### Jabotinsky **Gains Victory** At Krakow

### Renamed to Presidency of World Revisionists. Given Ovation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) KRAKOW, Jan. 14.—Extremists In the Zionist Revisionists movement suffered a crushing defeat last night when Vladimir Jabotinsky was re-elected president of the World Revisionist Union at the closing session of the sixth world

closing session of the sixth world conference of the group. A lengthy ovation was given Jabotinsky as he mounted the plat-form to thank his followers. He left immediately afterward for Cherbourg, France, where he will embark for the United States. The Revisionist conference

adopted resolutions declaring that adopted resolutions declaring that the present Palestine administra-tion handicaps the realization of the Balfour Declaration and the Palestine Mandate; affirmed belief raiestine Mandate; ammed belief in the idea that Great Britain will establish a Jewish state in Pales-tine as a result of pressure from the Jews; urged the formation of leagues to secure signatures for the Revisionist petition to the League of Nations and the British League of Nations and the British government; called for the convo-cation of a world petition confer-ence in 1986; protested the can-cellation of Palestine citizenship rights of Dr. Yevin and Aba Achi-meter, and agreed to participate in the World Jewish Congress. # Labor Groups Back AJC Elections

### Bloc Is Formed Vladeck Not Memebr To Participate In Conference

### District Parleys Will Be Called to Determine the Delegates

A labor bloc, which will organ-ize workers' groups and individ-uals for participation in the Amer-ican Jewish Congress national democratic elections on April 28, was formed at an all-day conference of representatives of Jewish organizations at Central Plaza Hall, it was announced yesterday.

The session was attended by 506 delegates representing 361 organ-izations. There was also an audi-

The council will meet at least once a month, while the executive committee will function between meet-ings of the council.

trict committees and conferences, planned for the purpose of nominating delegates to the American Jewish Congress.

Due to the flourishing prosperity of Palestine, hundreds of small banks are transacting business without having sufficient cover for their transactions and without this condition being realized, the report will point out, it is learned. The present banking laws permit banks to be established and conduct business without any minimum capital requirement or reserve.

To remedy this, the commission, according to informed banking circles, will recommend changes in the banking ordinances requiring all banks to have a minimum paidup capital of \$125,000 before they can engage in active banking. up capital of \$125,000 before they

# A Survey of Palestine's Progress

### Rise of Imports Has Featured Its Expansion

### Revenue So High Taxes Could Be Remitted.

**Guardian States** 

The following is the second of two articles by a correspondent praising Jewish achievement in Palestine).

An English government official ummarizing the extraordinary summarizing the extraordinary the last year and a half, said that the Jewish National Home had materialized. That is true in two senses. More than at any previous period since the British pation the Home has established itself in the conviction of all sec-tions of the population of Palestine and in public opinion outside

At the same time the immense development may seem to be pre-dominantly material. The figures of economic expansion, whether one looks at the affairs of the government or at private enter-prises, speak for themselves. In this article it is proposed to deal with the progress shown by the government returns.

Customs Returns High

The most significant figures of the economic development of the country are those of the customs returns. Till two years ago the customs revenue had not exceeded \$1,000,000 a year, and that figure was regarded as exceptionally high. It represented about forty per cent of the total revenue.

It is expected that the revenue

for the fiscal year 1934-35 will be in the neighborhood of £3,000,000 The monthly returns from import duties are steadily going up. For the month of October they reached the unprecedented total of £300,-There has, of course, been no raising of the duties; in fact, there has been in several cases reduction. The great increase is due to the ever-growing import of (a) building materials to provide for the industrial enterprises and housing of the new population;
(b) foodstuffs to supplement the local supply, which is inadequate as regards the staple commodities; and (c) benzine and petrol for motive-power.

#### Revenue Equals Expenses

The customs revenue this year will be more than enough to support all the charges of gov ment. The surplus of the Pales-tine administration naturally con-tinues to mount, and that though the government has initiated new social services from its affluence. The surplus amounts to over £3,-000,000, and so far as meeting the t would be possible to remit all taxation for a year.


Alternatively, the government could grant a bonus of £2 to every inhabitant of the country.

#### Policy Is Cautious

It is not likely to do either of these things, but is following the prudent policy of accumulating a reserve which will enable it to tide over any setback that may follow on the present expansion.

That is inevitable and not unhealthy in a country where population and entertry where population and enter-prise are growing primarily prise are growing primarily through immigration. increase which there is in

the value of exports comes almost entirely from oranges and grape-fruit. About 1,000,000 cases a year are added to the export; and that process will continue for years to come provided that new markets can be found.

