year will, however, be the question of helping the Jews of Poland and Austria. Everything points to the view that the Jewish situation in Poland in 1935 will develop to a point where Jewish diplomacy will have to be changed to open aggression.

The picture in Austria is similar. The government says one thing and does another when it comes to Jewish rights. Mere representations to the Austrian government probably will not be sufficient in 1935.

The silence which Jewish organizations abroad have maintained during 1934 with regard to growing anti-Jewish economic discriminations in Latvia and Lithuania may be changed to open protest in 1935. The governments in these two countries, rapidly falling under the influence of anti-Semitic elements, may have to face a strong Jewish resistance.

New Territories

Simultaneous with the fight for Jewish rights, Jewish leaders will find themselves occupied in 1935 with the problem o: settling Jews on new territories in addition to Palestine. There is no doubt that a migration of Polish Jews to Biro-Bidjan will start on a substantial scale. Thousands of Jews may also take advantage of the invication to settle in Syria. Others may proceed w Brazil, in accordance with a plan now under consideration.

The year of 1935 also will be full of outstanding events for Palestine. The Iraq pipeline, which will add to Palestine's importance, will begin operations early in 1935. The doors of Transjordan may be partly opened in 1935. The Legislative Council may be proclaimed in 1935. The World Zionist Congress is scheduled for 1935.

As to American Jewish life, the year 1935 promises to be much brighter than its predecessor. There is good ground to believe that anti-Semitic propaganda in the United States will show a great decline since the economic situation here is on the road to recovery, and

ist machine with Fascist and Trotskyist gearing seems to me most unconvincing. The effort to pin the murder of Sergei Kirov. directly or indirectly, on Leo Kamenev and Gregory



Zinoviev leaves me especially unimpressed. I venture to guess that most other foreigners intimately acquainted with present-day Russia are quite as unconvinced, whatever they may say or write publicly for policy's sake.

The most dissonant streak in the picture, of course, is the fact that more than five dozen alleged terrorists were executed within a few days after Kirov's assassination, before there had been sufficient time to investigate such an organization as is now implied by the Russian press. The wholesale executions, unfortunately, came first and the charge of organized terror limps far behind.

A friend and well-known defender of the Kremlin, rather shaken up by the recent events in Moscow, attributes the situation to the "frayed nerves" of the Soviet leaders. They are so overworked, so deeply concentrated on industrial and military problems. that the death of one of their most trusted men acted as a shock. He credits the extensive executions without trial to a sort of unconditioned reflex.

Perhaps he is right. The tragedy of the business is that the reflexes, conditioned or otherwise, should repeatedly take such extreme forms. There is clearly a call for the services of a Professor Pavlov to untangle those nerves.

But over and above these considerations, anyone aware of the temper of Russian dissidents at this juncture, even the bitterest of them, can not readily credit the existence of organized terrorism. The process of suppression has been much too thorough and ef-

Unorganized discontent, individual acts of desperation, smoldering resentment there may be aplenty. But the type of underground activity familiar under Tsarism has long ago been stamped out. What is probably the most comprehensive system of mutual espionage in all history (certainly for its size) has been functioning for seventeen years.

I do not say that there are no underground movements. I merely assert that for anyone who, like myself, has lived in the new Russit many years it requires an impossible stretch of the imagination to believe it.

This I do know: that if such a movement has taken root in recent years, Zinoviev can have nothing to do with it. In the whole length and breadth of the Union of Soviets there is not another man so completely beaten, meek and conforming as Zinoviev. Crawling his repentance, physically a wreck and psychologically shattered. Zinoviev no longer has the stamina to think unorthodox thoughts. let alone organize terrorist acts.

Even if he were to confess publicly to having instigated the killing of Kirov, I should still know that he had nothing to do with it. Less than two years ago I

An Irish View On Nazi Methods

The Irish Times of Dublin, in an editorial on the Jewish situation in Germany, says:

Last week's report, that a proposal to make peace between Germany and the Jews had been rejected by Herr Hitler, suggests that the Nazi movement is continuing its campaign against non-Aryans with unabated vigor. Little has been heard of anti-Jewish demonstrations in Germany for some months past, since it seems that the Ministry for Economics has frowned on any further attempts to interfere with the trade-and particularly with the banking institutions of the Reich; but the anti-Jewish propaganda is just as strong as ever it was.

