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On the Saar Jews

Although the results of the Saar plebiscite will not be made known until tomorrow, it nevertheless is safe to predict that whatever the results are, the situation of the Saar Jews will remain hopeless.

There are seventeen Jewish communities in the Saar today. How many of them will re-main a year from today is not easy to foretell. Those Jews who are in a position to emigrate from the Saar are already leaving for other lands. Those who will remain will hardly be enabled to maintain their status as a community.

Those of the Jews in the Saar who do not leave the district will find themselves in a far graver situation than the Jews in Germany. There is no taxation in the Saar for the maintenance of Jewish institutions, as in Germany. quently the Jewish institutions in the Saar will be the first to be liquidated. Of the 5,000 Jews in the

Saar region not less than 4,000 have no means to emigrate. Only about 200 families have sufficient capital to be admitted

into other countries. The efforts which many Jews in the Saar will now make to sell out their property

within the twelve months of security guaranteed to them by the Franco-German agreement will hardly bring any results. Reports from the Saar already indicate that the local population is not in a hurry to buy any property from Jews, since it knows that the Jews will have to leave the country anyway within twelve months.

The fact that the League of

Nations failed to provide security for the Saar Jews for more than twelve months may perhaps serve to convince the voluble detractors of Jewry that their theory that the Jews are dominating world politics is nothing but a baseless myth. How different the situation of the Jews in the Saar would be today if "international Jewry" actually wielded any influence

in international politics!

The appeal which Rabbi
Ruelf, Chief Rabbi of Saarbruecken, issued on the eve of the Saar plebiscite, urging the world to raise its voice for the Jews in the Saar, is a direct indictment of the League of Nations — the very same League which anti-Semites all over the world so often accuse of being "an instrument in Tewish hands.

Work of the $J.\,D.\,C.$

By PAUL BAERWALD (Chairman, American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee)

The story of the J.D.C. has been known for many years. The word "Joint" is a house-The word "Joint" is a house-hold word in Eastern Europe and in many parts of Russia. The J.D.C. has been a bridge back to life for many thousands and it has been an agency be-tween despair and hope for a countless number.

In this country, we have come before the public periodically in an effort to raise money to make possible our great accom-In 1927, on plishment abroad. plishment abroad. In 1927, on the basis of a resolution at the national conference in Chicago, we created a national council comprising nearly 1,000 leading men and women throughout the country.
In 1933, we conducted cam-

paigns in 585 communities and in all States of the Union, der the leadership of the chairman of our fund-raising committee, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, with the assistance of our camaign director, Isidor Coons. 1934, we joined our efforts with the American Palestine Campaign (as indeed we had done previously in 1930), and con-ducted campaigns in close to 700 communities.

Formed in 1914 By Noted Leaders

To go back to its early his-ory, the J.D.C. was organized tory, in 1914 under the leadership of Schiff, Louis Marshall, Cyrus Sulzberger, Lee K. Frankel, Julius Rosenwald, Felix Fuld, among others, all of whom were active and were important members of our directorate un-til the time of their death.

In the years during and im-mediately after the World War, we cooperated with many non-sectarian organizations, such as the American Red Cross, the Quakers, Near East Relief and other bodies. In our work with the American Relief Adminis-tration, a number of the men whom we sent abroad as our representatives, under the lead-ership of the late Dr. Boris D. Bogen, enjoyed quasi-official sta-

The J.D.C. penetrated into every area of the war zone, dis-tributing food, medicaments, and clothing. It did its Lare in alleviating famine conditions in Russia under the direction of Dr. Boris D. Bogen and Dr. Jo-seph A. Rosen. It developed large associations of child-care, orted cultural-religious stitutions, established trade schools, organized summer colonies, restored and equipped hospitals and dispensaries, es-tablished the first Nurses' Training School in Poland and helped eradicate favus in Eastern Europe.

Established Permanent

Aid Organizations
In Palestine, it organized the
Malaria Research Unit, and it
has aided and continues to aid in a hundred and one ways, Not-ably, it has been able to establish permanent organizations for economic aid, such as:

 American Joint Recon-struction Foundation, which has enlarged and strengthened Jewish credit loan societies through-out Eastern Europe, through which a family population of 1,250,000 souls have been aided, and in this work it has been in continuous cooperation with the Jewish Colonization Association.