#### Sees Huge Citrus Export

The area under cultivation of citrus fruit is growing at least in that measure, and some statistician has calculated that if the planting of citrus is maintained at its pres-ent rate Palestine will have 40. 000,000 cases of oranges to export in 1950.

The young industries of the country, which up to 1932 were showing a small but rising export, are now fully occupied in meeting the local demands, and a nearer adjustment of the balance of trade will probably be found for some time rather through the reduction of manufactured imports than by the increase of manufactured ex-

### Coin Use Rises

The figures of the Palestine currency in circulation are another indication of the material prosperity. When the currency was first issued in 1929 the value of the notes and coin in use was about £1.750.000. It rose in 1933 to £2,-500,000. It has risen now to over £4,000,000. The profits which the government derives from the coin-age are already a substantial item in the revenue account. They will certainly be over £100,000 in this fiscal year.

Turning from figures to the economic enterprises of the government, the most striking achievement is the Haifa Harbor. formally opened by the High Com-missioner not much more than a year ago, and already the quay accommodation has proved inade-quate. There is a proposal to enlarge it at a cost of some £750,000.

#### Pays Own Way

Economically the harbor is already paying its way. There was a trivial deficit on the working of the first year, but the area reclaimed from the sea in the making of the harbor, which has given Haifa a new front, and the government a large and most valuable site for warehouses, etc., after providing for the needs of the rail-way, custom-house and other pubhis services—that area is only be-ginning to be turned to profitable use. When it is disposed of it is likely that the harbor will bring substantial revenue

The Administration is adding to the main port a small oil port in which the tankers may load and discharge when weather interferes with those operations in the open roadstead. The pipeline from Kirkuk is already discharging its oil regularly at its Haifa outlet, and there is to be a cerossocial in-

auguration of the 700-mile subterranean oil-duct in January.
Rail Income Rises The railways of Palestine, which

are entirely controlled by the government, have had, and are having, a hard struggle to compete with the motor traffic both for passengers and for goods. The trunk roads made by the Administration are so good and the network of secondary roads is so large . . . It is quicker and easier for traffic to go almost anywhere by road than by rail. Nevertheless the railway receipts have shown substantial improvement during the last two years; and if it were not for the heavy interest charges that the Palestine railways are called upon to pay of £160,000 a year they ald also be producing revenue The interest charge is the harder a considerable burden, because a considerable part of it was incurred on account part of it was incurred on account of the sum paid to the British government for military expenditure on a railway that was not well suited, or well sited in some parts, for civil conditions. The better economic position of the Palestine railways is due in great measure to the carriage of the heavy goods imported for indus-

#### tries and for building Shops Employ 700

The railways have now at Haifa eir workshops, which had been till the last two years at Kantara., in Egyptian territory. That enter-prise gives employment to 700 persons, and the railways are alto-gether the largest employers of permanent workers. The Public works Department of the govern-ment actually heads them in the ment actually neads them in the number of persons in its employ, but a considerable proportion of their workmen are casuals. The department has at the moment a large and varied program. The major part of the new loan of £2,000,00 which was raised by the government this year will be used

for public works The principal item is for water supplies and drainage, which accounts for about half the loan. In this item the most important feature is the provision of the water supply for Jerusalem. After years of baffling negotiation and weary waiting the concession which had been given by the Turkish gov-ernment for bringing water to the waterless capital has come to nothing, and the government is now carrying out itself the provision of the public utility.

#### Oil From Iraq

The oil pipeline which opened yesterday in Iraq, with its terminus in Haifa, considerably widens the economic possibilities of Palestine.

Under the agreement concluded between the Palestine government and the Iraq Petroleum Company the transit of the mineral oils of the company through Palestine will make Haifa a very important harbor city. The agreement is valid for seventy years and provides among others that the Petroleum Company must em-ploy local labor in Palestine and may construct its own railways and roads there.

At the expiration of the concession seventy years hence, all rights, immovable property and fixtures will automatically become the property of the Palestine government, unless the concession is extended or is renewed. It is not without reason that

the Palestine government has seen to it that British subjects alone should be the ones to acquire land in the Haifa Bay section. The Palestine gov-ernment knows what this section will be worth strategically as soon as the operation of the oil pipeline begins.