Surely, there must be a limit to the Nazis' folly. Already the hostility of Jews throughout the world is beginning to make itself felt in Germany. Possibly, Herr Hitler and his colleagues are indifferent to world opinion; but if they continue to prevent non-Aryans from earning a livelihood in their native country, they will forfeit the sympathy of every enlightened people.

Cyprus Competes With Palestine

That Cyprus is becoming a competitor to Palestine in the export of citrus fruits is emphasized in a report in the Near East and India. The report states:

The export of early season oranges is now in full swing. A steamer of the German Levant Line is taking the fruit direct to Germany and Scandinavia. Cyprus oranges penetrate as far north as Stavanger, in Norway. The price is good at thirty-four shillings per thousand, in comparison with twenty-seven shillings at this time last year. The present shed accommodation at Famagusta Harbor is proving inadequate, and the construction of the new £8,000 shed proceeds very slowly.

It is being built with dressed stone, to harmonize with the old Venetian fortifications. The roof is supported on buttresses independent of the walls to allow for sinking. The large, rough oranges, unpopular in England. are being shipped to Yugoslavia. Curiously enough, Typrus fruit pays a penny a case more landing charges in England than Palestinian.

Radio Sales Gain In Palestine

The London Times, analyzing the exports of the British radio industry, reports:

In Palestine excellent progress is being made by British makers. In the first four months of this year, 3,246 sets were sold, compared with 3,701 in the whole of 1933. Other countries, however, are also going ahead, and America's total sales are more than double those of Great Britain. The market in Palestine for radio sets generally is expanding rapidly owing to the trade recovery and to the arrival of Jewish immigrants, many of whom are comparatively prosperous and look upon a wireless set as a normal possession. When the new broadcasting station in Jerusalem is completed next year receiving sets will be required to a still greater extent.

Finds That Jews Are Like Neighbors

Are Jews different? The Hebrew Union College Monthly, answering this question, says:

Maybe some Jews are, but the Jews we see daily are not essentially different from their neighbors. We don't like to believe this because we've been brought up on a tradition of difference. But it was a tradition that was based on wish and not fact. The only real difference which the Jew reveals is a nervous self-consciousness which comes from being a persecuted minority. Remove the factor of anti-Semitism, and even this will disappear. As it is the Jew is a worker or a capitalist, an abstainer or a drunkard, a spendthrift or a hoarder, a moral or immoral person, just the way his neighbor is.

Glasgow News Compares Jews and Scots

The Glasgow Evening News, making a parallel between the Scotsman and the Jew, says:

The Jews were the Scots of Western Asia, and the Scots the Jews of North-West Europe. Both were threatened and persecuted. Had the English Edwards, Henry VIII, Mary Stuart, and the last two Stuart monarchs had their will of the Scots, they would have been enslaved, tortured, and finally dispersed.

At one time there were 30,-000 Scots in the army of Gustavus Adolphus, and 30,000 or more Scots in business in Danzig and Poland. Their numbers and success aroused the jealousy of the German merchants, who obtained an edict against "Jews, Scots, and other vagabonds." The strange story of the Scots in Poland is recounted by a Scotophile German, Fischer.

Thus were those enterprising peoples fellow-victims for a time in the same persecution, which, so far as the Scots were concerned, was largely on religious grounds. Most of the Scots merchants in Poland were Protestants; and Poland, after its capture by the Jesuits became the most bigotedly Roman Catholic country in Europe. In 1724, long after Christians elsewhere in Europe had ceased to kill each other for the love of God, several leading Protestants at Thorn were executed by Polish

NRA Butchers' Code Goes Into Effect Today

10,000 Meat Dealers to Be Affected Throughout Country

More than 5,000 kosher meat retailers in Greater New York and an equal number in various cities throughout the country are affected by the NRA code for their industry which becomes effective today by executive order of President Roosevelt.

Enforcement of fair trade provisions of the code marks the end of a long period of cut-throat price slashing which drove many butchers out of business, according to David S. Andron, counsel for the Federation of Kosher Butchers, who was instrumental in framing the code and gaining its approval.

The code forbids malicious pricecutting, misrepresentation of the quality of meat, and sale of nonkosher meat as kosher. It also specifies that meat prices may be fixed "in an emergency." It further provides that kosher butcher shops must close on Saturdays and Jewish holidays.