2. Agro-Joint (American Jewish Joint Agricultural Corporation) which has directed land settlement and industrial under-takings in Russia. It is impor-tant to mention that through the stimples of the J.D.C. activities and the Agro-Joint program, there was formed, not with the funds of the J.D.C., but separately, an independent organization, the American Society for Jewish Farm Settlements in Russia, Inc. As a result of the activities of these oversitions. organizations, in cooperation with the government of the U.S.S.R., there are now approximately 50,000 families, or to one-quarter of a million Jews on the soil.

3. Palestine Economic Corporation, which was organized in order to develop the commerce and industry of Palestine and, among other things, it has undertaken a large housing program. It is recognized as a pow-erful factor in the economic development of that country.

Activities Affect Lives of Millions

Thus, the direct and indirect activities of the J.D.C. have reached into the lives of millions of Jewish people throughout the world; and large sums are being utilized as revolving funds annually in behalf of the needy Jewish population abroad.

Our programs of relief and re-habilitation have been carried on in forty different countries and sections, and during the past twenty years, we have disbursed in the neighborhood of \$82,000,000. With great tenacity on the part of the executive committee and board of direc-tors, the J.D.C. was kept together, although there were times when the requirements abroad became more moderate, and local self-help in Eastern and local seif-help in Eastern Europe had measurably in-creased. However, when the new crisis in Germany occurred in the Spring of 1933, it was a great relief to know that the J.D.C. organization was available to the second of the second o able to meet the emergencies without delay, and it was gen-erally felt that if there had been no J.D.C. at that time, it would have been necessary to establish it.

Under the leadership of Dr. Bernhard Kahn, who transferred our major bureau to Paris our program immediately took on a larger scope. We were thus enabled to work more close-ly with the French National Committee which had established itself in Paris for refugee aid under the leadership of Baron Robert de Rothschild; with the Central British Fund for German Jewry of which Sir Os-mond E. d'Avigdor Goldsmid is chairman of its Allocations Committee; with the Jewish Colonization Association, originally founded by Baron de Hirsch in 1891; with the Hicem, and the refugee committees in the various countries—and since November, 1933, with the full cooperation of the High Com-missioner for Refugees (Jew-ish and Other) coming from Germany, Mr. James G. Mc-Donald. In Germany itself, we conducted our program t.rough the Zentral Ausschuss fuer Hilfe und Aufbau, on which are represented the most important welfare and economic aid or-ganizations of Germany.

Well-Planne Emigration Program

In this program of German aid, the main objects have been toward a well-planned emigration program, including emigra-tion to Palestine, the training of Jewish young people for produc-tive occupations, retraining the older people, strengthening the economic status of the Jews within Germany and in refugee countries, and for many constructive purposes.

The significance of the J.D.C. program lies, not merely in the help described above; it is important also in the measure of contact which it brings to the Jewish people of this cruntry with the problems and needs of the Jewish people abroad. Thus meeting the tragedies of Jewish existence, the J.D.C. carries on its historical mission.

Or is he, rather, defending democratic institutions against Fascist methods of government

The Supreme Court, that monu The Supreme Court, that monu-ment of conservatism, has just placed itself squarely across the path of Fascism. The basic attri-bute of Fascism in any of its manifold forms is the enthusiastic retirement of the representative legislature and the vesting of all governmental functions in a single body, whether it be one person or a commission or a class. As long as an elected legislature operates genuinely, and the power to issue edicts is withheld from the executive, Fascism is crippled.

Well, here is what eight of the nine Supreme Court judges have just asser'ed in a decision invali-dating a section of the oil laws under NRA:

"The Congress manifestly is not permitted to abdicate, or to trans-fer to others, the essential legislative functions with which it is Intive runca...
thus vested."