The American Consul Gen-eral in Palestine, foreseeing a year ago the possibilities in the Haifa Bay area, has notified the State Department in Washington to encourage American citizens to acquire land in this area. Other consulates in Palestine have acted similarly, notifying their governments of the strategic importance of the land which can be acquired in the vicinity of the Haifa har-

It seems, however, that the Palestine government made it difficult for citizens other than British actually to secure land in the Haifa Bay district. It was on this account that sev-eral foreign consuls in Palestine last month submitted their protests to the Palestine administration .

In these days, when oil is one of the most important factors in world economics, the completion of the Iraq oil pipeline and its termination in Haifa makes Palestine one of the most important commercial centers in the entire Near East. It will certainly add to the prosperity of Palestine.

# Black Gold in Holy Land

By MELVIN JACOBS

East and West joined hands again yesterday in Haifa, with the official opening of the 1,200mile-long Mosul oil pipeline which has one of its Western termini in Haifa. On October 14, 1934, oil flowed for the first time through the gigantic pipeline. The test was a success and the "fifty million dollar pipe dream" of Sir John Cadman, chairman of the Iraq Petroleum Company, Ltd., was an assured success. The other Western success. The other Western terminus of the pipe line will be at Tripoli, Syria.

Through this pipeline, which runs from the heart of Iraq to the Mediterranean, 4,000,000 tons of oil will travel annually to Haifa and Tripoli from the w of Kirkuk, hundreds of miles inland, across desert, river and mountain

### 'Eighth Wonder Of the World'

Truly international in all its aspects, this gigantic scientific and engineering feat, already called the "eighth wonder of the world," will tie the nations of Europe and the United States in an effort to exploit the rich oil fields of Iraq. British, French, Dutch, Italians, Germans and Americans participate in the venture, with the concession divided among them according to an agreed plan worked out after much bickering at San Remo by world statesmen.

The Iraq Petroleum Company is operating under a seventy-year-concession with the governments concerned. The concession is international in its nature and has been the subject of many disputes among the governments of the world.

#### Difficulties Ensue

#### On Concession

The concession itself dates back to 1911 when a Turkish company was formed to develop Mesopotamian oil fields. After World War the concession was taken over by a British

group. When, however, Ameri-can, French, Dutch and Italian oil companies, backed by their governmente nrotested Iraq Petroleum Company was formed, and they were included.

A syndicate of American oil companies holds a twenty-three per cent share of the total concession, which is expected to add a tremendous reservoir of oil as the older fields are drained.

Despite much talk of pipe line building, final negotiations were consummated in 1931 when Sir John Cadman signed conventions the governments of Iraq, Palestine, Transjordania, the Lebanese Republic and Syria. Preceding the negotiations, pre-liminary survey work had been carried out by American and British engineers.

#### American Machines Dig Long Trench

Early in 1932 the real work of construction began and at the close of the year some 10,-000 natives, directed by hundreds of American, French and British engineers were at work. Not only American engineers, but American mechanics and American products played a highly significant role in the building of the giant pipe line. More than 125,000 tons of pipe were laid across the desert at the rate of seventy-five miles a month. 10,000 Work Under

### Heat of the Desert

Across the desert that previously had known only camel caravans, American digging caravans, American digging machines dug a three-feet-deep trench, sections of pipe twelve feet in diameter and forty feet were placed in the trench, welded together by husky Tex-ans, covered with tar and then finally with thick brown wrapping paper of the kind commonly used in American department stores. The record number of ioints welded in one working day of nine hours is seventy-three, and all-time world record

But the laying of the line, difficult as it proved to be, was least of the difficulties that confronted the engineers Food had to be provided for thousands of workers and camps had to be arranged for them. It was workers and camps had to be arranged for them. It was necessary to transport millions of gallons for the workers in the desert heat

Hundreds of thousands of tons of material were transported from all over the world and then rushed to where the work was in progress in huge Ameri-can motor trucks specially built for the purpose. It was neces-sary to tunnel through rivers, cut through the loose, shifting sands of the desert, and dig through mountains.

Three years of work are over and the Mosul oil line with ter-mini at Haifa and Tripoli are realities in the industrial and political worlds. But for Palestine and the Near East, completion of the task opens a new and bright chapter in the his-tory of the ancient lands that make up the Near East. Near East Ioins

### The Modern World

In Haifa a new, large harbor has been built. On the Bay of Acre huge steel storage tanks await the thousends of tons of oil that soon will be poured into them. Tankers from all over the world, and freighters bearthe world, and freighters bear-ing cargoes, will pull up to the Haifa docks, load their cargoes of oil and Palestine products and return with goods from the various countries of the world.