A national conference to elect a code authority and work out details of administration will be held at the Hotel Pennsylvania on January 8 and 9, Charles Cohen, president of the Federation of Kosher Butchers, announced yesterday. He said thirty regional code authorities will bet set up throughout the country.

The code was approved by NRA authorities last month and signed by President Roosevelt on December 21 after one and-and-a-half years of negotiation during which chain groceries and the food code authority bitterly opposed a separate code for the kosher butchers.

Plot of Embryo Hitler Bared at Probe

Planned Coup, Says Captain

\$700,000,000 Said to Back 500,000 in This Move

(Special to the J.D.B.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30. - A Fascist plot to set up a dictatorship in the place of American democratic government, with Jackson Martindell, Wall street financial counsel, as Fuehrer, was laid bare today in the record of the House committee investigating Nazi and other un-American ac-

An army captain, Samuel Glazier of Baltimore, in charge of a Civilian Conservation Camp at Elkridge, Md., gave the investigators the testimony concerning the dictatorship plan.

Captain Glazier said that Martindell had discussed with him the formation of the "American Vigilantees," comprising 500,000 men, and backed with \$700,000,000 to turn out the administration and set up Martindell as dictator.

According to the testimony, which was made in a recent executive session in New York and withheld, the scheme was closely modeled on German Nazism, with the Jews singled out for the role of scapegoat.

Hitler Methods

Captain Glazier told the committee Martindell said Adolf Hitler's rise to power started by the broadcasting of promises of employment to the jobless young men. Similar tactics were planned in this country, the witness reported the Wall street man informed him.

The would-be American Hitler, Captain Glazier stated, betrayed "a particular antipathy against

Martindell and Captain Glazier first met last October, when the New Yorker arrived at the Elkridge CCC camp with a letter of introduction reading as follows:

"This will serve to introduce the bearer, Mr. Jackson Martindell, and party, who will be shown every courtesy by you.

"By command of Major General

"A. P. SULLIVAN, "Captain, Adjutant General's Department,

"Assistant Adjutant General."

Forced Labor

Martindell, the army captain's testimony revealed, /talked of a scheme for forced labor in industry to end the unemployment problem and later invited him to Martindell's Bernardsville, N. J. estate. Captain Glazier went after receiving approval from corps area head-

"I called up in order to verify his particular status." the witness said. "They said he was a personal friend of General Malone's: that he was a very rich man, and that anything I had to say would be at my own discretion .

'Drive Out Jews'

"While we were eating lunch there was conversation and during the conversation I noticed in his sister and himself a particular antipathy against he Jews . .

"He went on to state that there were a lot of people, particularly the Jews, that they were going to get out."

He contended that it was not the province of the Executive to enter the business of selling news to newspapers.

Mr. Landau's offers were, however, declined by the members of the Histadruth who dominate the Executive and who are anxious to control the news from Palestine through their own news service

The statement by the press office of the Jewish Agency was ignored here today in the London press and did not appear in any newspaper except one which caters to the Histadruth. The Jewish Times, the leading Jewish daily in London, edited by Morris Myers, a member of the Executive of the British Zionist Federation, also ignored the statement, since it clear-Iv indicates that it was issued by the Executive under the pressure of the Labor Farty only, which does not represent the opinion of the entire Jewish community in Palestine and which is facing opposition on the part of other leading Zionist groups, including General Zionists, Mizrachi, as well as of the Jewish industrial and farm associations.

The fact that the Executive of the Jewish Agency is being utilized by its laborite majority for fighting the only existing impartial news agency ir the world today received highly unfavorable comment in Zionist circles here. It is pointed out that the Jewish Telegraphic Agency has been serving Jewish interests for the past fifteen years, occupying an important position in Jewish life and doing important work for Jewish interests, not only in Palestine but also in all other countries. Criticism has been expressed here against the Histadruth for dragging the name of the Jewish Agency into an affair of which the majority of the Jewish Agen: y would certainly not approve.

The Times stated that the German authorities had so advised the British consulate general at Frankfort-am-Main, declaring that the government disapproved of the measures because they interfered with the regime's economic pro-

Nazi headquarters had ordered peaceful picketing of Jewish stores in order to warn Nazi party members against patronizing them, it was said. The pickets, however, exceeded their orders and interfered with the general public, creating much disorder when police sought to prevent this.