As long as that principle pre-As long as that principle pre-vails, legalized Fascism, support-ing itself hypocritically on the Constitution, will be impossible. The spectacle of Charles Evans s and his associates in the role of a bulwark against Fascism is not without its overtones of paradox. The decision, and others along the same line which seem inevitable, may put a large part of the New Deal into the discard. But in essence it would seem to be a curb upon elements which are fascinated by the vision of an American Mussolini or an Ameri-can Hitler.

Of course, when an American Hitler or Mussolini arises, he may ride roughshod over the Supreme Court as well as over everything else. But that's another story.

Long, long ago, as far back as 1930 and 1931, the unemployment dole was a foreign importation. It was un-American, en insult to our national manhood and a lot of other dreadful things. It was Big Business, in particular, which hurled these epithets. It would not permit the rugged individualism of American workingmen to be sul-lied by official hand-outs. spokesmen are favoring Federal

Saar Voters Involve U. S. A. in Troubles

The Chicago Tribune, comment-ing editorially on the naturalized Germans who proceeded from the United States to participate in the voting in the Saar plebiscite next Sunday, writes:

Peasants and Workers In Biro-Bidian

The Review of Reviews, analyzing the Jewish situation in Soviet Russia writes:

The Soviet government for-bade all anti-Semitic tendencies, and inflicted severe punishment on those who defied this pro-hibition. The intellectual sponhibition. sors of anti-Semitism were liable to the death penalty. But the Soviets were not content with nurely negative measures.

The injection of large bodies of Jews into the industrial prowas at first impossible. There was widespread unemployment in the towns and the period of reconstruction had only just begun. All the more eagerly did the Jewish youth force its way into the giant factories which sprung up during the first Five Year Plan.

At the same time appeared the plan of creating a Jewish autonomous territory in Biro-Bidjan, a district in East Siberia on the Manchurian frontier Biro-Bidjan is 8,000 kilometres east of Moscow and 1,000 kilometres west of Vladivostock. Its area is 70,000 square kilometres, three times as large as Palestine, and the Trans-Siberian railway runs through it for 332 kilometres.

The habitable parts lie along the railway and the rivers Amur and Urmi.

The northern part of the district is virgin forest (1.2 million hectars). In the west are mountains of great mineral wealth (chalk, iron, gold, graphite, coal, granite, marble and precious stones.) The northwestern part has sulphur springs, believed to possess valuable medicinal properties, and a sanatorium, "Kul-dur," has already been estabdur," has already been estab-lished there, which serves the whole of the Far East. The third great metallurgical complex of the Union is going to be developed in this district. For the first time in recent history a nation of merchants and middlemen is being transformed into a people of peasants and work-

Mosley Paper Reports Troubles in France

Sir Oswald Mosley's newspaper Sir Oswaid mosicy's newspaper, The Blockshirt, reports feeling against the Jews in France. Un-der the heading, "Low Class der the healing, Aliens" it declares

Feeling is becoming accentu-ated against the large numbers of low-class aliens in this country, in particular against refugees from Germany and also the permanent Jewish resident population. Too often latterly has the French press shown Jews to have been the instigators of crime and corruption

The French are up against the most pregnant crisis of their history and they must face the results of two centuries of false teaching, secretly organized and directed by able unscrupulous brains, and subtly imposed on the less competent and ignorant masses. The issues have come down to the bedrock of morality and the touchstone of truth, and and the touchstone or truth, and already a spirit of renaissance breathes suspended in the air. The changing tone of the press and the nature and direction of the applause at political meetings are witness of this. Our enlightenment in Britain will come later when the public mind

starts thinking.

Despite all external difficulties Hitler's appeal for direct conversations might well result in inestimable benefit, if France had a MAN with the French nation at his back to negotiate. The French have a little confi-dence in overtures through a body like the League of Nations, whose Jewish origin and influences are becoming more and more widely known.

Position of Jews in Austria and Germany

The Western Mail, published in Cardiff, Wales, finds a similarity between the condition of the Jews in Austria today and in Germany before Hitler:

The position of Jews is similar to that in Germany before Hitler got into power. They are small in number and mostly occupy positions of importance.
Their brilliant, artistic, and intellectual gifts have contributed largely to national achievement. Finance and the press are in the hands of the Jews, subject to the government. Of the 4,800 doc-tors in Vienna, 4,000 are Jewish; in the legal profession the pro-portion is even higher. Hostility to Jews is, of course, one of the main points of National So-

cialism.