The ancient city of Haifa, which knew war and desolation long before the Crusaders erected a citadel there, is pulsing with a new and rich life. But this time it is the peaceful development of the land, the slow Jewish immigration and the awakening the modern industrial life which is replacing the ancient langour of a formerly stagnating country.

The Saar Jews When the results of the pleb-

iscite are made known today in Saarbruecken, hundreds of Saar Jews will already be on the other side of the frontier.

Though the League of Na-tions has guaranteed security for the Jean in the Saar under the Nazi regime, no Jew will take the chance of remaining under the Hitlerites if he can help it. The difficulty of the situation

lies, however, in the fact that the great majority of the 5,000 Jews in the Saar have no means to leave the country. They have not sufficient capital to be admitted anywhere. They are all

mitted anywhere. They are an small traders and professionals. The statement which was made yesterday in behalf of Hitler, that the Jews in the Saar will be treated like the Jews in Germany, will do little to pacify the anxiety now pre-vailing among Saar Jewry. Hitherto not a part of German Jewry, the Jews of the Saar have no financial aid to adjust themselves to new professions, as the Jews in Germany have. They have no rich members in their communities personally to finance such adjustments. Nor do they have any community in-come which would make this task easier, as it does in Ger-many, where the Jewish community is fortunate enough to be in a position to enforce com-pulsory taxation upon every pulsory taxation upon e Jew in the country. An Immediate Problem

The problem of the Saar Jews must, therefore, become the im-mediate problem of the existing Jewish relief organizations. There will be about 4,000 Jews left in the Saar and something must be done to enable them to leave this territory within a maximum of twelve months from today. Something must be done to make them feel that the Jews of the world are not indifferent to their position.

Four thousand Jews is an in-

significant number in compari-son with the millions of Jews for whom it is necessary to pro-vide urgent relief. The case of the Saar Jews is, however, dif-ferent than that of the needy Jews of Poland, Austria or even Germany. The Saar Jews must be taken care of immediately "

and without delay.

A Solution Wanted

The best solution to the prob-lem would be if the Jews of the Saar were permitted to enter the neighboring countries, where they could become absorbed without difficulty. Many of them would continue their trading in these countries of exile, just as they did in the Saar. Others would also adjust themselves

there without outside assistance. It seems, however, that the doors of the neighboring countries are to be tightly closed for entrants from the Saar. The French government issued in structions yesterday that no refugees from the Saar should be permitted to enter Alsace Lorraine or to settle in Paris. The Dutch government also issued strict instructions yesterday against permitting the entrance of immigrants from the Saar. The same line is also followed by countries like Belgium and Czechoslovakia. Thus the Jew of the Saar, like the other anti-

Nazi element there, has nowhere Several hundred Jews have crossed the border during this week-end to Luxembourg and settled there. These are the richer elements of Saar Jewry. What of the poorer Jews?

under the red flag than to events under any other standard, and for that reason feel (perhaps mistak-enly) that I can write more vividly and convincingly on matters Soviet than on any other.

Considered more broadly, from the social point of view, I harbor a profound conviction that what happens in Russia is vastly more significant than what happens elsewhere. There, as nowhere else, ideas and professions are being

Even in its failures and contradictions and excesses the Soviet regime is dealing realistically with the stuff of reality; any summary of the present world which fails to take it into consideration seems to me worthless. And its suc-cesses and achievements, it goes without saying, are crucial in any attempt to judge the chaotic world we live in.

For Jews, that significance of the new Russia is heightened and deepened a hundred times. The cold statistics of revolutionary history prove that Jewish leadership was a dominant element in the crucial years of the seizure of power. The mere listing of the spectacular names of the Russian decade of 1917-1927 underlines that fact, because it includes names like Trotsky, Sverdlov, Zinoviev, Radek, Kamenev, Litvinov, and many others.

Moreover, the Soviet solution of the problems of minority national-ities and races is its most outstanding rounded accomplishment. The anti-Semitism that still exists, whether in the population or in the ruling circles, is a residue of the past. The government itself is definitely and vigorously fighting against it. Among the youth it is clearly dying out.

Anti-Semitism in Russia survives, parodoxically enough, at the two extremes: among the anti-Soviet elements and in the ruling bureaucracy. In the former, of course, it is a natural expression of old-fashioned hatred for Jews who are blamed, without pretense of logic, for all the ills on the calendar. In the ruling circles, feeling against Jews thrives on an ordox economic diet, in the acute competition for better-paid politi-

cal plums. Because of their higher literacy, their more agile adjustment to new conditions, their larger participation in the revolutionary move-ment, Jews do hold a dispropor-

### Behrman's 'Rain From Heaven' their own judgments, to see clear, to create propaganda from the blas Is a Strong Appeal to Reason

By HENRY W. LEVY S. N. Behrman, to my way of thinking, is one of the most neg-lected of modern playwrights. Not that his plays cry of loneliness in an attic trunk, not that his pro-duced plays do not attract cus-tomers and not that he isn't high ly regarded by the critics, but that he hasn't received the high approhation of the critics of the the-atre this is his due. And too few critics, so far, have recognized him for the penetrating, sincere theatrical thinker that he is.

A master of dialogue, he is Am-A master of dialogue, he is America's greatest, they all say. But that is not enough. Instead of easting aspersions on his art by talking about a too-thin story, the critics might well show greater insight by discoursing on the depths and subtleties of his writ-ings. If Elmer Rice were right about critical shortcomings, no better case could be presented than that of S. N. Behrman.

Take his latest play as a case point, "Rain From the Heaven," Theatre Guild presentation at the John Golden Theatre, is the best play that has yet been written play that has yet been written about the Jewish problem in gen-eral and the Hitler question in play that isn't set in Germany, specific instance. And it is a play that isn't set in Germany, that doesn't as much as once mention Hitler and in which not a single storm trooper molests a respectable Jewish family, long rooted in Germany—even to the extent of an inter-marriage or so Protest Against Stupidity

Such are the elements of the typical Hitler play; they were the grist from which playwrighting mills turned out "Birthright," "The Shattered Lamp," "Kultur" and "Races." But they are not the stuff of which "Rain From

Heaven" is written. The reason is that Behrman didn't set out to write a polemic against Hitlerism; that his play was born in his mind around a was born in his hind around a personality and a specific instance that had the stuff of which great plays are written. In the writing, despite the maintenance of a complete neutrality, a protest against tyranny, race prejudice and class stupidity came about.

Despite the fact that Behrman

is not a propagandist, "Rain From Heaven" is a propaganda play. It is a propaganda play in the same sense as the late John Galsworthy's "Loyalties." Both playwrights sense as the late John Galsworthy's
"Loyalties." Both playwrights
were neutral; both presented a
comprehensive picture. In their
appeal to the intellects of their both Behrman audiences, both Behrman and Galsworthy presented unweighted debates on a given subject. It was up to the rugiences to make

create propaganda from the bit that existed in their own minds.

Appeals to Reason "Rain From Heaven" is an ap-

peal to reason. It is an appeal to the finer instincts among men. Nevertheless the characters are persons who live their own lives; they are not puppets created in he image of a playwright's bias. Devotees of the propaganda play

bevotees or the propagata play—in its commonly accepted use, the proletarian play—object to Behrman's plays on the ground that they point no solution. But is there a ready-made solution for the world's woes; and if there is, does the theatre-more limited in scope than most of the arts—pos-sess the capabilities to solve world problems?

# France Prepares for Saar Exodus

# Limited Areas To Fugitives

Orders Them Excluded In Alsace Lorraine and Paris

(Jawish Telegraphic Agency)
PARIS, Jan. 14.—The French
government issued strict instructions today to frontier and customs officials not to permit refugees from the Saar to remain in Paris or in Alsace Lorraine.

The refugees will, however, be permitted to enter France in ac-cordance with the French tradition ordance with the French tradition of hospitality for politically perse-cuted groups. They will be con-fined to the western and south-western sections of France and will be subjected to rigid governmental control.

French papers point out that the refugees will aggravate an already bad economic situation, but declare that they must be admitted. Thou-sands of refugees from the Saar are expected to enter France once the Saar is handed over to Ger-

In recent months there has been much ill feeling toward the refu-gees, and the French police con-ducted an anti-alien drive which resulted in the expulsion of many

The chief cost of developing the The chief cost of developing and Mosul fields is involved in transporting the oil from the region near Bagdad to Mediterranean ports. The pipeline covers about 1,200 miles.

Originally the plan was to run the pipeline along the Haifa-Bagdad railway route, and to make Haifa the terminus. Great Britain favored this plan because it meant that the pipeline would be run through territory under British mandate