The National Socialists, although "verboten," are numerthe strongest party. They are the middle classes reduced to poverty, often to utter misery, by the War; most of the former wealthy classes, and especially the younger genera-

Western Paper Finds Rays of Light

Opening of Soria to Jewish set-tlement is welcomed by the West-cru Jewish Bulletin as a means of alleviating some of the pres-sure in Central and Eastern Europe. Under the caption, "Rays of Light," it declares:

The pressure of millions of hungry Jews in Poland, or de-Judaised Jews in Russia, of insulted Jews in Germany, of threatened Jews in Austria, of pogromized Jews in Rumania had hitherto been relieved only by the relatively small immigration into Palestine.

Not only has this relief been small, but the pressure has brought into Palestine elements that threatened the further absorptive capacity of the country by undermining the principles of Jewish labor, by indulging in land speculation, and by ignor-ing the needs of a country in the state of becoming Jewish.

Under these circumstances it comes as a welcome message that the government of Syria has allowed Jews to enter and to buy land there. The fact that the land bought is on the Palestine border will ensure the safety of the Jewish population and will help to relieve the speculation with real estate that has threat-ened and is still threatening the solid foundations of the national upbuilding in the Jewish homeland

From Biro-Bidjan, too, reports indicate that Jewish colonization may be increased and that immigration of Jews from capitalist nds may be allowed to a de

It is to be hoped that the re-lief thus provided, small and insignificant as it is compared to the tremendous need of the millions of stricken Jewry, will not drive us into a frenzy of enthusiasm and will not turn every Jewish settlement into a new Zion. What is necessary now is careful and scientific settlement with a minimum of loca! "patriotism."

Tel Aviv's Growth

If Haifa has the economic fu-ture, Tel Aviv maintains its hegeture, Tel Aviv maintains its hege-mony in the economic present. In the last two years its population has doubled, so that it is now the largest single town in the country, with over 100,000 inhabitants. It has burst, as it were, its physical banks, and is spreading all round Jaffa, of which it was till a few years ago but a suburb. It has a school population of 20,000. It is now a full-fiedged municipality, and its municipal budget amounts to some \$5.000,000, and would ento some \$5,000,000, and would enable its trade to be more adequate-ly dealt with than is possible in the present port, even with the improvements made by the gov-ernment. That demand will have to be seriously met if the present rate of expansion in Jaffa-Tel Aviv rate of expansion in Jarra-Tel Aviv and its Judaean hinterland is maintained. The three main branches of the economy of Pales-tine, citrus growing, industry and commerce, are at the moment most completely exemplified in that


Good Psychologist

Sees Zionism Aiding Greeks To Find Jobs

Paper Says Movement Takes Jews From Country

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) SALONICA, Jan. 13.—The Zion-ist movement is of value to Greece from the strictly national view-point because it takes the Jews out of the country and opens new sources of employment to Greeks, the Phoni Tou Ipirotou, new Greek paper in Jannina, declares in its first issue.

Editorially commenting on anti-Zionist agitation conducted by a number of Greek newspapers, the paper declares that Zionism does not harm the country but the Jews themselves.

"If we examine the question ob jectively," it declares, "Zionism does not harm the country but the Jews themselves since it gives them the feeling they are here temporarily, not permanently. That is why we consider as unjustified attacks against Zionism. Zionism claims no territorial concessions. It aims at assembling Jews on their ancestral soil. That harms neither Greeks nor Greece. If Zionism does well for the Jews, it is a question for them alone. Nothing gives us a right to interfere with their affairs."



The paper expresses adherence to the view prevalent in some cir-cles in Germany that the return of the Saar may result in a new chap-ter in the policy of the govern-ment and, also, in its stand on in-ternal affairs. Such predictions, however, as have been often prov-en in the past, have been fathered only by the wishes of the Jews.
